So is Purcell Lake water safe to swim in?

The short answer is yes based on E. coli tolerance levels published by the Environmental Protection Agency in 2012. Or maybe not based on what council member Jay Tate says is the bacteria load limit used in Oklahoma City.

City manager Dale Bunn said the city tests the lake water for the presence of E. coli bacteria every Tuesday and publishes the results online if the E. coli concentration exceeds 320 viable cells in a 100 mL (3.38 fluid ounces) sample.

The EPA standard, Bunn

Ladd Road changes

Construction starts Monday

Construction will begin Monday on a multi-month \$9 million project at the Ladd Road interchange at mile marker 101 on I-35.

Oklahoma Department of Transportation spokesman Cody Boyd said a contractor will reconstruct and lengthen on and off ramps and will also replace the Ladd Road bridge spanning the interstate.

The ramp modifications will give traffic more distance to accelerate and decelerate while entering or exiting the interstate.

Boyd explained the modifications as a “big safety improvement, especially for trucks.”

The work will continue

through the spring of 2020.

“While there will be daytime work, I - 35 lane closures will be limited to the overnight hours between 8 p.m. and 5 a.m.,” Boyd said, adding the contractor will be required to have all lanes open to traffic during the OU-Texas weekend.

“It’s also important to note that the Ladd Road bridge will be closed beginning Monday,” he continued.

Traffic will be detoured to either State Highway 74 south at Goldsby or Johnson Road.

The Oklahoma Transportation Commission awarded the \$9 million contract to Silver Star Construction of Moore in June.

Did lobbying efforts influence spending on school panic buttons?

A \$3 million taxpayer-funded program will soon give schools across the state access to a relatively untested “panic button” app that can alert authorities and staff if there is an active shooter, fire or emergency in the school.

Funding for the Rave Panic Button app was largely approved behind the scenes this year. Although it was not included in the state Education Department’s budget requests, lawmakers passed funding for the program through a line item in the department’s 2020 budget allocation.

In addition to the \$3 million price tag, the app comes with recurring maintenance fees, expected to be \$2 million for two years, according to an Education Department spokeswoman. The department will pick up that cost. Districts can choose whether to use the system.

There was a bill this year to direct school districts to implement a panic button alert system by Sen. Nathan Dahm, R-Broken Arrow, but it stalled during the legislative session.

Ethics Commission reports show company officials were busy lobbying state leaders shortly before the budget deal was finalized.

Rave Mobile Safety, a Massachusetts-based company that makes the app, employs a lobbyist at the State Capitol — the same lobbyist who represents the Oklahoma Sheriff’s Association, which voted to endorse the program in March.

The lobbyist, Steve Edwards, reported purchasing meals for a number of state lawmakers, but two stand out: a \$52 dinner on May 21 with three key Education Department staffers: state Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister, Chief of Staff Phil Bacharach and Chief of Government Affairs Carolyn Thompson, records show.

He also reported spending more than \$50 on a dinner with Hofmeister a month earlier, on April 17.

In a statement, the department defended the lobbyist meals.

Hofmeister regularly meets with representatives of businesses and nonprofits, said Steffie Corcoran, a department spokeswoman. She also toured the Norman 9-1-1 center along with state legislators to see how Norman schools has implemented the Rave system.

“We are excited about how the Rave system will significantly enhance school safety.

“Although the department did not request this in our budget, we understand why legislators included a line item to implement a mobile safety app for schools,” she said.

The panic button is a cell phone app that will be available to staff at every school in the state. The \$3 million provides access to all school districts,

Oklahoma senators split on Washington budget bill

Oklahoma’s two U.S. senators – Republicans Jim Inhofe and James Lankford – split their votes on a two-year-budget bill that President Trump quickly signed into law, and Inhofe’s provisions on modernizing the McClellan-Kerr Arkansas River Navigation System and authorizing funding for other key projects advanced as part of a huge highway bill.

Approved by a Senate vote of 67 to 28, H.R. 3877, the budget bill would revive the current appropriations process, avoid another government shutdown and severe spending cuts and lift the debt limit. It increases defense spending from \$716 billion in the current fiscal year to \$740.5 billion in fiscal year 2021 and nondefense spending from \$605 billion to \$634.5 billion during that same time period.

For Inhofe, the chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, the top issue was the significant boost in spend-

ing for national defense.

“Passing this defense budget deal is the right thing to do — for our troops, for our veterans and for the American people,” he said. “Providing sufficient funding for our military and eliminating the threat of sequestration for good are absolutely necessary for our military to have the budgetary stability and predictability they so desperately need.”

For Lankford, the main issue was the increase in spending and suspending the nation’s debt limit.

“At \$22 trillion in debt, even the most conservative of budget proposals include debt ceiling increases, but those moments must be used to confront the serious fiscal challenges facing our nation’s future,” he said.

“We should have pursued a plan that includes a long-term proposal to address both our immediate fiscal challenges and a plan that ultimately consists of a way to pay down the debt increases.”

Trump tweeted his response to such claims coming from his own party.

“Budget Deal is phenomenal for our Great Military, our Vets, and Jobs, Jobs, Jobs! Two year deal gets us past the Election,” he tweeted. “Go for it Republicans, there is always plenty of time to CUT!”

Senate joins House in annual August recess

The Senate vote on the budget agreement was the last roll call for the month as senators

joined members of the House for their annual August Recess.

Both chambers are scheduled to be out of session until after Labor Day. Once the appropriations process for fiscal year 2020 gets back on track in September, one closely watched factor will be how the new budget figures will be applied to specific programs within agencies.

Trump promotes largest transportation act in history

Trump also used Twitter to promote the \$287-billion, five-year S. 2302, “America’s Transportation Infrastructure Act of 2019,” that came out of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee on a 21-0.

“Do I hear the beautiful word, BIPARTISAN?” the president tweeted. “Get it done. I am with you!”

Inhofe described the bill’s \$4.2 billion for Oklahoma as the “largest amount of funding provided for highway reauthorization legislation in history.”

According to the information provided by the senator’s office, the bill would make funding available for key projects such as Interstate 44/U.S. 75 in Tulsa; Interstate 40/ Interstate 44, Oklahoma City; U.S. 270, Woodward; U.S. 81, Chickasha.

Inhofe promoted his provisions to amend existing freight programs to allow Oklahoma flexibility to modernize the

