Pay raises

Purcell board OKs salary schedule

Certified personnel working for Purcell Public Schools will get a \$1,220 raise in addition to the district's standard step raises. That raise comes out of action taken earlier this year by the Oklahoma Legislature. The school board approved the raise as well as a new salary schedule for the 2019-20 school year during a meeting Monday.

The raise puts the district's starting salary for a teacher with a bachelor's degree at \$38,453. The starting salary for a teacher with a master's

degree is \$39,867 and someone with a doctorate will start at \$41,281.

The salary schedule includes 30 step raises, capping at \$54,283 for a bachelor's degree, \$56,238 for a master's degree and \$58,703 for a doctorate.

In addition, teachers not enrolled in the district's health insurance plan will receive a monthly \$69.71 payment from the state.

Summer heat with storm potential

This week will end with sunny skies and high temperatures in the low 90's. Under sunny skies though the heat index will be in the upper 90's and low 100's. Make sure to have water at all times and to limit time outside. A slight breeze everyday will make it feel more enjoyable. The beginning of next week is our next chance for storms with thunderstorms developing late in the day on Monday and persisting into Tuesday.

Are we too clean for our own good?

Americans have a need for cleanliness, especially when it comes to our children. But mounting research suggests our quest to be clean might make children sicker, not healthier. Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation immunologist Eliza Chakravarty, M.D., said this groundswell of germophobic parenting and the tendency to create over-sterilized environments may keep children's immune systems from developing adequate defenses.

It's called the 'hygiene hypothesis,' where scientists believe early exposure to allergens actually contributes to a healthier immune system. While it isn't a new theory, it is becoming more widely accepted.

Your immune system is built to protect you, so if it sits idle, it will find something to fight. Even fairly harmless substances like pollen, peanuts or pet dander can look like foreign invaders and result in an immune system overreaction. Autoimmune diseases occur when the immune system attacks your own body's tissues as if it were a pathogen or virus.

to the environment.

Gaffney said more evidence is needed, but increasing research links germ exposure, diverse environments and minor infections at a young age with a lower risk of health problems later in life.

"Exposure to low-level allergens and germs like dog hair, pollen and common pathogens when you're young allows the immune system to fine-tune itself and learn how to function properly," said Gaffney.

"Regular hygiene is still important, but don't fret if your little ones dig in the dirt or wrestle with the dog. They may wind up healthier for it," he concluded.

Kicking in 1972

Tony DiRienzo had to go back to his home country of Brazil to sign paperwork about serving in the armed forces back in the summer of 1972.

That journey to Brazil and back caused Tony to be a day late reporting to OU's fall football camp that year.

Tony had been noticed by OU coaches when he was a Rotary Exchange student kicking soccer style for the Ardmore Tigers.

Back then Tony D, like most college age kids, had long hair.

The long hair and being a day late had the usually grumpy OU kicking coach Jack Baer in an even grouchy mood.

Baer was also OU's equipment manager at the time.

Ironically, Baer had coached both George Kernek and Don Woolly when they played baseball for the Sooners.

Baer's first bark was for Tony to cut his locks, since Jack was a crew cut stickler.

Next he wanted to see if DiRienzo could kick a 20 yard field goal.

So, Tony took the two steps sideways and was about to boot the ball when Baer yelled out.

"Not over in the stands, kick it toward the goal posts."

DiRienzo, now a Purcell resident, easily made the kick and subsequent kicks from 30, 40 and longer went through the uprights.

DiRienzo, who is married to the former Carol Greene of

Purcell, holds the OU program record for the longest field goal in school history.

DiRienzo's program-record 60-yard field goal has now held up for almost 46 years. He achieved the feat Nov. 17, 1973 against Kansas.

It was against Kansas again in 1975 when DiRienzo was the only Sooner to score in a 23-3 upset loss.

Sooners were in the middle of back-to-back National Championships in 1974 and '75.

While DiRienzo was earning All-Conference honors, another soccer style kicker was being recruited.

Uwe von Schamann, who was born in Berlin, West Germany, had transferred to a high school in Fort Worth.

When Uwe made his way to the Sooner squad, Baer said the soccer style kicking was merely a fad.

Baer wasn't the kicking coach much longer after that.

Adventures with Bill

We're discovering Oklahoma one drive at a time

A few years ago I asked a favor of my friend Bill, a native Oklahoman who loves this state and its history, particularly people and places forgotten in the passing of years.

"Show me the history you know and let me see it through your eyes," I told him.

I call our excursions "adventures" and we've explored every corner of Oklahoma except the Panhandle.

It's truly been a journey of discovery and one would think we're both well-versed in Oklahoma facts by now.

So I think it surprised us both a little on Friday when I asked if he knew the meaning of an obvious Native American name of the small burg we were driving through.

He didn't and I wondered aloud how many places in Oklahoma have Native American names and what those names mean.

"Look it up," he said, "and write about it."

So I did and I am. Here's what I found:

Agawam is named for a tribe in Massachusetts. Atoka is the Choctaw word for chief.

Bigheart was an Osage chief and Bluejacket is named for the Rev. Charles Bluejacket, a Shawnee.

Bokchito is Choctaw for big

creek and Bokoshe translates as little creek. Bokhoma is Choctaw for red river.

The town of Bowlegs is named for Billy Bowlegs, a Seminole leader in Florida.

Bushyhead honors Dennis Bushyhead, a principal chief of the Cherokees.

Catoosa is Cherokee for between two hills. Checotah is named for Samuel Checote, the first Creek chief after the Civil War.

Chilocco is Creek for big deer.

Gotebo is named for a Kiowa chief and Konawa is Seminole for string of beads. Lenapah is the name of a Delaware tribe.

Nashoba is Choctaw for wolf and Ochelata was the Cherokee name of principal chief Charles

Thompson.

Olustee is a Seminole word meaning pond while Okmulgee is Creek for boiling waters.

Okemah is named for a Kickapoo chief and Okfuskee is a Muscogee tribe in Alabama.

Pontotoc was an historic Chickasaw tribal area in Mississippi and Quapaw is named for the Quapaw chief of that name.

Sapulpa was a fullblood Creek and the first permanent resident in that area.

Sasakwa is Seminole for wild goose. Talala means red-headed woodpecker in Cherokee.

Talihina is iron road in Choctaw and Tushka is Choctaw for warrior.

Wakita was a Cherokee chief and Wapanucka is Delaware for eastern land people. Wetumka is Muscogee Creek for tumbling water.

The town of Wewoka was named by a black Seminole for Wewokea, Chief Osceola's second wife, who was half Seminole and half black.

I'm sure there are more out there that I missed with this list. I look forward to discovering them on future adventures with Bill.

June was Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month, which marks an important time to talk about the widespread challenges facing our society due to Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia.

Indeed, these mysterious diseases have impacted all of us, whether we have had a family member or a friend suffer and tragically pass away as a result. My family understands firsthand how exceedingly difficult it is to watch someone you love helplessly deteriorate because of dementia.

It was heartbreaking to see my own father suffer and

worsen through the various stages of Alzheimer's during the last several years of his life.

While Alzheimer's disease is all too familiar and personal for many American families, there is still a lot we don't know about its cause or why it rapidly progresses.

According to the Alzheimer's Association, Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death in America and the fifth among seniors.

Alzheimer's is also credited as the most expensive disease in the United States, straining both public and private dollars. In fact, Alzheimer's and other dementias are estimated to cost the nation approximately \$290

billion this year alone.

Along the current trajectory, the cost of Alzheimer's and other dementias is projected to eclipse \$1 trillion by 2050. But that estimate doesn't account for the human cost, including decline in the health of family members who often serve as caretakers and take on the immense physical and emotional burden that comes with that job.

