

# Pine Needle basket make-andtake class August 25

The Chickasaw Nation will host a pine needle basketry class from 1-3 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 25, at the Chickasaw Council House Museum, 209 N. Fisher Street, in Tishom-

The class is open to the public at no charge.

Space is limited so registration is necessary. Supplies will be provided and beginners are welcome.

Pine needle baskets were traditionally used to gather, store and serve food or hold and keep personal objects. Aged, brown needles for

crafting were often salvaged from the ground and made into baskets using the coil and stitch method.

Coiling is one technique of basketry used by Native Americans across North America.

A fibrous stitching material is pulled through the pine needles to help create and maintain the shape of the basket.

# 90 percent say paper best source

NNA survey of more than 1,000 rely on local newspaper

Ninety percent of the more than 1,000 people responding to the National Newspaper Association's 2018 readership survey said that their community newspaper informs them. And 73 percent said that their hometown paper provides valuable local shopping and advertising information.

The poll was conducted for NNA by Susquehanna Polling and Research, which is based in Harrisburg, PA.

In addition, 64 percent of survey respondents said they read a community newspaper either in print or online, which is a small decline from last year's survey. When it comes to advertising, readers are most likely to trust and respond to ads they see in their community newspaper.

According to the survey, community newspapers rate as the most popular advertising medium when it comes to making purchasing and shopping decisions at local merchants, cited by 24 percent of respondents. Other less popular ad platforms include direct mailings, 18 percent, social media platforms; 16 percent, and in-store promotions; 13 percent. Readers of community newspapers tend to rely on newspapers even

more, cited by 34 percent—far and above the most popular answer given.

NNA has continually fought to keep public notices in newspapers, as one way to keep an eye on what the government is doing with taxpayers' money.

According to the survey, respondents rated the importance of access to public notices a mean score of 5.72 on a 7-point scale, including a combined 80 percent who give a high score of five, six or seven. Even non-readers of community newspapers agree that access to public notices is important, with a mean score

As most publishers know, the people who read newspapers are the ones who are most likely to vote. When it comes to the coming mid-term elections, 84 percent of community newspaper readers are very likely to vote this year, compared with only 61 percent of non-readers. Plus, 77 percent of community newspaper readers say they voted in the last election in their local community, compared with only 61 percent of non-readers. This shows that readers of community newspapers tend to be more politically active than non-

In fact, according to the

survey, 86 percent of the respondents said they were either very likely or somewhat likely to vote in the next

For those newspapers working to get more political advertising in the coming elections, the survey notes that community newspapers are cited by respondents as not only the most common go-to source to learn about political candidates running in local elections at 65 percent very or somewhat often, but also the most trusted with a 4.38 mean score on a 7-point scale. In comparison, other less-popular sources of information to learn about local candidates include national network TV news, cited by 57 percent, cable TV news programs; 47 percent, talk radio; 36 percent; and social media platforms, 33 percent.

Additionally, 81 percent of community newspaper readers rely on local newspapers to learn about local candidates, far more than any other source. On the issue of trust, even non-readers of community newspapers trust community newspapers more than other sources, rating their overall trustworthiness a 3.71

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



for \$295.9 billion for troop training, vigorous maintenance programs and base operations.

These funds are crucial to the day-to-day operations at places like Tinker Air Force Base in my district, which oversees key logistics and maintenance for Air Force aircraft and machinery.

Also key to my district are programs like the Paladin PIM weapons system at Fort Sill Army Post, which received \$150 million in funding. Additionally, the bill includes \$92.4 billion for research and development, which supports the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter, space security programs and

And to further the scope of the military, the bill allows for \$145.7 billion for procurement to provide weapons, platforms and resources including 12 Navy ships, 93 F-35 aircraft, 24 Super Hornets, 58 Black Hawk helicopters and 66 Apaches. Lastly, the bill will fulfill the request for a 16,400 end-strength increase.

One of the fundamental parts of building a robust military is taking care of the servicemembers themselves. This year's defense appropriations bill delivers on that promise. It provides for the authorized 2.6 percent pay raise for our mission and success.

