

School boards, council

Single filings decide some races

Three area school board races will be on the February 12 primary election ballot.

Patrons in the Washington, Dibble and Newcastle school districts will vote on candidates for Office 4.

In Washington, incumbent Greg Tontz has drawn challenges from Stanley Burns, Wade Hamilton and Adam Price.

The incumbent in Dibble, Jeff Burr, isn't seeking another term. Candidates for his office are Candace Doaney, Harold Ledgerwood and Gene Shiflett.

In the Newcastle race, incumbent Gary Knowles has two opponents – Jeff Dingee and Tyler Riddle.

The two candidates polling the most votes in each race will advance to the general election on April 2.

Also on the April 2 ballot will be school board races for Office 4 in Purcell and Wayne.

Incumbent Kim Croslin in Purcell will face Kay Bunn, while in Wayne, incumbent Abbi Castle has drawn Kristen Harper for an opponent.

That's because Lexington has had three separate power outages in the past week lasting between four and six hours.

City Manager Chris Coker has been fielding call after call but the problem doesn't lie with the City of Lexington.

"There hasn't been one instance of the City of Lexington being the cause of the outage," Coker said. "We get our power from OG&E and we are absolutely at their mercy."

The latest power outage occurred this past Monday with power only coming on around 11:30 a.m.

The previous Monday power was out four hours. Last Saturday night the power was out for six hours and power was out December 3 for four

Foodborne illness not something to be thankful for

Feasting with family and friends is an enjoyable part of many holiday celebrations. With the number of things that can go wrong in the kitchen, steering clear of food safety blunders can be challenging.

It is important not to cut corners and put family and friends at risk of foodborne illness by forgetting to wash your hands after handling the raw turkey, or forgetting to check the internal temperature to assure the turkey is fully cooked.

Every year, approximately 48 million Americans become ill with a foodborne illness.

Salmonella infection is of particular concern with turkey and other poultry products.

During the last year, there has been a multi-state outbreak of 164 Salmonella Reading cases, including one in Oklahoma, related to raw turkey exposure. This strain of Salmonella might be widespread in the turkey industry.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) reminds everyone about the importance of practicing food safety when handling and preparing turkey, as well as other holiday foods.

The OSDH recommends the following food safety tips for preparing a holiday meal and keeping gatherings free of foodborne illness:

20 Seconds of Hand Washing: Wash hands with soap and running water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing is especially important when handling any raw meats. Without proper hand washing, the well-intentioned cook could quickly spread bacteria around the kitchen and to other food

Tips to help avoid gift card fraud

For many consumers, purchasing a gift card takes the stress out of finding the perfect gift to give. First introduced in the 1990s, gift cards have continued to gain in popularity. It is expected about \$130 billion worth of gift cards will be purchased by the end of 2018.

While they are a popular gift, crooks are finding ways to steal the money before the intended recipient has a chance to spend it, said Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension family resource management assistant specialist.

"Gift cards are a big target for criminals and there are various

ways in which consumers are scammed out of their money," Clampet said.

The simplest method involves a scam artist taking a gift card from the rack in a store, writing down the number and scratching off the strip to reveal the security code. Once he has that information, the hacker puts a replacement strip, which are easily available online, over the code and puts it back on the rack.

Later, the unsuspecting consumer purchases the card and loads money onto it. Once the card is loaded, the hacker periodically goes online to check the balance of the card. Once it is loaded, the scammer gets busy shopping.

"Unfortunately, consumers don't even know the card has been hacked until the recipient tries to use it," she said. "One way to help safeguard your gift card purchase is to pull a card from the middle of the rack."

"Don't take the first one on the rack. Inspect it closely, especially the area to be scratched off to reveal the security code. If it looks like it has been tampered with, choose another card. Or look for gift cards that are kept behind the counter or are in a well-sealed package."

Another tip to avoid being scammed is to change the security code as soon as you

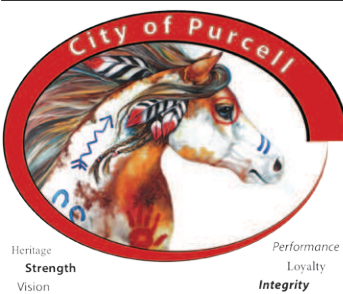

\$165K seized

DA: Cash was drug proceeds

The District 21 Drug Task Force recovered drug proceeds totaling \$165,000 during a traffic stop on Interstate 35 on December 4.

Now McClain County prosecutors have charged a passenger, Rogelio Reteguín-Guerrero, 27, of Peoria, Ill., with acquiring proceeds from drug activity.

Reteguín-Guerrero was released after posting \$50,000 bond. His preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. January 16.

According to an affidavit, a task force member stopped a white Jeep with Illinois plates near mile marker 81 for speeding.

After detecting an odor of marijuana in the vehicle, the agent had all four occupants exit the Jeep. All gave consent for a search during which 18 bundles of cash were found hidden in a factory compartment under the front seat.

Reteguín-Guerrero admitted he was transporting the money from Peoria to Fort Worth and said the cash was drug proceeds, according to the affidavit.

He also told investigators the other three occupants were asked to accompany him so it would look like a work trip.

Several fraternities and sororities have filed both federal and state lawsuits against Harvard University.

The suits are in response to the school's policy of black-listing students who choose to join single sex organizations, regardless of whether those organizations are recognized by Harvard.

"This is an untenable example of overreaching institutional policy and Sigma Chi has chosen to 'Stand Up To Harvard' to fight for the rights of our men, as well as students everywhere who find great value in the experience provided by a single-sex organization," said Tommy Geddings, the president of the entire Sigma Chi Fraternity earlier this month.

Sigma Chi is joined by Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Alpha Phi and Kappa Alpha Theta in the law suits.

"We believe all students

deserve the right to shape their own leadership and social paths on campus, and such decisions should not be dictated to them by administrators with an axe to grind," Geddings wrote. "Harvard's new policy forces conformity at the expense of individual and group rights and denies students who participate in these organizations the leadership experiences that, paradoxically, would help

fulfill its own mission of educating society's future leaders," Geddings said.

