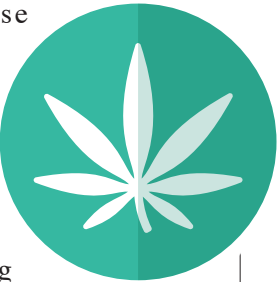
A newly adopted Purcell city ordinance imposing harsh restrictions on medical marijuana businesses in the city lasted just five weeks before those restrictions were eased.

"I've been doing this 43 years and I've never seen anything in such turmoil," city attorney Ted Haxel told council members at Monday's meeting.

Haxel was referring to the City of Moore's decision to not enforce that city's ordinance "at this time," as well as a pending lawsuit against Yukon's marijuana ordinance.

## Monday a day for veterans

Annual PHS Assembly honoring those who served

A former KC-135 pilot who logged 5,000 hours during his nine years in the Air Force will be the guest speaker Monday at the Purcell High School Veterans Day Assembly.

Daniel Schwab, a native of northern Indiana, went on to a 20-year career with Hydra-Dyne Hydraulics. He retired in 2014.

Schwab graduated from New Carlisle (Ind.) High School in 1966, entering Indiana University that fall.

He was at IU on an academic scholarship from 1966-72,

graduating in 1970 with a bachelor's degree and in 1972 with a master's degree in business administration.

He accepted an Air Force ROTC scholarship in 1967 and was cadet commander in 1970.

Schwab was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1970. In 1972, he was sent to Vance Air Force Base at Enid for pilot training.

As a KC-135 pilot, Schwab served seven years in Maine and Texas.

During that time, he deployed twice to Southeast Asia and

once to Europe.

The assembly will open at 10 a.m. with a veterans professional.

Bryce Tuck and Anoli Billy will post the colors and Matthew Dobbs will lead the Pledge of Allegiance and deliver welcoming remarks.

The high school band will perform the National Anthem, as well as the songs for each of the five branches of the U.S. military – Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force and Coast Guard.

Also on the program will be presentations by Hailey Day, Madi Tolle, Vivian Steiner, Susanna Cox, Linda Hurst and the Art Club.

Jade McCurdy will explain the 13 folds of the American flag.

Making closing remarks will be superintendent Jason Midkiff.

A reception and luncheon will follow the assembly.

### Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

### Confronting the opioid epidemic

#### Congressman Tom Cole

In too many communities across the nation, opioid addiction has destroyed and claimed lives, causing unexpected grief and loss for families.

Without question, opioid abuse is a very real and rampant health crisis and one that is impacting individuals from all walks of life.

In response to this widespread problem, I am encouraged that Congress offered solutions to combat the issue through a comprehensive piece of legislation recently signed into law by the president.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, more than 115 people fall victim to opioid overdose each day. In fact, addiction to once well-intended prescription medications like oxycodone, codeine and morphine - as well as illicit use of heroin and fentanyl -

have led to the deaths of more than 42,000 Americans in just one year.

The unfortunate imprint on our own state is heartbreaking; in 2016, there were 813 Oklahomans tragically lost to overdose. Along with and likely due in part to the rapid rise in opioid misuse, the nation's overall life expectancy has seen a disturbing decline in recent years as well.

Especially since opioid addiction exists in most-if not all-American communities, confronting the epidemic has never been a partisan undertaking in Congress. And I am pleased that H.R. 6, the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act, demonstrates a truly bipartisan effort.

Rightly so, the historic legislation reflects the concern shared by lawmakers on both sides of the aisle and the desire in both chambers to effectively

confront and end this national health crisis.

Made up of several bills introduced throughout this Congress to prevent and end the cycle of opioid abuse, H.R. 6 not only addresses symptoms of the problem but confronts underlying causes of the crisis.

For those currently struggling with addiction, the legislation improves treatment and recovery options and ensures help is more readily available. To prevent addiction from taking root at all, the legislation supports non-addictive opioid alternatives for pain management and discourages the disturbingly high opioid prescription rate through better drug monitoring.

The legislation also supports safer communities by empowering law enforcement to keep

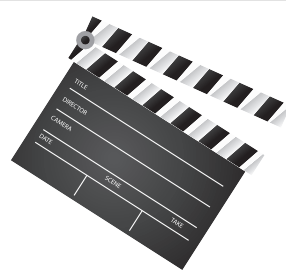

### MOVIES WITH DAVE

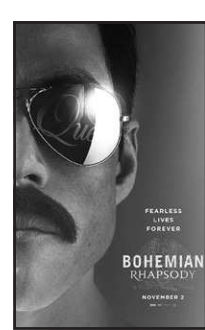


The holiday movie season has finally begun. And with it three new releases.

We have a biopic about one of the most popular bands of all time, a reimagining of the classic tale of "The Nutcracker" from Disney, and yet another Tyler Perry comedy.

Let's get right to the reviews.

First up is "Bohemian Rhapsody."

Based on a true story, this film traces the meteoric rise of the band known as Queen

and their extraordinary lead singer Freddie Mercury (Rami Malek).

From their small beginnings, all the way up to Queen's legendary appearance at Live Aid in 1985.

I love Queen. They're probably my favorite music group of all time.

Ever since watching a clip of Queen at Wembley Stadium in 1986 as a teenager and seeing Freddy on stage, not just singing himself, but commanding the audience to sing along with him, all before an amazing performance of "Under Pressure" to a seemingly endless crowd.

Just like the audience in Wembley, that moment captivated me, and in a way that no other performance ever had.

After that I bought a collection of Queen's greatest hits, but that wasn't enough for me. I needed more.

