Up to nearly 4" recorded in some parts

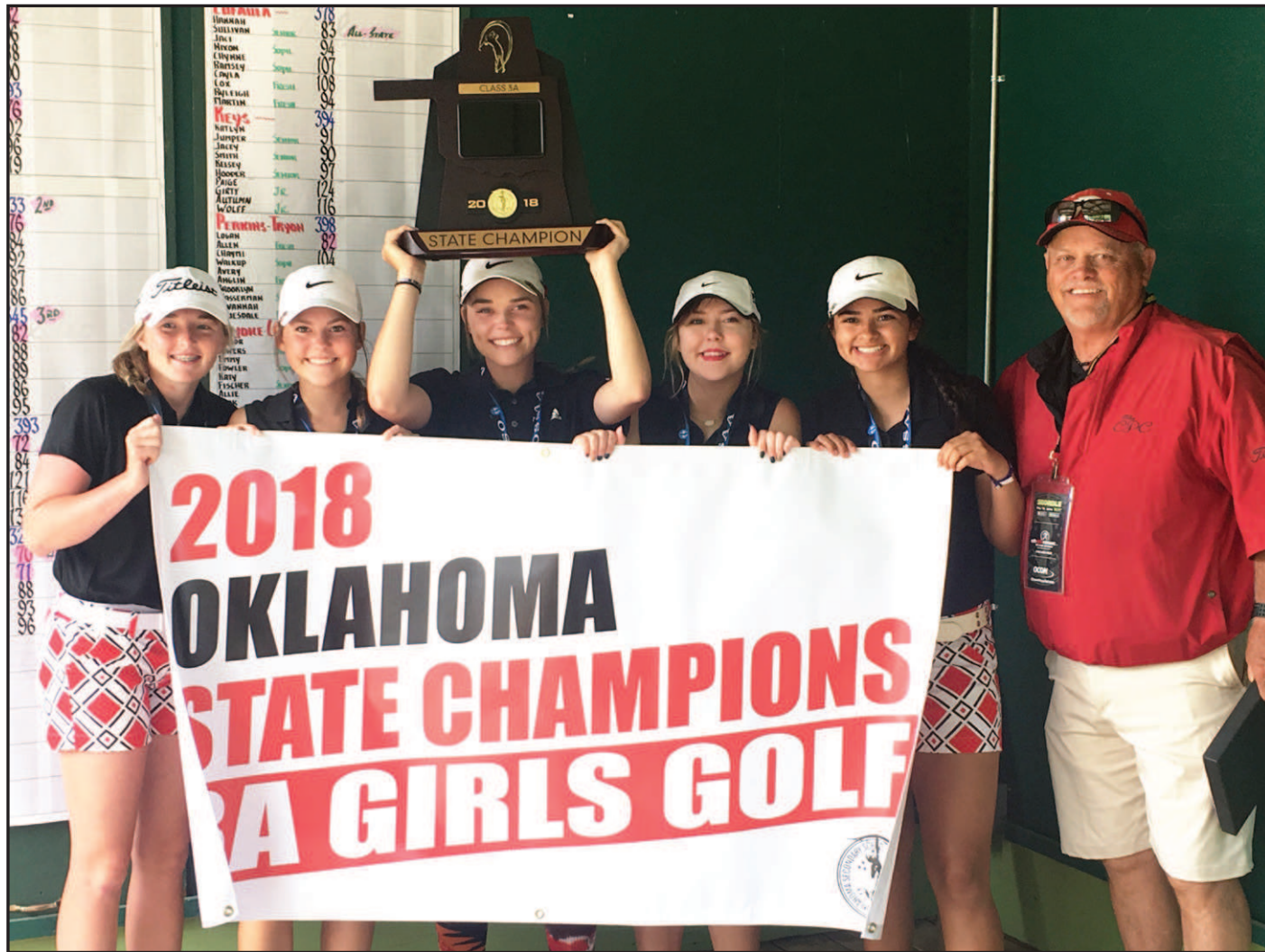
Some parts of Purcell received storm damage from the weak tornado followed several hours later by gale force winds.

Tornado damage assessed in town

EF-1 tornado hits Purcell night of May 2

All wrapped up

The small tornado that ripped through the northeast part of Purcell last Wednesday did a number on the garage roof and ceiling of the home of Maria Pritchett, located at 301 W. Harrison. Mrs. Pritchett was in the garage when the twister struck but was not injured.

No one wanted the visitor to Purcell that dropped in uninvited on the night of May 2.

A severe thunderstorm packing strong, possibly tornadic, winds hop scotched across the city, knocking out electricity in the north part of town and felling one of the new light poles installed as part of GreenScape about 9 p.m.

City manager Dale Bunn said several large trees in residential areas were also felled by the wind.

"Probably the biggest damage was on North Canadian east of the football stadium," Bunn said. "Some outbuildings were blown away."

City workers were out assessing the damage and beginning the cleanup until after midnight, Bunn added.

Advice to live long and prosper

The United States had not yet entered World War I when Irene Dowdy was born at Marietta on April 27, 1915.

Skip forward to April 27, 2018, and Dowdy, now a resident of Lexington Nursing Home, celebrated her 103rd birthday with cake and balloons.

It's likely she has lived through the most remarkable 100-plus years the world has seen.

Think about it.

She was born in a horse and buggy era and lived to see man walk on the moon.

There were boom years and bust years, the Roaring 20s and the Great Depression. Two World Wars, a Cold War, heated conflicts in Korea and Vietnam and an ongoing Global War on Terror.

Dowdy was the ninth of 10 children—she had five brothers

and four sisters. Her parents, she said, were “partially farmers.”

She loved baseball and a catcher was an avid player as a girl.

Why catcher?
“I was dumb and didn't know I could get hurt.”

Was she a tomboy?
“I guess I must have been.”

She never married, but life and career moved her away from her hometown.

She was an assembly line worker and had a “really nice little place by Tinker.”

She moved to Lexington in 2017.

“I knew some of the people around here,” she said.

Routine fills her days and she continues following her own advice for living a long life:

“Just try to find something interesting to do and stay out of the way of everything.”

Vehicle speed results in drug arrests

Agents recover cocaine, cash

Bonds on two Texas men were raised to \$100,000 each after they appeared in McClain County District Court on drug charges.

Jose L. Vencos, 22, aka Jose L. Venices-Garcia, and Uriel Ugarte-Benitez, 21, are both charged with unlawful possession of a controlled drug with intent to distribute and acquiring proceeds from drug activity.

Both defendants are from Austin.

According to an affidavit, a District 21 Drug Task Force officer stopped the men for speeding at mile marker 84 of Interstate 35 on April 19.

They were headed south in

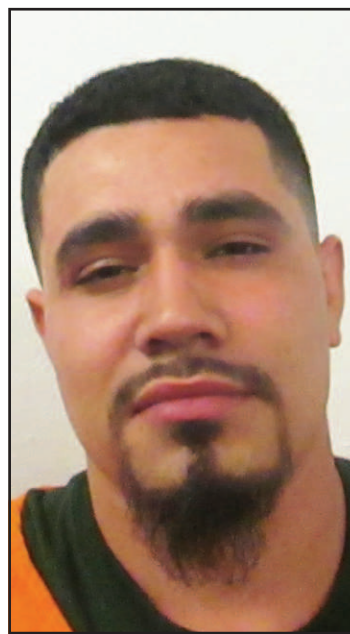
a silver Infiniti with a paper Texas tag.

Neither man had identification and the officer called for a drug dog which alerted to the vehicle.

