Non-certified pay goes up 3 percent

A 3 percent raise is included in the non-certified salary schedule approved Monday for the 2019-20 school year at Purcell Public Schools.

Superintendent Dr. Sheli McAdoo told board members that the schedule will cost the district about \$32,400.

The new pay grades are as follows:

- Secretary, 12 months – \$12.93 per hour (\$20,543) starting to \$19.05 per hour (\$30,267) for 25 years.
- Secretary, 11 months – \$12.13 per hour (\$17,659) starting to \$17.84 per hour (\$25,982) for 25 years.
- Secretary, 10 months – \$11.02 per hour (\$14,508)

and your electricity may be out for several days. You are low on everything - food, pet supplies, toilet paper, batteries, diapers and your medication.

Imagine how you would feel

in this situation. While you can't predict which weather forecast will come true, you

Vaccine and Equipment Care and Handling

Several millions of dollars have been invested to deliver to the livestock producer safe and efficacious vaccines. It behooves us to handle these products in a manner that will maximize the immune response in the healthy animal.

Let's review a few simple steps to help insure that we don't drop the ball by some-

thing we did or did not do that could negatively affect vaccine efficacy.

1. Purchase only federally licensed vaccines from a reliable source that is conscientious about the ordering, timely receiving and shipping, and storing vaccines they are going to sell you.

2. Purchase the proper vaccines for the cattle you are vaccinating. Consult your veterinarian and/or read the directions carefully.

3. Keep vaccines refrigerated at all times (36 degrees to 44 degrees F). Keep in an ice chest and out of the sun at chute side.

4. Mix only enough vaccine that will be used in a timely period (less than one hour) and discard any unused product by burning containers.

5. Reconstitute modified live virus (MLV) vaccines with clean transfer needles. Using a bleeding needle is highly recommended because they are cheap and disposable (see your veterinarian).

6. Do not mix two different products in the same syringe unless it is part of the package,

i.e. IBR/Leptospirosis vaccine.

7. Use only new needles to fill and refill syringes.

8. Consider using multidose disposable syringes that automatically draw from the vaccine vial, especially for modified live virus (MLV) vaccines. When using this method keep the vial in use in a vial shroud or cover to insulate and protect from sunlight.

9. Use the proper needle gauge and length. 16-gauge X 5/8 or 3/4 inch for all subcutaneous (subq) injections. Use 16-gauge X 1-inch needles for intramuscular (IM) injections in young cattle. A 16-gauge X 1 1/2-inch needle is used for IM injections in adult cows and bulls. Always use sharp needles, burrs take in hide, hair and debris resulting in injection site infections and abscesses.

10. Use the proper injection site as described by the product insert. Always use the subcutaneous route of administration when a choice is given between subcutaneous and intramuscular. All injections are to be administered in the neck area.

11. Syringe cleaning
a. Don't use alcohol, disinfectants, or detergents in syringes used for (MLV) vaccines.

b. Do use hot water (distilled), more hot water as a rinse, dry on clean paper towels,

Prepare:

can plan ahead so when a severe weather event strikes, you have the tools and resources to effectively weather the storm.

The Department of Homeland Security offers several resources to help you prepare for major weather events and natural disasters. Visit www.ready.gov/make-a-plan.

Preparedness Actions and Items

- Stock your pantry with a three-day supply of non-perishable food, such as canned goods, energy bars, peanut butter, powdered milk, instant coffee, water and other essentials like toiletries.

- Confirm you have adequate sanitation and hygiene supplies including towelettes, soap and hand sanitizer.

- Ensure your first aid kit is stocked with pain relievers, bandages and other medical essentials and make sure your prescriptions are current.

- Set aside basic household items you will need, including flashlights, batteries, a manual can opener and portable, battery-powered radio or TV.

- Organize emergency supplies so they are together in a easily accessible location.

During a prolonged outage

In the event of an outage, turn off appliances, TVs, computers

and other sensitive electronics. This will help avert damage from a power surge and will also help prevent overloading the circuits during power restoration.

That said, do leave one light on so you will know when power is restored. If utilizing a small household generator, consider using LED holiday lights to illuminate a living area. A strand of 100 white lights draws little energy yet produces considerable light.

Solar lights also work, if they can receive some sunlight during the day for charging.

During thunderstorms, the American Red Cross recommends avoiding electrical equipment and land-based telephones. Use battery-powered TVs and radios instead.

Keep away from windows. Listen to local news or NOAA Weather Radio for emergency updates, or check your SmartHub app, REC's website and REC's facebook page for restoration updates.

After the storm, avoid downed power lines and walking through flooded areas where power lines could be submerged.

Allow ample room for utility crews to safely perform their jobs - including on your

property.

Power in planning Advance planning for severe storms or other emergencies can reduce stress and anxiety caused by the weather event and can lessen the impact of the storm's effects.

Sign up for NOAA emergency alerts and warnings and install the SmartHub app to your phone to stay abreast of restoration efforts and other important co-op news and information.

Act today, because there is power in planning.

silicone oil, and store in a clean dry area (baggie).


Wash the outside first with the needle and needle cover on. Wash your hands thoroughly, break the syringe down, and perform the cleaning procedure.

The take home message:

We, the beef producer, the vaccine company, and the veterinarian have a mutual

responsibility to produce a quality, drug free and economic product for the beef consumer.

Using quality vaccines, proper handling and administration, and using clean functional equipment ensures healthy cattle will develop immunity when vaccinated thereby decreasing as much need for antibiotic therapy and increased injection sites.

That gave the historic field a proper send off.


Then came the construction project and the new Conger Field that appears like it could pass for a junior college stadium and field.

NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

A busy six weeks

Even though the U.S. House of Representatives was not in session, I kept a busy schedule during the extended work period.

Throughout the last six weeks, I spent a great deal of time in Oklahoma hearing directly from constituents, local community leaders and small business owners at town halls and other meetings.

In addition to these valuable conversations with fellow Oklahomans, I participated in two insightful learning trips with some of my colleagues in Congress.

At the beginning of August, I traveled to countries in the far east with a bipartisan delegation of lawmakers from both chambers. Focused on foreign policy and defense issues, the trip made stops in Japan, Singapore, Australia and Fiji, where we met with diplomats from each country.

On the way home, we stopped in Hawaii to meet with Admiral Philip Davidson, Commander of the United States Indo-

Pacific Command; Admiral Davidson oversees the largest military theater in the world.

Throughout the various meetings with leadership in the region, I repeatedly noticed two common themes.

First, there is a very real fear of Chinese aggression, especially since China has relentlessly built up its naval fleet and continues to flex its muscles in the South China Sea. Certainly, the United States has a vested and significant interest in protecting the Pacific from Chinese provocation and ensuring global trade is undeterred in international waters.

Second, support for the United States as an ally remains strong in the region. After hearing from our friends and allies abroad, I believe we must stand by them in the face of the Chinese - not only because it's the right thing to do, but our friends' freedom in the Pacific also yields benefits for the U.S. from a trade and military standpoint.

After I returned from my first trip, I kicked off a series of town hall meetings across the Fourth

District of Oklahoma with stops in Norman, Chickasha, Pauls Valley, Duncan and Moore as well as a telephone town hall meeting.

Especially when I have extended and dedicated time back at home, town halls are an incredibly useful forum to hear from constituents, and I always remain available until every question or comment is answered and addressed. I am grateful to the hundreds of constituents who took the time to participate in these recent events.

Last week, I spent a couple days visiting the U.S.-Mexico border with Senators Shelley Moore Capito and Roy Blunt. During our visit, I had the chance to observe the situation and hear directly from those monitoring and managing the various humanitarian and security needs.

We toured numerous facilities in the Rio Grande Valley and met with officials from U.S. Customs and Border Protec-

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Well the August barrage of movies seems to finally be over. This September is shaping up to be a little more relaxed, at least as far as wide releases go.

That doesn't mean there aren't any big movies this month of course. In fact, one of the most anticipated fall releases popped into theaters this past weekend. The sequel to 2017's blockbuster horror hit, "It: Chapter Two."

And since that was the only wide release this week, I decided to take a look back and check out a smaller film that never quite made it to theaters in our area, but just released to video on demand.

So with that out of the way, let's get to the reviews.



First up is "It: Chapter Two."

Defeated by members of the Losers' Club, the evil clown Pennywise

(Bill Skarsgård) returns 27 years later to terrorize the town of Derry, Maine, once again. Now adults, the childhood friends have long since gone their separate ways. But when people start disappearing, Mike (Isaiah Mustafa) calls Bill (James McAvoy), Beverly (Jessica Chastain), Richie (Bill Hader), Ben (Jay

Fire in the Amazon

You did not watch the rainforest being destroyed for farmland. Based upon today's technology, the Amazon is not suitable for large scale agricultural production.

By definition, what is the Amazon? It is the land mass that is drained by the Amazon River regardless of country boundaries. This is a region equal in size to the continental US.

tion (CBP), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) to hear more about and assess funding needs.

As the top Republican leader of the appropriations subcommittee responsible for crafting and marking up legislation to fund humanitarian aid for minors in holding facilities, this was a particularly important experience for me.

While I am relieved that Congress provided desperately needed emergency aid earlier this summer, members in both chambers and on both sides of the aisle must continue to work together to ensure those serving on the front lines have the resources they need to compassionately confront the crisis and keep our citizens safe.

It was helpful to learn more about what has caused the high numbers of illegal crossings attempted and the resulting backlogs. Border patrol simply lacks the ability to deport illegal immigrants fast enough.

Although Mexican citizens can be sent to their home country immediately after attempt-

ing to illegally cross the border, that is not the case for people who come from countries in Central and South America, which has previously caused massive overflows in holding facilities.

Another problem that law enforcement faces is the fact that more and more single adult males are claiming unrelated unaccompanied minors as their own family hoping they will get to stay, since the United States does not deport minors.

Fortunately, the funding given by Congress has allowed border patrol to conduct DNA tests, and the results have shown that a significant number of adult males are lying about their relationship with unaccompanied minors.

As the House returns this week for legislative session, I am grateful to be armed with the thoughts and concerns that I heard during my time at home as well as valuable insight from my trips abroad.

For those who were unable to participate in town hall meetings, I hope you will join me in the future so we can talk in person.

Damaged by scars from the past, the united Losers must conquer their deepest fears to destroy the shape-shifting Pennywise, now more powerful than ever.

Here it is. The movie horror fans have been waiting all year for. A sequel to a film acclaimed by both critics and general audiences alike, not to mention based off of one of Stephen King's most popular works.

The conclusion to the calamitous clown cacophony known simply as "It."

Like most people who saw "It" back in 2017, I couldn't wait to see this sequel. While it probably isn't the best horror movie ever made, nor is it the scariest, it was definitely still was one of my favorites.

And it was for one major reason. The characters.

I absolutely loved all the kids in the first film. In a town full of cruel indifferent adults, not to mention a menacing killer clown, these "Losers" managed to come across as incredibly down-to-earth and very relatable.

They're all incredibly easy to like. And unlike some more annoying horror protagonists, you actually want to see them succeed.

