Order closes former clerk's lawsuit

An administrative order on January 3 closed a wrongful termination/sexual harassment lawsuit filed 11 months earlier by a former municipal court clerk for the City of Purcell.

Defendants in the case were the City of Purcell and city manager Dale Bunn.

Bunn said Tuesday that the city's insurance carrier, Oklahoma Municipal Assurance Group, handled the negotiations with attorneys for Mary Desellier.

Bunn added he didn't know the amount, if any, paid to Desellier.

"All we got was a note it was settled," Bunn said.

Calls from **The Purcell Register** to Desillier's attorneys Blake Sonne and Amber Hurst and OMAG attorney Matt Love weren't returned.

The administrative order signed by U.S. District Judge David L. Russell provided scant information, stating only "On the representations

Board approves new contract with Midkiff

Purcell Public Schools Superintendent Jason Midkiff was given a new 2-year contract Monday evening.

The contract will run through the 2019-2020 school year.

In announcing the contract, school board members noted that Midkiff's base salary goes unchanged.

The district continues to be challenged by shrinking state support for public education.

In his monthly report to the board, Midkiff said even with higher enrollment, the district came up \$79,000 short when the State Department of Education send the mid-term adjustment over the Christmas break.

"There is just not enough money going into the formula to handle the increase in students each year," he said.

Midkiff added he is looking forward to exciting things now that the second semester is underway.

He also reminded the board that Monday will be a professional day in the district. Students will have the day off in observance of Martin Luther King Jr., Day.

Midkiff said the district's partnership with Aptegy will help increase parent

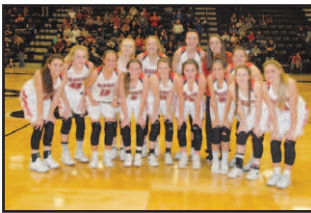

The McClain County GOP continues its “meet your governor candidate” series Monday evening at the Newcastle Storm Shelter.

Guest speakers at the 7 p.m. meeting will be Gary Jones and Dana Murphy.

Jones is currently Oklahoma’s state auditor and inspector. He is running for governor.

Murphy, a corporation commission member, is seeking the post of lieutenant governor.

Jones became state auditor and inspector in 2010.

He was previously a Comanche County commissioner.

In addition to being a certified public accountant, Jones is a certified fraud examiner.

He has spent much of his adult life seeking to expand government accountability and to improve the delivery of government services.

Jones and his wife, Mary Jane, have been married for 40 years and live on their farm southwest of Cache where they raised two children.

Mrs. Jones was a teacher for 36 years before retiring in 2011.

As state auditor, Jones is qualified to help solve Oklahoma’s continuing budget problems.

“I know what’s going on. I know how we got into this position. I know what’s necessary to fix it,” he said.

Murphy has served on the Oklahoma Corporation Commission since 2009.

The Woodward native now lives in Edmond. But she spends weekends working on the family farm in Ellis County.

“As a fifth-generation Oklahoman, I am proud of this state, and my passion for its success runs deep,” Murphy said. “It is no secret that Oklahoma is at a crossroads. Our state’s next set of leaders must be able to navigate solutions that spur our economic recovery while also addressing and improving basic public services.

“I believe my experience and skills as a proven problem-solver are needed now more than ever to help Oklahoma.”

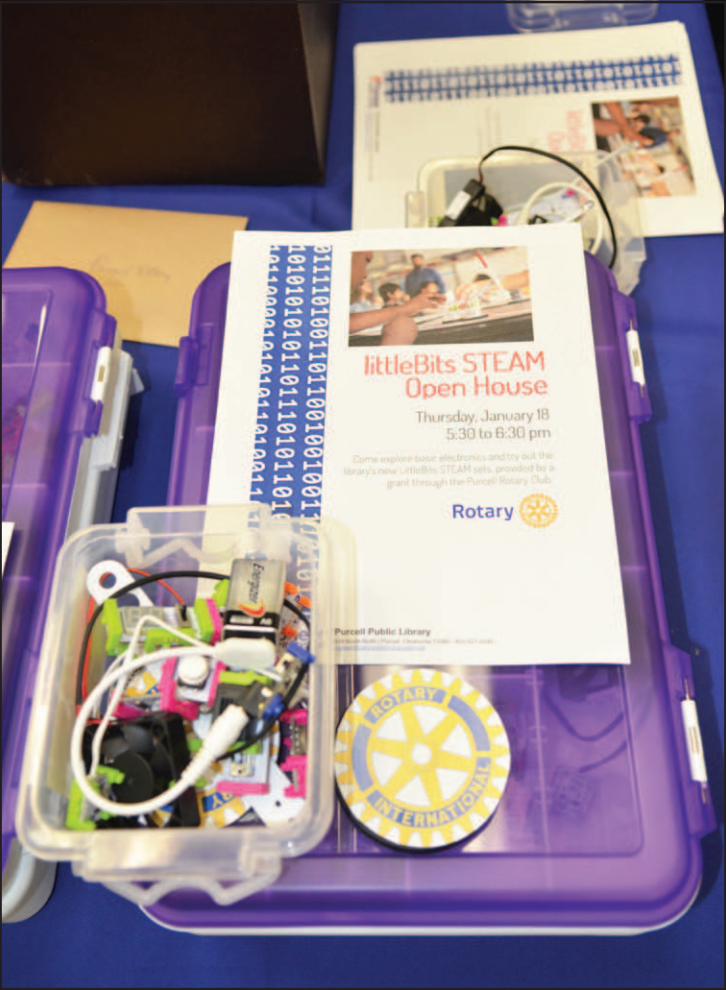
Applications now accepted for Leadership Oklahoma Class 32