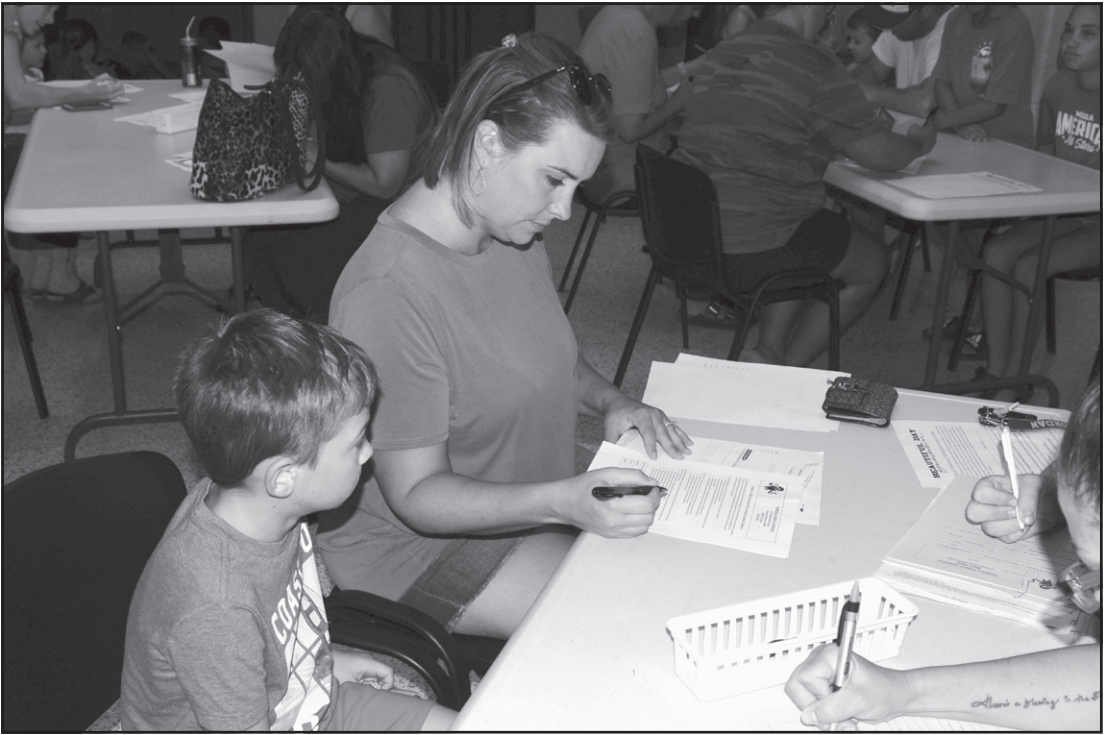

Now is the time to begin planning for your fall garden

Despite the fact that Oklahomans are just getting into the heat of the summer, gardening enthusiasts need to be planning for their fall garden crops. Some of the best quality garden vegetables are produced and harvested during the fall season when warm, sunny days are followed by cool, humid nights.

Under these climatic conditions, plant metabolism is low; therefore, more of the food manufactured by the plant becomes a high-quality vegetable product.

To ensure a bountiful harvest in the fall, gardeners need to start getting ready now.

As with any garden, adequate soil preparation, available garden space, selected plantings, space for plantings and obtaining the quantity and varieties of seed must be taken into consideration.

Some crops are more easily grown when seeds are planted early, then transplanting the seedlings to the garden at a later time.

Transplants and seeds can be planted in the garden in mid-July through September. Keep in mind that the time of planting is dependent upon the length of time required to produce the crop.

Seeds left over from the spring planting can be used if the seeds were stored in a cool, dry location or in a refrigerator or freezer. When gardeners are ready to plant the seeds, the seeds need to be soaked overnight. This will speed up germination and seedling emergence.

Cowpea beans, pole beans, cilantro, sweet corn, eggplant, peppers, pumpkin, squash, broccoli, carrots, parsnip and tomatoes all can be planted in mid- to late-July.

Lima beans, cucumbers, beets, cabbage, cauliflower, collards, Irish potatoes, leaf lettuce, green peas, radish, rutabaga, Swiss chard and turnips should be planted sometime between early-August and mid-

September.

Soil preparation for fall gardens is just as important as it is for the gardens you planted in the spring.

Modifying or improving the soil prior to and during the gardening season is vital for

a successful garden. Various fertilizer elements are necessary for plant growth and can be easily applied.

However, other aspects of

Chickasaw Nation Election Secretary Rita Loder announced results of the July 30 general election.

A runoff election for Tishomingo District Seat 2 will be scheduled between Derrick Priddy of Sulphur, who received 649 votes, and Bradley Steven Woods of Sulphur, who received 519 votes. The winner of the runoff election will fill the vacant seat resulting from the retirement of Tim Colbert of Sulphur.

Candidates Scott Clark of Mill Creek and Robert Kelly Tucker of Sulphur received 251 and 201 votes, respectively.

Pickens District Seat 3

incumbent Linda Briggs of Marietta received 1,735 votes to defeat challenger Michael T. Watson of Ardmore who received 622 votes.

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby will remain in office for another four-year term.

Governor Anoatubby and Lt. Governor-elect Chris Anoatubby were officially elected by a one-vote margin when no challengers had filed at the close of the election filing period on June 5.

Pontotoc District Seat 5 incumbent legislator Lisa Johnson Billy of Lindsay will retain her seat as no challengers filed for the position.

Panola District Seat 1 incumbent Beth Alexander of Hendrix will also retain her seat as no challengers filed for the position.

Supreme Court Seat 1 incumbent Mark Colbert of Ardmore received no challengers and will retain his position.

Elected officials will take the oath of office Tuesday, October 1.

We stand with Israel

The United States has been a long-time friend and ally of the Jewish state of Israel. For decades, our country has rightly supported the nation of Israel as one of our greatest allies on the international stage.

But in recent years, Israel has been subject to an increasing amount of unfair criticisms.

Since its inception, Israel is a shining example of western civilization and democracy in a region of the world that has been characterized by chaos and terror for years.

The Middle Eastern countries and terrorist organizations that heap so much scorn upon Israel would certainly benefit if they followed Israel's example.

However, many in this part of the world simply despise western values.

Additionally, Israel has been an indispensable ally in the war on terror.

The unfair criticisms hurled at Israel stem from land disputes with the Palestinians.

While I certainly sympathize

with Palestinians who want a peaceful solution to their disagreement with Israel, we cannot forget the influence that the terrorist organization of Hamas—who is funded by the Iranian government, the world's largest state sponsor of terrorism—exerts on the Palestinians.

Just recently, a senior Hamas official even went as far as saying that Palestinians across the world have a duty to kill all Jews. Israelis have been supportive of a two-state solution with a sovereign Palestinian state, but as long as Hamas continues to target civilians, including women and children, Israel has every right to defend itself.

Last month, we passed a resolution in the U.S. House of Representatives condemning the anti-Semitic Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement, which is designed to destroy Israel's economy.

Leaders of the BDS movement have repeatedly refused to distance themselves from Hamas. Generally speaking,

people around the world who participate in the movement refuse to do business with companies from Israel.

While I of course supported the resolution to condemn the BDS movement, I was disappointed that the measure was simply non-binding words.

Rather than etch anti-BDS sentiment into policy like the Senate has done in a bipartisan fashion, we simply condemned it.

The Senate passed a bill earlier this year by a margin of 77-23, that actually puts some teeth on the condemnation.

It is not—as some people have suggested—an infringement on the freedom of speech. The legislation does not prohibit people or companies from participating in BDS either. It simply allows states and local governments to refuse to do business with those who participate in BDS.

In fact, courts have ruled that the U.S. government

Our Views

Time to recognize

An editorial by the National Newspaper Association World War II correspondent Ernie Pyle died during the invasion of Okinawa in 1945. In his pocket was a draft of his last column, "On Victory in Europe." He wrote, "...the companionship of two and a half years of death and misery is a spouse that tolerates no divorce. Such companionship finally becomes a part of one's soul, and it cannot be obliterated."

He had returned to his home after brushes with death while covering the war in Europe. But he was haunted by the untold stories on the Japanese warfront and so back he went.

He died from machine gun fire in an area that had been considered safe. No one could say he was ready to die. Indeed, he hated the fact that he had to go back. But the troops and the nation were counting on him. He knew and feared the danger, but duty propelled him back to the fight so he could tell America about the men and women at war.

That devotion to duty has been understood by journalists across America throughout our nation's history. Like first responders, journalists run toward danger. Some lose their lives.

But the greatest recent loss of journalists on American soil was not during the heat of battle. It happened on June 28, 2018, when five newspaper employees were gunned down in their offices at the Capital-Gazette, in Annapolis, Maryland. The shooter was apprehended. Law enforcement officers said he held a grudge against the paper for its coverage.

That announcement was chilling. It strikes at every reporter, editor and publisher who has presented unpopular information to readers and viewers. Whether it is a story of public corruption, a drunk-driving arrest or even something as simple as a house foreclosure, someone often wants to keep that information out of the paper. That we have reached a point in our nation's history where journalists at work are receiving training on surviving a shooter would surprise and dismay a hardened wartime correspondent like Pyle. He probably would say that is not the nation he went to war to protect and inform.

We agree. That is why it is time to recognize, with sadness and heavy hearts, those who lost their lives because they were trying to tell us the stories that make us a democracy: The five Capital-Gazette employees — Gerald Fischman, Rob Hiaasen, John McNamara, Rebecca Smith and Wendi Winters; Jamal Khashoggi, who was killed in the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul; Mike McCormick and Philip Aaron Smeltzer, who died covering tropical storm Alberto for WYFF in North Carolina; and others deserve our thanks and our respect.

