But now Purcell has its first four-sport All-Stater with Swayze recently tabbed as All-State in basketball.

She will be attending college and playing bas-

Trade war fallout?

Trump tariffs will raise the cost for school construction

It seems trickle down economics does work – just not always in a good way.

Tariffs ordered recently by President Donald Trump are increasing the construction cost of a new junior high school and improvements at the football stadium before the first shovel of dirt is turned on either project.

Purcell Public Schools Superintendent Jason Midkiff gave that news to the school board during Monday's meeting.

Still, Midkiff said, the projects are "still on target for an early June start on the field-house and then a late August start on the junior high."

"We will look at ways to offset some of the increases as we go along," he continued. "We built in contingencies for that sort of thing."

The news from the transportation bond was better. The district has ordered an activity bus and four other buses. Delivery is anticipated before the start of the 2018-19 school year.

Midkiff added the district has acquired some land by the football field from the county through a competitive bid.

"That was not a cost we had in the original budget, but we do have the funds to acquire that property," he said.

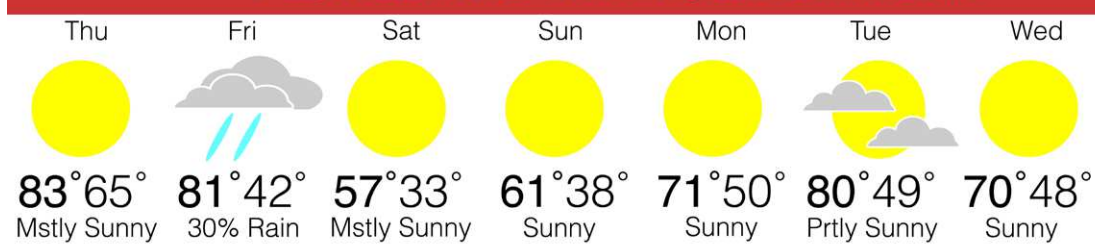

Still no positive ID

Remains found Feb. 1 are female

Authorities are no closer to identifying skeletonized human remains discovered February 1 in southern McClain County.

What is known, said Jessica Brown, spokeswoman for the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, is the remains are female.

Investigators are “working off a name we believe the person to be,” Brown said.

However, even that lead is tentative until the medical examiner’s office makes a

positive identification.

It is believed the unburied body could have been at the location between 1 and 2 years.

They were discovered by an oilfield worker taking a bathroom break in some trees about 100 yards east of Interstate 35.

The site was also about 100 yards west of a workover rig located approximately 1/4 mile east of the Wayne/Payne exit on State Highway 59 and then south on a lease road.

McClain County Sheriff Don Hewett said animals had scattered the bones. Female clothing was nearby.

Purcell policing in the cloud

Digital tickets saving time, paper

Gone are the bulky ticket books and risk of writer’s cramp.

Traffic tickets in Purcell these days are all in the cloud. It’s all thanks to a company called Digiticket and the department’s contract with them.

Motorists stopped for a violation will have already noticed the change since the department took the paperless tickets live on March 2.

Det. Sgt. Scott Stephens, public information officer for the department, said the handheld Digiticket device is roughly the size of a cell phone.

A red laser light scans the bar code on the back of the driver’s license and all of the driver’s information is automatically loaded into the device.

The system stores a “top 25” list of traffic violations. If the offense isn’t on that list, the officer inputs the correct ordinance number.

Because the Digiticket system doesn’t access the Department of Public Safety’s

database that includes driving history, license status and whether insurance is current or lapsed, the officer still must have a dispatcher run those checks.

The individual receiving the citation signs the digital copy on the device. A portable printer then produces a paper ticket for the motorist.

“People lose their tickets all the time and if they are not aware when it is due, they end up with an arrest warrant for failure to appear,” Stephens said.

Municipal court clerk Kaytie Spencer said the digital tickets sync to the Digiticket website. “And basically I just sync them to my system.”

Municipal court convenes on Wednesdays and Spencer prints out copies of the tickets for the corresponding court date.

“It’s super easy. I love it,” Spencer said.

The citations and dispensations are sent electronically to DPS to become part of the individual’s driving record,

Stephens said.

The department has six Digiticket devices and portable printers.

Officers log in and are assigned 50 numbered blank citations. Each officer works from his or her own “ticket book” which they access at the start of a shift.

When they’ve issued 50 citations, they are assigned another set of 50.

Officer Blake Steely said Digiticket is a proven time saver during a traffic stop and is particularly useful when issuing multiple citations to one person.

He estimated it cuts the time for a traffic stop roughly in half.

That alone means more time available to patrol Purcell’s streets.

In the first three months of 2018, police issued 238 traffic citations and issued 290 written warnings.

During the first month using Digiticket, the tally was 79 traffic citations and 99 written warnings.

Lexington Couple charged

DA: Daughters endured sexual abuses

A Lexington couple have been declared indigent and are in jail on charges stemming from the alleged sexual abuse of their 16- and 13-year-old daughters.

Kenneth D. Retherford, 41, is charged in McClain County District Court with four counts of lewd or indecent acts to a child under the age of 16.

His bond is \$100,000.

Joann D. Retherford, 44, faces two counts of enabling child sexual abuse. Her bond is \$70,000.

Preliminary hearing conferences for both defendants will be at 9 a.m. May 9.

According to an affidavit, Lt. Kevin Austin with the Purcell Police Department learned of the allegations from a sheriff’s investigator in Cleveland County on March 22.


One daughter, now an adult,

told investigators when she was in the first grade, Kenneth Retherford fondled himself in front of her and showed her child pornography on his computer. He also reportedly fondled her genitals.


When Joann Retherford found out, she reportedly made him delete the pornographic video and installed a key-only deadbolt lock on the bedroom door to prevent Kenneth Retherford from entering his daughters’ room in the middle of the night. She kept the key tied around her waist.

