## PMH acquires new endoscopy system

Purcell Municipal Hospital's purchase of a new video endoscopy system arrived just in time for March's observance of National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.

The Olympus EVIS EXERA III system uses a video processor, light source, endoscope and monitor to help physicians detect gastrointestinal diseases like colorectal cancer at an earlier state when treatments are most successful.

PMH Chief Executive Officer Kem Scully said now is the perfect opportunity to talk with your doctor and ask yourself – along with family and friends – if it is time for colorectal cancer screening.

The disease is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States. With 140,000 Americans di-

# 3 stars for PMH

## Patient satisfaction surveys heavily weighted

Patient satisfaction surveys played a big role when the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services were handing out star ratings for the nation's hospitals.

And that single fact may be the main reason that Purcell Municipal Hospital's rating dropped from four to three stars.

While CMS maintains its star ratings enjoy "a solid reputation with the public,"

many hospital administrators disagree, citing an unlevel playing field.

"CMS updated the methodology for the star rating from the previous versions," said Kem Scully, chief executive officer at PMH. "A portion of the rating comes from patient satisfaction survey results. For Purcell, we only had a 29 percent response rate (111 patients) after hospitalization."

"This is a very low num-

ber of respondents," she said.

Comparing PMH with two other 3-star hospitals – Norman Regional and St. Anthony in downtown Oklahoma City – revealed the following results from those patient surveys:

Seventy-nine percent of PMH respondents reported nurses always communicated well. That was slightly

# Moving ahead

## New hospital plans progress

At a special joint meeting of the Purcell city council and public works authority on Wednesday (March 20), the city was expected to approve a financing plan for the new hospital.

An agenda item called for action on a measure for the PWA to incur debt by issuing a revenue note

based on the city's utility system.

At a special meeting February 14, the Purcell Municipal Hospital board reported to the city that hiring Miller/Nap for a "turn-key" job constructing the new hospital and then leasing it to the city would cost the city \$31.4 million.

"And in the end we would not own the hospital," PMH board chairman David Shirley told that

meeting.

At the end of the lease, the city's cost to purchase the hospital from Miller/Nef would be \$5 million.

Financing the new hospital through Municipal Financial Services for a 21-year term would cost the city \$18.9 million.

Wednesday's meeting also included an executive session on the purchase or acquisition of land on which to build the new hospital.

# Deadline for property taxes March 31

Property owners in McClain County have until March 31 to finish paying their 2018 property taxes.

McClain County Treasurer Teresa Jones said Tuesday her office has received approximately 80 percent

of the taxes due.

For owners who took advantage of an option to split the payment by paying half by December 31, the second half is due March 31.

If no payment was made before the December deadline, the tax bill

has been accruing interest at the rate of 1-1/2 percent per month since January 15.

Payment may be made in person at the treasurer's office in the McClain County Courthouse or mailed to McClain County Treasurer, 121

N. 2nd Ave., Room 318, Purcell, Okla., 73080.

Payments may also be made online by going to [www.oktaxrolls.com](http://www.oktaxrolls.com) and clicking on McClain County.

If paying online, an additional

2.95 percent processing fee (minimum \$1.95) will be added to the transaction.

## Tornado season is right around the corner

It might be difficult for some Oklahomans to think about tornado season while dealing with below-freezing temperatures. However, with a weather warm up on the horizon, now is a great time to get prepared for turbulent spring weather.

Whether you have lived in Oklahoma your entire life, or are new to the area, one thing is for certain--storm season must be taken seriously.

We all know the devastation of a tornado outbreak in Oklahoma. That's why it's so important to be prepared ahead of time.

The weather in our state can change quickly, so start thinking now about what you need to do to be safe.

If you have a storm shelter at your home, make sure it is cleaned out and ready to go before storm season. When the sirens are blaring is not the time to discover standing water, hordes of spiders or the space

has been used for storage and there is no room for people.

If you discover water in your shelter, inspect it and determine how the water is getting in. Repair any cracks to help keep out moisture. If the water is coming in through the door, homeowners will need to divert rainwater away from the entrance.

Spiders and other creepy crawlies also get in through small cracks. Sealing those will help eliminate them.

Once the shelter is cleaned up and ready to be inhabited, prepare an emergency kit of essentials in the event you have to shelter in place for a while, or if your home is significantly damaged and no longer inhabitable, requiring you to live elsewhere for some time.

Including things such as non-perishable foods, can opener, flashlights, extra batteries, a battery operated radio and a first aid kit.

