Purcell, Lex adjust school calendars

Minutes matter. Two area school districts – Purcell and Lexington – have adjusted their 2017-18 calendar to make up for the days they were closed in support of the teacher walkout. Amending the calendar was taken up by Purcell's School Board at a special meeting on Wednesday. Purcell schools were closed for 10 days. The board approved superinten-

dent Jason Midkiff's recommendation to add one day of classes on May 11.

"We're required to have so many hours (of instruction)," Midkiff said. "That puts us over."

The school year will end on May 18, which is also graduation.

Lexington students and teachers returned to class on Friday after being out 9 days. On Monday the

The race to serve

Filings open 2018 election cycle in Oklahoma

Only one McClain County officer will begin a new term in 2019 after skipping the election cycle this year.

County treasurer Teresa Jones, did not draw an opponent during the three-day filing period that ended at 5 p.m. Friday.

Jones is a Republican. Pam Irwin, Democrat, the county assessor, will face Republican challenger Kendal Sacchieri in the general election on November 6.

Neither incumbent filed for county commissioner Districts 1 and 3.

The District 1 race will also be decided in the general election.

Voters turning out for the June 26 primary will select the Democrat and Republican candidates who will face off in November.

Democrats who filed for the office are Larry Davis and Chris Sheehy. Republican candidates are Glen Murray and Chuck Spray.

Two Republicans – Terry Daniel and Jim McClain – filed for the District 3 seat. That race will be decided in the primary.

Of the area's two state senators and two rep-

resentatives, the only incumbent to file was Bobby Cleveland, whose opposition to legislation giving Oklahoma teachers a \$6,100 raise may cost him another term.

Cleveland, 74, of Slaughterville, has five challengers in the Republican primary, including a longtime Purcell educator, Tina Swayze, 54, of Purcell.

Other Republican opponents are Anthony Mackey, 44, and Delene Gilbert, 27, both of Noble; Jimmy

Smith, 49, of Lexington, and Sherrie Conley, 54, Newcastle.


The Republican victor will face Steve Jarman, 63, a Democrat, and Donald C. Gallup, 35, a Libertarian, in the general election. Both are from Pauls Valley.

Another education opponent, freshman lawmaker Tim Downing, didn't file for a new term representing District 42 in House.

Democrats seeking that office are Liz George, 34, and Tara Jo Thompson, 21, both of Blanchard.

Republican candidates are Allie Burgin, 77, of Wynnewood, and Cynthia Roe, 58, of Lindsay.

Remains ID'd

Victim had been missing since 2016

Human bones found February 1 in southern McClain County have been positively identified.

Sheriff Don Hewett learned Monday from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation the bones are the remains of Cynthia Garcia.

The 29-year-old Moore woman disappeared June 2, 2016.

According to news reports at the time, Garcia was last seen that afternoon leaving her job at FAA. Her car was later found inside the garage at her home.


Her phone was used to send a text message to her supervisor the following day saying she would not be coming to work.

Her estranged husband also reported receiving a text message in which Garcia allegedly wrote she wasn't feeling well and would pick up her 7-year-old daughter on June 4.

However, she never showed up and her phone was turned off.

Garcia was described at the time by co-workers as being





Fire danger extreme here

McClain County included in state of emergency

McClain County was one of 52 counties declared under a state of emergency Friday by Gov. Mary Fallin. The governor signed the executive order after wildfires burned more than 200,000 acres across Oklahoma on April 12. The order clears the way for state agencies to make emer-

gency purchases and acquisitions needed to expedite the delivery of resources to local jurisdictions. It is also a first step toward seeking federal assistance should it be necessary. A burn ban remains in effect in 20 western and northern counties. "I am asking all Oklahomans

to be vigilant and careful and to do their part to prevent fires," Fallin said. "Anything that can be done to minimize fires will help keep both our firefighters and the public safe. The executive order will remain in effect for 30 days and may be amended to include more counties if needed.

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Mixed bag of sales tax monies

The Oklahoma Tax Commission this month disbursed \$143,047,307 to municipalities, an increase of \$7,878,417 from the same time last year. Cities and towns also shared in a use tax disbursement of \$14,391,474. The total sales tax returned to counties was \$25,101,772. Counties also shared a use tax disbursement of \$2,540,388. The returns represent sales from February 16-28 and estimated sales from March 1-15.

Stolen and found

This stolen trailer and pickup were recovered Friday near Wayne by lawmen acting on a tip to Garvin County Crimestoppers. A 24-year-old Purcell man, Conrad L. Taliaferro, allegedly admitted the theft and was arrested on a complaint of knowingly concealing stolen property.

