Field officially dedicated in 1938

(Editor's note: This is the first of a four-part series on Conger Field with facts and history provided by Kelly Nemecek.)

James H. (Jim) Conger wore many hats in the Purcell School System but is probably known most for being the most successful football coach in the storied history of the school.

Conger was high school principal here from 1927-28 and served as superintendent from 1930-1941. He is the third most winningest PHS Head Basketball coach going 120-67 for a 64.17 percentage.

He coached the Dragons to a pair of state championships in track in 1936 and 1937.

But his 100-34-11 career football coaching record stands alone.

He coached the Dragons from 1926-28 and from 1930-39 carving out a winning percentage of 72.76 percent that earned his name to be forever connected with Dragon Football.

Jim Conger died in November 1981 after seeing one last game on the field named in his honor earlier that fall.

## Fruit of the vine

Slaughterville vineyard growing  
Jill Stichler's dream

Tucked away just a few miles east of I-35 in Cleveland County is a small slice of paradise.

Willow trees frame a peaceful pond, birds sing from their branches, and sunlight illuminates grapevines that stretch across four acres at Slaughterville.

For Jill Stichler, it is a beautiful utopia created by a labor of love.

"I always wanted to have a vineyard," Stichler said.

Stichler started the vineyard with 114 Riesling grape vines in 1999.

By 2003, she was harvesting, processing, pasteurizing, bottling and distributing her

own grape juice under the label "Redland Juice Company."

It all began one day as she was driving home and came across the Canadian River Winery planting their first grape vines.

After a brief visit with them and sharing that she, too, had always wanted to grow grapes, she struck up an agreement to grow grapes and sell them to the winery.

Not long after, she bought her first vines from them.

"Once you plant the vines, they have to grow for a couple of years before you can harvest

# Borders no barriers

OU students engineer hope in African projects

While eight engineering students from the University of Oklahoma were literally making a splash in Ethiopia during June, five others were working out of Saint Monica's Tailoring School for Girls in Gulu, Uganda.

The two missions were organized by Dr. Jim Chamberlain, education and outreach co-director of the university's Water Technologies for Emerging Regions (WaTER) Center.

Chamberlain, a priest, is also pastor of Purcell's Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church.

The group that traveled to Addis Ababa worked with Splash International, a non-governmental organization based out of Seattle.

Splash has been successfully using a franchise model to put clean water and sanitation facilities in schools in Nepal, China and India, Chamberlain said.

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# Education program at OCU

## For candidates running for city council seat

Candidates are frequently elected to serve on city councils and municipal boards across Oklahoma without a basic understanding of city budgets, zoning laws, labor relations and a myriad of other issues public officials must address on a weekly basis.

In response to those concerns, Oklahoma City University is launching an innovative new program designed to educate citizens interested in running for elected positions in municipal government, said Steve Agee, dean of OCU’s

Meinders School of Business.

The Meinders School has joined with the Oklahoma Municipal League, The Oklahoma Academy and a variety of other civic leaders across the state to establish the Leadership & Public Administration Municipalities Certificate Program. It is a series of weekend classes being offered this fall on the OCU campus, and to the rest of the state via live-streaming.

“We need a program that will educate and prepare people for the roles and responsibilities of elected office before they

are elected,” Agee said. “That would allow them to avoid having to learn about the job at the same time they’re making important decisions that impact municipal government.”

The program consists of seven modules held from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. every Saturday from Sept. 8 through Oct. 20. While the courses will be taught on the OCU campus, they also will be available via live-streaming at many career techs across the state. The cost is only \$250 per person for the entire certificate program.

'New' DARE vehicle outfitted on a song

Great things can – and do – happen, even with a \$0 budget.

And if you doubt that, look no further than the McClain County Sheriff's Department DARE program for the proof.

Or ask Deputy Scott Gibbons, the county's DARE officer.

He's driving around in the proof.

It all began when Henkels & McCoy in Norman gave the department a 2013 Ford F-150 extended cab pickup.

"It came off their oilfield line," Gibbons said.

And with only 170,000 miles on the odometer, there was still plenty of usable life in the vehicle.

"We believe it was well maintained," Gibbons said. "It appeared to be without any major issues."

Well, technically, the department's budget for the pickup wasn't exactly \$0. The department did pay for a county radio that was installed in the vehicle.

And once that was done, there followed an outpouring of community support like you've never seen.

Sheriff Don Hewett left it to Gibbons to accessorize the truck.

And he set about doing just that with two goals in mind.

One, the pickup would be easily identified as a law enforcement vehicle since when he's not working as a DARE deputy or school resource officer at Washington, Gibbons is a field deputy.

And second, Gibbons wanted the pickup to be a "cool" law enforcement vehicle that promoted the DARE program.

"I hope when families see the vehicle working in the community, it gives them an opportunity to discuss the DARE program and drugs with their kids.

Thus the transformation from oilfield truck to DARE/patrol vehicle began.

Perfection Graphics donated the wrap on the truck. Two of their vendors pitched in with donations of their own.

ECCO furnished emergency lights and Decker provided a utility storage container for the pickup bed.

New wheels came courtesy of Auto Image.

Three tire companies – Jeter Tire, WW Tire and Hesselbein

Tire – furnished the tires and a lift and level kit.

Wadley EMS helped with the installation of emergency equipment.

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### A nation defended well

As the leader on the global stage, the United States is re-entering an era of military pre-eminence. Our nation's military needs to be restored to advance America's competitive military advantage to rival those of nation's like China and Russia, as stated in the recent National Defense Strategy.

We now believe that the greatest threat to America is not terrorism, but the reemergence of great power rivals like China and Russia. We need a military not only designed to defeat terrorists, but to counter the modern militaries of Russia and China, and regional powers like North Korea and Iran.

Congress has the responsibility to rebuild and supply the U.S. military through the annual Defense Appropriations bill, which funds the Depart-

ment of Defense and the military branches, in line with the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA).

For the past two fiscal years, each Defense Appropriations bills has marked the largest increases in defense spending in a generation. These investments will support the National Defense Strategy, and the goal to counter growing global threats.

