


# Belicek into Hall of Fame

Could be not quite as well as you thought.

Do you know his "real" name isn't Quinn, but David?

How about the "mistress" he spends most weekends with, leaving his wife at home?

Do you know what position he holds at the Purcell Fire Department?

Starting from the bottom, Quinn gave up his captain's bars in July 2018 to accept the job as Purcell's first fire marshal.

And the "mistress" isn't what you may be thinking - unless you really were thinking bass boat.

Quinn is an avid competitive angler and to hook and land trophy-class fish at that level takes a lot of time on the water with a rod and reel in one's hand.

For the record his favorite places to drop a line are Lakes Arbuckle and Murray in southern Oklahoma.

As for Quinn, well, when your dad is a huge Dylan fan, that's what you get for a nickname.

The elder Kroth was a bail bondsman. He died in 2011.

Quinn was 5 when his family moved to Purcell from Oklahoma City.

That was in 1979.

He wanted to be a firefighter and applied with the Oklahoma City Fire Department "a couple times." It never crossed his mind initially to apply in his adopted home town. Eventually, however, he did join the department as a volunteer. He joined the department in December 2002 and remained a volunteer for at least a year before he had an epiphany that "this was




2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

# Senate approves bill to better protect students on school buses

tion Wednesday to allow school districts to take action to address drivers unlawfully overtaking school buses.

House Bill 1926, by Sen. Ron Sharp and Rep. Dell Kerbs, would better protect student riders by allowing districts to install cameras on school buses to record those who illegally pass when the stop sign is flashing.

"Unfortunately, this is a common occurrence. If there isn't a police officer around, many drivers don't realize the danger of passing a stopped school bus. A young man was recently struck in Stillwater by a passing driver and over the years, many

around the state and some even killed," said Sharp, R-Shawnee.

"There's a reason it's illegal to pass a bus – it's extremely dangerous to students, especially younger ones who might not be as attentive crossing the street," he said.

Under the bill, those caught driving around stopped buses can be fined \$100 or more with 75 percent of the funds going to the Cameras for School Bus Stops Revolving Fund. The State Board of Education will oversee the Fund and provide grants to public school districts for the installation of camera equipment on their buses.

"This bill will allow those sideration.





On April 4, 1949, the North Atlantic Treaty was signed, and the United States entered the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) as one of 12 founding member countries. Seven decades later, the transatlantic alliance endures, and it has grown to include 29 countries, pledging still to face aggressors and security threats together.

In reflecting on this historic and lasting partnership, it was an honor to recently hear from NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg during a joint session of the United States Congress.

While his address was a so-

threats and difficulties we have experienced alongside our NATO allies, it was encouraging also to remember the steadfast cooperation that has existed all the while in promoting and preserving freedom.

As Secretary General Stoltenberg poignantly remarked, "The strength of NATO is that despite our differences, we have always been able to unite around our core task. To defend each other. Protect each other. And to keep our people safe."

Following the devastating conflict of World War II, NATO allies banded together with the shared commitment to defend against future threats and the shared desire to prevent

bering reminder of the security future conflicts, particularly with the Soviet Union.

A partnership which started in the thick of the Cold War, NATO allies remained watchful and ready to defend against potential attacks during the early decades.

However, it was not until 2001 that NATO allies invoked Article 5 of its treaty: "An armed attack against one or more of them...shall be considered an attack against them all."

After the heartbreaking September 11 terrorist attacks on our soil, NATO allies quickly came to the aid of the United

For those who've never watched any of their documentaries, they basically take footage of animals and add a highly personal kid friendly narrative on top of it.

Usually the story is focused on a single creature and their family, or in the case of "Born in China," a group of critters tied together by their location. All narrated by a single famous actor.

In the case of "Penguins," that voice actor is Ed Helms.

I have to say, based on the only other Disneynature movie I had seen, "Born in China," I went into "Penguins" a little pessimistic.

While the footage in "Born in China" was well shot and the voice acting was fine, the actual narrative of the documentary itself felt completely manufactured.

Well I guess this is part two in this year's series of horror movies featuring terrifying ent voices depending on the mother figures.

The first being "Greta." Released last month, it was a film about an insane lady who lures unsuspecting young women into her house using abandoned handbags.

I guess if you're desperate for a scare or two, this might get the job done. It definitely had my heart racing a couple times near the beginning of the movie.



Sprayer Calibration is a Must

With the warm weather arriving, the weeds in the pastures are already off to a good start. and with the price of fertilizer you have to ask yourself do you want to fertilize the weeds.

