

Football tragedy at Lexington

Lexington Middle School became the second school in Oklahoma this football season to deal with the most unspeakable tragedy.

Eighth grader Riley Boatwright died from injuries sustained on the gridiron in a junior high game against Stratford Tuesday night in Lexington.

Details of the play were unavailable as of press time Wednesday morning.

Counselors were called into the middle school Wednesday morning to help console classmates of Boatwright.

In a statement, Lexington Schools said, "Our school and community hearts are

heavy after the loss of a Bulldog student and incredible young man. Lexington Public Schools will provide counselors and safe spaces for students and staff in the days to come as needed to share memories and feelings."

Lexington Superintendent Chad Hall told **The Purcell Register** that he had no immediate comment out of respect to the Boatwright family.

It was less than two weeks ago that Southwest Covenant football player Peter Webb died from football related injuries.

Funeral services for Boatwright are pending with Wilson-Little Funeral Home in Purcell.

Annual readership survey confirms newspaper readers are voters

Newspaper readers are voters, and the National Newspaper Association's annual readership survey of more than 1,000 people from rural and urban communities across the country once again validated that point.

The survey – conducted annually for NNA by Susquehanna Polling and Research of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania found that 85 percent of community newspaper readers said they are "very likely" to vote in elections either later this year or in 2020, compared to 73 percent of non-readers.

Further, respondents rated community newspapers as the most trusted source of information about candidates running for public office.

On a scale of 1 to 10, respondents rated how much they trusted a source's information when it came to learning about (58 percent). Less than half of candidates for public office. (A the respondents seek out direct

When it comes to seeking out information about candidates for public office at the federal, state or local level, 68 percent of respondents turn to national network TV news "very or somewhat often," closely followed by community newspapers (61 percent) and cable TV news programs

political parties (42 percent), talk radio or satellite radio Community newspapers news program (38 percent), metropolitan newspapers that cover major cities and suburbs (33 percent) and Facebook or Twitter (29 percent) for information.

> "Overall, great news for local community newspapers," said NNA Vice President Matt Adelman, publisher of the Douglas (Wyoming) Budget. "[The results] show Facebook and even direct mail have far less impact and readership than the political consultants insist, especially on the trustworthy scale where our newspapers rank about even with national news programs, but far ahead of the rest of the pack."

Both readers and non-readers also think it is important for the public to have access to public notices from local governments

Responsibility of Home Owner to Maintain Property

It is the responsibility of the home owner and or tenant to maintain their property or be subject to a \$260 fine. Violations are as follows:

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.

2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.

3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).

4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.

Mental health issues dog storm survivors

After a natural disaster, survivors can have psychological fallouts for weeks and months, or even lifetimes, research shows.

Xavier Delgado was 10 in May 2013 when an EF5 tornado hit Moore. He nearly was one of the town's 24 fatalities as the storm, with its 210 mph winds, struck Plaza Towers Elementary School.

Xavier, his abdomen impaled by a spear of debris, spent 40 minutes under rubble before rescuers got to him. His parents, Athena and Simon Delgado were relieved Xavier was alive - he was even joking with nurses at the hospital.

Xavier seemed emotionally fine. But later, while watching coverage of the storm, he sat on the floor counting on his fingers the number of friends he had lost. Seven.

loved, and he was afraid of death, his mother said.

"Your kids are so resilient, they'll bounce back? No, they don't," Athena Delgado said. "Something this dramatic that happens ... it follows them forever."

Four years after the tornado, Xavier took his own life.

The Delgado family-including Xavier's little sister, Haley, who also was at Plaza Towers Elementary that day – now shares their story of the deadly delayed effects of natural disasters as part of their advocacy for better mental health services in Oklahoma.

Families, community members, psychologists and school officials are saying the Federal Emergency Management Agency, construction crews and church groups aren't enough to help communities recover.

The report urges local governments to create preparedness plans for psychological recovery, just as they do for He stopped doing things he physical infrastructure.

This spring, not even a year after Hurricane Michael hit the

Gulf Coast, school officials in Panama City, Florida, asked for extra help at every school, saying more than a third of the students and teachers in the Panhandle district are showing symptoms of clinical depression, post-traumatic stress or anxiety.

Eight years after a tornado destroyed a third of Joplin, Missouri, mental health professionals are reaching out to survivors with the message that they still may need psychological help and should seek it now.

The lingering aftermath of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, called attention to the importance of mental health services, experts say, but it was Hurricane Katrina in 2005 that elevated public awareness of the need for emotional help after natural disasters.

