Cheyenne Fulks literally broadened her horizon this summer.

The University of Oklahoma student from Purcell traveled thousands of miles from home to spend three weeks in the east African nation of Tanzania.

She wasn't alone. Nine other OU students also made the trip for college credit through the university's Study Abroad program.

For Fulks, who will be a sophomore at OU this fall, the trip fulfilled a lifelong wish – and whetted her appetite for more world travel in the future.

She is a health and exercise science major who plans on going into occupational therapy.

Tanzania was "one country I've always wanted to visit,"

she said, "and I didn't think I would ever have the opportunity to do it again."

The travel itself was, if not grueling, long and time-consuming.

There were two 8-hour flights and a third flight of nearly 10 hours duration before the OU group reached Arusha, a city in northern Tanzania.

The group studied at a Danish school, learning some Swahili.

They stayed with local families for a week, an immersion crash course in the country's culture.

"I had a mom and dad and two little sisters and a little brother," Fulks said of her Tanzanian "family."

"They took us to market and we got to see their life," she

# Hardly the highest

Sales taxes higher in a dozen cities

If anyone tells you sales tax in Purcell is the highest in the state, don't listen.

They are wrong. The sales tax in Purcell is 10 percent, of which one tenth – a penny – is earmarked solely to support Purcell Municipal Hospital.

Another penny is earmarked for capital improvements in the city.

The other 9 cents is divided thus: 4 cents to the City of Purcell including

a penny tax specifically for capital improvements, a half-cent to McClain County and 4-1/2 cents to the state.



Voters here will be asked August 28 to extend the hospital sales tax 20 years through Dec. 31, 2039 and also approve 15 more years of the capital improvements sales tax. That would push the expiration of that sales tax

## Cooler temps, maybe rain

After surviving last week's heat, things look to be much cooler in the coming days. The upper level ridge that steered heat into the Oklahoma area is shifting to the west, bringing a surge of Canadian air behind it. This will help keep high temperatures in the near to slightly below normal range for this time of year – mostly lower 90s, and maybe even the mid to upper 80s early next week. The cool air aloft will also increase instability and bring with it chances of thunderstorms for most of the weekend and possibly into next week. Those chances of storms will become clearer as the day approaches.

## Purcell Elementary, Intermediate Schools enrollment confirmation

All students in grades pre-kindergarten through fifth grade planning to attend Purcell Schools this fall should confirm enrollment for the 2018-19 school year. Enrollment will be held at Purcell Elementary and Purcell Intermediate on Monday, August 6, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Tuesday, August 7, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Returning students and those pre-enrolled last spring need only provide a current proof of residence and up-to-date student information. Students new to the school district must bring a birth certificate and a current immunization record in addition to a current proof of residence in the Purcell School District. A current utility bill with parent or guardians name and physical address is the most efficient way to establish residence. Lease agreements or housing contracts are also acceptable. General mail will not be accepted as proof of residence. Children who will be four years of age prior to Sept. 1, 2018 are eligible for enrollment in the pre-k program. Pre-K is currently filled and new enrollees are being placed on a waiting list. Students who will be five before September 1 are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten. Open house at Purcell Elementary School will be held on Monday, August 13, from 5:30-7 p.m. Intermediate School open house will be from 6-7 p.m. Classes will begin Wednesday, August 15, at 8 a.m. Please call the school office at 527-2146 with any questions regarding enrollment.

## NEWS from the City of Purcell

- ### Regulations for Garage Sales
1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.
  2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.
  3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.
  4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.
  5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.
  6. If you have any questions, call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274. Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

**OSU EXTENSION News****July is an important month for native pastures**

Native prairie and bermuda grass may be the two most common types of pastures and hay fields in central Oklahoma, but they are very different from when it comes to management.

To maximize productivity over the long-term, native prairie needs more rest at different times and a higher residual stubble height than bermudagrass.

Also, being predominantly bunch grasses, native prairie may require years to recover from severe overgrazing that bermudagrass in comparison can recover from more quickly.

July is the time when native grasses enter their reproductive stage and begin to prepare for the following year.

This time of year is also the most important for plant persistence and stand improvement. Overgrazing after mid-July would have the most detrimental effect on native grass stands.

Ideally, a portion of a native

pasture would receive a full growing season of rest once every four to five years. However, that means 20 percent of your pasture is not being utilized which many times is not very realistic.

An alternative is to rotate rest periods focusing on giving each part of your native pasture a rest between July 15 and November 15 every few years. This includes maintaining a six to eight inch residual stubble height and utilizing the "take half, leave half" rule of thumb.

This also includes not grazing the same area of pasture at the same time two years in a row.

For example, if you graze a pasture in January and February of 2018, you would not want to graze that same pasture again in January and February of 2019. Having your stocking rate optimized makes this rotation much easier.

The pastures rested between July 15 and November 15 can be utilized for winter grazing, but the standard six to eight inch

residual stubble height should still be maintained.

Even though the plant is dormant, its crown can still be damaged due to low grazing. There are other reasons to leave an appropriate stubble height during dormancy. Stubble catches snow for greater cold protection and winter persistence and also increases water infiltration.

In the case of native hay meadows, a single cutting of hay should be made for the year in early to mid-July.

A cutting at this time maximizes the tradeoff between forage quality and yield while maintaining stand quality. Additional cuttings or grazing are detrimental to the forage stand.

Also, an estimated 70 percent of forage production occurs in native hay meadows prior to early July, so little forage is gained by additional harvests.

Additional information can be found in NREM-2891 Native Hay Meadow Management.

**Cause of traffic death unknown**

Investigation continues into the cause of a collision which left a Norman man dead and a Purcell man hospitalized on July 18.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Shayne Ballard identified the victim as Eric P. Gulbranson, 55.

He sustained head and internal injuries and was pronounced dead at the scene by State Medical Examiner Janice Wilkinson.

The wreck occurred about 1-1/2 miles north of Lexington at approximately 7:39 p.m. on

U.S. 77 at York Road.

Gulbranson was driving a 2002 Dodge Ram pickup.

The other driver was Robert E. Riggle, 50. He was the driver of a 2004 Dodge Ram pickup.

Riggle sustained internal injuries and was admitted to OU Medical Center in good condition.

He has since been discharged. No other details of the accident were available at press time.

**FSA county committee nominations launched**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) encourages America's farmers and ranchers to nominate candidates to lead, serve and represent their community on their local county committee.

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will accept nominations for county committee members.

Producers across the country are already serving on committees where they play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA, making im-

portant decisions on programs dealing with disaster and conservation, emergencies, commodity price loan support, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

"Our county committees make decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve the needs of agriculture in their community," said Acting FSA Administrator Steve Peterson. "We strongly encourage all eligible producers to visit their local FSA office today to find out how to get involved in their county's election. There's an

increasing need for representation from underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers."

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated farmers and ranchers serve on FSA county committees, which consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month, or as needed. Members serve three-year terms.

