WIND DAMAGE in Wanette

NWS continuing investigation into destructive storm

The National Weather Service in Norman reported there were two confirmed tornadoes in the Wanette area Sunday night.

The closest one to Wanette was five miles south of Asher, the weather service said.

That EF1 destroyed a barn and some other farm buildings near SH 3W and County Road 1450.

Rick Smith, Warning Coordination Meteorologist, said the weather service is still investigating the Wanette storm.

"We can't say for sure if it was a tornado or not.

"There was quite a bit of straight line winds in the storm but there were also some smaller brief tornadoes embedded in the storm," Smith said.

"We are continuing our investigation of the Wanette

Do trees need to be wrapped after fall planting?

Protective wraps may be needed at planting time. Young, thin-barked trees such as ash, maples, fruit trees and others may develop sunscald unless protected.

Sunscald in the winter months occurs when the bark on the southwest side of a tree inswarmed by the sun during the day, followed by a sudden plunge in temperatures that kills a portion of the bark.

Wraps around trees can also

protect against rodent damage or injury by equipment. Misused wraps can result in damage or tree death by girdling, disease, insects or excessive bark moisture.

The normal application of tree trunk wraps is from October to March for the first two growing seasons. Wraps should be removed each spring prior to spring growth.

Paper or cloth wraps allow the excess moisture to be released, but do not protect as well against mechanical or

rodent damage.

Plastic wraps provide better protection but if applied too tightly can cause girdling.

Wraps should be applied loosely from the base up to the first branch in an overlapping spiral. Periodically inspect the wraps for trunk damage and insects.

Trees with twigs that shade the trunk should be left, if practical. Cut them back a few inches to encourage foliar cover. They can be removed after two years.

Health literacy program grant

Purcell library to receive \$4,240

Purcell Public Library is one of nine branches in the Pioneer Library System that will receive a grant for its health literacy program.

The grants are available through the Oklahoma Department of Libraries.

The local award is for \$4,240. In charge of the programs it will help fund is Karen Fielder.

In total, Pioneer branches are receiving \$51,239 with individual grants ranging from \$1,575 to \$9,000.

This is the eighth year the Oklahoma Department of Libraries has funded its Health Literacy Initiative.

The initiative has gained national attention and Okla-

homa is participating in a study to look at health literacy programs in four states—Oklahoma, Michigan, Vermont and North Carolina.

Researchers from Wayne State University, the University of Oklahoma and the University of North Carolina are beginning a three-year study on health and wellness programming at small and rural public libraries.

The goal is learning how those institutions address health and wellness through public programs.

Libraries in these states are challenging traditional ideas of what counts as health literacy work, according to Christine D'Arpa, an assis-

tant professor at Wayne State University. "This project will let us study how small and rural public libraries in four different states are developing health and wellness programs in an effort to build health literacy."

Oklahoma ranks 47th in the country for the health of its citizens according to the latest America's Health Rankings from the United Health Foundation. That is down from 43rd a year ago.

Oklahoma's Health Literacy Initiative is funded by the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services. For additional information, call 405-522-3242, or visit libraries.ok.gov/literacy.

Those rolls are provided by the assessor's office.

Property owners have the option of paying the tax in full or paying half by December 31 with the balance due by April 1.

If no payment is received by the end of the year, interest begins accruing at the rate of 1.5 percent per month.

The National Weather Service (NWS) in Norman told me they are still investigating where it was straight line winds or a small brief tornado.

Rick Smith, Warning Coordination Meteorologist with the NWS told me late Tuesday they should know more about the storm in Wanette in the next few days.

Whether it was a small tor-

nado or merely straight line winds doesn't really matter. The bottom line is damage was done to homes, buildings and trees.

When we were in Wanette Monday OG&E crews were scattered all over Wanette working to restore power lines.

Power outages forced Wanette Schools to send students home very early when power was out to the district except for the cafeteria.

A Wanette school official said at first the gym and cafeteria had power.

Then the elementary school lost power.

The high school never had any power.

By the time everyone got to school there was no power so students were sent home.

The school official said by Tuesday morning everything was back to normal power wise.

I didn't see them, but ...

Imported fire ants are around us

I was working for **The Daily Ardmoreite** 30-some years ago when I wrote an article that the imported fire ant had finally managed to ford the Red River and establish itself on Oklahoma soil.

I interviewed the county agent who took me to a mound of dirt with no discernible hole. He took a stick and barely disturbed a bit of soil at the edge of the mound.

Immediately the mound came alive with hundreds of tiny ants intent on a seek and destroy mission.

We quickly stepped away from the mound.

The defensive display was impressive. I never forgot what I saw that day, but it wasn't at the forefront of my mind either.

Until Friday.

The paper received a call from a man who said a grain truck had overturned near Slaughterville, spilling its load.

I got my camera and headed out. To get the best photo, I had to walk through an overgrown field.

I must have missed the

mound hidden in the heavy vegetation.

I was headed back to my car when I experienced sharp pain around my left ankle.

Glancing down, I saw that I had walked through sandburs and several were stuck to my shoe. I continued walking back to my car where I began picking them off.

I initially thought the pain was from the sandburs, but while the top and sides of my shoe were covered, there were none close to the top around

my ankle.

The itching and burning started while I was picking the sandburs off.

There were red marks, but no sign of what caused them.

The itching let up after a time and it wasn't until Saturday night that I noticed every red spot was now a tiny irritated pustule.

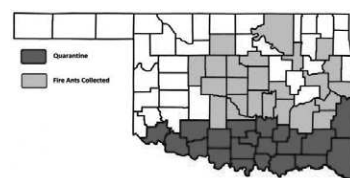
Most were around my ankle, but I found a few others on the calf of my leg.

I ruled out poison ivy or poison oak largely because the things, while unsightly, don't itch.

Through process of elimination, I realized I'd most likely been bitten and stung by imported fire ants.

Changing the course of the opioid epidemic

While it takes time to change the course of a national health crisis, I am encouraged that noticeable progress has been made to combat the epidemic of opioid abuse and addiction in the United States.

Because of bipartisan solutions in Congress in recent years and the Trump Administration's focus on related initiatives, the course of the opioid addiction crisis is indeed starting to change.

According to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), provisional estimates of overdose deaths dropped by 5 percent between 2017 and 2018.

And as HHS Secretary Alex Azar recently pointed out when

speaking about the National Institutes of Health's HEAL Initiative, this is the first time in more than 20 years that there has been a decrease in this sobering statistic.

In recent years, Congress has prioritized financial resources to address the opioid crisis. And I am proud that the first significant federal investment in funds to target opioid addiction came while I was chairman of the subcommittee that directs funding to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

While shepherding the funding bill for fiscal year 2017 in the House, my subcommittee included the first ever flexible grant to states for prevention, treatment and recovery services

related to opioid substance use disorder.

Lawmakers have continued to prioritize and increase funding for resources to prevent and treat opioid addiction in communities.

In fact, as part of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, funding for programs addressing opioid substance use disorder was increased by \$3 billion, and the fiscal year 2018 appropriations bill included more than \$4.6 billion in total funding for opioid addiction and treatment services.

Since 2017, HHS has received more than \$10 billion to fund these vital programs. The largest program is opioid

Student Loans

One of the big issues in politics right now is cost of college and student debt. Among the Democrats running for president, some are calling for free college and others are looking to pay off student loans. There is some history on this subject, but there is also some personal history. Loans are something I know too well.