This was not only accomplished due to some genuinely fantastic performances from these very young actors, but also through good writing and dialogue, making the interactions between these kids feel very natural.

There was also quite a bit of comedy in the first film. In fact I think that's what surprised me the most about it. Just how much I ended up laughing.

But while unexpected, those funny moments were incredibly welcomed. And they gave the audience a much needed breather in between the film's more tense moments.

All of that, I suppose, brings me to this movie.

Fortunately "It: Chapter Two" boasts a similarly great cast of talented actors.

While the original child actors do make frequent appearances in the film for brief and extended flashbacks, the majority of this movie stars the kids' aged up counterparts. And boy was the casting here spot on.

Jessica Chastain as Bev was a complete no brainer. As was Bill Hader as the constantly joking Richie. In fact in interviews back in 2017, both the young actors for Bev and Richie said Chastain and Hader would be their first pick to portray their adult selves.

It's no surprise both actors were two of the highlights here. Especially Hader, who not only is responsible for much of this film's comedy, but also holds his own in the more dramatic scenes as well.

The whole group has this wonderful chemistry together, one that felt just as natural as their younger counterparts.

This film is easily at its most entertaining when these lov-

able "Losers" are just sitting around, hanging out together, reminiscing about the old times and joking around with each other.

And just like the first film, there are a ton of really funny scenes in this movie.

Unfortunately though, the filmmakers were noticeably less skillful at mixing comedy and horror this time around. There were some really odd timed comedy bits here. Moments that felt totally out of left field.

Instead of the comedy helping to balance out the horror aspects of the film, it completely undercut the tension of some scenes.

Luckily, the film still had its fair share of decent jump scares and a few select disturbing moments. Granted, I don't think any were nearly as memorable as the first, but Pennywise still had me jumping all the same. Plus Bill Skarsgård was just as good as ever as everyone's favorite murderous clown.

But sadly, even though I loved the characters and enjoyed both the comedy and horror aspects of the movie, this film still left me feeling more than a little disappointed. And it all came down to the narrative.

First of all, in the first third of the film, the story takes these great characters, characters who have this wonderful chemistry together, and splits them off on their own little adventure in Derry for some arbitrary reason. A decision, mind you, that nearly gets each and every one of them killed, but that's not my main point.

Each of these moments basically ends up being deleted or extended scenes from the first film, where the adult version of each character goes to a certain location in Derry and relives a traumatic moment where Pennywise, in one form or another, attacked them. Concluding with Pennywise harassing them as adults.

Some of these scenes are better than others, but by the fifth or so one I was definitely ready for the film to move on.

After awhile it just felt so repetitive. Though to be fair, those moments did do a good job in reinforcing which adult belonged to which kid from 1988.

But speaking of repetitive, you remember the romantic subplot from the first movie involving Ben, Bill, and Bev? The one that seemed basically resolved by the end of the film?

Yeah, well everyone in the Losers' Club, with the exception of Mike, comes down with a convenient case of amnesia. So we get to relive my least favorite part of any movie once again, the dreaded love triangle.

But fine, at the end of the day these are just nitpicks. I would have been much more forgiving of these rehashed scenes if the conclusion was satisfying. But sadly, the ending here is a complete mess.

Forewarning, I'm about to talk about the conclusion of the film in the vaguest terms

I can. I'll try to avoid specifics, but if you don't want to see any kind of spoilers for the ending of "It: Chapter Two," you should probably stop reading now.

Essentially all the preparation from the first two-thirds of the film gets thrown out the window, and our heroes have to come up with solutions out of nowhere.

There's not even the barest hint at the final method they end up using to confront Pennywise. Not until the very end of the movie. There's no setup, so there's not much payoff when they finally do stumble on the right approach.

It just kind of felt like they made it up as they went along. Not only that, but their solution for Pennywise seemed to completely contradict both films' underlying message against harassment and bullying.

The whole thing just struck me as odd.

So even though the story is conclusive, and the film gets wrapped up with a little bow on top, it all still felt horribly unsatisfying.

It really is a shame, because there is a lot to like about this movie. Heck, it might be enough for many to overlook the hastily thrown together, slapdash ending.

At the end of the day, the cast, characters, and comedy were enough for me to enjoy the movie okay as a whole. But coming off the highs of the first film, I can't help but feel a little disappointed.

"It: Chapter Two" is rated R.

The other movie this week is "The Last Black Man in San Francisco."

Set in the San Francisco Bay Area, this movie

follows Jimmie Fails (Jimmie Fails) and his best friend Mont (Jonathan Majors) as the two of them try to reclaim a house built by Jimmie's grandfather.

The effort launches them on a poignant odyssey that connects them to their past, even as it tests their friendship and sense of belonging in the place they call home.

That isn't a typo in my summary there. Jimmie Fails, the star of this film, played himself in this movie, in a story based on experiences in his life.

While it's true that it isn't uncommon for a famous celebrity to make a cameo as themselves in movies, it's a bit more rare to see someone portray themselves in something semi-autobiographical. In fact, the only movie I can think of off the top of my head was last year's "The 15:17 to Paris."

That doesn't exactly bode well for this movie, because while the real life actions of three men who starred in "The 15:17 to Paris" were incredibly heroic and they

deserve the utmost respect, their acting sadly left a lot to be desired and they should have never been cast to play themselves.

Fortunately, the similarities between this film and "The 15:17 to Paris" end there, because this is a beautiful, well acted movie.

Jimmie does a fantastic job playing himself. If I didn't know beforehand, I would have never guessed this was his first role in a feature film. He was great here. In fact, the performances all around were really solid.

But what really interested me here, at least on a conceptual level, is the autobiographical nature of the story.