Producers can nominate themselves or others. Check your local USDA service center to see if your local administrative area is up for

election this year.

Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program and reside in the area where the election is being held.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### Working together to end the opioid crisis

#### Congressman Tom Cole

The country has been tangled in many debates lately that seem to create partisan divides in our daily conversations. However, it is important to note that there has been serious bipartisan work completed in Congress.

Recently, the House has considered and passed multiple pieces of sweeping legislation to address one of the more pressing issues on the home front – the fight against opioid abuse and addiction.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 115 Americans die every day from an opiate overdose – that is one American every 13 minutes. In fact, drug overdoses are the leading cause of death among Americans under 50.

We know the most significant contributor to this alarming fact is the misuse and abuse of opioids. Prescription drugs like oxycodone, codeine and morphine have become readily available through illegal channels and are distributed on the street without supervision from the original prescribing health professional.

Addiction to these once well-intended drugs, as well as illicit use of heroin and fentanyl, have led to the deaths of over 50,000 Americans in just one year.

In the House Appropriations Committee, we understand

the importance and essential role federal funding has in combating the opioid crisis. Combatting this epidemic has become one of the most significant challenges facing families and communities across our nation. Thanks to leadership from Chairman Hal Rogers, Congress has been targeting financial resources to address this crisis since 2015.

This past month, the Appropriations Committee approved nearly \$4 billion in the Labor, Health and Human Services appropriations bill to combat the opioid epidemic for fiscal year 2019. This includes supporting numerous medical research and public health programs within the National Institutes of Health and CDC that are targeted toward treatment, prevention, and care for those suffering from opioid abuse. Maintaining our financial commitment is fundamental to helping this crisis turn a corner.

In addition to work done by the House Committee on Appropriations, I want to join Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy in commending the efforts of Chairman Walden of the Committee on Energy and Commerce and Chairman Brady of the Committee on Ways and Means.

Both Chairmen have held numerous hearings to examine the many facets of this issue. In their respective jurisdictions,

they have proposed and passed through committee multiple pieces of legislation related to enforcement, prevention, education and treatment of opioid abuse.

The end result has been the passage of more than 50 pieces of legislation through the House this year alone that are targeted specifically at preventing and ending the cycle of opioid abuse.

Leadership from these Committees and work from their respective members have been steadfast and critical to the ongoing efforts to reducing the prevalence of opioid addiction. Addressing this continuing epidemic is a top priority, and both Republicans and Democrats in Congress are committed to continuing to help families and communities struggling with the consequences of addiction.

Opioid abuse and addiction is not an urban issue, nor is it a rural or suburban issue – it is a national issue. The increasing rate of opioid misuse affects us all - young and old, families and friends, neighbors and co-workers.

I believe that our sights are set on eliminating the hold opioid addiction has on our nation. I will continue to stand with our nation's leader and our bipartisan, bicameral coalition of Congressional allies in their determination to ending our nation's addiction to opioids.

# MOVIES WITH DAVE

I guess this was sequel weekend because all three of the films I saw this week were follow-ups of previous movies.

We have a sequel to a movie about Denzel Washington killing in the name of justice, a sequel to a musical filled to the brim with ABBA hits, and a sequel to a horror film where everyone gets murdered over Skype.

Let's get right to it shall we?



First up is "The Equalizer 2."

Retired CIA black ops operative Robert McCall (Denzel Washington) is back, continuing to help the less fortunate, hopeless, and oppressed at every possible opportunity.

But when someone he cares about is harmed, how far will he go to seek justice?

I don't know what to say about this movie.

It's just Denzel Washington doing another Denzel revenge movie. That might as well be its own sub-genre at this point.

The action here is much like the first "Equalizer." Stylistically, it's nothing to write home about, but it is very brutal and certainly earns its 'R' rating.

But the most obscene thing in this movie was the ridiculously overt product placement.

Denzel works as a driver for Lyft, a popular ride sharing and taxi app, in this film and do they ever hammer that in at the beginning of this movie.

I sure hope Lyft cut the makers of this film a giant check. Especially for the trailers, which felt more like an advertisement for Lyft than an actual promotion for the film.

I haven't seen product placement this shameless in quite a while.

Story wise this movie surprisingly feels less like a revenge flick and a bit more like a spy thriller, especially towards the end.

Kind of like Denzel does Jason Bourne, except the movie wasn't directed by Paul Greengrass, so the film doesn't look like it was shot by someone being chased by a swarm of killer bees.

Honestly, I found the plot quite boring and I could barely keep my eyes open during the first hour or so. But spy thrillers can be fairly hit or miss with me, so your mileage may vary.

Luckily for this movie, Denzel is as talented of an actor as ever.

The dialogue itself isn't anything all that special, but man oh man does Denzel know how to unload on the powerful scenes.

There's a reason he's received nine Academy Award nominations and won twice.

One scene between him and Ashton Sanders, who plays an artistic but troubled young man in the film, actually gave me goosebumps.

He really is a fantastic actor. Even if I don't always enjoy the movies Denzel stars in, I can certainly count on an exceptional performance from him.

Overall, if you enjoy other Denzel action movies, I don't see any reason why you wouldn't enjoy this one too.

If Denzel wasn't in this film, most would probably write it off as a forgettable revenge flick. Thankfully Denzel is charismatic enough to carry an entire film on his back.

Those who expect a bit more style or substance in their entertainment may be disappointed, but for Denzel fans, this movie is a no brainer.



Next is "Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again"

Five years after the events of the first film, Sophie (Amanda Seyfried) prepares to reopen her mom's hotel, only a year after her mother Donna (Meryl Streep) passed away.

While Sophie, along with her friends and family, make everything ready, the film shows a young Donna (Lily James) during her fateful summer getaway and how she originally met Bill (Stellan Skarsgård and Josh Dylan), Sam (Pierce Brosnan and Jeremy Irvine), and Harry (Colin Firth and Hugh Skinner).

I'm going to be completely honest here. I was not a big fan of the original "Mamma Mia!" Sure, it's filled with talented performers and has a soundtrack with all of ABBA's number one hits, but as a movie I found it horribly lacking.

With the exception of a few songs, most of them just felt thrown in with zero rhyme or reason.

Yes, the music is wonderfully catchy, but lyrically they had almost nothing to do with the plot, making the story feel rushed at times and horribly bogged down at others.

Plus the cinematography was mediocre at best, especially with such a beautiful location, the choreography ranged from uninspired to downright silly, and pretty much all the humor fell flat for me.

With all that in mind, I didn't have terribly high hopes for this sequel. Frankly, I figured it'd just be more of the same.

I'm here to tell you I was completely wrong.

It's flat out astounding how much this film improves on the original.

Literally every element here is better than the first.

The songs actually fit what's happening in the movie! I can't tell you how much of a difference that makes towards the overall film.

It almost seemed like some of the music was written specifically for the film. As it turned out they were just some of ABBA's lesser known tracks I had never heard before.