Trailer recovered

Crimestoppers tip led lawmen to find

A stolen trailer featured in last week's Crimestoppers for Garvin County has been recovered following a tip to the hotline number.

Garvin County deputies located the trailer and a pickup west of Wayne in McClain County on Friday, Sheriff Larry Rhodes said.

With the assistance of the McClain County Sheriff's Department, Conrad L. Taliaferro, 24, of Purcell was arrested on a complaint of knowingly concealing stolen property.

According to Rhodes, Taliaferro allegedly admitted stealing the trailer during the week of April 2.

Criminal charges are pending in McClain and Garvin Counties. The trailer was valued at \$1,200.

"The stolen trailer was out of the public's sight and had the serial number altered," Rhodes said, crediting the Crimestoppers program. "If not for a Crimestoppers tip reporting where the pick-up could be located, the trailer may not have been found."

The Garvin County Crimestoppers program began in 2011 and continues today. In 2017, 48 tips were received through the Crimestoppers program. All the tips were investigated and are now closed. A total of \$850.00 was paid out in rewards in 2017.

Persons calling Crimestoppers may remain anonymous and can earn a reward of up to \$1,000 based on their information. The number is 1-855-211-7867.

Out with the old tax system in with the new

This week, millions of Americans will file their taxes under an antiquated system for the last time. What was once an onerous task will become a more simple, easier process in the years to come.

Filing taxes for the past 32 years was done under a complicated, invasive tax code. The burdensome process grew and evolved under the changes of society, and we are left today with a system that allowed for many loopholes and unfair tax brackets.

Now that the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act is law, millions of Americans and thousands of businesses will truly begin to thrive financially.

The complex nature of the individual tax brackets had severely moved out of touch with regular tax filers in the past decades. Smaller paychecks make it harder for the average taxpayer starting a new job or for a family of five trying to sustain basic wellbeing.

of their respective employees as a result of the new corporate tax rate. And it hasn't slowed down.

Companies big and small in Oklahoma have reaped the benefits of the new tax code, with many awarding bonuses, providing raises and expanding operations.

Express Employment Professionals, based in Oklahoma City, awarded \$2,000 bonuses to its employees. Larger companies like Southwest Airlines and Lowe's, which employ thousands of Oklahomans, also followed through with bonuses.

In the long run, corporate investment back into the American economy will not only support the overall well-being of the economy, it will support families and consumers across the nation.

There is reason to celebrate Tax Day this year. As we say goodbye to the old tax system, we can anticipate the benefits of the new one next year.

Thousands of issues

The legislature deals with literally thousands of issues each legislative session through the bills we file, debate and amend.

A majority of those bills may never make it to the governor's desk but it keeps a conversation going about issues important to particular areas and groups of citizens.

This session, the focus has been on the budget and finding a way to raise teacher and state employee salaries and we successfully funded both. I want to thank the many educators, parents, students, state employees and others who rallied at the Capitol to share their thoughts and concerns. This is the people's house and I'm proud to serve as your voice in the legislature.

I'm pleased for our schools and teachers with everything that was approved the last couple of weeks. The approved \$2.9 billion common education budget is 19 percent higher (nearly \$500 million) than last year's. Teachers will be getting an average \$6,100 raise making them the second highest paid in the region and the 28th highest paid in the nation.

Putting more dollars into the

classroom will help us retain and recruit quality, professional educators to help our students and our state succeed.

We are committed to considering more ways to increase classroom funding as well as reforms that will benefit our students, parents and teachers.

State employees will also get a bump based on their current salary from \$500-\$2,000. These incredible men and women work so hard to provide vital services we depend on daily including public safety, health care, human services, transportation, elder care, foster care, corrections, mental health and so many more.

I'm pleased that we were able to approve this important revenue package with bipartisan support. As you know, we've been working towards this goal for nearly a year. The plan was similar to one the Senate supported last fall.

Both the House and Senate were able to meet the 75 percent approval threshold required for revenue increases like those found in HB 1010xx and its companion bills.

My family and I began our campaign in July 2015, and from that day until now the best part of serving was meeting so many amazing Oklahomans in our district. It was a family decision for me to run for office, and it is a family decision for me to pass the baton to the next

representative that is elected by our district.

The sacrifice of serving is borne not by the elected member alone, but more so by their spouse and children. This is just one of the reasons why representation should be passed along season by season from one citizen to another, some serving longer than others, but all eventually making that decision.

