PMH acquires new endoscopy system

Purcell Municipal Hospital's purchase of a new video endoscopy system arrived just in time for March's observance of National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.

The Olympus EVIS EX-ERA III system uses a video processor, light source, endoscope and monitor to help physicians detect gastrointestinal diseases like colorectal cancer at an earlier state when treatments are most successful.

PMH Chief Executive Officer Kem Scully said now is the perfect opportunity to talk with your doctor and ask yourself – along with family and friends - if it is time for colorectal cancer screening.

Patient satisfaction surveys heavily weighted

Patient satisfaction surveys played a big role when the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services were handing out star ratings for the nation's hospitals.

And that single fact may be the main reason that Purcell Municipal Hospital's rating dropped from four to three stars.

While CMS maintains its star ratings enjoy "a solid reputation with the public," many hospital administrators disagree, citing an unlevel playing field.

"CMS updated the methodology for the star rating from the previous versions," said Kem Scully, chief executive officer at PMH. "A portion of the rating comes from patient satisfaction survey results. For Purcell, we only had a 29 percent response rate (111 patients) after hospitalization.

"This is a very low num-

"And in the end we would not own the hospital," PMH board chairman David Shirley told that

At the end of the lease, the city's cost to purchase the hospital from Miller/ Nef would be \$5 million.

Financing the new hospital through Municipal Financial Services for a 21-year term would cost the city \$18.9 million.

Wednesday's meeting also included an executive session on the purchase or acquisition of land on which to build the new hospital.

R319. 1 Address Numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters.

Numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inches (102 mm) high with a minimum stroke width of ½ inch (12.7 mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means shall be used to identify the structure.

News from Capitol Hill

The ever growing debt challenge

Congressman Tom Cole

Last week. President Trump sent his annual budget request to Congress for consideration. While the president's proposal is not binding, it does importantly reveal the Administration's funding priorities for the coming fiscal year and represents a necessary step in the annual budget and appropriations process.

Considering that the president's recommendations are aspirational, some floated ideas were clearly more realistic and sensible than others. But in general, I think President Trump was on the right track to emphasize funding for the nation's defense and to further restrain some domestic spending.

While I was encouraged that the president's budget laid out a path toward balance, it is discouraging that, even with proposed discretionary spending cuts, it would take at least 15 years to get there.

serious the fiscal challenge is at hand for our nation, which I believe should cause more urgency in dealing with the real challenge of our nation's ever-growing debt.

For context, federal spending falls into a couple general categories: discretionary and mandatory. During the annual budget and appropriations process, lawmakers address only the discretionary side of the budget. Mandatory spending, on the

other hand, is essentially left as is unless lawmakers offer solutions for reform to various programs—like Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid, which automatically pay out benefits to those eligible and enrolled.

The real challenge is that the mandatory side of the budget, including interest on the national debt, is by far the largest category and rapidly growing. Numerous facts, figures and economic analyses

This illustrates just how have for years warned about the unsustainable growth of mandatory spending.

For example, the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) reported that mandatory represented 34 percent of all government spending in 1965; today, that figure has risen dramatically to reflect more than two-thirds of all spending in 2018. By 2028, mandatory is on track to cover at least 77 percent of all spending.

With mandatory, it's not only the rapid rate of its growth, eclipsing discretionary, that is alarming. CBO has also projected that the federal trust funds connected to Medicare and Social Security are quickly nearing insolvency and thus will eventually fail to deliver on the benefits promised.

On the current path, Social Security as a whole is expected to become insolvent by 2030 - with the Social Security Dis-

ability Insurance Trust Fund solvent for at least 75 years. unable to pay out full benefits as early as 2025.

Clearly, to make real progress toward tackling our burden of debt, tough decisions and careful solutions are required. But the solutions must include reforms to save and sustain the mandatory programs serving many vulnerable Americans.

I believe a good place to start would be passage of legislation I introduced again this Congress, the Bipartisan Social Security Commission Act. The bill calls for a bipartisan and bicameral commission tasked with recommending reforms to ensure Social Security is life of Social Security.

Congress would then be required to vote up or down on the commission's recommendations within 60 legislative days. The legislation is modeled after the successful approach taken by former House Speaker Tip O'Neill and supported by President Ronald Reagan in 1983, when Social Security was also on the brink of bankruptcy.

At that time, bipartisan legislation was approved to stabilize and improve the fiscal foundation of Social Security. And the resulting legislation not only received widespread public support, it extended the

If history is any indication, I believe what worked before to save Social Security can work again-if both parties commit to pursuing reforms in a thoughtful, fair and bipartisan manner.

Even though the president's budget showed a way to get to balance, I wish his proposal had more seriously addressed the real driver of the nation's rapidly rising debt.