I ended up buying every recording of Queen's that I could get my hands on. From their original self-titled debut album "Queen" all the way to "Made in Heaven," released four years after Freddie's death.

Given all that, you'd think a biopic like this one would practically be made for me. A telling of Queen's history filled to the brim with their best songs off their best albums? What's not to love?

And this movie definitely has the music.

Pretty much every popular song by Queen is featured in this film.

Naturally the creation of "Bohemian Rhapsody" gets a large amount of screentime here, plus there's prominent favorites like "We Will Rock You," "We Are The Champions," "Another One Bites The Dust," and my personal favorite "Under Pressure." But there's also some deeper cuts like "Love Of My Life," "Lazing On A Sunday

Afternoon," and "Who Wants to Live Forever.

As a huge Queen fan, I couldn't ask for a better soundtrack. There's a reason they're one of the most influential bands of all time, and the music here was definitely one of the major highlights of the film.

The other major standout was Rami Malek as Freddie. Up until this movie, Rami has mostly been relegated to television roles, breaking out with his fantastic performance in USA's techno thriller "Mr. Robot."

After this movie though, I'd be shocked if we didn't start seeing a lot more of Rami in major productions.

He's just so good here. At times it's almost like Rami completely disappears and you just see Freddie.

The way he talked, the way he acted, the way Freddie commanded an audience. Rami nailed it all.

Between the soundtrack and Rami's amazing performance, there's a lot to like with this film. In fact I think those two elements alone will be enough for most people to come out of "Bohemian Rhapsody" loving it.

Sadly though this movie is far from perfect. Unfortunately, weak storytelling and a fabricated, cliched narrative hold this film back.

Let me start off by saying I'm not a stickler for historical accuracy.

I don't really care if the filmmakers decided to have Freddie meet his future girlfriend Mary Austin (Lucy Boynton) the same night he joined Brian May (Gwilym Lee) and Roger Taylor (Ben Hardy), even though that's not how it actually happened.

I understand to fit a typical film plot structure and make a movie entertaining, some adjustments to the original story always have to be made.

However, I'm much less understanding when filmmakers start wholesale making up facts. Especially when those fabrications are some of the most tired stereotypical story elements, used in nearly every movie about a musical group.

For instance, the band having a fight and splitting up so the egotistical lead singer can start a solo career. It happens in every single movie about a band, so of course they throw it in here too.

It's a tired old cliché and putting it in this movie speaks

volumes to the lack of care that went into the writing. Mostly because it never actually happened.

It's the same tired plot point used in every band movie ever. Heck, they used it in the Disney Channel original movie "The Cheetah Girls" and Hasbro's box office flop "Jem and the Holograms." How lazy can you get copying those films?

Yes, Queen did take a year off in 1983, but it wasn't because everyone had a falling out with Freddie. They needed a break after touring for practically 10 years straight.

The character is loosely based on EMI chief Roy Featherstone, but Roy was actually a huge fan of Queen. Yes, he thought "Bohemian Rhapsody" was too long to be a single, but beyond that the clash between him and the band in this movie was completely fiction.

I don't get it. If the movie needed more conflict, why didn't they include Queen's real falling out with their original manager Norman Sheffield?

They even wrote a song about Norman for crying out loud, "Death on Two Legs," which got the band sued for defamation. But no, he isn't in this movie whatsoever.

Next is "The Nutcracker and the Four Realms." After the recent death of her mother, Clara (Mackenzie Foy) is left a one of a kind priceless gift from her late mother. An intricate box with a keyhole, but no key.

Clara's search for this key leads her into a mysterious world of four realms, filled with marvels such as living nutcracker soldiers, the Sugar Plum Fairy (Keira Knightley), and the tyrant Mother Ginger (Helen Mirren) with her legion of mice who will stop at nothing to keep Clara from retrieving her mother's key.

I have to say, I haven't been much of a fan of Disney's live action offerings recently.

Between "A Wrinkle in Time," "Christopher Robin," "Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Men Tell No Tales," and the live action version of "Beauty and the Beast," I don't think I've enjoyed a non animated movie from Disney for past two years.

And sadly, this movie didn't even come close to breaking that streak. In fact this might be the worst film of the lot.

But on the positive side of things, I supposed the acting is okay. At least for the most part.

Mackenzie Foy is certainly a young actress, but she has a surprising amount of good performances under her belt including major roles in "The Conjuring" and "Interstellar."

And for what it's worth, I think she makes for a perfectly fine lead here. Honestly, I don't think anyone could have done better in her position.

Helen Mirren is also good, for the whole three or four scenes she's in. Same with Morgan Freeman, who's only in the movie once at the beginning and again at the end.

On the opposite side of things is Keira Knightley as the Sugar Plum Fairy. I have no idea what to make of her performance, but if you've seen the trailer for this movie, Knightley is just as strange and unsettling as you think she would be.

I think she was supposed to come across as eccentric, but in a likably way. Instead, between her strange soft spoken voice and bizarre mannerisms, she just comes across as downright creepy.

And it's not like she's only in a few scenes like Mirren or Freeman. Behind Clara and her living nutcracker friend Captain Philip (Jayden Fowora-Knight), Knightley gets the third most screen time in the entire film.

I just wanted her character to go away, but instead they kept on putting this insane Sugar Plum Fairy centerstage.

But unfortunately, Knightley's bizarre performance is the least of this film's problems.

The story here is just plain boring and there's zero sense of urgency whatsoever.

It's frustrating because the movie has a very clear, if incredibly simple, plot.