Charged:

Another adult daughter related to investigators that her father touched her inappropriately when she was 10 or 11.

During a February 23 interview with Cleveland County authorities, Joann Retherford said she was aware of Kenneth Retherford's sexual attraction to young girls and knew of the abuse taking place, but did not report it because he was never violent to the girls.

The alleged abuses occurred while the family was living in Tahlequah, Welling and Purcell.

It was in Purcell that he allegedly spanked and then grounded the 13-year-old. He later reportedly told her he would lift the grounding if she would take off all her clothes and allow him to fondle her. The girl told him she would rather be grounded, according to the affidavit.

The 16-year-old was never the target of her father's sexual advances, but told investigators she witnessed many of the incidents reported by two of her sisters.

My dad, John D., expressed an opinion in last week's newspaper about the teacher walk-out. He never said he didn't support the teachers. He never said he didn't believe that additional funding in classrooms wasn't needed, necessary or deserved. He's always advocated for public schools.

He merely said he thought teachers had exhausted their political capital at the state Capitol and it was time to end the walkout and head back to the classroom because 10 years of funding cuts can't be made up in one year.

Wow. Did he ever poke the bear?!

We've heard from people all over the state. Some we don't know and some we know well.

Some from people that have been in our office turning in grant proposals for the Purcell Public Schools Foundation.

Some people whom we count as friends have been downright nasty. Some whom we don't normally see eye-to-eye with have been in John D.'s corner. And vice versa. It's been a very divisive week at our office — as it has been state wide.

But let me clarify a few things about my dad. He loves teachers and he loves Oklahoma public schools. In fact, he has unconditional love for at least a few teachers. His mom, sister and nieces are all either active or retired Oklahoma teachers. He has intimate knowledge of what it is to be a teacher and respects the profession.

John D. has done as much as he could do for public schools over the years. He's a charter member of the Purcell Public School Foundation. It was his idea, in fact. He approached Don Sherman in the early 1990s about starting one. He did. In the end Don Sherman, John Mantooth, Richard Duffy, Betty McElderry, Ken Bridwell, Harry Wollenberg, Don Griffith, Tony Baird, Dr. Jean Dunegan, Dr. Bryan Dye, Rev. Dennis Hooper, Mike McGregor, Robin Merrill, Bertha M. Potts, James Readis, Dr. Rick Schmidt, Ernie Thompson, Dr. George Hatfield, Rayora Moore and Jayne N. Montgomery created what is now a viable addition to funding for teachers across the district. I'm not sure how many students have benefited from the Foundation, too many to count, but it's been one

of his most heartfelt endeavors.

I've never seen him turn down a high school student soliciting a yearbook ad, after prom sponsorship or candy bar sale. And bond issues! Take a look back at the bond issues. If you question where his position has been on bond issues you need a thump on the head.

He's not after accolades, he only wants to help the school and his community.

But I've seen people try to smear him in a state-wide campaign this week because of ONE editorial. An editorial in which he never said he didn't support teachers, he just thought they could have a different approach. And that's what makes it so hard for me.

It's difficult sitting on the sidelines, seeing what people say about him on social media. He's not on social media and doesn't see the vitriol that's on there. He's lucky! I see it and other members of our family see it and are disgusted and hurt. Thankfully most of you don't have to see things written about your family that are written about mine.

But for the record, there have been few people who support public schools like John D.

Walking for pupils, teachers

Dear John D.:

I have always had and continue to have respect for you and Gracie and the job you do to support all of the area communities. And while we may not always agree on every topic, I realize it takes courage to voice opinions that may not be popular. Thank you for what you do.

I graduated from OU in December 1979 and started teaching in January 1980 in Purcell. I have had the honor of teaching for almost 40 years in two of, in my opinion, the best schools in the state. I taught in Purcell and have been blessed to teach in Lexington for almost eight years. I was Miss Barnum when I started teaching and worked two jobs. I had the offer to manage a convenience store I had worked at through high school and college for \$30,000 a year

plus bonuses. I took home \$468 a month my first year teaching. I said, like many, I didn't get into teaching for the money. I knew what I was getting into.

Fast forward 10 years to 1990. I was married and my older child was starting kindergarten in the same grade as your younger child. What a fun group of bright and funny children. Do you remember there were 30 students in each of the kindergarten classes that year? I taught a combination class of wonderful children for several years because the district could not afford to hire a first grade teacher and a second grade teacher. So I had 28 children who ranged in ability from no knowledge of letters, sounds and numbers to reading at almost a fourth grade level. I felt lucky we could share an assistant. She helped each of us

almost an hour a day. I recruited many parent volunteers, some of which are my best friends to this day. This was the only way I could give these young students the individual time they needed.

When 1017 passed, I am sure the teacher raise included was extremely important to a young married teacher with two children, day care and a mortgage. Honestly, I had to look the bill up last week to see if it contained a pay raise. That's not what I remember. It's the class sizes being set at 20 for primary grades. Districts were charged for each student over the mandate so it became more expensive NOT to hire a teacher.

There was money for re-

I am writing to respond to some of the comments I have seen and heard concerning your column on April 5, “Time to Hit the Books.”

In the spirit of honest disclosure, I’ll remind readers I am a former managing editor of **The Purcell Register** and a dear friend of yours, Gracie’s and your family. However, this letter comes as a reader of **The Register** and former longtime resident of Purcell, as well as a citizen of this country who believes in civil discourse.

We all know the state of education in Oklahoma is embarrassing and without question, deserving of all the support educators have asked, for their livelihoods and their students. One of the points lost in the current standoff is teachers are asking for as much support for their students as for themselves. They are genuine public servants of the first order.

Your column, like any opinion was, by it’s nature, going to generate disagreement. I have no problem with that. What I’d like to address is the vile, sickening and distressing nature of the attacks that have been directed toward you.

