

Gabriela's favorite class is calculus.





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

Retirement woes

don't receive even a plug nickel for having played MLB, because they didn't have at least 43 game days on an active MLB roster. If he's lucky, Kernek probably receives a check every Febru-

ary of \$2,500. After taxes, he probably nets \$1,750. Unlike Kernek, a vested retiree can earn up to \$220,000 a

year from his MLB pension. During parts of two seasons, in 1960 and 1961, Kernek ap-

peared in 30 big league games, came up 81 times, collected 21 hits, including three doubles and two triples, and scored 11 runs. The other years he played professional ball did not count to any major league service time.

Kernek and 634 other men and their families are being denied pensions by both the league and the union representing the current players, the Major League Baseball Players' Association (MLBPA), because of an error the union committed 38 years ago.

In order to avert a threatened 1980 walkout by the players, MLB made the following sweetheart offer to union representatives: going forward, all a post-1980 player would need to be eligible to buy into the league's premium health insurance plan was one game day of service; all a post-1980 player would need for a benefit allowance was 43 game days of service. At the time, the threshold was four years to be vested in the pension plan.

The problem was, the union failed to insist on retroactivity for all those players like Kernek.

The league – which I concede does not have to address this matter unless the union broaches it in collective bargaining negotiations -- recently announced that its revenue was up 325 percent from 1992, and that it has made \$500 million since 2015. What's more, the average value of the each of the 30 clubs is up 19 percent from 2016, to \$1.54 billion. And the 30 club owners recently wrote a \$10 million check to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

The owners chose museum relics rather than retirees.

To date, the MLBPA has been loath to divvy up anymore of the collective pie. Even though the players' welfare and benefits fund is worth more than \$3.5 billion, MLBPA Executive Director Tony Clark has never commented about these non-vested retirees, many of whom are filing for bankruptcy at advanced ages, having banks foreclose on their homes and are so sickly and poor that they cannot afford adequate health care coverage.

Even a post-1980 player who only has 43 game days of service credit receives a minimum pension of \$3,589 at the age of 62, assuming he was called up to the majors and stayed on the active roster from August 15 to October 1. Considering that Kernek helped pave the way so someone

such as Bryce Harper or Manny Machado could reap the benefits of free agency, it is anothema to me why the union doesn't do more for these men.

One possible answer is a quote attributed to the founder of the American Newspaper Guild, the late Haywood Broun. "Sports," he once wrote, "does not build character.

"It reveals it."

We've got a movie about a violent convict and a wild mustang, a slice of life drama starring Julianne Moore, a remake of a Disney classic, and a film about a rebellious stoner named Moondog starring Matthew McConaughey.

Let's get to those reviews.



First up is The Mustang."

Roman (Matthias Schoenaerts), a convict in a rural Nevada

prison who struggles to escape his violent past, is required to participate in an "outdoor maintenance" program as part of his state-mandated social

Spotted by a no-nonsense veteran trainer (Bruce Dern) and helped by an outgoing fellow inmate and trick rider (Jason Mitchell), Roman is accepted into the selective wild horse training section of the program, where he finds his own humanity in gentling an especially unbreakable mustang.

I hadn't even heard the faintest whisper about this film before it was released. No trailer, no advertising, no nothing.

Looking at the plot summary though, it definitely has an air of familiarity about it.

I mean it's a movie about a deeply flawed man and absent father, who learns how care about others from a wild animal who is just as unpleasant as himself.

The film practically writes itself. There's basically no surprises here.

But a predictable story doesn't automatically make a movie bad. Good writing and fascinating characters can make just about any concept worth watching.

Unfortunately the main character here is far from charismatic.

likeable, nor is he terribly interesting as a person.

To be clear I'm not blaming Coleman the acting. I thought Matthias Schoenaerts did a fine job performance wise and the man clearly knew how to nail the more emotional moments when he had to

I just don't think he was written to be all that compelling.

Roman is stoic, he doesn't like talking, he pushes people away, and he certainly doesn't get along with others.

All that could make for an interesting character if we could hear some kind of inner monologue. You know, give the man some kind of humanity.

As it is though he's just a loathsome man who's unpleasant for everyone to be around, including the audience. That said, there is an aspect to

this film that others might find engaging that I don't.



film does come across as fairly unfocused.

But despite the movie's illdefined nature, I think I actually ended up enjoying this film.

The highlight of course being Julianne Moore. She really is perfect in this role.

Everything about her feels so natural. The character fits her like a glove. Honestly, it doesn't even seem like a performance most of the time. She's just Gloria, that's all there is to it.

This movie basically just feels like a brief window into an ordinary middle aged woman's life. It's not exactly thrilling, but somehow I still found it compelling. And despite the film being fairly unfocused, I think it still has a pretty satisfy-

Despite a great performance from Moore, I just don't think it'll appeal to most audiences.