This year's bill also includes provisions to innovate technology, improve weapons and machinery, expand troop numbers, build training programs and provide for servicemembers and their families. It is a comprehensive piece of legislation that will support the need for a robust, ready military.

Overall, this year's Defense Appropriations measures is consistent with the NDAA for Fiscal Year 2019 and the 2018 Budget Agreement. It allows

for \$674.6 billion in total funding.

This includes \$606.5 billion in base discretionary funding – an increase of \$17.1 billion above the Fiscal Year 2018 enacted level.

Additionally, it ensures the military has adequate resources to continue Overseas Contingency Operations and the Global War on Terrorism efforts with a total of \$68.1 billion in resources ranging from operational needs, equipment, personnel requirements and support for key allies.

The largest benefit of this spending bill is that it restores military readiness to its highest levels. The bill provides for \$295.9 billion for troop training, vigorous maintenance programs and base operations.

These funds are crucial to the day-to-day operations at places like Tinker Air Force Base in

my district, which oversees key logistics and maintenance for Air Force aircraft and machinery.

Also key to my district are programs like the Paladin PIM weapons system at Fort Sill Army Post, which received \$150 million in funding. Additionally, the bill includes \$92.4 billion for research and development, which supports the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter, space security programs and nuclear force modernization.

And to further the scope of the military, the bill allows for \$145.7 billion for procurement to provide weapons, platforms and resources including 12 Navy ships, 93 F-35 aircraft, 24 Super Hornets, 58 Black Hawk helicopters and 66 Apaches. Lastly, the bill will fulfill the request for a 16,400 end-strength increase.

One of the fundamental parts

of building a robust military is taking care of the servicemembers themselves. This year's defense appropriations bill delivers on that promise. It provides for the authorized 2.6 percent pay raise for our troops – the largest pay raise in nine years.

Furthermore, the bill includes \$34.4 billion for the Defense Health Program, which provides care for our troops, their families and for retirees.

Having a well-funded military is essential to our national security and the protection of our democracy. When we celebrate the Fourth of July, we will celebrate our beautiful nation that is defended by thousands of men and women in uniform that took the oath and sacrifice to serve. We are forever grateful for their service, and will forever continue to support their mission and success.

## Newsprint tariffs not good

I've been focused on several bumps in the road of life recently. Sometimes these things will start running through my head, particularly at 3 a.m., and I end up tossing and turning for several hours.

What helps me is to get up and make a list of solutions, or things to do the next day, which often does allow me to empty my brain of these worries. I tell myself that I can't do anything about these worries at that hour of the night, but it's really committing them to paper that helps me let go and eventually get back to sleep.

One thing that's given me a few sleepless hours in the middle of the night is something I wrote about several months ago; the tariffs being applied to the paper on which we print The News-Gazette. In March, additional duties were levied on Canadian newsprint, which increased the price 30 percent over that in effect the first of January. American producers followed suit and

raised their prices to match the Canadian price including the duties. The net effect to us is an 11 to 13 percent increase in the total printing cost of each edition of The News-Gazette, starting June 15. I totaled that up for a year, based on our average number of pages and our current press run, and it's a substantial five-figure dollar amount.

We will find a way to deal with this, without cutting staff or the quality of the newspaper.

We're looking at how to make the number of copies we print as close to the number we need for subscribers and our single copy purchasers. In other words, reduce the waste factor as much as possible.

We will also see how we can increase our revenues to offset this increase. Our staff is pretty creative, and I've already been given some good ideas for promotions for the coming months. And, frankly, we hope our readers value what we do enough to pay a bit more for a subscription.

That's still cheaper per week than a cup of coffee!

A friend in the industry, who owns a paper in a much smaller, more rural community than Rockbridge, recently adopted a new business model that relies more on subscription revenue than advertising. There are few businesses in her county – no supermarket, no auto dealer, mostly small mom and pop stores. Her paper was already an outstanding community newspaper, but she's upped the number of pages, added content and more color, and beefed up the paper's website.

Her subscribers get the weekly paper and the website – for all that happens in between the paper days – for \$99 a year.

She was worried that she'd lose a lot of subscribers.

She shouldn't have. Almost 85 percent of her subscribers have been renewing at the higher rate. They see the value in paper's local coverage, and are backing that up by paying for the outstanding writing and reporting that the paper offers. And even at the new rate, the weekly cost is about the same as a large coffee shop java.

The tariffs on newsprint are

just an unnecessary impediment to a publisher who is providing what every community needs, and is brave enough to embark on a new course to keep the paper viable.

That kind of collateral damage is what happens when simplistic solutions are applied to complex problems, like the loss of manufacturing jobs in America.

As worrisome as the added costs are to already-strapped community papers, there's word that the tariffs may create shortages of newsprint, and that smaller newspaper printers may not be able to get an adequate supply to keep the presses rolling.

This seems counter-intuitive, because you'd think higher prices for paper would stimulate more production. The fact is, most of the paper mills in the U.S. and Canada are already producing at capacity.

This confirms the argument we've made that the closure of American paper mills was due to declining demand, not unfair foreign competition.

The tariff question will be heard by the International Trade Commission on July 17, with a decision to be rendered sometime in the early fall.

Legislators from both sides of the aisle have said they are opposed to these tariffs, and have written to the commission, or are scheduled to testify before it against the tariffs. Neither of Virginia's senators nor our congressman have taken a position, though I know my calls and emails can't be the only ones they've gotten from constituents.

If this unfair tariff bothers you, we'd sure appreciate it if you'd add your voice by calling or emailing them.

# MOVIES with DAVE

Another week, another pair of movies. And this time they're both continuations of well established franchises.

One is about a dystopian future where one night a year people are allowed to indiscriminately murder as they please, the other features a tiny Paul Rudd.

Let's get right to them, shall we?

First up is "The First Purge."

In this precursor to "The Purge" series, the rise of a third political party, the New Founding Fathers of America, leads to a controversial experiment. No laws on Staten Island for 12 full hours.

Putting their theory to the test, that allowing people to vent all their aggression in one night, leads to a more peaceful society.

Oh, "The Purge." Where do I even start with these movies?

There is something innately compelling about an alternative reality where the United States decides to stop enforcing laws one night a year.