According to the American Psychological Society, as many as four in 10 survivors can experience a mental or behavioral

Older mares face reproductive challenges

A horse owner recently asked me: "I have a 17-year-old mare from whom we really wish to get a foal. She has proven herself over the years as a true athlete. We have tried now for two seasons without success with a stallion of proven fertility. My regular veterinarian told me that she may have poor fertility and be hard to get pregnant. Is that really the case?"

Actually, that may very well be the case. A mare's reproductive tract undergoes changes with age. The older she is, the more likely she will have problems becoming pregnant.

At 17, her eggs are starting to age and have an increased risk of chromosomal abnormalities. The lining of the uterus (endometrium) degenerates and becomes fibrotic over time.

These degenerative changes occur mainly with aging and not necessarily with the wear and tear of pregnancy. In fact, regular pregnancies tend to and thinner mares. reduce or suppress many de-

generative processes. Another problem that occurs

with older maiden mares is that they lose the ability to clear the uterus of fluid (secretions) that is a normal part of the reproductive cycle.

Normally as a mare cycles, the cervix (a barrier that protects the uterus from outside contaminants) softens and allows normal uterine contractions to push out accumulating fluid.

In older maiden mares, the cervix fails to relax and fluid builds up inside the uterus. This fluid is toxic to both sperm and an embryo, if one develops after breeding.

Also in older mares, the cells lining the uterus become less functional and are less likely to allow the placenta to develop fully or to support a growing fetus in mid- to late pregnancy. Also, older mares' external reproductive tract conformation may become tipped forward over time, especially in taller

with multiple foalings, but it may happen with age. Either way, this condition increases the risk of reproductive tract contamination and infections.

With all of these factors going against an older maiden mare, one might wonder if it is worth the effort in trying to get them pregnant. Still, not all mares age the same way, and many of these conditions can be diagnosed and treated.

For years, veterinarians at Oklahoma State University's Center for Veterinary Health Sciences specializing in equine reproduction have developed a clinic specifically dedicated to the older barren mare.

From basic breeding management, to delicate laser surgery, to embryo transfer, and more recently, the ability to aspirate the mare's eggs from her ovaries for in-vitro fertilization (see more at okla. st/miracles).

son, Xavier, to go to therapy, but he didn't. When his pediatrician assured her that children are resilient, that Xavier would bounce back, she attributed the change to attention-deficit/hvperactivity disorder, or ADHD. Later, another doctor said Xavier most likely had PTSD and survivor's guilt.

After the funeral, the whole family began seeing a therapist. Simon, Athena and their youngest daughter, Haley, still go regularly.

"Until she turns 18, until she's out from under my roof, she'll be in therapy," Athena said.

Six months after the May 20, 2013, tornado, Moore Youth and Family Services started Project Moore Hope, a program to provide services, including in schools, to tornado victims, according to Lisa Williams, CEO of the nonprofit.

Williams, a psychologist, said her research showed mental health needs increase five to seven years after a disaster. Researchers saw this after Hurricane Katrina.

It's now been six years for Moore. Williams said the program has seen an increase in school counselors referring kids to therapy, especially when the weather threatens. The second- and third-graders who survived are now entering high school.

So far, they've received a \$1.2 million federal grant, and Athena Delgado urged her the hope of more money from a recent disaster relief bill passed by Congress.

> "It (mental health) was a piece of what we did, and now it has become a focus of what we do. That's the difference," said Sharon Michalik, the school district's director of communications.

Hundreds of students have been acting out in ways they didn't before the hurricane, according to a report on mental health needs the district released in May.

Schools reported students talking about wanting to die, attempting suicide on campus, and family members of students dying by suicide in the months after Michael.

If the district can get the money from federal or state agencies, it would be used over the next three years to provide each of the district's 37 schools with mental health teams.

School officials said that since the hurricane, the crisis team responded to hundreds of incidents involving mental health concerns, some of which led to hospitalization through the Baker Act, the Florida statute that allows involuntary examination of individuals due to signs of mental illness or threats of harm.

"Once in a blue moon, a student might need that level of intervention," Michalik said, "but it wasn't daily. It wasn't weekly."

Mental health experts warn that trauma peaks seven to 10 months after a storm.

"We really saw that, because that's really where we finished

the school year and where we are right now, as people begin to try to grasp that this is the new normal," Michalik said.

When schools reopened their doors in November, a month after the hurricane, the workbook "After the Storm" was provided to address questions and emotions students might experience.

In Panama City, community mental health partners, operate Project Hope, a preventionoriented crisis counseling program funded by FEMA. It maintains a presence at recovery centers and community events, and it has access to the schools.