While this film is based on aspects of Jimmie's life, this is a predominantly fictionalized narrative. One that doesn't use Jimmie's history as a strict guidebook, but more of a jumping off point to tell this very personal feeling tale.

The movie has incredibly heavy themes revolving around gentrification and people being forced to leave their neighborhoods due to the skyrocketing cost of living. A major issue the Bay Area continues to deal with.

That's really only the film's backdrop though. The movie's main focus is more on what happens to these families who leave their homes and end up scattered to the wind, disconnected from each other.

But even though the themes of the film are quite strong, the story here is definitely a little less structured than most casual moviegoers would be accustomed to.

There's not really a strong narrative thrust in the movie. Sure, Jimmie is obsessed with his grandpa's house, but for the large percentage of the movie it's not clear to what end. The film just kind of drifts from one scene to the next until it finally comes to a conclusion.

I don't know that I would say this is a bad thing, but it was definitely a style of storytelling I found less than engaging.

Of course that's not to say I didn't appreciate the movie.

Like I said, it is beautiful. Some of the shots of San Francisco are flat out stunning and I absolutely loved the film's use of color.



U.S. Senators Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.), chairman of the Senate Homeland Security Appropriations Subcommittee, and Roy Blunt (R-Mo.), chairman of the Senate Labor/Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee and U.S. Representative Tom Cole (R-Okla.), ranking member of the House Labor/Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee, recently returned from a trip to the U.S.-Mexico border.

The group toured a number of facilities in the Rio Grande Valley and met with officials from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) to hear more about and assess funding needs related to the security and humanitarian crisis there.

"During my visit to the southern border, I was grateful to observe the situation and hear directly from those monitoring and managing the various humanitarian and security needs," Congressman Cole said.

"While I am relieved that Congress provided desperately needed emergency aid earlier this summer, members in both chambers and on both sides of the aisle must continue to work together to ensure those serving on the front lines have the resources they need to compassionately confront the crisis and keep our citizens safe," he said.

"We will soon begin marking up this year's government funding bills in the Senate Appropriations Committee, and as committee leaders, it was important for us to see firsthand how funds are being used to manage the border crisis and the evolving needs," Senator Capito said.

"The dedicated Homeland Security personnel we met with are doing the best they can to deal with an ever-changing situation, but it's clear that they

need more support. We worked with President Trump to secure an emergency supplemental, but there is still a lot that we need to address.

"I am committed to delivering much-needed support and hope to provide more sustainable solutions to make sure these men and women have the resources to secure our borders and continue enforcing our immigration laws effectively and humanely," she concluded.

"The President's efforts with Mexico to address the crisis at the southern border are making a tremendous difference," Senator Blunt said.

"I hope we will continue to work with Mexico on the immigration issues facing our two nations. I appreciate the hard work of the men and women at Health and Human Services, Customs and Border Protection, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement," he concluded.

Constitution was just the first step

America celebrates Constitution Day Tuesday, Sept. 17, the 232nd anniversary of the 1787 date when Congress signed the US Constitution. But their job wasn't finished. Many states asked that a Bill of Rights be added.

Think of the original Constitution as a road map to run the new nation's government. The Bill of Rights is a rule book setting basic rights that citizens fought the Revolutionary War to get. Congress passed these 10 amendments in 1789, and the last state needed ratified them Dec. 15, 1791.

The First is shorter than a tweet, but touches every aspect of daily life.

Key details:

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion: That means government can't declare an official religion for our country. It can't tell you where or how to worship or if you should worship at all.

Or prohibiting the free exercise thereof: Congress can't interfere with religious expressions. While the majority of U.S. citizens are Christian, hundreds of others faiths are followed here. Almost all have different branches within their followers. Public schools and other agencies face a challenge deciding how to teach about religion and observe religious holidays.

Or abridging the freedom of speech,

Find: Choose, Citizen, Congress, Government, Grow, News, Nose, Protest, Religion, Right, Root, See, Speech, Vote, Warn, Worship.

Activity: Check for newspaper stories about citizens using First Amendment rights or government blocking citizens from using those rights. Send a letter to the editor about it. Which First Amendment rights are you using?



OMRF scientist uncovers clues about age and muscle loss

New findings from the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation have revealed clues that could lead to new strategies to combat age-related muscle loss.

The study was led by OMRF scientist Benjamin Miller, Ph.D., and researchers from the University of Iowa.

The biggest breakthrough came from identifying an age where the ability to regrow muscle after a period of loss is greatly impaired. Further, they show that these changes vary by muscle and not all muscles are the same.

The researchers looked at rats and found they could regrow muscle after a period of loss until 24 months of age, but at 28 months this ability dropped off. Miller said this translates to humans in their

70s. The goal of the study was to better understand the two trajectories by which people lose muscle over time.

The first occurs through the gradual loss of muscle that comes with aging.

The second results from acute periods of loss that take place after situations like bed-rest or following an injury. A better understanding of these two courses could lead to intervention strategies and treatment options.

"The gradual loss over time is something we all go through, but these other critical periods when you are bedridden can have long-lasting consequences. You can lose muscle mass

Pantry sets Norman hours

Infant Crisis Services' Baby-Mobile Pantry will be in Norman on September 19 to provide assistance to children under the age of 4 years.

The pantry will be at the Norman Health Department at 250 12th Avenue NE from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. to distribute diapers, formula and food.

Infant Crisis Services will provide qualifying infants or toddlers with a week's supply of diapers, formula for one week, a pack of toddler food (depending on age), a bottle and a pack of wipes.

Services are provided a maximum of five times per child before they reach the age of 4.

Visits must be at least a week apart.