Bottled water is essential, too. A good rule of thumb is about one gallon per person,

per day.

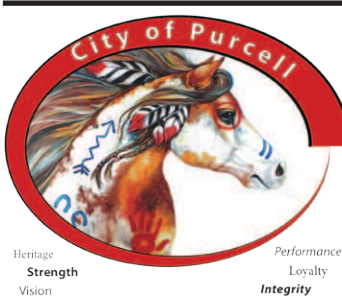
Also, make sure everyone is wearing shoes when you take cover in the shelter. Your feet will need to be protected in the event of storm damage when you emerge from the shelter.

Think about the daily needs, as well as the special needs your family may have. Families with babies and small children should pack diapers, formula and other child-related essentials.

Because young children can become frightened during a storm, a special stuffed toy or blanket should be brought into the shelter.

Older adults will have their own special needs that must be taken into consideration. Make sure you have medications ready to take into the shelter.

Last but not least, be sure your shelter is registered with the city or county emergency management in case your shelter is covered with debris and you are unable to get out by yourself.



## NEWS from the City of Purcell

### Site Address - Section R319

R319. 1 Address Numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters.

Numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inches (102 mm) high with a minimum stroke width of 1/2 inch (12.7 mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means shall be used to identify the structure.

Please sign up to secure your child's place in Pre-K. Parents are required to come for school enrollment in August to finalize placement in Pre-K.

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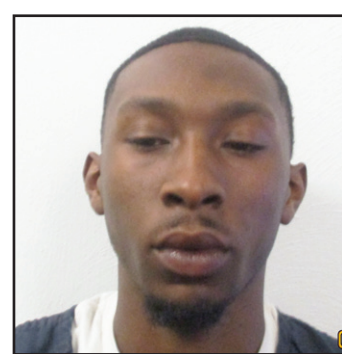
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## Robbery investigation Sheriff and OSBI looking into situation

The McClain County Sheriff's Department, along with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, is investigating an armed robbery in Goldsby March 11.

According to an affidavit filed by Detective David Tompkins, Karen Murillo needed a ride to the Loves Convenience Store in Goldsby about 4:10 a.m. to acquire a pack of cigarettes.

She used social media to contact someone to give her a ride from her home on Adkins Hill Road.

According to the affidavit, a black SUV with two African

American males in it pulled up. She got in and pulled out her wallet to give them \$10 for gas.

Murillo reported the car suddenly pulled over and the passenger in the vehicle pulled out a black semi-automatic pistol.

The gun was pointed at Murillo and she was ordered to give them her wallet. After a scuffle she was struck at some point with the barrel of the weapon.

She lost her wallet and her glasses in the struggle after she was grabbed and pulled out of the vehicle.

That afternoon Det. Tompkins met with Murillo when he learned one of the men in the vehicle was Marlon Lamont thanks to Facebook information.

OSBI Special Agent David Gatlin learned the full name of the person to be Marlon Lamont Chandler, Jr. DOB 10/1999.

Chandler faces a charge of robbery or attempted robbery with a dangerous weapon or imitation firearm.

**Losses mount for area towns**

The March disbursement of sales tax revenue was disappointing.

The Oklahoma Tax Commission returned \$139,701,209 to municipalities. That was

\$320,213 less than municipalities received a year ago.

Use taxes returned to cities and towns totaled \$18,049,627.

The state's counties shared in a \$25,404,627 sales tax dis-

bursement and a \$3,383,313 use tax disbursement.

The returns were based on taxes on sales from January 16 to 31 and estimated sales from February 1 to 15.

The great taste of buffalo wings in the form of lasagna.

**Buffalo Chicken Lasagna**

- 3 chicken breasts, boneless, cooked and chopped very fine
- 1 cup Frank's Red Hot Buffalo Sauce
- 3-1/2 cups pasta sauce
- Uncooked lasagna noodles
- Tub Ricotta Cheese
- 1 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 cup mozzarella cheese, shredded
- 1/4 cup water

In a bowl combine the chicken, buffalo sauce and pasta sauce – this will be called the sauce from here on.

Spray your slow cooker with non-stick spray. Ladle a large spoonful of your sauce to cover the bottom of the crock pot.

Add a layer of noodles – you will need to break them up.

Spread a layer of ricotta cheese across the noodles. Top with cheese. Repeat the layers until you run out of ingredients.

On the final layer top with sauce and cheese. Pour 1/4 cup of water over your lasagna.