When American soldiers came home from WWI, they had a difficult time rejoining their old lives. With so many men coming home at once, it was difficult finding a job as factories were cutting production after the war. Many others found their jobs filled by black Americans who moved north during the Great Migration from the south.

To help relieve some of the suffering, Congress passed the Bonus Act of 1924, giving soldiers a \$1.25 bonus for every day they served. The problem was the payment was deferred to 1945. In the midst of the Great Depression, 15,000 veterans marched on Washington, demanding their bonuses, known as the Bonus Army. When Congress denied their appeal, most of the "Army" returned home, but those who remained were driven out by the U.S. Army. President Hoover claimed they had been infiltrated by communists and anarchists.

With World War II, Roosevelt wanted to do better for the current soldiers at war and the G.I. Bill was born. Among other things, the G.I. Bill paid for college for returning veterans. For the first time in our nation's history, working class Americans could afford to attend college. By the mid-1950s into the 1960s, almost half of college students were using the G.I. Bill.

In the 1960s came the space race, and the federal government decided we were lagging behind the Russians in school and made education a priority. The National Science Foundation alone gave \$500 million to pay for education, especially in STEM fields.

Today higher education is still as important, but also incredibly expensive. It seems as if universities are raising costs each year. There are many reasons for this that I do not have time to explore. Some are positive, some are not. Uncle Sam can still foot the bill with the G.I. paying for college if you are willing to serve in the military. But for many low-and middle-class citizens, the cost of college is becoming not worth the return.

One of the problems I see today is the need to attend large state universities. I understand the appeal. I earned my Master's and Ph.D. from such schools and I loved the atmosphere of these schools, especially during football season. Yet when I hear complaints about the cost of schools, I question why students are not looking at other options.

This is going to seem like an advertisement for my school, but it just happens to be a good example. I know not having a football team in Oklahoma seems like heresy, but I teach at a small public liberal arts university that is much cheaper and has a smaller student body and class sizes. Also, all our classes are taught by professors, not grad students, and we focus on undergraduate research. Yet the large universities are full and turning away students while we have room for more.

When it comes to government interference with college, I am of two minds. Free college does not seem fiscally possible for the government. As for loans, when the borrowers took them, they knew they had to pay them back, just like any other transaction. Yet now that I have a senior in high school, I am starting to see the college experience in a different light from my almost twenty years of being a professor.

A little personal history. I have a son starting his senior year and, like many of you, is starting the process of applying to colleges. What a pain! My son has autism. He is intelligent and high functioning, but his special needs limit our college options. We need a college near family that also has the program he wants. Though he has three sets of grandparents who each live by small colleges that would work, only the one in southern Utah has the program.

I have three children. I work at an amazing but small university while my wife is a public-school teacher, so basically, I have always told my children they needed to earn scholarships to pay for college. I am lucky to have great kids who take their schooling seriously.

My senior has done everything that could be expected of him, even with difficulties. He has a 4.2 GPA, is a standout on the academic team, takes A.P. and college classes, and is even an Eagle Scout. I felt we were covered for a smaller regional school like the one in Utah. Yet what I found out is that scholarships are rewarded based solely on his GPA (they only accept up to 4.0) and the dreaded ACT.

Get ready for electric scooters: Who is responsible?

Fall is finally here in Oklahoma. Between the golden leaves and cool crisp air, you will begin to see electric scooters flooding the city streets.

These rental scooters can be found along the curb in hundreds of U.S. cities including Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Norman and Stillwater. Before you download the app and hop on, there are a few things you should know to protect yourself.

According to Consumer Reporters, eight people in the U.S. have died while using a rent-by-the-minute dockless electric scooter since the fall of 2017. One of those deaths was a five-year-old boy who was riding with his mother in Tulsa in April.

Along with numerous injuries, these deaths highlight the potential dangers of the scooters. Understanding the insurance implications related to electric scooters will help you make responsible decisions.

Your health insurance could help defray the cost of medical bills in case of an accident. But what if you are riding a scooter and you hit a pedestrian, damage someone's property or cause a car accident? You might think your auto insurance would kick in; however, most car insurance doesn't generally cover vehicles with less than four wheels.

Homeowner's or renter's insurance may cover an accident that occurs on a traditional bicycle, but it does not cover motorized bike or scooter trips.

The two largest scooter companies in the United States generally place the responsibility for accidents on riders by listing in their rental agreements that riders relieve the companies of liability. You must agree to those terms before you can ride.

And despite the scooter companies' liability insurance, responsibility for damages is likely to fall on your shoulders

because of the terms and conditions agreed upon when you downloaded the app.

What can you do to protect yourself? Call your insurance agent. You may be able to add an umbrella policy to your homeowner's or renter's insurance policy. An umbrella policy can cover more scenarios and include higher limits for coverage than a typical policy.

There are a few other ways to protect yourself on an e-scooter.

- Wear a helmet: While it is not required by law in Oklahoma to wear a helmet while riding a scooter or a bicycle, it is highly recommended.
- Operate the scooter in right-hand lanes and bike lanes where possible: Your agreement with your scooter rental company will tell you to use streets and bike lanes. Riding motorized scooters on sidewalks is illegal in most cities, and you can be cited for doing so. Know where you can ride before you hop on.
- Keep your eyes on the road: You may be tempted to share photos or videos of your new adventure on social media while operating. Always pay attention to the road.
- Inspect the scooter before you ride: Check to make sure the brakes are working properly before taking off.

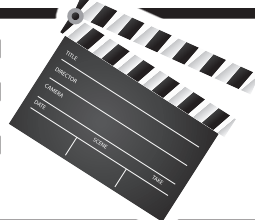
I'm encouraging everyone who plans to ride an electric scooter, to get ready. Know your coverage. Anticipate what could happen, and know what your insurance will and won't cover. And most importantly, be careful.

Again, my son put in due diligence on this test. He took a prep class, had some private tutoring, and did all the online practicing, yet all three times he took the test he did not score high enough. His individual subject scores went up and down, but when he went up in one area, he went down in another.

If they took the top scores from each subject (which they don't), he would receive a full scholarship, but as it stands right now he only qualifies for in-state tuition. He has done everything in his power, everything that can be expected of him. But because of one test, academic scholarships are off the table.

This is not meant to be a sob story; my life is no different than most out there who work hard and try to do what's best for our kids. What it does tell me is that some change is needed. Not sure what those are, but we have to stop weighing down our kids with a financial burden of debt just as they are preparing to start their lives.

I am not saying government should take care of everything. There is something to the idea of college students earning their own way and taking matters more seriously if they have a stake. Yet I have also experienced too many good students fall behind or drop out because they were simply working so hard to pay for school that they could not keep up with their academic load.

Historically speaking, there are times the government has stepped in to assist or regulate. Maybe now is another time, like the 1940s and 1960s, we can reemphasize the need for education and make some changes.

Well, it looks like this week's theme is belated sequels. I guess five or ten years after the original movie was released is better late than never.

One is the continuation of a tale that sheds a new light on one of Disney's most infamous villains, and the other is a lighthearted follow up to a film featuring four friends surviving in a zombie infested wasteland. Let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Maleficent: Mistress of Evil."

The years have been kind to Maleficent (Angelina Jolie) and Aurora

(Elle Fanning) since the events of the first film. Their relationship, born of heartbreak, revenge and ultimately love, has flourished. Yet the hatred between man and the fairies still exists.

Aurora's impending marriage to Prince Phillip (Harris Dickinson) is cause for celebration in the kingdom of Ulstead and the neighboring Moors, as the wedding serves to unite the two worlds. But when an unexpected encounter introduces a powerful new alliance, Maleficent and Aurora are pulled apart to opposing sides, testing their loyalties and causing them to question whether they can truly be family.