# **Chapter Eight:**

In the 1920s, the Saint Louis Zoo built some of the nation's first naturalistic bear habitats by creating rocky grottos from molds of nearby Missouri bluffs. Other zoos followed this example, inspiring a new generation of zoo habitats.

Nearly a century later, these original bear grottos needed upgrades. The Saint Louis Zoo built a \$16 million polar bear habitat with two freshwater pools, two filled with saltwater, a coast-like terrain, a sandy beach and an area of grass. Add a climate-controlled building with polar bear bedrooms and the Zoo's Polar Bear Point became a beautiful, 21st century upgrade, a new model for bear care. All it needed was a polar bear.

Kali, a wild-born, Alaskan polar bear, was the responsibility of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). Its officials decided the Saint Louis Zoo's newly designed polar bear habitat was the perfect permanent home for the young bear.

Kali had been shy and cautious when he first arrived in Buffalo from the many changes in this life. But playing with Luna had helped Kali grow to become a confident, strong bear, ready for any challenge. Caitlyn would miss the boisterous adolescent bear, but also knew he had a bright future ahead of him.

So, how does an 850-pound polar bear travel from New York to Missouri? The same way any special delivery might: via FedEx.

Caitlyn trained Kali in the weeks before his departure, to calmly walk into a huge aluminum crate, a move he performed on his departure day. Kali's crate was loaded into a truck, which drove him to Rochester, New York, where his crate was transferred to a plane to Memphis, Tennessee. Kali had already been on quite a few flights, but flying a tiny cub is quite different from flying a large, sub-adult polar bear! FedEx donated their expertise and services for Kali's trip. A veterinarian and zoo officials flew with Kali, caring for him to keep him calm and comfortable.

In Memphis, Kali was loaded onto another truck. During the 4-hour drive to St. Louis, he was monitored by advanced technology, with frequent checks by a veterinarian, curator and zookeepers. The temperature was kept at a polar-bear-friendly 55 degrees and frequent stops were made to check on his comfort.

It was a lovely May evening when his truck pulled up to the Saint Louis Zoo. After a long journey, Kali finally made it to his



Speed tops 100 mph on Green Avenue

A Duncan man shouldn't have tried to elude Purcell police when an officer tried to make a traffic stop in the early hours of August 1.

Now Jose M. Tapia Jr., 39, is facing multiple charges in McClain County District Court.

Prosecutors charged Tapia with trafficking in illegal drugs, driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of drugs,

former felony convictions. A warrant for Tapia's arrest

is outstanding.

According to an affidavit, an officer attempted to make the traffic stop around 2:25 a.m. in the 400 block of South Green Avenue after spotting an expired tag on Tapia's motorcycle.

Instead of pulling over, Tapia allegedly began making erratic lane chances, accelerating to speeds topping 100 mph.

He continued south on Green Avenue, but lost control while attempting to make the curve onto Weedn Boulevard.

The motorcycle slid on its side before stopping in the drainage ditch on the southwest corner of the intersection.

As police approached him, Tapia reportedly began yelling about his dog which was tucked


inside his shirt. The dog freed itself and ran

However, that employee will be subject to action for using or possessing marijuana on school property during the school day.

The policy references Oklahoma statute Title 63, Section 424 which addresses the retail, growing, processing and transportation of medical marijuana, but makes no mention of schools or school employees.

Students with a medical condition requiring the use of medical marijuana will be allowed to utilize the drug in accordance with state law.

The medical marijuana must be administered at school by a caregiver who holds a medical marijuana license that designates them to act on the student's behalf.

The policy forbids storing the medical marijuana on school property and also bans smoking the medical marijuana.

School employees are specifically barred from serving as the designated caregiver unless they are the student's parent or legal guardian.

Both the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University have banned the possession or use of medical marijuana on their campuses, citing a conflict with federal law which could jeopardize their federal funding.

While Purcell Public Schools does receive federal dollars, Midkiff doesn't believe there's danger of losing that money by allowing students to use medical marijuana while at school.