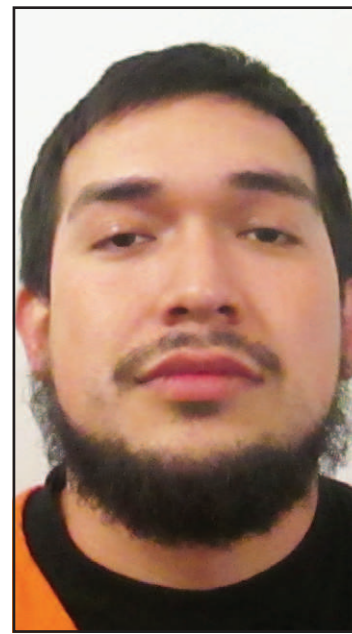
The men consented to a search of the vehicle, according to the affidavit. During that search, the officer found a baggie of cocaine under the center console. There were several smaller baggies of cocaine in the trunk.

Also, several bundles of cash totaling several thousand dollars were located in three areas of the dash.

There is also an Immigration and Customs Enforcement hold on both defendants.

Prison upkeep gets funding

Legislature OK's corrections bond

More than a third of the \$116.5 million bond approved by the Legislature for the Oklahoma Department of Corrections is earmarked to pay for public safety improvements at the Lexington Assessment & Reception Center and Joseph Harp Correctional Center.

The adjacent facilities east of Lexington will receive more than \$40 million.

The department will use bond

proceeds to pay for repairs, maintenance, equipment and improvements.

The bond bill began in the Senate and passed in the House 62-29.

The department has proposed more than 20 projects at the Lexington prisons.

“Most state prisons are retrofitted facilities, often originally built for purposes other than housing inmates,” said Rep.

Bobby Cleveland, chairman of the House Public Safety Committee, “While DOC has done the best it can with what it has, this bill provides the department an opportunity to perform badly needed repairs.”

Among anticipated projects are reroofing facilities, increasing ventilation and repairing water lines and electrical services.

DOC also plans to install stun fences and replace broken locks

on cell doors at certain facilities.

Also included are additional beds to ease the overcrowding problem plaguing the prisons.

“Not only will correctional officers be better equipped for their jobs, the living conditions for prisoners will also improve,” Cleveland continued. “It's my hope this investment in DOC will be just the beginning of what lawmakers can provide in the future.”

Changing role at Lexington

Peg Fletcher new interim superintendent

The news was sudden. So was the transition.

On April 18, Ronda Bass posted the following on the Lexington Public Schools information page on Facebook:

“Effective immediately, the Lexington School Board and I have agreed to part ways.

“I was neither fired nor did I resign. We simply agreed to a separation settlement so that we can all move forward.”

On April 19, school board

members appointed the district's federal programs director, Peg Fletcher, interim superintendent.

A search for a new superintendent is now in progress with the assistance of the Oklahoma State School Boards Association.

“They are accepting resumes at the moment,” Fletcher said Tuesday. “We would like to have somebody in place July 1 to start the school year.”

Fletcher said the transition “hasn't been easy, but it has been smooth.

“In my position, I work closely with the superinten-

dent,” she added.

The parting from Bass was bittersweet.

“It has been an absolute joy to work for the children of Lexington for the past 3 years,” she wrote, “and it was a true honor and privilege to stand rock-solid behind our teachers during the recent walkout.

“And while I know I ruffled some feathers during my stay at Lex, I will leave with very fond memories and many, many new friends. I wish you all the very best.”

Bass directed patrons to check the district website for any future updates.

Girl walks away while Mom naps
Mom waited 8 hours to call police

A mother waited nearly 8 hours before calling police to report her 8-year-old daughter left home while the woman napped and was missing.

It was the second time in less than seven weeks that the girl had run away. Now Amanda B. Hatcher, 25, of Purcell, is charged in McClain County District Court with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Hatcher was arrested April 30 on a bench warrant and was released after posting a \$2,500 bond.

According to an affidavit, the alleged incident occurred March 3.

Hatcher called police at 5:49 p.m. and told officer Thomas Rollins she'd taken a nap with her two younger children from 9 to 10:30 a.m., and awoke to discover the 8-year-old was gone.

The girl left a note saying she was going to a cousin's house on North 4th Avenue. Hatcher said she went to the cousin's house a few blocks away, but her daughter wasn't there. She then reportedly drove to Maysville and Wayne before returning home.

Hatcher was unable to give police a recent photo of the girl or provide a description of her clothing.

She also told police she hadn't called them earlier because "every time I call as soon as she leaves, you pick her up and bring her back," according to the affidavit.

Rollins went to the cousin

and obtained a recent photo of the missing child.

By that time, a second officer and the Purcell Fire Department had joined the search for the girl.

Rollins was discussing the search with a detective when he got a call from dispatch that the girl had been located in Maysville at her grandmother's.

of town told me they did hear the sirens.

But people in my area of town reported not hearing any warning sirens.

One resident that lives two miles east of Lexington told me he heard the sirens in Lexington blaring all the way to his house with he and his family in their storm cellar.

Emergency Management Director Kevin Rhoads said

when wind speeds reach 45-50 mph, they "just blow the sound away."

The radar analysts at Ch 9 and their trackers need to keep their eye on other parts of the state as well.

When it's night time and we are without warning, it makes things a little more dangerous.

We probably should have been in our shelter during the storm but didn't have a clue a tornado was actually in town.

Purcell got lucky no one was injured, especially Maria Prichett who was in her garage when the whole thing started shaking.

"I ran to the front of the house and then outside," Prichett told me.

She lost the roof of her garage and the ceiling collapsed.

Lucky she had left that part of her house. Otherwise, the story could have been much different.

Continuing achievements

Congressman Tom Cole

As Congress reaches the final stretches of its 115th session, the House can reflect on a long list of accomplishments it has achieved since the beginning of the session. Despite the constant discussions that partisan gridlock may be the new norm, it has been quite the opposite.

Since the beginning of the 115th Congress, the House has passed 598 bills – 470 of which are sitting in the Senate with no action. That means almost 79 percent of all legislation passed thus far have yet to see the Senate Floor or the President's desk.

However, since President Trump took office, we have worked in concert with the Administration to advance good legislation that will support America's economy and well-being.

One of the first legislative initiatives that Congress approached was the successful work to deregulate harmful government regulations and Obama-era federal rules. Congressional Review Acts served as the catalyst to end the many bureaucratic red-tape practices that have slowed industrial growth, regulated thousands of workers and hampered American ingenuity.

So far, Congress has passed, and the President has signed, 15 Congressional Review Acts. Regarding deregulatory action alone, no Congress and Administration have done more than the current ones.

The most significant accomplishment of the 115th Congress so far has been the passage and implementation of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, which reforms the current tax code and incentivizes businesses to invest into the American economy.

This year, Americans filed their taxes for the last time under the antiquated tax system and will begin to reap the benefits of the new system's individual tax brackets.

Businesses have begun to re-invest in corporate expansion, and have awarded thousands of dollars in bonuses to employees. As a result, the passage of the tax reform bill is projected to contribute to economic growth in the United States in the years to come.

During this Congressional session, the federal government, unfortunately, faced multiple continuing resolutions and even a government shutdown. The House has been diligent in the past year by passing all 12 appropriations measures to send to the Senate promptly.

However, it was ultimately the Senate that made it impossible for the bill to be sent to the President's desk on time. The Fiscal Year 2018 omnibus spending bill, which funds the entire federal government, was finally passed by both chambers and signed into law by President Trump in March of this year.

It is important to note that this year's omnibus funding bill does not direct any funds to Planned Parenthood, and includes many provisions to protect the sanctity of life.