Sigma Chi established a chapter in Cambridge, Massachusetts in May of 1992.

The university has never formally recognized the chapter so it has operated independently.

The university's present policy sanctions Sigma Chi brothers for being a member of the organization.

It's liberal views like that that never cease to amaze me like people saying "Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer" show is anti-gay and that Santa is a bully in the show.

Remembering George H.W. Bush

Congressman Tom Cole

George H. W. Bush led an extraordinary life defined by personal decency and public service. Perhaps the greatest member of America's "Greatest Generation," he began his service as a Navy combat pilot in the South Pacific during World War II.

Later as our 41st president, he led our country to final victory in the Cold War, won the Gulf War and departed office leaving America as the world's only unchallenged superpower. Over a long life, Bush served the nation in many ways—soldier, congressman, diplomat, CIA director, vice president, president and presidential envoy.

No one in modern American history can match the range, depth, duration or quality of the public service that Bush rendered to our country.

While I would never claim to be a Bush intimate, our paths crossed many times over the course of my own political career.

I met with him when I served as both Executive Director and Chairman of the Oklahoma Republican Party. In 1988, I cast Oklahoma's delegate votes at the Republican National Convention for then-Vice President George H. W. Bush.

He returned the favor by personally endorsing me in my state Senate race that same year, sending in future Vice President Dan Quayle to campaign on my behalf. It mattered. Bush won my district by several thousand votes. I won by 311.

During the last two years of "41's" presidency, I served as Executive Director of the National Republican Congressional Committee. And when his son, George W. Bush, ran for president, I served as Chief of Staff for the Republican National Committee.

Neither Bush ever forgot those who helped and worked with them. So I was not surprised when George W. Bush endorsed me in my hard-fought first congressional race.

At the height of his popular-

ity, he filmed a television commercial with me and dispatched Vice President Dick Cheney to campaign on my behalf. Next to my own mother, I owe the Bush family more than anyone in my political life.

George H. W. Bush was the most grounded and least egotistical politician I ever met. His personal character and commitment to his family were both obvious and legendary.

When Bush engaged you in conversation, he always made your thoughts and concerns the center of the discussion. No one ever doubted that he was a true gentleman in every sense of the word.

Bush's decency and wisdom were often overlooked because he refused to boast about himself and his many accomplishments. He personified the values of the generation that won World War II and made America an economic powerhouse and a beacon of freedom

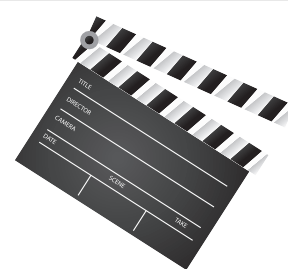

MOVIES WITH DAVE

And I thought the previous weekend was bad as far as new releases go.

Unlike last week, which at least had one new film, this week didn't have a single new movie released to theaters.

Fortunately I was still able to find a few films I hadn't seen yet.

Two of them are movies on the tail end of their theatrical run, but I still wanted to check them out as both of them have the potential to come out with an Oscar nomination. Specifically, a best actor nod for Hugh Jackman in "The Front Runner," and a best animated feature nomination for "Mirai."

And the third movie was an early screening of the latest film in the Transformers franchise.

So without further ado, let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Mirai."

When four-year-old Kun (Jaden Waldman) meets his new baby sister Mirai,

his world is turned upside down.

As his mother (Rebecca Hall) returns to work, and his father (John Cho) struggles to run the household, Kun becomes increasingly jealous of baby Mirai, until one day he encounters strange guests from the past and future, including his sister Mirai, as a teenager (Victoria Grace).

It's been a while since I've had the chance to review a new Japanese animated movie.

Anime generally doesn't get many wide releases here in the states, not unless the director happens to be named Hayao Miyazaki.

But the director for "Mirai," Mamoru Hosoda, has certainly made a name for himself over the years, at least among anime fans, directing popular films like "The Girl Who Leapt Through Time," "Summer Wars," and of course "Digimon: The Movie."

And while I probably wouldn't rank "Mirai" as Hosoda's best, it's still a decent, well animated film.

The movie centers around Kun, a little boy struggling to deal with all the changes that come with becoming an older sibling. Stuff like being jealous of the new baby and not getting the attention from his parents that Kun is used to.

The twist comes from some kind of unexplained magic

where Kun is able to interact with members of his family at different ages or in different manifestations.

Like the description says, Mirai appears as a teenage girl, but Kun also meets his own mother when she was Kun's age and his great-grandfather as a man in his 20s.

But my favorite of Kun's companions had to be the family dog, who becomes personified as this shabby looking man in his late 20s/early 30s.

The dog is voiced by a prolific anime voice actor Crispin Freeman, a man with dozens of credits to his name, but to me he'll always be Jeremiah "Orange" Gottwald from Code Geass.

He's such a fun actor and he always brings a ton of personality to his roles. I was thrilled to hear his voice in this movie. His performance was definitely one of the highlights of the film.

For the most part, most of the conflict in this movie comes from incredibly mundane situations. Things like Kun not wanting to put away his toys, or Kun learning how to ride his bike, or Kun not getting to wear the clothes he wants because they're in the laundry.

Granted when you're a little kid, things like being forced to pick up your toys can seem like the the biggest source of anguish imaginable. Still, the stakes in this movie are decidedly low.

Each obstacle for Kun almost feels like its own self contained short story, rather than a single movie with an overarching plot, and it rarely ever feels like the film is actually building to anything.

Yes, the movie ends up being about Kun learning to get along with his little sister. The movie is called "Mirai" after all. But there's a huge chunk in the middle of the movie where Mirai is nowhere in sight.

It's like the movie got distracted and lost its narrative thread halfway through, then suddenly picks it up again at the very end of the film.

I wouldn't say the movie's distractions were necessarily bad, but from a story standpoint I think the film would have been much better off with more scenes of Kun learning to get along with his little sister, and less stuff like Kun learning how to ride a bike.