But in Oklahoma, the Delgado family and other Moore residents have lobbied at the Oklahoma State Capitol, urging legislators to require a tornado shelter in every school. It didn't pass this year, but they vow to continue.

They also plan to start a foundation, Speak About Your Doubt, to help pay for mental health bills of those who survived the 2013 tornado. Simon Delgado said he knows Moore's teenagers still are struggling.

"They struggle, but they struggle in silence. They don't know how to reach out," he said.

Xavier's sister, Marissa, 21, recently had a baby. She named him: "Lincoln Xavier."

As Benjamin Franklin famously wrote, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

That is certainly the case with the flu vaccine, which according to the Center for Disease Control, prevented 5.3 million Americans from getting the flu and stopped 85,000 influenza-related hospitalizations in 2016-2017.

Furthermore, a 2015 CDC study revealed that, over nine years, the flu vaccine saved more than 40,000 lives while another showed that for every 4,000 people getting the vaccine, one life is saved.

As we near the 2019-2020 flu season, it's important to make sure you and your family are protected from the flu. Except for a few special cases, everyone over the age of six months should get the flu vaccine not just for their protection, but for the protection of those around them.

Pregnant women are espe-

risk for complications, but they contracting the flu. can also pass on immunity to their babies before birth and continue providing antibody protection if nursing.

The CDC recommends getting vaccinated before the end of October, however, even a shot later in the season can provide some protection.

Following a vaccination, it can take up to two weeks to develop the antibodies needed to protect you from the flu. In addition to getting vaccinated, don't forget to take additional steps to increase your protection, such as avoiding sick people when possible and washing your hands to reduce the spread of germs.

If you or a loved one gets the flu, please stay home from work, school, or social gatherings to keep from spreading the virus to the rest of your community. While this year's vaccine is no guarantee you won't catch the flu, it can help protect you from the most widespread strains and even make your illness less severe.

As mentioned earlier, there are a few very small groups of individuals who should not get the flu vaccine, such as those with a compromised immunity or intense egg allergies.

A waste of time and energy

When lawmakers returned for legislative session after the extended work period, House Democrats had an opportunity to turn a new leaf and actually get things done for the American people.

Unfortunately, instead of focusing on areas where bipartisan cooperation is possible, Democrats remain fixated on dead-end investigations and igniting baseless impeachment inquiries.

That violence hits its peak towards the end of the film, where John decides to turn his property into an R-rated recreation of "Home Alone."

Just imagine a grown up Kevin McCallister who went off to Nam, got PTSD from fighting Viet Cong soldiers in tunnels, and decided to use all that experience against a group of Mexican criminals who dared to harm the closest thing he had to a daughter, and you've got a pretty decent picture of what happens in the final act of the film.

Is it a well told story? Not particularly. Is the writing any good? I suppose it's effective, but only on a surface level. Does it feature fantastic performances? Not unless you count Stallone's innate intensity.

Does it rely heavily on racial stereotypes to a problematic degree? Oh you better believe it does. But so have the last three Rambo movies. This series gave up on tact and subtilty over 30 years ago. That ship has long since sailed.

Like I said at the start. This is Rambo. If you've watched any of them, especially the fourth one, you know exactly what you're in for. For fans, this is more of the same.

If you enjoy over-the-top violence, and can get past the poor writing and shallow characters, you'll probably like this movie just fine. Those who were hoping for a change to the nearly thirty-five-year-old formula should look elsewhere.

Why are limbs falling out of my tree?

Now is the time of year we start getting several calls regarding why small limbs are falling out the trees. The pecan and elm trees seem to be taking a hit from an insect called a twig girdler right now.

The twig girdler is commonly found on pecan, elm, hickory, and persimmon trees. They will also attack oaks, honey locust, hackberry, poplar, dogwood, sourwood and various fruit trees. Adults emerge from late August to early October.

The main symptoms of the twig girdler are fallen branches with a smooth cut that look as if they were sawed off or cut off with pruning shears. Twigs with a diameter from 1/4 to 1/2 inch are most commonly girdled. But it is possible for branches up to two inches to be girdled.

Squirrels can also cause limbs to drop when they cut about 3/4-inch-long at maturity. them to use in building their nests, but the cut will not generally be a smooth one. The leaves will turn brown prematurely.

In pecan orchards, large innut yields in subsequent years. In addition, injury may cause the development of offshoots that adversely affect the symmetry of the tree.

Repeated girdling may cause forks, crooks, and/or other stem deformities in young trees.