Here we go again. Disney's back at it releasing yet another live-action reboot of one of the beloved animated properties.

Hold on though. This one's a little bit different.

Instead of being a shot-for-shot remake of one of Disney's animated classics, this film is a sequel to a reimagining of one of Disney's animated classics.

That's much better.

Over the past few years I've definitely had mixed feelings over Disney's latest addiction of turning their acclaimed animated library into live-action films.

Quite frankly, I think they've done an outright abysmal job for the most part. In fact, out of the over 10 released in the last decade, the only two I would confidently call 'good' are "Cinderella" and "The Jungle Book."

Though some of these remakes are better than others, the two I despised the most were "Beauty and the Beast" and "The Lion King." And interestingly, both films have a couple key things in common.

The first is, both movies are loyal to their animated source material to a fault. Sure, each of them add on a few extra scenes and maybe throw in a new song to pad out the runtime, but for the most part the setting, plot, characters, and story beats are all exactly the same.

And while these live-action reboots might attempt to replicate the originals, often times

all the way down to the camera angles and exact dialogue, these films can't help but just feel like pale lifeless reflections when compared to their animated counterparts.

They just don't have the same energy, the same spark that brought these iconic films to life.

Sadly, the other thing of "Beauty and the Beast" and "The Lion King" have in common, is that they're both the highest grossing of all the Disney's live-action remakes. Which means this trend of recreating classic animated film shot-for-shot in a live-action setting isn't dying anytime soon.

This is part of what made "Maleficent" and its sequel compelling to me.

Back in 2014, before the remakes of "The Lion King" and "Beauty and the Beast," heck, even before "The Jungle Book" and "Cinderella," Disney was out there willing to take one of their most beloved fairy tales and turn it on its head.

"Maleficent" asks the question, what if the widely known tale of "Sleeping Beauty" was laced with half truths and outright lies?

What if the character of Maleficent wasn't evil incarnate, but instead was actually a hero in the end? One that was painted in a negative light by historical revisionists with an axe to grind.

It's a compelling concept. What if a classic, well known tale of good vs. evil was all just a massive smear effort to paint a misunderstood character as the villain?

The first "Maleficent" certainly had its flaws, but after watching it recently I was simply thrilled to see a Disney live-action remake with a little creativity in it. One where the writers looked at the story of "Sleeping Beauty," and said "hey, let's do something different with that."

And, what interested me about the sequel, "Maleficent: Mistress of Evil," was the promise of furthering this idea.

Years after the events of "Maleficent," few people remember the actual history, due to a widespread misinformation campaign. Instead they only know Maleficent as an evil and incredibly dangerous fairy. The same one we saw in Disney's "Sleeping Beauty."

It seems like an idea with a lot of potential, right? Yeah, I thought so too. That is, until I saw the movie itself.

There's something very off regarding the tone of "Maleficent: Mistress of Evil."

The movie begins with our couple from the first film, Aurora and Phillip, getting engaged, leading to a collection of odd comedy moments revolving around Maleficent. Beginning with Maleficent opposing the marriage and ultimately ending with the dark fey coming over for dinner to

meet Phillip's parents.

In between, we get scenes with Maleficent practicing her greeting to the king and queen, and her learning how to smile without appearing threatening.

These moments came across as incredibly corny to me. Though I must admit, I did enjoy the one scene when Maleficent first enters the human city and everyone starts running in fear or grabbing pitchforks. But honestly, even though I didn't find these scenes all that funny, I would have been fine with them. That is, if they weren't followed by a plot from the film's villain planning outright genocide.

It's not everyday you see a Disney movie where the evil scheme is reminiscent of the extermination camps at Auschwitz, but here we are.

Watching it all gave me whiplash. One minute we're watching this awkward "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner" scenario with Maleficent, the next our villain is plotting the horrifying extermination of all the creatures from the Moors. After dinner, Maleficent basically leaves the film for half the movie's runtime.

Instead of her confronting the negative rumors and defamation she's received over the years, she is randomly brought to a hidden cave filled with a bunch of other bird people just like her.

So forget anything involving the misinformation campaign surrounding Maleficent, because all of that quickly becomes irrelevant after the first 30 minutes.

And though these giant winged fay do manage to suck up a sizable chunk of runtime, the only reason they exist is so there's plenty of bodies for a giant action sequence at the end of the movie.

Their scenes were so ridicu-

response grants for states, including millions allocated to fight the opioid epidemic in Oklahoma communities.

Since opioid addiction exists in most—if not all—American communities, confronting the epidemic has never been a partisan undertaking in Congress.

For example, at the end of last year, both chambers passed and President Trump signed into law the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act. Made up of several bills introduced throughout last Congress to prevent and end the cycle of opioid abuse, the historic legislation sought to address the symptoms of the epidemic and confront underlying causes of

the crisis.

This included solutions to improve treatment and recovery options, support non-addictive opioid alternatives for pain management, discourage the high opioid prescription rate and empower law enforcement to keep harmful drugs from entering communities.

Certainly, the fight against the opioid crisis is far from over, but I am heartened that past efforts seem to be making a real difference.

In the days ahead, I will continue to work with my colleagues to ensure states and communities have the resources needed to prevent opioid abuse and save lives.

The other movie this week is "Zombieland: Double Tap." A decade after the events of the first film, post-apocalyptic warriors Tallahassee (Woody Harrelson), Columbus (Jesse Eisenberg), Wichita (Emma Stone), and Little Rock (Abigail Breslin) must rely on their wits and weapons more than ever as they find themselves in a relentless battle against smarter, faster and seemingly indestructible zombies.

I'm just gonna go right out and say it. I loved the first "Zombieland."

The original film, released all the way back in 2009, is such a well constructed, perfectly paced action comedy. Even rewatching it 10 years later, I couldn't help but gawk at how wonderfully the whole thing was put together.

Though the movie takes place in a typical horror setting, gore and all, the film is constantly hilarious, filled with wonderfully witty dialogue and a cast of lovable snarky characters.

But upon rewatching the movie, what really set it apart in my opinion was the storytelling.

The motivation for characters are all so perfectly simple, yet effective, not to mention very easy to relate to. And even the smallest moments setup early on ended up paying off in big ways by the finale.

And the rules. Oh how I loved the rules. To survive the wilds of Zombieland, Jesse Eisenberg's character of Columbus created an entire code to live by.

Simple rules, many of which were introduced right at the start. Things like 'Double Tap,' meaning don't be stingy with your bullets when it comes to flesh eating zombies. Or 'Buckle Up,' because even in an apocalyptic setting, car accidents can kill you just as easily as the rabid zombies can.

These rules are constantly referenced throughout the film. Both in how Eisenberg's character behaves, and even visually with the rule's name popping up on screen when the said rule applied to the situation.

To anyone who hasn't watched the movie, that may seem obnoxious, but the way these rules were integrated fit the film's tone perfectly. Not to mention making for plenty of their own funny moments throughout.

And fortunately, "Zombieland: Double Tap" features the same fun style and the same cast of characters that were so easy to love from the first movie.

But while this sequel still makes for a fun time at the theater, it definitely pales in comparison to its more proficiently produced predecessor.

The movie picks up 10 years after the events of the first film, with our heroic band of zombie killers apparently making it clear across the country, from Los Angeles all the way to Washington D.C.

From there, through a series of events, the youngest of the group, Little Rock, ends up striking off on her own in the hopes of making her own way in the world.