Still, it's such a huge difference from the 2008 film.

Just look at the titular song, "Mamma Mia," which is in both of these movies.

In the first one Donna just sees the three men hiding in her old goat house.

We know the guys are her old lovers and one of them is Sophie's father, but beyond that we know almost nothing about Donna's relationship between all of them. She just suddenly bursts into song and that's that.

In this one we actually see Donna's romance with Sam and the eventual heartbreak caused by it. So when young Donna sings "I was cheated by you and I think you know when" there's an emotional impact.

It even becomes a pivotal moment in the film. Exactly what you'd expect from the song the movie is named for.

Beyond that, the singing is just as lovely or an improvement over the first one.

Even Pierce Brosnan, who was relentlessly mocked for his shout-singing in the original, has a wonderful little musical moment in the movie.

I actually got emotional over Pierce Brosnan singing. That was absolutely the last thing I expected from this or any movie. This film was just full of surprises.

The background music was also very well thought-out.

There's a wonderful little mo-

ment during Donna and Harry's first date where you can hear "Our Last Summer" playing softly in the background. The very same song Harry sang in the first film about their summer together.

Everything across the board is improved here.

The cinematography is more lively, the choreography is better and wildly more elaborate than the first.

Then there's the humor.

This movie is genuinely hilarious. I can't tell you how much I laughed during this film.

Also I wasn't sure what to expect with the younger cast and the story of Donna's wild summer, but it actually ended up being my favorite part of the movie.

Lily James had some massive shoes to fill, playing a young Meryl Streep, but she pulls it off wonderfully.

I'd go as far to say as the character of Donna just as much James's as she is Streep's at this point.

She brings so much life and personality to the role.

I really hope this performance lands her more roles on the big screen. She was an absolute joy to watch here.

At this point I think I'm just gushing.

I'll concede that this isn't a perfect film. There is a pretty major lull towards the end of the movie where I found myself getting a bit bored.

But the improvements over the original are so drastic, I just don't care.

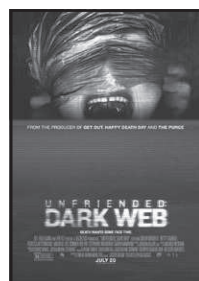
This movie completely exceeded my expectations.

The National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

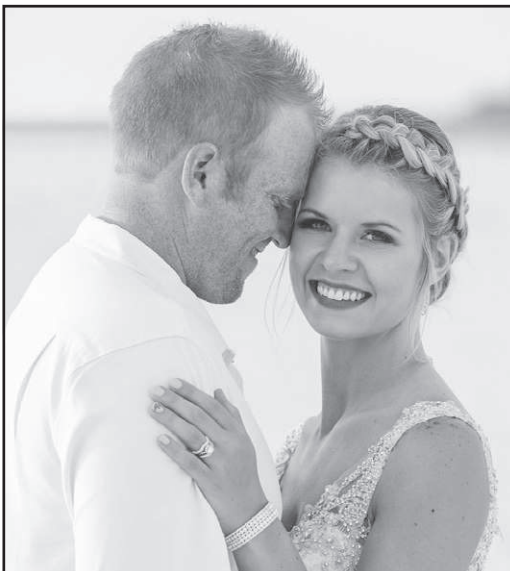

## New school year jitters are normal

While a new school year is bound to create lots of anticipation for Oklahoma students and their parents, it also is likely everyone is a little nervous, too.

The good news is it is normal for both parents and students to experience some anxiety.

"It doesn't matter if your children are returning to the same school, setting foot in a new one or moving to a new grade level, a few jitters are natural," said Laura Hubbs-Tait, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension parenting specialist.

"Starting a new school year can be exciting as well as stressful for students and their parents."

There are lots of positive ways to deal with any potential new-school-year jitters. For starters, establishing the right attitude goes a long way. More specifically, parents who try to project the right attitude help set the tone for the upcoming year.

"There's a good chance parents are just as anxious as their

children about the start of a new school year, but if children pick up on that nervousness it can add to their hesitation and reluctance," Hubbs-Tait said.

For reassurance, parents can reach out to friends, other family members or even a professional counselor to talk through any concerns.

"The goal for parents is to be in the right frame of mind to support their children and give them the best possible start to a new school year," Hubbs-Tait said. "Some ways parents can show a good attitude include offering general encouragement, speaking positively about classes and teachers and encouraging children to get involved with extracurricular activities."

Establishing routines such as starting the day with a healthy breakfast and setting aside a regular time for homework also can help counter children's anxiety.

"School-aged children should be well used to bedtime routines such as bathing,

brushing teeth and reading a story. It is also important for parents to become accustomed to talking with children about assignments, grades and what's happening in the classroom," Hubbs-Tait said.

"If these routines haven't been established yet or they've been interrupted by summer activities, the start of the school year is an opportune time to create or resume these positive habits."

Finally, it is important that families regularly take the time to share the day's events and activities with each other.

"This gives children a chance to talk about what they're learning, their friends and classmates, any problems they're facing and how they're feeling about school," Hubbs-Tait said.

"For example, if it fits in your family's schedule, dinner is a great time talk. Best of all, research shows that families who eat meals together have children who are both mentally and physically healthier," she concluded.

## Tale of two brothers entwined

DA: Man impersonated his brother

Sometimes there's no love between brothers for good reason.

And now one of the brothers is charged in McClain County District Court with falsely impersonate another to create liability and larceny of lost property.

An arrest warrant is outstanding for Micah J. Brunson, 33, of Moore.

According to an affidavit, it all began May 12 with a report of a stolen wallet at Riverwind Casino.

That victim told an officer he left his jacket by a machine. When he found the jacket at another machine, his wallet containing \$600 cash and a pack of cigarettes were missing.

Surveillance video showed a man identified as Aaron Gragg picking up the jacket and going through the pockets.

The following day, the officer spoke with the suspect and identified him as Gragg. The man, now known to be Brunson, denied taking the money.

The officer called Gragg on July 6. Gragg said he'd committed no crime and only learned of the outstanding warrant due to a background check for a job.

Gragg told the officer Brunson, his brother, has used his name before. He added

Brunson was in the Oklahoma County Jail on other charges and asked the officer to look further into the matter.

The officer got a copy of Brunson's booking photo from the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Department and confirmed Brunson was the person on the casino's surveillance video.

Gragg also confirmed that a photo taken from the surveillance video was indeed Brunson.

## Lewd acts

Lex man will stand trial on 3 counts

A 35-year-old Lexington man will stand trial in Cleveland County District Court on three counts of lewd or indecent acts to a child under the age of 16.

Hunter L. Smith waived his preliminary hearing last week.

Formal arraignment will be at 2 p.m. September 20. By then, Smith must have a new attorney as William Devereaux was allowed to withdraw from representing him.

Smith remains free on a \$20,000 bond.

Prosecutors filed the felony charges January 23 after a then-15-year-old girl told a Blanchard school counselor that her mother's boyfriend had been touching her inappropriately.