Count me in as no better. Just the other day I was taking out some trash as I was leaving the house to go back down to the office.

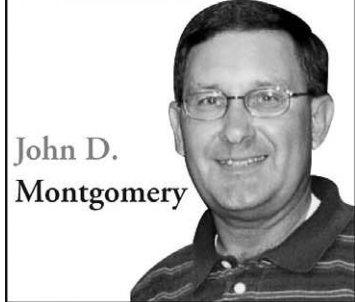

Postive revenue picture emerging for state

The state Board of Equalization – made up of most of the state's top executive officials – met in December certifying almost \$6 billion in revenue for the next fiscal year's budget, which begins in July.

Of that figure, lawmakers will be able to appropriate \$5.69 billion. The rest comes off the top into funds dedicated for things such as education, transportation, judicial and bonds.

That compares to the almost

\$5.3 billion certified for appropriation for FY18 and \$5 billion in actual appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for FY17.

The presentation showed Oklahoma's economy is recovering and job growth is up. It also showed Oklahoma is experiencing revenue growth, with next year's revenue estimated at \$360 million above the current fiscal year.

The board's report shows general revenue is projected

to be up 5.9 percent in the state when comparing projections for this past December to next December. That includes increases in categories such as mixed beverage tax receipts, gross production taxes on oil and gas, individual and corporate income taxes, and sales and use taxes.

The numbers are positive, and we have reason to believe in a driving economy in 2018. Revenue in the state is up for 11 of the past 12 months. State

nonfarm employment rates are higher than they've been since 2015. Employers in most sectors say they are hiring.

Oklahoma crude oil and gas prices and the number of active rigs in the state are both up from late 2016. This is significant because one in six Oklahoma jobs is in the energy sector.

The Country appears to be recovering with U.S. Real Gross Domestic Product Growth higher than it's been since the first quarter of 2015, and that

will be positive for Oklahoma.

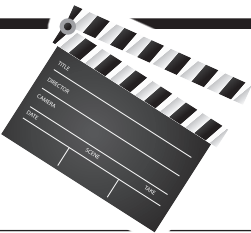
In addition, we're getting some things cleaned up in our state agencies so they can operate more efficiently, saving taxpayer dollars. New leadership is in place in several areas, and light is shining on areas that need further restructuring.

The governor still maintains that even with all the positive numbers there will still be a

Whatever, it’s a well deserved award for a fantastically bizarre performance. I’m glad to see Franco get some recognition for it.

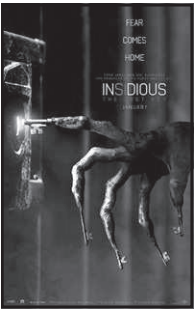
Sadly things are looking pretty sparse as far as reviews go this week. Just one new release for our area.

I mean I suppose the first one was competent enough as far as horror films go, and its sequel had some fun with the idea of a spirit realm where time is meaningless, even if the dialog was laughably bad at times.

But I just don’t see the appeal of these prequels.

This movie has the same problem all prequels have, something that’s especially bad for a horror film.

We know for a fact that nothing, no matter how terrifying, can harm our main characters.

They just can’t. They’re in the next chronological movie.

So even if throughout the film it looks like our heroes are in mortal danger, we all know in the back of our heads that they’re actually invincible.

It removes any tension.

So for me most of the movie amounted to sitting around being bored while waiting around for the next lame jump scare.

At least the third Insidious film, and first prequel, introduced a new main character to follow.

Sure Elise and her two goof-ball sidekicks were summoned to save the day in the end, but they were still second fiddle to this new girl who could actually be harmed.

Here they forgo any of that and make Elise the main character. Great for those wanting to learn more about her backstory I suppose. Not so much for making an actual scary horror movie though.

Even if Elise wasn’t clad in impervious plot armor though, the scares here still would have been pretty lame.

The whole film just amounts to Elise quietly sneaking around her old house for long stretches of time, only to finally end with a loud sound and a spooky face to go with it.

Worst still was all the film’s fake out scares. It almost became comical with how many there were.

At one point it was like Elise was playing peek-a-boo with the evil spirit, just waiting for it to pop up and scare her. I couldn’t help but laugh.

The most annoying element by far though was Elise’s ghost hunter sidekicks Tucker (Angus Sampson) and Specs (Leigh Whannell).

