

## Wrongful termination

Suit claims Open Meeting Law violation

An allegation that Dibble Public Schools Superintendent Chad Clanton went around the state's Open Meeting Law to fire the football coach in 2018 is behind a lawsuit filed May 6 in McClain County District Court.

Jacob Offolter claims in his lawsuit that Clanton wanted his son to start for the Demons.

According to the petition, Dibble's school board hired Offolter as a high school teacher and head football coach for the 2018-19 school year on March 26, 2018.

Four months later, Offolter attended a coaches' clinic in Tulsa. He was arrested and charged with assault and battery/domestic in the presence

of a minor child.

According to an affidavit in that case, Muscogee (Creek) Nation Lighthorse Tribal Police were called to investigate a domestic at the Riverspirit Resort shortly before midnight on July 25.

They found Offolter standing outside a room with a scratch on his face. He said he and his wife had argued.

Offolter's wife had a "significant injury" to her face, according to the affidavit. She told officers they were in bed and began arguing, but she was unable to say what the argument was about.

The Offolters' son told officers his mother rolled over

**Purcell Water** Department crews worked feverishly on a broken water line at the corner of Brule and 10th Monday afternoon and evening. The leak was discovered about 2:30 p.m. But crews couldn't begin digging until the gas line was located around 4:30 p.m. Water was out in parts of Purcell for at least an hour and there were reports of low water pressure as well. Water Department Superintendent Michael Minor said homes up on hills didn't have enough pressure to have water for awhile. He reported everything was back up and running by 1:15 a.m. after a valve (inset) was installed.

Tyler Graves, construction manager with Goldsby Construction, said the company is bringing in additional crews and working 10-hour days to make up time lost due to the weather.

The construction schedule had called for turf to be in by July 8, but that date has been

Graves said there has been good progress on the field house, adding construction fencing will be removed by Friday.

Locker installation will be this week.

The new junior high school will be framed out in three weeks and workers can then start hanging sheetrock.

## Dr. Bill McCurdy honored

Dr. Bill McCurdy, a 1957 graduate of Purcell High School and Norman resident, was among a trio of men honored recently by the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine Alumni Association.

The Physician of the Year-Private Practice award was presented to retired surgeon William C. "Bill" McCurdy III.

He is the third generation in a family of physicians, a legacy that began when his grandfather arrived in Purcell in 1903 to practice medicine.

After McCurdy graduated from medical school and residency, he went to Vietnam, where he served as chief of surgery.

Upon returning home, he established his general surgery practice in Norman and also

went to his father's practice in Purcell once a week to perform surgeries.

Altogether, he practiced medicine 40 years.

His cousin, Rick McCurdy, M.D., and a 1961 graduate of Purcell High School, joined him for 27 of those years and continues that surgical practice today.

"He was my hero growing up across the street from him in Purcell," Rick McCurdy said. "We always got along great, and still do. He had an excellent bedside manner and he always maintained his calm in the operating room. He deserves Physician of the Year. As far as I'm concerned, he's the physician of all years. I think that much of him."

OU Medicine's longtime chaplain and children's advocate, Danny Cavett and OU Medicine orthopedic surgeon Charles Pasque, M.D., were also honored at the event.

Each year, the OU College of Medicine Alumni Association honors two alumni – one in academic medicine, one in private practice – as well as a "Friend of Medicine" who has contributed to the health and well-being of Oklahomans.

Cavett, director of the pastoral care team for OU Medicine, was presented the Friend of Medicine Award. Cavett came to OU Medicine more than 40 years ago and now leads a group of 11 chaplains who support patients, loved ones and hospital employees around the clock.

The Physician of the Year-Academic Medicine honor was presented to Pasque, a professor in the Department of Orthopedic Surgery and Rehabilitation at the OU College of Medicine.

Pasque serves as director of the residency program, as well as director of research and sports medicine.

## Tips to keep mosquitoes out of your landscape

We are still a few weeks out from the official start of summer, but with warmer weather, spending time outside is a priority for many. It is fun to invite friends and family over for a cookout. Unfortunately, there will likely be some unwanted pesky guests...mosquitoes.

Much of the state has received quite a bit of rain lately, and while the moisture is welcome, it can lead to a greater population of mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes breed in open water sources, so the best way to eliminate these pests is to get rid of their breeding grounds, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist.

"Look around your landscape at anything that collects water. Flowerpots, rain gutters, watering cans, old tires or birdbaths are prime breeding ground for mosquitoes," Hillock said. "Through some landscape design, we unintentionally create an atmosphere pleasing to mosquitoes. Fortunately, just dumping out the water is an

easy fix."

For those who may employ the use of rain barrel or other containers to collect rain water for irrigation purposes, cover them with screening to keep out mosquitoes. Be sure to keep the screens clear of debris.

Hillock said something as simple as a puddle of water in the lawn can be a breeding ground for these annoying pests.

"Fill in those low places where water puddles form in an effort to cut down on the mosquito population. Clean out your rain gutters so water doesn't build up inside and create another breeding ground," he said.

"Also, check all of the outdoor water spigots around your home to ensure they aren't leaking and causing puddles of water. Flush the water from your bird bath at least twice a week. Not only will this cut down on mosquitoes, the birds will like it, too."

Children's toys and wading pools are other places mosquitoes like to hang out and lay eggs. Be sure to turn these things over following each rain

to dump out collected water. If possible, store them in such a way that water will not collect.

For those who have a swimming pool, fish pond or other body of water in the landscape, make sure it is properly maintained. In addition, keep grass cut short around your home so adult mosquitoes will not hide there.

When working in your garden, be sure to wear insect-repellent clothing and outdoor gear. Lightweight, long-sleeved shirts will help provide protection for your arms. This also will help with minimizing sun exposure.