It's a fascinating, if horrifying, concept. One that could have potentially made for a compelling movie. A single compelling movie.

Now we're up to number four.

And beyond the first one, which ended up being more of a home invasion film rather than pure anarchy in the streets, these movies have basically been the same horror film over and over.

You get a brief introduction to the main characters preparing for The Purge. Government officials going on camera saying how wonderful and necessary The Purge is for a peaceful society.

Then for one reason or another, our main characters are forced to face the horrors of The Purge and slowly come to realize the whole event is a fascist government conspiracy to encourage underprivileged African-Americans to kill each other.

That's the entire premise of these movies. That The Purge is what would happen if neo-nazis came to power in the United States.

These movies are dripping with anti-fascist and anti-white supremacy commentary and nowhere has that been more apparent than in this latest film.

In fact, they practically knock you over the head with it.

I have zero problems with movies that depict fascists, racists, white supremacists, white nationalists, and neo-nazis as scum of the earth.

If that's who you want to make the villains in your film, I'm all for it.

The problem I have with these movies, this latest one most of all, is their anti-fascist commentary is so overt and so over-the-top, you can't take it seriously.

If this were a comedy that'd be one thing. After all, satirising

Nazis and their ilk is a longstanding western tradition.

But it's not. This movie is actually attempting to be a semi-serious cautionary tale on current events.

This film is trying so hard to be a timely message about the recent rise of neo-nazis groups, and most of all, Donald Trump's presidency.

Forget the movie itself, just look at the marketing. You only need to go as far as one of the posters depicting a bright red ball cap with white embroidered lettering saying "The First Purge." Exactly like Trump's "Make America Great Again" hats.

It's all about as subtle as a brick to the face.

The narrative itself is typical of what you'd expect from "The Purge" franchise, though, considering it's a prequel, it ends up being incredibly unsatisfying.

By the end of this film, a large amount of Purge survivors know the entire event is a government conspiracy to eliminate poor minorities and said survivors plan to fight back.

The problem? They obviously fail. According to the other films in the series, The Purge continues on as a celebrated American tradition for the next 20+ years.

Hooray for the resistance? I can't see recommending this movie to anyone but the most loyal fans of "The Purge" series.

Even those looking for pure catharsis in gorey violence will most likely be disappointed.

The camera shakes around so much you can barely see what's happening at any given moment. Not to mention the final action scene, where the filmmakers decided it'd be a great idea to light every set with strobe lights.

This movie wants to be a clever commentary on current events while also being an over-the-top indulgent murder fest.

Perhaps a better filmmaker could balance both those aspects in a way that doesn't come across as a complete farce, but try as they might the people behind "The Purge" and all its sequels just haven't been able to cut it.

"The First Purge" is rated R.

The other movie this week is "Ant-Man and the Wasp."

In this latest chapter of the Marvel Cinematic Universe

(MCU), Scott Lang aka Ant-Man (Paul Rudd) is back. In the aftermath of "Captain America: Civil War," Scott grapples with the consequences of his choices as both a superhero and a father.

As he struggles to rebalance his home life with his responsibilities as Ant-Man, he's confronted by Hope van Dyne (Evangeline Lilly) and Dr. Hank Pym (Michael Douglas) with an urgent new mission. Scott must once again put on the suit and learn to fight alongside The Wasp as the team works

together to uncover secrets from their past.

It hasn't even been three months since the last MCU film and we already have another one.

You got to give Marvel Studios credit, they sure do know how to pump out movies.

This time though, the stakes aren't nearly as high as they were in Marvel's last film, "Avengers: Infinity War."

Those looking for answers after "Infinity War's" devastating climax sadly won't find much comfort here.

Like the previous "Ant-Man" movie, this sequel is much more of an action comedy, rather than just a straight superhero flick. Something I don't mind one bit.

Paul Rudd is absolutely hilarious throughout this movie. It almost feels like he's channeling Ryan Reynolds's Deadpool at times, only a more PG-13, family friendly version.

I especially loved the scenes with him and Abby Ryder Fortson, who plays Rudd's daughter in the film.

The relationship between the two of them feels so natural. It was just plain adorable in the first "Ant-Man" and it's even more so here.

And of course I have to mention Michael Peña, who absolutely stole scene after scene in the first film, and does the exact same thing here.

You know it's going to be a great time when Peña starts telling stories. I was cracking up before he even had a chance to open his mouth.

Another big highlight is the action. There's even more fun with resizing here than in the last "Ant-Man" movie.

And it all comes together in a huge car chase scene through the streets of San Francisco that incorporates just about everything imaginable involving shrinking and growing.

There's so much creativity and so many interesting visuals, I couldn't help but have a huge grin on my face the entire time.

The overall story itself was perfectly fine, though it is pretty typical for a Marvel movie. I guess keeping powerful objects and technologies out of the hands of baddies never really gets old.

I hope you like techno mumbo-jumbo though, because this movie is chock-full of it. So many minor details and explanations sailed right over my head.

The plot does revolve around quantum mechanics and the quantum realm though, I guess confusion comes with the territory.

Regardless, the movie never gets too bogged down in the details. For the most part this is another light-hearted, family friendly superhero film.

If you enjoyed the first "Ant-Man," I don't see any reason you wouldn't like this one too.

It might not please Marvel fans eager for a follow-up to "Avengers: Infinity War," but for those just looking for a continuation of Paul Rudd's antics as Ant-Man, this should satisfy just fine.

## Funding restored to OCAP

The Office of Child Abuse Prevention (OCAP) will receive \$2 million dollars in contract funding from the Oklahoma State Health Department (OSHD) for State Fiscal Year 2019 after funds were cut from surrounding non-profit agencies.

The money in contract funding for the Office of Child Abuse Prevention (OCAP) will be restored after funding had been cut in late October of 2017 for State Fiscal Year 2018.

Through the OCAP funding in SFY 2017, Parents as Teachers contractors served 608 families in 26 counties.

While the Oklahoma State Health Department (OSHD) does provide three home visitation models under the MIECHV grant (Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting grant), some families may not meet the eligibility requirements in order to be apart of that specific grant, which is where the Office of Child Abuse Prevention comes into play with the PAT program.