Legislative amendments like the Hyde Amendment prohibit federal funds to be used for abortion, and the Weldon amendment protects doctors and nurses that do not want to perform abortions from discrimination.

Our national security has become a top priority in the past year as well. In the Fiscal Year 2018 omnibus spending bill, the Department of Defense received its largest funding boost in 15 years, which will lift

the military out of the harmful sequester.

These investments in the military will bolster critical programs that support troop training, equipment, and facility maintenance, improving technology, research, and development and fulfill any readiness shortfalls.

Furthermore, the funding increase will expand troop numbers, so that the U.S. military is a more robust and able fighting force.

Additionally, reforming the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) systems has also been a significant accomplishment of the 115th Congress. A vast number of legislative reforms have been signed into law that are directed at creating more transparency and accountability at the VA.

In the Fiscal Year 2018 omnibus bill, the VA received the largest dollar amount increase in history. The Department of Veterans Affairs received \$85.1 billion which will help care for seven million patients.

It will also address shortfalls at the VA by reducing patient wait times, improving electronic health records and addressing the disability claims backlog.

In addition to completing the Fiscal Year 2019 funding bill this year and in regular order, the House will still maintain a busy legislative agenda to finish before the end of the year. Many major actions, like the 2018 Farm Bill and the creation of stronger border security will need to be addressed.

As we reach the home stretch of the year, it is imperative that the House, Senate, and the White House continue to successfully pass bills that will advance regulatory reform, economic growth, public health and wellbeing and ultimately, the American taxpayer.

Letter carriers food drive

Retiring? You have a choice to make on Medicare

When you retire and qualify for Medicare at 65, you'll need

to decide how you'd like to receive your health care benefits.

Because you'll be new to Medicare, you may not realize you have two options.

One is to join the government's fee-for-service program that's existed for 53 years. The

other is to buy a Medicare Advantage plan from a private insurer.

The choice may seem bewildering at first, so let's go over each option.

With traditional fee-for-service coverage, you may go

to any doctor, hospital or other provider that accepts Medicare.

Medicare pays the provider a fee for the service you receive. Once you meet your annual deductible, Medicare typically covers 80 percent of the cost for your care.

You have a few choices for covering the other 20 percent:

- You may use your retiree health plan from your former employer, if you're retired

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Well the box office might still be dominated by The Avengers, but there's always new movies being released.

This week we have a film with Charlize Theron tackling motherhood, a thriller featuring a thief who decided to rob the wrong man's house, and a remake of a 80's Kurt Russell comedy.

Let's get right to it.



First up is "Tully." Marlo (Charlize Theron), a struggling mother of three including a newborn, is gifted a night nanny by her brother (Mark Duplass) to help her get some much needed sleep.

Hesitant to take him up on the offer at first, Marlow eventually succumbs and calls into service a thoughtful yet quirky young nanny named Tully (Mackenzie Davis).

Well this is definitely not a movie to go see if you're on the fence about having a baby.

I'm not a parent myself, but this film makes the experience of caring for a newborn seem absolutely horrifying.

It certainly felt like the story came from a place of experience. And considering the movie's writer, Diablo Cody, is a mother of three, I'd say she probably has a solid understanding on the subject.

Charlize Theron is fantastic in this role.

Everything about her character seems so real. You can't help but feel the stresses of motherhood radiating off of her, just from the expressions on Theron's face.

Even before she has the new baby, her life is just one giant ball of stress.

Theron's character has to deal with a young son with some kind of undiagnosed developmental condition, plus she a daughter on the verge of becoming a teenager, which is a whole other mess in itself.

Frankly, it comes as a massive relief when Tully finally comes into the picture and gives this poor mom a much needed break.

But the film doesn't stop there.

All that is just the beginning, and what starts out as a movie that seems to be about a mother simply getting her life back together, turns into something far more intriguing in the end. Especially with Tully.

At first she just seems like a perfect, if unconventional, caregiver. But as the film goes on and Tully's and Marlo's relationship grows, it slowly becomes clear that everything about this peculiar nanny isn't exactly what it appears.

Mackenzie Davis does a wonderful job bringing this character to life.

Yes, she does oftentimes fall into the overly quirky stereotype you've probably seen dozens of times in other movies.

She never becomes annoying though and I think the way the filmmakers handle her character turns out to be downright clever.

I wish I could go into more detail, but I really don't want to give it all away.

Suffice it to say I think this is a movie very much worth watching.

If you have the chance to go see it, I highly recommend it. "Tully" is rated R.

Next is "Bad Samaritan."

Sean Falco (Robert Sheehan), a valet who uses the cars entrusted to him by his clientele to rob their homes, suddenly finds more than he bargained



for when he breaks into the house of a billionaire (David Tennant), only to discover a woman bound and imprisoned inside.

Determined to do something, Sean does everything in his power to rescue the trapped woman. But as a result he becomes the new target of the sadistic kidnapper who systematically sets out to ruin Sean's life.

This movie feels like a terrible waste of a really interesting concept.

I loved the idea of this film going into it.

In a lot of ways it reminded me of 2016's "Don't Breathe."

Both star sympathetic burglars, except instead of a ruthless old blind man with a hapless young woman trapped in his house, this time it's a ruthless trust-fund billionaire with a hapless young woman trapped in his house.

Sadly this movie has neither the style nor the suspense of "Don't Breathe."

This movie just fails to build any tension whatsoever. I lay most of the blame with the camera work and editing.

It doesn't surprise me in the least that both the cinematographer and editor have pretty much exclusively worked in television their entire careers.

Not that I'm saying TV can't look fantastic, in fact I'd say some shows can be better produced than many theatrical releases.

But this film is barely one step above a made for TV movie in appearance.

Instead of the camera framing and transitions adding suspense to the narrative, it completely snuffs out all tension. Tension that would have been present in the hands of better filmmakers.

Which is a shame, because the actor's performances themselves aren't half bad.

Robert Sheehan does well as the valet turned burglar and makes for a very sympathetic lead character.

David Tennant definitely has his moments as well.

I love Tennant as an actor and early on in the film he comes across as very threatening.

Sadly his billionaire baddie persona becomes about as menacing as a Scooby Doo villain towards the end.

He might as well have said "And I would have gotten away with it too, if it wasn't for you meddling burglars."

It was such a silly and unimaginative ending to a story that I thought had so much more potential. I couldn't help but be disappointed.

All that said though, I don't think this is a bad movie. I'm sure many people will enjoy the film just fine.

For me though, I can't help but feel the whole thing is just a massive waste of a good concept.

"Bad Samaritan" is rated R.

Last this week is "Overboard."

Kate (Anna Faris), a single, working mother of three is hired to clean the luxury yacht belong-



ing to a selfish, spoiled and wealthy Mexican playboy named Leonardo (Eugenio Derbez). After unjustly firing Kate, Leonardo falls overboard one night and wakes up on the beach with zero memory of who he is.

Seeking revenge against Leonardo, Kate shows up at the hospital claiming to be his wife.

If this story sounds familiar, it's because it probably is.

This movie is almost an exact remake of 1987's "Overboard" with Kurt Russell and Goldie Hawn, except instead of the woman being the spoiled rich one, this time it's the man.

It's pretty striking how similar these movies are. Entire sections of the films are word-for-word exactly the same.

That won't be an issue for most people though. I doubt too many have watched the original recently, not unless you're really into older Kurt Russell comedies.

I'd say the biggest difference between the old version and the remake is that almost half the dialogue for this new film is in Spanish.

There are a ton of subtitles here. If you don't like reading, this movie will be a nonstarter.

On the other hand if you're bilingual, this movie is tailor-made for you.