With the "baby boomers" generation getting older, it is imperative that we find a way to slow down Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia before more seniors fall victim. Ulti-

Let's Talk About Life

All of society respects the man who cares for the homeless because as a culture we believe no life should be just thrown away. Everyone grieves, prays and works to help those struggling with addiction because we care about human dignity.

We all admire the woman who feeds a hungry child or serves as a reading mentor because we universally acknowledge that every person deserves a chance.

Why not also celebrate and recognize the potential in every child's life, no matter how small?

The recent national conversation around life has largely ignored the central question: is a child really a child? The 1973 Roe v. Wade decision did not resolve the question of when life begins. It focused instead on legal questions around the viability of the child, the moment he or she could survive outside the womb.

Modern medicine has dramatically advanced so that babies as early as 20 weeks gestation are viable outside the womb. In fact, at the earliest moment of conception, each baby has unique DNA, determining hair color, eye color, height, sex and their unique smile.

In a few short weeks, that "tissue" in the womb feels pain, has 10 fingers, 10 toes, a beating heart, and he or she can hear our voices.

On an airplane headed home recently, I spent the flight listening to the distinct high-pitched sound of a newborn loudly not enjoying the trip. Every person on the plane would be appalled if that child was violently shaken because of her crying.

But just a few weeks ago, that same child could have been destroyed in the womb, and no one would notice. In fact, some in our society would call her death just a choice.

For some reason we define one child as valuable and the other one as inconvenient or disposable based solely on preference. The only difference between the two children is time.

We know these are painful conversations about heart issues, requiring us to be respectful of one another. Our hearts break for women in our nation who make the difficult decision to have an abortion.

We don't believe any mom flippantly makes a decision to abort a child or ever forgets the procedure. Mothers, fathers and children are created in the image of God, have value, and deserve to be treated with dignity, kindness and respect. In the painful dialogue there

is often a selfish man refusing to take responsibility and a woman facing an uncertain future alone. But at the center of this argument, there is also a child listening to hear his or her fate.

Forty years ago, our nation found a few minimum areas of middle ground on this divisive issue by creating the Hyde Amendment and by prohibiting late-term abortions.

The Hyde Amendment determined that federal tax dollars should not be used to fund abortions, an agreement that has been renewed every year since 1976.

Most states, just like most countries in the world, also do not allow late-term abortions of fully viable children. But lately, the demands of the pro-abortion lobby have changed. Taxpayer-funded abortion is the new demand for abortion advocates.

It's not enough to just support the right to abort a child, to prove your real pro-choice credentials you should demand that those who oppose abortion must be forced to pay for it.

The other pro-choice litmus test is the right to abort a child all the way to their natural birthday, demonstrated in laws debated or passed in New York, Virginia and Illinois.

Just a few years ago, we could look at the ultrasound monitor together and all acknowledge that we saw a late-term baby sucking his or her thumb in the womb, but now even that common ground is ignored.

There was a time in our history when we considered some people only "three-fifths of a man." There was a time when women were not allowed to vote. There was a time when we locked up Japanese Americans in prison camps. There was a time when we sold human beings in the market as property.

But decades later, we are appalled that we were so blind to the obvious truth: human beings are not less than equal because of their color, sex or background.

They are valuable because they are human lives, no matter how small, weak or poor. People, especially children, are not property.

Civil rights activists and those in the women's suffrage movement bravely took to the streets decades ago to speak out for those who had no voice or rights.

Just like the counter-culture youth, women and men who have marched for decades for life, they see the value of each child and the need to give them a voice in a society that does not want them seen or heard, ever.

Ransomware:

Can put healthcare providers, patients in critical condition

A healthcare organization can find itself in critical condition if attacked by ransomware — a type of malware that prevents or limits users from accessing their files unless a ransom is paid.

Verizon's 2018 Data Breach Investigations Report discovered that ransomware accounts for 85 percent of all malware targeting the healthcare industry. Ransomware attacks have been numerous in hospitals and other health facilities recently, and the consequences can be dire for providers and patients, who are denied access to their files and cannot receive the care they need.

"Many healthcare offices are not prepared to combat cyber attacks," says Alex Zlatin, CEO of Maxim Software Systems and author of Responsible Dental Ownership (alexzlatin.com). "It can be a life-or-death situation if they can't access data. So, they are more likely to pay up."

"Healthcare organizations are prime targets because of all the patients' personal information they have to offer cyber criminals. It's imperative they get up to speed on how to prevent such a nightmare scenario and know how to deal with a ransomware attack quickly."

Zlatin offers ways for healthcare organizations to prevent or reduce the risks of ransomware attacks, and how they should respond if infected:

If attacked by ransomware Isolate the infected computer immediately. "Infected systems should be removed from the network as soon as possible to prevent ransomware from

attacking network or shared drives," Zlatin says.

Isolate or power-off affected devices. Those devices that have not been completely corrupted should shut down or be isolated. Zlatin says this can provide time to recover data and contain the damage.

Secure backup data or systems by taking them offline. "You'll want to ensure backups are free of malware before using them to restore inaccessible data," Zlatin says.

Change online account passwords and network passwords. "After removing the system from the network, do this, and change all system passwords once the malware is removed," Zlatin says.

To prevent attacks and mitigate risks

Train employees on cyber hygiene. "This is a healthcare organization's best defense against ransomware," Zlatin says. "Cyber hygiene is not putting yourself in a situation where you're surrounded by malicious links — like surfing the internet for personal reasons, opening emails from unfamiliar sources, going on Facebook or checking your Twitter feed from a workstation."

Keep all systems secure. To remain compliant with HIPAA regulations in the U.S. and Canadian ones like PIPEDA, PHIPA and Alberta's IHA, all systems that contain protected health information are required to stay up to date. "To protect against a ransomware threat, a similar approach must be taken so that all systems are secured against any potential vulner-

abilities," Zlatin says.

Monitor network traffic and file access. "Data breaches can be discovered by monitoring for unusual behavior within the systems," Zlatin says. "Detecting outbound connections can pinpoint the location of an infection."

Back up all data. "If some or all of a system's files get encrypted, restoring the files from a backup is the only recovery option," Zlatin says. "Making sure that the backup restores properly is as important as having a backup from the get-go."

Adopt additional protection. "Ransomware sometimes goes undetected by many antivirus tools," Zlatin says, "and IT departments must apply safeguards to block suspicious emails and deploy additional filters that block potential harmful sites," Zlatin says.