If you do your own weed spraying, how much liquid do you apply per acre? How much chemical do you put out per acre? Are you following the recommended rate listed on the label? Are you controlling the weeds as cost effectively as possible? Are you getting the results you want?

Studies show that only one in four sprayers actually apply the amount of chemical that the operator had intended. The other three either over or under apply by at least 33 percent.

Over application can result in (1) unnecessary chemical cost, (2) risk of crop damage, (3) environmental risk, and (4) applicator safety, while under





# Two Oklahoma hospitals fought off deadly fungal "superbug" called serious health threat

#### **TrevorBrown Oklahoma Watch**

It wasn't publicized locally, but within the past few years teams of health officials at two Oklahoma health facilities took rapid actions to contain the spread of a fungal "superbug" that federal officials have declared a serious global health threat.

facility was infected, and both patients recovered. But the incidents reflect the growing alarm among health officials over the deadly, multidrugresistant Candida auris, or C. auris, which can kill 30 percent to 60 percent of those infected.

Oklahoma is one of 12 states that had reported confirmed cases of the fungus by late February. By comparison, Texas reported one and California two. The problem is much more severe in New York, with 309 confirmed cases, and Illinois, in the future," said Interim with 144

In April of 2017, a team of experts from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention converged on the University of Oklahoma Medical Center in Oklahoma City after a patient tested positive for the drug-resistant fungus.

About a year later, a patient at a southeast Oklahoma health

worried the CDC enough to issue a clinical alert in 2016 for all U.S. health care facilities to be on the lookout for suspected cases. State and local health officials say its emergence in Oklahoma is a reminder that hospitals, health clinics and even nursing homes need to be aware of the emerging threat.

The CDC warns that many disinfectants commonly used in the health care industry are ineffective in stopping the fungus. Some strains are resistant to all three main classes of antifungal drugs.

#### **Containing the Threat**

Due to privacy concerns, the Oklahoma State Department of Health would not disclose where the state's two reported cases took place, except to say one occurred in Oklahoma County and the other in southeast Oklahoma.

"I hesitate to go into any more details because with the time and place, it could lead to identifying the patients," Burnsed said.

But published documents, including a PowerPoint presentation and article on the CDC's website, suggest the April 2017 case occurred at the OU Medical Center. The hospital confirmed the case in a statement to Oklahoma Watch.

OU Medical Center saw one of the state's two documented cases of multidrug-resistant fungus Candida auris. The hospital moved quickly to contain the infection, and the patient recovered.

seriousness of the situation by describing how a three-person an expert in fungal infections, auris and other drug-resistant helped state and local health officials take 73 samples, including tray tables and door handles, and send them to CDC labs over a two-day period. Hospital officials also reviewed about a year of previously taken samples to rule out the possibility that the patient caught the germ in the hospital. The digital presentation from the hospital's infection control manager notes that hospital officials didn't find anything outside of the patient's room and believe it came from outside the hospital.

Officer Dr. Dale Bratzler said the patient acquired the infection in Asia and was already in isolation due to multiple infections from drug-resistant organisms when C. auris was identified.

"The most important part of our strategy at OU Medicine for this type of infection is early detection," he said. "Our laboratory is able to quickly identify this organism if we should ever see another patient with it."

During the April incident, the CDC also worked with hospital staff to go over its infection containment strategy and review how to conduct environmental sampling so future tests can be done on site.

"The work in Oklahoma was deemed successful because CDC did not find further evidence of transmission," CDC epidemiologist Karlyn Beer Beer said in the CDC article. "This is a testament to the quality of the hospital's lab surveillance, infection control and its commitment to finding and preventing C. auris transmission."

# Scott's bills to help children and seniors head to Governor

During the 11th week of session, Sen. Paul Scott had another bill signed into law and two more heading to the Governor's desk.

After receiving unanimous approval in both legislative chambers, House Bill 1074 was signed into law April 15.

It requires DHS to verify the applicability of the Indian Child Welfare Act within three months of a child, to whom it might apply, being taken into custody.

The department is also required to conduct a nationwide relative search within three months of a child being taken into custody, for the purpose of identifying a fit and willing relative with whom to place the child. The new law will go into effect Nov. 1, 2019.

HB 1075 was unanimously approved in both the House and Senate before being sent to the Governor last week.

It requires that every child taken into DHS custody be provided, within seven days, an assessment of his or her physical, medical, mental health and educational needs and requires the assessment be updated at for the Silver Haired Legislaregular intervals while the child ture and for our state's seniors," is in the department's custody. said Scott.