Cook on low for 4-5 hours or on high for 2.5-3 hours.

ability Insurance Trust Fund unable to pay out full benefits as early as 2025.

Clearly, to make real progress toward tackling our burden of debt, tough decisions and careful solutions are required. But the solutions must include reforms to save and sustain the mandatory programs serving many vulnerable Americans.

I believe a good place to start would be passage of legislation I introduced again this Congress, the Bipartisan Social Security Commission Act. The bill calls for a bipartisan and bicameral commission tasked with recommending reforms to ensure Social Security is

solvent for at least 75 years.

Congress would then be required to vote up or down on the commission's recommendations within 60 legislative days. The legislation is modeled after the successful approach taken by former House Speaker Tip O'Neill and supported by President Ronald Reagan in 1983, when Social Security was also on the brink of bankruptcy.

At that time, bipartisan legislation was approved to stabilize and improve the fiscal foundation of Social Security. And the resulting legislation not only received widespread public support, it extended the life of Social Security.

If history is any indication, I believe what worked before to save Social Security can work again—if both parties commit to pursuing reforms in a thoughtful, fair and bipartisan manner.

Even though the president's budget showed a way to get to balance, I wish his proposal had more seriously addressed the real driver of the nation's rapidly rising debt.

Until congressional leaders and the president work together on mandatory reforms, the nation's long-term fiscal house will remain in a state of disorder, threatening future prosperity for our children and grandchildren.

## Endoscopy:

agnosed with colorectal cancer annually, it is also the third most common cancer, affecting both men and women.

The good news, however, is colorectal cancer can be prevented and new studies confirm screening is key to saving lives.

Doctors at PMH emphasize regular screening is a gateway to preventing this disease.

And the gold standard for screening is the colonoscopy, a test in which the physician places a thin, flexible scope into the rectum and guides it through the colon.

A tiny camera transmits images of the colon's interior to a screen, allowing the doctor to look for any changes that may warrant further investigation.

"By finding precancerous polyps and removing them, we can actually prevent ma-

gnancies from developing," doctors say.

In fact, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, recommended screenings such as colonoscopies can prevent at least 60 percent of the disease's 50,000 deaths annually.

Some people are put off by the idea of a colonoscopy and the preparation needed. The colon must be cleaned out prior to the test by means of a laxative.

"But even if this process is slightly unpleasant, the procedure itself is painless and it's a very small price to pay for potentially saving one's life," doctors say.

In its earliest stages, colon cancer may exhibit no symptoms. Still there are some signs that could serve as early warnings. These include persistent

constipation or diarrhea, rectal bleeding, abdominal discomfort or bloating, loss of appetite and weight loss.

Doctors recommend anyone experiencing any of these symptoms contact their primary care doctor for an exam.

While the symptoms could be linked to other causes, they could also be early warning signs of cancer.

In short, making a wrong assumption isn't worth the risk, Scully said.

Current American Cancer Society guidelines call for a colonoscopy every 10 years starting at age 50 for men and women with average risk.

If you are overdue for a screening, National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month is a good time to schedule one by calling PMH at 527-2242.

more than the 77 percent at both other hospitals.

The state average, however, was 81 percent and the national average was 80 percent.

There were 91 percent of Purcell patients who reported their doctors always communicated well.

At Norman and St. Anthony, there were 78 and 80 percent in agreement, respectively. State and national averages were 83 and 81 percent, respectively.

When asked if they always received help as soon as they wanted, 73 percent at PMH agreed — right between the state's 74 percent and national's 70 percent.

Norman and St. Anthony had 61 and 66 percent, respectively.

Purcell was on track with the national average — 66 percent — of patients who said staff always explained the medications before the patients took them.

The state average was 68

percent. Norman and St. Anthony had 63 and 62 percent, respectively.

Sixty-nine percent of Purcell respondents indicated their rooms and bathrooms were always clean. Other percentages were Norman, 68; St. Anthony, 71; state average, 78 percent, and national average, 75 percent.

Asked if the area around their rooms was always quiet at night drew a 55 percent response from PMH, 63 percent from Norman, 62 percent from St. Anthony (also national average), and 68 percent state average.

The percentage of patients who strongly agreed they understood post-discharge care instructions was 49 percent in Purcell, 51 percent in Norman, 50 percent at St. Anthony, 55 percent statewide and 53 percent nationally.

Eighty-one percent of Purcell patients reported they were given instructions what to do at home during recovery.

That query brought an 88 percent response in Norman, 85 percent for St. Anthony, and 87 percent for both state and national averages.