The restored funding will provide for up to 10 contracts that will be awarded following review of Requests for Proposals (RFP) that must be submitted as part of the SFY 2019 budget process. State law requires interested parties

to submit new proposals for funding.

them,” she explained.

Stichler worked her vines for a few years before getting her first harvest.

Once they were producing, she harvested grapes for both her own juice making and for the winery.

“I just kept adding vines,” Stichler said. “Now, I have 4 acres of Merlot, Chardonnay, Riesling, and Muscat Canelli grapes.”

Today, Stichler is also a 25 percent partner in the Canadian River Winery.

Until very recently, she has maintained the vineyard on her own, with little manual labor help from others.

However, there is one time of year that Stichler has always welcomed all the help she can get and she calls on family and friends to help with the harvest. “It’s a big family event,” Stichler said. “I couldn’t do it without them.”

Juice making can sometimes be a more complicated and delicate process than wine making, because the grapes cannot get above a certain temperature or they will start to ferment.

This makes the entire process of growing, harvesting and producing extremely time sensitive.

Stichler soon became an influential person in the industry because of her passion, as well as her knowledge.

She studied viticulture and enology at Grayson County College not long after planting her first vines.

Over the years, Redland Juice Company has received numerous awards and accolades for juice varieties and Stichler continues to take great pride in her work today.

“Jill is an amazing business woman,” said her sister, Sharon Harrison. “When she sets her mind on a project, you know she will find a means to make

it successful through hard work and determination.”

Indeed, what began as a mere hobby has become a lasting legacy in the Oklahoma grape industry.

Seen as a modern-day pioneer in Oklahoma viticulture, Stichler was elected the first female president of the Oklahoma Grape Growers and Wine Makers Association in 2003.

She was also a founding member of the Oklahoma Grape Industry Council with Gene Clifton and an early member of the Made in Oklahoma Coalition, with which she continues to be involved.

Though it was truly a hobby for Stichler, she also wanted to help others receive the education and resources they needed to become successful and allow the industry to flourish in Oklahoma.

She was responsible for securing three Specialty Crop Block Grants – one for an economic impact analysis of the industry in Oklahoma, another for a vineyard quality survey, and the third for setting up the wine lab at Oklahoma State University Food and Agricultural Products Center.

Stichler worked closely with FAPC and credits Dr. William McGlynn for his role in assisting her personally, as well as establishing the wine lab.

Appointed by Gov. Brad Henry, she was the first woman to serve on the advisory FAPC board. She remained on the board for six years.

To many, Stichler is a shining example of how someone can be successful in learning and mastering a new trade.

She did not grow up in the viticulture industry.

She and Sharon grew up on their family’s cattle ranch in Creek County. In addition to cattle, her family also raised

bison and kept a garden.

When Stichler was 11, her family relocated to Norman. She went on to the University of Oklahoma where she majored in zoology with minors in botany and chemistry.

She graduated college in the middle of the Vietnam War, and immediately went to work as a logician at Tinker Air Force Base. Her work was tracking high speed anti-radiation missiles.

It was at Tinker that she met Lt. Col. Richard Stichler, a C-130 pilot. When he received orders for California, the two married. Stichler transferred her logistician work to the U.S. Navy.

As military life goes, they moved again to Washington D.C., and there Stichler went to work for the Naval Air Systems Command and eventually the National Weather Service.

While in the Baltimore area, she also earned a masters degree in administrative science from Johns Hopkins University.

Only seven years into their marriage, Richard died at the age of 48 after a battle with lung cancer.

It was losing Richard that motivated Stichler to come back to Oklahoma and be close to her family.

She stayed with the National Weather Service until 2001 when she retired and put her full attention and heart into her vineyard.

Stichler’s passion is what has kept her going despite obstacles with her health and Mother Nature.

A recent tornado blew the roof off her home of 25 years, but left her vineyard untouched.

“There is nothing in life like harvesting the fruits of your labor to be sold or shared with friends, family and neighbors,” Stichler said.

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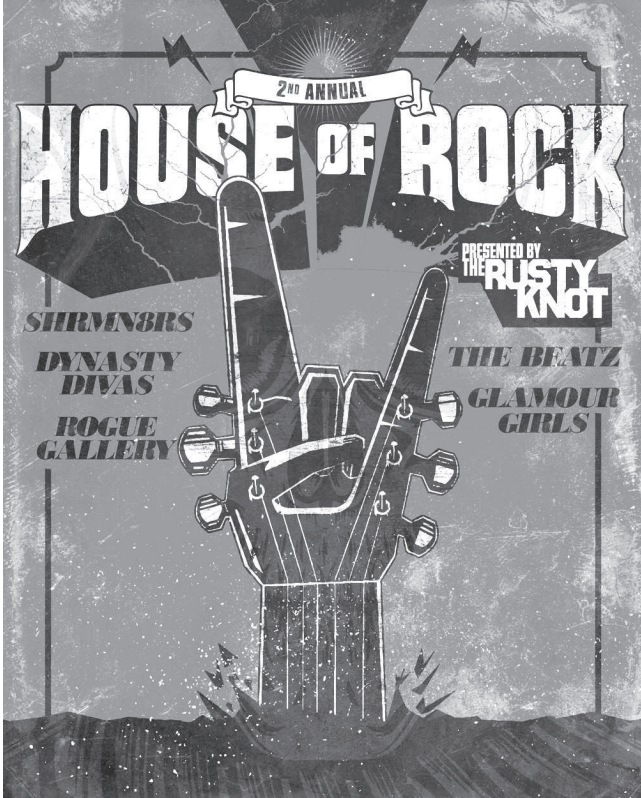

# Chickasaw, Choctaw artists bring top work to “Ikbi” partnership

**Chief of the Choctaw Nation Gary Batton and Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby welcomed a large crowd of artists, art lovers and officials for a joint art show June 29. “Ikbi: Chickasaws and Choctaws Sharing Our History and Culture Through Art” features 35 artists and is on exhibit at the Oklahoma Hall of Fame Gaylord-Pickens Museum through September 22.**

The Chickasaw and Choctaws nations held a VIP reception June 29 to showcase an art exhibit featuring 16 Chickasaw and 19 Choctaw artists.