Animation quality wise, I'd rank this movie about average as far as theatrical animes go.

It's not nearly as breathtaking

as something from Studio Ghibli, nor does it even come close to the visual spectacle that is “Your Name.” Heck, I wouldn’t even rank it above some of Hosoda’s previous work, namely “Summer Wars.”

But still, there are some nice hand drawn backgrounds here and the characters are all very expressive. Nothing to write home about, but the animation is more than competent nonetheless.

All in all I’d say this is a solid animated movie, but it’s not really something worth seeking out unless you really love anime.

If you’ve never seen any of Hosoda’s movies, I’d highly recommend checking out “Summer Wars” or perhaps “The Girl Who Leapt Through Time.” If you enjoy both of them, then “Mirai” just might be worth a watch.

“Mirai” is rated PG.



Next is “The Front Runner.”

Based on a true story, this film follows presidential candidate Gary Hart (Hugh Jackman), the widely accepted frontrunner in the race for the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination.

But as the Democratic National Convention approaches, Hart’s campaign becomes sidelined when a story of an extramarital relationship with Donna Rice (Sara Paxton) comes to light.

I really wanted to like this movie.

I absolutely adore Hugh Jackman as an actor. He’s such a talented and charismatic performer. Though he has been nominated, it really is a shame that he’s never received an Academy Award.

Unfortunately though, this definitely isn’t going to be the movie that gets Hugh the Oscar.

That isn’t to say that Hugh Jackman is bad in this movie. On the contrary, I think his performance was easily the best part of the film and he especially shines while giving impassioned speeches.

The problem is the movie itself is incredibly unfocused, especially in the beginning, and the filmmakers did a surprisingly poor job introducing all the various characters and their motivations.

There were so many report-

ers and members of Hart’s campaign floating around I could hardly keep them all straight.

What made matters worse was the sound mixing in this film.

If there was an award for worst sound mixing in a movie, this film would win it hands down.

I couldn’t believe how bad it was. You simply can’t understand a large portion of the dialogue in this movie.

Many scenes had characters speaking in hushed whispers with loud ambient noise background. Plus more than once, the movie had moments where you can hear two distinct conversations at the same time, making it hard to focus on either one of them.

And there’s no blaming the theater itself on the bad sound mixing. I saw “The Front Runner” in the exact same auditorium as “Mirai,” just three hours later, and the audio for “Mirai” sounded just fine.

Rarely have I ever watched a movie where the sound mixing was so bad it ruined the film, but this is one such movie.

The story itself is relentless in taking the media as a whole to task. It’s quite the contrast to recent films like “Spotlight” and “The Post” where reporters are basically portrayed as heroes.

This movie on the other hand clearly paints the employees of both **The Miami Herald** and **The Washington Post** as inconsiderate or reckless at best and outright villains at worse.

There certainly is an argument to be made against the tabloidization of mainstream media, but sadly this movie does a poor job presenting it. Also as a bit of an aside, Hart’s story almost seems quaint in this day and age.

Back then an affair could completely ruin a person’s chance at the presidency. Nowadays a presidential candidate can freely admit to affairs and can even be exposed as a self admitted perpetrator of sexual assault and still be elected just fine. Simpler times I guess.

Honestly I feel bad for Jackman and all the other actors in this film. It’s a shame they all couldn’t have been in a better movie.

Sadly I don’t think I could recommend this film to anyone. Not even the most politically minded theatergoers.

Even if the story was told in a more compelling way, the ridiculously poor sound mix-

ing ruined any potential this film might have had.

Sorry Hugh, I love you, but this isn’t going to be the one that nets you an Oscar.

Last this week is “Bumblebee.”

Twenty years before the events of the first “Transformers” film, Bumblebee, on the run from the Decepticons, takes refuge in a small California beach town junkyard, where a teenage girl named Charlie Watson (Hailee Steinfeld) takes him in.

The two of them soon find themselves hunted by a government agency known as Sector 7, led by Agent Jack Burns (John Cena), along with the Decepticons who will stop at nothing to eliminate Bumblebee and his fellow Autobots.

I have to say I’m not the biggest fan of the Transformers franchise.

To be fair I never watched any of the various animated TV shows or movies growing up, so I can’t speak to those. I’ve heard both good things and bad, but I’ve never actually sat down and checked out any of the cartoons myself.

No sadly, my only exposure to Transformers has been the recent films directed by renowned explosion connoisseur, Michael Bay.

Bay somehow has the ability to take a concept like giant robots battling over the fate of the planet, and turn it into an oversaturated snoozefest.

The action in all of Bay’s Transformers is simply a mess, often so zoomed in you can barely even tell what’s happening moment to moment.

Plus the characters are all unlikeable jerks with little to no depth and the stories themselves are so dense with absolute nonsense you could watch each of them with a printed plot synopsis in your hands and still be unable to make heads or tails of anything.

Honestly, it’s amazing anyone is willing to give these films a chance at this point. Even with Bay’s departure from the franchise, I wouldn’t blame anyone for avoiding Transformers movies like the plague after all the garbage that’s been released in the past.

Well I’m here to tell you that “Bumblebee” is not only the

best live action Transformers film ever made, a low bar to be sure, but “Bumblebee” is also a genuinely fun action flick well worth checking out.

Everything that Michael Bay did wrong for “Transformers,” the director of “Bumblebee” does right.

Before this movie, Travis Knight had primarily worked in animation, his only director’s credit being the stop motion film “Kubo and the Two Strings.”

Well after “Bumblebee” I can’t wait to see what movie Travis directs next, because he certainly came out of the gates swinging with this film.

Everything is just so good. The story itself isn’t all that different from the first Transformers movie. Teenager wants a new car, teenager gets a new car, new car turns out to be giant killer robot from outer space.

From there the movies diverge a bit, but the beginning will be familiar to anyone who saw the first film.

The similarities don’t matter though, because the characters here are so much better.