The twig girdlers are longhorned beetles that range from 1/2 to 5/8 inch long. They are grayish brown in color with a broad, ashy-gray band across the middle of their wing covers.

Their antennae are at least as long as their body. Their eggs are white, oval, and about 3/32 inch long. The larvae are whitish, legless grubs that reach

The adult twig girdlers feed bark in the twig section beyond

It is not uncommon to see unable to develop in healthy

The cut made by the adult female is deep enough around the twig so that the girdled portion dies quickly and usually falls to the ground, either because festations may result in lower of wind or its own weight. The small larvae overwinter in the dead twig either in the tree or on the ground.

Larvae grow rapidly in the spring and tunnel toward the severed end of the twig, feeding only on the woody portion and leaving the bark intact. Pupation occurs during August and September and lasts 12 to 14 days. The adult chews a circular hole in the bark to emerge and will live six to 10 weeks.

Since the larvae are in the twigs when they fall from the tree, gathering and burning of the fallen twigs and branches is the best means of control.

This form of control is somewhat limited if trees are growing in adjacent areas where on tender bark and mate before these girdlers are abundant and girdling takes place. Brad Beller doesn't usually script his first couple of plays.

He did last Friday night at Marlow and the second play of the game was an 81 yard touchdown pass off the arm of senior quarterback Devin Orr to sophomore Kobe Scott.

"I don't usually script the first two plays but I thought if we were in a certain situation we could set up the pass with a certain first down play," Beller said.

Marlow also scored in the first quarter with the game remaining deadlocked at 7-all until Washington scored in the fourth quarter on a six-yard Lance Spaulding dash.

"He ran the option well. He ran when he needed to. He handed off when he needed to and passed well. There is probably only one pass he'd like to have back and that was right before the half. Outside of that he had a really good game."

But the offensive mainstay had to be Spaulding.

What a difference a week can make.

The Lexington Bulldogs football team won for the first time this season with a 27-12 victory over the Purcell Dragons last Friday night.

In Paul's first letter to Timothy, he asks us to pray for "kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity." (1 Tim 2:1-8) We need to pray for our president and all our political leaders, that the law and policies of the land will allow us to live quiet and peaceful lives.

But in order for us to pray in this way, we must believe that God is going to intervene. We must believe that God cares for us enough to intervene. We must believe that God takes an active role in our lives, in our well-being.

This is different from deism. It is much easier to be a deist. A deist is someone who believes that, yes, there is a God who created the heavens and the earth. There is a God who set the planets in motion. There is a God who is the foundation of life itself. But this God does not intervene in the details of evervdav life.

Biblical spirituality believes that God does care about our everyday lives. From the very beginning, God has intervened in the lives of the people He loves.

When Moses was tending the flock of sheep for his father-inlaw, he was also hiding from the authorities. (Ex. 3:7-12) He was a fugitive. He had killed an Egyptian man who was beating an Israelite slave. God spoke to him in the burning bush, asking Moses to return to Pharaoh and demand that the Israelites be

given their freedom. This was, of course, very

dangerous for Moses. And so Moses wanted to know who it was that was asking him to do this. God said "I am who am." That is, "I am the source of all being. I am being itself. I am that which connects all being to one another."

And then comes one of the scariest verses of the Bible: "You will know that it is I who sent you only after you have led my people out of Egypt. They can then worship again on this holy mountain. Then you will know that I have been with you all along.'

It is only after we have been delivered that we know that God has been with us all along. So, until then, we have to trust in His presence, in His support, in His mercy. The same things would happen later to Jesus. It was only after His suffering and death on the Cross that He felt once again the presence of God again in the resurrection.

When I was younger, I thought that prayers of petition were done mostly in order to change us, to orient myself towards God. This is still true. But now I believe that there are times when God does intervene.

Cancer is a disease that happens when the body's normal control mechanism stops working. Old cells do not die and instead grow out of control, forming new, abnormal cells. There are times when doctors Facebook

can do no more to stop the growth of cancer.

But God can. And sometimes God does intervene and cure the cancer. Sometimes God does intervene and turn a stubborn will back to Him. Sometimes He does intervene and heal a wounded heart.

Prayer of petition is always answered. It may not be answered with a physical healing. It may be answered with a healing of the spirit, or a healing of the emotions, or a healing of the heart. But God always answers our prayers to him.

In the same letter, Paul writes: "It is my wish, then, that in every place the men should pray, lifting up holy hands, without anger or argument." Yes, let us pray for those in authority.

But let us also pray for those in our lives who are in need of healing – of body or of spirit. Later, after our prayer has been answered, then we will know that God has been with us all along.