"Obviously, there's no way to completely rid your yard of mosquitoes and keeping yourself protected can be challenging. Insect repellents are another way to provide protection, as well as using citronella oil products such as candles and tiki torches in your outdoor space," Hillock said.

"With summer just around the corner, families want to spend more and more time outdoors. Don't let the mosquitoes get the best of you," Hillock concluded.

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## Keep your tags

A mandate from the Oklahoma Tax Commission states that beginning in July Oklahoma motorists will keep their license plates when they sell their vehicles.

Citizens will put the old tag on the new or used vehicle they purchase.

The reason is unknown to the Purcell Tag Agency.

Attempts to contact the Oklahoma Tax Commission as to the reason why were unsuccessful.

Turns out, Oklahoma is one of only eight states where a license plate stays with the vehicle rather than the original owner.

State officials estimate that practice costs the state between \$35 and \$40 million a year in sales tax, excise tax and registration fees.

This is not a tax increase, only a measure to stop “title jumping”.

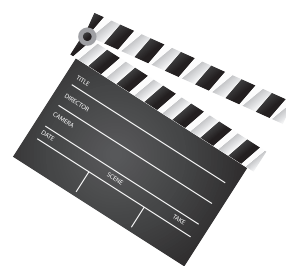

If that plot summary gave you a strong feeling of déjà vu, it's because this isn't the first time a story about competing con artists scamming rich people on the French Riviera has been put to film.

In 1988 there was a comedy released called "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels," starring Michael Caine and Steve Martin as two competing scamsters. Caine being the sophisticated genteel type, and Martin a less refined small-time hustler.

Of course that film itself was a remake of a 1964 movie called "Bedtime Story," starring Marlon Brando and David Niven in the same roles.

As I've said in the past, I'm not opposed to movies being remade.

If the filmmakers behind these films have something new to add to these stories, or perhaps a different perspective on the same source material, I'm all for it.

In fact "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" did just that. That film turned the concept of the original on its head, completely changing the ending and updating it for modern sensibilities all with one simple, yet brilliant, twist.

So what does "The Hustle" do to switch up the script?

Well it makes the main characters women instead of men, they change the main character from the refined hustler to the small time swindler, and they throw in more overt sexual references.

That's about it.

Everything else, including the overall story, entire scenes, and even the surprise twist ending was carelessly ripped from the previous film with barely a thought.

It's basically the same exact movie, just worse and with more sex jokes.

Unlike Steve Martin, Rebel Wilson isn't remotely convincing as a con artist.

Rebel's doing her normal comedy schtick here. Generally her characters are incredibly blunt and overly honest to a fault.

That works fine for her in many movies, but not one where she's supposed to be a woman who makes a living off of lying to men.

Honestly, I think she was horribly miscast. Don't get me wrong, I think she's a fine comedic actress. She just doesn't fit the role here though.

Anne Hathaway, on the other hand, was perfectly cast. She plays the role of the refined chameleon con woman quite well. If there's one bright spot in the entire film, it's her.

It's just a shame the film around her wasn't up to snuff.

The whole experience felt like a cheap knockoff of the 1988 film.

Sure, most of the same events happen, but often they lack the same set up, making some scenes feel shoehorned in. Included not because they made sense in this version of the story, but because they were in the original.

For example, in "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" early on there's a scene with Caine's character pulling a scam on a wealthy woman at a roulette table.

The gist of it being him pretending to be a prince in danger, gambling his last dime to help fund freedom fighters in his country.

The whole scam requires

the "prince" to lose his bet, thus gaining sympathy from his mark.

This routine is given a comedic twist later on when Caine and Martin's characters decide to have a competition to see who's the best con artist.

When he tries to pull the same scam again on a different woman, instead of losing his money and gaining the mark's compassion, he inexplicably wins over and over again.

It's a funny scene and it works because of that setup at the beginning of the film.

"The Hustle" has the same exact scene at a roulette table during the swindlers competition, but without the first scene showing the scam work.

It seems the filmmakers didn't understand why that scene was funny. They just saw it in the other movie and threw it in without thinking.

It's like they told the punch line of a joke without including the setup.

So beyond swapping the main character's genders and telling the jokes worse, this movie doesn't have much to offer anyone who's seen "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels." In fact it'll just be annoying to anyone who enjoyed the 1988 film.

But at the same time, if you haven't seen "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" many of the scenes here just won't make sense.

"The Hustle" is the worst kind of remake. One that's both too lazy to do anything new with the concept, and too incompetent to recreate the elements which made original fun in the first place.

"The Hustle" is rated PG-13.

Next is "Pokémon Detective Pikachu." In a world where Pokémon and humans live side by side, a detective named Harry Goodman goes mysteriously missing, prompting his 21-year-old son Tim (Justice Smith) to discover what happened to him.

Aiding in the investigation is Harry's former Pokémon partner, a Pikachu with a detective's cap (Ryan Reynolds). Finding that they are uniquely equipped to communicate with one another, Tim and Pikachu join forces on an adventure to unravel the tangled mystery. Chasing clues together through the neon-lit streets of Ryme City.

Alright, I have a confession. I am one of the few kids who didn't get wrapped up in Pokémon during the 90s.

I didn't play any of the Gameboy games, didn't have any of the collectable cards, and I certainly didn't watch the ridiculously popular animated series.

I think the whole "pocket monsters" moniker, which is what Pokémon literally translates too, gave my parents pause in accepting the collectable creatures.

I wasn't the type of kid to outright defy my mom and dad, so I basically ignored Pokémon growing up. Besides, I had plenty of other obsessions to fill my time, including dinosaurs, super heroes, and Star Wars, so I never really felt like it was missing out.

Since then, as an adult I've learned a bit more about Pokémon, especially from popular alternate reality game Pokémon Go, and I've even watched a couple episodes of the cartoon.