Charlie Watson isn’t just another girl thrown in for eye candy like every other young female role in previous Transformers movies.

She’s actually a fully fleshed out, well rounded, likeable character. Likeable characters! Who knew that was possible in a Transformers movie? Michael Bay certainly didn’t.

And her relationship with Bumblebee here is genuinely touching. I just loved watching the two of them interact together.

The filmmakers did a wonderful job of making the interactions between Bumblebee,

a fully computer generated character, and Charlie look real.

All the Transformers are so much more expressive here than previous movies, especially Bumblebee. There’s so much emotion in his eyes and how he moves. Plus the way he melts into Charlie’s touch like a giant metal kitty cat is ridiculously adorable.

I can’t stop talking about how well animated this movie is. It’s just so perfect.

Also, as a side note, I loved John Cena here. I’m so glad he made the jump from pro wrestling to film. Even when he’s the bad guy, like in this movie, he’s still ridiculously charismatic.

Then there’s the comedy. This movie had me laughing quite a bit, and in ways that often took me completely off guard. I honestly wasn’t expecting this film to have so many funny moments. The humor certainly played a part in keeping the movie fun and engaging.

Unlike the other Transformers films, this movie is never boring and never feels like it drags on. Mostly because you actually care about the characters in the movie, but also because the narrative is structured well and has a good flow throughout.

Plus, for once, you can see what’s going on.

The action here is well framed and fairly well shot. It’s not just a constant jumble of metal and explosions in your face. Yes, there’s some closeup action, but it’s not every single scene like a Michael Bay movie.

And finally, this movie isn’t a non-stop product placement marathon like every single one

of the previous Transformers movies.

I always felt like I was being forced to watch a dang car commercial every five minutes with the other films. And it wasn’t only cars, it was Bud Light, Mountain Dew, Beats by Dre, plus dozens of other companies too numerous to mention.

I’m generally not one to nitpick embedded marketing in movies. Many times real products can add to the authenticity of a scene, but the Transformers franchise took advertising in movies to an entirely different level.

You know what “Bumblebee” has in the way of product placement. The main Transformer is an old rundown Volkswagen Beetle, Charlie uses Charmin brand toilet paper to TP a house, and at one point a can of Tab soda is shown. That’s it. That’s all I noticed at least.

This review isn’t meant to be a personal attack on Michael Bay himself. I don’t know him, I’m sure he’s a fine person. But I’m so glad he isn’t making Transformers movies anymore.

“Bumblebee” is the breath of fresh air that this franchise so desperately needed.

After all the garbage this series has put out over the years, I never thought I’d see the day where I actually loved a Transformers movie. But here it is.

If you don’t see this film, you’re missing out. I am thrilled to say that “Bumblebee” is finally the live action Transformers movie we’ve all been waiting for.

“Bumblebee” releases to theaters December 21 and is rated PG-13.

Health insurance exchange open enrollment ends on December 15

The end of the HealthCare.gov open enrollment period is just around the corner. Whether you are new to the HealthCare.gov exchange or returning, we want to make sure that Oklahomans who want coverage through the exchange are aware of the Dec. 15 deadline so they don’t miss the opportunity to sign up for 2019 coverage.

The focus for this year, as it was for last year, is to provide a seamless enrollment experience for HealthCare.gov consumers. We’ve made important improvements to customer service this year. We streamlined the application to simplify the process and improved the website’s content to make it easier to understand. Healthcare.gov has performed optimally, consumers have been able to easily access enrollment tools to compare plans and prices, and the call center’s consumer satisfaction rate has remained at 90 percent.

Since open enrollment began on November 1, more than 51,000 Oklahomans have selected a plan in the federally facilitated exchange.

Here are the three things Oklahoma consumers need to know:

1. The deadline to sign up for coverage is fast approaching.

Oklahomans have until December 15 to sign up for coverage that starts on January 1. Oklahoma residents who don’t enroll by the deadline can’t get 2019 coverage unless they qualify for a special enrollment period. Consumers can visit HealthCare.gov and CuidadodeSalud.gov to preview 2019 plans and prices and sign up for coverage today.

2. Now is the time for Oklahoma consumers to go to HealthCare.gov or CuidadodeSalud.gov to update their information or add it for the first time, and select the plan that best meets their needs.

We are encouraging Oklahomans who need health insurance to join the millions of people who have gone to HealthCare.gov and found health insurance. The plans on HealthCare.gov are comprehensive and offer:

- Annual checkups at no extra cost.
- Coverage for doctor visits, prescription drugs, and certain preventive care with no out-of-pocket costs.

3. Nationally, average premiums have decreased and the number of plans have increased on the federal exchange for 2019.

For the first time since Healthcare.gov started offering

coverage, average premium rates for a benchmark silver plan in 2019 have gone down across the 39 states that use the federal platform. Consumers have more plans to choose from to find the best fit for themselves.

There are 23 more issuers on the federal exchanges for 2019 than there were in 2018. And 29 issuers are expanding their service area into new counties. Consumers should come back to HealthCare.gov to compare plans and prices. They may be able to find a plan that saves them money and better meets their health needs.

Help is available! Oklahoma consumers can get help filling out their application in three ways:

- By phone. Consumers can call the exchange’s call center at 1-800-318-2596.

- In-person help. Consumers can use the “find local help” tool on HealthCare.gov to see if they can get in-person help in their community.

- Health insurance agents and brokers. Agents and brokers can help consumers enroll through the exchange or handle the whole process. Search for health insurance agents and brokers by using the “find local help” tool.

Don’t delay. If you want coverage by January 1, you must sign up by December 15.

Cheese Grits Casserole

8 slices bacon, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1 onion, very thinly sliced

4 cups low-sodium chicken broth

2 cups coarse stone-ground grits

2 cups heavy cream

2 cups grated Monterey Jack cheese

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

In a heavy pot, cook the bacon over medium heat to render the fat, about 2 minutes. Add the onions and cook with the bacon until the onions are golden brown and the bacon is chewy, about 5 minutes.