The highest calling of any newspaper is to be a vehicle of public discourse. **The Purcell Register** has never shied away from its responsibility in this arena. Nor should it. That has meant, at times, that you’ve risked public scorn in order to generate meaningful conversation. I commend you for doing such.

That, in my opinion, is the definition of selfless public service.

I could list all the institutions and initiatives that have benefited from support from both of you, as well as the newspaper. I could attempt to list the litany of lives you have touched by cataloging accomplishments and milestones. However, such an undertaking would require more than space than a newspaper would hold, and neither of you would want such.

Love of teaching

Dear Editor,

I’m going to use myself as the example so no one gets offended.

When I start the school year (this being my 20th year), I start small getting to know my students because I have to earn their trust and respect before they feel comfortable to open up to me.

It’s much the same with people who work with teenagers.

I realize that education won’t get the \$213 million that has been cut from 2008 to 2018 while enrollment has increased nearly 40,000 but I can be a voice for the future of education in Oklahoma.

I won’t lose my love for educating the future during the first or last week of school. I realize that I also won’t get all the funding back into education right away.

I did get a raise, but this has never been just about me. It’s a start, but will it stop professionals from leaving our state? Only the future can tell.

I teach English but correcting grammar isn’t all I do each day. I help my students fill out college applications. I help my students find resources to get out of bad circumstances. I help my students find help for their friend who has an eating disorder. I help my students by listening to the drama they are having with their job. I help my students by spending time off the clock to fill out recommendation letters. I help my students find the resources they need to move on beyond high school. I help my students with more than grammar.

Teaching is like eating a pizza. You can’t teach everyone at once just like you can’t eat the whole pizza at once. You’ve got to teach them one at a time because like pizza they all have different taste.

So, I will not go back to work. I will live to fight politics another day, because my students deserve to at least have the regional average of \$9,744 spent on their education instead of below average with \$8,075.

I did see the notice on the door of Bobby Cleveland, because I’ve been there, many times! The governor even signed another bill Tuesday to give support staff a raise, which could replace that \$22 million that was cut in February or with the new bills on Friday replace the \$50 million that was repealed in March. But what will be done about the future and replace the cuts from the past or just past two months?

I’m doing my job, standing up for my students. I’m meeting with my students on a Saturday to help with their upcoming AP Exam this month. I fail to believe that education has received all the money they are going to give us this session. I fail to believe this is the best Oklahoma can do for education.

I’m not saying I disagree with you. I’ve seen the comments on social media. I’ve stood on the street corner and been told I’m number one. I also understand that these same people don’t walk in my shoes and understand how much has been cut to education over the past ten years and that there is nothing left to cut.

We’ve already had many districts go to four days a week, it’s not because their students can learn quicker. If you don’t live it, you don’t see it so I understand why some feel we should be fired or just go back to work. However, it’s not time to go home. The Legislature should do more than give us a favor, they should make education a priority in Oklahoma.

Here’s the deal. Education continues to be cut and teachers have said enough. We’ve always made due by using our own money, writing grants, foundation grants, larger class sizes, cutting resources like DHS, reusing instruments, students buying their own materials or equipment, there is nothing left to cut. I agree, after 10 years of doing this I’m sure that anyone in a company would welcome a \$6,000 a year raise. Which is why we haven’t pushed for more but again, this was never just about us. It is now time to give back to our students and support staff. Wouldn’t that be nice?

Students are not where they were 10 years ago, so I don’t feel people understand my pain. Parent support has decreased, resources have decreased, at risk students have increased, free and reduce lunches have increased, social issues have changed and the dynamics of a traditional class has changed.

One public servant asked a teacher, “Don’t you get a cost of living raise every year?” The teacher said, “No I’ve never got a cost of living raise.”

I totally get that neither have many people in Oklahoma. So it seems we have both chosen careers where we knew what we were getting into. The difference is I’m responsible for 149 students and if I have the chance to fight for their education to be at least average, I’m going to fight every time!

Teachers, you have made a statement and done some good but quit while you are ahead before the vote of public opinion starts to go against you. Thanks for your opinion but my 30,000 plus colleagues at the capitol seem to show otherwise! Together we are stronger for our students and the future of education.

In politics, as in life, no one ever gets everything they want and I’m not asking for everything, just asking for my students to at least be considered “average” in per pupil spending!

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Eye on legislative process

Dear John D.,

I returned to Oklahoma to teach second grade just in time to participate in the walk out of the 90s that brought HB1017 into law. As a young teacher I celebrated with my colleagues all of the good the legislation brought; a pay raise, more funding, class size reductions, etc. Then we went back to teaching, having school, and doing the best we could for kids.

That's when I made a huge mistake. I think some of my colleagues will acknowledge making it too! While I continued to vote and be a good citizen, I took my eye off of the legislative process. I didn't pay attention to what was happening at our great state capitol. I was busy being a coach's wife, a mother, and a teacher pursuing my master's degree.

In 2000 I moved into the principal's office. As a new administrator I worked hard to get my feet on the ground, learn all things leadership, and build a culture of continuous improvement where all kids mattered and received the absolute best that we could give day in and day out.

Although we weren't rolling in the dough, the site budget bought all the copy paper the teachers needed, construction paper, other supplies, and I was not aware at least of any situation where I couldn't provide for the basic "needs" of the classroom and often was able to provide some of the extras that helped us to stay at the front of the pack, progressive and ensuring that our students had resources and classroom materials.

At the end of each school year I was actually able to work with my teachers on making lists of furniture and supply needs, discuss materials needed for pursuing new initiatives, and gather titles for new library books that teachers knew would enhance the curriculum.