Still, I don't really have a big emotional connection with the franchise. I like Pokémon fine, but since I didn't grow up with them, I just don't have the nostalgia many people my age have.

Which brings me to this

movie.

I have to admit, despite not being a diehard fan, seeing Pokémon occupy a living breathing live action world is quite impressive.

Pokémon replace every real animal here. Instead of cattle, you have herds of Tauruses. And instead of birds, you have flocks of Pidgey and Pidgeotto.

And in Ryme City, the Pokémon become even more ubiquitous.

They're everywhere. Roaming the streets, or sleeping in them in the case of Snorlax, coexisting with humans side by side.

As someone without a lot of knowledge about Pokémon, I thought the setting here was very well done and invited plenty of fun ideas to explore.

Unfortunately, since I'm not steeped in Pokémon lore, the overall story for this movie felt more than a little convoluted to me.

I don't want to spoil the details, but suffice it to say the film gets pretty weird. Especially in the second half of the movie.

What started out as a detective noir-ish story, led to a bizarre ending that felt more like a cheesy Saturday morning cartoon than anything. Complete with a nonsensical super villain plot.

It wasn't awful to the point of being unwatchable, but by the midway point my eyes had definitely started to glaze over.

Performances wise, it's basically impossible for me to dislike Ryan Reynolds in a movie at this point.

Granted, having him voice a cute little Pikachu is a bit of a stretch. His voice does not match the cuddly looking creature at all. But I guess the contrast between his voice and character is kind of point.

Either way, Reynolds is definitely one of the biggest highlights of the movie. He basically brings all the humor, interjecting with funny lines almost constantly.

Sadly, not every actor can be Ryan Reynolds, and the rest of the performances were a bit hit or miss.

Justice Smith was okay for the most part, but lacked the emotional punch in the film's more sentimental scenes.

And Kathryn Newton, who plays a junior reporter which helps our detective pair along the way, plays the character a little too campy for my tastes.

Again, like the middling story, none of the acting outright ruins the movie. It just doesn't quite live up to the fantastic setting the filmmakers created here.

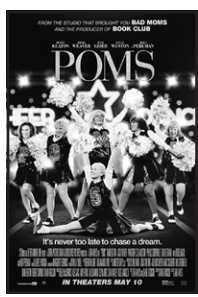
Overall, this is a cute buddy adventure movie. Probably the least bad video game based movie ever made. But as game enthusiasts know that's an incredibly low bar.

I'm sure fans of the series, children and adults alike, will get a lot more out of it than I did.

Definitely worth seeing it if you're a Pokémon fanatic. If nothing else, it's cool to see the real world filled with all these fascinating creatures.

Third this week is "Poms."

Following the sale of her estate, Martha (Diane Keaton), decides to move into a retirement community to live out the rest of her days in peace.

But instead of peace, she winds up with a next door neighbor named Sheryl (Jacki Weaver) who insists on keeping Martha company, whether she likes it or not. Together the two of them decide to form a cheerleading squad, much to the disdain of many of her

fellow residents.

This movie is kind of an odd duck.

On the surface it looks like a comedy. At least that's what it's marketed as. But oddly the least effective part of this film is the humor.

There laughs here were surprisingly sparse. The few that exist come at the expense of the ages of the main characters, and the rest involve Martha's friend Sheryl openingly discussing her sex life.

Honestly, at its heart this film isn't really a comedy. It's a sports drama.

You have the leader with Martha. A woman who always wanted a to be a cheerleader, but never had the chance.

Her plucky sidekick Sheryl, who always believes in her no matter what.

A group of inexperienced, yet enthusiastic squadmates who are terrible at first, but through a series of training montages become an amazing cohesive team.

And you have the over-the-top villains, who will stop at nothing to keep our hero from living her dream. In fact, this movie has a few varieties of antagonists.

There's the de facto leaders of the retirement community, a group of snide southern women who see a group of elderly cheerleaders as a legal liability.

A group of high school cheerleaders, who just seem to enjoy abusing our main characters because they're grumpy teenage girls with nothing better to do.

And finally, for our final villain, we have the son of one of the members of the cheer squad. An obnoxious, overprotective adult man who treats his adult mother like a child. He is by far portrayed as the most despicable.

In the end though, the most malicious malefactor that permeates the entire film isn't a person at all. It's mortality itself.

Death in this film is a near constant subject.

In fact, one of the first thing Keaton's character Martha says in the film is that she moved to the retirement community to die.

Occasionally people dying is played up for a laugh or two, but it's largely treated seriously, at least when it involves Martha. Dying seems to be the sole subject on her mind.

All that makes this movie surprisingly morbid.

This isn't a happy-go-lucky film about a group of seniors who decide to become cheerleaders. It's about a woman living out her dreams while she has the chance, before her expected inevitable death.

So with all that said, it shouldn't surprise anyone that this movie ends up being more of a tearjerker than a laughfest.

There were definitely a few moments, especially towards the end, where I found my eyes welling up.

Unfortunately, the filmmakers here didn't know where to draw the line, and by the very final scene the whole experience felt very emotionally manipulative.

In the end though, "Poms" is a crowd pleaser. It's not a particularly great movie. It completely fails at being a comedy and it follows the generic "sports film" storyline to a T, but I expect most people seeking this movie out will enjoy it.

Just don't expect a ton of laughs.

Finally, last this week is "Tolkien."

This film explores the formative years of the renowned author J.R.R.

Tolkien's (Nicholas Hoult) life as he finds friendship, courage and inspiration among a fellow group of writers and artists at school.

Their brotherhood strengthens as they grow up and weather love and loss together, including Tolkien's tumultuous courtship of his beloved Edith Bratt (Lily Collins), until the outbreak of the First World War which threatens to tear their fellowship apart.

It's no secret to anyone who reads my reviews that I love Peter Jackson's film adaptations of Tolkien's "The Lord of the Rings."