He also discounted any discrimination against school employees who are forbidden to use medical marijuana during school hours.

# The Hospital is a Blessing for Local Residents

Upon returning from a week-long bike ride across Iowa, I was hospitalized with severe dehydration and a prostate infection. First I was seen by a PA in the urgent care center in Purcell. After her examination and the lab analysis of blood and urine – done right here in Purcell – I was sent immediately to the Emergency Room and was attended to by Dr. Gray and then by Dr. Dye. I was admitted to a hospital room in PMH and underwent treatment for about 48 hours. St. Isidore was a farmer. He plowed the fields for a rich landowner outside of Madrid, in Spain. Isidore married a young woman who was also very devout. Her name was Maria de la Cabeza, and she also was a saint. They had one son who died as a child.

Isidore would attend Mass early in the morning. Then he would pray to God as he walked behind the plow in the hot sun.

would stop in the fields and pray to Holy Mary. He and his wife would share their food with the poor ones who had less to eat. Isidore was a saint, and he is the patron saint of farmers. St. Rose was born in Lima,

Peru. Her name was Rose, just like the flower. She took St. Catherine of Siena as her model saint. Rose was very beautiful, and her parents wanted her to get married. But she chose instead to give her life completely to God. When her parents fell into

financial trouble, Rose worked very hard to help them. She worked in the garden during the day. And at night she sewed clothes to sell in order to help her parents. The big city of Lima had very few hospitals and clinics. So, during the last few years of her life, Rose used one room in her house to care for sick children and the elderly. All this time, she was devoted completely to Jesus our Savior. She died when she was only 31 years old.

St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross was born as a Jew. She was not a Christian. When she was a teenager, she lost her faith and stopped going to synagogue with her parents. But she was very intelligent and loved to read and to learn new things.

She read the autobiography of St. Teresa of Avila, and was so inspired that she desired to become a Catholic. And so she was baptized when she was 30 years old. Just like St. Teresa, she became a Carmelite nun.

Since she was so smart, she went to college and earned a doctorate in philosophy. But this was the time of the Nazis takeover in Germany. Because she had once been a Jew, Teresa and her sister were arrested and sent to a concentration camp. There they both died in a gas chamber.

Each of these saints is very different from each other. Each is unique. But they shared one thing in common. They were all nourished in their faith by receiving Jesus as the Bread of Life. Jesus said "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51).

When we choose to follow God, we will be saints in our own unique way. Let us strive to become saints, just like St. Isidore, and St. Rose of Lima, and St. Teresa Benedicta. Then we too will have the sweet smell of holiness, the sweet fragrance of God's love.

Our sermon lesson this past Sunday was about Balaam and the Talking Donkey (Numbers 22:22-35). In this story, we learn about Balaam, one with a reputation as a pagan sorcerer. A sorcerer attempts to manipulate the pagan gods to do his will. Balak, the king of Moab, sends emissaries to Balaam to hire him to curse Israel, making them weak so that Moab can defeat them.

Balaam knew he probably shouldn't get involved dealings against Jehovah, and yet in this writing he consults their God. God tells Balaam to not curse Israel because they are blessed by God. Balaam tells the Moabites this and refuses to go with them, but they finally wear him down by offering him more and more riches as a reward.

God finally tells Balaam, "If these men have come to summon you, go with them. But you must do only what I tell you to do." Balaam saddles his donkey and leaves with his two servants and the Moabites.

But God becomes angry with Balaam because he did go with the men (and probably for accepting the reward). So while he is on the journey, God sends an angel as an adversary. The donkey sees this messenger with his sword drawn in the middle of the road and turns to go into the field off the road. Balaam beats the donkey to get him back on the road.

stone wall on one side. The donkey continues to see the angel with the sword in front of them and squeezes Balaam's foot up against the wall to make him stop. Balaam beats him again.