That is why it is time for the Fallen Journalists Memorial in Washington, D.C. to be built entirely without taxpayer dollars. The memorial requires Congressional authorization to be placed on federal land in Washington, D.C.

Legislation sponsored in the House by Reps. Tom Cole, R-OK and Grace Napolitano, D-CA; and in the Senate by Benjamin Cardin, D-MD, and Rob Portman, R-OH, will give the Fallen Journalists Memorial Foundation a green light to begin planning for the memorial. It would be a blessing if, by the time the memorial is built, there are no new names to add to it.

This newspaper believes it is time to recognize the sacrifice of journalists killed in the line of duty. We call upon our Members of Congress to add their names to the legislation introduced by Cole, Napolitano, Cardin and Portman and we urge you to ask them to sign onto this worthy effort.

“Redshirting” my 9 year old

DEAR ELI: I have a 9 year old who plays baseball and basketball. Two different coaches have urged me to hold him back a grade. They explained how, if I held him back now, it would be beneficial for his high school career.

I think this idea is ridiculous. The emotional distress it could cause him doesn't compare to the "what ifs" of his high school sports career. I'm curious to hear your thoughts on this. — CURIOUS SPORTS MOM

DEAR SPORTS MOM: There's a term for what you're talking about; it's called "redshirting." And no, I don't think you should subject your 9 year old to this sort of crazy.

Redshirting is, however, on the rise across the country. Redshirting is the practice of holding a child back in school for the purpose of gaining an advantage in sports. In other words, let your kid grow a year, and she'll be the one scoring all the points, hitting homeruns, and spiking the volleyball down the younger, smaller girls' throats.

I'm going to confess something now: I was redshirted.

But it happened in college, which is where the term originates. College. Not elementary school or middle school.

The problem with this new form of "redshirting" is that it

occurs during critical developmental years for children: previous to kindergarten or deep in the throes of middle school.

According to Michael McArdle, a Learning Research Specialist, the absolute highest use of energy in the human brain occurs around the age of four (right before kindergarten). So, holding your son back a year to let him grow larger and stronger, will most definitely effect his cognitive development. You cannot put a child's brain on hold.

Along the same lines, when a child reaches middle school, his brain isn't buzzing quite as fervently as it was previous to kindergarten, but something else is forming, something equally important — his social life.

Yanking a kid away from all the friends he's grown up with is dangerous. Nonprofit publisher Ed Week released research recently that said retaining a child at any grade level typically yields little or no positive effects, but retention can lead to academic boredom. It can also hurt their self-esteem.

Are there instances where "redshirting" may be beneficial? Sure.

If a teacher or principal alerts you that your child is falling behind in their classwork, or his maturity isn't on par with

his peers, then you should think deeply about holding your son back. But doing so in order to gain an advantage in sports? Especially at the ripe age of 9 years old?

That's crazy. And it's truly shocking to me that two different coaches have advised you in this manner. It's scary. And here's why:

At the core of every human being is the yearning to belong. To fit in. To be a part of a team. Some of the sweetest memories from my playing career happened in locker rooms or on buses, places other than the glory of the field.

The camaraderie forged through athletics is what makes it special. In many ways, it's why sports even matter at all — they bring us together.

So I would urge you, with as much conviction as possible, to think long and hard about redshirting your son. In the life of a 9 year old, there is nothing more important than friendship. Nothing more essential than being a part of the team, his team, the friends he's grown up with.

and Oklahoma is the third state to implement the service in schools statewide. The others are Arkansas and Delaware.

The panic button works like this: A teacher or other staff member uses the app to dial 911, which simultaneously alerts authorities and on-site staff of an active shooter, fire or other emergency.

The app gives a 911 operator immediate access to the caller's specific location, as well as building floor plans and points of entry. The Rave Mobile Safety website claims this enhanced coordination saves time and lives.

It also allows the caller to text 9-1-1 if they are afraid or unable to speak, according to the Oklahoma Sheriff's Association.

The program is largely untested, and there have been some concerns over reports of the app's failure to notify emergency responders or of false alarms, such as one that occurred at an Arkansas elementary school in 2015.

But law enforcement in areas where it's being implemented, including one Oklahoma district and individual districts in New York, California and

Florida, have found success using the system.

Norman Public Schools has implemented the app and has so far used it several times for medical situations, said Alesha Leemaster, a district spokeswoman. She said the app's immediate, consistent communication with key people improves response time, which is critical.

All public and private K-12 schools in Michigan's Eaton County use the Rave app, which was funded by a state school safety grant. Eaton County Central Dispatch Director Michael Armitage says the panic button system has proven to be useful in various situations since it was implemented in 2015.

"We encourage use any time they're contacting 911," Armitage said. Schools in his area have used it when there's been a threat outside the school, such as a person with a weapon. But medical emergencies are the most common.

Armitage says the app has brought 911 into the planning process for school safety, building a stronger relationship between emergency services and school administrators.

With school shootings in the U.S. becoming more common and deadly, state and local leaders are searching for ways to assuage fears of violence and keep students and teachers safe.

To do that, many schools are investing in products and technologies. School security has grown to an estimated \$2.7 billion market and is expected to continue growing an average 1 percent per year, according to IHS Markit, an analytics firm.

But there's little evidence these technologies work to prevent or mitigate violence in schools.

Last year The Washington Post surveyed schools across the country that had experienced a shooting since 2012; half replied there was nothing they could have done, and several schools emphasized the need to build relationships with students, who often hear about threats before teachers do.

McClellan-Kerr navigation system and apply for grants designed for projects of regional importance.

Despite the unanimous vote in the committee, a significant challenge remains on exactly how Congress will come up with the money to fund the bill.

Outside groups, including pro-business business organizations, have been pushing for an increase in the fuel tax, a traditional go-to source that has not been hiked since the 1990s, but key lawmakers have not endorsed that idea.

So far, indexing that tax to inflation and eliminating exemptions on electric cars have generated interest, but even supporters concede that approach will not generate the type of money fast enough to fund such a huge bill.

Many have cited the lack of a funding source as the main reason Trump's campaign promise of a trillion-dollar infrastructure package has failed

to gain traction.

The existing highway act does not expire for more than a year, and the House is not expected to advance its bill for several months.

At a recent State Leadership Day held by the White House, a group of county, city and tribal officials from Oklahoma and four other states heard remarks from Vice President Mike Pence, and a small group of them met with President Trump.

Grant County Commissioner Cindy Bobbitt was one of those invited into the Oval Office meeting.

Bobbitt said transportation was the top issue she raised during her brief comments to Trump, adding she also thanked him for his administration's on-going efforts to replace the Obama-era Waters of the United States regulation, which has been the subject of multiple legal challenges and remains unpopular among farmers and local and state officials.

"This administration wants to work with our counties," said Bobbitt, a Republican. "We are at the table, and they are listening to us."

According to the agenda provided by the White House, other states represented at the meeting, one of several held by the administration, included Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska. Topics included disaster recovery and infrastructure.

Parents should make eye exams part of back-to-school plans

Optometric physicians are reminding parents that all students should receive comprehensive vision exams before the start of the school year, especially as digital learning devices become more common and children's screen time increases.

Smart phones, tablets and computers can cause a condition known as "Computer Vision Syndrome," or CVS. Symptoms of CVS include eye strain, headaches, fatigue, burned or tired eyes, loss of focus, blurred vision, double vision or head and neck pain.

Nationally, parents report that two-thirds of all children do their homework on electronic devices which can lead to CVS. Furthermore, undiagnosed

vision problems are extremely common (approximately one-in-four children has an untreated vision condition) and can cause both academic and behavioral problems as well as physical conditions like frequent headaches.

Approximately 40 percent of all children with learning disabilities have vision problems.

Many simple vision screenings performed in schools or in a pediatrician's office test basic distance visual acuity (ie "is a child 'near-sighted' or 'far-sighted'?"), without also testing the wide variety of vision conditions and problems that affect learning and schoolwork.

Eye doctors are using the back-to-school season to remind parents that comprehen-

sive vision exams are the best way to identify and correct these issues.