The percent of respondents who rated their hospital stay 9 or 10 on a scale of 1 to 10 were Purcell, 69; Norman, 72; St.

Anthony, 75 (also state average), and national average, 73.

Those who would recommend the hospital to others were Purcell, 67 percent; Norman, 71 percent; St. Anthony, 75 percent; state average, 73 percent, and national average, 72 percent.

Norman Regional's figures were based 2,553 patient surveys or 23 percent. St. Anthony results were taken from 763 surveys or 19 percent.

The survey period covered the second quarter of 2017 to the second quarter of 2018.

Interestingly, Pauls Valley Hospital which closed in 2018 was given a 4-star rating.

Eighty-five hospitals in Oklahoma were rated with the state average of 3.2 stars.

Nine facilities received five stars — Ar buckle Memorial Hospital in Sulphur; Community Hospital, McBride Orthopedic Hospital, Oklahoma Heart Hospital and Oklahoma Heart Hospital South, all in Oklahoma City; Memorial Hospital in Stilwell; Oklahoma Surgical Hospital in Tulsa; St. John Hospital in Broken Arrow, and St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid.

Twenty-four hospitals received four stars, 28 scored three stars, 19 had two stars and five were given one star.

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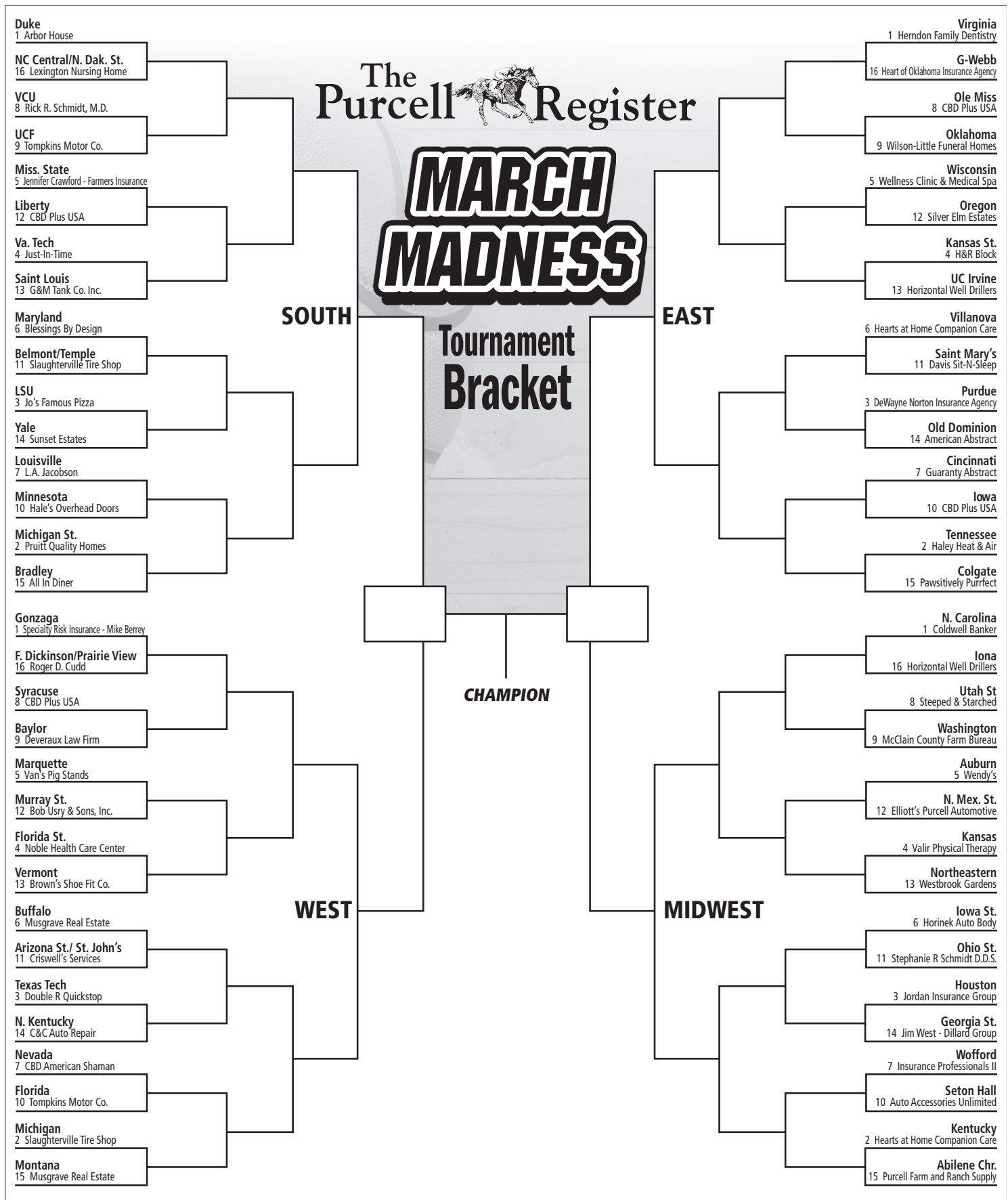

A young Preacher Miller decides to quit!