My family and I committed from the outset to pray and discuss each term of office

the same way we did the first. After months of prayer, we felt confident that God was leading us not to seek another term, and to allow another to have that opportunity.

House District 42 is filled with many great Oklahomans, and I look forward to one of them representing me at the Capitol.

This term in office was filled with many serious challenges, intense policy battles, and included year-round special sessions. I knew for a fact I was

supposed to be there, and faced each day with that reminder while praying for wisdom and also strength to stay the course and stand for the principles I campaigned on.

I campaigned on being a fiscal conservative who would oppose raising taxes. Due to the circumstances, I took more votes on tax proposals in one term than most historic members would have taken in decades of service.

I consistently kept my campaign promise to oppose taxes,

including multiple tax packages that were the largest in the history of our state.

Instead of raising taxes, I voted for the elimination of handouts like the zero emissions tax credit for wind, which resulted in over a half a billion dollars of funds for our state.

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Another week, another set of three movies. And what a group of films it is.

We have a gimmicky horror movie from Blumhouse, an animated kids film set during World War I, and The Rock is back in another big budget disaster film.

Let's get right to it.



First up is "Sgt. Stubby: An American Hero."

Based on a true story, this film follows Stubby, a stray who gets adopted by a soldier training for World War I, and his journey to become the most decorated canine in American history.

Now this movie is an anomaly if I've ever seen one.

It's not everyday a studio releases an animated kids' film about soldiers during wartime, much less one set during World War I.

It makes sense. Horribly depressing trench warfare involving chemical weapons doesn't exactly scream kid friendly.

Honestly I'm impressed the filmmakers even attempted to make a movie like this. And surprisingly for what it is, the film turned out pretty decent.

I love that they tried to make the movie as realistic as possible, or at least as accurate as you can for a kids' movie about the harsh realities of war.

Because of that Stubby isn't a talking dog, he's just a regular loveable pooch.

I'm sure it would have been an easier sell to have Stubby talk, but I'm glad the filmmakers ended up going the realistic route. It really helps keep the film grounded.

But for as much accuracy as they try to pack in, the setting is still probably a little too idyllic for a war movie.

There's absolutely zero blood or visible wounds even when characters are nearly fatally wounded. It feels a little odd on the surface, but again I understand. This is still a kids' film after all.

The animation isn't going to win any awards either.

The character movement can be awfully stiff and if you're expecting the polish of something like a Disney or even an Illumination film, you'll be disappointed.

That said, I've seen worse animation. Despite some stiffness in the human characters Stubby still manages to be very expressive.

The voice acting also isn't the best and definitely feels forced at times, especially with foreign accents.

But again I can forgive that considering the film is aimed at 6-year-olds. Making everyone clearly understandable is the priority here.

All in all, for what this movie is, it's not half bad.

Like I said, I can't think of any kids' movies that feature World War I. Heck, even when war is mentioned at all, it's almost always used as a vague backdrop in children's entertainment.

Taking such a harsh subject like war and making it kid friendly while keeping any sort of realism is no easy task. For that alone the filmmakers here have my respect.

Plus the movie has a really good message and even deals with wartime discrimination in a way that's easy for children to understand.

Parents who take their kids to see this will certainly have a ton to talk about.

There's quite a bit of history packed in here and I think this film would make an excellent launching point for teaching

your children more about that era.

For the educational value alone, this movie is an easy one to recommend.

Determined to save his friend, Davis teams up with geneticist Dr. Kate Caldwell (Naomie Harris) and together they attempt to stop George, and the other genetically modified creatures, on their rampage of destruction.

Patrons in Owasso were also baffled when they learned that the ragged textbooks pictured in an infamous photo were not in fact being used in class. That was actually fake news, and it got extensive national media coverage.

Owasso voters, in fact, approved a bond issue to include \$2 million for textbooks and materials. Incredibly, though, they also approved bonds to spend more than twice as much (\$5.45 million) on artificial turf.

And down in Norman, the teachers got their raise, and every middle and high school student in the district will get a new laptop thanks to \$16 million in bond funds.

Oklahoma raised teacher pay and invested in education. Now, it's time for local leaders and school boards to prioritize spending.

Do we really need 500-plus school districts with well-paid superintendents? Why would taxpayers give nearly \$250,000 annually to a superintendent in whose district (Union) the majority of students lack pro-

iciency in every subject?