Until congressional leaders and the president work together on mandatory reforms, the nation's long-term fiscal house will remain in a state of disorder, threatening future prosperity for our children and grandchildren.

Dale K. Graham Veteran's **Foundation**

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week Bill Scott served in the Vietnam War as a member of the United States Air Force. He has served as a volunteer for our foundation for many years and just received his VA Accreditation.

Last week was another excellent one for the veterans and surviving spouses who visit us. Two hundred and sixty veterans and family members visited us last week.

Our crew, who are assisting Veterans at the Lawton Vet Center once a month, has doubled from two to four volunteers. As Lawton has many military retirees in their area, there is an abundance of veterans needing help with their VA claims.

I want to find several volunteers who live in that area to consider joining our team that visits there each month. We know that there are hundreds of thousands of veterans in Oklahoma who need the financial assistance and VA Health Care that comes with the approval of their claims for VA benefits.

Compensation payments for a service-connected disability begin with a 10 percent rating of \$133 to a 100 percent rating of over \$3000 a month. We usually start a claim for hearing loss and tinnitus. This small monthly payment.

Many veterans have applied for VA health care and were told they do not qualify because they make too much money. When they are approved for May 16—Last Day of School. that service-connected disability the health care door is opened for them. Some of the veterans who visit us are only interested in the VA health care that comes with the approval of a service-connected condition. The cost of health care along with prescriptions has forced some veterans to be unable to afford medical care.

A couple of weeks ago, I told you the VA created new forms designed to speed up the appeals process. As you know, during your visit with us we create several VA forms for you. When you disagree with the VA's ruling, you may request the VA take action. To do so, we will now be using the VA's new forms. To determine whether you should file a Supplemental Claim or ask for a Higher-Level Review, we are training our volunteers we look to whether the claim needs new evidence. If not, we would recommend a Higher-Level Review. We also select this path when we think a mistake was made.

As an example, the VA rules against a claimant based on it finding the claimant did not have an honorable discharge during the relevant time period. If evidence were already submitted that clearly disputes that finding, we would likely recommend a Higher-Level Review. I receive each week we were or personal news that you notified 14 veterans received However, if new evidence is a rating of 100 percent. and include the new evidence. an annual basis. In the category A Higher-Level Review Claim and a Supplemental Claim will both be reviewed by a VA employee. If it is a claim for Higher Level Review, a Higher-trained VA employee will be performing the review and making the decision. No new evidence may be added. New evidence must be submitted with a Supplemental Claim, and the VA will help you gather the evidence. A VA employee will make a decision after reviewing the new evidence.

Our volunteers train every other Monday to keep up with these developments. Having dedicated, well-trained volunteers reduces wait time and improves the chance of presenting a well-documented claim.

For those of you who would like to give back to others less fortunate, please consider joining our team. Our volunteers don't have to wonder if they are making a difference in the lives of others, they can see it enables most of them to become in the faces of the hundreds of VA claims and questions. for the services that we provide. Many times, people will ask what they can do to help our organization. Currently, we spend approximately \$25,000 each month on the services we provide. Some of these are medical testing, transportation for veterans to the VA hospital or to our location, medical expenses, food items, utility payments, along with a host of unforeseen expenses that our veterans and their dependents incur. We also use a lot of printing paper, printer cartridges and other types of office supplies.

One expense that is never ending is the cost to mail all the veteran's claims each week. Just the mailing is over \$250 each week. On average we receive over 600 pieces of mail from VA of that we will send out an average of 200 letters to veterans. We have a wish list available for those of you who would like to bring consumable personal or community news items that are used daily.

We also accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles angiesteele73@gmail.com or tractors or other items in running condition that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to help veterans.

of benefits awarded in the 10-90 percent range, 29 of our clients were awarded benefits and will receive \$356,877 annually.

We are fortunate to have several partners in our efforts to get veterans and their families what they need. One of our partners is the Vet Center, which has locations in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, and Lawton. They provide counselors on site each day we are open. They also allow us to use their space when we have a hearing before a Judge with the Board of Veterans Appeals. The Oklahoma Vet Center



When that hour comes - sometime around the mid-1930s – the Georgia preacher makes the same decision Jeremiah makes. To make it official, he gets up one morning to go to an old preacher he knows to give him the bad news:

"I'm quitting," he says, "I just can't take it anymore.'

The reply that comes catches the young Miller by surprise: "Preacher Miller," the old man says, "if you can quit, by all means do!"

"Now, I wasn't ready for that!" my granddad would tell me many years later. "He was supposed to beg me to stay, to put his hand on his shoulder and assure me it'd be all right. I thought he would tell me how badly the church needs men like me, and how the brotherhood would suffer," he added with a healthy laugh.

But Preacher Miller never hears those words. As a result, he decides to take the old man's advice. If that was the way he wanted it, he'd just quit!