Those movies had a large impact on me as a teenager and the behind the scenes documentaries for those films are a big reason I became interested in how movies were made in the first place.

However, I'm sad to say the books they're based on aren't quite my favorite.

I forget why, but in the early 2000s, back when the films were originally released, I was forced to read all "The Lord of the Rings" books before I was allowed to watch the movies.

It started out fine. I began with precursor to the the trilogy, "The Hobbit," which is a pretty easy read. Not surprising as it was released as a children's book.

But then I moved on to "The Lord of the Rings."

Maybe it's because I have the attention span of a gnat, or perhaps I'm just hopelessly uncultured, but those books felt like a complete slog to me.

I don't remember how long it took to finish the entire series. I just remember it being an absolute struggle for me.

Even so, I do have a fondness for the stories and the fantastic world brought to life by the mind of Tolkien.

However, I'm ashamed to say, even though I watched nearly every piece of behind the scenes footage for the film adaptations, I never really delved too deep into the life of the author himself or the events that inspired him.

And for that, I really do appreciate this movie.

While "Tolkien" might not be a particularly deep dive into the famous author's formative years, it was compelling for someone like me who was mostly uninformed.

The film is less about what inspired the fantasy of Middle Earth, and more focused on the

fellowship.

The story here centers around Tolkien's friendship with three other young men growing up, and their club dubbed the T.C.B.S., Tea Club and Barrovian Society, named for the tea shop they hung out at while discussing their hopes and dreams for the future.

The film also delves into Tolkien's relationship with Edith Bratt, their budding romance, and the struggle to stay together despite being forced apart.

Throughout all this, the film intercuts scenes from the future during Tolkien's time in the trenches during the First World War and the horrors of battle.

These war scenes were by far the least interesting parts of the movie to me.

The film doesn't really explore how the war affected Tolkien. The whole time he's just searching for one of his friends, while having hallucinations of shadowed creatures in his fevered state.

This would potentially be compelling, as the movie implies the horrors of war inspired the darker creatures of Tolkien's fantasy world, but the film does nothing to explore this aspect of Tolkien beyond showing the creatures.

And if that wasn't disappointing enough, from my research it seems in reality Tolkien never mentioned experiencing hallucinations and they were completely fabricated for the film.

Clearly the shadow creatures were thrown in as a nod to the fantastical elements of Tolkien's writings, but considering how tacked on those scenes felt, I think the film would have been better without them.

Beyond that complaint, I enjoyed this movie quite a bit.

The performances were quite good all around. I especially like Lily Collins as Edith Bratt, and I thought her and Nicholas Hoult had some good chemistry together.

Sure, it's not exactly action packed, but for the most part I found the film quite compelling.

Is this a movie I'd recommend rushing out to watch? Well, probably not. But if you have a love for Tolkien's stories and don't know anything about the man himself, I'd say this film is a decent starting off point. Certainly worth at least a rental.

"Tolkien" is rated PG-13.

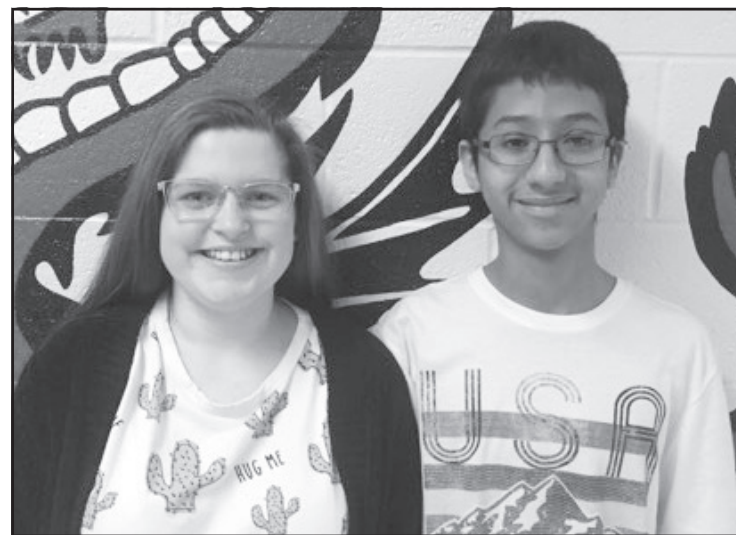

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# LARC benefits from bond

## DOC utilizing \$116.5 million Legislative funding

It has been six months since the Oklahoma Department of Corrections began working on maintenance projects touching every state prison including the Lexington Assessment and Reception Center in Lexington.

Last session, the state legislature passed a \$116.5 million bond to help modernize the failing infrastructure of DOC.

The agency has identified dozens of critical infrastructure areas needing repair or replacement.

“We are right where we want to be in the timing of this massive project. Working through state statute which mandates

how we must bid projects as well as juggling security at each prison facility takes a lot of attention to detail. DOC has an excellent team working together to make this process run as smoothly as possible,” Faron Bryant, DOC Construction and Maintenance Director, says.

Six months into the three-year bond project, DOC has either completed or is in some phase of moving forward on more than 130 projects.

Those projects range from updating and replacing failing water and gas lines, updating electrical systems at aging facilities, to replacing inefficient

or nonworking heat and air systems like the one at LARC.

“I appreciate the legislature providing DOC the ability to put money back into our dilapidated buildings,” DOC Director Joe M. Allbaugh said.

“For years DOC only had the money to apply Band-Aides to what amounts to gaping wounds involving critical infrastructure.

DOC has assembled a team to ensure we use the bond money in the most cost-effective ways. One way is using inmate labor when possible.”

So far, DOC has spent close to \$40 million of the \$116.5 million bond.