Is there a better way to manage bond and operational funds to make sure priorities are met? When large school districts, like Tulsa Public Schools, issue more than \$12 million for textbooks but then suggest they don't have enough revenue, it undermines the true and legitimate needs of other schools.

What about staffing levels? A economist Benjamin Scafidi noted, between 1992 and 2015, enrollment in Oklahoma schools rose by 17 percent, teacher staffing went up by 12 percent, and non-teacher staffing ballooned by 36 percent. Can't we redirect some of that operational diversion to other needs?

Legislators raised taxes by more than half a billion dollars to ensure teachers received the pay raise they needed. Now it's time to enact reforms that will help modernize our system and empower our teachers.

Lowrance has been involved with art since early childhood, when she enjoyed drawing tablets and colored pencils.

Her artistic inclination was shaped and supported by teachers and mentors in grade school, through college and still today. Now, she returns the favor by teaching art every chance she gets, whether it be at the college level or with community classes.

She's a multimedia artist who creates and appreciates art which tells a story or allows the viewer to become emotionally involved with the piece. Much

of Lowrance's work reflects simple rural Oklahoma scenes and landscapes.

Lowrance's photography classes at the ARTesian Gallery & Studios are \$10 per session and can be taken independently, no requirement to attend them all. Dates, times and topics are as follows.

April 21 — Lenses and Focal Length

The class will focus on matching the correct lens to photography goals. Participants will explore telephoto and wide angle lenses plus learn what "all those numbers" on the lenses mean.

May 5 — Aperture and Depth of Field

The class will focus on aperture, the variable hole in the lens light passes through on the way to the camera's sensor. Changing shutter speeds or aperture settings controls the light.

Participants will discuss F-Stops and learn how to use aperture to best suit their needs.

June 23 — Introduced Light

The class will explore how to best use studio lights. A studio setup can be as simple as a subject and a backdrop or complex enough to require an entire team to prepare. But the need for introduced light is a constant when it comes to indoor photography.

July 21 — Composition

The class will cover the different theories, techniques and rules involved in framing and composing appealing images. Following composition guidelines makes it easier to arrange the subjects and objects of an image on the fly. As an example, the well-known "rule of thirds" uses a grid which divides the image into three horizontal and three vertical sections. The dividing lines and intersectional points of the grid make for quick and easy compositional reminders.

Scott:

It's my hope that we'll continue working to further strengthen our schools and vital state services by finding further efficiencies within our state agencies.

We also need to continue looking at reforming apportionments as too many programs and agencies receive off-the-top funding that are constitutionally protected, which ties the legislature's hands during hard economic times.

We now must turn our attention to the 400 House and Senate bills that were reported out of committee as well as the budgets for the 70+ other state agencies.

With only six weeks remaining, we constitutionally only have five weeks to approve the budget as no revenue bills can be introduced during the final week of session. Session is constitutionally required to adjourn by the last Friday in May.

Our state has faced historic revenue shortfalls the last nine years and the legislature has been working hard to get the state back on strong financial footing. Fortunately state

revenues have been steadily increasing in recent months. Our financial picture is getting brighter.

Teachers say pay is important, but profession's issues go deeper

Boosting teacher pay by an average of \$6,000—which the Legislature approved last week—wasn't enough to put the brakes on a massive shutdown of schools to rally at the state Capitol.

An estimated 30,000 people attended the April 2 rally, and many school districts were closed again April 3 and 4 so the walkout could continue.

But could the pay package, which passed by a narrow margin in the generally tax-averse legislature, turn the tide on the state's teacher shortage? The problems facing teachers and the teaching profession are myriad, but, like so many things in state government, they boil down to money — how much there is for teachers, support staff and for schools in general.

Finding Qualified Teachers

Alarm bells about the state's struggle to staff classrooms with qualified teachers have been sounding for years. There are now more than 1,900 emergency certified teachers in Oklahoma classrooms — a 67 percent increase from last year. There were fewer than 100 five years ago.

Emergency-certified teachers hold a bachelor's degree but lack classroom experience. Yet school administrators say the lack of applicants forces them to hire nontraditional teachers.

One in five schools operate on a four-day week, a strategy that stretches the budget a little but mostly gives schools an edge in recruiting teachers. Oklahoma is losing teachers to other professions and other states. The consequences of that include electives and advanced courses that are cut because schools can't find anyone to teach them, and rising class sizes.

Julie Caruso, a science teacher at Rogers Middle School in Oklahoma City who rallied at the

Capitol, said her students need elective courses restored and reading specialists brought back. Without those supports, students are falling behind.