In the previous movies those two characters did their best to add some levity to the story and maybe even a funny line or two here and there. Overall I didn’t mind them much either way.

Here they decided to crank their antics up to eleven.

Every single line either of them spoke ranged from cringe worthy to creepy.

I know they were going for dorky and endearing, but man did they miss the mark, especially when the two started flirting. I just wanted to disappear into my seat during those parts.

Thankfully they don’t get a huge amount of dialogue. Still, I can’t deny the strong urge I had to leave the theater every time either of them were on screen. It was that bad.

I’ll give the movie some credit. It was certainly more unpredictable than any of the previous films.

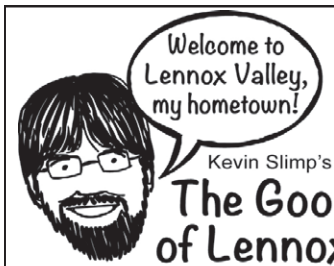

Copper remains hot item

Two defendants charged with felonies

The first two felony filings of the year name a pair of alleged burglars who targeted a Goldsby business in December.

Kevin R. Moore, 42, of Oklahoma City and Gregory J. Moore, 32, of Bethany are each charged with second degree burglary, entering with intent to steal copper, possession of burglary tools and obstructing an officer.

The charges against Kevin Moore were filed after a former felony conviction.

The men are free after posting

\$8,000 bond each. Preliminary hearing conferences for both will be 9 a.m. January 31.

According to an affidavit, McClain County Deputy David Childress was contacted December 14 by Donnie Anderson, chief of the District 21 Drug and Violent Crime Task Force, about an ongoing copper theft from Eagle Drilling in Goldsby.

Anderson said the thefts were occurring at night and the suspects were possibly entering the fenced yard on the west.

Childress went to the business around 10:40 p.m. the following night and used a

thermal imaging device to scan the area.

The deputy was 100 yards east of the main entry when he saw two men cutting wire from oil field equipment.

When the suspects saw Chil-

With more cold weather on the way, here’s a great soup to make.

Slow Cooker Potato Soup

6 slices cooked bacon, diced
3-4 cups good-quality chicken or vegetable stock

2 pounds Yukon gold potatoes, peeled (if desired) and diced

1 medium white or yellow onion, peeled and diced

4 tablespoons butter

1/3 cup all-purpose flour

12-ounce can 2% evaporated milk

1 cup shredded reduced-fat sharp cheddar cheese

1/2 cup plain low-fat Greek yogurt or low-fat sour cream

1 teaspoon Kosher salt, or more to taste

1/2 teaspoon freshly-cracked black pepper

Optional toppings: thinly-sliced green onions or chives, extra shredded cheese, extra bacon, sour cream

Add bacon, 3 cups chicken stock, potatoes and onion to the bowl of a large slow cooker, and stir to combine. Cook on low for 6-8 hours or on high for 3-4 hours, or until the potatoes are completely tender and cooked through.

Once the soup has slow cooked and is about ready to serve, cook the butter in a small saucepan on the stove over medium-high heat until it has melted. Whisk in the flour until it is completely combined, and then cook for 1 minute, stirring occasionally

Gradually add in the evaporated milk while whisking it together with the flour mixture, and continue whisking until the mixture is completely smooth. Let the mixture continue cooking until it reaches a simmer, stirring occasionally, and then it should get really thick.

Immediately pour the milk mixture into the slow cooker with the potatoes, and stir until combined. Add in the cheddar cheese, Greek yogurt (or sour cream), salt and pepper, and stir until combined.

If you would like the soup to be even thicker, you can use a potato masher or a large spoon to mash about half of the potatoes (while the soup is still in the slow cooker) to thicken the soup up. 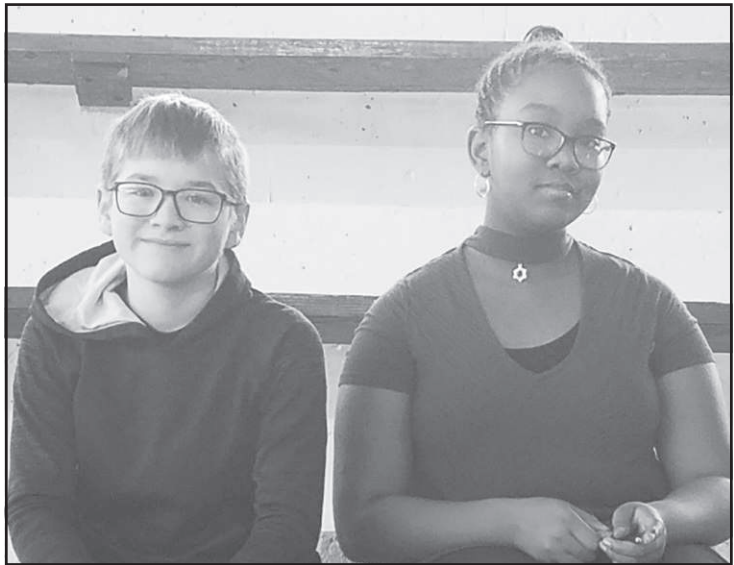

Results

The annual National Reining Horse Association Futurity was held November 23 through December 2 at the Oklahoma State Fairgrounds Arena. This year marks the 51st Anniversary of the NRHA Futurity. The world’s best reining horses and competitors came to Oklahoma City to compete for more than \$2 million in total purse and cash prizes.