But there is a problem.

"Oh, I tried to quit," my granddad would tell me many times, "I tried. But I couldn't do it.'

There was a burning, you see, down deep in Preacher Miller's bones, just as with Jeremiah. And he figures out early on that it never was going to let up – not as long as the good Lord gave him breath.



WHEREAS of the time, date and place of hearing published at least 15 days prior to hearing, a public hearing before the Board of Trustees of the Town of Goldsby was held to consider the adoption of traffic impact fees that establish proportionate "fair share" costs to new developments that will have traffic impacts on the roadway system;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, THAT:

Section 1. Current Article 2 of Chapter 19 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances Renumbered. The current Article 2 titled Miscellaneous Provisions of Chapter 19 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is renumbered as Article 3 of said Chapter 19 and after renumbering the same shall continue to be titled "Miscellaneous Provisions."

Section 2. Current Article 3 of Chapter 19 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances Renumbered. The current Article 3 titled Penalty of Chapter 19 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is renumbered as Article 4 of said Chapter 19 and after renumbering the same shall continue to be titled "Penalty."

Section 3. Chapter 19 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances amended by adding therein a new Article 2 thereof to read as follows:

ARTICLE 2. TRANSPORTA-TION IMPACT FEES SECTION 19.20. Short Title, Authority And Applicability

A. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Town of Goldsby Transportation Impact Fee Ordinance

B. The Town Board of Trustees of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, has the authority to adopt this ordinance pursuant to police powers and authorities granted to municipalities of the State of Oklahoma and specifically by 11 Okla. Stat. § 22-10, 11 Okla. Stat.

§ 43-103, and 62 Okla. Stat. §895. C. This ordinance shall apply within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma to any person or applicant seeking the issuance of a building permit for any new or expanded or modi-

fied commercial development, industrial development, planned development, or residential development, or seeking the approval of any plat or lot split for any new or expanded or modified commercial development, industrial development, planned development, or residential development which requires the recording of a final plat or lot split approval pursuant to the subdivision regulations of the Town of Goldsby

SECTION 19.21. LEGISLATIVE

The Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma finds, determines, and declares

that: A. Goldsby must expand its transportation system in order to maintain current levels of service

if new development is to be accommodated. B. The Legislature of the State of Oklahoma has, through the enablement of land development statutes and police power regulations authorized municipalities to

adopt a Transportation Impact Fee Ordinance. C. The imposition of impact fees is one of the preferred methods of ensuring that development, whether new, expanded or modified, bears a proportionate share of the costs of capital improvement or facilities necessary to accommodate such development which is required to promote and protect

D. Land development will generate traffic demands necessitating either the acquisition of land or the construction of facilities and improvements necessitated by new developments for which the fees are to be levied.

the public health, safety and wel-

fare of the citizens and residents

of municipalities.

E. The fees established herein are derived from, are based upon, and do not exceed, the costs of providing new capacity, acquiring additional land, and/or construction of improvements necessitated by the new developments for which the fees are to be levied.

SECTION 19.22. RULES OF CONSTRUCTION

A. The provisions of this ordinance shall be liberally construed so as to effectively carry out its purpose in the interest of the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens and residents of Goldsby.

B. For the purposes of administration and enforcement of this ordinance, unless otherwise stated in this ordinance, the following rules of construction shall apply to the text of this ordinance:

1. In case of any difference of meaning, whether by inspection or otherwise, between text of this ordinance and any caption, illustration, summary table or illustrative table, the text of this ordinance shall control.

2. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not discretionary.

3. The word "may" is permissive. 4. Words used in the present tense shall include the future: and words used in the singular number shall include the plural, and the plural the singular, unless the context clearly indicates the contrary.

5. The phrase "used for" includes "arranged for," "designed "maintained or," or occupied

6. The word "person" includes an individual, a corporation, a an incorporated association, or any other similar entity.

7. Unless the context clearly indicates the contrary, where a regulation involves two (2) or more items, conditions, provisions, or events connected by the conjunction "and," "or," "either... "or," the conjunction shall be interpreted as follows:

i. "And" indicates that all the connected terms, conditions, provisions or events apply.

ii. "Or" indicates that the terms, conditions, provisions or events may apply singularly or in combination.

iii. "Either...or" indicates that the connected items, conditions, provisions or events shall apply singly or in combination.

8. The word "includes" shall not be limited to the specific example but is intended to extend its meaning to all other instances so designed or . circumstances of like kind or character.

9. "Town" means the Town of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, or the municipal officials he/she may designate to carry out the administration of this ordinance. SECTION 19.23. DEFINITIONS

A. A "fee payer" is a person or entity commencing a commercial, industrial or residential land development activity which generates construction or placement of a commercial or industrial building, residential dwelling units or other structure and which requires the issuance of a building permit, or the approval and recoding of a final subdivision plat or map.