Clara needs to get the key. Everything in the film revolves around getting it.

So "alright," I think, "let's get that key!" But after a brief chase for our precious key, Clara takes a detour to an elegant castle, naturally trying on a shiny new dress in the process.

But "fine" I think.

"They're at the castle, now they can regroup and track down that key!" The movie even raises the stakes and basically says "If we don't get the key, we'll all be annihilated!"

But instead of doing anything, the Sugar Plum Fairy takes Clara on a parade through town, on a hot air balloon ride, and they also watch some ballet together too just for heck of it.

Eventually though, later on in the film, Clara finally gets the key.

Now does she rush back to the safe castle as quickly as possible? Especially considering mere minutes ago she was running for her life?

No, of course not.

Clara and Philip decide to

take a break while still inside the evil lady's realm. A realm where moments before we saw hundreds of mice bursting out of the ground and kidnapping people with zero warning.

The two of them just sit down and have a nice five minute conversation without a single care for the world.

It's so frustrating to watch. No one in this film seems to care to get anything done, even when their own lives are on the line.

Not to mention the movie is just plain dull. The pacing is terrible and no matter how hard I tried, I couldn't keep my eyes open during the film's climax.

Yes, the climax. The part of the movie that supposed to be exciting and filled with action. That part put me right to sleep because at that point I just didn't care about anything, or anyone, in the film.

I'm not sure what's going on with Disney's live action studios, but I'm definitely not a fan of it.

Maybe they'll turn it around with "Mary Poppins Returns" in December. We'll see. I have high hopes, especially with Emily Blunt and Lin-Manuel Miranda in the lead roles.

Until then though, it seems like The Mouse is determined to hand me nothing but one disappointing film after the next.

harmful drugs from coming in and by combating illicit use of synthetic drugs like fentanyl, which is easily obtained and often lethal.

In addition to this important effort, recent legislation to fund the government reflected the same commitment to confronting the opioid crisis. As part of a two-bill appropriations package that maintained many priorities first advanced by the subcommittee I chair, lawmakers directed \$6.7 billion toward treatment and recovery programs for those battling substance abuse.

This included a substantial increase for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. I am proud that the president signed this legislation into law at the end of September.

While it takes time to change the course of a national health crisis, I am encouraged that Congress and the president have taken critical first steps in slowing down the opioid epidemic.

I believe that we can and will eliminate its hold on individuals, families, communities and our country.

The Purcell Parks & Rec Advisory Board will be hosting a public hearing regarding a grant application for adding on to the Purcell Lake walking trail.

- This grant project would continue the foot/biking/mountain biking trail around the entirety of Purcell Lake.
- This grant is administered by the Federal Highway Administration to the Federal Trails Program which is then distributed by the Oklahoma Department of Tourism
- This grant application is for the second phase of the Trails project.
- The grant would pay 80% of the cost, and the city would pay 20% of the cost.
- There will be no tax increase to fund the project.
- The trail would be 10' wide, matching the width of the walking trail upgrade plans from Phase I.
- Phase II would extend from Chandler Park eastward towards the volleyball courts. It would then turn north following the road north and following the Purcell Lake dam, then turning west along the cemetery to the north boat ramp.
- Engineers have been consulted to begin drawing up an estimate of the overall trail and each of its phases.
- The City of Purcell has already had the grant application for Phase I of the walking trail approved which will begin in 2019.
- This grant request is due January 31<sup>st</sup>, 2019
- We would like to receive letters from the community. The letters should say why people do / do not want the trail, and how the trail will impact the city.

### Slow Cooker John Wayne Casserole

32 oz. bag tater tots, not thawed  
1 lb. ground beef  
1 small yellow onion, diced  
1 green bell pepper, diced  
1.5 oz. pkg. taco seasoning  
Water, add the amount the taco mix says to add  
1 cup sour cream  
8 oz. pkg. Cheddar cheese, sharp  
1/8 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/2 tsp. onion powder

Spray slow cooker with non-stick spray. Add the tater tots down in a single layer. Set aside.

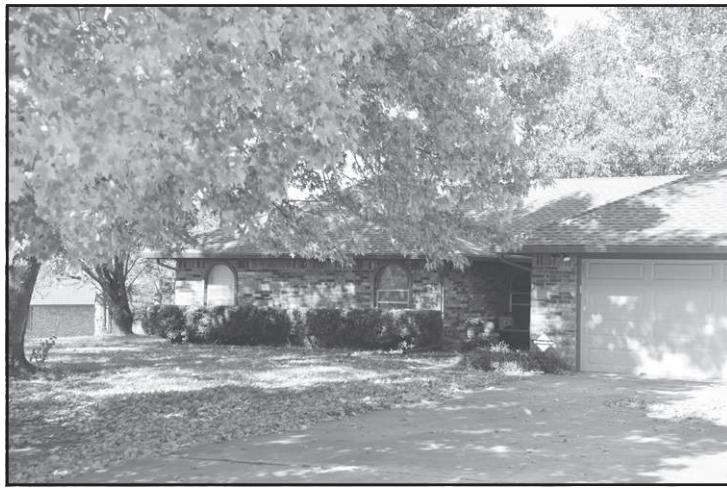
In a large skillet brown the hamburger, onions and bell pepper. Drain the fat. Add the water the taco packet says to add along with the taco packet and continue cooking until the meat and seasoning has thickened.

Pour the meat mixture over the tater tots.

Combine the sour cream, salt, pepper, onion powder and half of the cheese. Spread the cheese mixture over the meat mixture in the slow cooker.