The NRHA Futurity showcases the exciting performances of the world’s best 3-year-old reining horses and riders.

Each year the Futurity hosts the North American Affiliate Championships (NAAC). The Championships are for NRHA members and horses who have qualified through their respective Regional Affiliate Finals. Each final sends its eight highest placing riders, plus ties, to the NAAC to compete for North American bragging rights.

This year marks the return of

the Collegiate Judging Contest. There were a few changes from previous years, with the biggest changes being in the creation of a junior and senior division, and the opportunity for each college to bring up to two teams per division. Contestants completed a penalty clip test, rulebook test, and judge two sets of 10 live runs during the Open Level 4 Semi-Finals.

This contest supports an important sector of the equine industry. These contestants are about to enter a new phase of their life in the work force, and any opportunity we have to expose them to high level reining, judging and scribing, the more likely they will continue to be involved with NRHA and the sport of reining. During the contest, the senior division acted as scribes for the junior division and vice-versa. An awards breakfast was held the following morning to announce placings and celebrate the winners.

With beautiful horses, talented riders, exciting music and costumes, Freestyle Reining was back again at the 2017

Futurity. In addition to the 12 entries, of which only the top six will go to the International competition, NRHA this year partnered with the Oklahoma City Convention and Visitors Bureau so that members could vote online to determine four additional riders to compete in the 2017 NRHA Invitational Freestyle contest to compete for a \$20,000 prize.

A Celebration of Champions event was held in the Super Barn just prior to the crowning of the 2017 NRHA Futurity Champion, featuring food and beverages, and surprise thank you gifts for attendees provided by new sponsor, Farnham Equine.

The annual horse sale featured an outstanding group of top producing broodmares with proven performance bloodlines in foal the hottest sires in the reining industry, followed by sales of yearlings, 2-year-olds and finished show horses. A special stallion auction was held with all proceeds

Spring oats for forage

There are currently few opportunities remaining in our area to produce late-winter and early-spring forage if you did not plant wheat pasture, annual ryegrass, or have fescue pastures. One option to consider that may offer some hope for relief is spring-planted oats.

Oats can be planted in late winter through early spring for pasture or hay. Even though there is substantial risk in-

volved with this strategy due to weather, it may offer some help for increasing a short forage supply.

The primary considerations for success are that it must be drill-planted on a prepared seedbed when the opportunity arises and managed accordingly.

There are not wide selections of oat varieties available, but those for use in the southern USA are preferable to northern USA varieties. The window for

spring-planted oats is between February 1 and March 10 with an optimal planting time during the last full week of February.

Oats should be drill-planted on a conventionally prepared seedbed at a seeding rate of 80 to 100 pounds of seed per acre. Seeding depth can be as deep as 1-1/2 inches, but a depth of only 1/2 to 3/4 inch will increase the rate of emergence, establish-