“Ikbi: Chickasaws and Choctaws Sharing Our History and Culture Through Art” officially opened May 31 at the Oklahoma Hall of Fame Gaylord-Pickens Museum in Oklahoma City.

The leaders of both tribes – Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby and Chief of the Choctaw Nation Gary Batton – were on hand to welcome a large crowd of artists, arts patrons and tribal officials.

“Ikbi” means “to create” in both the Chickasaw and Choctaw languages.

The exhibit will run through September 22 at the state hall of fame, 1400 Classen Drive.

The show marks the second time in one month the Chickasaw Nation has celebrated a public showing of artwork by Chickasaw citizens.

A VIP and artist reception was hosted at Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art on the University of Oklahoma campus June 7 for “Visual Voices,” an all-Chickasaw art exhibit which runs through September 9.

Several artists featured at “Visual Voices” also are displaying works at Ikbi.

They are California jewelry designer Kristen Dorsey; textile artist and weaver Tyra Shackleford; painter Brent

Greenwood.

Also painter Bill Hensley; painter Brenda Kingery, potter Joanna Underwood-Blackburn, textile and garment maker Margaret Wheeler; carver and painter Dustin Mater, and blade smith Daniel Worcester.

Joining them are Rena Smith, an Oregonian who is a puckered-toe moccasin maker and expert on ancient Chickasaw garments, footwear and pigment dying techniques; Paula Loftin, a photographer specializing in Indian and Western-themed image-making.

Also E. Dee Tabor, an artist who excels in many genres particularly jewelry; Richard Thomas, a master woodworker and restoration expert.

And Mike Larsen, an Oklahoma Hall of Fame inductee, painter and sculptor; Ben White, a former fireman who now uses flames for pottery aesthetics and Kelley Lunsford, an artist working in several media, primarily textiles.

Choctaw artists include Carole Ayers, painter; J. Dylan Cavin, painter and ledger artist; Karen Clarkson, a Prescott, Ariz., painter; Chester Cowen, who excels in bead work.

And Norma Howard, painter; Paul King, painter; David Lawrence, painter, Gwen Coleman Lester, painter; Brenda Mackey, painter and Laurie Moore, a Peoria, Ill., painter.

Other Choctaw artists include Lauretta Newby-Coker, who specializes in stained glass; Edmon Perkins, pottery; Chris Reiger, painter; Nancy Rhoades, painter; Jane Semple Umsted, painter.

And D.G. Smalling, a painter who specializes in a unique style of painting, his brush, once on the canvas, is never taken off it; Floyd Gene Smith, a metal art sculptor; Bobby Von Martin, a Fresno, Calif., painter and Carolyn Bernard Young, a Weatherford, Texas, potter.

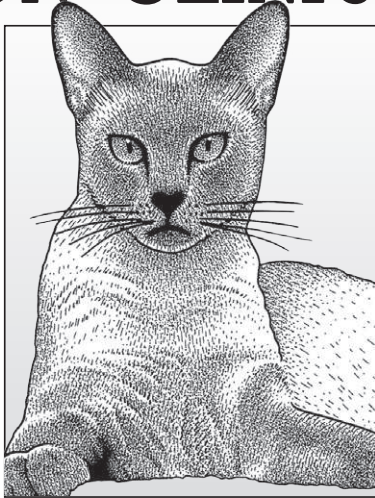

# Weekly Chickasaw language classes open to public at no charge

The Chickasaw Nation will offer community Chickasaw language classes 6-8 p.m., Thursdays through September. Classes are open to the public at no charge at the Chokka’ Kilimpi’ building, 3200 Marshall Ave., in Norman.

Classes are planned for July 12, (Tuesday) 17 and 26; August 2, 9, 16, 23, (Tuesday) and 28 and September 6, 13 and 20.

Location is subject to change, and if so students will be notified weeks in advance.

Instructor Jason Eyachabbe, education coordinator for the Chickasaw Nation, will lead the class in gaining a deeper understanding of Chikashshanompa’ (the Chickasaw language).

Students will bolster their Chickasaw vocabulary and learn about the history and culture in which the language is rooted.

Classes will consist of common words and phrases, language engagement activities and also Rosetta Stone videos and lessons.

The Chickasaw language was the primary language of Chickasaw people for hundreds

of years, passed on to new generations orally. It is viewed as a gift from the ancestors.

In 1994, the estimated number of fluent Chikashshanompa’ speakers was less than 1,000. Today, there are less than 75 fluent speakers, with the vast majority older than age 55.

Based on the 1931 play “Green Grow the Lilacs” by Claremore, Okla., native Lynn Riggs, “Oklahoma!” was the first musical written by the legendary team of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II. Rodgers and Hammerstein’s “Oklahoma!” began a new era in American musical theatre. It also began the most successful songwriting partnership that Broadway has ever seen.


Before their collaboration, Rodgers and Hammerstein worked successfully with other partners. In 1942 Richard Rodgers and Lorenz Hart were highly successful, having written musical comedies that were praised for their wit and sophistication.

A decade prior, Oscar Hammerstein II enjoyed similar success writing innovative operettas that consistently reshaped the art form. “Showboat,” his 1927 collaboration with Jerome Kern, is highly regarded as a landmark in American theatre history.

“Oklahoma!” premiered on Broadway at the St. James Theatre on March 31, 1943, and closed after 2,212 performances on March 29, 1948.

# Chickasaw Nation plans public stomp dances and classes

The Chickasaw Nation will offer stomp dance classes open to the public at no charge through September in Ada, Ardmore, Sulphur and Tishomingo.

Multiple public stomp dances are also planned, presenting students with opportunities to use what they’ve learned in a welcoming environment.

Classes are 6-8 p.m. and will cover the basics of stomp dancing.

For Ada, stomp dance classes are planned for July 12, 16, August 9 and 23 at the Ada Chickasaw Nation Community Center, 700 N. Mississippi.

Ardmore’s classes are planned for July 18, 31, August 15 and 28 at the Ardmore Chickasaw Nation Commu-

nity Center, 907 Locust St. Sulphur’s classes are planned for July 19, August 2, 16 and 30 at the multipurpose building on the north property of the Chickasaw Cultural Center campus (a left turn before the main exit of the cultural center) 867 Cooper Memorial Drive.