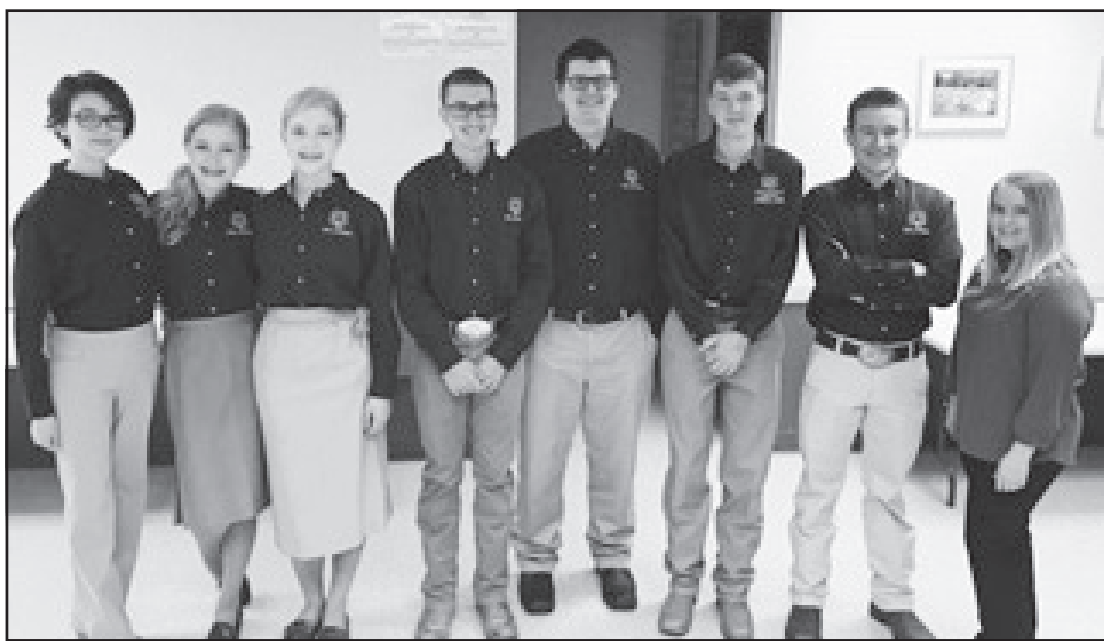

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# Discovering the Americas

Trey Alderman's two-wheeling life on the road

After Trey Alderman graduated from Wayne High School in 2017, he took a summer job in Montana, intending to return to Oklahoma in the fall and enroll at East Central University in Ada.

Instead, Alderman cancelled his ECU classes and the summer job extended through autumn and winter. By April 15, 2018, the Wayne native was enroute to Argentina – on a bicycle.

He didn't quite make it to Argentina. But make no mistake. He pedaled a far piece, landing eventually in Bogota, Colombia.

Alderman estimated start to finish, he cycled about 10,000 miles. An impressive feat in anyone's book, but more so perhaps given that he wasn't a cyclist when he started.

In fact, an Internet search put the cycling notion into his head. During a search for cheap ways to travel, Alderman discovered cycle touring.

"It seemed the perfect pace for me," he recalled. "You rely completely on yourself."

On the open range of Montana, Alderman quickly fell in love with cycling.

"There are Bureau of Land Management lands everywhere," he said, "and beautiful cycling routes. You

can go the length of the state and not see any homes."

His family had plenty of misgivings when Alderman announced his plans to cycle across two continents.

They tried to talk him out of it and when that didn't work, they told him to be careful.

He and a friend left Montana in April 2018. The first leg of the trip took them through the scenic Sierra Madres and along the west coast to San Diego.

There, they parted com-

pany.

Holton would be the first of several cycling companions he shared the trail with.

He next met Liz Dodd, a journalist and cyclist from the United Kingdom. She had just finished a year-long cycling journey across Europe to China.

They traveled the Baja Peninsula together before boarding a boat for mainland Mexico.

There, their paths diverged though they continued to meet in locations across the country.

"She was one of the coolest people I ever met," he said. "We disagreed on so many things, but we're best friends now."

They parted company in Mexico City and Alderman finished the southern leg through the country solo.

Sometime after crossing into Nicaragua, Alderman met a cyclist from Estonia and they traveled across Costa Rica and Guatemala and into Panama together.

Alderman missed crossing paths with the migrant caravan by three weeks, though he passed through the same Mexico-Guatemala border crossing they did.

When he entered Guatemala, his passport was

so damp that the officials couldn't stamp it. He had to spend an hour in front of a fan to dry the pages before he could get the stamp and continue his journey.

The fare through the Panama Canal was too dear, so Alderman hired a local with a speed boat to take him from Panama to Colombia.

From the seaport of Cartagena, Alderman cycled nearly to Venezuela before turning south and continuing to Bogota.

He stayed two months in Colombia and would probably be there still had he not run short of money.

Still, frugal could be his middle name and Alderman's expenses were minimal.

Alderman spent about \$3,000 for his special Kona touring bicycle and gear.

And nine months on the road – or back country trails that passed for roads – cost him about \$7,000.

He actually lived two months in Colombia, spending only \$700 of his hard earned cash.

The most he ever carried on his person was the equivalent of \$300 and he relied on ATM's throughout his trip.

He cooked most of his own meals, but also found people along the way willing to cook for him when he bought the groceries.

It was that "mi casa es su casa" kindness and hospitality that he remembers most.

"People helped me out all the time," he said.

One incident occurred in Colombia. A woman agreed to cook his meal and after he ate, he accepted the woman's offer to use a hammock for a brief nap.

He intended to sleep just 30 minutes, but was out for three hours. When he awakened, he apologized and started to leave.

The woman insisted he spend the night with her sizeable family, which he did in a room crowded with six beds.

"It was a neat experience, someone opening up their very humble home to a complete stranger who barely speaks their language," he

said.

And about language.

Alderman wasn't at all conversant in Spanish before starting his trip.