Of course, the other three, especially her sister Wichita,

aren't content to let Little Rock venture off on her own, and so the group sets off through the heartland of America to track her down.

Along the way, they end up saddled with a new companion named Madison, played by Zoey Deutch. And I swear, this character could possibly be the stupidest person to ever exist in a movie.

Just imagine the dumbest blonde stereotype you possible can, multiply it by 1000, and you might just begin to scratch the sheer idiocy that is Madison.

At first I was somewhat concerned Madison would end up being nothing but an annoying, poorly conceived side character, but as the film went along, her aptitude for the moronic ended up delivering some of the funniest moments in the film. Go figure.

As the story progresses, our characters are thrown into increasingly absurd scenarios. Including one very well choreographed action sequence, shot and edited to appear as a single ludicrously long take.

Unfortunately, comedy wise, this movie retreads a lot of the same ground as the original film. At first it just seemed like cute little references to the first movie, but towards the end it ended up feeling like they had simply ran out of ideas.

The narrative here was also noticeably less refined.

Gone are the deeply personal, yet ridiculously simple, clear cut desires for each individual character. Instead, everyone is just traveling across the country to track down Little Rock.

Don't get me wrong, that's a perfectly okay motivation. It just feels lackluster when compared to the first film.

But in the end, even though the humor and storytelling here might not live up to the highs of the first "Zombieland," this film still makes for an entertaining ride. One that's sure to please fans of the original gore-filled zombie comedy.

A little more than a week remains for McClain County voters to apply for absentee ballots to be mailed to them for the November 12 county bond election.

Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the county election board by 5 p.m. November 6 to be processed in time for the election, said McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley.

Absentee voters may apply in person at the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse or may mail, fax or email their applications.

An online version of the form may be filled out and submitted electronically at www.elections.ok.gov.

Any registered voter eligible to vote in the election may vote by absentee ballot without stating a reason, Haley said.

However absentee voters can activate certain special conditions in the following

circumstances:

- Voters who are physically handicapped or who care for physically handicapped persons who cannot be left unattended. These individuals may apply only by mail, fax or email.

- Voters who are confined to nursing homes within the county. An absentee voting board goes to nursing homes a few days before the election and sets up a small polling place for those voters. They may apply only by mail, fax or email.

- Military personnel, county residents residing overseas and their spouses and dependents are eligible to receive absentee ballots. These voters may apply only by mail, fax or email. Other Oklahoma residents living overseas are directed to www.fvap.gov/oklahoma.

Election rules and reminders

Following tips will simplify voting experience

Voters will go to the polls November 12 on a \$23.75 million bond issue to construct a public safety complex for McClain County.

Election board secretary Karen Haley advised voters to keep the following information and tips in mind:

- Early voting will be available at the County Election Board office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. November 7 and 8. On election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Lines are possible at peak voting times. Wait times will likely be shortest at mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Anyone in line to vote at 7 p.m. will be allowed to cast a ballot.

- Anyone who needs to look up their polling place, verify their registration information or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: www.elections.ok.gov. Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

- Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the County Election Board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot.

There are three ways for voters to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state or tribal government; show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the County Election Board; or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. (If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.)

- Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may be assisted by a person the voter chooses.

In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes.

Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-tactile interface (ATTI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or at their assigned polling place on election day.

- Voters who have moved since the last election, but who have not transferred their voter registration to their new address, may do so on Election Day by going to vote at the polling place where their registration has been in the past.

Clark to receive Ben Johnson Award

Roper and horseman Doug Clark of Wayne will receive the Ben Johnson Memorial Award during the Rodeo Historical Society and National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum's annual Rodeo Hall of Fame Weekend November 8-9 at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City.

The Ben Johnson Memorial Award is an annual award presented to a living person who has been involved in the rodeo industry, contributing to the growth and improvement of the sport, as well as involvement with youth and/or community activities.

The recipient must be like Ben Johnson in helping to create a positive image for rodeo and the Western lifestyle.

Clark is an Oklahoma native and fourth generation Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association (PRCA) member since age 18.

Clark's successes include winning the All-Around Championship at Cheyenne Frontier Days in 1995, in addition to setting a new arena record there in 1987; winning the 2005 Pendleton Round-Up Steer roping championship and qualifying for the National Steer Roping Finals in 2005, taking home second.

Aside from roping, his real passion includes training horses for rodeo's top ropers and working with young people, teaching them the art of roping, horsemanship and a few life skills along the way.

Clark got a chance to know Ben Johnson and admired him for his wit, wisdom and accomplishments in and out of the arena.

Rodeo Hall of Fame inductions and awards are sponsored and selected by the Rodeo Historical Society, an organization under the auspices of the National Cowboy Museum whose worldwide members

share an interest in preserving both rodeo history and the sport itself.