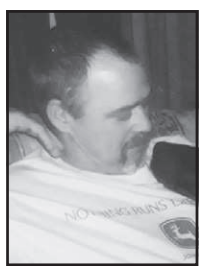

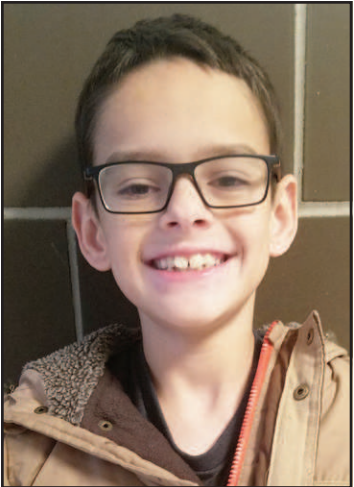

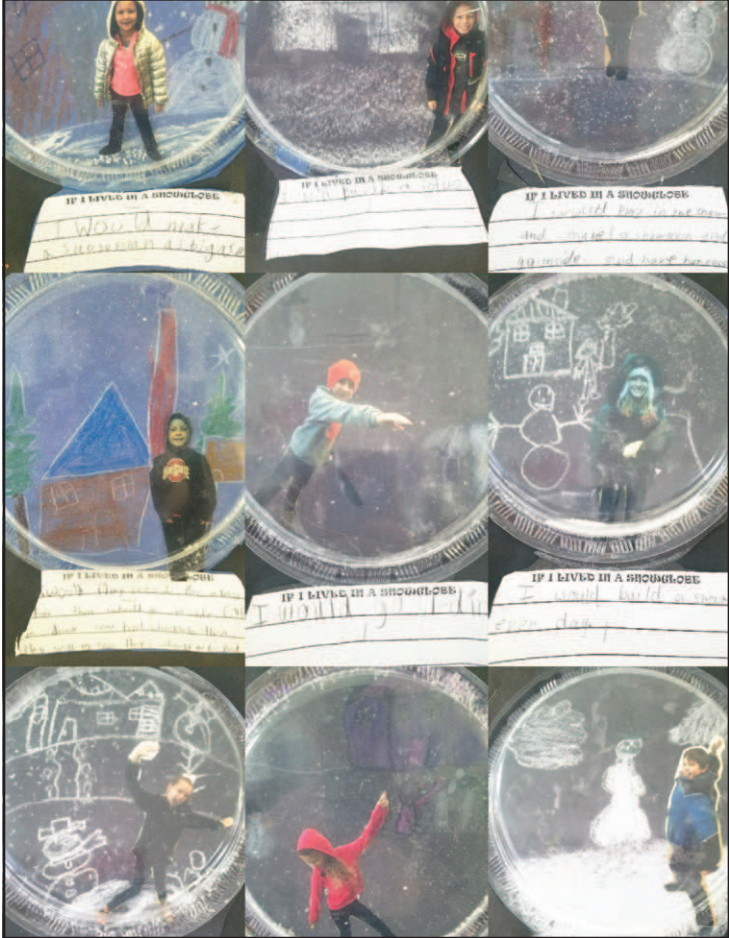

Chickasaws took this style and incorporated it into their culture by constructing the piece with the newly acquired glass beads. This type of bead-work was practiced by many of the Southeastern tribal cultures.

Forage:

ment, and forage production potential.

Forage production potential from a spring-planted oat crop will average 1,500 to 2,000 pounds of forage per acre. Based on the forage production of spring planted oats, planning should include N fertilizer at a rate of 60 to 75 pounds actual N per acre after establishment.

Spring-planted oats harvested for hay should be cut at early heading. Once the seed heads begin to emerge, there will be no appreciable increase in yield.

Likewise, once the seed heads begin to emerge, there will be a substantial decrease in nutritive value due to the accumulation of stem tissue and also leaf loss. For grazing, oat plants should be a minimum of

six inches tall. Be sure there is an adequate root system developed as well before grazing.

Spring planted oats mature quite rapidly once the spring temperatures began warming. Each acre of spring-planted oats should be able to provide between 35 and 60 days of grazing for a mature beef animal. Growing animals (750 pounds) can be stocked at approximately 1.5 animals per acre for 60 days.

Do not consider spring-planted oats to be the fool-proof solution to remedy a short forage supply. There are substantial risks involved mainly due to dry weather. With planning and a little luck, a spring-planted oat crop may add some additional forage to an already short or non-existent forage supply.

According to an affidavit, two Chickasaw Lighthorse Police officers were called to the casino around 7:30 p.m. December 23.

When they contacted Vanderburg, she gave her name as Marissa Jones and said she was 22.

When the officers pointed out that she didn’t look like the photo on the ID, Vanderburg said the picture was taken a long time ago.

After the officers told her they believed she was lying, Vanderburg gave her true

name and said the checks and ID belonged to her brother, Anthony’s, girlfriend.

Vanderburg gave the officers the checkbook, which was found to contain Marissa Jones’ Social Security card, as well.

A records check on the ID and Social Security card confirmed they were stolen and a theft report had been made to Edmond police.

Also in the checkbook was a receipt from Remington Park Casino for a \$199.50 check Vanderburg allegedly cashed there.

Vanderburg allegedly told the investigators she was instructed to cash the checks by Mark Linn who reportedly knew Marissa Jones.

However, Linn denied any knowledge of checks and said he didn’t know Marissa Jones.

The officers also contacted Marissa Jones, who said her purse was stolen from a residence about a week ago.

She said she did not know Linn or Vanderburg and was never in a relationship with an Anthony.

Glasgow told the investigator he forgot to return it to the department, but admitted using it at his home, according to the affidavit.

Authorities searched the Washington residence and found an evidence bag bearing a barcode from the evidence room and containing nine .40-caliber rounds of ammunition.

Glasgow reportedly admitted taking the ammunition from the evidence room to be destroyed by the bomb squad at the Norman Police Department.

Instead, after being suspended from the department, he removed the evidence bag from his patrol car’s trunk and placed it in his closet at home.

On November 21 Glasgow was able to access the department’s evidence manager

system and marked the ammunition as destroyed.

However, the Norman Police Department evidence clerk said Glasgow never brought any evidence in to be destroyed.

In fact, there were no entries of incoming ammunition from Purcell in the Norman Police Department ledger, according to the affidavit.

Purcell City Manager Dale Bunn confirmed Thursday that Glasgow resigned on December 16.

Glasgow was suspended with pay after being charged in March with reckless conduct with a firearm, a misdemeanor, after he allegedly shot a neighbor’s dog while intoxicated.