No appointment is necessary. The BabyMobile is designed to eliminate the barrier of transportation that prevents

many families from receiving ICS services.

It travels to partner agencies in the Oklahoma City metro area as well as Canadian, Cleveland, Lincoln, Logan, Seminole, Payne, and Pottawatomie counties.

In addition to the stop in Norman, ICS will have a child's safety seat check-up and distribution September 21 at 4224 N. Lincoln Blvd., in Oklahoma City.

The first-come, first-served event will be open 7:30 a.m. to noon.

New car seats will be available for a suggested donation of \$10.

To qualify, the legal guardian of the child receiving the seat must bring the child, the vehicle most often used to transport the child and proof of government assistance.

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

The Built Ford Tough AQHYA World Championship Show is the world's largest, single-breed world championship horse show open exclusively to youth exhibitors 18 years and younger. It was held August 1-10 at State Fair Park in Oklahoma City.

This is the pinnacle event for youth competitors around the world who must qualify for the event by earning a pre-determined number of points to secure a spot in each of the classes, representing English, western and halter disciplines. The other road to qualifying is for competitors to participate and compete through their state or provincial affiliate.

AQHA Youth World crowns 42 World Champions in the Level 3 category and 33 Level 2 Champions in this 18-&-under age group, in a large slate of classes, but in 14-18 and 13-&-under, world champions are crowned in the following core classes: western pleasure, hunter under saddle, horsemanship, hunt seat equitation, showmanship, ranch riding and trail.

really quickly during periods of immobilization," said Miller, a physiologist in OMRF's Aging and Metabolism Research Program. "Young people have the ability to gain that back quite well, but this seems to be impaired in older individuals." This inability to regain muscle sets older people on a new trajectory of loss because they can never really rebound. This can be catastrophic for the elderly, leading to a loss of mobility and independence that often cannot be recaptured. "Our lab is focused on learning how to maintain muscle,

which is critical for maintaining independence and a healthy metabolism," said Miller. "We want to keep people able-bodied for longer so they can get the most out of their years. This research will give us new targets to aim for toward this goal."

The second significant finding was that changes with age or from atrophy differ from muscle to muscle.

Miller said the results led to additional questions about the underlying mechanisms by which some muscles are maintained during aging, while

others are not. "From a public health perspective, this broadens our knowledge and shows us we need to consider muscles on a case-by-case basis," said Miller. "This also identifies a critical period where, if someone has an extended period of inactivity, we need to target the regrowth and learn what we can do to intervene."

The findings were published in the Journal of Cachexia, Sarcopenia and Muscle. OMRF scientists Justin Reid and Rick Peelor contributed to the research.


The panel of experts will consist of representatives from FSA, NRCS and Cooperative Extension Service representing Cleveland, Garvin and McClain counties.

Bynum receives prestigious Patrick Henry Award

G.T. Bynum, the mayor of Tulsa, received the prestigious Patrick Henry Award from the National Guard Association of the United States (NGAUS) September 2 during the 141st General Conference and Exhibition of the National Guard Association of the United States in Denver.

Maj. Gen. Michael C. Thompson, the Adjutant General for Oklahoma, nominated Bynum for the award in April 2018 in recognition of his commitment to the support of the 138th Fighter Wing, Oklahoma Air National Guard, located in Tulsa.

In 2014, while a member of the Tulsa City Council, Bynum supported funding for the 138th Fighter Wing Mission Training Center (MTC) as part of the Tulsa Vision sales tax extension. That support led to the appropriation of \$9.4 million of funding for the construction

of the MTC. When Bynum was elected Mayor of Tulsa in 2016, he pushed for a short timeline for construction of the MTC, in order to ensure the facility was complete and ready to receive \$25 million worth of F-16 flight simulators. Planting a wildlife food plot

Establishing food plots for wildlife is not a difficult process and can be done with minimal investment. A basic understanding of the soil, the wildlife species you wish to attract, and wildlife food preferences will help make your food plots successful.

When done properly, food plots can provide opportunities to view wildlife or develop a healthier wildlife population. Establishing food plots can also be a great activity for a family or members of a conservation organization.

The following are some recommendations for a quality wildlife food plot.

1. Fence off 1 acre of land (208 feet x 208 feet OR 100 feet x 435 feet, etc.).
2. Spray with one quart of 2,4-D and one quart of glyphosate herbicides mixed in 20 gallons of water. Use the entire tank on the acre. Apply the mixture in early to late July after a good rainfall when the plants are growing actively.

3. One to two weeks later mow off existing dead vegetation.
4. Disk ground four to six inches deep.
5. In late August, apply any lime, phosphorus and potassium recommended from a soil test. If a soil test was not taken, apply six 50 pound bags of 10-20-10 fertilizer to the plot (if you don’t soil test, you’re food plot may not produce forage to its full potential).
6. Disk the fertilizer and lime into the soil. This should be done prior to the first week in September.
7. In early September, disk the ground lightly one to two inches deep. Evenly spread 15 pounds of annual ryegrass seed over the entire acre.
8. Do the same with 10 pounds of inoculated crimson clover, five pounds of inoculated red clover and three pounds of inoculated white clover (Ladino or other white clover variety).
9. Drag the plot lightly to cover the seed. A chain harrow will work the best. Bed springs, pallets or a 10 foot cut cedar

tree can be used as a drag. A very light covering of soil on the seed is all that’s needed.

9. Apply a 50 lb bag of 46-0-0 in mid-October to kick ryegrass in high gear.
10. With any luck and some rain you should have green food plots by mid-October.

The ryegrass should reseed itself every year. The red and white clover should survive for three years. The crimson will need to be reseeded every fall. Fertilizer should be applied every year.