There were quite a few Spanish speakers in the audience when I saw this comedy, and as far as I can tell, they all seemed to have a wonderful time watching it.

In a lot of ways this movie reminded me of last year's "How to Be a Latin Lover," a comedy that also had a ton of Spanish dialogue.

Which makes sense because not only do both of these films share a studio (Pantelion Films), they both share a lead actor (Eugenio Derbez).

But compared to the studio's last film, I had a much harder time getting behind the concept of this movie.

The plot of "Overboard" just seems so cruel, both in the original and remake. It took me a long while to find humor in what was essentially forcing someone with a head injury into slave labor.

Luckily for this new film, Eugenio Derbez is a very charismatic actor and his performance adds a huge amount of charm to the whole production.

Sure, the humor is silly. In fact it's very silly at times, and there's tons of low effort comedy with a fair amount of physical humor thrown in.

It's all relatively harmless though. Despite a cruel concept, the movie itself isn't really all that mean spirited.

It took a long time, but I'd say in the end the movie actually started growing on me.

It's not a smart comedy, but you can definitely do worse.

Heck, if you speak Spanish and English, this film is specially made just for you.

This film probably won't end up in my favorites as far as comedies go this year, but for what it is, I didn't think it was half bad. "Overboard" is rated PG-13.

and have such a policy. Some retiree plans may cost less or provide more benefits than other supplemental coverage.

- You may qualify for Medicaid, if you have limited income and savings. Besides helping with your out-of-pocket costs like deductibles and co-insurance, Medicaid may pay for your monthly Medicare premiums.
- If neither of those applies, you may buy a "Medigap" policy from a private insurer to cover what Medicare does not. There are 10 kinds of Medigap plans, with different benefits, so you'll need to decide which is best for you.

If you choose the traditional fee-for-service program, you'll probably also want to buy a prescription drug plan to go with your other coverage. Traditional Medicare remains the favorite among people wanting the broadest possible access to doctors, hospitals and other providers. When coupled with a supplemental plan, it also makes your health care costs relatively predictable.

Still, 33 percent of all Medicare beneficiaries – including 18 percent of Oklahomans with Medicare -- now prefer to get their health care benefits through a private insurer. The number of people buying private Medicare Advantage plans has more than doubled over the last 10 years.

With Medicare Advantage, insurance companies contract with the government to provide care. Every private plan must cover all the benefits that traditional Medicare covers. In some cases, Medicare Advantage plans may offer extra benefits, like routine hearing or vision care.

Many plans charge a premium on top of the amount you'll pay each month for Medicare's Part B medical insurance, but there's no need to buy a supplemental Medigap policy. Likewise, most Medicare Advantage plans include drug coverage with their other benefits.

The premiums, deductibles and co-payments will vary from one Medicare Advantage plan to another. But all plans, by law, must have annual limits on their overall out-of-pocket costs.

Unlike the traditional fee-for-service program, most Medicare Advantage plans require you to go to doctors and hospitals within their network of providers or pay more for getting care outside the network.

Still, the private health plans have been especially popular among people with low to moderate incomes. They provide relatively affordable supplemental coverage, with lower premiums than those for Medigap policies.

So, which is better -- the traditional fee-for-service coverage or a private Medicare Advantage plan? That depends on your own circumstances and preferences. What's best for one person may not work as well for someone else.

This is a really good casserole recipe.

Baked Burrito Casserole

1 pound of ground beef
1 small onion, chopped
1 pack of taco seasoning
1 can refried beans
1 can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
1/2 cup sour cream
1 pack large flour tortillas
2 1/2 cups of shredded Mexican blend cheese

Preheat oven to 350°.

In a large skillet, cook the ground beef and onion until the beef is no longer pink and drain.

Add the taco seasoning and refried beans and heat through.

In a separate bowl, blend the mushroom soup with the sour cream. Then spread half of the soup mixture in the bottom of a baking dish.

Add a layer of 3 flour tortillas to the top of the soup mixture. You will need to cut or tear the tortillas and overlap them.

Spread on a layer of the ground beef mixture and top with about a cup of cheese.

Repeat all of these layers and top with the remaining cheese.

Bake for about 20 minutes until cheese is melted.

Finger weaving is an art form used mostly to create belts, sashes straps and other similar items without using a loom.

It was common in much of eastern North America, where it was first accomplished using

spun buffalo hair, rabbit hair, as well as mulberry bark and dogbane.

In addition to the simple diagonal weave, other common patterns include those depicting chevrons, lightning bolts, arrowheads and diamonds. These are all achieved with slight changes to the weaving process.

Seating is limited to 15 people ages 15 and up and registration is required. All supplies will be provided.

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Chickasaw Nation honored by OU for endowment

The University of Oklahoma expressed its gratitude to the Chickasaw Nation during a reception and open house at the OU Native Nations Center April 26.

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby accepted on behalf of the Chickasaw Nation, which provided endowment funding for the center, located at Copeland Hall on the OU campus. A portion of the endowment was used to renovate and refurbish the Department of Native American Studies.

"We are pleased to support OU in the development of the Native Nations Center," said Gov. Anoatubby. "We believe the center will play a vital role in elevating the level of Native American education in Oklahoma and across the United States. This investment will help advance research and scholarship essential to a brighter future for individual students and Native American communities," he added.

The area will be used for gatherings and events, including nationally known speakers and such outreach efforts as workshops on tribal governance and curriculum development. The center will also host listening sessions with tribal leaders to develop a deeper understanding of their communities' goals and objectives.

Gov. Anoatubby was presented with a Pendleton blanket by Amanda Cobb-Greetham, director of the center and department chair for OU Native American Studies. Dr. Cobb-Greetham is a Chickasaw citizen and former Chickasaw

Nation administrator of history and culture before joining OU in 2013.

"We are grateful for the Chickasaw Nation's generous gift toward this important program. The Native Nations Center plays a significant role in elevating and institutionalizing collaborative relationships with the 39 Native American nations of Oklahoma," said OU President David L. Boren.

OU President-designate James Gallogly attended the open house on behalf of Boren who will step down as the university's top leader June 30 after serving 24 years.

The center overflowed with Native students, faculty, and university officials eager to celebrate changes to Copeland Hall, Native Nations Center and Native American Studies.

"OU is poised to become not only the leading Native American Studies academic program in the nation, but also the leading institution in all areas relating to Native Americans, including recruitment, retention and research," said Dr. Cobb-Greetham. "We have amazing institutional resources, from our Native students, faculty and staff to archival collections.

"The center provides a front door to OU's acclaimed Native American programs," she said. "The center will enhance research opportunities for scholars. It will provide much-needed resources for Oklahoma's tribes while also enriching the lives of our students and all Oklahomans. With the help of the Chickasaw Nation, OU's Native Nations Center will al-

low us to recruit and retain the finest and brightest minds in the country."

Research will be a major focus of the Native Nations Center, primarily in the areas of tribal governance and policy, language revitalization and indigenous arts and cultural expression. The center will facilitate grant submissions and develop a large, digital database of national Native American resources for use by students, researchers, communities and tribal governments.

The idea of a physical center devoted to Native American

resources began in 1915. OU was among the first colleges in the nation to offer Native American courses. Native American Studies degrees were conferred at OU starting in 1994 and Boren elevated the program to a department in 2015.

In the past 20 years, Native American Studies has awarded more than 200 degrees; alumni of the department have distinguished themselves in a wide range of careers, including tribal government, law, health policy, filmmaking and media, historic preservation, language revitalization and education.