Subsequently he was charged with violating a protective order in July and on November 30 prosecutors added two felony counts of child abuse by injury.

When the child abuse charges were filed, his status with the department was changed to unpaid administrative leave.

He was freed in that case after posting a \$30,000 bond.

Boys take second after double overtime loss

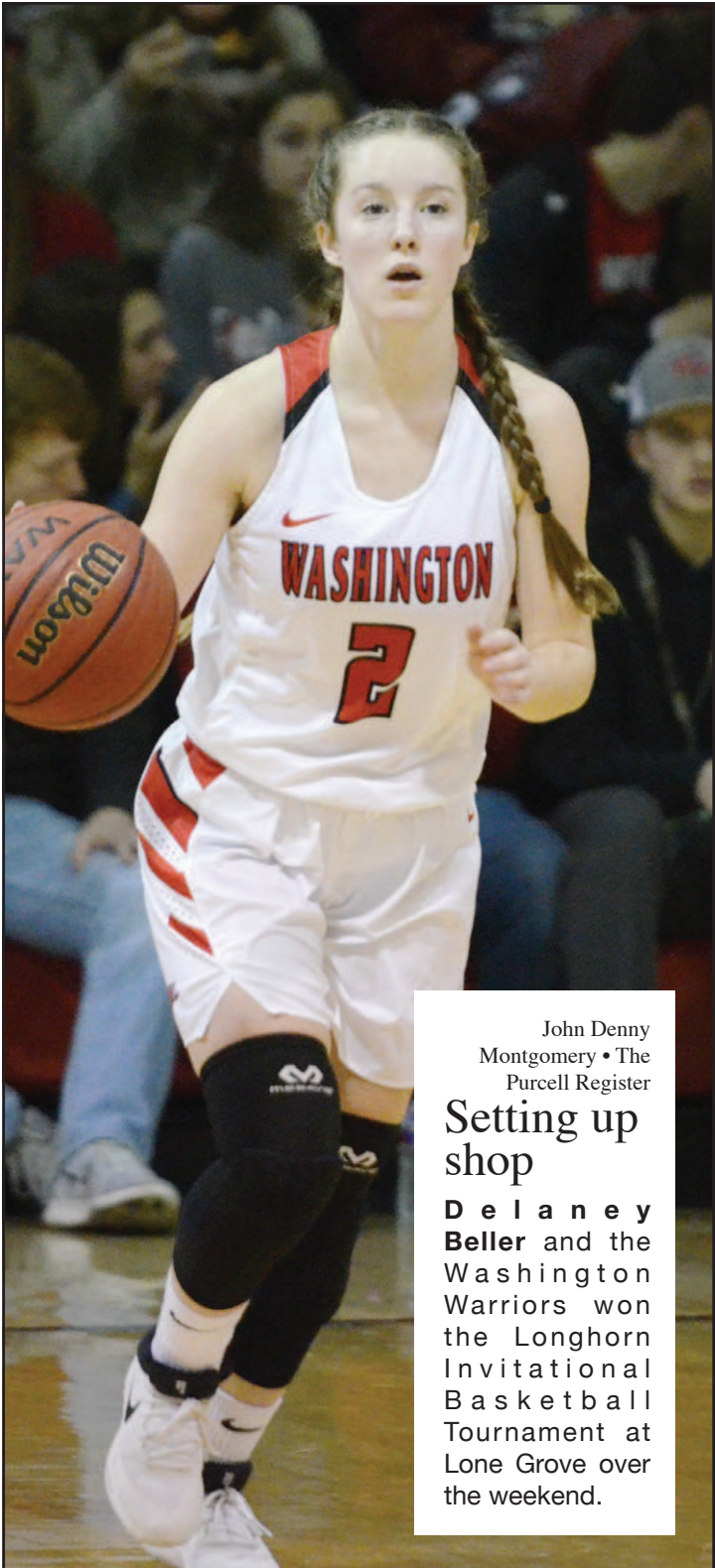

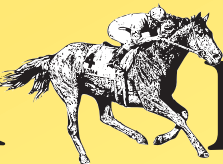

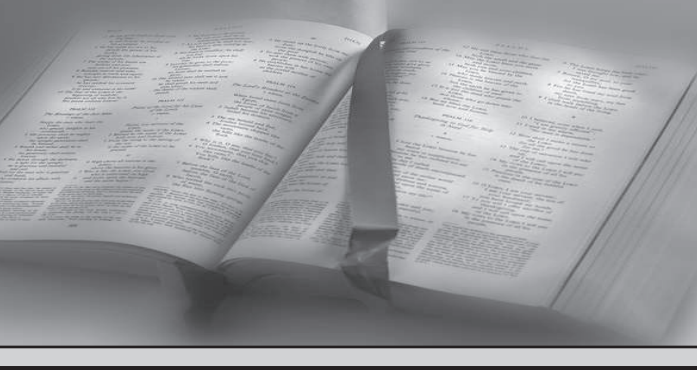

Welcome, good friends, to the “front-porch” gospel. To start off 2018, let’s make very sure that we include this in our resolutions: I resolve to be a “can” man!