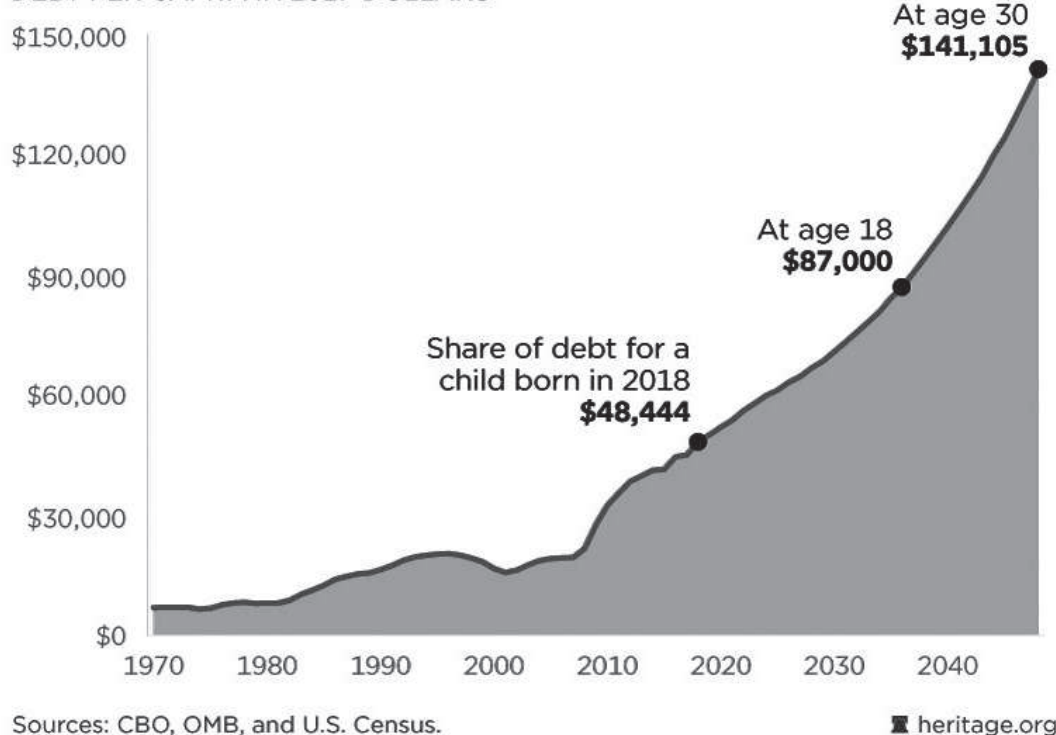
"Providers can't just hope an attack doesn't happen to them," Zlatin says. "They must do everything they can to prevent it."

To Congress: No budget, no pay

Many lawmakers seem to think they deserve a pay raise.

When House Democrats and Republicans began negotiating a congressional pay increase earlier this month, Democrats seemed to support it, as did some ranking GOP members. Critics then voiced open opposition, and House leaders swiftly pulled the bill, though House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer, D-Md., maintains the raises will eventually pass.

The debate has subsided for the moment, but it raises the question: What have members of Congress done to even remotely deserve a raise?

The Democrat-controlled House Budget Committee, for its part, has failed to release a budget plan this year. The Senate Budget Committee fell short as well, proposing a budget that would cover just five years and that has little chance of receiving a vote.

Passing budgets is Congress' most basic job, yet for years the process has broken down, resulting in semi-annual omnibus bills and continuing resolutions that spend far too much.

Until Congress starts consistently doing its job—namely, following the annual budget process by passing a budget and then pursuing reconciliation legislation—it shouldn't even consider raising lawmakers' pay.

What can be done to help this happen?

The first step is to create robust enforcement measures that give Congress a strong incentive to follow its own budget process laid out by law.

One such measure already exists. Recently, Sens. Mike Braun, R-Ind., and Rick Scott, R-Fla., introduced the No Budget, No Pay Act, which would withhold congressional pay if lawmakers fail to pass a budget by the Oct. 1 deadline, which marks the beginning of the next fiscal year.

That bill was attached to the

Government Shutdown Accountability Act, which passed out of committee on June 19, bringing it one step closer to becoming law.

Braun called the move a "big step toward pulling Washington out of la-la land," and Scott added that the act would hold members of Congress to the same standards as American families, ensuring that lawmakers only get paid if they do their jobs. Scott was optimistic about getting Democratic support for the bill, noting that "accountability shouldn't be controversial."

Another accountability measure was introduced by Sen. Joni Ernst, R-Iowa. Her bill would prohibit Congress from going into recess until a budget is passed.

Under her proposal, if a budget isn't passed on time, members of Congress would be barred from leaving Washington and Congress would not be able to adjourn for more than eight hours.

These are healthy steps toward holding Congress accountable to do its most basic job. They are measures The Heritage Foundation has called for in the "Blueprint for Balance," which includes additional measures to compel

Congress to follow the budget process.

Although politicians are wont to forget it, the budgeting process isn't just a hobby horse for fiscal hawks. Article I of the Constitution squarely gives Congress the obligation to regularly lay out the "Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money."

Congress has proved more than willing to rack up trillions in new debt, but it lacks even the faintest motivation to account for its reckless and decadent spending habits.

So long as that's the case, Americans should question not only whether lawmakers deserve a pay raise, but whether they should be paid at all, let alone remain in office.

After all, American workers can't expect to keep their jobs and get paid if they consistently fail at their main task.

Politicians should not be held to a lower standard than the people they represent.

Active and vigilant measures like the "no budget no pay" rule would take a significant step toward forcing members of Congress to do their jobs and to govern with discipline.

No budget for America? No pay for you.

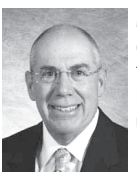

This movie does address those questions. But at the end of the day, much like "Spider-Man: Homecoming, this is still a film about a high school kid dealing with some decidedly high school problems.

Because of that, this movie can't help but feel microscopic in the shadow of Endgame.

I don't mind that though. Despite being in the same franchise, many of the movies in the MCU have found ways to incorporate various genres in their films. From high fantasy to heist comedy, this series has it all. So why not a couple smaller scale coming of age dramas?

You just have to make sure to adjust your expectations before going into this film is all.

On the whole, I liked the story for this movie pretty well.

It started a little slow, and I have to admit the high school level drama did begin to wear on me at points, but it was never too overbearing, thankfully.

Regardless, by the second half of the movie I was all in. I really enjoyed where the narrative ended up. In fact at this point, I'd say I'm more excited for the next Spider-Man movie than I was for this movie. I don't want to spoil anything, but the ramifications for Peter's character are absolutely massive.

Acting wise, the entire cast is great here. Which is basically par for the course as far as MCU movies go.

Tom Holland continues to be fantastic as our web slinging hero. At this point he's probably my favorite live action version of the character. He really was perfectly cast for the role.

I also really like Zendaya as MJ. She's incredibly forward and brutally honest, but also really awkward in an endearing kind of way. I liked her in Homecoming, and I liked her even more here.

Naturally, Samuel L. Jackson can't help but steal the show as Nick Fury, but the real scene stealer here, not to mention the best performance in the entire movie by far, goes to Jake Gyllenhaal as Quentin Beck.

If you've seen 2014's "Nightcrawler," you have an idea of the intensity that Gyllenhaal can bring to a role, and you definitely see glimpses of that here.

His performances, not to mention his character's abilities, were absolutely mesmerizing. After 23 movies, you might think the MCU would be running out of surprises, but the introduction of Quentin Beck proves Marvel still has more fascinating characters to bring to life.

I don't think there's too much more to say.

I guess if I had a minor nit-pick, it'd be that I felt the writing was a little weaker than the MCU usually is. I didn't care for a few moments of dialogue, and a couple of plot points felt a bit too contrived, but it was never anything so terrible that it ruined the movie.

At this point, if you're already invested in the Marvel Cinematic Universe, checking this one out too is a no brainer. You'll especially like it if you enjoyed "Spider-Man: Homecoming," since both movies share a similar tone.

Those expecting another epic galaxy sized slugfest like Infinity War and Endgame might leave a little disappointed, but most viewers seeking it out should leave satisfied.

"Spider-Man: Far From Home" is rated PG-13.

The other movie this week is "Midsommar."

Dani (Florence Pugh) and Christian (Jack Reynor) are a young American couple with a relationship on the brink of falling apart. But after a family tragedy keeps them together, a grieving Dani invites herself to join Christian and his friends on a trip to a once-in-a-lifetime midsummer festival in a remote Swedish village.

But what begins as a care-free summer holiday in a land of eternal sunlight takes a sinister turn when the villagers invite their guests to partake in festivities that render the pastoral paradise increasingly unnerving.

Man oh man, where do I even begin with this movie?

I think it's fair to say I've seen a decent amount of horror movies in my time. Some are scary, most are at least a little unnerving, and a few are even nauseating at times.

But the filmmaker behind this movie, Ari Aster, truly has a knack for the grotesque.

