



Collection, Hauling and Disposal of Municipal Solid Waste **Change in Collection Time**

The City of Purcell has an exclusive contract with WCA of Oklahoma to collect, haul and dispose of municipal solid waste within the city's corporate limits.

Collection Time-Pick up is now the last Monday of the month beginning in October. Items are not to be put out by the curb until that weekend prior.

Bulk Waste-Brush or limbs shall be bundled in no larger than three feet x three feet bundles. No furniture larger than a pickup bed or or that exceeds 75 pounds. Appliances must have refrigerant/compressor legally removed and shall not exceed 75 pounds. Yard waste such as leaves and grass clippings must be bagged. All items must be bagged and no loose items will be picked up.

Hazardous Waste-Solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the United States Enviornmental Protection Agency (EPA) or so classified by any federal or State of Oklahoma statute, rule, order or regulation should not be put out for collection. This includes tire, paint or oil products.

Shutdowns never work

House, Senate billfiling deadline passes


Last week, the House and Senate each had deadlines by which the bills for the upcoming legislative session had to be filed.

Certain bills, like those relating to budget, can be filed later through the Appropriations & Budget Committees. Other substantive bills can be filed later through the speaker of the House or the Senate President Pro-Tem, but the bulk of legislation is introduced by this January deadline.

In total, 1,193 bills and 32 joint resolutions were filed in the House. This is fewer than the 1,340 bills and 24 joint resolutions filed in 2017. However, because this is the second session of the 56th Legislature, legislation from last year is still eligible to be considered this year. Carried over are 1,280 House bills and 29 House joint resolutions. In the Senate, 706 bills were filed along with 23 Senate Joint Resolutions. In 2017, a total of 831 Senate bills and 46 Senate Joint Resolutions were filed. Only about 400 bills make it into law each year. That is because the process of passing a bill is challenging by design so there are multiple opportunities for a bill to fail if it is bad legislation, unnecessary, or needs more work. Once a bill is filed, it has to first be selected to be heard in committee. If it passes committee, it must be selected by the majority floor leader to be considered by the full House. If it passes the House, it goes to the Senate. This process works in the same manner in the Senate. If a bill is passed as is by the opposite chamber, it goes to the governor to be signed into law or vetoed. If it is amended by the opposite chamber, it must return to its chamber of origin for final passage. If amendments are rejected, legislation has one final chance via conference committee where members from each chamber meet to discuss the bill. If it passes conference committee, it goes to the governor. If it fails in conference, it is dead. Each stage of the process has a deadline. Lawmakers often rely on legislative staff members like legal, fiscal, and research staff, to help determine current state statutes and fiscal impacts and develop language consistent with the intent of the legislation requested. Bills often are requested by constituents, groups, and government agencies, but ultimately must come directly from the lawmaker. Hopefully, the intent of most legislation is to make government more efficient and less regulatory, to serve the greatest number of people while not overburdening them. In future columns I will discuss bills I have filed for the upcoming legislative session. These will include many of the recommendations of the Opioid Commission which I served on this year. I ran legislation last session to create the Opioid Commission, which is chaired by Attorney General Mike Hunter. Over 1,000 Oklahomans die each year from an opioid overdose, placing us at the center of the opioid epidemic.



As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all the VA rating decisions on the veterans and their families represented. As many of you know, we have been assisting quite a few surviving spouses to receive VA benefits either DIC or Pension based on the veteran's military service. Each week our volunteers are providing that service to 10 to 15 surviving spouses of veterans.

Recently the son of a deceased veteran who was rated at the 100 percent rate asked if we could help him as he was disabled before age 18. After reviewing his medical records, we determined that he might qualify for VA benefits.







will make you fishers of men." They dropped what they were doing and followed Jesus. The the same way, and they even left their father holding the fishing net! (Mark 1:14-20). Immediately they followed this stranger, no questions were asked.

But in John's Gospel, the first disciples ask Jesus "Where are you staying?" Jesus responded "Come and you will see." So the disciples went and stayed with Jesus, from late afternoon through and into the evening (John

1:35-42). It was as if Jesus was giving them the opportunity to get to know him better before he revealed any kind of mission to them. He wanted to be a friend to them even before he was their teacher and rabbi. This was a different response to the call of Jesus - more thoughtful, considered, and gradual.

As human beings we "Come and follow me, and I these Gospels, side by side, we might ask "Which is the correct response to the call of Jesus?" I think the correct answer is "Both are correct." When we discern the call of Jesus to repent and believe, to change our habits and preconceptions, our biases and our fears, then we should drop what we are doing and leave behind all of these stumbling blocks.