Cover and cook on low for 4-1/2 hours without opening the lid during the cooking time.

After the cooking time is up, add the remaining cheese evenly over the casserole. Cover and let the cheese melt and serve.

fines, up to a maximum waiver of \$20 off an account.

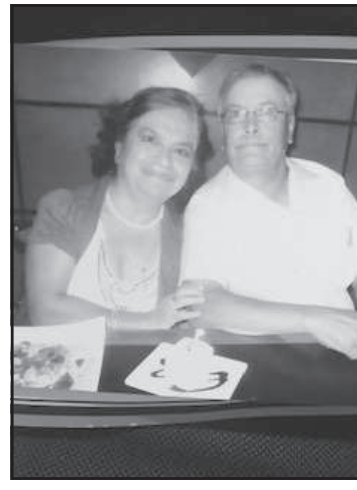
However, donations do not count toward lost item charges or fees associated with debt collection.

## Keep your pets safe during winter weather

For pets that spend a good deal of time romping in the back yard or lounging in a patch of sunshine on the deck, the arrival of winter may be a rude awakening and cause of concern for safety.

Before Oklahoma experiences a deep freeze, pet owners need to make sure their pets are well-cared for when the temperatures begin to fall, said Dr. Paul DeMars, associate professor in Community Practice at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University.

“As pretty and soft as your pet’s fur is, it isn’t necessarily the perfect insulator, especially when the temperatures are extreme or when the fur gets wet,” DeMars said. “Compare it to being outside wearing a t-shirt when it’s below freezing. Your pet’s toes, nose and ears are especially susceptible

to winter weather, too.”

If you suspect your pet has frostbite, cover the animal with warm towels. Gently pat dry the affected area and contact your veterinarian.

While winter weather can be hard on any pet, very young animals, as well as older dogs and cats, should not be kept outdoors. DeMars said these young pets simply do not have the fat, metabolism or the full fur coat they need to stay warm.

The best option for pet safety during the winter is to keep them indoors. If your pet lives outside fulltime, it is imperative to provide adequate shelter from the elements. A covered enclosure with blankets or clean hay/straw/cedar shavings is a must. Another option is a heated floor mat. Check with your local pet store to see what is available.

“Try to face the opening of the shelter away from the

wind. Also, if it rains and the bedding gets wet, replace it with dry bedding,” DeMars said. “Wet bedding can grow bacteria and mold, which are not healthy for your pet.”

It is no secret exercise is good for both humans and their pets. For those who enjoy a nice walk with your pet, sidewalks and walking trails are likely to have been salted if there is ice or snow on the ground.

While this is beneficial for humans to help keep them from slipping and sliding, salt can cause irritation on an animal’s foot pads.

Not only is the weather a concern for your pet, the chances of exposing your pet to life-threatening chemicals also increases. Leaky radiators can leave pools of antifreeze in your driveway and is both a winter and summer issue. Although the sweet taste of antifreeze is appealing to your

pet, it can be deadly, even in very small doses.

“Antifreeze is highly toxic and absorbs quickly into your pet’s system. The kidneys are the most affected organs and can shut down completely within 12 to 24 hours in cats and 36 to 72 hours in dogs,” DeMars said.

Another outdoor danger is animals who seek protection from the winter weather in dangerous places. Before starting and moving your vehicle, check under the hood and in the wheel wells to ensure there are no animals hiding.

Because it takes a few more calories to keep warm in the winter, your pet may need a little extra food. For pets who stay outside, make sure the water in their water bowls is not frozen.

“Winter weather will mean your pets require a little extra care to ensure their safety,” DeMars said.

## Chickasaws host Multi-Tribal Day

Several hundred visitors filled the Chickasaw Cultural Center’s Traditional Village November 3, to enjoy, learn and partake in dance, food, crafts and much more during Multi-Tribal Day.

Representatives of about a dozen tribal nations, including dancers, artisans, flutists and drum circles dressed in traditional regalia took part in the event. The Chickasaw Nation rolled out the red carpet, serving traditional pashofa – a hominy-based soup which has sustained Chickasaws for centuries.

Patrons traveled from far and wide to witness tribal culture, learn ancient dance steps and taste a menu based on recipes passed down through the generations.

Chickasaws Linda Underwood and husband, Darrell, set wood ablaze under an iron pot to cook pashofa long before the sun peeked through a partly cloudy sky.

“We were here in the dark getting everything ready,” Mrs. Underwood said. Chickasaw Virginia Bolen was enlisted to help the Underwoods serve pashofa as long lines of patrons sought to sample the ancient staple of the Chickasaw tribe.

“I think it’s pretty good. The pork and salt add flavor and texture,” said Hong Li Nguyen, a student at the University of North Texas at Denton. “The way in which it is prepared (in huge iron pots) would feed many people.”

A few steps away, Chickasaw citizen Debbie Walker and Choctaw citizen Janet Milburn, of Duncan, served up squirrel gravy for sampling.

Debbie’s husband, Wayne, said the squirrel meat was provided by Chickasaw Nation Cultural Activities Manager Jesse Lindsey.

Squirrel gravy was prepared in the traditional Chickasaw manner, according to Debbie. The meat was seared and water was added to mix into gravy. Flour-based gravy was a rarity, she said. “Chickasaws made do with resources available to them.”

Lori Whitebuffalo and her young daughter, Mahlia, sampled the Walker contribution. It was obvious Mahlia loved it. “She likes it very much,” said Lori, a Sulphur resident who watched as her daughter quickly consumed the dish.