Tishomingo’s classes are planned for July 24, August 7, 21 and September 4 at the Chickasaw National Capitol Building, 411 W 9th St.

Public stomp dances are planned 8 p.m. to 1 a.m., August 25 and September 28 at Kullihoma. For July 21, a stomp dance is planned from midnight to 6 a.m. at Kullihoma. Dances will include traditional song and dance, food and fellowship.

Kullihoma is located seven

miles northeast of Ada on state Highway 1. Watch for the Kullihoma exit signs.

Stomp dancing has deep roots in the Chickasaw culture, as it does with most southeastern tribes.

There are still different dances for various occasions. The Chickasaws remember their dances for their spiritual nature, yet they have become mainly social today. No matter the type of dancing, it is always an opportunity to come together as a community.

Men sing stomp dance songs in a call-and-answer format, following a male song leader, who often sets the dance rhythm using a handheld shaker made of materials like the horn of a bull or turtle shell.

Women enhance the rhythms with shakers worn on their legs. These shakers are often made of turtle shells, deer toes or milk cans.

Set in Indian Territory just after the turn of the 20th century, the spirited rivalry between the local farmers and cowboys provides the backdrop for the love story between Curly, a handsome cowboy, and Laurey, a beautiful farm girl.

arrangement with the Ethiopian government to assist in upgrading the hygiene facilities for children in public schools throughout the capital city – nearly 500 schools!” he continued. “The OU team volunteered to spend an entire month to help conduct the site assessments for a large share (more than 150) of the schools—to evaluate current conditions, help prioritize the schools, and make recommendations as needed.”

The students worked in three teams – one led by Chamberlain included Tamara Scott, environmental engineering major, and Brandon Brooks and Jaclyn Willis, civil engineering majors.

Another team was comprised

of Jonathan Witt, environmental science major, and civil engineering majors Anna Myers and Emma Coggin.

The third team led by Jordan Campbell, a civil engineering graduate student, included Diana Phan, environmental engineering major and Amanda Elmendorf, civil engineering major.

The teams “struck out on their own after an initial series of training sessions, armed with only an interpreter, an electronic tablet, and plenty of smiles,” Chamberlain said. Schools were still in session and the children were eager to flock around the strange visitors that they called “China,” not strange as the Chinese were the only visitors many of them had ever seen.

The engineering students spent time first interviewing the principal and/or vice principal for each school. Then they vis-

ited every latrine stall, drinking water and hand washing station, and conducted water flow rate and water quality sampling and analysis. They also made sketches of each school site.

“Many of the schools were grossly under-served by way of water and sanitation infrastructure,” Chamberlain said, explaining the World Health Organization (WHO) recommends a maximum ratio of 75 students per toilet, while Splash strives for 25-35 per toilet.

But some schools had only one toilet per every 100-300 students and teachers!

“There was rarely any soap at the hand washing stations, and often the water was not even flowing on the school site,” he said. “Many improvements were thus needed.”

In addition to making friends with Ethiopian drivers and translators, students also gained valuable experience both in

urban water infrastructure, Ethiopian culture, and the workings of an NGO.

Midway through the trip, students took a weekend off to enjoy Lalibela in the northern Ethiopian highlands, a village known for its rock-hewn churches and peaceful mountain vistas. They then traveled to Lake Tana and hiked to the majestic Blue Nile Falls, which mark the eastern branch of the waterway that joins the White Nile in Sudan to become the famous Nile River flowing north to Egypt.

The ancient monastery on a lake peninsula is beautifully painted and holds an important collection of 14th- to 20th-century wall paintings, crosses and crowns that will one day be displayed in a big new museum.

Students were able to complete the surveys a few days ahead of schedule and complete comprehensive reports for each school site.

Eric Stowe, founder and CEO of Splash, received the 2017 OU International Water Prize for his work to bring clean water and sanitation to children in need throughout the world.

The five engineering students spending the month in Uganda were Audry Yu, environmental design; Adella Kuster, environmental engineering; Jordan Bryan, environmental engineering; Yocelin Piedra, civil engineering and Taylor Huizenga, geography and sustain ability.

They were part of a 16-member team to be hosted by Sister Rosemary Nyirumbe and her religious order, the Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The group experienced “all the joys of Ugandan life,” Chamberlain said, ticking off cold showers (when the water was running), sleeping under

mosquito nets, occasional loss of electricity, clothes-washing by hand, and cool weather with rain each day.

The first 10 days were spent preparing for the Women’s Peace Conference hosted by the OU Center for Peace and Development.

More than 70 women from various parts of northern Uganda attended.

These were women affected in one way or another by the Ugandan civil war (1981-86) or its social aftermath.

The students were greeters and recorders during the discussions in which women felt free to talk about their current challenges, as well as hopes for the future.

After the Conference, students spent time in collecting their own thoughts and emotions, while also preparing two reports on the Conference outcomes.

Over the next two weeks the students divided into their respective disciplines of engineering, education and city and regional planning.

Chamberlain led the engineering students in several worthwhile projects.

They first repaired a broken hand pump at a well in the orphanage at Atiak. The popular hand pump is used by local villagers who rely on this for safe drinking water.

The students then visited the farm plot whose current residents are mostly cows, goats and a couple of chickens. They saw the brick-making machine in operation and learned how

Conger:

Project from 1936-37, Conger Field is widely considered one of the most unique football stadiums in the long history of Oklahoma High School Football.

Fans still sit in the bleachers on the same side of the field that is loomed over by Red Hill.

Conger Field’s official grand opening was held Friday Sept. 16, 1938 when the Dragons christened the field with a 45-0 victory over Lexington.

Historians believe there were a few games played on the field as it was being constructed.

While he was in Purcell Conger was known as one of the most innovative offensive minds in Oklahoma School Football History. He was instrumental in the introduction of the T-formation to all of Oklahoma High School Football.

Oklahoma Legislature.

The salary for a teacher with a bachelor’s degree maxes out at \$53,063 after 30 years in the classroom.