"That's what makes my job the most difficult. That's where I start thinking I don't get paid enough for this: the heartache for the extra work ... trying to make up for those deficits," she said.

Why Teachers Leave

Teachers are fleeing Oklahoma for many reasons, with pay being the most common, said Theresa Cullen, an associate professor at the University of Oklahoma. In October, she published the results of a survey of 250 teachers who began their careers in Oklahoma but were teaching in other states.

More than 80 percent said they left for money. Average teacher compensation in Oklahoma is \$45,276 including benefits, ac-

have average pensions of between \$22,000 and \$23,000 a year. That's because the higher pay will also mean higher contributions, on a dollar basis, for both employees and their employers.

Currently, employees pay seven percent of their compensation into the retirement system, while their employers pay 9.5 percent.

"As the salaries go up, so will the cash contributions to the system from the employee and employer," said Tom Spencer, executive director of the Oklahoma Teacher Retirement System. "There will be more cash going into the fund."

The legislation approved last Thursday will give raises that average about \$6,000. The raises start at \$5,000 for new teachers and increase with experience.

Jason Perez, chief human resources officer for Mid-Del Public Schools, said even after the raises go into effect, pay will be an issue when competing with Texas districts.

At a recent job fair, his district was in a booth next to recruiters for Mesquite, a Dallas suburb. Their salaries were a full \$20,000 higher for teachers with no experience. Next time, Mid-Del will still be offering about \$15,000 less, assuming Mesquite's salaries don't increase.

Perez said if the Legislature continues to increase teacher salaries a little each year, Oklahoma could become competitive. But if they expect the \$6,000 boost to tide teachers over for another 10 years, it won't be long before the state is back in the same spot.

"We're going to hang onto some of the teachers that would have been on the fence about retiring or resigning, but I doubt this is going to do a whole lot to really change teacher recruitment," Perez said.

Other reasons for leaving cited by teachers in Cullen's research

More Retirees, More Money?

New teachers are eligible to retire when they hit the "rule of 90," or their age plus years of service. The top five consecutive years of salary determines the size of a retiree's pension.

The higher teacher pay schedule isn't expected to have much effect on the Teacher Retirement System, where current retirees

Step 3. Let the club leader know your family wants to become a 4-H family. The leader will give you the link to enroll and help you select projects. Parents may also be asked to help by leading a project group or assisting in some other way.

4-H isn't just for people with animals. 4-H offers a wide variety of projects, for youth ages five to high school seniors, such as robotics, shooting sports, sewing, food science, and so much more!

Jean Allene Gifford Gill, 94, passed from this life on February 9, 2018 in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

are not as easily addressed through legislation. More than 50 percent of teachers cited "respect" as a factor for leaving the state, and just under 50 percent said "political climate."

Raising the starting pay will help get brand new teachers into the school, Cullen said. But if legislators don't fix the long-term funding, it won't keep teachers there.

Returning to the Classroom There is evidence the pay increase could draw teachers back into the classroom. In Cullen's survey, a third of the teachers said they were likely or very likely to return to Oklahoma if the education system improved.

A separate survey of more than 5,000 Oklahomans with active teaching certificates but who weren't teaching also found a

third of teachers would return to the classroom if salaries improved.

Emma Sawyer, a student majoring in education at the University of Central Oklahoma, was among those rallying at the Capitol Monday. She said she's hopeful the walkout will result in a positive outcome for future teachers like herself, and future students in classrooms around the state.

"It's dim right now. I'm really hoping that today changes that future for me, so I'm not forced to leave the state," Sawyer said.



district implemented longer hours for the remaining 25 school days.

A notice on the district's website informed parents that students who ride the bus needed to be at the bus stop 10 minutes earlier than their normal pick up time. Normal drop off times have been extended 25 minutes.

In addition, drop off at the school starts at 7:20 a.m. That is also when the cafeteria opens to serve breakfast.

Classes start promptly at 7:45 a.m. and the final bell schedule is 3:25 p.m. at the elementary school, 3:33 p.m. at the middle school and 3:35 p.m. at the high school.

Lunch will be 30 minutes between 11:30 a.m. and noon for grades 6 through 12. The high school campus will be open only to foot traffic during that time.

Graduation and the last day of school remain unchanged at May 11 and 18, respectively.

Washington Public Schools was closed only one day – April

2 – for the walkout, said superintendent A.J. Brewer.

"We don't have any days to make up because of the walkout," Brewer said Tuesday.