The angel is still in front of Balaam and his donkey, in a place that is too narrow to turn either right or left. The donkey lies down in the road with Balaam on his back. Balaam is very angry and beats the donkey with his rod. Then God allows the donkey to speak to Balaam: "What have I done to you that you've beaten me these three

Balaam says, "Because you've tormented me, and if I had a sword, I'd kill you right now." The donkey replies, "But I'm your donkey that you've ridden quite often in the past. Have I been in the habit of doing this to you." Balaam: "No."

Then God allows Balaam to see the messenger in front of him, standing in the road with his sword drawn. Balaam bows low to the angel, honoring him as God's emissary. The angel asks, "Why have you beaten your donkey these three times? I was sent by God as an adversary to you, to keep you from continuing on the road when God told you not to go. Your donkey saw me and turned away three times. If it hadn't done so, I would have killed you and let the donkey live."

Balaam says to the messenger, "I've sinned, because I didn't know you were standing against me in the road. Now, if you think it's wrong, I'll go back." God's messenger tells Balaam, "Go with these men to The narrow path continues Moab, but don't say anything.

So Balaam went on with Balak's

When he reaches King Balak, he can only speak the words God puts in his mouth. Instead of cursing the Israelites, Balaam blesses them.

We don't often think about a pagan listening to God, but we see Balaam does so here and in some of the passages that follow this reading. In other places in the book of Numbers and in the rest of the Bible, we see that Balaam doesn't do this. He may have been gifted as a predictor of the future, but that doesn't change his corruption of his followers through idolatry and immorality.

What's the message in all this? Sometimes the truth is right in front of us. The messenger of God was with Balaam and his donkey all along, but only the donkey could see him. When Balaam saw the angel, he saw the reality of God's greatness. But Balaam chooses to be the pagan seer that he had always been, giving up following the one True God in all things.

Please pray for our children, their teachers, the bus drivers, and all the schools' support staff as they begin the new school year. Keep our fellow churches and their members safe. Help us and all your churches to be beacons of God's love to all our neighbors. May all people that may not have a church family find a house of God in which they can feel comfortable.

# Indian Health Service awards cite Chickasaw artist's abstractionism

**By Gene Lehmann Chickasaw Nation Media** Relations

Larry Carter's niche in the Native American art scene is expanding and he hopes to influthe future.

Framed prints of paintings by Carter, a Chickasaw citizen, were presented to Indian Health Service (IHS) professionals at an awards ceremony hosted at Riverwind Casino near Norman.

His art will be displayed at many IHS facilities throughout IndianCountry, a fact that pleases Carter immensely.

"I am learning and pushing myself to improve and engage viewers," the Noble resident said. He is experimenting. He is taking a weekly three-house course where a model poses for artists, and he has linked up with Leslie Pate, owner of Tribes 131, a Native-exclusive art gallery in Norman. He is hoping to expand his art exhibits in more contemporary settings as well.

Carter's unique, brilliantly colored, textured abstract art with hidden images no two individuals discern completely alike – is evolving.

subdued images to others and has incorporated images instantly recognized by art lovers.

The background in Carter's recent "Black Hills Gold" remains true to his abstractionist lilt, yet yields to realism with two tepee lodges on the sundrenched, windy South Dakota plains, where Oglala and Lakota Sioux, Chevenne, and Arikara have dwelled for centuries.

"Chickasaw Hunter" harkens back to Carter's signature work. An archer, blended within hundreds of fantastic colors, prepares to pierce his quarry in a setting that will differ in the mind's eye of each individual art admirer.

At 53, Carter has been painting a number of years, but only dedicated himself to abstract genres approximately four years ago. Before 2014, his paintings reflected what he believed was "accepted" art; landscapes or deer cautiously leaving the woodlands to graze in a grassy meadow.

Now, his work is evolving into with realism.

"I never know where a painting is going to go," he said with a wide smile. "I have a vision of what the painting will be but it can turn out to be something completely out of left field before it is finished," he said.

Another joyous element of his art is when art patrons discover did not know was there.