If signed, the bill will become effective Nov. 1, 2019.

"House Bills 1074 and 1075 are an effort to protect the best interests, health and safety of Oklahoma's most vulnerable citizens, our children," said Scott. "I want to thank Rep. Brian Hill for bringing these important issues forward and allowing me to carry them in the Senate; and I also want to thank my colleagues in both chambers for their support of Oklahoma's youth."

SB 990 was a request from the Silver Haired Legislature and is on the way to the Governor's office after strong support from the legislature.

The bill requires any premium rate filing for a Medicare supplement policy to be approved by the Insurance Commissioner and communicated to the policyholder annually only during the open enrollment period (between September 1 and October 30). Each increase will take effect on January 1 of the following year. Rep. Brad Boles is the bill's House author.



"Why would you need to know my name?" he asked. 'There's only one of me."

The time traveler's point is that you really only need a name to distinguish between things. If there's only one, a name isn't needed.

In the Bible, there is only one church (Ephesians 4:4, Colossians 1:18), so it doesn't have a name – it's usually just called "the church." Otherwise, it's given a description. Sometimes the Bible will talk about the church in a location, such as "the church of the Laodiceans"



(Colossians 4:16), or "the (1 Thessalonians 1:1).

More often, however, it's given a description of ownership, such as "the churches of Christ" (Romans 16:16) or "the church of the Firstborn" (Hebrews 12:23).

How would you feel if woke up one morning to find that someone had come into your house and rearranged your furniture, and was getting ready to knock out a wall or two? You'd probably be furious, but God's.

why? Because it's your house, and only you can decide how things should be done in your house, of course.

Well, the church of the Bible was purchased by Jesus Christ with His own blood (Acts 20:28), so only He would be able to determine what would be done in His church. When people add things or change things because it's what they want, they might not realize it, but they're saying that that those are their churches, not



at some point in their military service; I just did not know that it was so common for some men to be assaulted sexually. Today's military leadership has probably addressed that issue enough to improve most servicemen and women's lives.

One of the first things we do when we identify a person who has been assaulted is to encourage them to visit with our counselors from the Vet Center who are available each Tuesday and Thursday. We provide a volunteer of the same sex to guide them through the VA claims system as they apply for VA benefits.

We have several medical providers who are available to fill out a PTSD DBQ to use as evidence when filing a claim for VA benefits. Several years ago, combined amount of \$812,396. one of the ladies we assisted had been assaulted in 1970 by a senior military member. She had suffered throughout her life blaming herself for someone else's action. Sometimes we can help victims of MST find closure after they have finished and received VA benefits for what happened to them. Currently, our Board of Directors is researching and studying ways to grow our organization to enable us to assist everyone who visits us for help with their VA claims and questions. The maximum number of veterans and surviving spouses we can accommodate each Tuesday and Thursday is met very early in the day. Sometimes we have reached 150 veterans by 6 a.m. in the morning. One of the ways that is being studied is to add satellite locations in other parts of Oklahoma. We currently have a volunteer team that goes to the Lawton Vet Center one day per month, and a team that goes to Binger once a month. I believe that we need local people in other towns who want to volunteer their time to help others in their communities to provide our services. We provide training on a biweekly schedule that volunteers could take advantage of that would enable them to assist veterans and surviving spouses in their communities. All applications would be sent to our Norman office to be reviewed before being filed with VA. One of the things we have not written about lately is possible VA benefits for surviving spouses and dependents of veterans. Something that every

surviving spouse should know is that the benefits that may be available to them if their spouse dies from a condition that is and will receive a combined presumptive to their military service.

to Agent Orange, Gulf War, and Camp Lejeune along with exposure to radiation may be eligible for benefits if one of the presumptive conditions is on the veteran's death certificate. We suggest all veterans and surviving spouses visit us or google presumptive diseases to your veteran's military service

(Example) Diseases presumptive to Agent Orange exposure.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all of the rating decisions and other correspondence veterans and surviving spouses who are represented receive. This enables us to review each decision that VA makes to make sure that each person is receiving the benefits we believe they are entitled to.

Last week there were eight veterans who received disability ratings of 100 percent. That group of men and women veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$316,009 per year. Sixty-five (a record high so far for this year) received ratings ranging from 10-90 percent. This group of veterans will receive an annual Three surviving spouses were

approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their veteran's military service annual amount of \$47,281.

Counselors from the Vet Those who were exposed Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.