Oklahoma Association of Optometric Physicians President Dr. Selina McGee said that a comprehensive vision exam should be part of every student's back-to-school checklist.

"Many times, a student who is having problems reading and learning has an untreated vision problem," said Dr. McGee. "That's why it's so important for parents to take their kids to see an optometrist every year for a comprehensive vision screening. Getting these kids treated and back on track is one of the best parts of my job."

soil improvement may not be as easily accomplished. Organic matter needs to be incorporated into sandy soil to help reduce the drying of the soil and improve nutrient availability.

Heavy clay soil combined with organic matter will improve soil aeration, water absorption and drainage.

Keep in mind that when conditions are favorable for growing vegetables, they also are favorable for grass and weeds. Mulch the soil or cultivate when the grass and weed plans are small and more easily eradicated.

A fall garden is a great way to maintain fresh quality produce. Gardens do take time and effort, but the results are more than worth it.

Sen. Mary Boren receives approval for interim studies

State Sen. Mary Boren has received approval for four interim studies ahead of the 2020 legislative session, including two requested with House Republicans.

Boren says she’s requested studies on farm-to-table reforms, affordable housing initiatives, and joint studies on textbook adoption and funding reforms and on solar energy in schools.

“Each of these issues represents areas of concern identified by citizens in Senate District 16,” said Boren, D-Norman. “These studies will give us an opportunity to take an in depth look at these topics and help us find ways of empowering

Oklahomans with solutions that reflect our best values.”

Each approved study is assigned to the committee that has oversight of the area of law related to the request. It is up to the chair of each of those committees to schedule meetings.

“I’ve already heard back from the Senate Agriculture and Wildlife Committee’s chair, and my study on farm-to-table will be given a hearing in October,” Boren said. “We’ve seen an increasing trend of more restaurants and farms wanting to be able to take advantage of farm-to-table, which gives diners the opportunity to enjoy fresh, local produce. My goal is to identify any unnecessary barriers or red tape, then work to pass reforms so we can better promote farm-to-table, better supporting local restaurants, farms and poultry operations.”

Boren’s affordable housing study has been assigned to the Senate Finance Committee.

“Home ownership makes a community stronger, but we also know there is a need for more affordable housing. There are many Oklahomans who work hard at full-time jobs that pay low wages.

“We want to identify what the need is and what affordable housing means for the working poor and look at initiatives that the state and local communities could utilize to help close that affordable housing gap, such as incentives or enterprise zones,”

Boren said.

The joint study on textbook adoption and funding reforms has been assigned to the Senate Education Committee.

“There is a significant need for publishers to create content more aligned to Oklahoma curriculum. I am hearing from educators that material from other states doesn’t always mesh with the material we require our schools to teach,” Boren said. “That’s especially problematic with so many emergency certified teachers who don’t have the curriculum development training those with education degrees have.”

The joint study on solar energy in schools has been assigned to the Senate Energy Committee.

“As we work to identify efficiencies that will enable us to put more of our education dollars back into the classroom, we need to be looking at sustainable, renewable energy sources. Purcell just built a new middle school building without increasing their energy costs thanks to the use of solar panels,” Boren said. “This clean energy source can help generate savings that can go directly into the classroom.”

All Senate interim studies must be completed by November 8. Meeting notices will be posted at www.oksenate.gov.

“State 4-H Roundup is the culmination of the 4-H year and provides an opportunity to recognize the hard work and dedication club members across the state have put in over the past year,” said Jeff Sallee, Oklahoma 4-H science and technology state specialist. “We have something for everyone, including friendly competitions, district rallies, campaign speeches, educational workshops, dances and more.”

4-H’ers had an opportunity to participate in a variety of competitions, including Livestock Quiz Bowl, 4-H Food Showdown, Clover Quiz Bowl, Land Judging, Fashion Revue, Job Readiness, Tractor Contest, Vocal Contest and 4-H Has Talent. 4-H Roundup is steeped in tradition and recognizing and honoring club members has been happening since day one. The announcement of the two State 4-H Hall of Fame inductees has been a highlight State 4-H Roundup and of the Honor Night Assembly for many years.

Another time-honored tradition is the recognition of former 4-H members who have made significant contributions to their communities since they completed their 4-H membership. This year’s 4-H Alumni Award winner was Becky Walker, who currently serves as the 4-H educator in Pontotoc County.

During the Honor Night Assembly, club members walked away with more than \$100,000 in educational scholarships, thanks to the generous donors to the Oklahoma 4-H Foundation.

There was an extra celebration following the Honor Night Assembly as the delegates and adults in attendance celebrated the 80th year State 4-H Roundup which took place in Gallagher/Iba Arena. Starting in 1921 with the very first State 4-H Roundup, events took place in tents on the campus of what was then Oklahoma A&M College. A storm blew in one year in the mid-1930s and toppled the tents.

In light of the storm, and A&M students needing more space on campus, Oklahoma legislators were asked for funds to build a field house that would be called the 4-H and Student Activities Building. The build-

ing was officially dedicated June 1, 1939 during Roundup and each State 4-H Roundup since that time has taken place in what is now Gallagher/Iba Arena.

Another event that is starting to become a tradition was Pete’s Picnic. 4-H Roundup always has been a way to introduce high school students to what OSU has to offer in the way of higher education. During Pete’s Picnic, academic departments and clubs from all of the colleges on campus offered information on majors, classes, work/study options and other highlights.

Cynda Clary, associate dean with OSU’s Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, said it is important for potential students to discover more about what OSU can offer.

“4-H plays an important role in encouraging and training young people to be service-driven leaders. I want each of those 4-H’ers to know there are many career paths in agriculture and natural resources where their enthusiasm, intelligence and work ethic can help change the world for the better,” Clary said. “Pete’s Picnic was a great opportunity to meet our future leaders and share that important career message.”

The Capstone Assembly was full on fun and excitement as 4-H’ers geared up to close out the 98th State 4-H Roundup. Oklahoma 4-H’ers did themselves proud with their Change for Change project. This is a project in which club members collect spare change all year long and donate it to the Children’s Hospital Foundation. The group set a lofty goal of \$20,000 this year. Their effort paid off as they surpassed their goal with a total of \$22,765.

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Enjoying summer without the bite of tickborne illness

Summertime is in full force, and with the warmer temperatures come opportunities for outdoor adventures... and tick bites.

In Oklahoma, there is a wide range of tick species, each of which can carry serious diseases, such as Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Lyme disease, Ehrlichiosis and Tularemia. In fact, there has been an uptick in tickborne illnesses, with 59,349 Americans diagnosed in 2017 alone.

Of course, staying indoors is not an option, especially when Oklahoma's beautiful outdoors are beckoning. So, how do you keep yourself and your family safe from tickborne illnesses while enjoying camping, swimming or even working in the yard?

According to health experts, the best ways to avoid tickborne illnesses include using insect repellent that contains DEET, wearing closed-toed shoes and clothing that fully covers the arms and legs when hiking through grassy areas and checking your skin for ticks every few hours.

In my practice as a dermatologist, I've seen too many patients become very ill from

tickborne illness, some of whom have had lasting effects.

To help people uncover possible infections quickly, my wife Rachel and I developed TestMyTick.com, a service that screens ticks for more than 14 possible diseases, including Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

The service is free to people throughout the state from July 1, 2019, to July 1, 2020, thanks to a grant from the Oklahoma State Medical Association (OSMA) Foundation.

If you or a loved one are bitten, be sure to remove the tick quickly and place it in a sealed bag to be tested for diseases. Then visit TestMyTick.com and click on the tab at the top that says "Order Tick Test." The coupon code for free testing is "PREPAID."

The testing is confidential and results are emailed within a few days after the tick is received. If your tick has a positive result, keep in mind that even a positive tick test doesn't necessarily mean that the disease has been transferred to you or your loved one. However, it does offer an important tool that can be used if symptoms develop and

will help your physician with treatment.

In addition to screening for potential diseases, the service also provides researchers with vital information found in areas throughout the state, all while keeping user information secure.