Tribes 131 accepted his work in January for exhibit. Two art shows have followed. Leslie Pate recognized Carter's talent and was lured by the hidden images - or perceived images - in his

With the critical eye of T.J and Pate's support in the gallery, Larry Carter paintings are selling at a pace "greater than ever before," he said. Pate is advancing his work to art patrons and to organizations, such as the IHS awards ceremony, to promote his talent, vision and efforts. In fact, several of his accepted works for IHS were purchased by attendees at the awards ceremony.

"Leslie is responsible for prints of my paintings being awarded to Indian health professionals," he said. "I am thrilled and may have the opportunity to do it again next year."

"I guess since the first painting Icompleted won an award, I have wanted to get my name out there among Native artists ... well, all artists really," he explained. I've learned a lot following the battle. many of his paintings; more from other artists just by looking at their finished paintings and by visiting with them when the opportunity arises," he said.

When Pate agreed to represent him and exhibit his art in her gallery, Carter was "short" on exhibit-quality material. "Ithink I completed 30 paintings in two months to flesh out my gallery presence," he said. "Many of the works I did during that time are being given as awards. One (painting) was purchased by the Chickasaw Nation recently," he added. The painting of an eagle in full flight was titled "Toward the Rising Sun." A print of it was given to IHS award-winners.

He also credits a feature story in the Chickasaw Times with fostering his brand among Chickasaw art lovers. Carter exhibited paintings in the Chickasaw Nation Welcome Center off Interstate 35 for several months in 2016. "It went very well and I was pleased my art was introduced to thousands of people," Carter said.

A painting titled "Native a mixture of abstraction coupled American" – an abstract of a Native with an American flag draped across his upper torso - intuitively spoke to all who viewed it. So powerful was the message, Carter put it on T-shirts. The shirt was a best-seller at art shows, the original painting was purchased at the IHS awards ceremony.

"War Bonnet" and "Signing an "image" in his paintings he of the Treaty" are emotionally stirring abstracts as well.

But Carter's exploration of himself, his art, his tribe and his Chickasaw heritage have taken him to an unusual place – the Great Plains.

"The historical experience of Native Americans and Europeans has a common thread. It may differ from tribe to tribe but the consequential outcome is the same," the artist said.

Carter's foreboding abstract "Cimarron Trial" brings the viewer to a particularly harsh branch of the Santa Fe Trail. The trail began in Independence, Missouri and ended in Santa Fe, N.M., some 770 miles total.

After wagon trains and trekkers passed the Arkansas River (near present-day Fort Dodge, Kansas), little water lay ahead. That explains the beast of burden skull that dominates Carter's painting. A traveler, hat low on his brow, illustrates hardships of the trek.

A completed abstract titled "When Ponies Ruled the Plains" pays homage to the importance of horses to American Plains Indians. Two tepees and three steeds are illustrated in the painting. It allows the viewer to imagine any story.

Chickasaw historian Towana Spivey said horses were largely unavailable to Native Americans until the 1680 Pueblo Revolt.

Horses became common among the southwestern tribes

Two paintings, "Red Dirt Riders" and "Painted Horse" honor the importance of the animal in Indian culture. In the first, a group of Natives ride along a ridge somewhere in the Oklahoma flatlands. In the other, the respect Natives had for horses – painting them before important events – is central to Carter's theme. Natives did not trade horses. They were far too valuable to tribes for hunting and in war and peace.

Carter spent a few years working in Montana, where he met his wife. The American Indian presence in Montana is large and those years influenced Carter.

"I am a proud Chickasaw artist," he said. "The culture and lifestyle of all tribes interest me. I think the Native American history is American history. That  $opens\,the\,door\,to\,lots\,of\,paintings$ and I am anxious to explore them all," he said.

A self-taught painter, Carter said his emphasis on abstract art came to be through a realization his realism works could not compete with artists who do it for a living. "I am never going to be the most talented artist in realism, but I can be the most interesting and the talented with abstracts. I want my paintings to reach out and grab a viewer. There isn't a better feeling than when someone finds something in my painting that I didn't see. My paintings are for you to decide what is included in the work," he added.