A favorite among attendees was Cvse, a soup made from pumpkin. Seminole Nation citizen Janet Johnson-Maylen prepared the soup along with Ecko (corn soup) and Cvtvhakv (blue bread).

Tribes demonstrated traditional games, such as stickball, the forerunner of today’s Lacrosse, and chunky, a spear-throwing contest. Beading, hide-tanning, weaponry, arrow-making, flint knapping and storytelling were demonstrated.

Glen Leming, a frequent demonstrator at such events, displayed weaponry and worked on smoothing a stem of river cane to make an arrow.

River cane is difficult to find in Oklahoma. It was the preferred arrow-making material of ancient Chickasaws in Mississippi where it could be found with ease.

“I like working with cane,” Leming said as he used a very sharp knife to cut the sectional pieces away from the cane to make it straight. “Chickasaws are growing it now because finding any in Oklahoma is tough.”

Multi-Tribal Day 2018 marked the eighth year the Chickasaw Nation has hosted the event.

Irwin. The vote was 8,529 for Sacchieri to 5,099 for Irwin.

Winning the race for McClain County District 1 Commissioner was Glen Murray, a Republican. He bested longtime district road foreman Larry Davis 2,526 to 1,400.

Among new faces in the Oklahoma Legislature will be Sherrie Conley, Cynthia Roe and Mary B. Boren.

Boren is the lone Democrat. In the District 20 House race, Conley defeated Steve Jarman 8,870 to 3,415.

Roe will take the District 42 House seat after defeating Liz George 7,812 to 4,090.

Boren's victory in the District 16 Senate race was over Becki Maldonado. That count was 15,509 to 9,143.

Incumbent Tom Cole easily held onto his District 4 Congressional seat, winning over Mary Brannon and Ruby Peters. Cole pulled 149,127 votes to 78,022 and 9,310 for Brannon and Peters, respectively.

McClain County totals in that race were 10,096 for Cole, 3,159 for Brannon and 488 for Peters.

The second time around was charmed for backers of a \$900,000 measure to build a new ambulance facility at Newcastle. Voters in the Dibble, Blanchard and Newcastle school districts approved the measure.

Affirmative votes totaled 4,230 or 59.41 percent to 2,890 or 40.59 percent against.

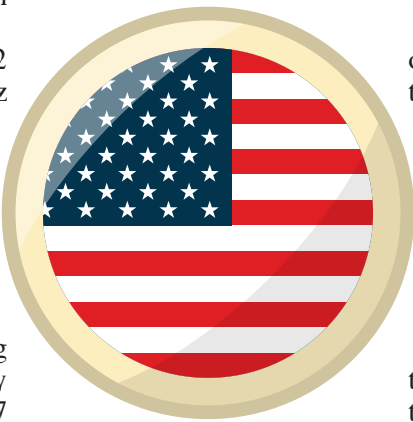

Voters retained all judges on the Oklahoma Supreme Court ballot for Districts 2, 3, 4 and 7; Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals Districts 1, 4 and 5; and Oklahoma Court of Civil Appeals, Districts 4, 5 (offices 1 and 2) and 6 (offices 1 and 2).

Five state questions had a mixed fate, with just one that was approved.

SQ 793, opposed by many optometrists in the state, failed to find favor with voters who defeated it by a 5,614-vote margin. The total was 579,741 for to 585,355 against. The measure would have allowed retail stores to offer space to optometrists and opticians.

SQ 794 sought to amend the Oklahoma Constitution to guarantee certain rights to crime victims. It passed 904,308 to 254,966.

SQ 798 would have required candidates for governor and lieutenant governor to run on a single ticket. It lost 528,110 for to 622,233 against.

SQ 800 sought to create a trust fund from five percent of the gross production taxes on oil and gas. It went down in defeat on a vote of 652,984 against to 488,135 yes.

SQ 801 would have permitted school districts to use ad valorem tax revenue to pay teacher salaries and other operating expenses. It failed 581,504 against to 572,151 in favor.

## Pot:

a judge in Broken Arrow has ruled that under existing state law, the only location restriction on medical marijuana businesses is they cannot be within 1,000 feet of a public or private school.

The ordinance which the council approved October 1 also applied that blackout area to libraries, museums, public playgrounds, child care centers, places of worship, public parks and recreation facilities, juvenile or adult halfway houses, correctional facilities and substance abuse treatment centers and residentially zoned areas, as well as other medical marijuana and retail marijuana establishments.

In the amended ordinance, the distance is dropped to 750 feet for all except residentially zoned areas and other marijuana businesses.

For those two categories, a distance of at least 200 feet is now in effect.

The changes apply to retail marijuana businesses, commercial growing facilities,

wholesale facilities and marijuana storage facilities.

City fees for commercial growing facilities and wholesale facilities remain at \$1,500. The annual license for marijuana storage facilities is likewise unchanged at \$2,500.

However, the license for growing medical marijuana for personal use drops from \$500 to \$50.

At the request of Joe Norton who has acquired property in Purcell for a commercial growing facility, the council dropped the ordinance's requirement for a 10-foot security fence in favor of a six-foot fence topped with three strands of barbed wire.

Norton, whose professional background is in security, told the council that a 10-foot fence only serves to let thieves know there is something inside worth stealing.

"I think we need to give this citizen a chance," council member Graham Fishburn said.

Norton said the property is a "huge investment."

He added the business will

employ eight people.