The goal of the tick testing mail-in program and information site is to save lives as well as to provide increased access to professional tick testing for physicians, veterinarians and the public.

Lastly, and most importantly, if you have already experienced a tick bite and no longer have the tick, be on the lookout for problematic symptoms, including fever and chills, joint pain, muscle aches, fatigue, a rash or a bullseye-shaped lesion around the bitten area.

If you experience these symptoms after receiving a tick bite, see your family doctor as soon as possible.

Now, enjoy the outdoors and don't forget to save those ticks!

The film follows a Chinese family who, when they discover their beloved Nai Nai or Grandmother (Shuzhen Zhao) has only a short while left to live, decide to keep her in the dark and schedule an impromptu wedding to gather before she passes.

Billi (Awkwafina), feeling like a fish out of water in her home country, struggles with the family's decision to hide the truth from her grandmother. This is a movie I've been looking forward to for a few weeks now.

Over the last month or so I have heard nothing but praise for this little film. And after watching it myself, I can definitely say the movie's acclaim wasn't without warrant.

This is a beautiful film. Though I suppose I should mention one thing upfront that might make this movie a non-starter for some.

Nearly all the dialogue in this film is in Chinese. Of course there are English subtitles throughout, but if you're someone who has a hard time keeping up with subtitled dialogue, this movie probably won't be the best experience for you.

However, if you can get past the foreign language aspect of the film, you're in for a very thoughtful, sincere, and surprisingly funny family drama.

I know, a movie about the looming death of a beloved family member doesn't exactly sound like the breeding grounds of comedy. Regardless though, this movie is packed with funny scenes.

It's the kind of humor that comes from ordinary, or even mundane family interactions.

There's such a natural chemistry between all these char-

acters. There's so many little moments sprinkled in that make these characters feel like a family.

Not just in the dialogue, but non-vocal things like the playful hitting, or Billi walking up behind her mother and resting her chin on her shoulder really go a long way to make the family in this film feel genuine.

Then of course there's the actors themselves, who do a wonderful job bringing this story to life.

Surprisingly, the breakout performance of the film wasn't the most well known of the cast, Awkwafina, though she does do quite well here. It's actually the grandma of the movie, Shuzhen Zhao.

She is absolutely perfect here as the film's Nai Nai. She's just so dang likeable in this wonderful grandmotherly way and has this amazing chemistry with the rest of the cast, especially Awkwafina.

The scenes between grandmother and granddaughter are easily the most touching moments in this film. I absolutely loved every minute the two of them were on screen together.

Speaking of Awkwafina, this movie has been called her break into dramatic movies, as she's mostly been pigeonholed into the role of the eccentric Asian lady in many comedies. Roles she exceeds at, granted, but still typecasting nonetheless.

But despite being out of her typical wheelhouse, Awkwafina does quite well here.

She's not overly dramatic, though her character is devastated by the seemingly inevitable death of her "Nai Nai." It's hard to describe, but the way she acts just feels natural. It's how I imagine someone would deal with this difficult situation in real life.

And I suppose if anyone would know what it's like to deal with the looming death of their grandma, it'd be the film's

writer and director, Lulu Wang, because she faced this exact scenario in real life.

Just like in the film, Wang's actual grandmother was diagnosed with stage IV lung cancer and given only three months to live. And just like in the movie, she was sworn to keep her Nai Nai's diagnosis secret from her, despite her passionate objections.

From an American perspective, it's kind of a shocking story. I mean, how could you keep a person's inevitable mortality away from them?

But this film does a good job explaining, and even justifying this differing perspective on death. I don't necessarily agree with it, but by the end of the film I did see where the family here was coming from.

I loved seeing this glimpse into another culture, especially since it's one that isn't often highlighted in American made movies.

This is by far one of the best movies I've seen all year. Everything about it felt so dang genuine. You can't help but love these people.

It made me laugh, and it left me with tears streaming down my face. If you can get past some subtitles, and maybe a bit of culture shock, this film is a must see.

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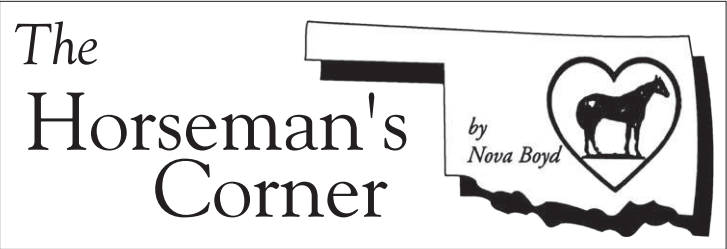

land. Chickasaw people continue to carry on the tradition today,” Billy said. “All of our speakers have something in common, they have all served, put on the uniform of the United States military.” Governor Anoatubby, a veteran of the U.S. Army National Guard, took the lectern to address the group. He led the gathering in a moment of silence to recognize Chickasaw warriors who have passed within the last year. “These individuals sacrificed their lives for the freedoms we enjoy today. There is a price for freedom and their sacrifices are not in vain,” Governor Anoatubby said. “These men and women lived to defend freedom and protect their fellow citizens. We honor their sacrifices and are thankful for all they have done.” He said it is important to honor our veterans, who are an exceptional group of men and women. He then extended thanks to the veterans and service members in attendance. “In defending this great country of ours, you’ve con-

tinued the Chickasaw tradition of bravery and service. You’ve kept the Chickasaw warrior spirit alive,” Governor Anoatubby said. Rebecca Owens, who retired as a U.S. Navy master chief petty officer after 30 years of service to her country, spoke about “Why We Serve.” Among the reasons she discussed were family traditions, role models, community, selflessness and protecting what and who we love. “Many of you may have had family members who served and joining was a continuation of a tradition,” Owens said. “I can certainly relate to that since I had paternal and maternal family members who were in the military.” She said there is a feeling of awe when she looks at old photographs of family members in the military. They were her personal super heroes. One family member in particular, her grandmother, had a large impact. “My female role model was my Chickasaw grandmother. Her name was Oteka Wires. She was in the Army where she later met my grandfather and they married,” Owens said. “Seeing my grandmother in uniform left a lasting imprint on me. These young memories and stories I heard sparked a flame in me and probably did with you as well. They fill us with the sense we can do anything and be anything if we set our sights on it,” she said. She said she believes we all share an inherent purpose to serve and be of service. “It’s in our blood as Chickasaw people. We know we are stronger when we work together... We joined and served because we possess a warrior spirit,” Owens said. Justin Underwood led a Q&A panel titled “Chickasaw Warriors in Action, How We Serve.” It consisted of veterans from different backgrounds sharing experiences and how they continue to serve communities and fellow service members. Panelists included Shena Goforth, Ray Orphan, Teresa Reams and Larry Paul. Other highlights of the

event included a musical tribute to each branch of service, panel discussions and a demonstration by the Chickasaw Dance Troupe. Opening ceremonies included an invocation by Rev. Gene Anoatubby, posting of colors and the Pledge of Allegiance. The renowned reputation of Chickasaw warriors is centuries old. Ancient Chickasaws were known as a warrior nation that formed societies to fiercely participate in battle. These warrior societies were ingrained into the Chickasaw way of life. The tradition of the Chickasaw warrior has continued to present day, where Chickasaw men and women have answered the call to serve our nation in every branch of the military and fought for their country on numerous battlefields throughout the world. the intra-squads and practice they’ll set themselves up well for games.” The Warriors return starters Hope Madden, Emma Curry, Kaydence Andrews and Mattie Richardson. Madden is slated for first base and Curry will get a shot at the infield after playing in the outfield last season, according to the coach. I appreciate the veterans and their families who have done so much for this United States of America. Without the sacrifices the men and women who served in our military have made for us, this country would not have continued to survive.

When we look at the many countries around the world where people have no control over their lives and face hunger every day, our country looks pretty good. I also would like to take this opportunity to say that without the financial support from the people we serve what we do would not be possible.

The number of veterans and surviving spouses who visit us each Tuesday and Thursday morning in Norman continues to increase weekly. Every day more veterans and surviving spouses arrive than we can accommodate. Our goal is to assist the first 140 veterans each day. That number is being reached before our doors are opened at 4 a.m. or so.