Out for bids

City seeks manufactured homes

No, the City of Purcell isn't going into the mobile home park business. But they are in the market for some manufactured homes. The city will accept sealed bids until 3 p.m. Tuesday, at which time bids will be opened and read. City manager Dale Bunn said a Wayne company, Anasaz, has been leasing trailers to the city since the devastating 500-year flood that sent Walnut Creek out of its banks in May 2015. The flood waters did extensive damage to the city yard and the trailers were rented to house the street, water and electrical departments. Bunn said Anasaz charged very reasonable rent but now needs those trailers for another use. It's a simple matter of economics. "We appreciate what they have been renting them to us for, but they can get more (revenue) in the Texas oilfields," Bunn said. The city manager said the manufactured homes will be temporary "until a new yard can be built." There's no timeline on that, however, as officials still haven't decided on a location for a new yard.

Charged:

demeanor. Also on Monday, McClain County prosecutors filed four new charges against Ball, including kidnapping, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, protective order violation and disrupting a 911 phone call. These are in addition to charges filed in McClain County on April 23: kidnapping, domestic abuse/assault and battery and preventing a call to 911. At his initial appearance in McIntosh County District Court on Monday, bail was set at \$100,000. His preliminary hearing conference there is scheduled for 9 a.m. July 5. All of the charges stem from Ball allegedly kidnapping his ex-girlfriend in Purcell twice in as many weeks. Assistant District Attorney Lesley March said Monday that Ball will be tried here before McIntosh County. "We have the original charges," she said. Det. Sgt. Scott Stephens said the latest abduction was recorded on surveillance video at Subway where the victim was closing up Friday night. That's when Ball, armed with a knife, entered the business and forced her to leave with him after a brief scuffle. Purcell police had no idea where Ball was going with the victim. By Saturday, Lt. Kevin Austin had information about a possible relative near Checotah, where Ball had gone to high school. "I called the Checotah police and gave them the person's name," Stephens said. Checotah police transferred the call to the McIntosh County Sheriff's Department, which dispatched a deputy to the residence near Lake Eufaula. Ball attempted to flee but the deputy gave chase and arrested him. The deputy then waited for a second officer to arrive before entering the home to search for the victim. She was found locked in a bedroom. She had been sexually assaulted. "But she was safe; we recovered her," he said. According to Stephens, Ball sneaked her into the home and hid her in the bedroom. The relative was unaware she was in the house. "She's pretty traumatized," Stephens said, adding that she is now back in Purcell. Authorities here issued an arrest warrant after the first incident in which Ball allegedly abducted his former girlfriend at the Purcell Sonic about 3:30 p.m. on April 21. According to an affidavit, Ball twice struck the victim's face with his closed fist and then took her phone when she tried to call 911. He drove her to Moore, trying to persuade her to resume their relationship. He returned her to Purcell after she agreed, dropping her off at a convenience store about two hours after the ordeal began. The victim told police she'd agreed, knowing that was the only way Ball would return her to Purcell. The victim was granted an emergency order of protection on April 23.

Vasquez has been charged with accessory after the fact in the death of Toombs, who was about seven months pregnant. Toombs had been reported missing since April 29 from a southwest Oklahoma City apartment.

After Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) interviews in Arkansas, Joshua Finkbeiner, 30, and Staci Harjo, 42, were arrested on first degree murder charges and are currently in custody at Cleburne County Detention Center.

They are awaiting extradition.

The McClain County Sheriff's Department said as other details emerge in the ongoing investigation, they will be released.

The entire ordeal began May 2 when a man at the Love's Country Store in Goldsby told a Lighthorse Police Officer his vehicle had run out of gas and there was a body in his vehicle.

McClain County Deputies located the vehicle south of the Goldsby exit on the shoulder of the north bound lanes of I-35.

They confirmed a deceased body was found in the back floor board of the vehicle.

Sheriff officials immediately contacted the OSBI, who took control of the investigation.

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Tornado:

About 10 firefighters and volunteers were joined by the street, water and electric departments.

The electric department still had personnel out at 10:45 a.m. the next day.

Bunn said most of the electricity was back on just after midnight. But there still could be individual outages that “we didn’t know about.”

Parts of town were without power for up to 6 1/2 hours.

The Parks and Recreation Department worked on storm damage around the lake and especially on Red Hill.

Bunn said he believes it was a tornado that caused the damage, but deferred that confirmation to emergency management director Kevin Rhoads.

After touring the city to assess damage with mayor Ted Cox and vice mayor Danny Jacobs, Rhoads sized the tornado as an EF-1, which he clarified is a small tornado.

“I think it stayed in the treetops most of the time until it got to Red Hill and crossed the river,” he said. “It was on the ground then.”

With reports that some residents never heard the storm sirens and others only heard the warning faintly, Rhoads said there was no problem with the sirens’ performance.

“The sirens are for people outside. They aren’t made to penetrate buildings,” he explained.

Residents need to remember that when winds reach 45 or 50 mph, they “just blow the sound away.”

“If that wind’s moving, you’re not going to hear (the sirens). That’s just the way they are,” he continued. “The city has one of the most up-to-date systems there is.”

Among damages caused by either the tornado or straight winds about 2:30 a.m. was a tree falling on vehicles on Bruel. The Rotary ticket booth at Conger Field was blown onto its side and moved northeast about 75’ by the winds.

The Welcome to Conger Field Go Dragons sign was blown out of the ground and onto its back.

There was tree damage all over town and the garage roof was destroyed at Maria Pritchett’s house at 301 W. Harrison. Her garage ceiling also fell in.

She was in the garage when it started shaking.

“I had no warning,” Mrs. Pritchett said. “I didn’t know what was going on.”

“I ran to the front of the house and then outside,” she said.

McClain County Sheriff Don Hewett said he was watching Channel 9 and only knew there was a tornado when his cell phone alerted him.

A front porch on a home nearby the Hewett’s was blown on top of the neighbor’s house.

When the strong straight line winds blew through the area about 2:30 a.m. it blew the porch back to its original position.

The small tornado touched down in the area of the Green Avenue Church of Christ, church officials said. It destroyed a storage shed behind the meeting house without damaging or disturbing the contents.

The storm also left a large dent on the south side of the building from flying debris and caused minor water damage inside.

Rhoads said in this instance, he only had about a minute in which to sound the sirens from the time the warning was issued until the tornado was moving through the city.

Instead of relying solely on tornado sirens, Rhoads said residents should affix digital antennas to television sets or invest in a weather radio.

“Something to ensure they will receive that warning,” he said.

those offices during Monday’s council meeting.

In addition, the council appointed Cox to represent the city on the Association of Central Oklahoma Governments board of directors, as well as ACOG’s committees for intermodal transportation policy and the Garber-Wellington Association policy.

The council agreed to an amended \$50,600 budget request from Purcell Public Library.

The funding for fiscal year 2018-19 will be earmarked as follows: \$10,600 for the summer reading program and \$40,000 to remodel restrooms.

The library had initially requested \$50,000 for the restrooms, but Purcell Public Schools, which owns the building, agreed to cover \$10,000 of that cost.

The council agreed to a \$1,000 increase in the city’s financial support of the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce by approving the chamber’s request for \$26,000.

Also approved was a \$22,500 request from Delta Public Transit.

The council tabled action on ending a 99-year lease with McClain County for Lions Park.

Cox, a Lions Club member, said Lions Park has existed “forever and a day.”

“You need to figure where Lions Park can go,” Cox told city manager Dale Bunn.

In other action, the council approved a proclamation recognizing July as Parks and Recreation Month in Purcell.

A second proclamation declared October 3 as Kim Barnes Day in Purcell.

Barnes is employed at the Purcell Fire Department.