Carefully add the chicken broth and 2 cups water. Whisk in the grits. Bring to a boil, lower to a simmer and cook until thickened, about 25 minutes.

Stir in the cream and cheese until thoroughly combined. Season with salt and pepper.

Hand washing should always include five simple steps:

- Wet hands with clean, running water, and apply soap.
- Lather hands by rubbing them together with soap. Be sure to lather the backs of hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
- Scrub hands for at least 20 seconds.
- Rinse hands well under clean, running water.
- Dry hands using a clean towel.

Say No to 'Bird Baths': Do not rinse or wash the turkey. Doing so can spread bacteria around the kitchen, contaminating counter tops, towels, and other food. Washing poultry doesn't remove all the bacteria from the bird.

Only cooking to the proper internal temperature of 165°F will ensure that all bacteria are killed.

If you have held the raw turkey, make sure to wash hands completely before seasoning to avoid contaminating spice containers.

Thaw the Turkey Correctly: Never thaw a turkey by leaving it out on the counter. To ensure that harmful bacteria do not multiply, thaw the turkey in the refrigerator, in a sink of cold water that is changed every 30

minutes, or in the microwave.

Check the Temperature of the Turkey and Cook the Stuffing Outside the Turkey: Do not rely on the pop-up thermometers that come with the turkey to determine if it is safe to eat.

Take the bird's temperature with a food thermometer in three areas: the thickest part of the breast, the innermost part of the wing, and the innermost part of the thigh.

Assure that all these areas reach 165°F. When stuffing is cooked inside the turkey's cavity, it must also be checked to assure it reaches 165°F.

It's easier to keep things simple and cook the stuffing outside the bird.

Use the Two-Hour Rule to Avoid Foodborne Illness: Everyone loves to graze during holiday meals, but when perishable food sits at room temperature for too long, bacteria can multiply.

If cooked foods containing meat, vegetables or dairy products have been left at room temperature for more than two hours, they should be discarded.

buy the card. Clampet said to register the card when you get home and change the PIN. Also, suggest the recipient use the card as soon as possible.

Another way sophisticated hackers steal your gift card dollars is by using robot networks, also known as botnets. Botnets test millions of combinations of gift card account numbers and stolen PIN passwords to try to log into online gift card accounts that have money loaded onto them. The botnets avoid detection by mimicking individual human browsing behavior and blending in with a website's genuine visitor traffic.

"Criminals also can gain access to your gift card numbers and PINs by hacking your computer. To help prevent that, make sure your security software is the most up-to-date version," she said.

"Create and use strong passwords to help protect your privacy. Also, consider purchasing gift cards online directly from the retailer."

Although the gift card industry continually is seeing an increase in purchases, many of them go unused. Of the estimated \$130 billion spent on gift cards last year, about \$1 billion went unspent.

"Fortunately, it has become

harder for retailers to make money on out-of-date cards. The Credit Card Accountability, Responsibility and Disclosure Act of 2009 ruled they should not expire until five years after the cards are issued," Clampet said.

"However, if you purchase a gift card from a smaller retailer, only about half of those businesses still will be around in five years. So, before you turn to the gift card as the perfect gift for those who are hard to buy for, make sure it's to a store at which the recipient shops. You don't want to waste your money for a gift that won't be used," she concluded.

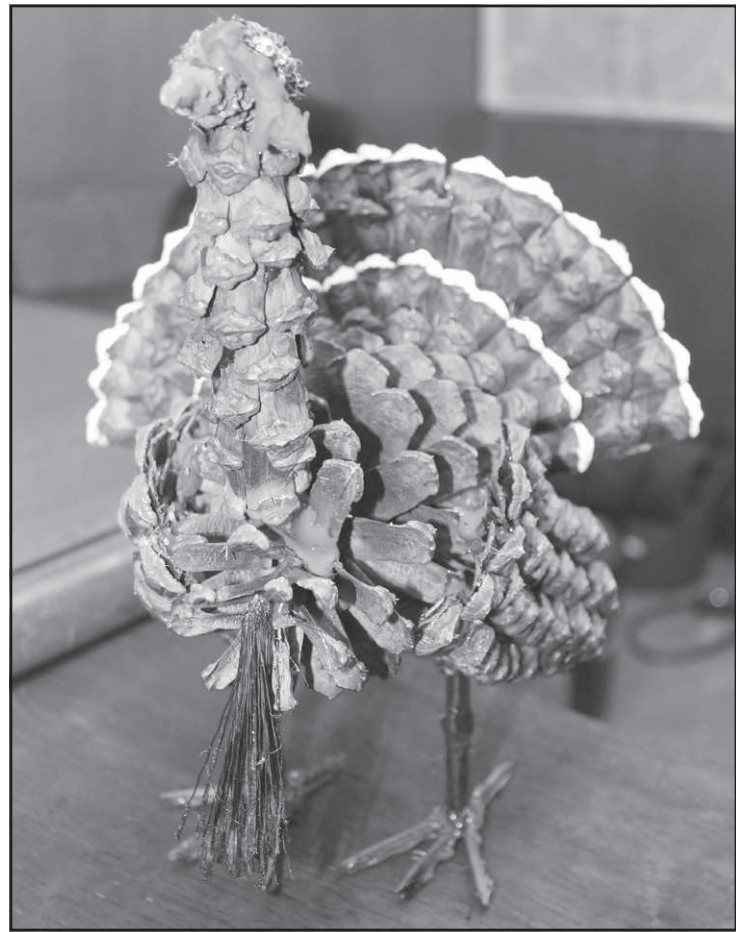

Tips to prevent chimney fires

Sitting in front of a cozy fire in your living room is a great way to spend a cold, winter day.

But while you may enjoy basking in the warmth, it is good to remember the chimney is an important aspect of the fireplace. Chimney's that are dirty, blocked or damaged are hazardous.

A dirty chimney can cause chimney fires, which damage structures, destroy homes and can injure or even kill people. Indications of a chimney fire can include loud cracking and popping noise, a lot of dense smoke and/or an intense, hot smell.