By the fourth year the food plot should be soil sampled, re-worked and re-planted.

The above plot can be planted without disking but follow the other steps as written. Do not expect as good a stand as you would with disking. Mow down plots in late June.

If grassy summer weeds become a problem treat plots in July with 1 quart of Poast herbicide + 1 quart of crop oil concentrate in 20 gallons of water.

Read and follow all pesticide label directions prior to use.

Biosecurity can keep beef cattle operations disease-free

This summer, Oklahoma and the country dealt with a number of disease outbreaks, including vesicular stomatitis, anthrax, and Eastern equine encephalitis. As most beef operations include horses, both cattle and horses faced potential threats.

Disease outbreaks highlight the critical importance of biosecurity procedures on every livestock operation. We usually think of applying these plans and procedures to protect against infectious and contagious diseases, but non-contagious diseases should also be considered.

The introduction of any disease into a herd can cause devastating losses from impaired fertility to limited growth and production to deaths. The most common approach taken by livestock producers to prevent these losses is vaccination.

Vaccinations are an important part of any biosecurity plan. However, not all diseases have vaccines, so more approaches

need to be included in biosecurity plans.

A comprehensive biosecurity plan starts with understanding how diseases spread. Generally, the organism responsible is transmitted by the fluids of the organ system it affects.

For example, infectious diseases that cause diarrhea or other gastrointestinal diseases are spread through feces. Pneumonia and other infectious diseases of the lungs are spread through respiratory secretions. Infectious skin diseases are transmitted when animals contact each other directly or rub on the same fencepost.

Reproductive diseases are often transmitted through breeding activity. Some diseases don’t fit this rule perfectly, but it’s true in most circumstances.

To prevent problems such as calf scours, raise calves in open areas so they don’t easily come into contact with each other’s feces. To prevent the transmission of respiratory viruses, don’t overcrowd or allow nose-to-nose contact across a fence.

Unfortunately, especially in Oklahoma, we also have to consider diseases that are transmitted by ticks and flies. An example is anaplasmosis, where the agent is transmitted through blood carried by the fly or tick to the next animal. This mode of transmission highlights one of the many reasons for an effective ectoparasite control program.

Finally, some viruses and bacteria are tough enough to survive for a time outside an animal host. These can then be carried on truck tires, boots, clothes, tagging equipment, tack and other objects that come in contact with manure or other body fluids.

The most common breaches of biosecurity involve introducing new animals. Incoming animals have been in a different environment than the permanent herd and can introduce new pathogens. Even human visitors from other operations

Are clovers good for horse pasture and hay?

I recently received a call from a fellow wanting to know how to get rid of the clover in his horse pasture. He had read online that clover was bad for horses.

While I do really like the internet and all the valuable information it allows us to share, sometimes we do not get the whole picture. Additionally, regional differences can be very significant, so localizing the information you find online is also important.

Bottom line up front. Clover in moderate amounts is beneficial in horse pasture and hay. Clover is palatable, high-quality forage (often greater than 18 percent protein), and it fixes nitrogen in the soil.

Some clovers in other parts of the U.S. have been associated with several health issues in horses when it exceeds 20-40 percent of a forage stand and becomes infected with fungal pathogens. However, due to our

climate here in central Oklahoma, it remains to be seen if these health issues will occur.

The clovers often associated with health issues include alsike, sweet, red, and white. Sweet clover is often found on roadsides and was commonly grown for erosion control, honey production, and forage. Its downfall was its tendency to cause excessive bleeding in livestock when sweet clover hay became moldy.

Alsike clover and to a lesser extent other legumes have been linked to photosensitivity skin reactions and liver disease. However, there seems to be some conflicting information as to whether this is caused by the clover itself or a fungus that also causes Black Blotch Disease (*Cymodothea trifolii*).

White and red clover are associated with temporary, excessive salivation commonly called 'slobbers' when the clovers are colonized by the fungus *Rhizoctonia leguminicola*. It is considered to be largely harmless; although, a consult with a veterinarian or at least keeping a close eye on the affected horse is advisable.

Dehydration, hoof issues and more severe issues are possible though rare.

If you notice, all of these health issues are associated with some kind of fungus. They are more likely to occur in pastures with large amounts of clover. They are also more likely to occur in wet, humid springs like the one we are experiencing now.

You may also come across information stating that clovers can cause colic, but that typically occurs in horses not

properly acclimated to clover pasture. Keep in mind horses can colic on lush spring grasses as well. This is another reason to have a well-designed dry lot to control pasture access.

Here in Cleveland County we don't see as many of the perennial clovers as they do not tolerate our typically hot, dry summers very well. Many pastures have annual clovers like crimson and arrowleaf seeded into them. Unfortunately, there is little information about whether these clovers create the same problems as red, white, and alsike perennial clovers.

Keeping all this in mind, how worried should we be about the presence of clover in our pastures? Just because your horses have never experienced one of the mentioned health issues, doesn't mean that they will not in the future.

While the likelihood and risk of any of these causing death is very low, for some horse owners, it still is not as good as no risk at all. Then again, there is no such thing as a zero risk pasture or farm for that matter.

Ultimately, the goal is not to eliminate clover from a horse pasture. As stated earlier, it is beneficial in moderate amounts. Instead, we are looking to manage it, and knowing which type(s) of clover we have is the first step in managing the risk of health issues.

This will not only give us an idea of problems to look for in our horses but also how to manage our pasture to prevent issues. Monitoring the amount of clover we have during wet

can bring things along with them.

The home herd may not have developed immunity to these disease agents, making them susceptible. It can happen in the other direction, too. The home herd may have immunity to certain pathogens that the new animal hasn't been exposed to before.