As you may well know, there are plenty of “cannot” people in the world. In every room, I guess, there is a “cannot” man. That includes every organization in the world, including, I’m sorry to say, the church.

But there’s something greater for you and me to know today: A “can” man can often overrule a hundred “cannot” men. I’m glad to know that. Sometimes they do not overcome the negativity, but their spirit never dies, even if their dreams do not immediately come true.

One of the greatest “can” men in all the Bible is a man back in the Old Testament named Caleb. I want to be like Caleb more in 2018 than I was in 2017. I hope you do, too.

Do you remember when the 12 spies in Moses’ day go over to spy out the land of Canaan, as recorded in Numbers 13? All of the men come back with a similar view of the land.

“The land where you sent us ... surely floweth with milk and honey” (v. 27) is the consensus. They recognize the beauty and value of the land they had only dreamed of before. But there is a problem. Ten of the spies add

this footnote to their report:

“Nevertheless, the people be strong that dwell in the land, and the cities are walled, and very great: and moreover we saw the children of Anak there” (v. 28).

This lack of faith infuriates Joshua and Caleb, the two “faithful” spies who had gone over to view Canaan with the other ten. Caleb steps up immediately and “stills the people,” saying, “Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it!” (v. 30).

But as strong as Caleb is – as positive, determined, faithful, encouraging, purpose-driven, and God-fearing – this servant of the Lord is unable to infuse faith in the cowardly spies. As a result, God sends these Israelites on a 40-year exile walking in circles in the wilderness between the Red Sea and the Jordan River!

But, listen, 40 years don’t weaken Caleb! After those four long, hard decades – after burying every man over the age of 20 in the wilderness (except Joshua and Caleb) – Caleb leads the march across the Jordan River. And after they overtake Jericho, Joshua begins to divvy out the inheritances. It is then that Caleb steps up much as he had earlier and reminds Joshua of his faith:

“I am as strong this day as I

was in the day that Moses sent me: as my strength was then, even so is my strength now,” he says.

Then he points over to a mountain nearby, a mountain in the land of Hebron, and says to Joshua, “Give me this mountain!” (Joshua 14:11-12). And Joshua gives him that mountain, the blessed land where Abraham and Sarah and other great patriarchs had long been buried.

Let us take the spirit of Caleb with this week and this year! Let’s be a “Can” man like that great old soldier Caleb! When the “cannot” attitude is in vogue among the Israelites – when he easily could have joined the “cannot” crowd – he chooses to have that positive can attitude that says this can be done – will be done! – with the Lord’s help!

We know there will be many “cannot” people that we encounter. But, friends, we are not going to be one of them, because they never, ever won a battle for the Lord. Never! All the Lord’s battles are won by men and women who have the faith to say, “With the Lord’s help, we can – we will! – do this!”

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Gallup polls consistently show that 40 percent of Americans say they attend church every Sunday. But only 20 percent actually do attend church. So, we are in the minority. We are the 20 percent who choose to bring our gifts to the Christ Child each week, just as the three wise men once did. But we bring not gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, but our very selves.

This past Sunday we closed the Christmas season with the Feast of the Epiphany – the visit of the Magi (wise men) to the stable. These men were from Persia, or present-day Iran. They were a group of curious astrologers, scientists of their day. They knew the Jewish scriptures. And they read the stars to look for patterns and insights.

They were seeking the King of the Jews and bring him gifts – perhaps to create an alliance, perhaps to establish a means of peace with a foreign king. Their idea of a king would have been the same as the Jewish people – a king to raise up a rebellion against Roman oppression, to throw off the shackles of slavery. But what kind of king will this child become?

Each of the four Gospels presents a different portrait of Jesus painted by a different artist, each of whom has his own particular technique and

sensitivity. Each of these is called a Gospel – “good news.” But the good news is maybe not what many people think it is. In these texts, you can find “good advice” on how you should live and how you should pray. You can also come to believe that if you do good things you will one day be in heaven with God. But “good advice” is still not the “good news.”

The good news that the birth of Jesus brought is that God loves this world so much that he sent his Son to this world – and that from now on this world will never be the same. The message of this child would not be about how to escape the world, but how the one true God was changing it – radically, and forever.

And the change would come about – not by threats or bullying, but by service and self-sacrifice. The change would come about not by using weapons, but by building solidarity – solidarity between the haves and the have-nots, the rich and the poor.

The change would not come by a quick revolution. Those kinds of revolutions do not last. But the change would come by the slow movement in people’s hearts, in their attitudes, in their perceptions. This is the real subversive and political nature of Jesus’ redemption.

“He would go on ruling... until he has put all his enemies under his feet... Death is the last enemy to be destroyed. When everything is put in order under Him, then He will take His place with God in heaven, so that God may be all in all.” (1 Cor. 15:25-28)

We are living in the time between that explosive event of Christ’s birth and the final ordering of the world, for which Christ is working, with our help. Once you have grasped this, then everything will change for you - your belief, your attitudes, your expectations, and not least, your new sense of belonging, a belonging which springs up among all who share in this.