First maintain your chimney. It is a good idea to have your chimney inspected each year. This is especially important if your home was impacted by a big storm or earthquake. Only burn seasoned hard-

woods. This will help reduce creosote buildup. Creosote is flammable tar that is deposited from wood smoke.

Finally, any combustion appliances, including fireplaces, can produce carbon monoxide. Be sure to use a carbon monoxide alarm when the fireplace is lit.

Second, prevent fire in the home. Make certain that any combustibles, such as furniture, pillows, blankets, etc., are at least three feet away from the fireplace.

Coal or wood stoves should be at least three feet from the nearest wall, as well.

Third, be prepared. Have an emergency plan in case of fire. If you ever think that there is a chimney fire, call 911. Taking the necessary steps to ensure your chimney is clean and safe is the smart thing to do.

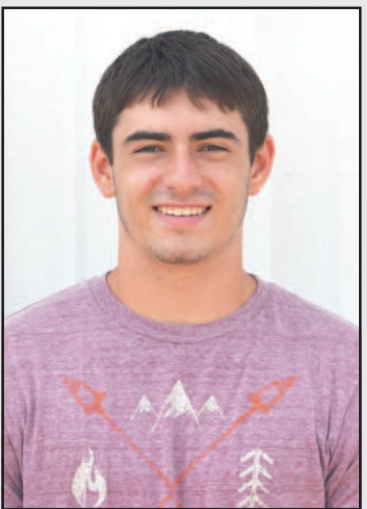

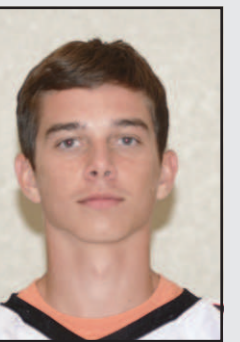

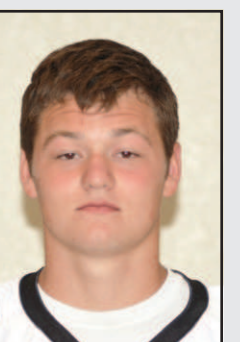

Pet lovers: Meals on Wheels needs your help

A 4-H volunteer recently received an urgent call from the Meals on Wheels (MOW) Executive Director Lynn Hayes asking if 4-H could once again supply pet food for the animals of her Meals on Wheels clients as her supply of pet food has been depleted.

Why do you ask, does the Meals on Wheels organization need pet food? It was discovered that MOW clients were sharing their nutritious meals with their pets because either they could not afford pet food, had no way to get it, or were not able to carry heavy bags of pet food.

A former 4-H member, Haley Armstrong, who started this pet food project 13 years ago to assist the elderly so that they would not have to share their meals, has graduated, and the Cleveland County 4-H officers have voted to continue working with Meals on Wheels as one of their community service projects.

This project has grown from about 36 clients to around 150. Pet food for both large and small dogs, and dried cat food, as well as cat litter are needed. Once it is received, the officers will divide the food up and deliver it to the MOW office.

accept pet food year-round, but really need some to take for the Holidays.

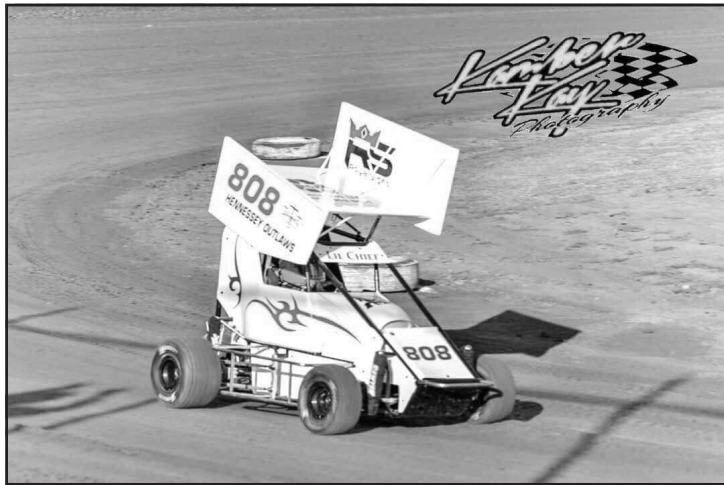

Junior Sprint racer

Brylee Kilmer, a nine-year-old second grader at Washington Elementary School, is set to race at the Lucas Oil Tulsa Shoot Out Jan. 2-5, 2019 in the Junior Sprint Class.

Each week we recognize veterans for service to our country who served during World War II or the Korean War. Each of them is given a military cap representing their service. The biggest job we then have is deciding which one of them will be our Veteran of the Week. We are proud to recognize Paul Keller of Sulphur who served in the Korean War as a member of the United States Army during the 1950s.

As we draw closer to the end of 2018, I would like to share that what our volunteers accomplished during the last 12 months for our veterans and their families has never been seen anywhere in this United States. We are assisting an average of 300 veterans and surviving spouses each week with their claims and questions. Considering we are only open on Tuesday and Thursday morning that is quite an accomplishment for a group of volunteers.

Our only goal is to improve the lives of men and women who served in our military. As many of you have gone to different organizations for help yet have been turned down for VA benefits, we do things a little differently in Norman. We file evidence-based claims for veterans using the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires (DBQs) available on the VA website. These DBQ forms are filled out by medical professionals as they evaluate the veteran's disabilities.

We then submit a Fully Developed Claim on VA form 21-526EZ with our DBQ evidence. Some of these claims may be decided using only the evidence provided while others may require another medical opinion by VA. By using these forms, most of the claims we file are approved by VA on the first time around. If a claim is denied, we review it making any changes that are needed and then follow our first process again.

When I filed my first claim back in the 80s the only choices we had locally were the American Legion, VFW, or ODVA. Back then I did not understand why VA denied my claim for service-connection of an eye condition that occurred while in Vietnam. I thought because I was treated for it in the military, the VA would automatically service-connect my eye condition after filing my claim. It did not take long for me to start reading everything that was available on how to receive VA benefits.

