Pine cone zoo

What Benny Ackerman can do with a few pine cones is totally amazing

Benny Ackerman's home is a zoo.

All because he doesn't see pine cones, but possibilities.

You see, Ackerman's gift is in finding the animal in the pine cones produced by 16 slash pine, loblolly pine and Australian pine trees on his acreage east of Lexington.

With imagination, hot glue and more than a modicum of skill, he can create animals great and small in a matter of minutes to a few hours.

He used to pick up and

burn the pine cones until one day he didn't. He still picks up all those pine cones, even harvesting some unopened and still green from the trees.

He saves the likely ones in heavy 55-gallon black plastic trash bags stored in a shed.

His first one-of-a-kind pine cone sculpture was a deer.

That was seven years ago.

"It's just something to do when there's no yard to mow and nothing on TV," he said. "The more you do, the more

1 Boy 2 Hearts 11 Years

Jhett Skaggs returns to Lexington after latest transplant

Home.

That's where Jhett Skaggs is today.

It's also where he hadn't set foot for six years while he waited in Houston for the call from doctors that they had a donor heart for him.

Finally.

The Lexington youth was born Jan. 4, 2007.

He received his first heart transplant the following November. Doctors then told his parents the heart should last until he was in his teens.

But a follow-up visit five years later revealed the transplanted heart was diseased and failing.

Parents Brian and Audra Skaggs were told Jhett needed another new heart as soon as possible and they moved him to Houston.

The wait for a new heart was expected to be four to

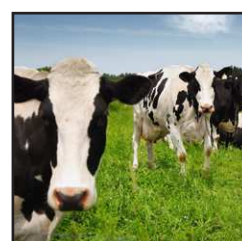

Bedlam blood drives

Event today at Purcell hospital

Give blood this football season and get a free Bedlam T-shirt.

That's the offer from the Oklahoma Blood Institute,

which conducted a blood drive Wednesday at Dibble High School.

The OBI will be at Purcell Municipal Hospital from 2 to

6 p.m. today (Thursday) for a community blood drive.

Oklahoma Blood Institute is the sole provider of blood to Purcell Municipal Hospital.

All donors will receive their choice of a free "Bleed OSU Orange" or "Bleed OU Crimson" T-shirt.

"No matter what color you bleed, we love our football here in Oklahoma," said Dr. John Armitage, president and chief executive officer of Oklahoma Blood Institute. "But saving the lives of our neighbors and friends through blood donation is what really defines the spirit of our community."

OBI relies solely on 1,200 volunteer blood donors a day to meet the needs of patients at more than 160 hospitals and medical facilities, as well as all air ambulances statewide. There is no substitute for blood, and the donation process takes about an hour.

Blood can be donated every 56 days. Platelets can be given as often as every seven days, up to 24 times a year.

If donors opt not to take the T-shirt, funds will be given to Global Blood Fund, a 501(c)(3) charity organization helping procure much-needed blood center supplies in developing countries.

Appointments to give blood are not required but can be made by visiting obi.org or calling (877) 340-8777.

To donate blood, 16 year olds must weigh at least 125 pounds and provide signed parental permission. The minimum weight for donors who are 17 and 18 and older are 125 and 110 pounds, respectively.

The do's and don'ts of voting

General and special elections set for November 6

Voters who are registered will go to the polls November 6 to vote in the General election.

Also, those voters who are registered within the Blanchard, Dibble, or Newcastle School Districts boundaries will find a ballot to vote in the McClain County Emergency Medical Services Special Election, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said today.

Please keep the following information and tips in mind as the election approaches:

- Early voting will be available at the County Election Board office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. November 1 and 2 and from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. November 3.

Lines are possible at peak voting times. Wait times will likely be shortest at mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Anyone in line to vote at 7 p.m. will be allowed to cast a ballot.

- Anyone who needs to look up their polling place, verify their registration information, or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: www.elections.ok.gov. Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

- Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the County Election Board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot.

There are three ways for voters to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state, or tribal government; or show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the County Elec-

tion Board; or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.

- Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may be assisted by a person the voter chooses.

In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union. A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes.

Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-

I did a little research and found some interesting stats with regards to counties not only here in Oklahoma but across the country.

Of the 100 poorest counties in America, Kentucky has 22

of them.