The Magi came to the stable to see the newborn King of the Jews. What they found was the Son of God. We, like the Magi, are the 20 percent who seek wisdom. We come to form an alliance with this child, this Wonderful Counsellor, this Prince of Peace. We come to work with Him to make our world a better place.

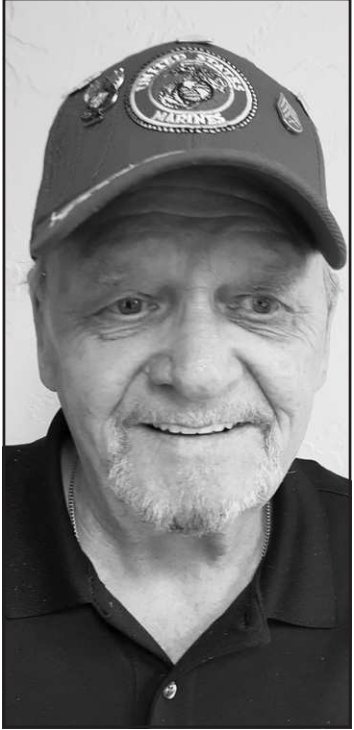

Veteran of the Week

Many have asked how many veterans were assisted last year who received a 100 percent disability rating; and the totals are in. We had 316 veterans awarded a 100 percent service-connected disability. These veterans will receive a combined annual amount of more than 18 million dollars per year.

As a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation, we use your donations to support our mission of making a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. Some have helped through donations of cars, trucks and motorcycles. We can give these to veterans in need or sell them to raise funds. The proceeds from the sale of these items have provided us with resources to help families suffering from the bitter cold and have money to cover the costs of medical testing for the evidence needed to support a VA claim for benefits.

For more information on how you can help, please stop by our office at 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman any Tuesday or Thursday morning. To become a volunteer please

stop by to fill out a volunteer application. A background check is required.

Our Veteran of the Week was a man who did everything he could to help others. William (Pat) Pattillo went to meet his Heavenly Father last week after a long illness. Pat served in the United States Marine Corps during the Vietnam War. Many who have visited us in Norman will remember Pat as a very knowledgeable person who always did his best to help every veteran he met to receive the VA benefits for which they were eligible. Pat was a person who cared for others even when he was ill. He volunteered his time with us for many years. Thank you, Pat, for being my friend!

There were only 198 veterans who braved the cold to see us for help with their VA claims and questions. For many of them, it was their first time to apply for VA benefits even though they were in their late 80s and 90s. They are finding out that it is costly to get older as we need more help doing the things that were once very easy for us.

One of the things I hate to see is for a couple who have worked hard their whole life, and then one of them needs extra care that they cannot afford. Sometimes we can help a veteran to service-connect an injury that occurred in the military that may help out financially enough to allow them to keep their assets.

If a veteran is approved for a service-connected disability of 70 percent or more they are eligible to stay in one of our states veteran's facilities for free. There are countless ways to receive VA benefits. It is a lot easier to receive these benefits if veterans apply before their health deteriorates to the point they are unable to be evaluated for a disability. For instance, to be approved for service-connection of hearing loss and tinnitus the veteran is required to take a hearing test provided by a VA contract provider. Some of the veterans' families who visit with us have waited until the veteran is unable by physical or mental disability to take a hearing test.

VA benefits are available to most everyone who served in the military. During the years that I have been assisting veterans and their families receive VA benefits, I have found that the only people who usually lose their claim for benefits are the ones that quit trying. With the availability of VA DBQ (Disability Benefits Questionnaires) to use as evidence to support service-connection of a disability, you should not have a huge problem.

Another thing we have not written about recently is a NEXUS letter which is a statement that provides a link to something that occurred in the military to a condition you have today. An example might be when a veteran suffered MST (military sexual trauma) while in the military. The VA has both a DBQ for MST and a VA form 21-078A that is used when filing a claim for benefits

based on MST. During the time that we have been helping veterans, I have helped many veterans who were victims of MST while in the military. We have mental health providers who can help with a diagnosis of this disability.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I received the following VA rating decisions last week. There were 11 veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive a combined annual amount of \$439,809 per year. Fourteen veterans received VA rating decisions from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$213,950 per year. Four surviving spouses were approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their spouse's military service.

Our volunteers who provide services to the surviving spouses of deceased veterans continue to make a difference. When a surviving spouse is approved for DIC, that person will receive from \$1,250 to \$1,500 each month. Some may be eligible for Pension benefits and Aid and Attendance.

Our drivers, Clayton and Louie, spent 58 hours this week transporting 16 folks 1,177 miles. As we continue to grow, we hope to add more days to our weekly schedule to serve the thousands of veterans and surviving spouses who have never applied for VA benefits.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.