In fact, barring severe weather between now and mid-May, Washington schools has one snow day not yet taken.

That means the last day of classes in Washington will be May 16, not May 17.

Baccalaureate will be May 6 and graduation May 13.

A similar situation exists in Wayne.

Superintendent Zach Powell explained the district always exceeds the state-mandated 1,080 hours of instruction in a given school year.

Wayne Public Schools were closed for the day of advocacy on April 2.

For the remaining days of the walkout, the district sent a delegation of its educators to the capitol. Their classes were covered in house or through the use of substitute teachers.

"We actually had extra days built in and we've used two snow days," Powell said.

Wayne seniors will graduate on May 14 and the last day of school will be May 16.

session ends.

"Ideally, we will send two delegates from each building site per day," she continued. "We could not do this without community support. We are extremely blessed and thankful to be living in such a town!"

Piazza said last week that the nine-day walkout was "the hardest thing we, as educators, have ever had to do."

The statewide walkout drew tens of thousands of educators to the capitol every day, including approximately 60-70 Purcell Public Schools employees.

About half set up outside the capitol, walking a "picket line," Piazza said, adding that pedometer readings put the distance picketers walked every day at about 7 miles.

Others waited up to 2 hours to enter the building.

Once inside, they spoke to representatives and senators from both inside and outside the district.

They also spoke to teachers from other schools across the state, chanted and sat in sessions.

"We are doing everything we can to fight for the students of not only Purcell, but around the state, as well," she said.

"While it is tiring and frustrating, there is no place we would rather be than fighting for our students."

Piazza describes herself as an optimist.

"I always try to find the silver

lining in every situation," she explained. "There are more silver linings than storm clouds. While we may not get all of our funding, our voices have been heard. Funding is secured for next year and with the turnover expected during November's election, I believe the fight to get more next year will not be as much of an uphill battle."

"The other silver lining is the community. Before deciding to join other educators in this battle, the question was 'Will we have community support?' The answer has been an overwhelming yes!"

"We have parents and community members advocating for us. They understand this isn't a selfish task we have taken on, but rather an honor to be the ones chosen to fight this fight."

A block party Wednesday evening at Purcell Intermediate School was a way for teachers to thank the community.

Piazza predicted the push for adequate public school funding will continue "as long as it takes."

"Classes may resume, but complacency is no longer in the vocabulary of any teacher I have spoken to," she said. "While most would agree funding schools should not be something we have to fight for, unfortunately it is."

"Luckily, you have a group of determined, well-spoken, wonderful teachers who are willing to do just that."



Lexington Westside Church of Christ

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I want to tell you today what I believe to be as real and solid as anything in this world:

I believe with all my being that God created this old world and everything that is in it.

The reason we believe that God created the world is simple: We believe it because God's Word declares it. As soon as the Holy Spirit opens the curtain of inspiration, He says, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth" (Genesis 1:1).

The Lord never goes about "proving" His existence in His powerful Word. He declares it profoundly and emphatically. Should a man choose to question the great truth, the Spirit offers the ultimate rebuttal, saying, "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God" (Psalm 14:1).

A couple of years ago, a news show reminded me how the world tends to question God's grand declaration of Genesis 1:1. I happened upon a panel discussion on one of the national news stations where the host asked several guests to share a great scene in history they would go back and witness if possible. One by one the panelists recounted some great American moments they would re-visit, such as Kennedy's "Ask not what your country can do for you ..." speech, or to Martin Luther King's speech at the great Lincoln Memorial.

But one panelist surprised the entire group when his turn came to speak. He said, "I think I'd go back to the resurrection."

The panel laughed loudly, thinking, I'm sure, "What a strange request! How could you go back to a scene that never really happened?" even though we know the resurrection is the greatest event in the history of the world.

I could not help but think at that moment: What a sad thing for a man or woman to live such a faithless life! The host of the show – obviously in reaction to the previous gentlemen – said, "Well, I think I'd go back to the big bang." The group was more than pleased with that countermove and chattered on a good while about that worldly response. When the chatter died down, the first gentleman – unwilling to concede to faithless notions – said boldly, "Well, I subscribe to a different belief."

It was refreshing to see a man – there on national television – subscribe to what the world sees as an old, archaic, out-of-date belief: "In the beginning God created ..."

It may be out of date to the world, but it is not out of date to us! And it was not out of date to those writers whose pen the Holy Spirit guided long ago.