I finally wound up with a copy of Volume 38 parts 0 thru 17 of the Code of Federal Regulations. That book has every disability for which a veteran

can be service-connected. It also has rating tables showing the different percentages a disability should be rated. I figure the more knowledge that both our volunteers and the veterans and surviving spouses have the more likely we will be able to help them with their VA claims for benefits.

Recently I was reading a Disability Benefits Questionnaire (DBQ) filled out by a civilian doctor who does contract evaluations for either QTC or LHI (those are companies that do contract medical or mental evaluations for the VA and Social Security). One of their mental health medical providers wrote: "in his opinion he did not think it was right for veterans to have the option to obtain DBQ evidence or diagnosis of a condition." To me, that is one of the most ridiculous things I have ever heard anyone say, much less a doctor. The Department of Veterans Affairs developed the DBQ system to establish a level playing field for all veterans. The VA disability system is based on evidence that either supports a veteran's claim or not.

If the veteran has no evidence of a disability, it can be or is usually denied unless it is presumptive to their military. The only thing I know for sure is we are assisting veterans from all Oklahoma's 77 counties, 48 states, and four different countries up until last week when I received a request from a veteran living in Kenya and Dubai. It looks like we now have veterans from six countries who are visiting Norman for help with their VA claims and questions.

As many of you know we set a goal of helping 1,000 veterans receive a 100 percent rating in 2018. As of today, there have been 968 who have received that rating. We will reach our goal in the next week or so, I just don't know what number we should set for our 2019 goal.

This week we have several new volunteers who are joining our team of men and women who are making a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. Our people don't wonder if they helped anyone or not as we receive all of the decision letters on the veterans and spouses who we serve. Have you thought about the lives of the 300 plus veterans and family members that we assist weekly? It looks to me like well over 10,000 of them visited us in 2018!

Please remember if you need a ride to visit us contact our drivers at (405) 550-8806, extension 105 and 106. These very dedicated volunteers

logged almost 80 hours last week transporting 40 veterans more than 1,200 miles.

In the mailbag from the VA this week we received more 350 pieces of mail including VA decision letters for 30 veterans who received a rating at 100 percent. These folks will receive \$1,207,395 on an annual basis. Sixty-seven veterans were awarded benefits at the rate of 10-90 percent and will receive \$1,178,670 on an annual basis. Four surviving spouses were awarded benefits and will annually receive \$59,450.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning with the doors opening at 5:30 a.m. We begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients as soon as we reach the quota for the day, and that time varies depending on the number of visitors and the number of available volunteers, which usually occurs around 7 a.m.

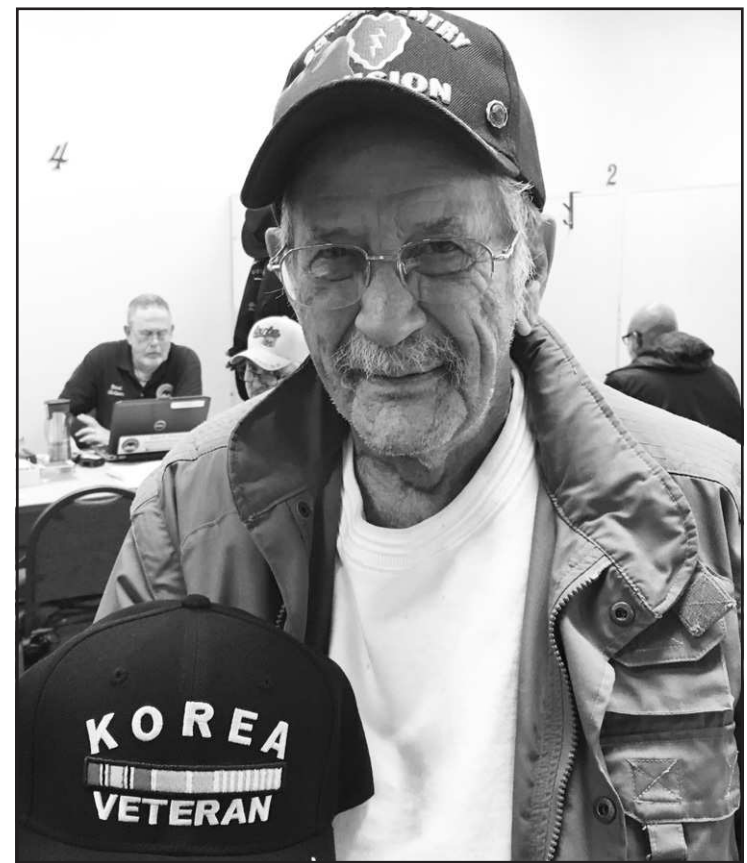

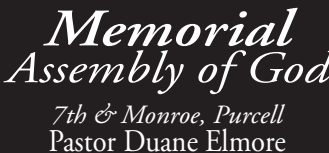

The preaching of John the Baptist, at the beginning of the ministry of Jesus, appears in all four Gospels. John was a mystic. John could see things happening around him and he interpreted these as a sign of God's invisible presence in the world. John was a saint because he trusted in the deep, abiding goodness of a Creator, that the ground of all being is love.

But John was still a prophet, in the Old Testament meaning of that word. John knew well the prophecies of Isaiah and Jeremiah and Ezekiel and probably even Baruch. John preached conversion, a turning towards God. What did John mean by conversion? Some ideas come to mind.

In chapter 11, Isaiah spoke about God's holy mountain: (Is. 11) - "There the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the young goat; The cow and the bear shall graze, together their young shall lie down; the lion shall eat hay like the ox. They shall not harm or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be filled with knowledge of the Lord."

Conversion means being at peace with another who is very different from you. Conversion means recognizing that we are different - very different - but learning how to live together in

God's kingdom on earth - the Church.