In other business, the council:

- reappointed Carol DiRienzo to the Pioneer Library board;
- heard a report from Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce President Allen Eubanks on options for getting a southbound entrance ramp to the interstate on the north side of town;
- awarded a contract totaling \$45,739.71 to Metro Emergency Upfitters LLC for work on three police vehicles;
- approved a \$10,270 budget amendment for maintenance of the Purcell Public Library building;
- approved a resolution to apply for a recreational trails grant from the Oklahoma Department of Tourism;
- approved a \$4,690.72 budget amendment for inspection of the football fieldhouse and new junior high school; and
- amended the 2019 city holiday schedule to reflect the Christmas holidays will be December 24 and 25.

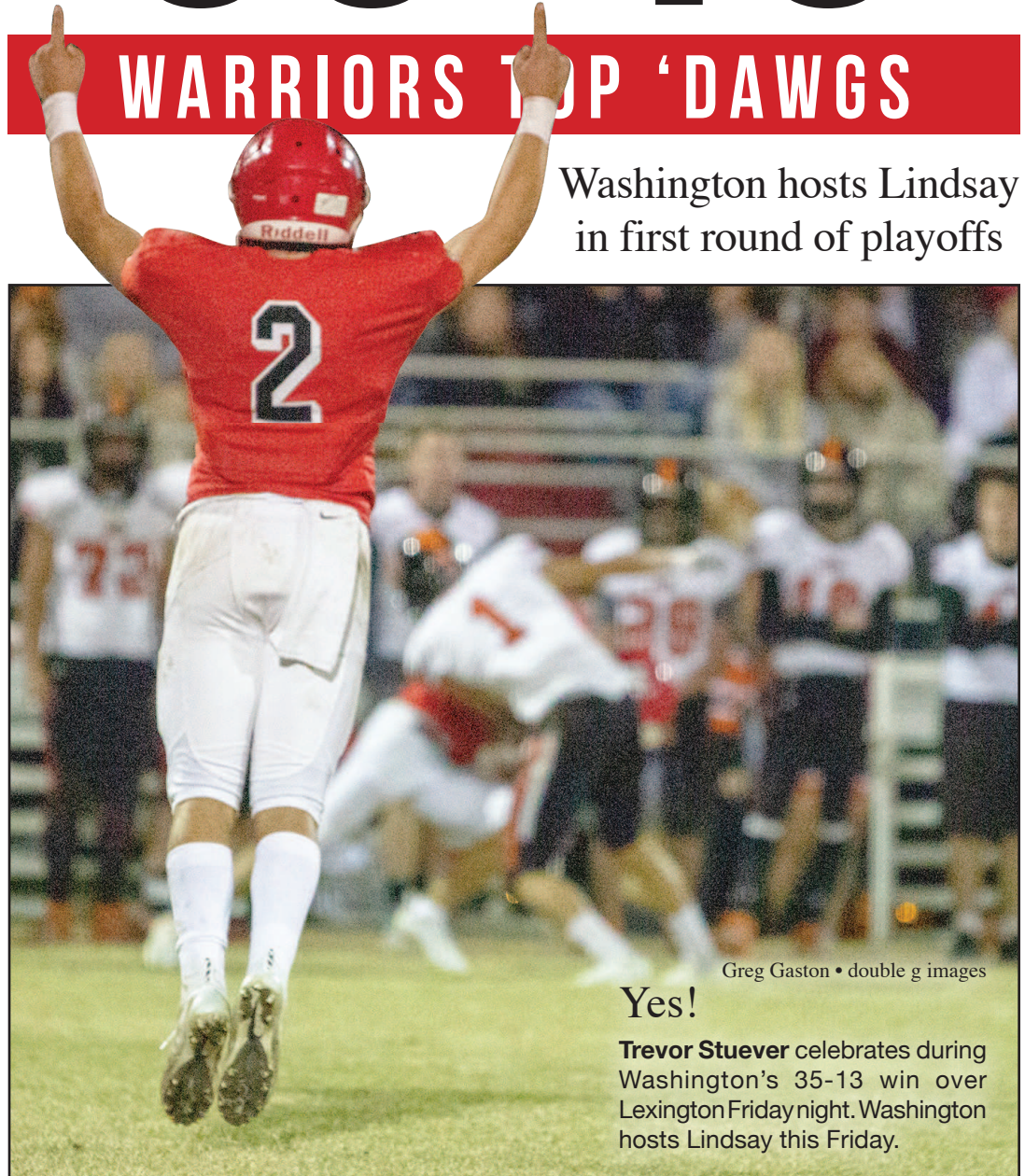
try and figure that out. But, our defense started playing better which gave our offense that opportunity to make those adjustments.