It's like sending a child to daycare or kindergarten. They've been at home and are immune to what's there, but then they go and meet new children who come with a whole host of new and different bacteria and viruses, and they return home sick.

The best way to prevent this type of exposure is to quarantine new or returning animals for two weeks to 30 days completely away from the home herd. Keeping them in quarantine also includes tending to them last and washing boots to minimize transmission between them and the herd.

It's important to work with your veterinarian to determine what testing, vaccination and parasite treatments should occur while an animal is in quarantine and the length of quarantine.

Animals that become sick should also be quarantined. Animals that die should be properly disposed of away from the herd.

I also strongly recommend that when animals die without a known cause, a necropsy (animal version of an autopsy) is performed by a veterinarian to determine the cause of death and if it is something that could affect the whole herd.

Finally, nothing protects the herd better than ensuring that they have a strong immune system. Protein and trace minerals play critical direct roles in im-

munity. A custom vaccination plan against the diseases with the most potential to enter your operation makes sure cattle are ready if there's a breach.

Solid cow immunity through nutrition and vaccinations also ensures that calves nurse quality colostrum and get early protection when they are young and just getting their immunity charged up.

Unfortunately, this summer demonstrated how effectively some diseases spread through livestock operations. So far, there have been 665 premises quarantined for vesicular stomatitis in Oklahoma and other states in the region.

The cost of working and testing animals, the loss of productivity from the effects of disease, and the loss of ability to move animals for an extended period can be economically devastating to an operation.

Look at your operation and consider the "holes" where disease can sneak in. Is your daughter traveling on and off the property with her show steer? Are your neighbor's stocker calves across a fence from your brood cows where they can have direct contact?

When you retrieved your bull that jumped the fence and was in with the neighbor's cattle for a day, did you have your veterinarian test him for trichomoniasis before you put him back with your cows?

When you bought that set of heifers and the seller said they had "all their shots," did he tell you exactly what they had and when? Did you purchase a nurse cow from the sale barn or neighbor?

Take charge of your own herd's biosecurity by working directly with your veterinarian to develop a plan.

spring is the second step. Thankfully, although clovers can and do naturalize here, they rarely make up a large portion of the forage in a pasture.

Lastly, applying cultural and chemical control methods if they do become excessive will

keep them in check. Avoiding overgrazing of pasture grasses will help keep clovers and broadleaf weeds from becoming excessive.

Your local county extension office can help with clover management as well as other equine related questions.



Willie Easton

Mr. Easton entered Heaven's Gates on Sunday, September 8, 2019.

William Alvin Easton was born November 10, 1920 in Charleston, Coles Co., Illinois, the son of William Nathan and Mada B. (Parrish) Easton. He came to Oklahoma in 1931 to Oil Center (north of Ada), and then moved in to Ada in 1934. In 1940, Willie joined the CCC, working at the Purcell camp, in Sentinel, and in Watonga.

Willie was drafted into the United States Army in July of 1942, and served his country proudly during World War II. On July 12, 1944, he landed on Utah Beach in Normandy, and fought across Normandy, France, Belgium, Luxemburg, and into Germany. After writing a girl from Stratford, he eventually married this girl. She was Euva Jean Eeds, and they were united in marriage on April 17, 1945. They moved to Lexington in July, 1954, and together they raised two sons, Alvin and Mark.

Willie established Easton's Upholstery Shop on Main Street, and owned and operated it for many years. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, The Military Order of the Purple Heart, National Purple Heart Hall of Honor, and a longtime and faithful member of Purcell Memorial Assembly of God church.

Purcell's Dragons christened the new Conger Field with an impressive 42-14 victory over the Lindsay Leopards last Friday night.

Purcell did it on the ground, through the air and had a pair of pick sixes scoring twice when they didn't even have the football.

Junior signal caller Kody Kroth's arm probably needed an ice bath after the game. He was on fire completing 13 of 25 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns to go with one interception.

His 45-yard strike to fellow junior Mojo Browning was a thing of beauty. Browning finished the night with four catches for 96 yards and the touchdown.

Senior Addison Love carried the mail for the Dragons rushing the pigskin 21 times for 119 yards and two touchdowns.

Love slammed into the end zone from three yards out on his first score and from four yards out on the second one.

Senior Brendan Farris tallied on a 38 yard touchdown shuttle pass and scamper. He finished with four catches for 92 yards and the score.

Purcell scored first but missed the PAT.

Lindsay came right back to snag the lead at 7-6 and led 14-13 until just before halftime.

That's when junior kicker Cale Walker toed an 18-yard field goal just before the teams retired to the locker rooms for the half time chat.

Twice Dragons stepped in front of Leopard passes and played like the Hamburgler, swiping the ball and returning it to the House.

Scott and Offensive Coordinator Questin Autry had a stable of receivers they rotated into the hot late summer air.

The Friday game with Maysville was cancelled.

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
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


He also touched on some malicious motives such as to disrupt, to kill and to look for victims for their immortal ventures. Then he moved on

their dad they would just stay home and let him enjoy his golf game without them. This made him start to wonder why they would pass up this opportunity, so he went to find them.

He stood there with his mouth open when he saw what they had done. Then his face turned red with anger and told them to go home and get cleaned up. He would talk to them and punish them when he got home.

The boys went home and somehow avoided their mom. They managed to get most of the paint off their skin and went to their room. They couldn’t imagine what their dad was going to do to them as punishment. The rest of the afternoon they were very quiet, anticipating their father’s return.