The alleged sexual contact

occurred at a home in Lexington that was shared by the girl, her mother and Smith.

According to an affidavit, the counselor notified Lexington police on December 7.

An officer contacted the mother at her work and brought mother and daughter to the police station.

At a forensic interview on December 11, the alleged victim said Smith violated her.

In addition, she said Smith would come up behind her and rub against her through their clothing.

The incidents occurred between April 1, 2017 and Dec. 5, 2017, according to court records.

Police contacted Smith, who initially agreed to speak with an investigator. He later cancelled the interview, according to the affidavit.

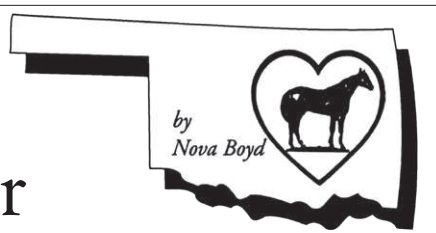

## 2018 National Reining Horse Association Derby

The National Reining Horse Association held its 52nd annual Derby from June 23-July 1 at State Fair Park in Oklahoma City.

The Derby showcases some of the most talented 4-, 5-, and 6-year-old horses, plus special classes for 7-year-old horses. Exhibitors were competing for a piece of the more than \$1 million in cash and prizes. With competitors of all ages and skill levels, the event featured two full slates of ancillary reining classes in addition to the limited-age event.

The 2018 Derby entries were record-setting, topping the 2017 Derby, which had been record-setting at that time. This was the 38th year for the Derby and the largest Derby ever.

The event featured American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) and American Paint Horse Association (APHA) approved classes. Purcell's Thiago Boechat, head trainer and general manager at Xtra Quarter Horses, won the AQHA Open Reining riding SG Frozen Enterprise for owner Silver Spurs Equine, now owner of Xtra Quarter Horses.

A new crowd was seen walking through the barns this year. Kids from Toby Keith's OK Kids Korral, a place for families to stay while their child is undergoing treatment for cancer, came to the event for the inaugural Hay Day at the Derby hosted by the NRHYA, the youth association. The event was an opportunity to showcase the sport and give back to the youth of Oklahoma City.

The day started with a trip to the NRHA office, where each honorary guest teamed up with a member of the NRHYA officer team to make pool noodle ponies and change into their new cowboy and cowgirl shirts, courtesy of NRHA Corporate Partner, CINCH. Then they sat down and enjoyed a pizza party and watched videos about what the association is all about.

The real excitement began when the group headed over to State Fair Park where they got to meet event vendors and sponsors, took a behind-the-scenes look at how reining is judged and watched a horse get a brand new pair of shoes. To end the day, each kid had the opportunity to sit in the saddle atop a reining horse. As you can imagine, the smiles were ear to ear!

The Derby hosted the 16th Annual Interscholastic Equestrian Association Western National Finals. The IEA members compete as individuals and as teams. Over 150 middle school and high school student-riders from eight zones across the nation competed. The IEA was organized to promote and improve the quality of equestrian competition and instruc-

tion available to middle and secondary school students and is open to public and private schools and barn teams.

Riders do not need to own a horse because the IEA supplies mounts and tack. Classes for this show were western reining and western horsemanship, western riding and huntseat equitation.

The Derby annually hosts the Collegiate Reining Championships, which consists of 12 riders, four from the National Collegiate Equestrian Association (NCEA), four from the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association (ISHA), and four who are selected by the NRHA. The Collegiate Championships are the ultimate catch-ride, as riders are provided horses by reining horse owners. No Oklahomans qualified this year.

## Apply now

### Mail absentee ballots available

McClain County voters who want absentee ballots for the August 28 runoff primary election mailed to them should apply now, county election board secretary Karen Haley said.

Although the county election board can accept applications for absentee ballots until 5 p.m. August 22, Haley urged voters who want to vote by absentee ballot to apply early.

Absentee ballot application forms are available at the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Forms may also be downloaded and printed from [www.elections.ok.gov](http://www.elections.ok.gov).

"At least two mail transactions must be made," Haley said. "The county election board must mail the ballots to the voter and the voter must return the voted ballots by mail."

Those ballots must be in the hands of the election board by 7 p.m. on election day in order to be counted.

Any registered voter may vote by absentee ballot in any election in which the individual is eligible to vote.

However, a voter must be registered and reside at an address within the geographical boundaries of a school district or municipality to vote in those elections.

"While anyone can vote

absentee without giving a reason, the law still provides several excuses and it is to the advantage of some voters to use them," Haley said.

By stating one of the following reasons on their applications, voters can activate some special conditions that make it easier for them to use absentee ballots:

- Voters who are physically handicapped or care for physically handicapped persons who cannot be left unattended. These individuals may apply only by mail, fax or email.

- Voters who are confined to nursing homes within the county. An absentee voting board goes to nursing homes a few days before the election and sets up a small polling place for those voters. They may apply only by mail, fax or email.

- Military personnel, county residents residing overseas and their spouses and dependents are eligible to receive absentee ballots. These voters may apply only by mail, fax or email. Military members should contact their unit's voting service officer for forms and information. Other Oklahoma residents living overseas can receive the same materials from any U.S. military installation, embassy, consulate or online at <http://www.fvap.gov/oklahoma>.

## Voter registration date near Deadline August 3 for runoff primary

August 3 is the last day to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the August 28 runoff election.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the requirements for registering are that the individual is a U.S. citizen, Oklahoma resident and at least 18 years old.

Those who have never been registered to vote, who aren't currently registered in their county of residence or who need to change their registration information may apply.

They need to fill out and mail

an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight August 3.

Applications postmarked after that deadline will still be accepted and processed, but won't be approved until after August 28.

The county election board responds in writing to every person who submits an application, Haley said.

The response is either a voter identification card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place or a letter

explaining why the application wasn't approved.

Anyone who has submitted a voter registration application and who hasn't received a response within 30 days should contact the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Application forms are available at the county election board, as well as most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries in the county, Haley said.