I worked my little heart out to grow the very best school I could, but I wasn't paying attention to everything that mattered. It never occurred to me that the representatives of the people wouldn't be doing their due diligence to take care of education. Everyone knows that education is the most powerful way to change the world, right? Everyone knows that the first step to helping kids step out of poverty is an education, right? Oh, how naive I was and today I am more than a little ashamed of it.

I am finishing my 18th year in the principal's office. I have watched the stack of applicants for teaching positions shrink from 60 to one or two if any. I have watched some really critical components of HB1017 (like class size mandates) be deregulated and/or waived because of budget deficits. I have watched teachers buy their own red construction paper for Christmas projects and a million other things.

I have watched our PTO and school foundation pick up the slack for the state and provide for the absolute basics of schooling. I have watched our site custodial staff be reduced from two-1/2 to one. Can you even imagine one person cleaning up after 500?

I have watched as teachers have taken on second jobs, got up at 3 a.m. to teach kids in China and donated plasma in an effort to get by. I have watched a decade pass without the elementary budget funded at 100 percent. All the while believing that times were tough and that the legislators would help us when they could. I feel like a fool.

Regardless of what happens next week, next month, or next year I have a message for the next generation of teachers. When the time comes and you are back in your classroom doing what you love - do not take your eye off the Capitol. I hope and pray that you will never have to walk out again, but I know that it will only be avoided if you continue to engage the way you have engaged lately.

You must be registered to vote, you must know who is running and you must know what they stand for. You have to remember that your representative is just that, your representative. It is your responsibility to keep them informed of your opinions and to make sure they know what matters to you.

When their voting record and their interests fail to represent the people that sent them to the capitol it is time to send them home. When you get into the voters booth, please do not focus on the party affiliation. Do your homework and vote with confidence for the person that will put your best interest above special interests.

At 31 years in ed, any way you slice it I am closer to the end than the beginning. My greatest fear for those incredible teachers rallying this week is that they will go back into their classrooms and again disengage in what our state leadership is doing. Learn from my mistake! Please commit for the long haul, well beyond this walkout. My generation should have never allowed our leaders to create the situation that brought us to today. I am committed to full engagement from now on.

If you have read this far, you know that I am all in. I believe in our power to change the world.

sources like textbooks and literature books. There was federal money at the time earmarked for hiring teachers to reduce class size, provide counseling and safety measures for students. There was enrichment for gifted children.

I could TEACH-work with each child to help them discover and nurture their individual strengths and talents.

Fast forward a generation. Now my daughter has taught school for 10 years. My oldest grandchild started kindergarten this year with your

grandson. Almost ALL of the mandates included in 1017 are gone. No penalty for large classes. So many schools are back to 30-35 or more students in their primary classroom. A large percentage of teachers are alternatively certified. There are open positions in districts because of no qualified or interested applicants.

Textbooks and library money has to be used to pay basic teacher salaries. Federal programs have been cut every year. Schools in our area are blessed to have administrations, boards and communities

Education funding

Dear Editor,

The current legislature cannot be held solely responsible for the current condition of education funding in Oklahoma. However, it is their responsibility to now fix the problems created by their predecessors.

It is extremely difficult for the average person to find current budget information. The 2016 budget allocated 16 percent for K-12 and 24 percent to Higher Education. It is my understanding the total is now up to 51 percent. It should be obvious increasing the money alone is not the answer. The legislature needs to determine why the money is not making it down to the local level where it is needed.

It is hard to understand why Higher Education gets the most money since they receive numerous grants and donations, and the students pay tuition and buy their own books. Our allocation to them is higher than surrounding states.

This should be corrected; however, this alone will not resolve the problem. The legislature needs to review our current system and reduce the amount that is being absorbed by management and administrative costs.

The local school boards must also assure money received is being properly used. This requires more than maintaining the status quo, approving bills after the fact, and approval of expenditures based on cursory information. This is very difficult because the current system used by most schools does not provide the information needed. This needs to be corrected.

The recent walkout has caused us to focus and given nationwide attention to the problem. However, it has now become a prolonged strike that needs to end so the elected representatives can focus on resolving the problem.

Throwing more money in the pot will fix nothing. Change will not be easy, but it is necessary and now is the time to make it.

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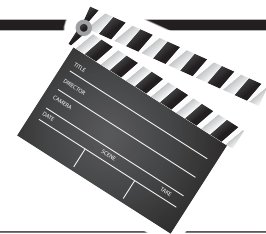
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MOVIES WITH DAVE

Another insane five movie weekend this week.

We have a film that focuses on the darkest moment in Ted Kennedy's life, which is saying something, yet another horror film from a comedic director, an R rated comedy featuring John Cena, Wes Anderson's return to stop-motion animation, and an overly sentimental sports movie showcasing one of the most over-the-top musical scores I've ever heard in a film. Let's get to it, shall we?



First up is "Chappaquiddick." Based on the true story of the tragic death of Mary Jo Kopechne (Kate Mara), this film follows Ted Kennedy (Jason Clarke), the events leading up to the fateful incident that took Mary Jo's life, and the ramifications that changed Ted Kennedy's life forever.

This is another historical film where I wasn't too aware the actual story going into it.

I knew Ted Kennedy was somehow involved in an accident that led to a woman's death, but I didn't know any of the details surrounding it.

When they tell you about the Apollo 11 moon landing as a kid, most don't add in the brewing Kennedy scandal that happened the very same week.

So in that respect this movie is very interesting and it's fascinating to see all these events unfold.

That said, I'm not sure if this movie does the story of the Chappaquiddick incident justice.

To give the film credit though

the acting's pretty solid all around.

Jason Clarke easily has the strongest performance of the entire movie and makes for a very believable Ted Kennedy.

Also the movie somehow manages to make Ed Helms less annoying than he normally is in other films. That's no small feat.

I don't know what to think about Kate Mara though. It hardly even felt like she was playing a character. Just Kate Mara acting as herself.