And he didn't really start picking it up until he got into Central America.

From Bogota, Alderman flew back to the States, landing in Dallas. Following a visit with his father at Fort Worth, he completed his trip cycling from there to Wayne. He got home January 21.

Alderman is the youngest of four – sisters Abby and Shelby and a brother, Corey. The only time he felt unease was in northern Mexico when he was stopped by men armed with AK-47s. He is still unsure if they were with a cartel or were local militia.

They accepted his statement that he was enroute to Argentina and let him go.

At no border crossing were his belongings ever searched.

Perhaps the safest he felt anywhere on the trip, including the U.S., was in Colombia. In fact, the country proved so welcoming that Alderman is considering emigrating to Latin America in a few more years.

Colombia is a real possibility as it is "very easy to get citizenship there," he said.

But he wants to fulfill his wanderlust first.

As soon as there is a break in the weather, he will cycle back to Montana, where a chauffeur's job at a 5-star resort awaits.

He wants to work and save his money for his next great

adventure across Europe to Asia or vice versa. And maybe a junket from Alaska through British Columbia.

"My plan is to do this until I'm 25," he said.

He is 20 now.

Then he wants to enroll in college in Montana, where in-state tuition is low and "start to settle down in my early 30s."

"I don't know if I want kids though," he added.

"Something I think I've learned is find something you are passionate about outside of family or work. If it makes you happy, go ahead and do it."

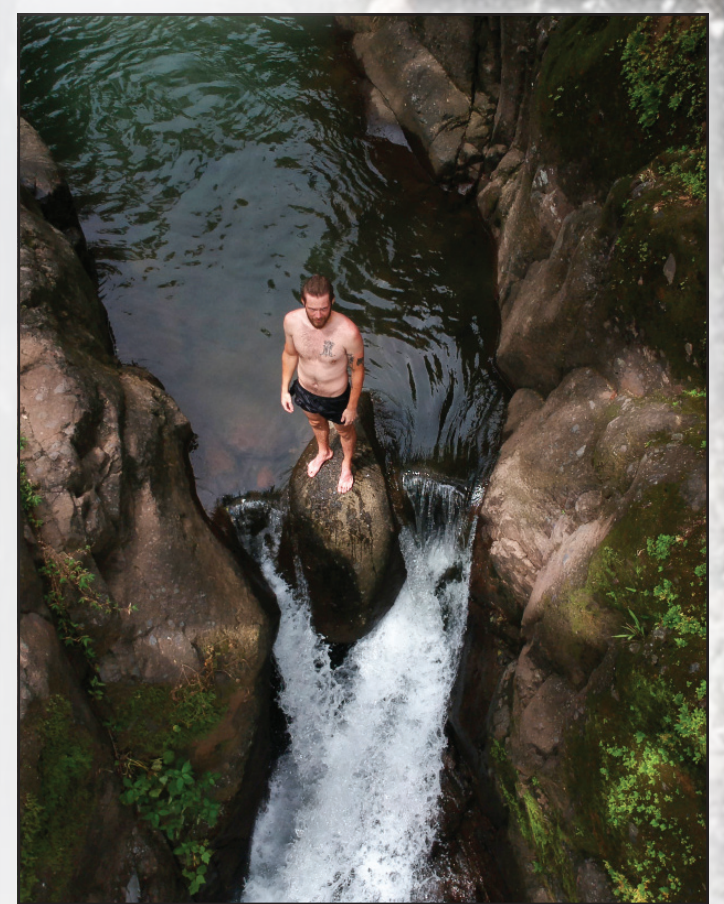

on Offolter, angering him. The boy said his father picked his mother up and slammed her on the bed before pushing her into the bathroom.

Neither party was able to recall how they got their injuries, officers stated in the affidavit.

A Tulsa County judge dismissed the misdemeanor charge on September 25 when the prosecution's witness failed to appear for a discovery hearing.

Between August 3 and 6, Clanton allegedly contacted four of the district's five school board members through a group text to gather the board's support to fire Offolter.

The state's Open Meetings law explicitly forbids "informal gatherings or any electronic or telephonic communications ... to take any action or to take any vote on any matter."

An exception exists for teleconferences, but only when

an agenda listing the issue to be discussed is posted, along with the location, address and telephone number of each site.

Additionally, no executive session can be conducted by teleconference.

No agenda was ever posted, according to the lawsuit.

Supporting document to the lawsuit relates the text discussion on August 6.

Clanton wrote, "FYI...I'm firing Jake as our head coach and recommending a guy named Greg Nation to be our head coach...if Jake gets cleared we can use him as an assistant."

Board member Steve Long replied, "I don't know if I can vote to fire Jake without a conviction."

And Jeff Burr posted, "Note \* this is a conversation that should be done individually. We do not want this to be misconstrued as a meeting."

According to the lawsuit, at the same time, Clanton told Offolter not to worry about his job, citing a precedent the district set the previous year when a second grade teacher was charged with domestic assault.

That teacher continued to teach for Dibble.

The district hired Nation who started as head coach on August 6. Clanton's son rejoined the Demons the following day, according to the lawsuit.

Offolter was suspended on August 6 and later fired as teacher and coach. He was never paid for his teacher contract, according to the lawsuit, damages he now seeks to recover.

The lawsuit also seeks punitive damages.

Clanton called the lawsuit a "really frustrating thing for me," adding he needs to consult with his attorney before commenting further.

and he hopes to turn on air conditioning in the building by mid- to late-June.

Work is still on track to complete all paving by July 1.

Superintendent Jason Midkiff said that as of 5:15 p.m. Monday, the Legislature still hasn't passed an education budget.

Midkiff said the Senate does not agree with the budget proposal supported by the House and Gov. Kevin Stitt.