Following an executive session, the council approved the continued employment of Bunn and city treasurer Victor Lohn for FY 2018-19.

After dispatching Dickson 5-3 in the first round of the Regional Tournament at Beggs, the Warriors had their sights on advancing.

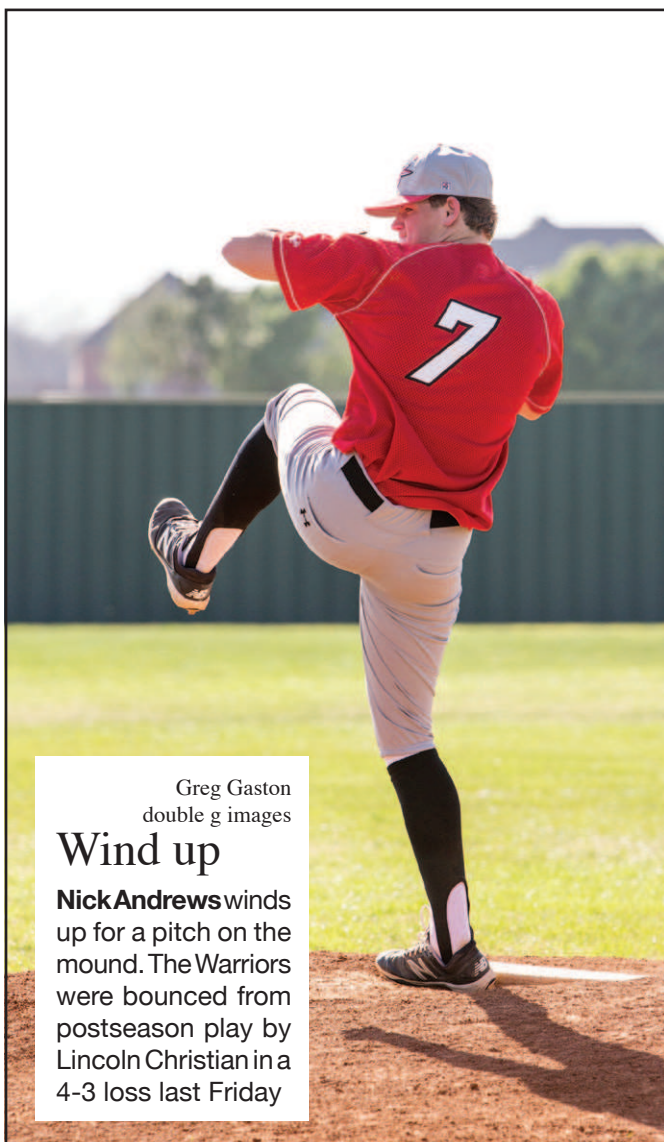
Oliver Wilson put the Dickson victory in his pocket tossing six solid innings of four hit ball.

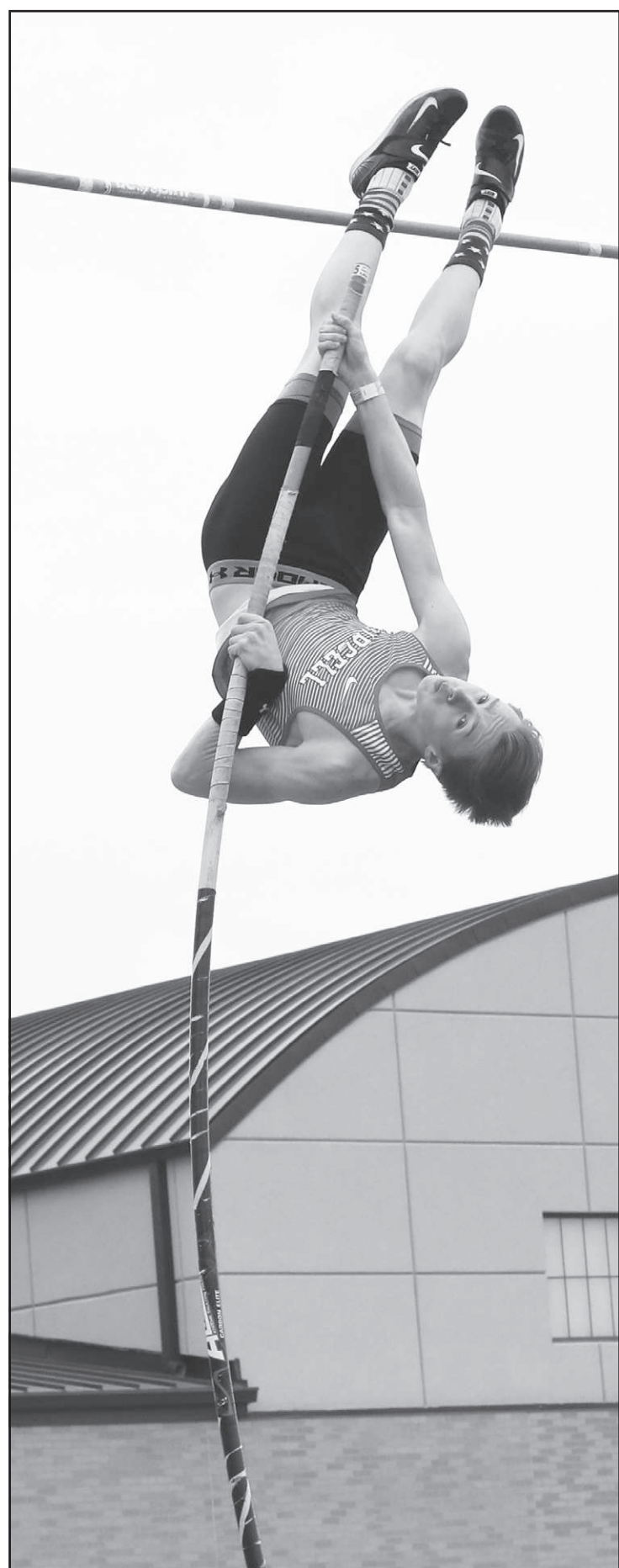

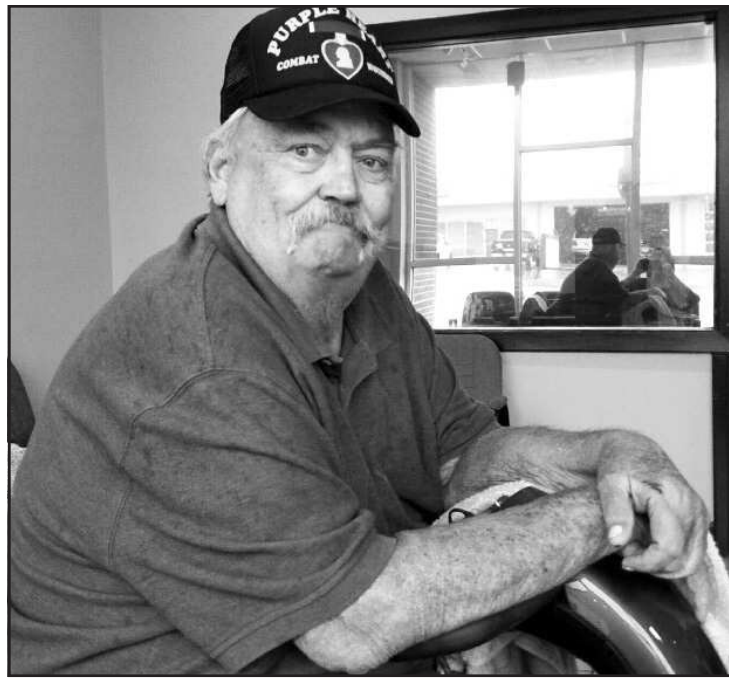

Our Veteran of the Week is one of my heroes, Jack O. Anderson who recently fought his last battle from exposure to Agent Orange.