I feel like I learned absolutely nothing about Mary Jo after seeing this film. I know Ted is the focus of the film, but a little more development for her character would have been nice.

And while I said I liked Clarke's performance, the writing for his character did leave something to be desired.

It's like they went out of their way to make Ted Kennedy completely unsympathetic in this movie.

For example, right after the deadly accident Ted goes to inform two of his friends what just happened. There isn't an official record of what was said, so the writers had artistic license here.

But they don't have Ted say something like "There's been an accident" or "I've done something terrible," you know something that would give the man a breath of humanity.

Instead Ted simply tells his friends "I'm not going to be president."

How callous and uncaring can you get? You just accidentally killed someone and your first concern is your political career?

That one scene sets the tone for the entire remainder of the

film.

Instead of exploring Ted grappling with the guilt of involuntary killing a woman yet not wanting to tarnish his family's legacy, everything from then on seems like Ted trying to avoid responsibility.

Even when he finally does confess to any wrong doing, it comes across as cold and calculated just because of that one sentence.

Who knows? Maybe that's what Ted actually told his friends. We'll probably never know what was said that night.

I don't have a huge issue with writers taking artistic license with historical events to make films more interesting

But that line doesn't make Ted's character more interesting. It robs him of his humanity.

Another thing that threw me for a loop was Joseph P. Kennedy Sr. in this film.

I'm no Kennedy expert so I wasn't aware Kennedy Sr. had suffered a stroke eight years prior to the events of this movie.

Because of that, when Ted called his dad telling him about the accident, I had no idea what was happening when Kennedy Sr. responded to the bad news by breathing heavily into the phone and croaking out a single word.

I thought the news had somehow given Kennedy Sr. a heart attack. I had no idea what was happening.

You have to set something like that up.

Maybe add in someone asking Ted about his dad before the Chappaquiddick accident happens. Even just cutting to Kennedy Sr. while he's talking on the phone would do, but give me something.

I feel like I'm being long winded, but I haven't even got-

ten to my least favorite aspect of this film.

Nope, that would be the cinematography.

I hated the way this movie looked.

It's like a made for TV film. There's no style. It all looks flat and digital. Nothing like the 1960s at all.

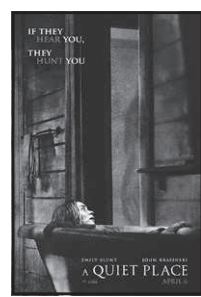
Maybe I'm spoiled by films like "Jackie" or "Battle of the Sexes," but you can tell from just a single frame which time period those movies take place.

If the actors weren't wearing period clothing, I would have never guessed the movie was set in the 1960s.

It's things like this that make me feel like the movie as a whole doesn't live up to the story's potential.

It still makes for a captivating tale to be sure, but I can't help but feel a film about Chappaquiddick could have been so much better.

Next is "A Quiet Place." Set in the not so distant future, this film follows a family (John Krasinski, Emily Blunt, Millicent Simmonds, and Noah Jupe) forced to live their lives in complete silence thanks to mysterious and terrifying creatures that hunt by sound alone.

If they can hear you, they hunt you.

What is it with comedic actors turning around and directing horror films?

First we have Jordan Peele breaking out of the comedy mold and directing one of the best, if not the best, horror movies of 2017 with "Get Out."

Now we have John Krasinski, best known for playing Jim from The Office, directing this film.

I don't know if this is some kind of trend, but I must say if these two movies are any indication, more comedians should try their hand at horror.

This movie is fantastic. I love high concept horror like this. If you make a sound, the monsters hunt you. Super simple and incredibly effective movie premise.

The first thing that hits you when the film starts is the sound. Or the lack of sound rather.

Because of that even the smallest noises become unnerving, not to mention loud noises which have never been more bone chilling.

That's not to say the entire film is complete silence. This movie has a fantastic musical score that beautifully accompanies the nearly quiet environment of the film.

This movie uses sound, and

more importantly silence, better than most films can even dream.

I haven't felt this much tension from a horror movie in ages. I was wide-eyed and white knuckled the entire second half of the movie. And the film managed to do all this while barely showing any violence or gore.

Along with the first-rate sound design, this movie also has fantastic world building.

I love the little details visually showing how this family survives this bizarre future. Things like spreading sand on forest paths to dampen sound, or painted spots on the floor to show which floorboards don't creak. It's all very well thought out.

We're never explicitly told where the sound hunting creatures came from and frankly I think it's better that way. Monsters are always scarier when details are left to the imagination.

Naturally since no one can make a sound without risking death, nearly all the film's dialogue is in sign language with subtitles for those of us who aren't fluent in ASL.

That doesn't stop the actors from delivering passionate and incredibly sincere performances though.

John Krasinski and Emily Blunt are both brilliant. Each manage to express so much emotion without saying a word.

Even the younger performers were great.

Krasinski reportedly went as far as insisting a deaf actress (Millicent Simmonds) be cast to play the family's deaf teenage daughter, and boy did it pay off. Her performance really helped add another layer of authenticity to the film.

This is easily the best horror movie of 2018 so far, at least that I've seen. If you love scary films, this movie is a must see.

Third is "Blockers." When three parents (Leslie Mann, Ike Barinholtz, and John Cena) stumble upon their daughters' pact to lose their virginity at prom, they set out to do everything in their power to stop them.

If you're like me, the first thing that pops into your head upon hearing this premise is "Oh, it's American Pie, but with girls."

And while the two films share a similar concept, this movie is much more focused on the parents and less on the teenagers.

Honestly I was kind of looking forward to this film. Sure

the trailers made it look stupid, but other critics seemed to be giving it universal praise. I thought we might have another great R rated comedy on our hands.

After seeing it though, I have zero clue what other reviewers were thinking.

This is just another dumb gross-out comedy.

I'm no prude. I can enjoy gross humor here and there, but that's all this movie has.