including research, an oral history project, acquisition of ma-

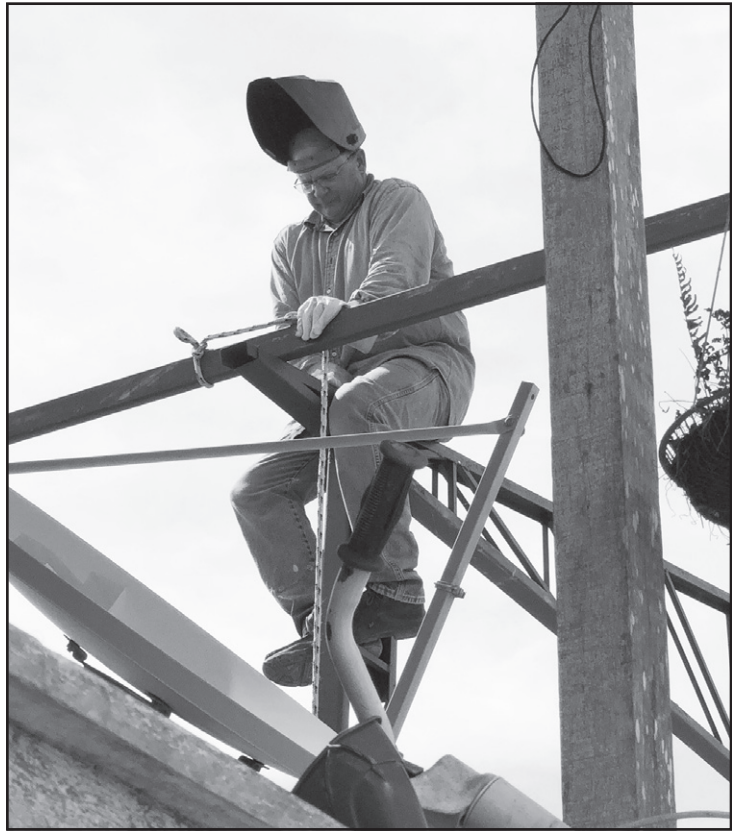

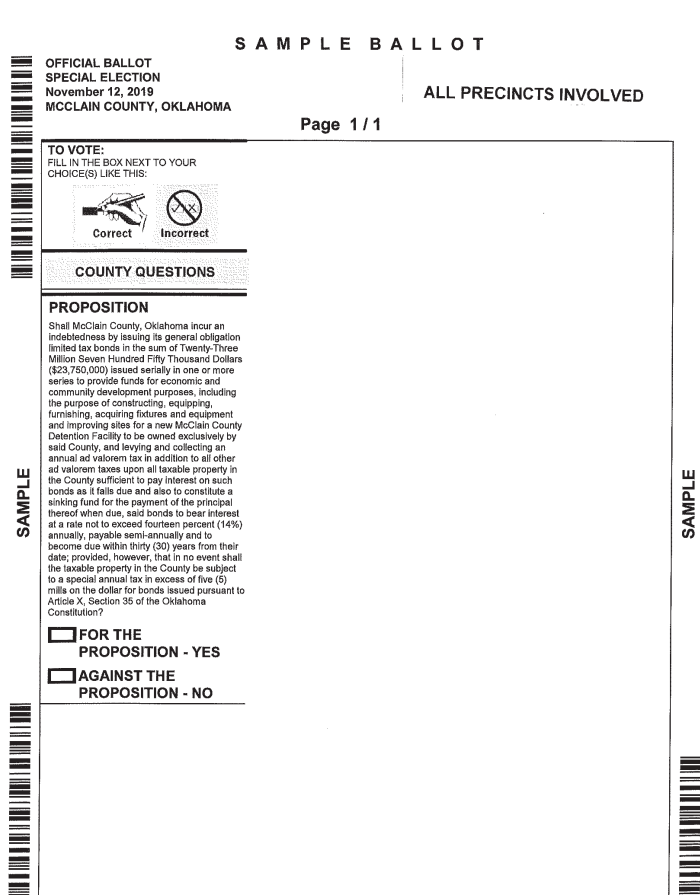

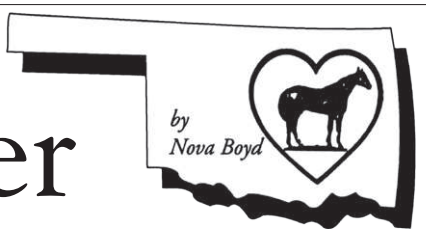

The Chickasaw Nation Car Seat Safety Program will host a community car seat check event Saturday, October 26, from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. at Pontotoc County Agri-Plex in Ada. Families are invited to receive a car and booster seat check at no charge, completed by certified passenger safety technicians.

“Technicians attend a nationally certified three-day training session presented by Safe Kids,” said Becky Anoatubby, program manager. “It is an extremely in-depth class that teaches the parts of the different kinds of child safety seats, how they operate and how the seats operate in different cars.”

Safe Kids is a worldwide organization that provides training for certified passenger safety technicians. Technicians ensure child safety and booster

seats are properly installed in the vehicles, are in good condition and fit the child.

Common installation mistakes include loose belts, incorrect shoulder strap position and the wrong style of safety seats used based on weight and height.

Devoted to the safety of children within the community, the Chickasaw Nation has nearly 50 employees trained as passenger safety technicians. They are based within child care, Head Start, transportation and WIC programs, among other areas.

Car seat safety inspections are available to the community. Technicians can determine if a new car seat is needed. Replacement seats may be available at no cost for those that have been recalled, are expired or are poorly fitting.

While it is estimated nearly 60 percent of all child safety seats are installed incorrectly or are not being used properly, the Chickasaw Nation Car Seat Safety Program has found these numbers alarmingly higher.

“During our car safety checks, 75 percent of the seats checked are either not installed correctly, placed in the wrong area of the car or aren't the right size for the children who use them,” Mrs. Anoatubby said.

During the car seat safety check at Pontotoc County Agri-Plex, families are also welcome to enjoy games, food and other activities. Information booths will be available to parents for information concerning Chickasaw Nation programs and services.

Rules:

While voting, they may fill out a form instructing the County Election Board to transfer their registration to the new address before the next election.

• Those who become physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. November 5 still can request an emergency absentee ballot. Those who might qualify for an emergency absentee ballot should contact the County Election Board office at 405-527-3121 as soon as possible for more information.

• Any violation of election law will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities.

Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. It is also unlawful to remove a ballot from the polling location, possess intoxicating liquors within half a mile of a polling place or to disclose how you voted while within the election enclosure.

Kids in costume get a
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100th:

That Brazilian missionary has talked about retiring, but Elmore expects he will continue to build churches “as long as the Lord gives him strength and he has people willing to come and do it.”

This was the Purcell church’s third trip to the region in as many years.

The first trip, he recalled, as “quite a step of faith” and then the Lord opened the door for the second.

“And He really opened the door” for this trip, Elmore continued.

A year ago they built church number 93 in the village of Jaraqui.

This year’s journey took them to the island of Nova Esperanca – Good Hope – on Lago (Lake) Janauaca.

At 1,716 square feet, it was the largest church they have built in the remote region. Others have averaged 1,300 square feet.

The new church has block walls and a tin roof. It is the only brick and mortar building on the island.

Mission group members Randy Idleman, Bruce Clark, Steve Hurt, Dillon Gardner, Terry Hillis, Dr. Rick Schmidt, Todd Russ, Fred Green, Scott Hosek, Crystal Hosek, David Elmore, Sarah Elmore, Pam Vaughn, Kathy Wollenberg, Penny Thompson-Massey and Stephanie Gentry flew out of Oklahoma City on September 23 and returned six days later.

They boarded a boat at Manaus, Brazil, and motored on the Amazon River for approximately six hours to reach the enormous lake dotted with islands.

Roughly 25 houses were on their island destination where approximately 100 residents attended church services under a tarp outside the home of their female pastor.

In addition to the church construction, the group conducted a medical clinic and delivered 125 water purification filters to residents there and on nearby islands.

They also conducted a one-day vacation Bible school for the children and distributed more than 100 pairs of shoes to the youngsters they met.

Daily they dealt with and worked through the equatorial heat and humidity.

While Schmidt and Elmore’s daughter, Sarah, ran the medical clinic, others toiled on the church construction or were assigned to set out across the lake in a skiff with an interpreter to deliver water filters to homes.

The work was hard, the days long and the heat and humidity oppressive, Elmore said. Two or three workers got overheated and keeping hydrated was an ongoing task. Still, there was just one casualty on the trip.

Sarah Elmore became so sick an emergency trip up river was called for one night.

Elmore went with his daughter on the 2-hour trip by boat and then one hour overland by car to reach a hospital where she could be treated with IV fluids and medication.

That night on the lake, the caiman were everywhere, their glowing eyes reflecting the light from the boat and marking their numbers and location.

The next morning, she was well enough to be released. But it was raining “like crazy” and Elmore wasn’t sure they could get back to the island in time for the church dedication that night.

The weather finally broke in the afternoon and they got back to the island just in time.

That worship service was an emotional one, Elmore said.

“There was a lot of joy, hugs all around. The Lord helped us and kept us safe,” he added.

More than 150 people attended the dedication.

Elmore is planning another celebratory service on November 3.

This one will be at his church for the congregation, as well as members of the community who contributed to the mission cause.

The 6 p.m. service will feature slides and testimony and will be followed by a meal in the church gymnasium.

Elmore said the water filters alone cost \$12,000. The lion’s share of that was furnished by his congregation.

But there was also a woman in the community who gave Elmore a \$1,400 check. Another man, not a church member, gave him a check for \$800. And one lady in the congregation gave \$50 every week.

“The community deserves a big thank you from us for helping us,” the pastor said.

Jail:

And Sheriff Don Hewett was looking at sending others elsewhere as soon as he can find another jail to take them.

That in one nutshell is why McClain County needs the proposed public safety complex.

The overcrowding in the existing jail is constant, Hewett said, and precipitates a flood of rising operational costs.

Too many inmates creates a safety issue, the sheriff said, and that requires more detention officers.

Costs spiral upward with no signs of stopping.