When their dad came home, he didn’t say anything to them. They had a very quiet dinner, with neither Mom or Dad mentioning the remaining spots of paint on their bodies. (They were still scraping it off their arms and faces.) They got through the rest of the evening and went to bed.

The next morning, they asked their mom about the punishment they were expecting from their dad. She told them that he

was tired from Saturday and advised them not to mention the situation. Their dad had spent the afternoon cleaning up all the paint that had been spilt around the neighbor’s house. The boys felt guilty that, instead of playing a round of golf, Dad had spent the time cleaning up after them.

They realized that they should have been made to clean up the paint as punishment, but instead their dad gave them a moment of grace by taking their punishment.


Another example was given to me by a psychologist I was seeing for counseling. I explained that I had always had trouble understanding the concept of grace but related very well to the idea of justice. He said, “What if you are speeding down the road and are pulled over by the officer on duty? If the officer says that you were speeding and deserved a ticket, that would be an example of justice since you would have to pay the ticket.

“But what if the officer said that you were speeding and should be ticketed, but this time, you would only receive a warning. Or, maybe the officer

wrote the ticket, but then tore it up. These are examples of mercy. Finally, what if the officer pointed out that you were speeding and would be given a ticket that must be paid? Then the officer takes the ticket and the officer pays the fine for you. This is an act of grace.”

That’s what grace is: a penalty that we deserve, whether it is a result of human sin or misdeed, that is paid for by someone else who is blameless for those acts. Sometimes our parents pay those penalties for us, but the supreme act of grace was given to us by Jesus. He paid the price for all the wrongs that we commit when he willingly took the punishment on the cross. Remember acts of grace are not just church topics but can happen “out there” in our everyday lives.

Gospel, Jesus warns us to think deeply through our choices. (Luke 14:25-33). First, he wants us to use our gift of reason in all things. Then he startles us with his strong language.

Of course, he does not want us to hate our family. But he does want us to hate those things in our family that keep us from living a life of holiness and completion in his love. He wants us to hate those things in our work that keep us from His love. He wants to hate those relationships in our lives that keep us from His love. Jesus our Teacher also wants us to learn the art of detachment.

To be a true follower of Jesus, we must be detached. What does detachment mean? It does not mean “to be uncaring, or unconcerned, or aloof.” To be detached in a spiritual sense is “to be free from wanting certain things to happen.”

There is a woman who was crippled at birth. Later in childhood she was disfigured by severe burns. But she learned how to detach herself from her deformities. She grew up to become a psychiatrist. She likes to tell people with a smile “I am not what you see.”

Sisters and brothers, we should not pray so much for the circumstances in our life to change. We should pray for the grace to accept those things in our life that cannot be changed, the reality of our life. And then

we can begin to discover how we can follow Jesus in the midst of these circumstances. When we do that, we will have freedom before God.

Our men and women who volunteer with us do not have to wonder if they are making a difference in the lives of veterans and their families, they see it each day we open our doors to veterans and their families telling us how we changed their lives. There are a lot of men and women in our country who would not be able to have a place to call home if it were not for the VA benefits that they are receiving. I believe all veterans should receive the VA benefits they are eligible for. One of the most important is the VA Health Care veterans who have a service-connected disability of only 10 percent are eligible for.

Last week we had 28 veterans rated at 100 percent and as a combined group they will receive \$1,098,408 annually. Sixty-nine veterans received ratings of 10-90 percent and will get a combined annual \$930,317. Two surviving spouses were approved for benefits and will receive a combined \$35,018.

I have been granted by the Muskogee VA Regional office more hours of access time to review claims in the VA VBMS computer system. This will enable us to review more information the VA has on the veterans and surviving spouses who we represent. We have been assisting veterans for over 25 years to receive the VA benefits they are eligible for.

Today's VA is being the most responsive to veterans and their families as I have ever seen since beginning this mission to make a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served our country. I know that we have made a difference in the lives of tens of thousands of veterans and their families. I plan to continue this mission

as long as there are veterans who need the support of other veterans.

As a 501(c)(3) we have several ways that we raise funds to support our Veterans Foundation. The main one is donations from some of the men and women we have assisted. We also apply for grants and have our automobile donation program where people give us their old cars trucks, tractors motorcycles and other items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide our services.

Some of the veterans we have helped will buy that new truck they always wanted and then give their old one to us. There are many ways that we can be helped. On an average month we spend over \$25,000 supporting veteran needs. We ask that you give however you are able.

WHS:

"Now, we had a lot of defensive swings early in the game (against Shawnee) and some bad-pitch strikeouts early on. You can't do that against a team that's pretty good in Class 6A. Once you get some breaks here and there, you can capitalize on their errors and such. We did a better job of making adjustments later in the game."

Brewer is no stranger to the game. He was drafted by the

Montreal Expos in the 1998 major league draft.

But, he decided to play at Baylor University.

"A lot of my experience at Baylor comes into play," Brewer said, "but more of my pro baseball experience comes into play when I am coaching. I learned the game even more at the pro level and I understand it. Now, I'm trying to bring back my knowledge from the pros back to this level.

"Playing the game, respecting your opponents... all those things I learned as a professional. It's taught me a ton about how to coach this game."

After their win over Shawnee, the Warriors proceeded to beat Class 4A Cache, 3-1, before losing to Class 6A Stillwater, 5-4, in extra innings. Washington played at Class 5A Carl Albert on Tuesday.

"We came in as state runners-up last season," Brewer said.

"I feel good about this team this year. I think we're as deep as we were last year and we probably have more options in several aspects - in the circle and around it - than we did last year.

"We're young and a little inexperienced because we graduated five seniors that started for us last season. But, we've done a good job of replacing them. We make the most of our opportunities."