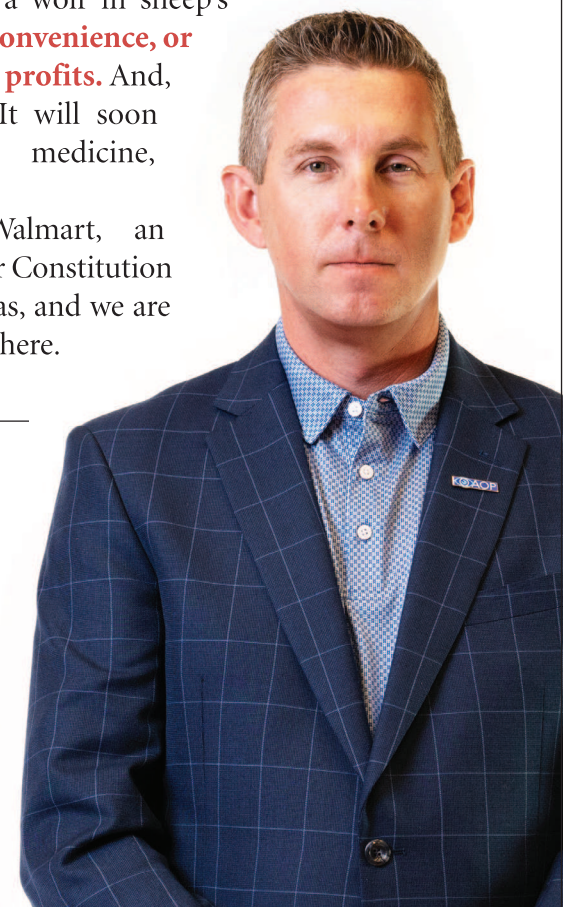

Neither is a new tax, city and hospital officials stress.

According to reports from the Oklahoma Tax Commission, 17 municipalities, including Purcell, have local sales tax rates of 5 percent.

Two others – Glenpool and Webbers Falls – have topped the 5 percent rate with local sales taxes of 5.1 and 5.5 percent, respectively.

But those figures don't tell the whole story.

If you make a purchase in Glenpool, your total sales tax is 9.967 percent. That is because Tulsa County's sales tax is just 0.367 percent.

The total sales tax you will pay in Webbers Falls is 10.65 percent due to the Muskogee County sales tax rate of 0.65 percent.

Eleven other towns also have a higher sales tax burden

than Purcell by virtue of their county sales tax.

Boley in Okfuskee County has the highest sales taxes in Oklahoma – 11.5 percent. Okfuskee County's sales tax is 2 percent.

There are three cities – Kiowa and Savanna, both in Pittsburg County, and Red Rock in Noble County – where the total sales tax is an even 11 percent. Both counties assess a sales tax of 1.5 percent.

Two Creek County municipalities and one city in Hughes County share a total sales tax burden of 10.5 percent.

They are Bristow and Oilton, both in Creek County, and Holdenville in Hughes County.

The county sales taxes there are 1 percent.

Next at 10.375 percent is Watonga in Blaine County. That county's rate is 0.875 percent.

Tatums, a small town in Carter County, has a total sales tax of 10.25 percent, of which 0.75 percent is the sales tax for the county.

Just behind that is Blackwell in Kay County. With a county sales tax of 0.667 percent, Blackwell's total sales tax comes to 10.167 percent.

The sales tax total for Porum in Muskogee County is 10.15 percent. The county sales tax is 0.65 percent.

Purcell and Dibble, both in McClain County, have a total sales tax of 10 percent.

Four others fall below the 10 percent benchmark.

They are Piedmont, 9.85 percent, Canadian County sales tax 0.35 percent; Erick, 9.75 percent, Beckham County sales tax 0.25 percent; and Nicoma Park and Spencer, 9.5 percent (no sales tax for Oklahoma County).

This was followed by a four-day safari to three national parks, including the famed Serengeti National Park.

With tour guides showing them around the parks, it was the students' first – and only – time to simply be tourists on safari.

The last 10 days were spent on the island of Zanzibar, where the OU students took a film studies class while attending the Zanzibar International Film Festival.

They watched African cin-

ema films and at the end of a week, had to write a paper on their favorite film.

"They literally have every race on this honeymoon island," she said. "It is gorgeous and that was our freedom. We got to roam around the island."

The students were also required to keep a journal, making at least 10 entries during their sojourn in country.

Fulks said Westerners think they are doing good for Tanzania through things like tourism.

"But they are actually negatively affecting Tanzania devel-

opment," she said. "It's quite interesting actually."

Fulks said her out-of-pocket expense was minimal for the 6-hour college credit.

She applied for and got a fellowship for the tuition and was able to utilize scholarship funds for her airfare.

OU offers other summer journeys around the world. Next year's study destinations include Italy, China, Brazil and the Middle East, which is where Fulks wants to go next.

"It is an amazing program and I suggest it to others," she said.

**OSU EXTENSION News****Safely walking and riding a bicycle to school**

Walking and riding a bike are two of the easiest, most reliable ways to get anywhere, including school.

That means when Oklahoma students head back to the classroom soon everyone should keep some important safety precautions in mind.

"Walking and riding a bicycle are great ways to get to and from school. But, children can be at an increased risk of injury because they're smaller, tend to have trouble judging distances and speeds of cars, and don't have a lot of experience with traffic laws," said Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist.

As a basic rule, walkers and bikers should obey all traffic signs, signals and laws, as well as any adult school crossing guards.

Younger children who do not know the rules of the road should be accompanied by an adult.

**Dragons:**

to don the Dragon uniform. Howard was a three-year letterman in three sports (football, basketball, track). He is still recognized as the greatest punter in Purcell history as he averaged 44+ yards per punt during his Dragon career. Also, an outstanding running back, as Howard was selected All-State as a running back and as a punter.

He accepted a football scholarship to OU, where he played for two years until an injury he suffered while working in the oil field one summer effectively ended his football playing career.

**Lester Lane** 1948-50 quarterback/defensive back\*. OU. A 15-sport letterman during his athletic career at Purcell, which included being named an All-State quarterback in football, an All-State Guard in Basketball and All-State in track as a State Pole Vault Champion. He was named as a High School Basketball All-American and was a State AAU Dive Champion. Starter on the 1950 Purcell Class B State Title Basketball team.

Accepted an OU football scholarship and played for two years, before moving full-time to the men's basketball team. Named All-Big 7 his junior and senior years. Still recognized as the last three-sport letterman at OU as he was also a pole vaulter on the track team. Lester was the starting point guard for the 1960 U.S. Men's Gold Medal Olympic Basketball team and was enshrined with the same U.S. team into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in 2010.

**Rick McCurdy** 1958-60 tight end and defensive end\*. OU. A two-sport Purcell All-Stater who was a standout on the 1961 Class B State Championship Basketball team, McCurdy was the starting Dragon quarterback as a sophomore, before moving over to tight end and helped Purcell to an 11-1-1 season in 1960, losing only to Choctaw in the Class B State Semi-Finals. A three-year starter for OU (All-Big 8 in 1964) playing for Bud Wilkinson.

He was drafted by the New York Jets in the 8th Round of the 1965 AFL Draft, but a career in medicine called and thousands of his patients now thank him for that decision.

**Mike McCurdy** 1967-69

"Parents and children should work together as a family to map out the safest route to and from school," Peek said. "Once a route is identified, parents should stress how important it is for children to stick to the plan and avoid taking shortcuts or accepting rides from people they don't know or who weren't sent by their parents."

Both walkers and bikers also should pay close attention to their surroundings and keep distractions, such as cell phones or other electronic devices, to a minimum.

"Watch for parked, oncoming or moving vehicles when crossing driveways and intersections," Peek said. "Be especially careful at intersections and crosswalks. Before crossing, check the traffic and only proceed when there is no oncoming traffic."