The state inspects the jail monthly and every month it is written up for the overcrowding.

Hewett said so far inspectors have backed off on levying heavy fines or ordering the jail closed.

But there’s no guarantee how long that will continue.

Hewett believes as long as his office and the county commissioners are trying to alleviate the problem, the write-ups and warnings will continue.

“I really think once we quit trying to do something, they will come down on us hard,” he said.

The county has scheduled an election for a \$23.75 million bond issue on November 12 to build the new complex on land northwest of Purcell on State Highway 74.

The center will be 50,605 square feet and will house the sheriff’s department, jail, emergency management and 911 call center.

The proposed state-of-the-art facility will be able to house up to 220 inmates.

Hewett is hoping the voters realize the need.

“I’m hearing more positive (comments) in the past week than before,” he said.

He said a Purcell man came to his office Tuesday just to tell the sheriff he understands the need and will help anyway he can to see the measure passes.

There is also a group of citizens in Blanchard supporting the bond issue and spreading the word in that part of the county.

“The key will be we have to get the yes voters out,” Hewett said. “This is a stand-alone election.”

'Dawgs fall to Falcons 28-6

Come up short in loss, looking ahead to CCS on Friday

The Lexington Bulldogs put up a good fight last Thursday in Oklahoma City.

But, the 'Dawgs lost, 28-6, to the Millwood Falcons. Millwood thrashed Lexington last year by a score of 80-21.

This year was different, though. The 'Dawgs tried with all of their might to overcome the Falcons. At halftime, it was a tie game.

"We're 6-6 at halftime," Lexington head coach Dale Berglan said after the first half. "We knew at the end of the first quarter what type of ballgame it would be. We had our chances. They made some big plays."

Starting quarterback Colton Penner went down with a leg injury in the first quarter.

"Colton went down with a thigh bruise and our freshman comes in," Berglan said. "Ezra Faulkenberry didn't skip a beat, though. You'd think he was a fifth-year senior with his composure. He made some very smart big throws."

In the first quarter, Millwood scored on a 7-yard pass but failed to make good on the two-point conversion for a 6-0 lead. With 3:13 left in the first, the Falcons almost scored on a pass play on 4th-and-36 but the toss into the end zone barely failed.

Nathan Clegg of Lexington (who had 86 yards rushing on 24 carries on the night) got down to Millwood's 25-yard line and Dylan Cottrell ran the ball to the Falcon 49-yard line with 6:33 left in the first. That led to a 4-yard touchdown pass from Faulkenberry to Coby Bear for Lexington to tie the score at 6-6 with 3:23 before halftime.

Faulkenberry was indeed a spark off the bench for the 'Dawgs. He was 4-of-8 passing for 19 yards on the drive.

Things looked good for Lex to begin the third quarter.

After both teams failed to score on their first drives of the second half, Jaylen Cottrell of the 'Dawgs unleashed a 55-yard punt down to the Millwood's 20-yard line. But, the Falcons eventually scored from 2-yards out and ran in the conversion for a 12-6 Millwood lead with 1:58 left in the third.

On the ensuing kickoff, Lexington fumbled the ball at the 38-yard line. That led to an eventual Bagby touchdown run and two-point conversion for a 20-6 lead.

With 5:16 left in the fourth, Millwood scooted in from five yards out and then tossed the two-point conversion to make it a 28-6 lead.

"Faulkenberry did a good job," Berglan said after the game. "We were beat up coming into the game. We had to patch some things together offensively and defensively. We were able to move the ball but we just gave up a couple of big plays. When we fumbled the ball on the kickoff at the 38, it made it tough."

"Our defense played their tails off. They fought hard. We just didn't move the ball well enough. ... The score wasn't what we wanted but we're a lot better than what we think we are. As beat up as we were, we were in the ball game until the end. We have a chance to be a very good ball team."

Cottrell was understandably upset with the defeat.

"We definitely came out and hit them in the mouth in the first half," Cottrell said. "But,

the second half, we made some errors and that's what got them going and on a roll. We weren't able to come back from that."

Faulkenberry was a trooper for Lexington as he played well for a freshman.

"It was kind of rough," Falkenberry said. "The sooner I can get a handle on things, we'll be on the right road. I was very nervous but in the Stratford game, I had to go in for a couple of plays, too. I really wasn't as nervous tonight as I was against Stratford. I think I did pretty well under fire."

The 'Dawgs are now 4-3 overall and 3-1 in the District 2A-7 standings. They will host the Community Christian Royals (4-3 overall, 3-1 in district) at 7 p.m. Friday night at Floyd West Field.

Last year, Lexington beat CCS 36-15 to make the playoffs. The 'Dawgs expect a rough battle with the Royals.

"We expect the same this year out of CCS," Falkenberry said.

"The more wins we get, the closer we get to the playoffs. We're just looking for that next victory."

'Dawgs Notes:

Lexington head coach **Dale Berglan** nominated **Nathan Clegg** for his Offensive Player of the Game. Clegg had 86 yards rushing on 24 carries, including a 40-yard run.

On the defensive line, Berglan nominated **Cameron Conner** who had two assisted tackles.