Each day 30 to 50 veterans are asked to return on another Tuesday or Thursday morning. We are doing everything possible to provide services to every veteran who needs our assistance. Some of our volunteers have assisted veterans 14 hours or more on many days. As most of us are retired, those long days are more than we want to have.

We are looking to start bringing volunteers in from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to relieve some of those who began to work at 4 a.m. This might help us to accommodate more veterans and surviving spouses. For those of you who are late sleepers, that start time might be just

the ticket for you. Those interested in becoming a part of our group please contact Lora at (405) 550-8806 or stop by any Tuesday or Thursday morning.

Last week we assisted 325 veterans and surviving spouses with their VA claims and questions at our foundation. Many of them made their first trip to Norman from other states. There were so many from Texas that we told them that we were going to build a wall along the Red River! Seriously though, I am hoping some of the veterans who travel to Oklahoma will use our evidence-based claims system to help us make a difference for the veterans, and surviving spouses in their area.

This week we will try to track the number of out of state veterans who visit us for assistance. I'm curious to see what the percentage is and the different states they are from. One of the reasons we have so many people coming to see our volunteers is the sharing of Social Media and our e-mails that are forwarded to so many people. Each week this newsletter is sent to 15,000 of the veterans and spouses we have helped, and from there it is forwarded by you to others. We thank you for telling your friends about us and hope we can be of some help.

This week 37 veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. That group of men and women veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,416,749 per year. They will also be eligible to receive many other benefits from our state of Oklahoma with the biggest being the property tax exemption on their primary residence in our state.

Some of the other benefits they may be eligible to receive are two reduced cost auto tags, exemption of excise tax on a vehicle once every three years, and free hunting and fishing licenses. Our state supports all veterans and their families more than many others do.

Sixty-three veterans were awarded VA benefits from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$1,038,867 annually. One surviving spouse was approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and attendance based on their veteran's military service and will receive \$15,828 annually.

Surviving spouses whose veteran was not retired from the military may be eligible for the Champ-VA medical insurance if they are approved for DIC (when a veteran dies from a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to their service). We also see surviving spouses whose spouse's death certificate list a service-connected disability as a contributing condition.

One of the most important things that I can tell a veteran who has never filed a claim for benefits is it is much easier to help a surviving spouse of a veteran who died if they were receiving VA benefits. It bothers me a lot to see surviving spouses walk in our door with no chance of receiving VA benefits because their spouse

would not take the time to do so.

Many times, the veteran is the only one who knows where they traveled during their service, and the different types of chemicals, fumes, radiation or other types of things they may have been exposed to while in the military. We have been reading some of the medical studies that have been done linking hearing loss to heart disease and dementia. We have had cases approved where the veteran was service-connected for hearing loss and later died from either heart conditions or dementia. There are many ways we can help veterans and their families if they only knew about them.

Our organization is a 501(C)(3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles, or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.

You can also donate anytime online at dalekgrahamveteransfoundation.org or by mail at PO Box 592, Washington, OK 73093.

We have power wheelchairs and scooters that have been donated. If you know a veteran who needs one, please contact us.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at 1268 North Interstate Drive Norman, OK 73072. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m., and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready.

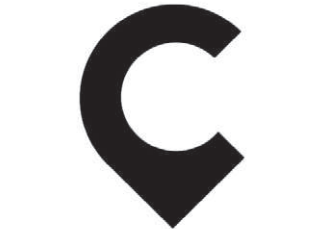

When the Lord pushes you in, swim fast!

Good day to all. Welcome to the “front porch.”

Recently we shared the story of a young man who courageously swam across a lake filled with alligators and snakes. Well, he may not have been all that “courageous.” One of his buddies pushed him in, so he didn’t have much of a choice. He had to do what he had to do.

That story reminded me of how it is with important tasks that sometimes get laid in our laps. The Lord, you know, will sometimes walk up to our desk, lay a humongous task in front of us, and say, “All right, put down whatever you’re doing. I’ve got a pretty big job for you.” Then He’ll walk off

before we have a chance to see that it’s a bit more than a “pretty big” job in our minds.

As soon as we realize what the job is, we holler after Him to protest. “Please don’t leave, Lord, let’s talk about this.”

But, you know, the Lord is good, and He’s good in ways we don’t always recognize. Sometimes His goodness is that He simply doesn’t give us a choice. The Lord doesn’t operate by the democratic system. We don’t all get a vote. He just pushes us into that lake and tells us to swim as fast as we can.

That’s how motivation sometimes works. It’s an important thing in life we call “providence” – and it’s one of the greatest aspects of the Lord’s

goodness.

Think back to some of the examples in the Bible of men who do great things only because the Lord takes them out to the edge of the lake and pushes them in when they least expect it.

Lot, remember, lingers in the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, and the Lord has to send angels to grab him by the hand to drag him out. Imagine that. Lot is deliberating about what he is going to do, not realizing that God is two inches away from sending down fire and brimstone.

Fortunately for Lot, the Lord

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

In last Sunday’s liturgy we caught a glimpse of two characters who, from the outside, look quite the same. Both men are working hard to procure a good life. The teacher who wrote the book of Ecclesiastes, Qoheleth, is the eternal pessimist, the cynic, who fears that all of his labors will turn to nothing.

“Vanity of vanities! All is vanity! What do people gain from all their toil under the sun?” (Eccl. 1:2-3). He will go on to say that even wisdom is of no use because it will one day be proven wrong. Wisdom is also but a “chasing after the wind” (Eccl. 1:17).

Jesus tells a parable of a man who also works hard and becomes wealthy, so much so that he builds bigger barns in which to store his grain. Since he is now so wealthy, why not live it up? Eat, drink and be merry. (Luke 12:13-21) But God had other plans and the man was struck down that very night.

One character represents the eternal pessimist, the cynic, who works hard but fears that all his labors will come to naught. What is the use, he asks? The second character also works hard but relies on his riches to grant him security. Now he need worry about nothing at all. We might call him

the eternal optimist.

Both Qoheleth and Jesus present similar solutions to the conundrums that these two men face. Qoheleth, the teacher, comes to realize that life is a mystery that cannot be solved. Bad things happen to good people and good things happen to bad people. Judgment and reward, in the end, is all in the hands of God. (Eccl. 12:13-14) Jesus reminds us that God’s plans are not always consistent with our plans. We had better be prepared for we never know when our time on

This is a sad time for our

country. We are working on the first year since 2016 with an average of more than one mass shooting per day. For more information of the details, see the data from the nonprofit Gun Violence Archive (GVA) on their website which tracks every mass shooting in the country: <https://www.gun-violencearchive.org/reports/mass-shooting>.

The GVA defines a mass shooting as any incident in which at least four people were shot, excluding the shooter. In 2019, there have been 22 incidents where four or more people were killed and seven or more people were injured. Since July 25, there has been a total of six shootings, with five massacres in which more than 100 people have been shot:

August 4: Dayton, Ohio, 10 people killed, 26 injured; in Chicago, Ill., one killed, seven injured.

August 3: El Paso, Texas, 22 killed, at least 24 injured. It has been the deadliest shooting of the year.

July 28: Gilroy Garlic Festival in the San Francisco Bay Area, four killed, 13 injured.

July 28: Chippewa Falls, WI, 6 dead, 2 injured.

July 27: Brooklyn, NY, 1 killed, 11 injured.