I don't know about you, but there's only so many times I can find projectile vomiting and full frontal male nudity funny.

Sure there's a few actual jokes here and there. Some of them even got a laugh, but so many more of them just fell completely flat.

I didn't care for Leslie Mann in this movie at all. Out of all the parents in the film, her relationship with her daughter felt the most forced. Besides, I think her comedy shtick is beginning to wear thin on me.

Surprisingly John Cena and Geraldine Viswanathan make the most convincing parent-child couple in this film. At least those two had an ounce of chemistry together, unlike the others.

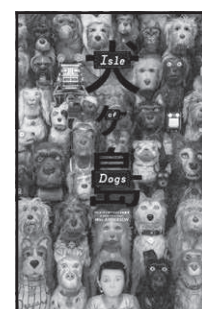
The movie also tries to have a message about female vs. male sexuality and how girls are unfairly repressed, but it continually undercuts itself with the actions of the parents.

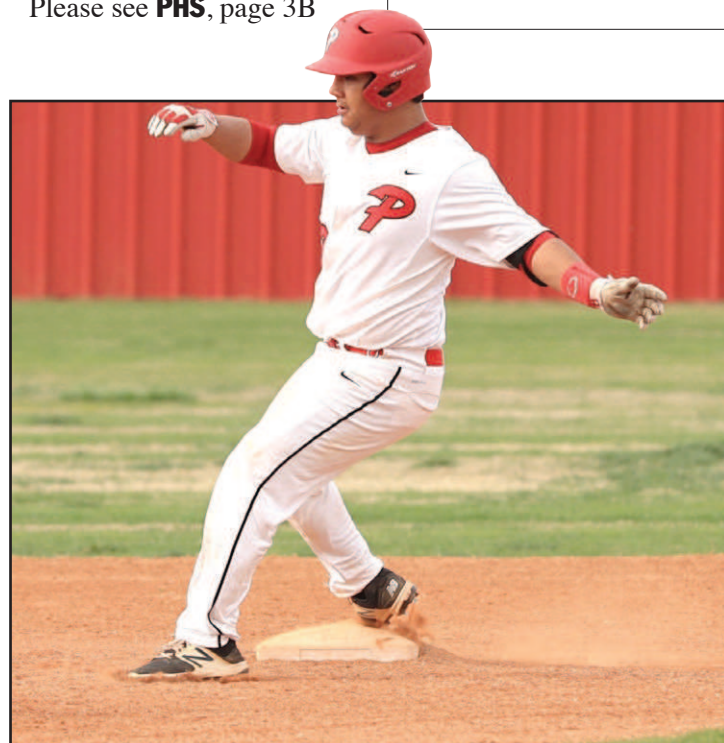

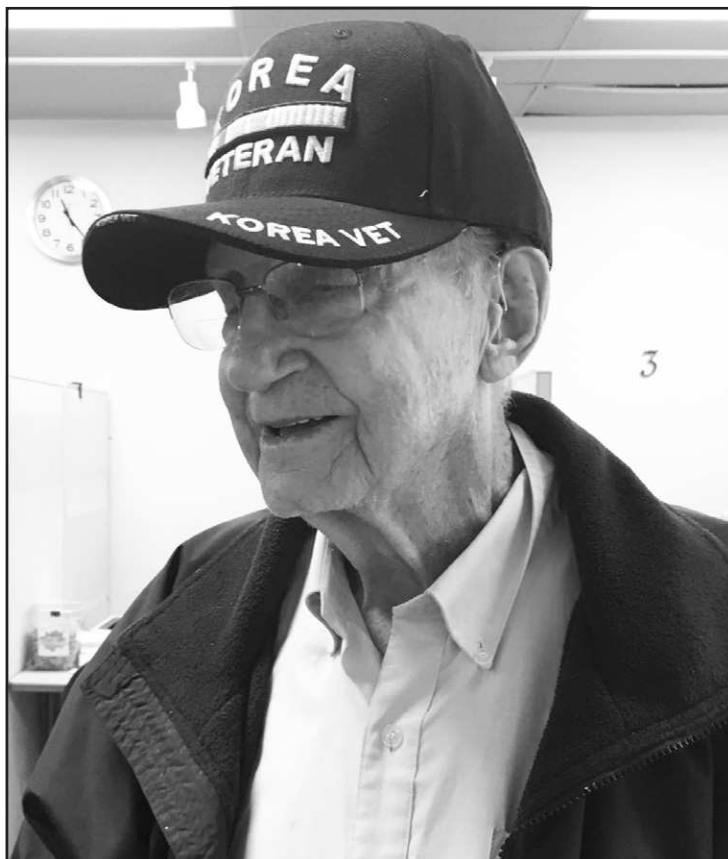

new driver, Terry O'Dea, who is certified to operate the lifts and has a commercial driver's license. We hope to have all the decals and our logos on the bus in the next week or so. For those of you who need this service, please call Lora at (405) 550-8806. Our other two drivers donated 65 hours to transport 20 veterans 932 miles.

We still have the 1965 Mustang that was donated to our organization to be sold to raise funds. For those of you who are looking for something to do, this car is 75 percent restored. It has a broken six-cylinder engine with an automatic transmission. One of our veterans is bringing an engine to us this week, and it will need to be rebuilt. We are asking \$3,800 or best offer for this classic car.

If I were not so busy helping veterans and their families I would buy it myself. My wife says no more projects unless it's something she wants done around the house.

Our program to accept cars and trucks that can be given to veterans or sold to raise operational funds for veterans continues to be a benefit to everyone. The donor receives a tax deduction, a needy veteran receives it, or we sell it and use the money to support veterans. We also accept any type of handicap items that we

can recycle to other veterans.