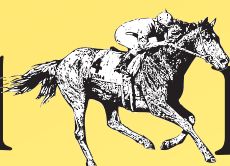

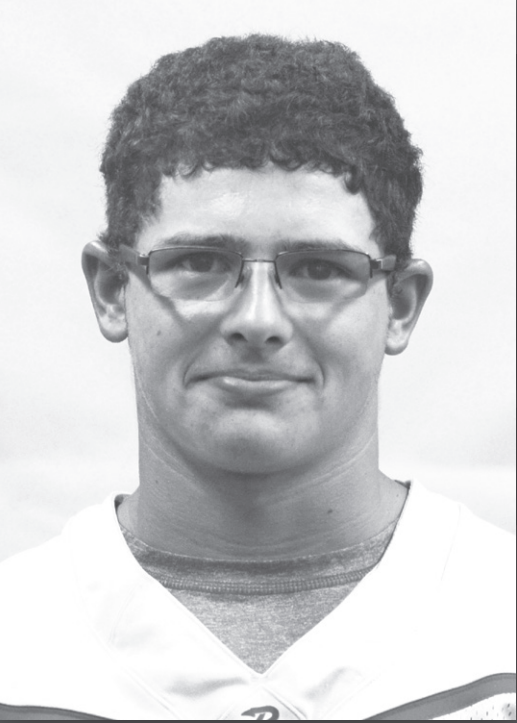

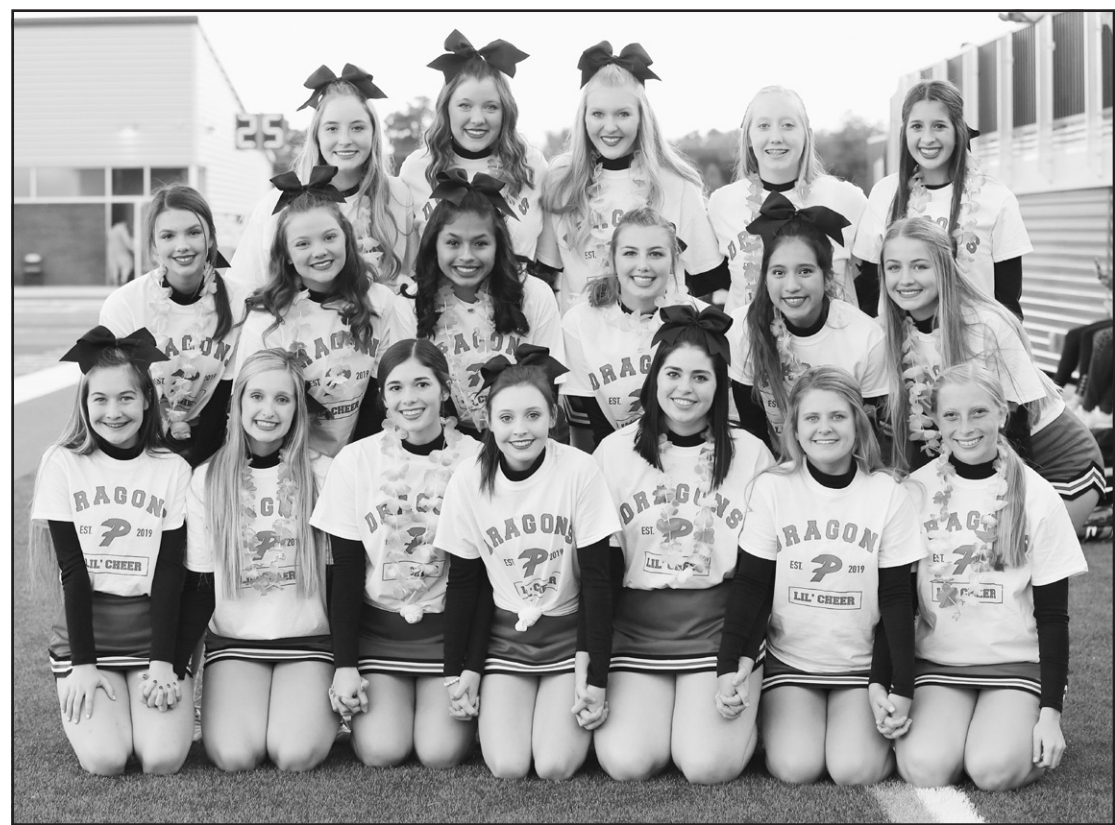

Beller said the Ruf-Nexs are best when their quarterback unloads the ball quickly getting it to their athletic receivers.

“They are more balanced than they were last year,” the coach continued. “They don’t really push the ball down the field. He does a good job of getting rid of the ball.”

What to do when you're alone but need better company!

Good week to all: Welcome to the "front porch." Recently, I had a study and visit with a very special 20-something friend who had just moved 300 miles from Little Rock to Houston. As we talked, I asked what her goals were now that she had relocated. Her answer surprised me. She gave a few of the replies you would expect from a young lady, but then she said that she'd like to learn how to be alone. Ah, out of the mouths of children. For 14 years I listened to as many as 200 students a year rehearse their goals in a speech; and, in all that time, I do not believe I ever heard one say, "I'd like to learn to be alone."

I took that goal as learning to handle "alone-time" better, not so much learning to be "single" better. I may have mistaken her intent. Still, the only good answer I think I could give her was to work on learning to be alone with God. If we do that, I expect we can handle any other challenges Aloneness brings us. We talked a good while about David and the psalms, because David understood well the challenge of solitude, spending many a day and night tending to his sheep out on a secluded, expansive Bethlehem hillside—just he and God. For several days after my young friend and I visited, I thought about what she had said. One morning this past week, I ran across an old sermon by an 1800s preacher on

the 51st psalm. The old writers, somehow, seem a little closer to my own age, and my way of thinking. You understand. In that psalm, David is pleading to the Lord for a much-needed cleansing. He remembers his failures—they are etched too deeply ever to forget—and seeks forgiveness. "Wash me," he will say at one point, "and I shall be whiter than snow." David must have had a great understanding of God's grace and mercy. Then he makes three unique requests in the middle of his prayer: "Renew a right spirit within me—Uphold me with a willing spirit, and—Take not your Holy

Prayer is like entering a castle with many rooms

Before Jesus left this world to be with God, he said to his disciples: "I will send the Holy Spirit to be your constant companion." The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Christ that lives among us. He is like the battery in a flashlight that lights up our path through life. The Holy Spirit is the energy inside of us that helps us to do the right thing. Especially when we don't feel like doing the good thing. If we are a child, maybe we are too tired to clean our room or do our homework. But we know we should clean our room and do our homework, so we do it anyway. This is the Holy Spirit acting in us. Or maybe you are upset at your little brother or sister, but they want you to play with

them. You know you should play with them, so you do it anyway. This is the Holy Spirit acting in you. If you are older, you might be tempted to hide the truth from someone that you have offended. But you confess that you did wrong. You tell the truth. That is the Holy Spirit acting in you. Last week the Church celebrated the Feast day of St. Teresa. St. Teresa was born in Ávila, Spain. Her town was like a big castle, with walls all around it. As a young girl, Teresa of Avila lived a wild life. By the time she reached 16, her father sent her to a convent. At first, she didn't like being there. Many sins got in the way of her spiritual life. But over time, she transformed into a

woman who deeply loved God and religious life. She spent much of her life learning about and practicing mental prayer. Teresa wrote several books which discussed struggles with prayer life and the power of mental prayer, of focusing our attention on God in prayer. She thought that prayer was like going into a big castle with seven different rooms that all lead to the center of the castle. In the first room, you are interested in being close to God, but there are many distractions. You have to be humble and be patient. In the second room you seek every opportunity for growth - by listening to sermons, by

When we're asked to pray publicly, we often panic and decline the opportunity because we feel we can't "pray right." We may think that we have to use the words we associate with the King James Version of the Bible, such as thee, thou, thy, etc. Since we don't use those words everyday (unless we are part of a tradition that does use them, like maybe the Quakers or Society of Friends), we

aren't comfortable with speaking with them. There are a few people that feel okay about using them—my dad was one who did—but most don't. The bottom line is that we don't have to use particular words, especially these, in order to pray. Throughout the Bible we see examples of how other people prayed. Some are given by prophets, others by priests, kings, judges, and others. The psalms are thought of as songs, and many are songs. But they may also be seen as prayers. There are other special prayers throughout the Bible: "The Prayer of Jabez" (I Chronicles 4:10) and prayers for various Jewish holidays and situations, like Rosh Hashanah, Passover and Hannukah.

One of the most famous ones for Christians is "The Lord's Prayer" which is also known as the "Our Father" in the Catholic tradition. That prayer is the one that Jesus gave to his disciples when they asked him to teach them to pray. Different faith traditions have other special prayers. There is a rich variety of prayers in the Catholic church which have been written over the years. The Catholic church is the basis for all Christian churches, and its history includes all the saints and martyrs of the church. One such prayer is "The Prayer of Saint Francis." There are prayers special to Islam, some of which overlap the

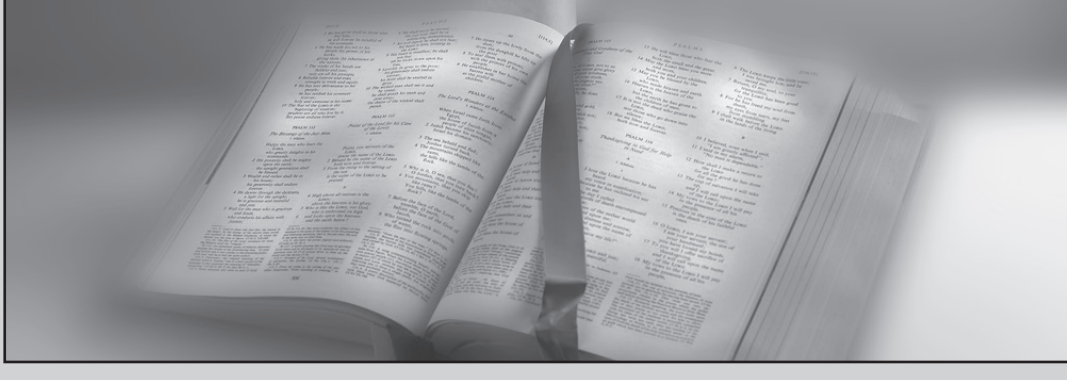

Spirit from me” (vs. 10-12).