Vandevere (Michael Keaton), who recruits the peculiar pachyderm for his newest, larger-than-life entertainment venture, Dreamland. Dumbo soars to new heights alongside a spectacular aerial artist, Colette Marchant (Eva Green), until Holt learns that beneath its shiny veneer, Dreamland is

full of dark secrets. Here we go again. Disney's back at the well of their beloved animated library and has delivered the first of three live action remakes they plan to release this year.

That's right, I said three.

First in May we get a Guy Ritchie directed version of months later in July, we get

about all Disney remakes, reboots, and belated sequels.

As I've said in the past, if the filmmakers behind these movies have something new and compelling to add to these

original stories, I'm all for it. I thought director Jon Favreau did a wonderful job taking 1967's "The Jungle Book" and updating it for a modern audience while still keeping an air of familiarity and a sense of nostalgia for the original.

Heck, Favreau's basically the only reason I'm kind of looking forward to "The Lion King." Luckily Disney had the smarts to keep him around to direct that film too.

But then we get remakes like "Beauty and the Beast." A movie which was more concerned with filling "plot holes" from the original than adding anything fresh to the table. And in the process of trying to coldly imitate the animated film, the filmmakers lost all of its original charm.

All that said though, I thought "Dumbo" 2019 had a remarkable chance to be an excellent re-imagining of the original

I don't know if any of you have watched the 1941 version of the film recently. I know I hadn't until last Friday. If you haven't, let me tell ya, there's a lot of room for improvement.

Narratively, the movie is pretty odd. 1941's "Dumbo' is surprisingly short, only 64 minutes long, yet for most of the film's runtime not much

It opens with a long music number about storks, then it has a song about the circus train, Dumbo gets "born" and is mocked for his ears, which is finally something relevant to the story, but then there's a three minute music number about underpaid workers putting up the circus tent.

That's a lot of filler and we're already a quarter of the way through the film.

You know the one part that everyone remembers? The part where Dumbo learns he can fly, is given a magic feather to build confidence, but it turns out he didn't need the feather and he could fly without it all along?

Yeah, we don't get to that part until over 50 minutes into the film, in a movie that's only 64 minutes long.

There isn't even the slightest hint Dumbo can fly until over three quarters into the movie.

That only leaves 14 minutes left to resolve a significant

For 50 minutes the original is basically doing nothing but twiddling it's thumbs, then suddenly it wraps itself up in the remaining 14 minutes.

So yeah, there a bunch of room for improvement over the original film here. At least in the overall structure of the narrative.

And luckily, improve this film does.

The remake has a much more standard plot structure compared to the animated film.

In fact the events of the original basically only take up the first third of the 2019 film.

From then on "Dumbo" 2019 is essentially its own original story. Yes, both still have most of the same basic content, they just removed most of the filler here. Which is exactly what I was hoping for.

Unfortunately, all the new stuff they added just isn't terribly interesting.

Instead of a focus on animal characters, our main characters are a human family. A dad recently back from war, played by Colin Farrell, and his two children, a boy and a girl. Plus Danny DeVito is there and Michael Keaton and Eva Green eventually show up.

I'd be perfectly okay with these alterations if these characters were well written and engaging, but sadly for the most part they aren't.

Colin Farrell feels like he's just phoning it in, and the children themselves sound like emotionless husks reading their lines off cue card. Kids who happen to have fairly prominent roles in the film I might add.

Michael Keaton is at least a little more interesting in that he just hams it up the entire movie. At least it looks like he's having fun I guess.

I adore Eva Green. She's one of my favorite actresses in Hollywood, but her character here is completely disposable. She might as well not be in the film for all she affects the plot.

The only actor that actually comes out of this movie looking good is Danny DeVito. His character is without a doubt the most fleshed out and humanized person in the entire film. But a single exception doesn't

make for a good movie.

As I've said in the past, when performances all around are bad, it's often not only the actor's fault. Much of the blame usually lies with the director. Which brings me to Tim Burton.



Redcedar expansion impacting natural water cycle

Ali Meek **Agriculture Sciences**

Spring brings promises of returning warmth, new life and the annual green-up. With this, the contrast between the brown winter landscape and the evergreen eastern redcedar diminishes. But the threat of redcedars does not.

Many Oklahomans are all too aware of the highly allergenic pollen of the eastern redcedar. Added to that is their high flammability. This can lead to devastating wildfires and increase their ability to quickly invade and convert vital prairies into unproductive stands of redcedar.

of redcedar expansion is its negative impact on the natural water cycle. Dense redcedar stands can reduce soil moisture and potentially cause a decrease in runoff and groundwater recharge at a local scale due to some unique characteristics.