Still, he added, it is anticipated that the budget will include \$70 to \$72 million earmarked for teacher raises. That would give teachers a \$1,200 pay hike. "Locally, I like where we are financially," the superintendent said. "State revenue numbers are good (and) the state economy has stayed strong. That is always a good sign considering the last few years and dealing with cuts."

Midkiff said the district's

purchase of Lions Club Park should be completed this month. The land adjacent to the football field should alleviate parking issues.

He reminded the board that Purcell High School graduation will be at 7:30 p.m. May 24 in the high school gymnasium.

The board authorized Midkiff to sign all current fiscal year expenditure reports, disbursements and cash receipts filed with the State Department of Education.

They also appointed Tracy Folsom as board representative to negotiate with the Purcell Association of Classroom Teachers for the 2019-20 school year.

The board approved the sale of \$2.18 million general obligation bonds on June 6 and also approved the district's annual technology E-rate.

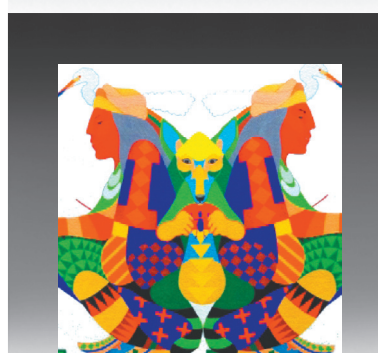

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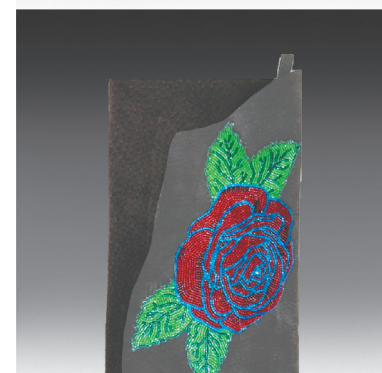

It's the second year the award has been handed out.

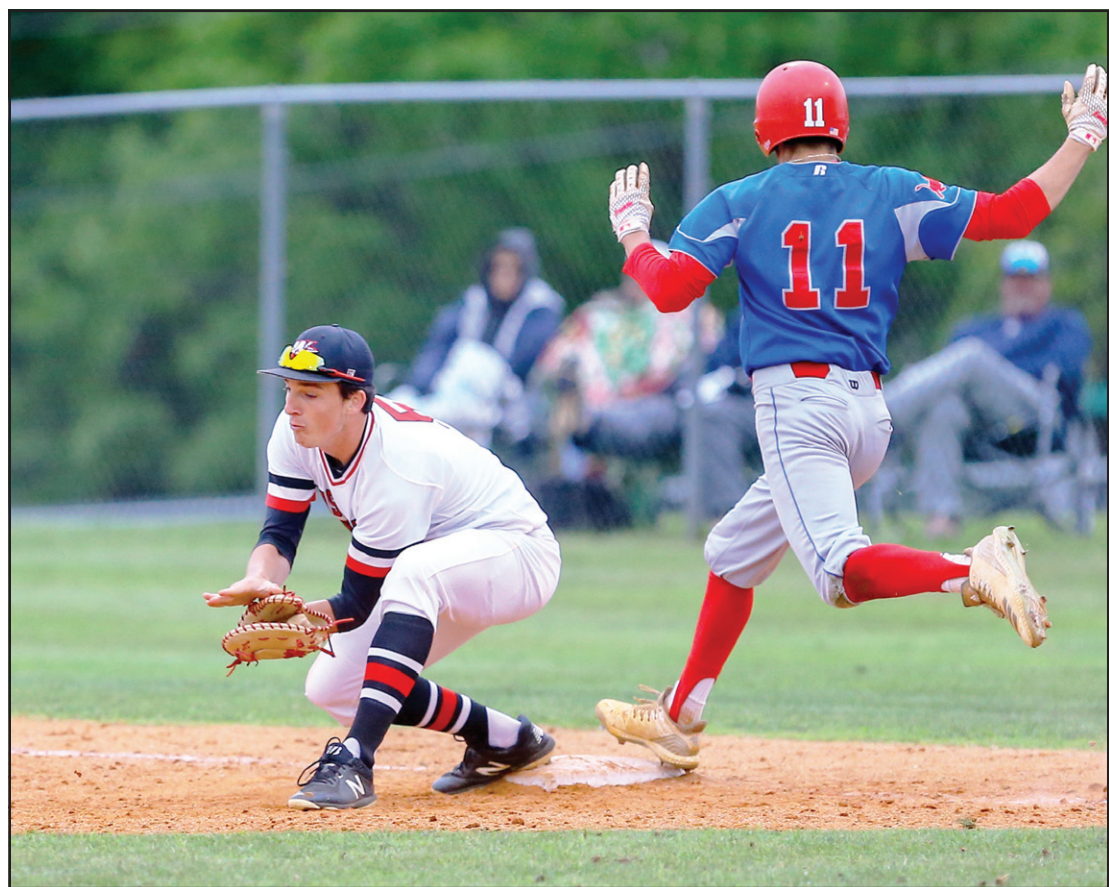

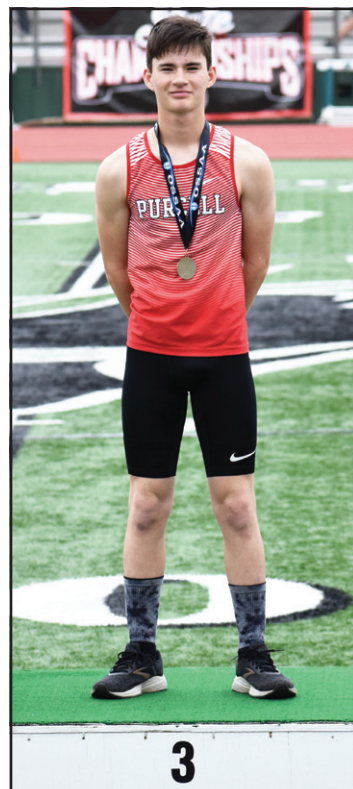

I cut a comic strip from the newspaper long ago, in which someone was complaining, "Just look around - no salad bar, no bowling alley...you call yourself a church?" While it was mildly humorous, it also reflects the way the world has become.