"But we made a goal line stand at the five and then

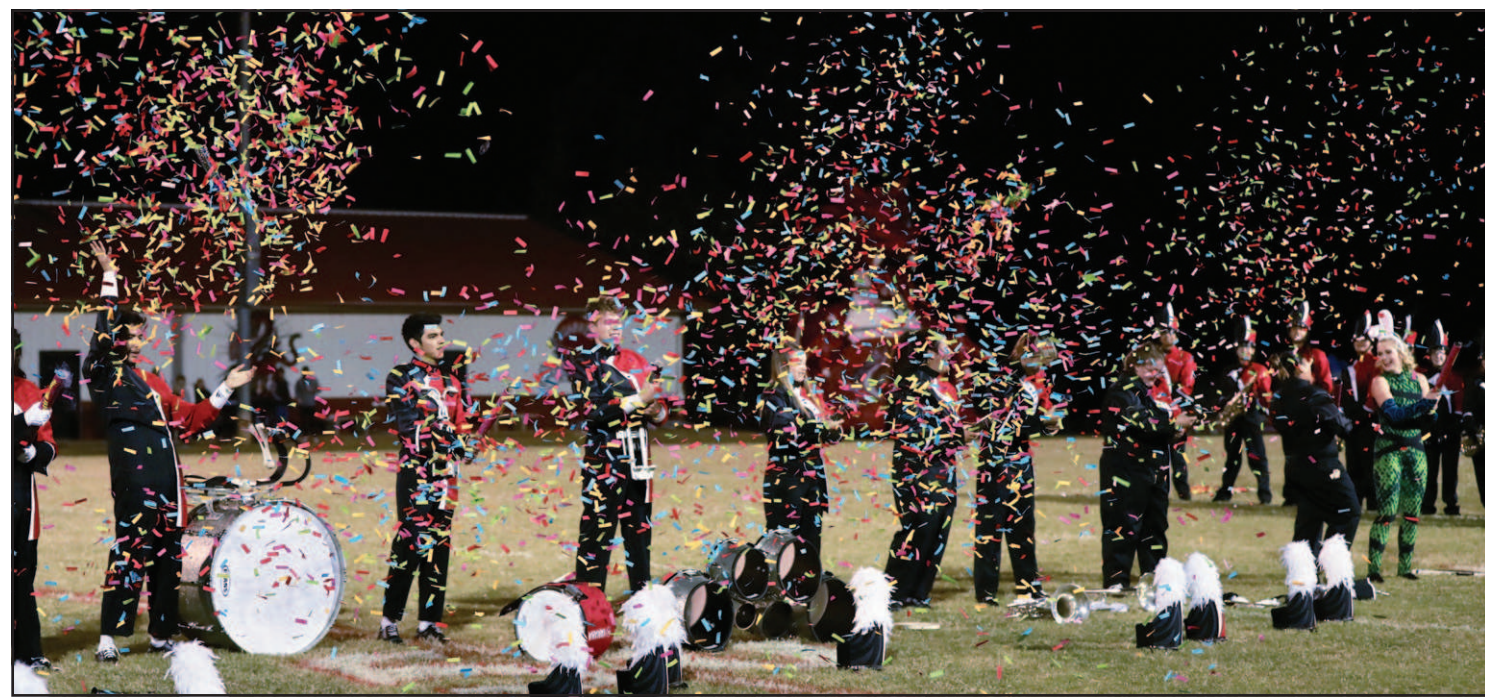

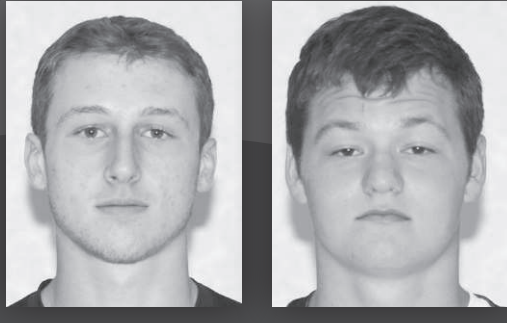

"He's explosive," Beller said. "If you give him a crease, he's going to find it. He's good enough to get into the secondary and make people miss. He's a strong runner and just a great overall running back."

Washington started the third quarter by marching down to the Lexington 37. After a couple of false starts backed the Warriors to the 48, receiver Marc Turbyfill caught a pass to the 25. After Stuever took the ball to the 7, Spaulding bulldozed his way in for another score, making it 35-0 Washington.

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

When the scribe asked Jesus, "Which is the first (greatest) of all the commandments?" (Mark 12:28-34). Jesus' response was first expected and then surprising. Jesus said "The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your mind, and with all your strength." This would have been expected, as it was the familiar shema that formed the centerpiece of Jewish daily prayer.

But Jesus went on. "The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." Jesus had taken this commandment from Leviticus, chapter 19, and added it to the traditional shema to form a

more complete version of love of God and love of neighbor. Loving God is the easy part. Loving the neighbor is much more difficult and takes a lifetime of practice.

A little girl was visiting a friend's house for dinner. The mother of the friend said to her "Do you like broccoli? We will be serving broccoli tonight." The little girl said, "Yes, I like broccoli." When it came time for the meal, the broccoli was passed around and the little girl did not take a portion for her plate. The mother asked "I thought you said you like broccoli." "Yes", she said, "but not enough to eat it!"

Maybe we are like that when it comes to love of neighbor. We love our neighbor, but not enough that we will change our

habits or routine or preferences to show it. We will not make a sacrifice for our neighbor when called upon to do so.

And yet that seems to be what Jesus is asking when He asks us to "love your neighbor as yourself." If we can try our best to put this Greatest Commandment into practice, then we, like the scribe, will "not be far from the kingdom of God." (Mk 12:34).

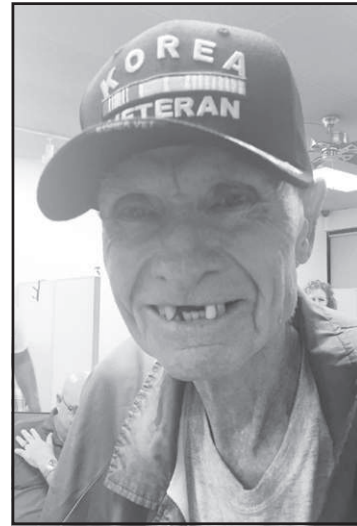

Our offices will be closed on Monday, November 12, in observance of Veterans Day. We will also be closed Thanksgiving Day, so our volunteers can spend this holiday with their families.