If you watched his previous film, "Hereditary," then you know what I'm talking about.

Those looking for the typical scares of other horror movies should avoid Aster's work at all costs.

In fact, looking back, I don't think "Midsommar" had a single moment I'd call frightening.

But what it lacks in scares, it more than makes up for by being ridiculously disturbing.

The creativity behind the disgustingness in this film is a sight to behold. To say it's shocking doesn't nearly do it justice.

There are moments that are guaranteed to make you slack jawed and stunned. One of which was right at the beginning.

And though there is a staggering amount of visceral gore in this film, some of the moments I found the most disturbing just involved this commune and their guests sitting around the dinner table.

Then of course there's the nudity. It's really only during one sex scene, but there's a lot of it. So much so the filmmaker had to battle with the M.P.A.A. (Motion Picture Association of America) just to avoid an NC-17 rating.

That scene was likely the strangest sex scene I've ever seen in my entire movie

watching career. I imagine that's exactly what the filmmaker was going for, so kudos to him I guess.

You might have noticed I haven't said if I liked or disliked this movie so far, and it's because I'm not really sure if I did or not.

Is it a well made movie? Well to that I'd say yes.

I loved how the film was shot. Lots of wide shots from far away, some clever framing with mirrors, and some unnerving psychedelic moments.

I also like that this is one of the few horror movies I've seen where nearly every scene is brightly lit and clearly visible. That alone makes this film fairly unique.

Honestly, I think the weakest part here is the story itself.

Maybe I just wasn't smart enough to piece it all together, but after a really compelling setup with Dani and Christian and their crumbling relationship at the beginning of the movie, it didn't really feel like the narrative did anything interesting with their characters, beyond throwing them in disturbing situations.

If you're just looking for shock value alone, the events of this movie are indeed shocking in many ways, yet it somehow felt noticeably less surprising than Aster's last movie, "Hereditary."

Yes, what transpires here is deeply disturbing, but certain moments here definitely felt a bit more telegraphed.

I guess that's a negative since part of why I enjoyed "Hereditary" as much as I did was because around every turn I felt like I was being blindsided. In that movie I had zero idea what would happen next. But here, I always at least had a vague idea of what was coming.

Regardless of how I felt though, the real question here is would I actually recommend this movie?

And to that I'd probably say no to most people. Even to a large portion of horror fans.

This is a slow burn, long movie, with absolutely none of the scares you typically see in horror films. At the same time, this is by far the most disturbing movie I've seen all year, and sure to be one of the most gruesome films of 2019.

If that sounds like a good time to you, then by all means, you'll probably like this movie just fine. Those looking for something a bit more conventional should probably avoid and watch "Annabelle Comes Home" instead.

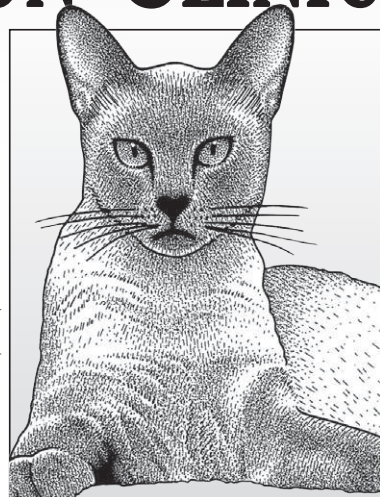

The board also approved basing the 2019-20 school calendar on 1,080 hours of instruction instead of a set number of days.

Superintendent Dr. Sheli McAdoo said the hourly option gives the district more flexibility.

Monday was McAdoo's fifth day on the job and she thanked the board for her appointment.

Tyler Graves, construction manager with Goldsby Construction, reported good progress on all of the bond projects.

The new field house will be completed by today (Thursday) and coaches can begin moving into their offices.

Student athletes who have toured the new facility are "in awe," Graves added.

Dirt work was completed on the playing field in June.

"The field is in better shape than it has been in many years," Graves said, adding that turf installation will begin in the next two to three weeks.

Graves told the board that Purcell is a "trendsetter" because of the energy optimization elements to the new junior high school and other campuses.

Representatives from other districts want to tour Purcell's schools to see the energy saving features for themselves.

Work on the junior high school continues to progress with the bulk of labor inside the building. Windows are scheduled to be installed within the next two weeks.

"The last month has been the most progressive of the past six months," he said.

In other business, the board approved several new hires. Those include Carol Testa, assistant high school principal/athletic director; Erica Keen, high school teacher; Frances Maynor, part-time choir teacher; Bryson Tuttle, junior high band director/high school band assistant director, and Amy Wells-Norman, intermediate counselor.

"I think Purcell needs a Play Street because it encourages kids to be active this summer," Johnson continued. "They can go outside and get some exercise and have fun before

the heat kicks in. The Purcell Elementary School has the meals and it's right next to the library."

Water:

Bunn said Tuesday the strike knocked out a section of the city's well field, taking out electrical service to the wells and causing problems with the pumps.

Also knocked out was the electronic monitoring for the entire well field.

Now the city has brought in technical experts to identify why manual overrides on the monitoring system aren't working.

The city's engineer, Kinney Sullivan, is also working to find a solution to bring everything back online.

Bunn said the city was able to manage for a time, but low water pressure in some areas became problematic in the past week.

"There was a lot of demand

over the holiday," Bunn said.

The city's water towers are normally kept at full capacity which maintains good water pressure across the city's 100-square-mile distribution area.

Hardest hit are areas to the west of Purcell toward Criner. Those customers are literally at the end of the city's water line.

Water towers are now "probably about half full," he added.

The city has stopped irrigating and has turned off the water at the splash pad on Red Hill.

While Bunn is hopeful the city can fix the problem without resorting to mandatory water rationing, he also said that "any voluntary water restriction" by the public will be appreciated.

Holladay:

pulling a small single-axle trailer. A second vehicle driven by Thomas Hoskins, 42, followed as part of a two-vehicle convoy.

The trailer lights were inoperable and the truck was known to have electrical issues affecting the rear lights, the OHP reported.

The truck and trailer were northbound and traveling an estimated 40 mph when it was struck from behind by a semi tractor-trailer driven by Daniel Moghrabi, 55.

The impact caused the Ford truck and trailer to roll. The semi caught fire, killing Moghrabi.

Holladay and her passenger, Stuart Abdo, 56, were able to get out of the Ford truck and were picked up by Hoskins.

Bypassing the Goldsby exit, Hoskins drove to the Love's on State Highway 9 west.

Loves employees reported the three sat in the parking lot for 14 minutes before entering

the store.

Abdo told a store employee he and his wife were arguing when she reached over and yanked the wheel, causing them to hit another trucker.

According to an affidavit, Holladay and Abdo were taken to Norman Regional Hospital by ambulance.

A blood sample taken from Holladay showed the presence of methamphetamine, amphetamine and lidocaine.

Abdo refused to give a blood sample, saying he had marijuana in his system, according to the affidavit.

In October 2018, Shirley Stanford, personal representative of Moghrabi's estate, sued Holladay and her employer, B&K Telecommunications and Construction LLC, in McClain County District Court.

That lawsuit was moved Nov. 9, 2018, to U.S. District Court for the Western District of Oklahoma.

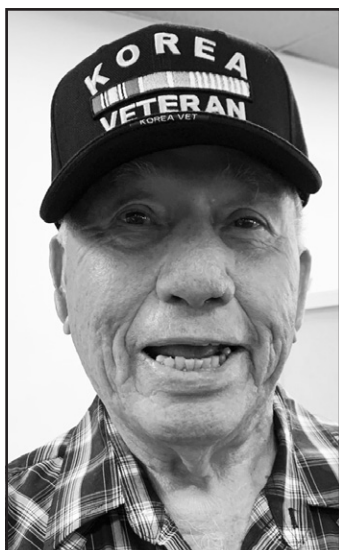

Freedom to follow a higher law

Last week we celebrated the Fourth of July, the day in which we declared our independence from the King of England and all his successors (and also bland English food and a funny accent. Ha!) Freedom is, at the same time, both generous and dangerous.