Jack and I were friends from grade school after which we both joined the military after high school graduation from Dibble High School. Jack was an adventurer in many ways.

When we were 13 years old, we hitchhiked 17 miles to Chickasha, so he could see his girlfriend. After joining the Navy, that same adventurer spirit led him to volunteer to be a gunner on the PBR boats patrolling the rivers of the Mekong Delta during the Vietnam War.

While serving there, Jack was wounded twice and was awarded two Purple Hearts and a Bronze Star with Combat V. Jack, like many veterans who returned home from war, looked the same yet was changed in many ways. I'm very proud to have known Jack and to have called him a friend. Gone but not forgotten.

The spring rains meant a slower week for our volunteers last week as there were only 230 veterans and surviving spouses who visited us. Needless to say, our volunteers did not mind having a less hectic day. Several of them said they were going home for a nap after we finished.

One of the most important things we provide for veterans is our transportation service. We have two full-time drivers, Clayton Lee and Louie Metseff, who stay very busy taking veterans to their VA appointments daily. Each week they log more than 1,000 miles providing rides for those who need this service.

Just last week, these two exceptional volunteers donated 63 hours transporting 17 veterans.

Our handicap accessible van is now available to transport veterans to their VA appointments. To schedule wheelchair accessible transportation contact Lora at 550-8806. As our population continues to age, we are going to need others to step up to provide relief for Clayton and Louie. We have volunteer applications available to those who would like to help us serve veterans and their spouses.

By being a VA Accredited Claims Agent, there are several benefits available to the veterans and surviving spouses we represent. One of the most important is the ability to review their claims. For instance, if a veteran comes in and wants to know how their claim is progressing through the VA system, we can open up their file to review their claim status.

Another plus is that I receive a copy of everything the VA sends to the veteran or surviving spouse. This enables us to send a letter telling our clients what to do next.

I received the following VA rating decisions last week; there were nine veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$352,548 per year.

There were 16 veterans awarded ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$211,902 per year. One surviving spouse was awarded DIC.

For those who receive a service-connected disability rating of 35 percent or more, the VA will also provide an increased amount if they have dependents. As the veterans rating increases, our state offers additional benefits when a 50 percent VA disability rating is achieved. Oklahoma benefits continue to increase as a veteran's rating increases.

For more information on state benefits, please stop by and visit with one of our volunteers.

As many of you know, we spend more than \$30,000 each month providing services to veterans and their families. This money comes from the veterans and their families we serve. We are not funded by any government agency. Everyone who assists veterans is a volunteer including myself.

Your financial support is needed to allow us and our volunteers to continue making a difference in the lives of our veterans and their families. As veterans, we know if we don't help each other no one else is going to do it.

Our program of accepting cars, trucks, motorcycles, and other items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to support our programs continues to be very successful. If you donate your old one and take the deduction off of your taxes many times, you can lower your tax bill more than the actual trade-in allowance.

Our volunteers who assist surviving spouses have been very busy the last few weeks averaging more than fifteen each week. We suggest all

surviving spouses visit with one of our specialists about the possibility of receiving VA benefits based on their veteran's military service. Many diseases are presumptive to some veteran's military service. If a veteran served in Vietnam, Camp Lejeune, Gulf Wars or other places where they were exposed to fuels, chemicals or herbicides the veteran or their surviving spouse should visit us.

Good week to all: Welcome to the "front porch."

Happy Mother's Day to all of you mothers and grandmothers. God bless you for all of your "amazing-ness"! That's the best word I could think of.

My mother would be 87 this year, but the Lord only gave her 42 years to share her faith and her truly amazing grace. We have often written that had Mama lived during Bible times, that the inspired writers could well have lauded her faith, as the Lord does so often in His travels, that He might have said she was a woman woven from a strong, special cloth.

When I think of Mama's faith, I often think of the faith of the woman in Matthew's gospel who had lived with a 12-year blood disease. Her faith is so determined that she believes down deep in her heart that if she can but touch the "hem of his garment" (v. 20) that the Lord has more than enough power to heal her. And the Lord does: "Daughter," he says compassionately, as He feels her reaching out and touching his cloak, "be of good comfort; thy faith that made thee whole."

Scenes of faith in this reading do not end with that remarkable woman. A bit earlier a Jewish ruler had come to him begging for the life of his daughter (v. 18). So Jesus begins to make his way to the man's house. He is on this journey when the woman with the blood disease fights

her way through the crowd to touch the hem of His garment.

But tragically, Jesus does not make it to the ruler's house in time. Mark records in his gospel that as they make their way toward the man's house, that some people run to tell the Lord that the 12-year-old girl has died (Mark 5:35).

Of course, Jesus' mission on this earth, ultimately, is to defeat death, which he does triumphantly at His resurrection; but he defeats death often along the way, as He does here. He goes to the man's house -- deflecting the scolding of the crowd along the way -- and gently, lovingly takes the young girl and gives her back to her joyful parents (v. 25).

When Mama faced her strength-shattering brain tumor, the Lord doesn't restore her to life as he does the young girl's. He does not take her by the hand and raise her up as He raises that sweet 12-year-old girl in Capernaum.

Mama's brain tumor also robbed her of her sight the last few months of her life, and the Lord does not restore that either, as He does for many blind men throughout his travels. Mama would not be able to look

at her children and her mama and daddy as she walked the last mile of the way.

But we all know that on the evening of Oct. 3, 1973 when Mama left us, the Lord gave her a great blessing. He cured this great woman of faith of that hard, long disease she had battled; He gave her vision unlike anything she had ever known or imagined; and, I am fully convinced, He reached down from the clouds of heaven, took her gently by the hand, and gave her a new life, eternal life. That night Mama would have "the right to the tree of life" (Revelation 22:14).

All of her children and loved ones, even the grandchildren and great grandchildren she did not meet on this side of heaven, are thankful to the good Lord even today for giving her such unspeakable blessings. And one day, we are confident, the Lord will allow her to see those grandchildren with heavenly eyes, making the glory of that moment far greater than a few years of sadness.

So, happy Mother's Day to my own mama this week, and to all of you mothers, too. God bless!

Head out to the wild horse and burro event in Pauls Valley

The Bureau of Land Management will hold an open house event at the Pauls Valley Wild Horse and Burro Adoption Facility in Pauls Valley May 18 and 19.

The event will feature 50 wild horses and burros, including several flashy mares. There will also be a horse trainer on-site giving wild horse gentling demonstrations.

The open house event will take place from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on May 18 and from 8 a.m. to noon on May 19, with the adoption beginning at noon on Friday.

The BLM will offer animals for the adoption fee of \$125 (set by law). In addition to the open house, the facility is open the second Tuesday of every month.

The horses offered for adop-

tion are adult and yearling horses and burros that once roamed free on public lands in the West. The BLM periodically removes excess animals from the range in order to maintain healthy herds, and to protect other rangeland resources.

The adoption program is essential for achieving these important management goals. Since 1973, the BLM has placed more than 235,000 animals into private care.

BLM staff will approve qualifying applications on-site. To qualify to adopt, an applicant must be at least 18, with no record of animal abuse. Adopters must have a minimum of 400 square feet of corral space per animal, with free access to food, water and shelter.

A six-foot corral fence is

required for adult horses; five feet for yearlings and four-and-a-half feet for burros. All animals must be loaded in covered, stock trailers with swing gates and sturdy walls and floors.

The BLM pays a one-time \$500 care-and-feeding allowance to adopters of horses that are at least four years old.