The salary range for teachers with master’s degrees ranges from \$38,647 for no classroom experience to \$55,018 for 30 years experience.

Those with doctorates, but no experience, will start at \$40,061 and max out at \$57,483 after 30 years.

Superintendent Jason Midkiff told the board that the teacher pay raise will be fully funded after Oklahoma Taxpayers United announced they wouldn’t pursue another petition drive to set aside new taxes to pay for the salary hike.

The Oklahoma Supreme Court had earlier tossed the group’s initial petition.

Midkiff called the teacher pay raise bill a “first step.”

“Our ills are not all cured,” he said, pointing out that the state board of education in June approved a record number of emergency certificates.

“It will take a little while for us to see the (teacher) applicant pool start to increase,” he said.

In a brief meeting, the board also approved changes to the

They then assisted a solar power vendor who installed panels for the Maternity Block at Saint Monica’s in Gulu. The students also dug trenches and filled plastic pop bottles to be used as bricks for a new patio for the restaurant at Gulu.

Their final project was to do a solar power design for all the new buildings that were being constructed at the Atiak orphanage—a clinic, a primary school, and new orphan homes.

The last day was spent at Paraa Wildlife Park where students saw elephants, hippos and crocodiles on a river safari to Murchison Falls, as well as giraffes, gazelles and, yes, even lions on a land safari that same day.

Perhaps the most valuable part of this trip was the building of relationships between the OU students and the various Ugandans that they met and worked with – the Sisters, the female students at Saint Monica’s, the women who came for the Peace Conference, the artists and seamstresses in Gulu, and the men who worked the farm and orphan facilities.

The students wrote journal entries and gave personal reports about this incredible cultural experience.

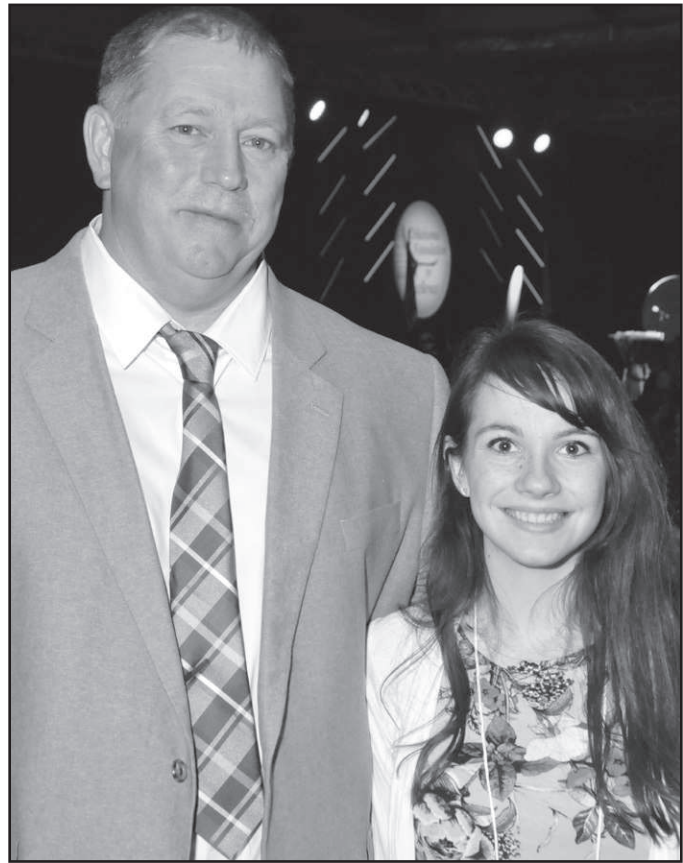

Good week to all. Welcome to the “front porch.”

The last couple of weeks we made a “return” to some of our studies in the great gospel of John, something we do every few months. Perhaps it will do you good this week to stop and re-examine your faith status. Let’s pause again with Peter, who posed that great question, “Lord, to whom shall we go?”

It is true that – should we decide to lean on our own understanding instead of going to the Lord, we will find that “the arm of flesh” will fail and we will discover we have set out on a long, dark journey. Along the way, a man on that road may offer some feeble intellectual theories, and even impress some gullible roadside

travelers as he goes, but they all fail to tell us of a heaven, eternity, and faith. His theories do well to reach above the trees. The world may be intrigued with such a limited theory, but, today, we cannot be.

Just a glance into Paul’s opening in his first letter to Corinth reminds us that the “foolishness of God” is wiser than the “wisdom of man.” As I tossed these thoughts in my mind a while, I thought back to the years of study we undertook in colleges and universities.

But, do you know that, in all the years we sat in class, no professor ever taught one thing, that I can remember, about God, about heaven, about hell, about salvation, about the blood of Christ, about being

“born again,” about “water and Spirit,” or about the church of Christ. While proficient in the disciplines of the world, they were not proficient in the matters of heaven.

I understood then that for us to attain a faith that will move mountains, we must go to a greater source. We have to seek out something solid to build our faith on, and the world’s scholarship is not the place to go. I had to go where faith is.

Peter gives us the answer none of the university’s scholarship could give. Where else can we go, asks the great apostle, “You have the words of eternal life.”

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

St. Paul once wrote these words: “a thorn in the flesh was given to me, an angel of Satan, to beat me, to keep me from being too elated.” (2 Cor. 12:7-10) Exactly, what was the thorn in his flesh? The truth is that no one knows. The teachers of the Bible do not know. Scholars of Scripture do not know. Maybe it was epilepsy, or a constant headache.

Maybe it was poor vision. In the letter to the Galatians, Paul writes of his large handwriting, perhaps to compensate for his poor eyesight. Maybe it was a speech impediment.

This is perhaps one reason why Paul was more impressive in his letters than in his being in person. (2 Cor. 10:10) Others think that the thorn was the Jewish people - his people – who continued to reject Christ.

We do not know what was the thorn in his flesh. But we do know that Paul asked the Lord three times to relieve him of this thorn. And three times the Lord refused. The Lord gave him this answer: “My grace is enough for you, for my power manifests

itself in your weakness.” Three times Paul asked to be relieved. And God always gave him the same answer – “It is in the very thorn that you carry that my power is revealed.”