If I am declaring freedom for me I am also giving you the same freedom. This can simply be a matter of preference – If I choose to be a Catholic Christian, I must allow you to choose to be a Protestant, or someone else can choose to be a Jew or a Muslim or a nonbeliever.

But freedom is also a dangerous thing. It can be frightening, because some will choose to do the wrong thing. Some parents will choose not to vaccinate their child, and because of this, other children will be in danger

from disease. If we are free to do so, then some will choose to abort an unborn child within the womb. If we are all free to own a dangerous weapon, then some will choose to harm others by using such.

And yet we still value freedom. Because with freedom to choose what is bad also means freedom to choose what is good. Our freedom before God is our freedom to choose “what is true and good and beautiful” (Phil. 4:8). As Christians, we know that we follow a different law - we follow the law of love.

Just because an action is legal, doesn’t mean that it is moral and life-giving. The law of love answers to a higher power. As St. Thomas Aquinas wrote: “We are free when we do what we should – refrain from evil – simply because it is evil,

not because it is against a law.”

This law of love is above the laws of any government. And when we choose this moral law – the law of love – then we will not have much company. We will be alone with the few, the few who find the road that leads to life.

Yes, young man, you can!

Good week to all! Welcome to the “front porch”!

Several thousand years ago, the psalmist poses a question that is as relevant as the morning news: “How can a young man keep his way pure?” he asks.

Then, immediately, he supplies the answer: “By guarding it according to your word” (Psalm 119:9, ESV).

Note what it is that David says a young man – or young lady, too – must keep pure: It is his “way.” He must keep his way pure. Browse through the 119th psalm, and you will see that David refers to one’s way repeatedly. We are to “walk in his ways” (v. 3), “cleanse” our way (v. 9), “rejoice” in the way of the Lord’s testimonies (v. 14), seek the “way of truth” (v. 30), and think on his own “ways” (v. 59) – and many other references.

It is clear that the way a man chooses is key to his success – really, it’s key to his survival! Some will go the right way, others the wrong -- some find their way, others lose it.

For a young man looking far into the future, the way that lies before him is a wide expanse with endless possibilities.

What he can be and will be is a mystery as deep as the ocean, to be sure.

If we can take ourselves back to the age of 18 and remember what it was like looking at life from that vantage point, we might better understand what runs through a young man’s mind. David does just that, climbing into the young man’s mind in Psalm 119:9 and asking that most valuable question. However, that question, likely, is not the one on the young man’s mind. He’s thinking more along these lines: “How can I make my way?” That is: What is it that I can do to make it big?

Even if a young man could bring himself to ponder the Spirit’s question for a bit, his conclusion might be that there are far too many unresolved matters at the moment to put a great deal of energy into searching for the answer. As far as keeping his way pure, he’ll just have to fly by the seat of his pants.

Then there’s another problem: What exactly does it mean to make his way pure? Does that apply just to his outward actions? If the young man can keep himself relatively pure outwardly, will he have accomplished the goal?

A minute’s thought on that alerts us that there is more to purity of life than outward behavior. Purity – at least, the way the Holy Spirit lays it out throughout Inspiration – is first inward and then outward. “Blessed are the pure in heart,” says the Lord in his sixth beatitude, “for they shall see God (Matthew 5:6).

So, purity is going to have to start far below the surface, originating down in the vibrant, unpredictable chambers of a young man’s heart.

To add to the difficulty of a young man’s finding the answer, he’ll face many threats

as he sets out on his way. The world is never done making offers that he thinks you cannot refuse. He has a deal waiting for you on every corner.

In view of all these difficulties, we almost want to ask the question in exclamation form: How in the world is a young man going to keep his way pure! Still, the exclamation aside, don’t fret, young man, because there is hope, and there are answers. In fact, the psalmist gives us a very simple one right on the heels of his 3000-year-old question: He says, simply, “Take heed.”

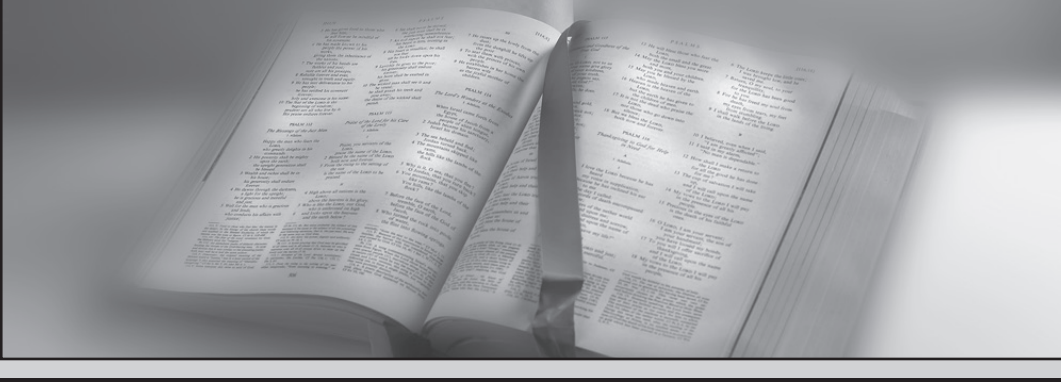
“That’s the way the KJV puts it. He can keep his way pure “by taking heed according to thy word.” Other translations say “guard,” and that may nail it down even better.

Friend, you will need a guard on the frontier. You will need one posted on the highest tower looking all around, and you need his eyes fastened down by your feet where you are making your way. That “guard” might encompass many helps for you along your journey. The psalmist, I am glad, follows up two verses later with one important one, telling the Lord what he will do to guard his way: “I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you.”

There, young friend, is your guard on the frontier. It is God’s Word. Note that’s God’s Word consists of more than written words on a page, but His Word includes all of His promises, hopes, providences, expectations, and rewards. Keep all of those close to you, but not just close. Keep them hidden away down deep in your heart, like a treasure you guard with your very life.

So, with that, young man and young lady, God’s blessings on you as you make your way.

Last week we talked a little about being an American without regard as to what religion we choose to follow. This week let's talk about being a true follower of Jesus Christ. There are many contexts that we can look at, but a good place to start is our political climate.

I don't know when our society changed, but when I was first able to vote, you went to the polls and chose the candidate you wanted to support. After the election, no matter whom you voted for, the winner was the one who had been chosen for the job.

That person may not have been your choice, but the election was over and done. Now it was time to get the work of governing started, which requires elected officials to work together regardless of their party affiliation, ethnic background, race, sexual orientation, or religion. It was time to look past those differences and get to work!

At some point in the last 30 years or so, this idea fell apart. Suddenly, people didn't seem to let go of the fact their candidate lost. They hung on to the attitude of "well, I didn't vote for him/her—they're not my (fill in the blank: president, governor, mayor, dog catcher, etc.)" This attitude has been lasting for the length of time that the

official is in office and has been holding over through the next election, and the one after that, and the one after that...you get the picture.

There have been many times since I registered to vote that I "lost" my vote. No, I really didn't "lose" my vote. It was just that the person I voted for didn't get elected. I still had exercised my right to vote for the person I preferred.

But being a good citizen meant that now I had to let the moment pass and support who was now in office. I didn't have to always agree with them, but as my representative, I could let them know my viewpoint. However, this would be done with thought and in a respectful manner.