B. A "capital improvement" includes transportation system planning, preliminary facility enaineerina, enaineerina or desian study, land surveys, land acquisition, permitting and construction, erection or placement of facilities including but not limited to:

1. Street systems, including roads, streets, boulevards, bridges, sidewalks, bicycle routes, drainage, traffic signals and systems, traffic control devices and signage, traffic calming devices, landscaping associated with street rights-of-way, and any local components of county, state, or federal highways to the extent and

to the proportionate cost that the local components are not funded by state or federal grants or other state or federal permanent funding sources

2. Public transportation systems and facilities;

3. Acquisition of land for right-

of-way or facility purposes; Transportation Impact Fee Or-

transportation facilities. D. A "traffic impact study" quantifies the changes in traffic levels and translates these changes into transportation impacts in the vicinity of the project. The traffic impact study will identify on-site and off-site transportation system improvements needed to accom-

modate the additional traffic as-

sociated with new development.

E. "Senior Housing" is a housing development intended for senior citizens as defined by the current AARP standards. For the intent and purposes of this code, a senior housing development shall be one in which a minimum sixty percent (60%) of the living units are built to current ADA standards.

SECTION 19.24. IMPOSITION OF TRANSPORTATION IMPACT

Except as provided in SECTION 19.25 Computation of Transportation Impact Fees, any person, after the effective date of this ordinance seeking the issuance of a building permit for any new or expanded or modified commercial development, industrial development, planned development, or residential development subject to the provisions of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, or any person seeking to record a final plat pursuant to the subdivision regulations of the Town of Goldsby, shall be required to pay a transportation impact fee in the manner and amount set forth in this ordinance.

SECTION 19.25. COMPUTA-TION OF TRANSPORTATION IMPACT FFFS

The amount of the Transportation Impact Fee shall be determined by the schedule set forth below. If the fee paver disagrees with the calculation of such fee, he/ she/it shall have the option of preparing and submitting to the Town Administrator an independent fee calculation for the development, construction or building activity for which the permit is sought. Such independent calculation shall determine the proportionately different costs incurred by the Town in the provision of transportation capital improvements to serve his/ her/its development. Any such independent calculation shall be prepared and presented by qualified professionals and follow best practices and methodologies. The decision of the Town Administrator shall be final subject to the appeal rights set forth in SECTION 19.30.

The fee payer shall pay the transportation impact fee required by this ordinance to the Town Treasurer or his/her designee prior to the issuance of a building permit for any commercial, industrial or residential structure within a development, subject to the provisions of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, or prior to the recording of a final plat or lot split approval for any subdivision. No such permit may be issued or plat or approval recorded for any such activity until the required fee is paid.

SECTION 19.27. TRANSPOR-TATION IMPACT FEE TRUST FUND ESTABLISHED

There is hereby established a single Transportation Impact Fee District, which includes the entire corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma for the collection and expenditure of all fees provided for herein.

SECTION 19.28. USE OF

Funds collected from transportation impact fees shall be used only to pay for capital improvements to the transportation system within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby. Said funds may also be used as matching funds to obtain state or federal surface transportation program funds. No funds shall be used to pay for transportation operating or maintenance costs.

SECTION 19.29. CREDITS

A fee payer shall be given dollar for dollar credits for the actual development costs, if any, he/she/ it may be required to make or may voluntarily make; or an equivalent offset of dollar for dollar for such improvements previously made in the course of land development activities; where such costs are or were for land, facilities, or improvements to the transportation system, adjacent to the fee payer's development. SECTION 19.30. APPEALS

Any decision made by the Town Administrator or his/her designee, or by an official of the Code Enforcement Office in the course of administering this ordinance may be appealed to the Town Board of Trustees or its designee.

SECTION 19.31. PENALTY AND ENFORCEMENT

In addition to the penalty set forth in Article 4 of this Chapter 19, a violation of this ordinance may result in work on the offending development being shut down until this ordinance has been complied with and Goldsby shall be reimbursed all fees and costs associated therewith

SECTION 19.32. SEVERABIL-

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Town Board of Trustees of the Town of Goldsby hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that anyone or more clauses and phrases be declared

unconstitutional. SECTION 19.33. REVIEW

The matters contained in this ordinance may be reviewed from time to time by the Goldsby Town Board of Trustees at their discretion. The fees provided for in SECTION 19.25 may be amended by the Town Board of Trustees at any time by resolution.

Section 4. Emergency. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the peace, health, welfare and safety of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma and the inhabitants thereof that the provisions of the ordinance be put into full force and effect, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by virtue hereof; this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval, passage and publication. 