Redcedars consume and evapotranspire more water than most other plants. Their leaves act as a canopy over the preventing it from reaching the ground.

ponds, and reservoirs.

For these reasons, researchers want to find ways to control the expansion of redcedar in Oklahoma. In 2010, researchers at Oklahoma State University began doing just that.

Chris Zou and Rodney Will, professors in the department of Natural Resource Ecology & Management, chose sites with dense stands of redcedar at the Cross Timbers Experimental Range to undergo one of two redcedar removal treatments.

In one treatment, redcedars were simply cut and removed with no additional changes. In the other, native switchgrass was planted in the newly Another well-known threat cleared area. Switchgrass was chosen because it offers many

"Switchgrass is great for soil water retention. It is also a dedicated feedstock for produce biofuel, making it a potentially profitable crop," Will said. "The goal was to cut the cedars, restore water flow, and explore alternative land uses for landowners."

"Switchgrass is efficient in water use. Biomass removal in the Fall mimics biofuel feedstock harvest, and may allow more runoff to replenish nearby waterbodies," Zou said.

Though the initial data show promise, conclusions ultimately will be based on results from multiple years to capture different climate conditions.

"At the end of 2019, we will have collected three years of data with fully grown switchgrass. This body of knowledge will help us better understand the ecological benefits of replacing redcedar with switchgrass," Zou said.

Redcedars, which now cover more than 25 percent of the state, are spreading at an almost exponential rate. Fortunately, there are many simple ways to combat the invasion. One option is cutting trees below the first green branch, but the most inexpensive and effective tool is fire. Fire is especially effective on larger properties, with smaller trees, and on less dense stands.

Managing redcedar expansion is beneficial to your land and Oklahoma's water future.

> "While people can enter information into the app at any time, we're particularly interested in observations during breeding season, which is April through October," Elmore said.

The gamebirds selected for the app are the scaled (blue) quail, prairie-chicken, bobant and wild turkey.

Once the app is open, choose which species is being observed.

Enter information regarding

how many adult birds are present, how many chick/poults are observed, the county in which the observation is being made, the date of the observation,

for this type of information to be collected because, currently, brood reports of young birds are limited across the state, and annual reproduction can vary from county to county.

This can make hunting forecasts and annual monitoring less reliable.

"We tried to make the app white quail, ring-necked pheas- simple so it would be quick and easy to use," he said. "It will work only if a lot of people use it broadly across the state. We'd like to get information from as many counties as possible."



At the schools, the Oklahomans passed out clothes, shoes, food, toys and school supplies.

The schools provide students one meal a day and for many, that is their only meal.

Many youngsters wear mismatched shoes that even appear to be different sizes.

Most of South Africa is Christian and with the blessings of school administrators, the missionaries also shared Jesus and the Gospel with students and played games with them, Blankenship said.

The bonds formed with the children were unmistakable. Many of the missionaries wept when it came time for good byes, telling Blankenship they were leaving part of their hearts in South Africa.

The parting was heart-breaking for the children, too. One little boy packed a bag, hoping to accompany the group back to Oklahoma and a new life.

Many parents also begged the missionaries to take their children and give them opportunities for a better life unavailable in South Africa.

In one area visited, HIV and AIDS have killed much of the adult population. Their orphaned children are being raised by the community.

The missionaries spoke in three different churches – one Methodist and two Pentecos-

They also painted church "It's a huge issue in the buildings, tiled floors and distributed food and clothes to the people.

"The people are very friendly and kind," Blankenship said. "They went out of their way to honor us. They almost treat you like you're a celebrity. The people cooked the best they had for us.

"It makes you realize how spoiled we are in many ways.'

Without fail, the people had two prayer requests for the mission group – prayers for their families and for employment.

Especially in the country, the sense of community is strong.

"They have to work together just to survive," Blankenship Cows, goats and chickens

were in abundance and farmers were growing a lot of corn and maize in the area visited by the Oklahomans.

There is also a lot of sugar cane grown outside of Durban.

Crime is a problem due to the high unemployment.

The missionaries had three off-duty detectives to drive their buses and "watch out for us."

The language barrier was least evident in Durban, where most South Africans speak English.

In the countryside, they also speak Zulu.

"They taught me to say 'God bless you' in Zulu," Blankenship said. "But they would giggle when I tried to say it. I must not have got it right."



The first thing we tell them is we are a free service provided to all veterans and their surviving spouses. Most of the men and women we help with their to their service.

We also help with VA Pension, DIC and Aid and Attendance for those that qualify. Our goal is to do everything that we can to help those who served and their families. What makes us different than other organizations is we use an evidenced-based claims system. We use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires filled out by a medical provider showing a Diagnosis of a disability, and also the severity of that condition.