But what are we seeing now? We have a lot of hate-filled name-calling, casting aspersions on opponents' mental abilities or their opinions, refusing to look beyond their differences, not being willing to see that there might be a way to come up with a common solution. I understand that compromise is sometimes a distasteful idea.

Compromise may mean that neither side is really happy about the decision, but the end result is hopefully something that both sides can "live with", especially if it is for the good of the whole American society, not just one particular group. says by Robert Fulghum called "All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten." Here are some of the things that we need to know: "Share everything. Play fair. Don't hit people. Don't take things that aren't yours. Wash your hands before you eat. Flush."

What does all this have to do with following Jesus? Remember he boiled down the Ten Commandments and all the regulations of the Old Testament into two rules only: Love God with all your heart, mind, and soul; and Love others as you love yourself. We Christians claim to know this, and we still can't get it right. If we don't show love for others, even our enemies or those that we disagree with, how can we claim to be Christian? Shouldn't we "walk the walk" if we're going to "talk the talk"?

Former Purcell Horsewoman Robin Merrill Appointed as AQHA Foundation Trustee

Robin Merrill, former Purcell horsewoman, has joined the American Quarter Horse Foundation Board of Trustees as the first appointed Trustee.

The American Quarter Horse Foundation consists of the AQHA Executive Committee as elected trustees, plus

a trustee appointed by the elected trustees. The Board of Trustees convenes quarterly to oversee Foundation business.

Earlier this year, Robin, of Poolville, Texas, and formerly of Purcell, also was elevated to AQHA honorary vice-president. She has also served on the Foundation Council and was the council's chairwoman from 2001 to 2004.

Robin and her husband,

AQHA Past President Frank Merrill, have been involved in AQHA and the American Quarter Horse industry for many years and have been major supporters of the Foundation and its initiatives.

The Merrills received the AQHA's 50-Year Breeder Award in 2018 and Frank was inducted into the OQHA Hall of Fame in 2013, and into the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 2012. Frank was President of the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association early in his career, in 1986.

In 1972, the Merrills founded Windward Stud in Purcell. Together they owned and operated the farm for 34 years. After a very successful stint in breeding during which the Merrills produced many well-known horses, they sold the operation to Cowan Select Horses. They stayed to manage Cowan Select Horses LLC at

Windward Stud from 2006 until 2012.

The Merrills also manage M5 Performance Bloodstock, which has produced Hall of Fame horses Miss Jim 45 and Royal Santana, as well as AQHA Superhorse Roo Star.

Both of the Merrills have multiple AQHA World Championships, most of them with cutting horses, their specialty, and had an All American Futurity second place win with Holme Maid.

Robin Merrill was also involved with the New Jersey Quarter Horse Association, Florida Quarter Horse Association, Oklahoma Horseman's Association, the Heart of Oklahoma Horseman's Association, Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association and is a member of the National Cutting

Oklahoma History Center to open photography exhibit

The Oklahoma History Center will open its newest exhibit, "Wanted: Dead or Alive" Monday, July 22.

This photography exhibit is comprised of images of some of Oklahoma's most infamous criminals and will be displayed in the Vose Atrium Gallery during the History Center's regular hours of operation, Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., until Feb. 29, 2020.

Images utilized in the exhibit have been drawn from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the University of Oklahoma Western History Collections, the National Archives, the vast photographic archives of the Oklahoma Historical Society and private lenders.

The 38 black-and-white images on display consist of mugshots, crime scene locations and group shots with

criminals and law enforcement officers. They span more than 70 years, starting before statehood in 1907 and reaching into the late 1950s.

While there may be a few familiar names, such as the Doolin and Dalton Gangs and Ma Barker, the exhibit showcases stories that might not be

I hope that everyone understands that we recognize our Independence as we celebrate each July 4th. Independence Day allows us to say thank you to the men and women who have served and those who are serving today in the American military. Without their sacrifices, we would not be living in a society where we can choose how we want to live our lives. America symbolizes freedom across the world.

We were closed on Thursday, July 4, for our volunteers to celebrate with their families and friends. We were still able to assist 185 veterans and surviving spouses Tuesday morning. Needless to say, that was a very long day for both our visitors and volunteers. We are going to incorporate a few changes in the number of people who we accept each Tuesday and Thursday morning.

Hopefully, we will be able to let everyone know when we have reached our maximum for the day. We are also looking at ways to decrease the wait time that some veterans have on their visit to our Veterans Foundation. Lots of things are being discussed that will improve our service to you. As everyone knows, we are volunteers who want to change veterans and their family's lives for the better. There is no charge for the services we provide to all veterans and surviving spouses of veterans.

As a 501(C)(3) non-profit the monies we use to assist other veterans, and their families come from local grants and donations we receive from the people we have helped. On any given month, we spend over \$25,000 in direct support to the men and women who have served in our military. I realized many years ago that some of the men and women who served in our country's military returned with severe medical problems that were physical or mental in nature. Some of them will be held back in their ability to provide for their families because of the disabilities that their military service caused them.

All of us at our foundation

believes that we can make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. As proof of what we do try driving through our parking lot any Tuesday and Thursday morning where there will be tags from all over the United States.

We believe our system of filing evidenced-based claims for veterans is the best way to help them to receive approval for a VA disability or an increase of an existing service-connected disability. If only all the other veterans' organizations used the same approach as we do, people would not need to travel thousands of miles for the type of help that we provide every day to veterans.

Did you know that a surviving spouse of a disabled veteran might qualify for DIC benefits if the veterans service-connected disability is listed on their Death Certificate as the primary or contributing factor in their cause of death? We have been able to assist surviving spouses in receiving over \$200,000 when the veteran died from a presumptive disease that was part of the Agent Orange Nehmer Ruling.

My suggestion to both veterans and surviving spouses is to visit us with your questions about possible VA benefits. We have several volunteers who specialize in VA benefits for surviving spouses of veterans. One of those is Shirley Fisher, who is the surviving spouse of a Vietnam veteran. Shirley has been with us for many years where her expertise has helped many surviving spouses receive the VA benefits they are eligible for.

Some of them would be eligible for VA Pension benefits if their veteran served just one day during a war-time period.

We continue to see an increased number of decisions the VA has made on the veterans and surviving spouses who are represented. Twenty-nine veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,127,429 per year.

We also received rating decisions on 61 veterans who were awarded disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected

disabilities. This group of men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$809,421. One surviving spouse was awarded benefits based on their spouse's military service and will receive \$15,828 annually.

Our organization is a 501(C)(3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles, or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

frogs, peccaries, raccoons and many birds. They hiked to La Fortuna Waterfall for a swim in the natural pools. Then off to the community of La Fortuna to eat local cuisine and shop for local handmade crafts.

Next was a visit to La Fortuna's local school where they toured the school, interacted with the students and presented them with much needed school supplies and futbols. Then it was off to a Pineapple Plantation. During the tour, they learned the process of growing them and how to pick a perfect pineapple. They were able to sample fresh pineapple and ended it with a fresh pineapple drink.

Afterwards, they trekked through the forest to see spectacular waterfalls. At Pure Trek Canyoning, they harnessed up and rappelled down five waterfalls into the beautiful and pristine canyons that lay below. This high intensity activity helped them to conquer their fears of height and adventure.

They hiked right into the Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve to explore the range of ecosystems and unique biodiversity found there. The cloud forest has more biodiversity than the Amazon Rain

Forest. They were able to see a quetzal, howler monkeys, snakes, three wattled bell birds and a black faced solitaire as well as orchids, bromeliads and strangler figs.

After a hike up to over 5000', they stood on the Continental Divide. The Pacific side was windy and the Caribbean side was calm. They learned about the world of hummingbirds at the Hummingbird Gallery. There they saw over 30 different species.