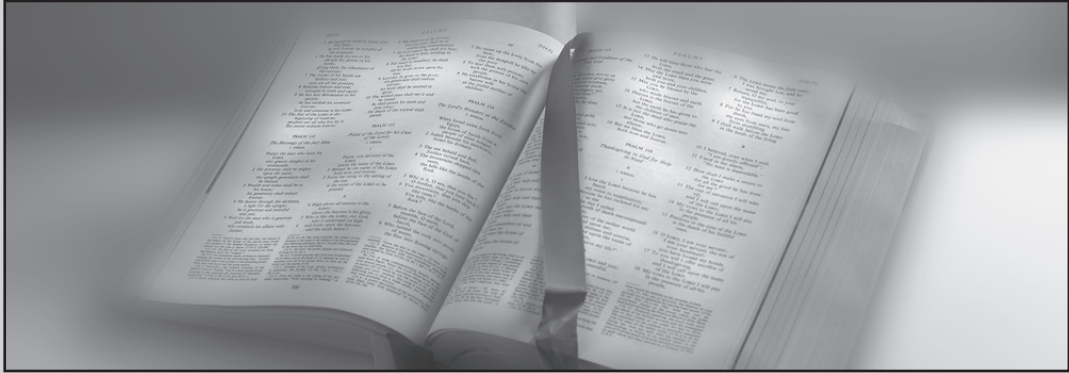
July 25: Canoga Park, CA, 4 dead, 2 injured.

Before the El Paso attack, the deadliest mass shooting of 2019 happened on May 31 in a municipal building in Virginia Beach, Va., where a former city employee killed 13 people and injured five.

Why do I quote all these statistics? I would like to shock you with how many human beings have either lost their lives or have been injured. It doesn’t matter if they are American, Hispanic, Asian, Canadian, or whatever nationality. Most are American, even if they are formerly from another country and are naturalized citizens.

It doesn’t matter if they are light skinned, brown skinned,

Going to Extremes

I was reading an article today with shocking dietary news. It that said that eating more fat can help with weight loss; it’s better to have regular milk and yogurt than the low-fat varieties; whole egg omelets are healthier than egg whites alone; and three to four cups of coffee per day cut the risks of Alzheimer’s, heart disease, and Parkinson’s. Don’t believe me? Check it out yourself, at <https://tinyurl.com/y62hchzh>.

These are all the opposite of the recommendations of a few years ago. I’m sure that in a little while, another report will come out, reversing everything in that article; I’m going to get in as much coffee as possible between now and then.

Often, what happens is that a scientist makes a measurement and writes an article to other scientists. Somebody else will summarize that, and stress only the newest part of the research; and then people will take that

and go overboard with it. Too many carbs make your blood sugar high? Let’s go to a zero-carb diet! If a little is good, a lot must be better, right? Usually, the truth is that moderation is best, and not either extreme.

The same thing happens in other areas of life. People began to change the Bible’s teaching on forgiveness, to the point that people believed that they could pay money before they went out and sinned, and get the forgiveness in advance for the sins they were planning to commit.

In case you’re wondering, “Get Out of Jail Free” cards come in Monopoly games, not Bibles. When people realized that “pay the priest” or “follow the ritual” isn’t what the Bible taught, they realized the importance of faith – but they went overboard, just like the dieticians.

Suddenly, the prominent teaching went from “all works

and no faith” to “all faith and no works.” Most religious groups today teach people to “say a little prayer” to be forgiven, not realizing that the words they’re praying were written in the 1950s, not in Bible times.

Jesus said that simply saying “Lord, Lord” isn’t enough, but rather that we need to do something - the will of God (Matthew 7:21). Jewell was publicly declared to be guilty. His mother was slandered. He was under 24 hour surveillance. His home was searched twice.

Three months later Jewell was exonerated and the real bomber identified. Jewell died at 44 years of age. His lawyer believed his death was in large part the result of his mistreatment by social media. We must always remember throwing rocks can kill and destroy. We should do unto others as if they were us.

yellow skinned, pink skinned, black skinned, tan skinned, or red skinned—they all bleed red blood. It doesn’t matter if they are Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, atheist, agnostic, or whatever religion. They are all children of God, Yahweh, or Allah even if they don’t know that name.

We are all brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ, even if he is seen as the Savior of Christians or as a prophet of Judaism, Islam, or another religion. It doesn’t matter if someone believes in Jesus—because we believe in him, we have to understand that Jesus believes in all of us, no matter who we are.

I remember a drawing that was published shortly after 9/11. Pictured in it were the burning Twin Towers of the World Trade Center, with clouds up above them. There

was a robed figure in the clouds, wiping tears from his eyes.

If you remember, it wasn’t just Americans killed on that day: it was the World Trade Center, with people from other countries, races, and religion. It didn’t matter who they were. They were all humans, and all were God’s children.

All of these killings are done out of hate. I’m not sure about you, but I profess to be a practicing Christian. As a result of that choice, Jesus has given us an example of loving all people, all humanity.

I have issues with immigration, with the use of assault rifles outside of war, with people not following the law of the land, the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, with a family having to work two or three jobs to make a living, with people not having enough to eat. There are too

many things that we need to do to solve these types of problems without getting so wrapped up in the business of hating.

I don’t know how to fix our world, but I know hate won’t do it. America is not the only place that is facing these issues and problems. But I do know that choosing to hate, talking hate, and doing hate is not the way to live. If you ask me what race I am, I’m human and an earthling. What are you, and what do you profess?

sees something good in him, something He can salvage. So, “the Lord being merciful unto him,” gives him a little nudge and gets him out of the city just in the nick of time. It really is that close. It makes us wonder how many times the Lord yanks us out of the fire just in the nick of time, and we don’t even know it (Genesis 19).

Then, think back to Moses and his initiation into the Lord’s work. Do you remember how excited he is to go to Pharaoh and tell him to let God’s people go? Well, again, he’s about as excited as we are to go to the dentist. I think I have purposely refrained from telling you this, but I’ve been to the dentist twice over the past six months for root canals. They are experiences I don’t necessarily like to bring up.

If the Lord were to speak to me right now and say, “Coach, I need you to go share the gospel

with your dentist,” I’m sure I’d want to say, “Lord, there are a lot of other people who need the gospel. If you don’t mind, send them. I really don’t even like walking into the dentist’s office.”

That’s kind of the way Moses reacts about going to Pharaoh to take on this big job. He has never even come close to doing anything like what the Lord proposes, and he lets the Lord know about it, too. As soon as God lays this great challenge on his desk, he goes through his Rolodex of excuses to explain to God why that doesn’t need to happen.

“Not so fast, Lord,” he says, in essence, “let’s slow it down a bit. First off, who am I to go to do that job? Not only that—who are you, Lord? The people don’t even know who you are, so they’re going to laugh me off the stage if I go to them and tell them God just spoke

to me. They’ll think I’m crazy. They’re not going to believe me, much less Pharaoh.”

“It doesn’t mean I don’t appreciate Your faith in me,” I can hear him say, “because I do. I appreciate it a lot, but, please, go find somebody else. There are a lot of people way more qualified for this job than I am. Besides all of that, you know I’m not even eloquent. Lord, you need an orator for a job like this. You need an Abraham. I’m not him, not by a long shot. You can’t take an Abrahamic-type job and give it to a Moses.”

So, what does the Lord do? I’m sure He shakes His head first, and then He does the very thing to Moses He often does for us to get us to do a job He has for us.

He pushes him into the lake and tells him to swim fast.

earth will be done.

Millard Fuller, the founder of Habitat for Humanity, would also say things like this in his many talks around the country: “We build decent housing for the working poor, for people who live in substandard housing – the roof leaks, the rooms are cold and drafty in the winter, houses are infested with rats and mice, where people are wasting their money by paying rent to a landlord that they never see. We don’t build houses because we like building houses. We build houses because families are living in poor housing and they deserve better. We will keep building houses until the last family has a decent place to live. Then

we can stop building houses.”

There is another way to say this: We who live in a comfortable house cannot rest while others live in a place of junk. We who are well-fed cannot rest while others go hungry. We who have clean water cannot rest while others drink dirty water because they have no other choice. We who have good health care cannot rest while others suffer without access to health care.

There is another type of wisdom that is neither pessimistic nor optimistic. It is realistic. This wisdom acknowledges that we cannot rest our true happiness solely on this world. It is the kind of spiritual wisdom that gives thanks to the

one Creator whose gifts we all receive.

It is the wisdom that acknowledges Him as the one who will be the Final Judge of every good work, both good and bad. He is the One in whom we place our trust.