Did you know that we have food items that can be given to veterans or their surviving spouses who need this type of services? During the last few weeks, we have provided electric scooters and wheelchairs to seven veterans who were in need. As always, we provide these items at no charge to our veterans and their families. Currently, we do not have any scooters left, but we do have two electric wheelchairs available for veterans. We may have a few walkers and shower chairs that are available.

One of the things I have not written about in a while is the presumptive illnesses caused by military service. One of the largest groups are those veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange while serving in Vietnam, Thailand, Korea and other places. For those of you who are suffering from any of the conditions associated with Agent Orange, VA compensation may be payable. The surviving spouses of veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange may be eligible for DIC benefits if any of the presumptive or conditions that were service connected are listed on the Veterans Death Certificate as primary or secondary to cause of death.

Last week there were 275

veterans and surviving spouses who visited us last week at 1268 North Interstate Drive for assistance with their VA claims and questions. The reason so many veterans and their families visit us is our reputation and our volunteers. Ask yourself why we have helped veterans and spouses from 41 states and three countries.

I doubt that there is any place else in this United States that people will travel thousands of miles for assistance with their VA claims. I'm very proud of the men and women who volunteer each Tuesday and Thursday morning helping to make a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served in our military.

Some of those who visit us were injured during their military service over 50 or more years ago. They have suffered from physical or emotional disabilities that occurred or were aggravated by their military service and have only recently filed their first claim for VA benefits.

When these men and women visit us for the first time most do not know how the VA claims process works or that they may receive compensation for an injury that occurred so long ago. Our goal is to help every veteran and surviving spouse who visits to receive all the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

For those of you who have been putting off a visit to our organization, please consider this an invitation to do so. We do not charge for our services.

Last week the men and women who work at our Muskogee VA Regional Office must have worked overtime based on the number of rating decision letters we got back. Thirty-nine veterans were approved for disability compensation from 10-90 percent based on their injuries that occurred in the military or were aggravated by their service. These men and women will receive an annual combined compensation of \$585,902 per year. There were 19 veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$770,120.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

Oklahoma Historical Society research guide focuses on researching land in Oklahoma

The Oklahoma Historical Society's (OHS) latest publication, "A Guide to Researching Land in Oklahoma at the Oklahoma Historical Society" by Katie Bush, is now available to purchase in the Research Center at the Oklahoma History Center.

The guide provides information for researching land records and explains Oklahoma history by settlement region through the homestead and allotment processes.

Researchers and genealogists often visit the OHS Research Center seeking information about their ancestors' land. This guide helps readers to understand legal land descriptions and how they relate to present-day locations.

Readers will learn about the homesteading process in Oklahoma Territory, and how to interpret legal land descriptions to find the amount of land a homesteader received and the location of the homestead.

The guide also outlines the rules and regulations for homesteading in Oklahoma and how they differed for tribal allotment recipients.

Historic maps were recreated by Katie Bush for each settlement region. The maps provide a wealth of informa-

tion including present-day county boundaries, township and range, original county boundaries in Oklahoma Territory, district and county lines in Indian Territory, and tribal reservation boundaries.

Researchers also can use the maps of tribal nations to researching records in the Indian Archives Collection at the Oklahoma Historical Society.

"A Guide to Researching Land in Oklahoma at the Oklahoma Historical Society" is available to purchase in the Research Center in the Oklahoma History Center, 800 Nazih Zuhdi Drive, in Oklahoma City.

The Research Center is a division of the Oklahoma Historical Society. The mission of the Oklahoma Historical Society is to collect, preserve and share the history and culture of the state of Oklahoma.

Founded in 1893 by members of the Territorial Press Association, the OHS maintains museums, historic sites and affiliates across the state. Through its research archives, exhibits, educational programs and publications the OHS chronicles the rich history of Oklahoma.

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Last week the Church throughout the world celebrated Divine Mercy Sunday. The choir led us in a prayerful musical version of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Where did this Feast come from?

Sister Faustina Kowalska was a Catholic nun in Poland. As she was growing up in a small Polish village, she sensed the Holy Spirit very near to her. She worked as a housekeeper.

But when she was 19 years old, she heard a voice that told her to go to Warsaw where she would enter a convent. She moved there but was not accepted to the convent, so continued to clean houses as her work. Finally she was received into the convent and joined the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy.

In the year 1930, Sr. Faustina began to receive a series of visions with Our Lord. For eight years she would receive these visions, about which she wrote in her diary. This was a time of great distress in Europe. The First World War had devastated the economies. The stock market had crashed.

People were out of work, homeless and hungry. They would listen to anyone who would promise to relieve their misery. And so there arose dictators, such as Hitler, Stalin

and Mussolini, who made great promises. But these were evil men who made promises that they did not intend to keep.

The visions of Faustina offered an alternative to these men. Our Lord spoke to Faustina through his Sacred Heart. He begged her to trust God and God alone because with God's love, there is abundant mercy. God's mercy is there to relieve us from the misery of our world.

As we read in the book of Jeremiah: "Blessed are those who trust in the Lord; the Lord will be their trust." (Jer 17:7). And in Psalm 118: "It is better to take refuge in the Lord than to trust in princes."

In her life, Faustina was away from home much of the time. So she learned how to trust, not in other people, but in God alone. God was offering to the world, through her visions, an alternative to trust in men.

St. Faustina is a modern saint as her experience of misery is similar to our own. We live in a country which is suspicious of strangers, and does not always welcome the stranger.

We live in a country that is fascinated with guns, and we pay a heavy price for such. We live in a state that does not value education for our young people, and we suffer for this.

We must do our part to change our world - to welcome the stranger, to restore education as a value, and to promote peace and understanding among peoples. But as we do so, we can rely on God's mercy to be the place in which we rest and refresh ourselves. God's mercy is an abundant font of strength, a font of hope.