The psalmist writes pointedly: "By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of his mouth ... For he spake, and it was done; he commanded, and it stood fast" (Psalm 33:6, 9).

Nehemiah, one of the last writers of the Old Testament – writing around 400 B.C. – says, "Thou, even thou, art Lord alone; thou hast made heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host, the earth, and all things that are therein, the seas, and all that is therein, and thou preservest them all: and the host of heaven worshippeth thee" (9:6).

The Hebrew writer adds, "Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear" (Hebrews 11:2).

David nor Nehemiah wit-

nessed the creation, nor does Paul or any of the New Testament scribes. They are not there when God creates the heaven and the earth powerfully by a simple word. They were not there when God takes invisible objects we now know as "atoms" and makes all of matter. They are not there when God's Spirit glides majestically across a formless, unorganized mass of water and matter (Genesis 1:2), adding organization and structure to a vast universe and to an earth designed for life. And they are not there when God reaches down to the dust of the ground to shape the crown of His creation – man – in His very image (Genesis 1:26/2:7).

But these inspired writers choose to believe in God's creation by "faith" – no, not by "blind" faith but by the vast "evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). Faith does not mean we cannot know. Faith only means we cannot see!

Man may become so "intellectual" that he can deduce the glory of the heavens to a random, accidental explosion. There was an "explosion," for sure, but it was not accidental. We stand today with the psalmist, and we declare with assurance: "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork ..." (Psalm 19:1, ESV).

I have to say I was proud of the gentleman on that panel of worldly scholars. He took the unpopular stance of faith amidst an unbelieving crowd. While that stance may be old, archaic, and out-of-date to the world, to us who believe it is something different.

To us it is still new and refreshing, just like the early morning dew.

The Chickasaw Nation Toksali Successful Mindsets with Attitude and Readiness for Tomorrow (SMART) program is a great opportunity for Native American youth to earn up to \$2,000 while gaining real-world work experience, which may include job shadowing, mentoring, leadership opportunities and job training.

The program begins June 4 and will continue until July 20.

All members of federally-recognized Native American tribes age 14 to 21 are eligible to apply. Participants must reside within the Chickasaw Nation's boundaries which includes all or parts of 13 counties in Oklahoma.

Those counties are Grady, McClain, Garvin, Pontotoc, Stephens, Carter, Murray, Johnston, Jefferson, Love, Marshall, Bryan and Coal counties.

Worksites are available within Chickasaw Nation departments as well as non-tribal professional entities in local communities.

Ada is a primary hub for job sites, having hosted almost half of all Toksali SMART participants last year.

Towns like Ardmore, Sulphur, Tishomingo, Purcell and Duncan are among other

locations which offer excellent tribal and non-tribal work opportunities.

Toksali SMART participants receive job placement assistance based on interest assessment results. In addition to work experience, participants attend weekly training and educational sessions.

The required training and education sessions include: Chickasaw Nation core values, Chickasaw language, cultural experiences, financial literacy, wellness, nutrition, customer service, community service opportunities, character and leadership development.

More than 680 Native American youth participated in the program last year. Many participants have gone on to work with the Chickasaw Nation, often attaining leadership roles through diligence and hard work.



Flipping the switch on power outages

Power outages happen, but families do not have to be left in the dark when the lights go out.

"Treat power outages like any other potential emergency by doing as much advanced preparation and planning as possible," said Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist. "Knowing ahead of time what to do and where to go will help you better manage during and after a power failure."

Start by assembling or restocking an emergency preparedness kit with important supplies such as nonperishable food, a can opener, water, a flashlight, extra batteries, cash and a first-aid kit.

Homeowners with electric garage door openers also should take some time to find the manual release lever for that mechanism and know how to operate it.

Meanwhile, families should ensure the car's gas tank is full and all cell phones are

completely charged.

"Keep backup cell chargers in the house and in the car," Peek said. "Be sure family members who rely on battery-operated or power-dependent items such as medical devices are included in the emergency plan."

During a power outage, rely on flashlights for emergency lighting rather than candles, which could be fire hazards, and keep the refrigerator and freezer doors closed to preserve chilled and frozen foods.

Most refrigerated food items can be kept safely for about four hours in a closed refrigerator, while a food in a full freezer will maintain its temperature for about 48 hours.

Other appliances should be turned off or disconnected to guard against potential power surges that could damage them.

"During a power outage in extremely hot weather, move to the lowest level of the house and wear lightweight, light colored clothing. If it gets too hot, you might be able to go somewhere like a shopping mall or movie

theatre," Peek said. "In cooler weather, wear layers of clothing to keep warm."