Three distinct prayers involving the “spirit,” three powerful alone-time prayers.

The one prayer is for the Lord not to take His Holy Spirit from him. The old writer points out that David does not enjoy the Spirit in the same way as the Lord promises the Spirit – the “Paraclete” of John 14 – to those who obey the gospel. But he is an inspired man and an anointed king; so, he does enjoy the presence of the Spirit in a special way, and he knows that without God’s Spirit he cannot take one step. That, then, becomes one of his alone-time prayers.

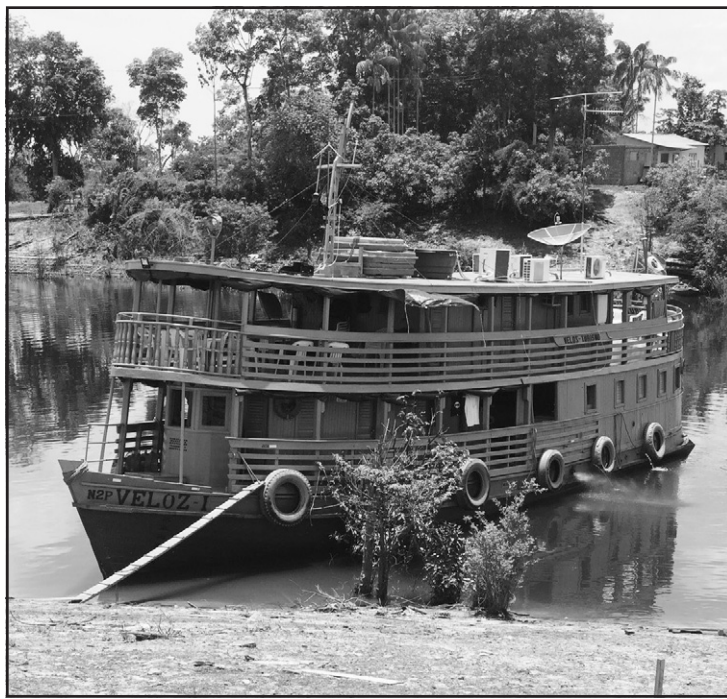
Next, he prays for a “willing” spirit – a “right” spirit, says the King James. David knows that for him to have any hope of God’s cleansing he must cultivate a willing heart. He needs a heart bound to the

Lord’s Spirit.

David’s third desire for a “free” spirit—that is, a “constant, firm” spirit. We see a logical progression in David’s desperate prayer: Lord, he says, supply me with your Holy Spirit so that my own spirit may be willing and may be firm.

As I read from the 1800s preacher and meditated on the words of the psalmist, my mind went to my young friend and to her unique desire to learn to be alone. There are, I suppose, a thousand answers to that innocent desire; but, for a start, those three powerful prayers from Israel’s greatest poet will do. Whenever you have some much-needed alone-time but feel you still need better company -- well, that’d be a good time to take three powerful prayers to the Lord.

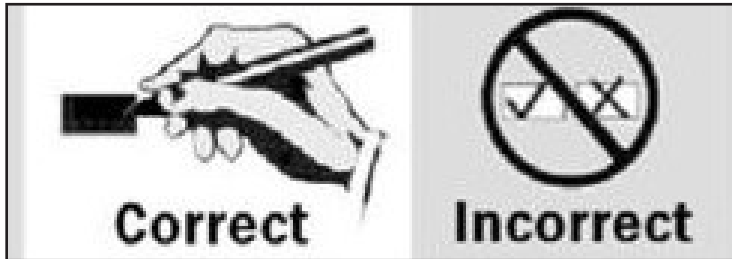

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Congratulations to our Veteran of the Week Billy Tollison of Garland, Texas. Mr. Tollison served honorably in the United States Army.

We have been working diligently to find ways to keep the men and women who visit us each Tuesday and Thursday morning from having to stand in line until they receive a number.

We have signed a lease on the adjoining office next to our location at 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. Hopefully, having more room will allow us to add more cubicles that will enable us to process veterans and surviving spouses' claims more quickly.

There will also be a need to increase the number of volunteers that we have each morning. We have started having some of our volunteers start working at 10 a.m. to closing time. New start times will enable some of our volunteers who began at 4 a.m. the ability to quit for the day or get a much-needed break. The hours are long for all of us.

As for me, it seems like my days are getting longer every week. It has been as late as 6 p.m. before finishing the review of the veterans' claims each day we are open. We are addressing all the issues listed above to find ways to accommodate as many veterans who need our help and to keep our volunteers from burning out.

As many of you know, there are many stories that veterans and surviving spouses will want to discuss with our volunteers as we help them with their applications for VA benefits. We have the Oklahoma Vet Center Counselors here with us every Tuesday and Thursday ready, willing and able to sit down with veterans who are suffering from any mental health issues.

I can honestly say that none of the veterans we have ever helped with obtaining their VA benefits has taken their own life. One of the things that I tell veterans is that the things we think about are not quite as bad if you have a little walking around money in our pocket. If you have never been broke and hungry, you probably don't understand what some of our veterans are going through on a daily basis.

Each week, I receive over 500 letters from the VA and veterans. Some of these are decision letters where veterans are approved or denied. Others inform the veteran what is needed to support their claim for benefits.

This past week we received the following rating decisions: Twenty-one veterans were rated at 100 percent and will receive a combined annual \$863,754. Forty-six veterans received ratings between 10-90 percent and will receive a combined yearly \$770,905. Our veterans rated at 100 percent will also be eligible for Oklahoma State and Federal Benefits. Some of these are exemption of property tax, sales tax exemption, two reduced auto tags and free hunting and fishing licenses. The dependents of veterans who are not retired military are eligible for Champ VA medical insurance.

Dependents of veterans rated 100 percent may also be eligible to receive education benefits. We also receive letters from veterans and their families, telling us how we changed their lives for the better. Occasionally, we receive a letter from a disgruntled veteran who was not approved for VA benefits. My theory on a claim that the VA denies is to read the decision

letter and understand what they are saying. The VA is going to tell you in that decision letter why a claim is denied and what it takes for it to be approved.

One of the things that I see is veterans who don't like getting to our place early and having to wait their turn. They will usually not return and will go where they do not have to wait. We do the best we can with our staff of volunteers. None of us are paid for this job. We appreciate the rest of you for being understanding and patient.

We use an evidence-based system for everyone who uses our services. We are going to suggest that a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire be obtained from a medical provider to use as evidence for a claim to support service-connection of a disability or to show the severity of the illness or injury.

As most of you know, we are a 501(C)(3) non-profit, which means our services are free to everyone who we assist with our services. We operate on the donations from individuals, business or grants that we receive. Our budget each month to provide services is over \$25,000. This equates to over \$300,000 per year in services to veterans and their families.

We have four transportation vans we use to transport veterans to their VA appointments. Our pantry also has food sacks

big enough to feed a family for a week at a time. These are available to those in our community who are doing without.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 1268 North Interstate Drive, Norman, OK 73072. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m., and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready.