We know there will be many veterans and their families who are going to be hungry and alone during this holiday season. I would hope that a prayer is said for those who are less fortunate.

Please remember we are a 501(c)(3) whose only mission is to improve the lives of all veterans and their families while we work each day to change the lives for the better for all who wore the uniform for the United States Military. We also encourage those of you who can afford to help us financially to sign up for an automatic monthly donation from your bank or credit card.

Our automobile donation program has provided us with the funds needed to assist the thousands of veterans who are in need. The cars, trucks, motorcycles, tractors and other items donated may also help you in the way of a tax deduction. Each month our organization spends from \$25,000-30,000 to provide services to veterans and their families.

For those of you who would like to join us as volunteer applications are available each Tuesday and Thursday morning. The application form is also available on our website.

Each week one of our toughest jobs is deciding which veteran we are going to recognize for their service in WW II or the Korean War as our veteran of the week. After considerable deliberation, Merlin Vincent who served during the Korean War is our Veteran of the Week. He was presented a military cap representing his wartime service as we introduced him to the hundreds of veterans who were at our Foundation for assistance with their VA claims and questions. Mr. Vincent served in the United States Army and makes his home in Norman.

Last Tuesday and Thursday morning there were more than

300 veterans and surviving spouses assisted by our volunteers. While visiting with the first veteran that I helped Tuesday morning I asked him where he was from. To my surprise he said New York City. When I inquired why he had traveled that far for VA claims assistance he said that one of the men he served with in the Army was from Desoto, Texas. That friend had visited us and encouraged him to do the same.

After reviewing his military records, I'm sure that he made the right choice to visit us for assistance. The main difference in the way we help veterans to file for VA benefits is we use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires as evidence in support of a veteran's claim for service connection of a disability or to ask for a re-evaluation of a current service-connected disability.

One thing that concerns me is that some organizations will assist veterans to file for an increased rating on a condition that is already rated at the maximum percentage possible. Recently an Army veteran came to see us because his service-connected feet, which had been rated at 50 percent, were being reduced to 0 percent after the folks claiming to help him asked the VA to re-evaluate that condition.

It is my opinion if a veteran is service-connected for a disability the folks who claim they are helping should know what the CFR 38 parts 0 thru 17 rating schedules list as the criteria that must be met for an increase. Each disability has a code number that can be researched in the CFR, so you will know if the veteran's condition has improved or meets the schedule for an increased rating.

Saturday evening several of us from our organization along with Gene Anoatubby and his wife Phyllis were present at the Oklahoma Military Hall of Fame for the 19th Annual Banquet & Induction Ceremony. The program was held at the Embassy Suites in Norman. There are many men and women from our state who have served in our nation's military that are real American Heroes. Each year 10 veterans are enshrined into the Oklahoma Military Hall of Fame after a rigorous review of their military service.

As many of you know, I'm a VA Accredited Claims Agent, and I receive a copy of everything the veteran or surviving spouse receives. This allows us to review all the decisions that VA has made on claims and know what the VA is proposing to do. Another positive that comes out of being accredited is that I'm able to review the VA claims folder electronically.

Twenty-seven veterans received a 100 percent disability rating of their service-connected conditions. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,032,945 per year. They will also be eligible for certain Oklahoma State Benefits and Federal Benefits.

Fifty-four veterans both male and female were awarded VA disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive a combined annual payment of \$847,292 per year.

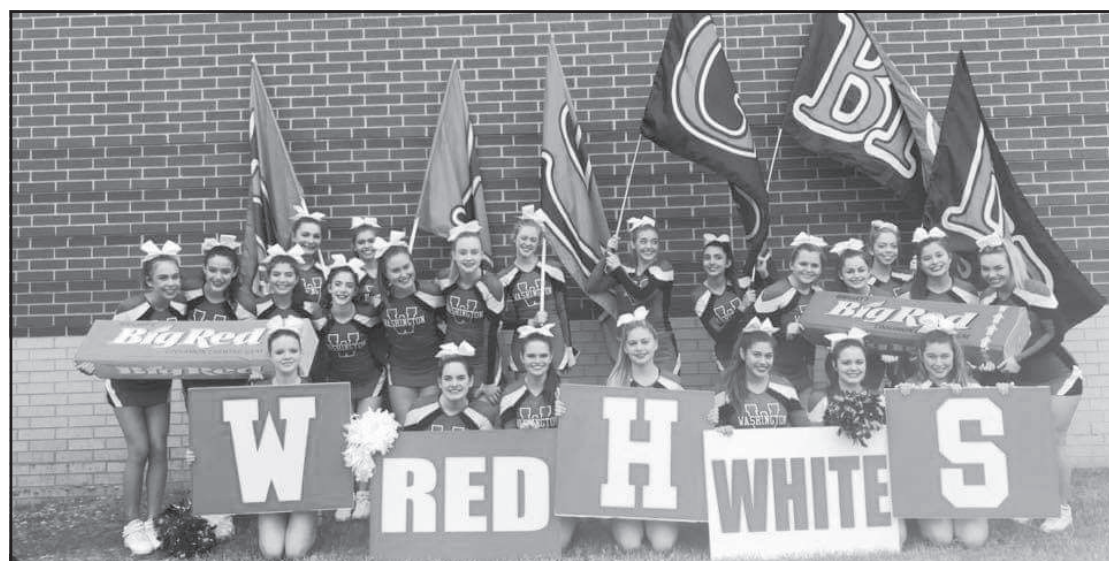