Walkers should use sidewalks when they are available. Otherwise, they should keep to the shoulder of the road, facing traffic.

Meanwhile, according to the

Oklahoma Department of Public Safety's Driver's Manual, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as a person driving a car and are subject to all the same vehicle laws. This means bike riders obey the law, just like car drivers.

For safety purposes, bicyclists should wear properly fitted bike helmets and brightly colored clothing to make them more visible to motorists.

Bicycle riders also should watch for road hazards such as potholes, storm grates and pools of water which could cause them to lose control of their bikes.

"Empty parking lots or other low-traffic areas are good places to practice important bike-handling skills like stopping and signaling, which can increase your child's confidence in being able to ride to and from school safely," Peek said.

Mike was a three-year starter at quarterback, who still holds the Purcell record of throwing five touchdowns in one game against Jones in 1968 during a 67-26 Purcell victory. He was named All-Conference, All-District and All-State. He was selected as a High School All-American quarterback. Accepted an OU Football Scholarship but switched to basketball and became a three year starter for the Sooners.

Gifted in any sport, Mike used his vast talents to become the rare athletic superstar that made his Purcell teams competitive with any opponent.

**Mike Ellis** 1970-72 offensive line and defensive line\*. SMU. A three-year starter on the offensive and defensive lines for the Dragons, Mike was selected as the District A-6 Lineman of the Year and then was also selected All-State. A four sport letterman while at Purcell, Mike eventually accepted a football scholarship from SMU where he was quickly inserted into a starting role as a freshman nose guard on the SMU varsity team.

Still thought of today as one of the most dominant linemen to ever play for the Dragons.

**Joe McReynolds** 1970-72 quarterback and linebacker\*. OU. Even after 46 years, Joe is still known as one of the greatest offensive players in Purcell Football History. A natural born athlete who was a star in every sport he played, Joe was a three year starter at quarterback. He was **The Sunday Oklahoman's** 1972 All-State "Back of the Year", and was also named a High School All-American quarterback by two different publications.

Recruited by almost everyone in the country, he accepted a scholarship to play football for the Sooners. Still the winningest quarterback in Purcell Football History (31-7) over his three varsity seasons.

**Cliff Thrift** 1971-73 offensive lineman and linebacker\*. East Central University. Without a doubt, the greatest defensive player in Purcell Football History. He will always be remembered for his toughness and tenacity as a Dragon in games and in practice. As a full-time linebacker in college, Thrift made 538 career tackles which remains a Tiger football record. A third round pick of

the Chargers in the 1979 NFL Draft, he would play for them until 1985 when he joined the Super Bowl XX Champion Chicago Bears. After a year with the Bears, he went to the LA Rams in 1986 and then retired from the NFL after that season.

**Gerald Green** 1972-74 running back and corner back\*. OSU. Gerald is still known by many as one of the greatest offensive players in Purcell Football History. He still holds the career rushing record of 4,341 yards, the single season rushing record of 2,606 yards, most career touchdowns with 47, the most career points at 292 and the top three Purcell Rushing games (295, 285 and 264 yards). A starter on the 1974 Purcell Class 2A State Champion Basketball Team, Green also won three gold medals at the 1975 State Track Meet including the 100 and 220 yard dashes and 440 yard relay.

**Chris Willis** 1973-75 running back / free safety\*. Arizona State. Willis is still known today by his teammates and by his competitors as one of the most unassuming athletic superstars to ever walk the halls at Purcell. A three-sport letterman for the Dragons, Chris was named All-State in football, he won three gold medals at the 1976 State Track Meet in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and 440 yard relay. He was also a mainstay on the 1974 Class 2A State Champion Basketball team. Willis played college football at Arizona State University for Coach Frank Kush, where Chris was a four-year letterman at wide receiver.

**Jimmy Don Green** 1977-79 running back and cornerback\*. Northwestern State University. Pound for pound, one of the most exciting and electrifying athletes to ever compete in any sport for the Dragons. A three-sport letterman for Purcell, Jimmy Don was All-State in football, won three gold medals at the 1980 State Track Meet in the 100 yard dash, 440 yard dash and the mile relay).

He lettered in basketball. He scored a total of 31 touchdowns as a junior in 1978 (25 rushing, 5 receiving) and one on a punt return. The Dragons went to the Class A State Semifinals. Green was also selected as The Oklahoman's 1978 "Co-Little All City Back of the Year."

Jamie is survived by his beloved wife, Cindy, of the home; mom, Delores Givens; sister, Lourinda, and two sons, Garret and Greyson.

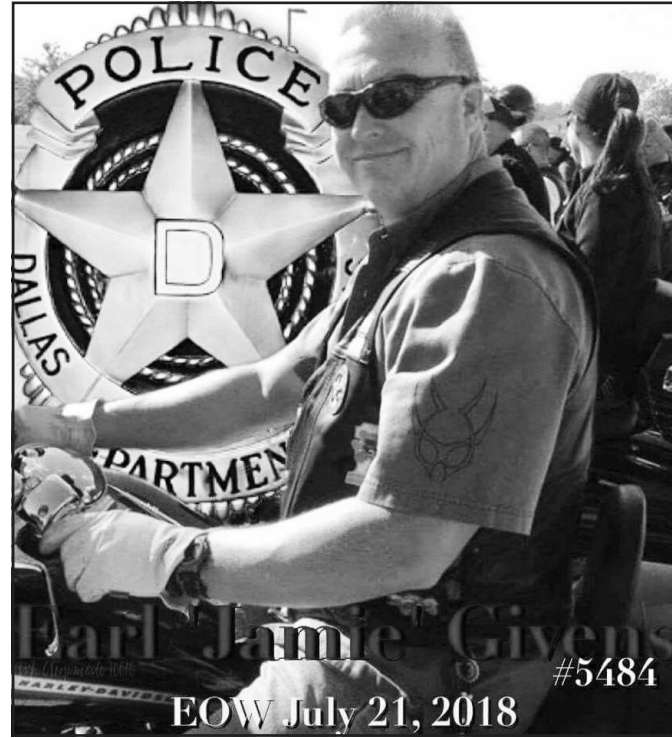
Fellow officer and friend, Lawrence Nichols of the Dallas Police Department said, "Jamie was larger than life. Everyone loved him."

### Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Tiffany's Restaurant, 101 Main Street, in Noble will host its sixth annual B.K. Shaw annual Veterans Breakfast from 6 a.m. to 1 p.m. on July 31.

Congratulations Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week Troy Lollis who served during World War II in the United States Navy. Mr. Lollis makes his home in Choctaw.

I continue to be amazed at the number of veterans and surviving spouses who visit us each week for assistance with their VA claims and questions.

Last Tuesday, we were able to assist 145. As there are always more than we can accommodate, please remember that we start helping veterans by at least 5:30 a.m. and we are usually full before 7 a.m. After we reach our capacity, the only time we accept visitors is if they traveled a great distance to reach us.