Paul learned an important lesson. He learned that God does not remove all of our weakness. He uses our weakness, our troubles, to make us strong on his behalf – until His power manifests itself. For it is in the darkness that the light of Christ shines. It is in our weakness that God reveals his strength. It is in the death on the Cross that God reveals the Savior, the One who brings eternal life.

Each of us carries with us a “thorn in the flesh.” Each of us has some impediment that makes us humble, that literally “grounds” us. For one person it might be a weakness in body. For another person, it might be a memory, or a sadness, that stays with us and never leaves us.

For another person, it might be a difficult person in our life – at work or in the family. And maybe this thorn will always be present in our lives.

But God can use this thorn to give grace in our lives. We must only ask for his grace. This truth is truly the paradox of Christianity.

For the last two weeks, I

worked with Sr. Rosemary and her Sisters in Uganda. We celebrated Mass on the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul. She reminded me that St. Peter was a simply man, and also a weak man. He was illiterate, a fisherman. But he was also cowardly, timid, uncertain, and at times unfaithful to Jesus.

But Jesus said to him “It is upon you, Peter, that I will build my church.” Jesus built his Church upon weak men, so that we might always be reminded that our strength comes from God alone. It is in the Cross that we find life. It is in our humility that we know the greatness of God. The love of God, the grace of God, is enough to turn our weakness into His strength.

This past week Fr. Jim returned from Africa where he worked on water and sanitation projects in Ethiopia and in Uganda. We also held our annual Vacation Bible School (July 10-12) for the little people in our parish.

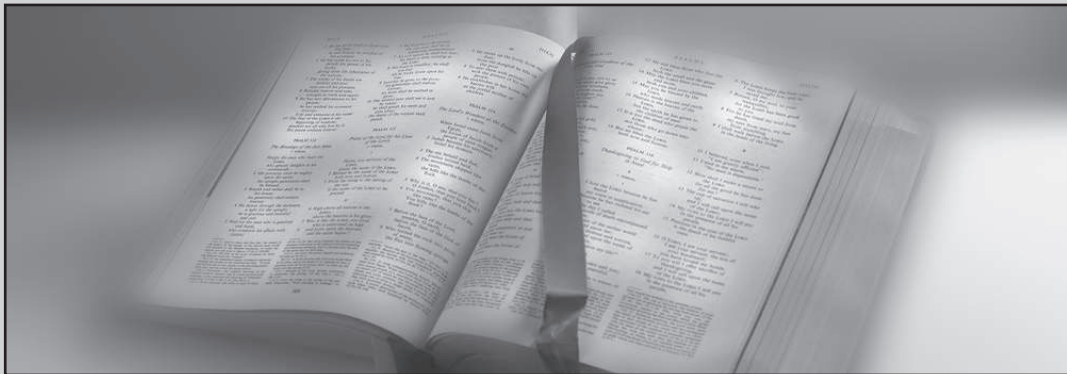

nity to meet with Oklahoma's senators and representatives and talk about 4-H. CWF truly is an opportunity to personally experience so many of the things the youth have learned in their history and civics classes," she said.

The Oklahoma 4-H Kids in Crisis group received a \$500 Farm Credit Services grant for the action plan they wrote. Their project involves purchasing blankets and stuffed animals for first responders to give to children in emergency situations. One grant is presented each of the five weeks during CWF. The

in Oklahoma City.

There were 243 veterans and surviving spouses assisted with their VA claims and questions last week. In the mailbag this week, 13 claims received a 100 percent rating. Those veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$510,179 per year.

They will also receive a property tax exemption and an exemption from state sales tax. Dependents of veterans not retired from the military will also be eligible for the Champ/VA medical insurance. There are other Oklahoma state benefits available depending on VA rating percentage.

Thirty-two veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$473,972 per year. A surviving spouse was approved for DIC, and another veteran was approved for Pension. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$26,797 per year.

Most of the veterans and surviving spouses we see will receive some type of VA benefit. During the first six months of 2018, we have assisted more than 400 veterans receive a 100 percent. There have been thousands of veterans who received rating decisions from 10-90 percent.

Most of the veterans and surviving spouses we assist are from Oklahoma. Our volunteers have assisted people from 45 states.

Last week we assisted a 103-year-old veteran from Clinton.

Two of our drivers spent 64 hours transporting 18 folks

"With historical Washington, D.C., as the backdrop, CWF is truly one of the best opportunities available to our club members. Another way you can support us is the donation of cars, trucks, motorcycles and other items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to support our mission. Any donations to our organization should be tax deductible.

Some of the things we provide to veterans and surviving spouses in need include food items, medical testing, rent, auto repair, handicap items, wheelchairs, walkers, etc. Veterans tell us, each day that the VA benefits we helped them to obtain have changed their lives.

Her designs are inspired by elements such as pottery, the energy of trees, all facets of energy and water.

Beginning with a white bolt of cloth spread over a 7-foot table, Michaels processes the fabric by hand-painting, dyeing, hand-felting or other means of texturizing the cloth, creating statement pieces.

“The way I design is not for the weary,” she laughed, “you have to be prepared to get dirty and put in long hours.”

“What’s important about all of these techniques is, it’s a way of expressing what all of our people have been doing for years. They’ve been creating a use of material that was foreign to them.”

Native people throughout history has pushed the use of materials, such as ribbon, beads and cotton, she explained.

“Rather than using it the way it was thought to be used, they challenged and cut the ribbon. They took cotton material and (made) beautiful Seminole patch work. Their use of these materials, they always pushed it. They were very smart and resourceful.”

“I want to use that same kind of mindset that our ancestors used,” she said.

“(Native People) didn’t follow the trends, they were trendsetters. Our trends last the longest – and I don’t want to follow any trend,” she said.

“Natives have always been modern in their design. From the turn-of-the-century up until the 1940s or 1950s, it’s been the same kind of thing. But, it is the longest collection that has ever lasted on the runway. Other collections are over by the next show. Our Native collections have had a long run and they are still running.”

“Our fashion has had a long run because it means something.”

In her first visit to Chickasaw Country, Michaels said she hopes attendees of the