**Lexington School Notice to Parents Regarding
Child Identification, Location, Screening and Evaluation**

This notice is to inform parents of the child identification, location, screening and evaluation activities to be conducted throughout the year by the Lexington School District in coordination with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. Personally identifiable information shall be collected and maintained in a confidential manner in carrying out the following activities:

Referral
Preschool children, ages three through five and students enrolled in K-12 who are suspected of having disabilities which may require special and related services may be referred for screening and evaluation through the local schools. Local school districts and the Regional Education Service Centers coordinate with the Sooner Start Early Intervention Program in referrals for identification and evaluation of infants and toddlers who may be eligible for early intervention services from birth through two years of age or for special education and related services beginning at three years of age. The Oklahoma Area Wide Service Information System (OASIS), through a toll free number (1-800-42-OASIS), also provides statewide information and referrals to local schools and other service providers.

Screening
Screening activities may include vision, hearing, and health. Other screening activities may include: review of records and educational history; interviews; observations; and specially developed readiness or educational screening instruments. The Regional Education Service Centers provide assistance and consultation to local schools in these efforts.

(1) Readiness Screening
Personally identifiable maturational assessment test information is collected on all kindergarten students participating in maturational assessment test screening to assess readiness prior to entry into first grade. Results of the screening are made available to parents or legal guardians, teachers, and school administrators. No child shall be screened for readiness or evaluated without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

(2) Educational Screening
Educational screening includes accepted procedures for the identification of children who may have special learning needs and may be eligible for special education and related services in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Each school district in the state provides educational screening. No child shall be educationally screened without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

- Educational screening is implemented for all first grade students by giving maturational assessment tests each school year.
- Second through twelfth grade students shall be screened as needed or upon request of the parent, legal guardian or teacher.
- Students entering the public school system from another state or from within the state without previous educational screening, shall be educationally screened within six months from the date of such entry.

Evaluation
Evaluation means procedures used in accordance with federal laws and regulations to determine whether a child has a disability and the nature and extent of the special education and related services that the child needs. The term means procedures used selectively with an individual child and does not include basic tests administered or procedures used with all children in a school, grade, or class. Written consent of the parent or legal guardian for such evaluation must be on file with the Lexington School District prior to any child receiving an initial evaluation for special education and related services purposes.

Collection of Personally Identifiable Information
Educational records containing personally identifiable information collected by schools in the identification, location, screening and evaluation of children shall be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the **Policies and Procedures for Special Education in Oklahoma**. School districts develop and implement a local policy regarding the collection, storage, disclose and destruction of confidential student records. Parents may obtain a copy of the local policy from the Lexington School District's Superintendent. These are the rights of parents and children regarding personally identifiable information in accordance with FERPA:

- To inspect the students' education records;
- To request the amendment of education records to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the students' privacy or other rights;
- To consent to disclose education records, except where consent is not required to authorize disclosure;
- To file complaints with the Family Policy and Regulations Office, United States Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202, concerning the alleged violations of the requirements of FERPA (34 CFR § 99.1-99.67); and
- To obtain a copy of the FERPA policy adopted by the Lexington School District upon request being made to the Lexington School Superintendent.

Before any major identification, location, or evaluation schools shall provide notice to parents. Accommodations for other languages or means of communications may be provided upon request. Such notice shall occur at least annually prior to conducting these activities and shall include the rights of parents under FERPA. For further information, please contact the following:

Wayne School Notice to Parents Regarding
Child Identification, Location, Screening and Evaluation

This notice is to inform parents of the child identification, location, screening and evaluation activities to be conducted throughout the year by the Wayne School District in coordination with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. Personally identifiable information shall be collected and maintained in a confidential manner in carrying out the following activities:

Referral
Preschool children, ages three through five and students enrolled in K-12 who are suspected of having disabilities which may require special and related services may be referred for screening and evaluation through the local schools. Local school districts and the Regional Education Service Centers coordinate with the Sooner Start Early Intervention Program in referrals for identification and evaluation of infants and toddlers who may be eligible for early intervention services from birth through two years of age or for special education and related services beginning at three years of age. The Oklahoma Area Wide Service Information System (OASIS), through a toll free number (1-800-42-OASIS), also provides statewide information and referrals to local schools and other service providers.

Screening
Screening activities may include vision, hearing, and health. Other screening activities may include: review of records and educational history; interviews; observations; and specially developed readiness or educational screening instruments. The Regional Education Service Centers provide assistance and consultation to local schools in these efforts.

(1) Readiness Screening
Personally identifiable maturational assessment test information is collected on all kindergarten students participating in maturational assessment test screening to assess readiness prior to entry into first grade. Results of the screening are made available to parents or legal guardians, teachers, and school administrators. No child shall be screened for readiness or evaluated without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

(2) Educational Screening
Educational screening includes accepted procedures for the identification of children who may have special learning needs and may be eligible for special education and related services in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Each school district in the State provides educational screening. No child shall be educationally screened without prior notice to the child's parent or legal guardian or whose parent or legal guardian has filed written objection with the local school district.

- Educational screening is implemented for all first grade students by giving maturational assessment tests each school year.
- Second through twelfth grade students shall be screened as needed or upon request of the parent, legal guardian or teacher.
- Students entering the public school system from another state or from within the state without previous educational screening, shall be educationally screened within 6 months from the date of such entry.

Evaluation
Evaluation means procedures used in accordance with federal laws and regulations to determine whether a child has a disability and the nature and extent of the special education and related services that the child needs. The term means procedures used selectively with an individual child and does not include basic tests administered or procedures used with all children in a school, grade, or class. Written consent of the parent or legal guardian for such evaluation must be on file with the Wayne school district prior to any child receiving an initial evaluation for special education and related services purposes.

Collection of Personally Identifiable Information
Educational records containing personally identifiable information collected by schools in the identification, location, screening and evaluation of children shall be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the Policies and Procedures for Special Education in Oklahoma. School districts develop and implement a local policy regarding the collection, storage, discloser and destruction of confidential student records. Parents may obtain a copy of the local policy from the Wayne School District's Superintendent. These are the rights of parents and children regarding personally identifiable information in accordance with FERPA:

- To inspect the students' education records;
- To request the amendment of education records to ensure that they are not inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the students' privacy or other rights;
- To consent to disclose education records, except where consent is not required to authorize disclosure;
- To file complaints with the Family Policy and Regulations Office, United States Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202, concerning the alleged violations of the requirements of FERPA (34 CFR § 99.1-99.67); and
- To obtain a copy of the FERPA policy adopted by the Wayne school district upon request being made to the Wayne School Superintendent.

Before any major identification, location, or evaluation schools shall provide notice to parents. Accommodations for other languages or means of communications may be provided upon request. Such notice shall occur at least annually prior to conducting these activities and shall include the rights of parents under FERPA. For further information, please contact the following:

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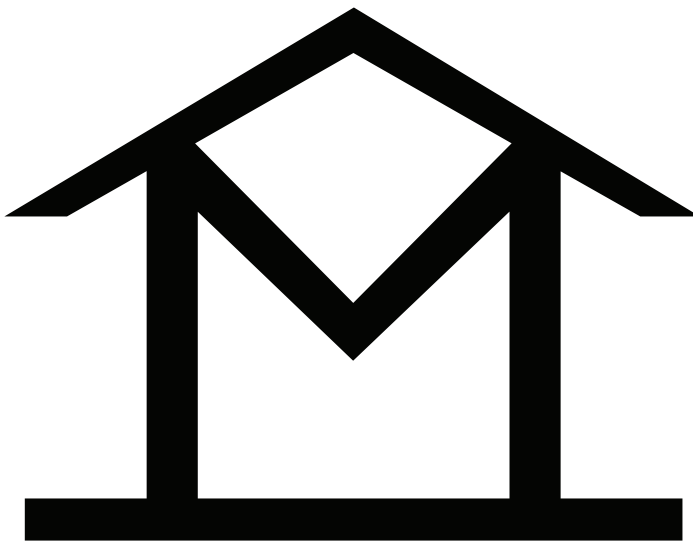