In Monteverde, they visited El Trapiche Coffee, Cacao, and Sugar Cane Plantation. It was a hands on tour where they learned how to make coffee, chocolate, sugar cane candy and molasses and was able to sample it all. They were also shown how they make moonshine from the sugarcane. They saw two sloths above them at the plantation and ended the tour with a cart ride pulled by two 2,000 pound oxen.

They headed to Jaco Beach and did a half day outrigger canoe expedition. They glided past spectacular cliffs filled with frigate birds and pelicans and interesting landmarks. They spent the rest of the day snorkeling, beachcombing, enjoying beach time and

eating fresh pineapple and watermelon.

Then they hiked into a wooded area to climb up inside a hollowed out Ficus Tree. At the top waiting on them were two Howler Monkeys. While traveling from the Cloud Forest to the Pacific Coast, they experienced many road blocks and stalled traffic due to truckers on strike against the country's 13 percent tax increase.

With the help of our tour guide, he was always getting us through with alternate routes and even persuaded truckers to move for our motor coach so the students could get to their next destination. They ended their program with Salsa Dancing lessons and a pizza and pinata party.

The students grew tremendously over the eight-day hands on, adrenaline packed educational program as well as made new friends that will last a lifetime.

Keeping snakes away from your home and yard

With the record-breaking rainfall this spring, it is not surprising some wildlife has been displaced from their regular habitat. While an errant rabbit passing through your yard may not be a big deal, some people are seeing an increase in snakes in their yard and around their house.

Unless you intentionally have a pet snake in a terrarium in your home, it is likely you do not want these slithering creatures calling your property home, said Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist.

“For a lot of people, the thought of a snake in their yard or inside their home can be quite unsettling,” Peek said. “Fortunately, snakes, as with most other creatures, don’t want anything to do with the human population. They’re likely invading your space because they’re looking for food and shelter.”

Most snakes found in North America are harmless. Although you may not want them on or around your property, the best approach is to remain calm and use nonharmful tactics.

Because snakes might be on

the prowl for food, it is important to keep your yard free of snake snacks. Rodents, such as mice, are a mainstay in a snake’s diet, so it is helpful to minimize the mice population in and around your home.

Store pet food in a metal trashcan with a lid or a sealed plastic container to keep out mice. Plug all small cracks and other openings around your foundation, doors and windows with steel wool or expanding foam sealant.

Something else to keep in mind is snakes like to forage for their food in tall, grassy areas, as well as under rocks or other items that may be laying in your yard.

Forexample, a pile of lumber leftover from a past construction project or rotten tree stumps provide a great habitat for lots of pests.

“These kinds of areas also provide a great habitat for the snakes themselves,” Peek said. “By eliminating dense cover, you’re also taking away snake habitats.”

When snakes seek refuge, they look for gaps or openings in your home. Gaps beneath garage doors or in the foundation often are large enough for a snake to slither through. Make sure you have a door sweep on

doors that lead to the exterior of your home.

Peek said during hot weather, snakes can be attracted to cool and/or damp places, such as beneath storage sheds or basements/storm cellars. Keep out a watchful eye when going into the cellar or if you need to crawl underneath your home or a storage building.

“Granted, most people prefer to not have snakes on their property at all. However, if you do run across one, if left alone, it’s likely to move along on its own,” said Dwayne Elmore, OSU Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist and Bollenbach Chair in OSU’s Department of Natural Resource Ecology and Management.

“Snake bites typically occur when an inexperienced person tries to pick up, pester, move or kill the snake. This is especially dangerous when dealing with venomous snakes.

“It’s best to call a professional pest or wildlife person to remove any poisonous snakes on your property,” Elmore concluded.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING AND IMPLEMENTING A PROGRAM TO CHARGE MITIGATION RATES FOR THE DEPLOYMENT OF EMERGENCY AND NON-EMERGENCY SERVICES RENDERED BY THE CITY OF PURCELL FIRE DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING FOR MITIGATION RATES AND INCREASES THERE TO; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING FOR REPEALER.

WHEREAS, the emergency and non-emergency services response activity to incidents continues to increase each year; which include, but are not limited to, Environmental Protection requirements involving equipment and training, and Homeland Security regulations involving equipment and training, all of which creates additional demands on all operational aspects of fire department services; and

WHEREAS, the Purcell Fire Department has investigated different methods to maintain a high level of quality of emergency and non-emergency service capability throughout times of constantly increasing service demands, as well as maintaining an effective response by the fire department while ultimately decreases the costs of incidents to insurance carriers, businesses, and individuals through timely and effective management of emergency situations, while also saving lives and reducing property and environmental damage; and

WHEREAS, raising real property taxes to meet the increase in service demands would not be fair to property owners within the corporate limits of the City of Purcell when the responsible party(s) should be held accountable for their actions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Purcell desires to implement a fair and equitable procedure by which to collect said mitigation rates and establish a billing system in accordance with applicable laws, regulations and guidelines;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PURCELL:

SECTION 1: The Purcell Fire Department shall initiate mitigation rates for the delivery of emergency and non-emergency services by the Purcell Fire Department for personnel, supplies and equipment to the scene of emergency and non-emergency incidents all as reflected on "EXHIBIT A." The mitigation rates shall be based on actual costs of the services and that which is usual, customary and reasonable (UCR) as shown in "EXHIBIT A," which may include any services, personnel, supplies, and equipment and with baselines established by addendum to this document.

SECTION 2: A claim may be filed against the responsible party(s) through their insurance carrier. In some circumstances, the responsible party(s) may be billed directly.

SECTION 3: The Purcell City Council may make rules or regulations and from time to time and may amend, revoke, or add rules and regulations, not inconsistent with this Section, as they may deem necessary or expedient with respect to billing for these mitigation rates or the collection thereof.

SECTION 4: It is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in accordance with all legal requirements, and the Codified Ordinance of the City Council.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date of adoption as permitted by law.

SECTION 6: The Mitigation Rates lists in Exhibit A will increase by 1.5% annually or based on the annual percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), as developed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor, whichever is more. Rate adjustments will occur on the anniversary date of this ordinance/ resolution to keep the fire department's cost recovery program in conformity with increasing operating expenses.

SECTION 7: REPEALER. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

OVERVIEW OF MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM
The McClain County Economic Development Authority (herein "Authority") has authorized a Program for qualified home buyers within the County whereby such Authority will issue Qualified Mortgage Credit Certificates to such qualifying Home Buyers within the County which will enable them to receive an annual federal income tax credit with respect to their federal income taxes so long as the original mortgage is on the home and the Homeowner continues to live in the home for which the Mortgage Credit Certificate was issued. The Authority has entered into a contract with the MCC Administration Corporation ("Program Administrator") to administer the program. This tax credit is a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the qualifying Homeowner's federal income tax due, not just a deduction from gross income. An explanation of the eligibility requirements for this Mortgage Credit Certificate is contained within this notice and you should review it carefully to see if you qualify.

AMOUNT OF QUALIFYING HOME BUYER'S FEDERAL INCOME TAX CREDIT

A holder of a Qualified Mortgage Credit Certificate issued by the Authority under the Program is entitled to a federal income tax credit equaling 50% of the interest paid on the certified indebtedness amount up to \$100,000 on the holder's home loan during that particular tax year in question. However, such qualifying Home Buyer Certificate holder is limited by Federal law to a \$2,000 per year income tax credit. Therefore, for example, if the holder paid \$4,000 of interest on the certified indebtedness amount up to \$100,000 on his or her home loan during the applicable tax year, then such holder would receive an income tax credit of \$2,000 (that is, 50% of \$4,000) and such Certificate holder would thus pay \$2,000 less in federal income taxes for the particular tax year than without the Mortgage Credit Certificate, subject to certain adjustments. The amount of tax credit will vary depending on the interest rate on each loan and is limited to 50% of the interest paid on the first \$100,000 of the home loan which is the certified indebtedness amount and a maximum of \$2,000 per year. See the certified indebtedness amount on each individual certificate.