The VA made these DBQ forms available for everyone to use in support of veterans claims for the service connection of a disability or to re-evaluate a condition as it got more severe. By using this type of evidence to support a claim for VA benefits, it is more likely than not that it will be approved.

Training classes are provided once or twice each month for all of our volunteers to improve their skills to help veterans and their families. All of the men and women who work at our Foundation know that without the sacrifices of the men and women who served in the military our country would not be what it is today.

Last week was another busy one for all of us as there were over 300 veterans and surviving spouses who visited us. As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, we receive a copy of all decisions the VA makes on the men and women represented. This enables us to review the decision and to send a letter to everyone who needs to return for a follow-up visit.

Another critical part of the decision letters is that it lets us know who was approved and what percent their rating was or if they were denied. 

The 'direct operation' of 'Indwelling'

Good day to all: Welcome to the "front porch."

Recently, a friend wrote me with some questions on the Holy Spirit, and along the way he said, "Since you believe in the direct operation of the Spirit, I thought maybe you believed..."—and he added something else I didn't believe.

That little tidbit got my attention fast. I immediately responded with a smile and a "Time out, brother! Better say that again, and this time a little slower."

It is always a little funny to me when people tell you what you believe, almost as if they think if they throw it out there you might just own it because they said it. I'm glad that I grew up in a family of friendly debaters who taught you two things fast: If you wanted to survive in this family, you'd better learn two things—one, your Bible, and, two, not to own up to anything that feels slippery in your mind. A failure either way could make for a long day

the Holy Spirit - and the there are several - in my friend's statement is that it is a man-made term from long ago that could well mean different things to different people.

Oh, I immediately knew what he was saying, and I also knew - even before he could get the words out of his mouth – that I didn't believe any such thing. But many of you, I am sure, do not know what the direct operation of the Spirit refers to. So, I want you to be clear, so you can know the merits or the failures of the belief.

The expression refers to a common denominational view that the Spirit must act directly on the heart of a person before he is able to receive the gospel. For example: With the nobleman of Acts 8, he could not have known how to obey the gospel through the preaching of Philip unless the Spirit fell upon him first to "enlighten" him.

Perhaps under the umbrella of that expression is the Holy Spirit's falling on the apostles (Acts 2:1-4) as well the Spirit's working on others who redown at my Grandma's house. ceived miraculous spiritual

The initial problem – and gifts by the laying on of the apostles' hands (Acts 8:17), all of which are phenomena that were prevalent during first century and the age of miracles. That age we believe to have long-since passed (Acts 8:17; 1 Corinthians 13:8-10).

You may wonder, then, why a good friend of mine would take such a leap (and it was a leap, to be sure) and say that I believed in any such things. The reason is that he knows that I and many others hold firmly to another belief, and that is that the Bible teaches the Holy Spirit dwells in every Christian – that is, the Spirit Himself dwells (Romans 8:9/1 Corinthians 6:19-20).

I say Spirit "Himself" as opposed to the view my friend holds that the Spirit only dwells through a medium, that being the Word of God. Some refer to the belief of the Spirit's indwelling in His Person as the 'personal indwelling" of the Holy Spirit.

Again, to be clear – and that, always, is our intent, even if we

Our study this week is on the Apostle Saint Matthew, also known as Levi, who was likely born in Galilee in the early first century AD. We know little about him, except that his father's name was Alphaeus and that he worked as a tax collector in Capernaum. As a tax collector he would have been literate in Aramaic and Greek. Levi would have been despised for what was seen as collaborating with the Roman occupation force, and it would have been shocking to his other disciples to hear Jesus call such a man to be one of his intimate

followers. It is common in the Bible for a person's name to be changed after a significant event occurs. For example, in the Old Testament, Abram becomes Abraham. In the New Testament, Simon becomes Peter, and in the same way, Levi becomes Matthew, derived from the Hebrew for "Gift of Yahweh."

He is one of the four evangelists (with Mark, Luke, and John) who wrote what we

("Good News") of Christ, because they include many of the same stories, often in the same sequence, and include accounts of Christ's life and death. Of the four Gospels, two were written by members of Christ's original 12 disciples.

Many years following the death of Christ, around 41 and 50 AD, Matthew wrote his gospel account. He wrote the book in Aramaic in the hope that his account would convince his fellow people that Jesus was the Messiah and that His kingdom had been fulfilled in a spiritual way. It was an important message at a time when almost everyone was expecting the return of a militant messiah brandishing a sword.

It is claimed that Matthew preached the Gospel to the Jewish community in Judea, before going to other countries. Ancient writers are not agreed as to what these other countries are. It is thought he departed for