The BLM pays the allowance after one year, when adopters receive official ownership title for their horse(s). All standard adoption conditions and fees apply.

To get to the Pauls Valley Adoption Center from I-35, take Exit 74 (Kimberlin Road) west about one-quarter mile to the facility.

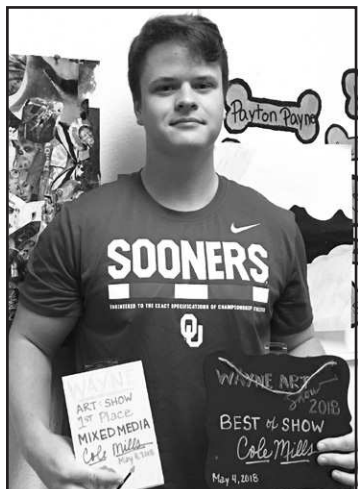
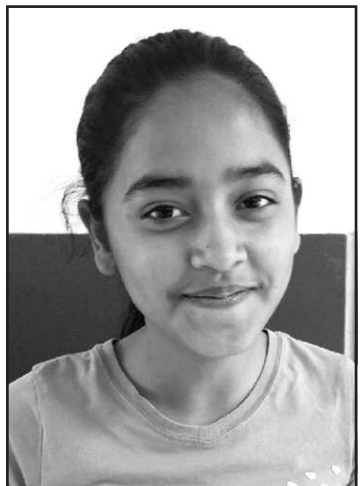

Horse owners encouraged to vaccinate against West Nile Virus

Animal Industry Services of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFA) is encouraging horse owners to take precautions and vaccinate their animals to protect against the West Nile Virus (WNV) and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE).

In years past, Oklahoma averaged approximately 40 cases per year of positive diagnoses of mosquito-carried diseases in horses.

The bird population serves as the reservoir for the viruses, and mosquitoes then transmit the virus to horses and humans. Mosquitoes most likely to transmit WNV and EEE lay their eggs in small pools of standing water.

Once the adult mosquitoes hatch, they can become infected with both WNV and EEE after feeding on an infected host, such as a bird carrying the virus. Within 10 to 14 days, the mosquito can transmit the virus to both humans and horses.

"Signs of West Nile Virus

include weakness, fever, incoordination, seizures, blindness and difficulty getting up," said Assistant State Veterinarian Michael Herrin, D.V.M. "There are several vaccines available, and we are encouraging horse owners to visit their veterinarians and determine the vaccination protocol that will best fit their operations."

Oklahomans can reduce the risk of both EEE and WNV by eliminating standing water which serves as a breeding area for mosquitos. Horse owners are encouraged to not let water stagnate in birdbaths or water tanks, and keep unused equipment that can collect water, such as a wheelbarrow, turned over when not in use.

Water troughs should be emptied and flushed twice a week. When possible, owners should reduce horses' outdoor exposure at dawn and dusk, the times of day when mosquitos carrying the viruses are most active.

In addition, ODAFA rec-

ommends vaccinating horses against Tetanus, Equine Herpes Virus, Equine Influenza, and Rabies.

Tetanus causes progressive paralysis and often death and is transmitted from spores in the ground via lacerations and puncture wounds.

Equine Herpes Virus may cause respiratory symptoms and abortions, but the worst manifestation is a neurological form that can mimic West Nile Virus. Symptoms of EHV are fever, nasal discharge, incoordination, hind limb weakness, urine dribbling, and a flaccid tail.

Equine Influenza may cause serious upper respiratory tract infection in horses. Fever, nasal discharge and coughing are the primary signs and can cause the performance of a horse to be hindered for weeks to months.

Rabies is a viral disease of warm blooded animals. The main carriers of it in Oklahoma are skunks. They transmit the disease to horses via bites.

We see a number of horses each year with Rabies, and they never recover from that.

We also see several humans who have to take the vaccinations because of exposure to a rabid horse.

Equine vaccines are available as individual vaccines or in combination. Horse owners should always work with their veterinarian to determine the best product to use for their horses depending on the way the horse is used and housed.

A common combination vaccine provides protection against West Nile, Eastern and Western Equine Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, Influenza, and two strains of EHV. Rabies is typically an individual vaccine.

ODAFA recommends horse owners and event managers remain at a heightened level of awareness, implement biosecurity practices, consult with a veterinarian on a vaccination schedule, and report suspicious illness or neurologic disease.

The street maintenance policies of the Town of Goldsby applicable to public streets throughout the Town for which the Town has accepted street maintenance responsibility shall be applicable to those public streets, if any, within the annexed territory that have been constructed or improved to meet or exceed the standards and specifications for such streets set forth in the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Goldsby. Streets (other than open section line roads) within the annexed territory that are not constructed or improved to meet or exceed the applicable standards and specifications for streets set forth in the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Goldsby are not accepted by the Town of Goldsby as public streets and the same shall not be maintained or improved by the Town of Goldsby.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, its invalidity shall not affect any other provisions of this ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid provision, and for this purpose the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

SECTION 4. EMERGENCY. It being necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, peace and welfare of the citizens and residents of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, that this Ordinance shall become effective immediately, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, by reason whereof, this Ordinance shall take full force and effect immediately upon its adoption, as provided by law.

Rules for absentees

Voters urged to apply now

McClain County voters who want absentee ballots for the June 26 primary election mailed to them should apply now, county election board secretary Karen Haley said.

Although the county election board can accept applications for absentee ballots until 5 p.m. June 20, Haley urged voters who want to vote by absentee ballot to apply early.

Absentee ballot application forms are available at the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Forms may also be downloaded and printed from www.elections.ok.gov.

"At least two mail transactions must be made," Haley said. "The county election board must mail the ballots to the voter and the voter must return the voted ballots by mail."

Those ballots must be in the hands of the election board by 7 p.m. on election day in order to be counted.

Any registered voter may vote by absentee ballot in any election in which the individual is eligible to vote.

However, a voter must be registered and reside at an address within the geographical boundaries of a school district or municipality to vote in those elections.

"While anyone can vote absentee without giving a reason, the law still provides several excuses and it is to the advantage of some voters to

use them," Haley said.

By stating one of the following reasons on their applications, voters can activate some special conditions that make it easier for them to use absentee ballots:

- Voters who are physically handicapped or or care for physically handicapped persons who cannot be left unattended. These individuals may apply only by mail, fax, email, online or via an agent who is at least 16 years of age and who is not employed by or related within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity to any person whose name appears on the ballot.

- Voters who are confined to nursing homes within the county. An absentee voting board goes to nursing homes a few days before the election and sets up a small polling place for those voters. They may apply only by mail, fax, online or email or by an agent meeting the same criteria above.

- Military personnel, county residents residing overseas and their spouses and dependents are eligible to receive absentee ballots. These voters may apply only by mail, fax or email. Military members should contact their unit's voting service officer for forms and information. Other Oklahoma residents living overseas can receive the same materials from any U.S. military installation, embassy, consulate or online at <http://www.fvap.gov/oklahoma>.

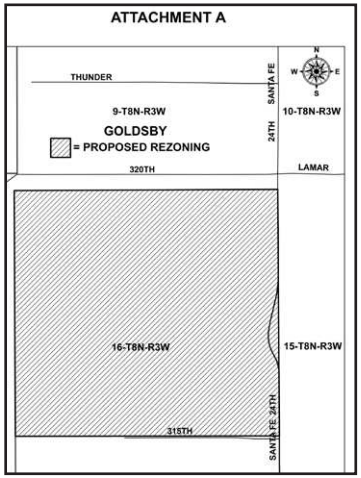