To many people, a "church" is a means of fulfilling their worldly needs and wants. It has come to the point that James Kelley, a Washington, D.C., atheist, founded a church.

Kelley said, "We all love the incense, the stained glass

windows, the organ music, the vestments, and all of that. It's drama. It's aesthetics. It's the ritual. That's neat stuff. I don't want to give all that up just because I don't believe in God."

One has to wonder about Mr. Kelley's motivations, but he's far from alone. I spoke to a director of the Florida branch of the United Church of Christ (a similar name, but no connection). He said approximately 40 percent of their membership is agnostic, not sure if there is a God or not. When I asked him why his people even bothered

to gather together, he said it was for "a sense of community." In other words, they view "a church" as an organization just like the Lions or the Rotary Club.

This mindset is how people walk away from a church service saying something like, "I just didn't get anything out of worship today." They have a mistaken idea of what worship is about. Worship to these people is a means of

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

We have all felt the blood-boiling symptoms of anger. Anger is listed as one of the traditional "seven deadly sins." But Christian theologians through the years have offered different understandings of this common emotion.

St. Thomas Aquinas thought that anger itself was natural and morally neutral. Anger becomes good or evil depend-

ing on what we do with it. If our anger leads us to work fervently to correct a matter of injustice, then it is channeled into the good.

For example, a mother's child is being bullied at school. Her anger gives her the courage to speak to school officials about ways to correct this harmful practice.

But if our anger leads us to lash out against another person because our own ego has been hurt, then we are surely in sin. St. John Cassian wrote that

anger should only be directed at our own sin, or perhaps sinful conditions, but never at another person. His biggest problem with anger is that it can become a stumbling block to our prayer, to our union with God.

When it is good, anger is motivated by a love for others, a passion for justice. When it is bad, anger fights for my own selfish cause - disrespect to my person, or damage to my repu-

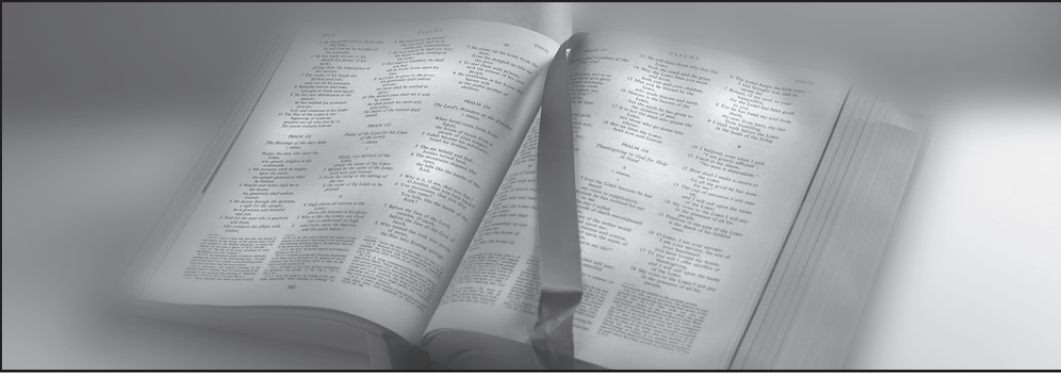

going and getting some kind of fulfillment.

This is why the so-called "mega-churches," who follow the Saddleback Church pattern developed by Rick Warren and documented in his book "The Purpose Driven Church," look for what the "unchurched" want. They provide drama, rock music, and laser light shows. Rick Warren himself has realized that this attracts crowds, but it doesn't change people; thousands of people came but left unchanged.

Biblical worship must be done in spirit and in truth (John 4:24). The Greek word

translated "worship" comes from word describing a dog licking the hand of his master. The purpose of worship is not to "get something," but to give something - our devotion to God, our Creator and Master.

It should not be a choir or musicians performing for an audience, but rather the congregation directing their attention toward God. The one who is being worshipped has the right to demand how worship should be conducted.

tation. Anger can go wrong in both its target and in its manner of expression.

The waitress gets scolded when it is actually the cook who should be blamed! And even when we have a right reason to be angry, we can let our emotions lead us to over-respond in a way that is not appropriate.

And finally, when we hold onto resentment, we are diminishing our own life. Instead, we should be "quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger, for the wrath of a man does not accomplish the righteousness of God." (James 1:20)

What do we do when we think that we have a problem with "wrath," which is anger as a vice, anger that is misplaced and/or out of proportion? One solution is to keep a journal for one week in which we write down each day each time that we have expressed anger.

What exactly were we angry about? What was the intensity of our angry response (on a scale of 1 to 5)? Later we look back at the journal and see if we notice any patterns that emerge. Were we angry too often? Did the situation about which we were so angry resolve itself independent of our anger?

If I felt that I (or another person) was being wronged, did I have reasonable expectations about what I or this other person deserve? As with most sin, pride is often the root of anger. With practice we learn to manage our angry rather than let it sweep us away. We can also ask ourselves if there was a way to channel that angry energy into something positive.

When I worked as a campus minister at Baylor, I found myself angry one night at my student leaders for their lack of commitment and responsibility. I used that energy to rearrange and decorate our little student center. I worked on it until 12 Midnight (long past my bedtime). And the next day everyone loved it! And maybe it gave them a little more desire to invest also.

Jesus once said "I am meek (gentle) and humble of heart." (Mt. 11:29). Gentleness is the counter-balance to anger. Jesus did get angry, but gentleness was the primary mark of his character. And so should it be with us.