Secondly, conversion means living our vocation with intense focus and energy, as John the Baptist did. St. Leopold Mandic was a Croatian priest. He was of the Capuchin order, a follower of St. Francis. On top of his physical deformities, he also suffered from chronic stomach ailments, poor eyesight, and arthritis. But he rarely complained, and he had a deep devotion to the Virgin Mary who he referred to as "my holy boss."

Fr. Leopold spent many, many hours hearing confessions in his little confessional box. Leopold's compassion showed that he was more understanding and sympathetic to the people that came to him, and would treat them with great sensitivity.

During the bombing of World War II the church and part of the friary where Leopold lived were demolished, but Leopold's cell and confessional were left unharmed. Leopold had predicted this before his death, saying, "The church and the friary will be hit by the bombs, but not this little cell. Here God exercised so much mercy for people, it must remain as a monument to God's goodness."

Leopold said that "a priest must die from apostolic work.

There is no death more worthy of a priest." Are you living your vocation with such intensity? Are you living your sacramental vocation as mother or father, husband or wife, with as much energy and care? This is what it means to be converted.

Finally, conversion means to see God as the movement of love behind all things in our life.

Blind people tell us that they can hold or touch an object - a stone or a dog or a tree - and they can feel a presence coming back to them. It is a comfort to them, just to feel such a presence. When we are converted we begin to "see" as a blind person sees, by feeling, by touching, by sensing a presence that cannot be seen but only felt.

Advent is a time of conversion. Let us pray for the companionship and help of St. John the Baptist who desires to prepare us for the coming of Christ.

We will have an Advent Penance Service on Thursday, December 13, at 7 p.m. After celebrating a communal rite, three priests will be available to hear individual confessions.

Our Mass schedule is Saturday at 5 p.m. (English), Sunday at 11 a.m. (English) and 1 p.m. (Spanish).

Front-Porch Gospel:
"Nearer My God, To Thee"
Can Still Soothe the Soul
Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

The amazin' blonde and I spent last Wednesday morning watching the life celebration of George H. W. Bush, the 41st president of the United States. Many moments during the ceremonies could not help but cause a lump to pop into your throat, but one in particular stands out.

In a most solemn, respectful moment - with the Bush family standing nearby with hands over their hearts - the soldiers carried the body of the president down the steps of the Capitol, One slow step at a time, having left the Rotunda where the president had lain.

As they began the journey down the steep stairs, the band began to play one of the greatest hymns ever written: "Nearer My God, To Thee."

"Still all my song shall be, nearer my God to thee..."

As the band played, the cameras captured the faces of all the Bush children and their spouses standing in solidarity nearby. At the playing of the song, the president's son George W. Bush, the 43rd president, struggled to hold in his emotions, a struggle he would lose at the end of his speech two

hours later. Laura Bush, too, choked back the tears.

It is at such a time, despite the sadness, that we feel nearer to our God than at any other.

That lovely hymn, written by Sarah Flower Adams in 1841, has a sublime history. Robert J. Morgan writes about the great hymn in his book, "Then Sings My Soul."

"It was reported," he writes, "that the band aboard the Titanic gallantly played 'Nearer My God, to Thee' as the great liner sank to its watery grave on April 14, 1912. A Canadian survivor told of being comforted by its strains."

What a song, and what blessed, eternal strains! They were worthy enough to soothe the dying souls in the icy North Atlantic more than a century ago, and they were worthy to soothe a former president and his family today!

But that song soothed another soul, too, and that one in this Georgia-land many years ago.

On Oct. 6, 1973, family members, co-workers from the Callaway Mill, loved ones from our little Southern church, and neighbors from all around the town of LaGrange gathered at the Murphy Avenue Church of Christ to celebrate and mourn the life of a mother of four: Ms. Fanny Louise Bowen, daughter of Preacher and Zona Belle Miller. Ms. Louise died far too young, at 42, but left

behind such trail of godliness and grace that her influence would be felt for many, many years, even today.

As they have done a hundred times, Larry Thompson and the Prince-family singers provided the beautiful, four-part harmony and hymns of comfort and blessing for the elegant Georgia lady.

Two songs often still stream through my mind today - one, "All Things Are Different In Heaven" (Oh, how true we know that to be!), and, two, "Nearer my God, To Thee."

In the 45 years since, I have not heard that song without thinking of Mama and all the lessons she taught on that blessed red soil, beneath these tall, elegant pines.

Emotions always tug down inside at the hearing and singing of the song. How fitting it is, I thought that crispy, cold morning: Ms. Sarah Flower Adams' hymn was worthy to help escort a great president to his final place of rest today.

And it was worthy to escort the greatest Southern lady I ever knew to hers almost half a century ago.

So, still, both for yesteryear and for today, I can say with assurance: All my song for now, and forever, shall be, Nearer my God, to Thee.

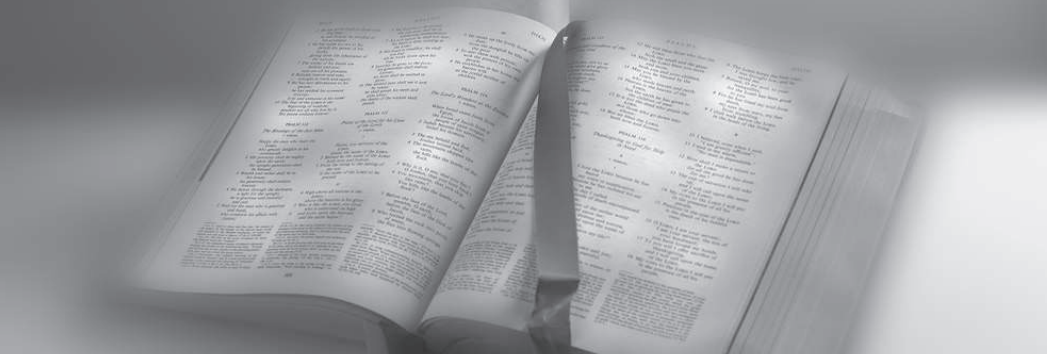
Landmark Church to present "The Meaning of Christmas"