From the diary of St. Faustina: "Lord, let my eyes be merciful, so that I may never judge someone from their appearance only, but that I may look to find what is beautiful in their soul. Lord, let my ears be merciful, so that I may not be indifferent to the needs of my neighbor. Lord, let my tongue be merciful, so that I may never speak ill of my neighbor. Lord, let my heart be merciful, so that I myself may feel all the sufferings of my neighbor." Amen.

Very good week to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

On Easter Sunday when we gathered for worship here in Lexington, we were blessed to open up to the 20th chapter of John and re-visit that blessed empty tomb. On Tuesday, afterwards, we visited the scene again, that time by pen, as we'll do here.

John prepares us for this great "empty tomb" sermon as he comes to the end of narrating the horrible death of our Lord at Calvary. It has been six hours since the cruel Roman soldiers crucified our Lord up on Calvary's knoll, the final three of which have been the darkest hours the world had ever known - spiritually and even physically, because the sun hides its sparkling light from an earth so dark and cruel as to snuff out

the world's greatest light.

Our Lord's journey has ended, as he declares in the utter resignation "It is finished" (19:30), and his spirit takes its joyful plight from that ugly hill to Hades, where it will rest and wait for three days.

The shouts and screams come to a merciful halt, the dust settles, the few most faithful disciples file away from that splintered, bloodied tree with hearts broken and shattered. And, as the daytime lingers, the soldiers make their tour of mercy to break the legs of the languishing victims. They break the legs of the one thief, he who could not bring himself to believe in the "Word" who is God, and he breaks the legs of the other, he who will soon take his own joyful plight to Hades' garden of rest and peace.

But when the soldier comes to our Lord and finds His spirit has hastened mercifully from his ravaged body, he lays down his hammer, thus fulfilling prophecy that not a bone of our Lord would be broken, a fellow soldier takes a spear and pierces the side of the Lord. John, and only the evangelist John records this great, symbolic truth, records that "forthwith came there out blood and water" (19:34).

As we wait for the arrival of Nicodemus, we pause to consider the great symbolism of these two elements, often seen separately in John's narrative

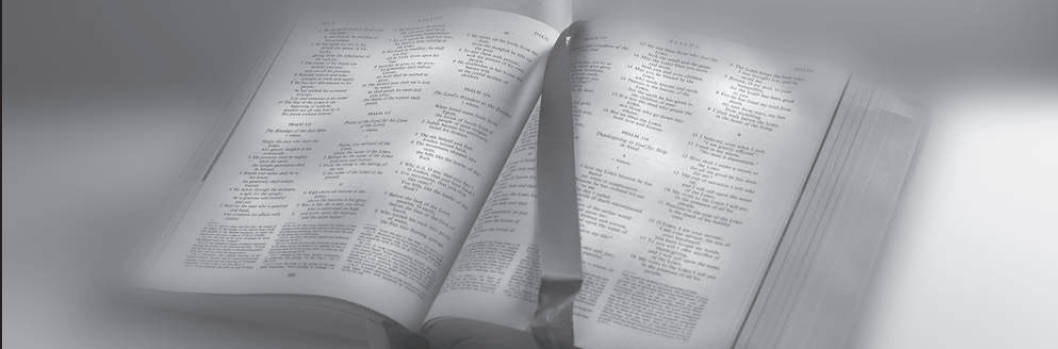
but here brought together.

There is the water and the wine of John 2. We cannot help but wonder if the record of Jesus' turning the water to wine in his first earthly miracle does not picture His taking the purifying element the Jews used for their ceremonies (water) and turning it into a wine that symbolizes the greatest of all purifying elements: the blood of Christ. Consider that thought more deeply, especially in view of the "blood and water" of John 19:34.

We have heard the Lord's discourse concerning the "water and the spirit" in John 3. We have seen the Lord offer "living water" to our great blessed friend we meet at the well in John 4. We have watched as the Lord promises "living water" flowing "out of our bellies" in regard to His promise to give the Holy Spirit in John 7.

Then Jesus sends the blind man of John 9 to "wash" in the pool of Siloam, and soon it will be with water that Jesus cleanses the feet of the disciples in the thirteenth chapter of this blessed gospel.

And, had the other three gospel narrators not included it, we would have read John's unique story of Jesus' taking the cup of blessing, a cup filled with the "fruit of the vine," and heard him say, "This is my blood of

First thing you should know going into this movie is that even though it's animated this really isn't for kids.

Not that there really anything terribly inappropriate for children, I just can't see a movie like this holding a kid's attention.

This couldn't be further in tone from other films featuring talking animals. If you're expecting something like "Beverly Hills Chihuahua" you will be firmly disappointed.

This is a Wes Anderson movie through and through. If you've seen his other films like "Moonrise Kingdom," "The Grand Budapest Hotel," or "Fantastic Mr. Fox" you know exactly what you're getting into.

Wes has a striking visual style, one I personally can't get enough of, but I could see some finding it a bit odd.

There's just something inexplicably charming about his films. From the way they're shot, to their color palette, and even the music. It all makes for a delightfully endearing aesthetic.

This movie also has a fun gimmick where all the humans speak in their native language, but the dogs all speak English. So basically you can understand the dogs, but unless you speak Japanese you have to rely on translators or subtitles to understand what the humans are saying.

It's a neat idea to be sure. Unfortunately Wes takes the quirkiness a bit too far in my opinion.

Oftentimes the movie will show Japanese writing along with English subtitles to translate. The problem is the translated text changes location on the screen almost constantly.

My eyes never knew where to look. By the time I found the words a split second had passed and the text was gone.

I understand Wes was going for a stylistic thing, but this was a bit too much in my opinion. Also, while I did enjoy the

story overall, it feels like it lags a bit in the middle. It never really gets boring, but I didn't find the film quite as engrossing as some of Wes Anderson's other movies.

Here's the bottomline. If you like Wes Anderson, you'll enjoy this film. Simple as that.