HOW AND WHERE TO APPLY FOR THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE
The Mortgage Credit Certificate Program is available to persons who are purchasing a home and obtaining a loan thereon for a house in the County which is to be used as his or her principal residence. Therefore, one should apply for the Program at the Mortgage Lender of the applicant's choice, however, such lending institution need not be located within the County. If the Mortgage Lender you contact does not have information concerning the Program, such information can be obtained by contacting MCC Administration Corporation at (405) 364-6565 or P.O. Box 1568, Norman, Oklahoma 73070. Therefore, a Home Buyer should contact a bank, savings and loan association or other mortgage lender to apply for a loan and work with the lending officer of such institution and the Program Administrator. Upon qualifying for a Mortgage Credit Certificate, such instrument will be issued by the Program Administrator. Thereafter, the Home Buyer will file a copy of the Certificate with IRS Form 8396 and IRS Form 1040. The Homeowner should thereafter be able to claim this credit every year as long as he or she lives in the home and is paying on the mortgage.

DURATION OF THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM
Persons may obtain Mortgage Credit Certificates under the Program until December 31, 2021. Persons receiving MCC's may be required to rebate to the Federal Government a portion of the federal subsidy represented by such tax credit upon resale of the related residence within the first nine years of the loan. The MCC Program will remain until December 31, 2021, or until the maximum amount of MCC's available through the Program have been issued.

FEATURES AND LIMITATIONS ON CREDIT

A Mortgage Credit Certificate holder is allowed to take the tax credit each tax year, so long as he/she continues to live in the home for which the Mortgage Credit Certificate was issued. In addition to the tax credit, a Mortgage

Credit Certificate holder is still able to take the standard mortgage interest deduction. That deduction is limited, however, to the mortgage interest paid during the year minus the amount of the tax credit for that year. For instance, if the Home Buyer paid \$4,000 of mortgage interest on the certified indebtedness amount for the year and receives a \$2,000 MCC tax credit, the taxpayer can also deduct \$2,000 (\$4,000-\$2,000) of mortgage interest from gross income for the year. If a holder's tax liability is less than the amount of the credit for the year, it may be possible for the unused portion of the tax credit to be carried forward.

COSTS OF MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATES
The Homeowner must pay a one-time Mortgage Credit Certificate origination fee of \$1,000 to the Program Administrator at the time of the closing of the loan. There will also be an annual Program administration fee of \$180 per year, and collected by the Program Administrator on a monthly basis from the Homeowner. The annual fee of \$180 is fixed for the first seven years of the loan, but may be increased annually thereafter by the Program Administrator but not to exceed 5% per year.

ADDITIONAL FACTS ABOUT MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATES

Before you decide to apply for a Mortgage Credit Certificate there are several features of Mortgage Credit Certificates that you should keep in mind. First, the tax credit is only available as long as you continue to live in the house financed in connection with the Mortgage Credit Certificate. You are required to notify the Program Administrator when you move and/or refinance your house. When you move, the Certificate is automatically revoked and you are no longer entitled to the tax credit. If you refinance your home, the Certificate will be revoked unless you make arrangements ahead of time with the Administrator to qualify the refinance for a reissuance of the Mortgage Credit Certificate. Call the Administrator for details. Second, a Mortgage Credit Certificate may be transferable. For information in regard to this, contact the Program Administrator before you sell the home. Third, if you make any misrepresentations about your eligibility for the Program you risk serious consequences. Your Mortgage Credit Certificate may be revoked as a result of the misrepresentation. Further, a misrepresentation may result in a fine of up to \$10,000 in addition to any criminal penalties imposed by law.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENT OF THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

In order to qualify for the Program, Federal Law requires that a Home Buyer satisfy each of the following guidelines:

1. First Time Home Buyer Requirement (The Three Year Requirement): The Program and federal law require that MCC's be issued only to "first time home buyers", unless the home lays within a "targeted area". Since McClain County is an all "non-targeted area", the first time homebuyer requirement applies to all MCC's issued in McClain County. The First Time Home Buyer requirement is that the home buyer have had no present ownership interest in a principal residence at any time during the three year period prior to the date on which the mortgage on the home is executed.

2. Targeted Area Set Aside Requirement: At least twenty percent (20%) of the tax credit provided by MCC's will be devoted to residences located within Targeted Areas of the County for at least one year after the date MCC's are first made available. Since all of McClain County is a "non-targeted area", the set aside requirement does not apply.

3. Home Buyer Income Requirement: Federal law imposes a "family income" limit on home buyers receiving MCC's. "Family income" is the anticipated total income from all sources received by the family head and spouse (even if temporarily absent) and by each additional member of the family, including salary and wages, as well as overtime, dividends, housing allowances, alimony, public assistance, social security, unemployment compensation and investment income and profits for the 12-month period beginning the date of the issuance of the MCC to the Home Buyer, exclusive of income that is temporary, non-recurring or sporadic. An income work sheet making determination of "family income" which is signed by the Home Buyer is attached to and included within the sworn affidavit of the Home Buyer.

The Program income limits are as follows:
Non-Target Area
Family of 2 or less; \$73,800
Family of 3 or more; \$84,870

4. Purchase Price: Federal Law imposes certain purchase price limitations. The maximum purchase price limitations are as follows:
New House; Existing House
Non-target Area—\$283,273; \$283,273

5. Principal Residence: Federal Law requires that the Home Buyer must occupy the home as a principal residence within 60 days after the financing is provided. A principal residence is a home

occupied primarily for residential purposes. A principal residence does not include a home used as an investment property, as a recreation home or a home 15% or more of the total area of which is used in a trade or business. Further, if the Home Owner ceases to use the residence as his principal residence for a period in excess of twelve (12) months, no deduction shall be allowed for mortgage interest accruing after the first day in such twelve month period.

6. Single Family Home: The residence financed must be a one-family residence. This includes a detached home, one unit of a duplex, a townhouse or condominium unit. Manufactured housing or mobile homes qualify only if the unit has at least 400 square feet of living space, if it is more than 102 inches wide, if it is permanently affixed to the real property and is not classified as personal property under Oklahoma law. Land adjoining the home is considered part of the home only if it maintains the home's livability and is not, other than incidentally, a source of income to the owner. The purchase price includes all amounts paid for the home including the cost of completion. For example, you may not agree to pay extra for a refrigerator or drapes so that the stated purchase price is low enough to qualify. The purchase price does not include legitimate settlement and financing costs or the value of the land if you have owned it for more than two years before beginning construction of the home.

7. New Mortgage: The mortgage loan financed in connection with issuance of a Mortgage Credit Certificate must be a new mortgage and may not replace a prior mortgage of the Certificate holder on the home (whether or not previously repaid).

8. Program Area: In order to be eligible for a Certificate, the home financed under the Program must be located within this County.

9. Prohibited Loans: Under the Program, any type of loan will qualify with two exceptions. First, a loan from a lender who is considered to be a "related person" to the Home Owner for tax purposes will not qualify. Second, a loan funded from the proceeds of a tax-exempt bond issue will not qualify.

10. First Come, First Served Nature of Program: Under the Program, Mortgage Credit Certificates will be issued to eligible Home Buyers on a first come, first served basis. Only loans closed on or after October 14, 2019, are eligible for the Program. MCC's must be issued by December 31, 2021.

11. Non-Discriminatory Nature of Program: The Program will be administered without regard to race, sex or national origin or other applicable Federal parameters prescribed by law relating to discrimination.