Today makes the third "front porch" visit in a row that we have sat together rehearsing some of the scenes in Preacher Miller's life. I expect there are enough powerful lessons to learn from the Georgia preacher for us to come back to him for a lifetime.

But all the preaching, traveling, debating, and baptizing Preacher Miller does almost never happens. He comes very close to quitting as a young man. He reaches his getting-off point almost before he gets started, and he decides to unhook his belt, take off his armor, and lay down the sword. For good.

But we know that many great preachers in Bible days come close to doing the very same thing - great men such as Jonah, Peter, Elijah, and Jeremiah. The prophet Jeremiah may have come the closest to quitting.

The audience of his day consists of a bunch of idolatrous Israelites who long ago stop walking with the Lord and decide to go "backward and not forward." They reject both the healing balm the Lord offers for their diseased souls and the living water He sends to sustain them daily. As a result, their hearts become as dry as a scorched river-bed, and their spirituality is like a "broken cistern" (Jeremiah

2:13; 7:24; 8:22).

Each time Jeremiah, the "weeping prophet," sits down to write a plea to the people he loves, the scroll becomes dampened by his dripping tears. Finally, Jeremiah's tears run dry, and he digs his heels in the ground and makes this sad resolve: "I will not make mention of him, nor speak any more in his name" (Jeremiah 20:9). He has had enough. He is through.

Who can blame him? Who among us would not have said the same? For years he has preached his heart out and nobody listens! So, he washes his

Pedro Arrupe grew up in the northern, Basque region

of Spain. He began studying for medical school, and when he was 19 years old, served on a delegation that examined the reported cures at Lourdes. There he verified two cures as miracles, and he felt God tugging at him. So he decided to give his life to God as a Jesuit.

After some years of seminary education, his superior sent him to work as a missionary in Japan outside the large city of Hiroshima. One late summer day, he heard an enormous explosion and felt the concussion that

blew in the doors and windows of his residence. Walking up the hill they saw that the city of Hiroshima had turned into a lake of fire.

Arrupe decided to use his medical training to help whom-ever he could. He and his colleagues were able to give aid to over 150 victims. They had been burned, boiled, skinned, blinded and made deaf by the bomb.

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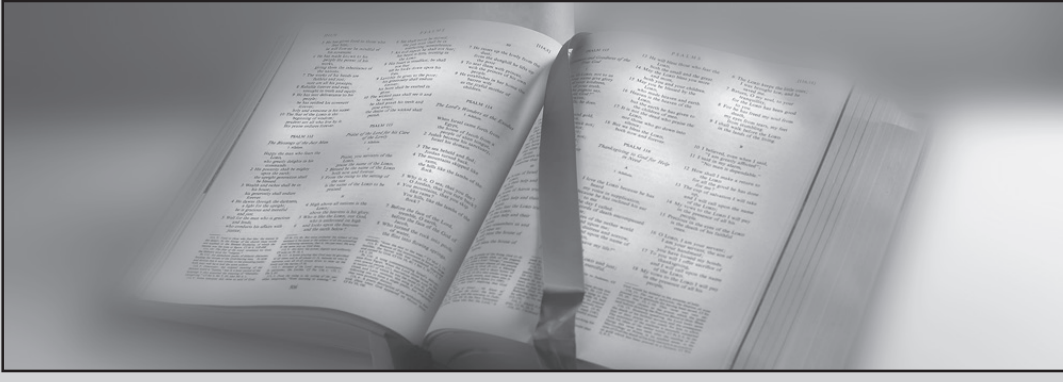
### Green Avenue Church of Christ

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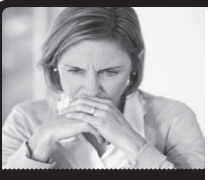
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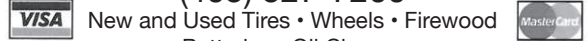