We've had visitors from all 77 counties in Oklahoma and from 45 other states. What surprises me is that we have only been in Norman a few years and already assisted more than 19,000 veterans and surviving spouses with their VA claims and questions.

Over the many years, we have been helping veterans and surviving spouses we have found evidence-based claims means it is likely a request for service-connection of a disability or an increase will be approved. Far too many veterans whose claims are filed at other places will be denied because no evidence was provided.

Many veterans who have outstanding appeals will receive a RAMP letter. This is a new program and provides a way for the VA to settle claims that have been in the appeals process for an extended period. For those of you who receive one of these letters, please bring it in and we will review it with you to determine whether that would be the best course of action for your claim. Several of those we have helped with RAMP had their claims approved in just a few months. Without RAMP, is not unusual to see some appealed claims take three to five years to get settled.

During the upcoming week, we will be in Muskogee to represent three veterans for hearings scheduled before a VA Administrative Law Judge via video conference. The VA has already approved several of those that we represented there a few months ago. When we travel to VA hearings, I do not want to go there without evidence from the veteran's medical provider that supports our request for service-connection of a disability. I would certainly like to see the VA schedule these types of hearings at the Oklahoma City VA. It would save us that drive to Muskogee from Norman.

Last week there were 14 veterans we represent awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. This group of veterans will receive an annual combined dollar amount of \$538,794 per year. We pride ourselves in being able to assist veterans and surviving spouses receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

We set a record in the next category. Fifty-five veterans received VA disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities caused by or aggravated by their military service. This group of veterans will receive an annual combined dollar amount of \$860,499 per year. For more information on what you may be eligible for please stop by and visit with one of our volunteers. There was one surviving spouse awarded VA benefits for DIC based on their spouse's service.

There are thousands of veterans who have received other than Honorable Discharges from the military. For some of those, we have been able to upgrade that discharge if the veteran has a diagnosis of PTSD or other mental condition. For those veterans who would like to try for an upgrade, please visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning.

For those of you who need a DD-214 (Military Discharge) we are available to help you order one from the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, Mo.

Our volunteers working on the claims for surviving spouses are doing everything possible to help them receive VA benefits. I have found that it is much easier to help the surviving spouses whose veteran filed for and received VA benefits. Usually applying for DIC is going to be the best option. To receive this benefit, the veteran must have been rated at the 100 percent rating for 10 years or died from a presumptive condition to their military service.

Another way is if the veteran's service-connected disability is listed as the primary or a contributing condition to their death. Many times, it is possible to amend the veterans death certificate to reflect the presumptive or the contributing factor of a service-connected disability. For questions about surviving spouse benefits please visit with one of our volunteers who specialize in this service.

Our drivers are staying very busy transporting veterans to their VA medical appointments and to our location for help with their VA claims. Each week they are transporting from eight to 15 veterans to their appointments. Our handicap accessible wheelchair van has proven to be a great tool to transport our wheelchair confined veterans. Last week our drivers donated 71 hours driving 19 veterans 1,012 miles.

As most of you know, we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit charity that provides everything we do at no charge. We do accept donations to help with the costs we incur to provide our services. We also accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles and other items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to be used in what we do.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

If you need a ride to and from a VA Medical Appointment, please contact 405-550-8806 to reach Clayton at Extension 105 or Louie at Ext. 106.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at the 1268 North Interstate Drive Norman, OK 73072. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. ## Planning ahead can help manage back-to-school costs and stress

As the back-to-school season ramps up, doing some advanced planning will help parents and students get down to the business of heading back into the classroom without busting the budget or losing a grip on that one last nerve.

"Planning ahead will add an important element of organization to your shopping. It'll help control your spending and your mood," said Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension assistant state specialist, family resource management.

Begin by creating a family budget for school-related purchases. Factor in costs such as instrument rental, school pictures, sports participation and transportation to school each day.

Also, add in possible expenses for graduating seniors and the college application process.

Once the budget is established, family members should

research their options based on the amount of funds available, then come to an agreement on all purchases.

"These days it's easy to go online to find the items and products you want in a price range that works for you," Clampet said. "Setting the budget in advance helps resolve disagreements before parents and students get to the store, where parents may feel pressured to give in to demands from their student while in public."

If changes or additions are made to the agreed-upon list of purchases after shopping begins, still try to stay within budget.

"Try not to shop if you're feeling rushed or stressed," Clampet said. "You also don't want to wait too late or take someone who is already upset or in a bad mood because you could end up overspending or falling short of what you wanted to accomplish during your shopping excursion."

Paying attention to sales, bargains and deals will help

families stay within their back-to-school budget. So will taking advantage of the Oklahoma Tax Commission's annual state-wide Sales Tax holiday, which allows shoppers to purchase certain clothing and shoes free of state, city, county and local municipality sales tax.

This year, the sales tax holiday is set for August 3-5.

Even with keeping a sharp eye out for bargains and sticking closely to a budget, some families may struggle to cover back-to-school costs. In these cases, check with the nearest county Extension office for a possible list of community organizations offering supplies for free or at a reduced price.

Finally, families may consider planning now for next school year by building anticipated expenses into the overall household budget.

"Tally all of this year's expenses, divide that amount by 12 and begin reserving that much money each month to put toward next year's costs," Clampet said.

## Applications now available for Chickasaw Princess Pageant

The Chickasaw Nation is now accepting applications for the 2018-2019 Chickasaw Princess Pageant. Applications must be submitted by August 24.

Chickasaw Princess candidates must be 17 to 25 years of age to compete, while Chickasaw Junior Princess candidates must be 12 to 16 years of age and Little Miss Chickasaw candidates must be 7 to 11 years of age.

Chickasaw Princesses are selected each year at the Chickasaw Princess Pageant during the Chickasaw Festival. Chickasaw Princesses

serve as goodwill ambassadors at a variety of events and functions across the U.S.

Candidates must reside within the 13-county jurisdictional boundaries of the Chickasaw Nation, be predominantly Chickasaw with at least one quarter blood quantum and be a registered citizen of the Chickasaw Nation.

Chickasaw Junior Princess and Little Miss Chickasaw contestants must attend school to be eligible for pageant entry. A minimum 2.0 grade point average (GPA) is required and the candidate must be in good standing with the

school.

Chickasaw Princess candidates must either attend school, be high school graduates enrolled in higher education or specialized training classes, or be employed to be eligible for pageant entry. If a princess candidate is employed, her schedule must be somewhat flexible to accommodate her participation in tribal-related functions and other events.

In addition to the application, candidates must also include a copy of their Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB) and citizenship card/

certificate, a digital photo, a brief essay and three references from individuals not related to the candidate.

The Chickasaw Princess Pageant will be at 6 p.m. Monday, October 1, at Ada High School Cougar Activity Center, 1400 Stadium Drive.

Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

Over the next couple of weeks, we would like to share a special "front-porch" discussion with you. With it, we'll bring two special audiences together: You all, and also the readers of our column in LaGrange, Ga., who have been reading our life story for over two decades.

On Sunday, July, 15, we witnessed one of the greatest events in our life, inspiring us to tell you of both the past and the present. Immediately, I had these thoughts:

If I live until 2093, I will be 137 years old and probably the oldest guy in the gym.

But should I fall a tad short of that goal, I am sure one of my great-great-great-grandchildren will emerge as a historian and gather information about where she came from. She'll have to go back as far as 1909 to begin that journey, the year Preacher E.H. Miller was born over in Pine Mountain, Ga.

One of the first places she'll go, I am sure, is to the archives of the LaGrange Daily News where she will find information covering a good portion of those 137 years or so.

Many great statesmen, gun-fighters, and writers from years past had their own personal "biographers" - some still do, officially or unofficially - but

our best "biographer" likely will be columns in the paper.

History often comes in the form of "dates," and because our history increased significantly on July 15, 2018, this is the time to record it.

December 12, 1967: Daddy - C.T. Bowen - left us unexpectedly at 37. He may have been the South's greatest maker of Brunswick Stew.

October 3, 1973: Mama - Fanny Louise Bowen, daughter of Preacher and Zona Belle Miller - left us on this day at age 42. The Lord had to send his best angels to transport her home, and those who knew her know why.

October 24, 1975: The amazin' blonde and I headed to the ocean for our first honeymoon, to Galveston, 800 miles from our Southern roots. We have celebrated 42 others since. If we make it, we plan to celebrate our 118th in 2093.

April 10, 1977: Rachel Louise Bowen comes to us, named after her grandma. She still owes us for choosing the "Louise" and not the "Fanny." She is now one of the world's greatest third-grade teachers.

March 6, 1980: Rachel gets to meet her little brother, Steven Malachi. Mal, whose name we borrowed from my high school friend Mal Taylor. Mal has never met a stranger.

December 29, 1989: Preacher

Miller laid aside 10,000 sermons and took his flight to meet Grandma. The Lord had to send his most distinguished angels to carry this great man home.

October 4, 2003: Grandma stepped out of the kitchen and laid aside her pots and pans with which she had baked a thousand cakes, pies, and pans of cornbread for us and my children and hundreds of others across the Southland. She stepped from the kitchen straight into paradise.

February 9, 2005: Our great third-grade teacher entered mama-hood, introducing the world to the hilarious Connor Reed Osburn. A "Popman" and a "Bamaw" also were born on this day.

October 20, 2008: Audrey Lyn Osburn burst on the scene in a flash! Her middle name is after her Bamaw Marilyn. But she also answers to "Pretty Eyes" or the "Nutt."

July 15, 2018: This was one of the proudest days we've ever had, a lovely day, a day never to be forgotten, a day regarding which my historian will probably write these words: "My great-great-great Popman couldn't seem to get over that day. He wouldn't have, even if he had lived to be 137."

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

In Gulu, Uganda, there is a big market. The market has small spaces for each person to sell his goods. In one place, they sell seeds and grains. In another place, they sell handbags, or shirts, all made by hand. In other place, they sell small wooden stools. If you follow your nose, you can find where they sell fresh fish! It is a marketplace, and you have many choices of things to buy.

In today's world, there is a marketplace for religion as well. You can find someone who believes almost anything. You can find someone who does not believe in God. You can find someone who believes in a God who created us but that he no longer has a personal interest in us. This is called agnosticism, and many people believe this way. Some of us may go through periods of agnosticism. And of course you can find many versions of Christianity.

In this marketplace of Christianity, why do some of us choose to be Catholic Christians? There are many good reasons - perhaps because this is the faith which our parents practiced, or our grandparents. It is the faith of our family. Or because it is the faith in which I have experienced the presence of God in my world.

It is a faith that engages all my senses - my eyes, my ears, my heart. It is a coherent faith that gives me a path with which to navigate through my life. These are all good reasons.

But there are other reasons to choose Catholic Christianity. The truth about God comes to us through both Scripture and Tradition. When Martin Luther and the other Christian reformers broke away from the Catholic Church, they threw out half of the faith - they threw out Tradition. This tradition includes the lived experience of God among men and women through centuries and centuries of faith. And it is quite an amazing treasure!

This tradition includes the practices of prayer, of the variety of ways in which to be with God in personal prayer. Many of our prayer forms use the imagination - including the Our Father, the rosary, lectio divina, and the prayer of St. Ignatius. In this kind of prayer I use my imagination to place myself in a scene with Jesus or Mary, or immerse myself in the Word of God in the Bible. The Exercises of St. Ignatius were recently used to help women

in recovery from addiction at a retreat in Oklahoma City - women of all faiths and creeds.

But there is another tradition called apophatic prayer. In this prayer, I am centered in complete silence, in complete emptiness. I allow God to enter into this space of openness, and I listen to the movement deep in my own heart, too deep for words or images. This is the tradition of St. John of the Cross, of Teresa of Avila, and of Thomas Merton. It is the tradition of Centering Prayer, and leads to a complete surrender to God in one's own life.

And finally, as Catholics, we center all of our prayer around the Holy Eucharist - the one practice that Jesus specifically left us on the night before he died. All of the Gospels attest to this - Jesus' one request was that we celebrate this Last Supper again and again until He comes again. It is the sharing of His body and blood as real spiritual food.

It is the call to service, just as Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. "Do this in remem-

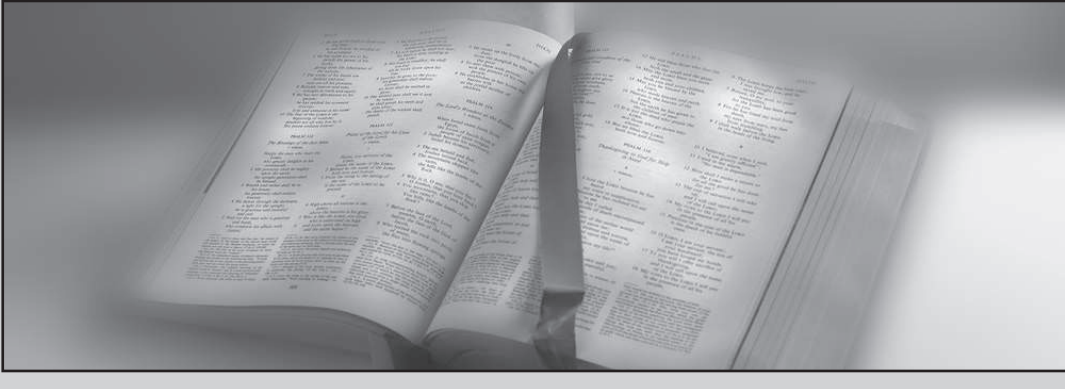
Abigail Escobedo of Purcell received second place for her essay on "What are the qualities of Blessed Stanley Rother that I find inspiring?"