After the power is restored, check the refrigerator and freezer for spoiled food items. Perishable food that has been at 40F or more for 2 or more hours should be thrown away. If the food has been exposed to temperatures of 90F or above it should be discarded after one hour.

Also discard any food that smells off or is an unusual color or texture.

Items in the freezer that are colder than 40F and covered with ice crystals can be safely refrozen though you may find the quality has deteriorated when they are used.

"Check with your doctor or a pharmacist if you think any of your medications were spoiled or compromised as a result of the power outage," Peek said.



Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week is Lanny Nellis of Norman. Mr. Nellis served in the Korean War while serving in the United States Air Force.

Last week we made three trips to the VA Regional Office in Muskogee to represent veterans and surviving spouses with their appeals for VA benefits. By the time we drove there on Monday, Wednesday and Friday plus assisted over 270 veterans on Tuesday and Thursday we were ready for the weekend.

We were very pleased with the way all three cases were handled. I believe all three of them will be approved for the benefits previously denied by VA. Of the several different ways for the hearing to be held, we chose to use the video hearing held in Muskogee as that was the quickest and most convenient way for us and the claimants. As most of the claims we file are approved, I think three trips to Muskogee in one week will ever be a common occurrence.

Currently, we represent more than 18,000 veterans and sur-

living spouses with their VA benefits claims. If very many of those claims were denied, we would be required to be at a hearing every day. I'm just very proud of our volunteers who help to make sure that we do everything possible for the men and women who have served our country in the military. The only thing that I don't understand is why other organizations don't use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire Forms the Department of Veterans Affairs developed for veterans to use to diagnose a disability. As far as I'm concerned, it's one of the best VA changes implemented to increase the accuracy of VA rating decisions and to reduce the number of pending claims.

One of the things that I have noticed throughout my life is that people don't want change. They will say that's the way we have always done things and they want to leave them alone. To me change is sometimes difficult, but if there is a better way to help veterans why would we not do so.

Another thought for everyone is we should all be on the same team when it comes to helping veterans and their families. Our goal has always been to help each person who visits us to receive all of the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

Of the 279 veterans and surviving spouses we assisted last week, there were veterans from California, Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, Colorado, Florida and Indiana. I would bet a dollar that there is no other place in this United States of America where veterans would travel to for help with their VA claims and questions.

A large number of visitors also keep our drivers very busy. Last week they volunteered 50 hours transporting 17 folks 1,310 miles, setting a record. Maybe we are doing something right for the men and women who served in the military. All I know is that what we do is very rewarding for those of us who are making a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served.

On any given day we receive hundreds of calls from veterans and surviving spouses who are in need of assistance of VA benefits. One of the most common things I hear from veterans is that they went to the VA for assistance with medical care and were told they did not qualify. Too often folks are told you make too much money to qualify for VA medical care. What they are not told is that a veteran who has a service-connected disability is eligible for VA health care.

Over the years we have helped thousands of men and women who were in the National Guard or Reserves to receive both VA health care and

VA compensation for any injuries that occurred while on active duty or during their annual training. The most common disability that may be service connected is hearing loss and tinnitus. For those of you who would like more information please visit us any Tuesday or Thursday.

As I look back over the years since returning from Vietnam I can understand how the things that happened to us during military service will sometimes affect our thoughts and actions for the rest of our lives. The men and women who are serving today are going to experience some of the same issues that veterans before them have had to deal with. Personally, I believe that today's veterans are better equipped to handle some of the traumatic events than some veterans who served in earlier times. The military is also much more proactive in veteran's mental health today than ever before. For many years members of the military would be discharged early because of a mental health condition even though they may have suffered a traumatic event while in the military.

One of the most common stressors that we see is military members who were involved in direct combat, seeing others killed or injured from roadside bombs or other types of trauma. Another thing we see a lot of are the sexual assaults that have occurred to veterans. Some of them have suffered for many years from PTSD and Depression from Military Sexual Trauma (MST). We never ask a veteran what happened to them. Our only question is, did a MST occur? We then refer them to a mental health doctor for an evaluation. If they are diagnosed with any type of mental health condition, we then ask for service connection of that disability.

Although we had a very busy week, our mail was very light. We were notified 11 veterans were awarded benefits at the 100 percent rate. These veterans will receive \$412,003 on an annual basis. Fifteen veterans were awarded benefits at the rate of 10-90 percent. These veterans will receive \$208,402 on an annual basis.