The poorest county in America, according to the Wikipedia list, is Wheeler County, GA.

Coming in at number 33 on the list is Greer County, OK.

Greer County has the distinction of being the lowest per capita income county in Oklahoma at \$13,241, according to 2010 U.S. Census data.

Oddly, the two counties that are adjacent to Greer, Harmon at \$17,677 and Kiowa at \$18,921 are significantly higher.

McClain County comes in at number 15 in Oklahoma at \$23,556.

So without further ado, let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Halloween."

Laurie Strode (Jamie Lee Curtis) comes to her final confrontation with

Michael Myers, the masked figure who has haunted her since she narrowly escaped his killing spree on Halloween night four decades ago.

Now this right here is the October release I've been looking forward to.

Growing up I was never much of a horror fan.

Ask anyone in my family and they'll tell you I was a massive scaredy cat when it came to movies. So it shouldn't come as much of a surprise that I never saw any classic horror films as a kid or even a teenager.

It's only recently that I've grown to appreciate the scarier side of Hollywood. Because of that I had a bunch of "Halloween" movies to catch up on this week before going to see this latest one.

Sadly, I didn't get through all 10, yes they've made 10 of these, 11 including this latest one, but I ended up making a pretty decent dent nevertheless. I even saw the 2007 Rob Zombie remake of the original.

Fortunately for anyone who doesn't want to dedicate a week of their life to slasher flicks, this latest entry to the "Halloween" franchise completely ignores every film in the series beyond the first one.

This one even goes out of its way to separate itself from all the other sequels, with characters outright denying a certain plot twist from "Halloween II" as just a rumor.

Personally I don't mind the fresh start. Plus this isn't even the first "Halloween" movie to ignore a large chunk of the previous entries.

1998's "Halloween H20," set 20 years after the events

of the first film, pretended like movies four, five, and six didn't exist. And the similarities between H20 and this film don't stop there.

Both feature a Laurie Strode haunted by the terror of Michael Myers, to the point that it affects all her relationships, especially with her immediate family.

But the Laurie in this latest film is somehow even more paranoid than the one in H20. Heck, she's basically a doomsday prepper. She even has a hidden bunker fully stocked with food and weapons.

Laurie's family situation is worse off here as well. In this version she has a daughter (Judy Greer) who wants to have absolutely nothing to do with Laurie, adding a large amount of strain to any family get-togethers they have.

It's no surprise that Jamie Lee Curtis delivers a great performance here as Laurie, considering the original movie was her first breakout role.

She isn't just phoning it in for a paycheck. Despite how standoffish and reclusive she seems on the outside, there's a strong emotional core to her character, one that's very easy to sympathize with.

Of course in the end Laurie's paranoia is proven justified and Michael winds up coming back, otherwise this wouldn't be much of a horror movie.

And while this latest film isn't quite as gory as the Rob Zombie remake, Michael Myers is just as intimidating as ever.

The killings here aren't just bloody, they're brutal and unsettling, with Michael often leaving bodies posed in horrifying unnatural ways.

It was quite chilling at times. It all built to this incredibly nerve-racking finale, an ending so intense I think it had every hair on my body standing on end the whole way through.

Overall I really enjoyed this movie.

No, it's not perfect. I was pretty underwhelmed with Judy Greer's performance and the whole mother-daughter relationship between her and Curtis wasn't quite as fleshed out as I was hoping it'd be.

Laurie's granddaughter, played by Andi Matichak, was even worse off. Not her acting, I thought her performance was just fine and her role led to some of the film's more touching scenes.

The poor girl just didn't have a character arc of her

own. Unless you count having incredibly poor taste in male friends I guess. In the end she was just an emotional outlet for Laurie. That and another person for Michael to hunt. I just wish that there had been a stronger focus on the three generations of Strode women and how Michael has affected all of their lives.

Instead the movie is mostly just about Laurie. And that's fine, but I can't help but feel the film could have been a bit more.

Those complaints aside though, this is still easily the best scary movie of the season.

If you're looking for horror, this is the film to watch.

If you haven't already I'd highly recommend watching the first 1978 "Halloween" though. It's not completely necessary since this film basically covers the cliff notes of the original, but you'll still get more out of the experience. Besides, they don't call it a classic for nothing.

"Halloween" is rated R.

Next is "The Old Man & The Gun." Based on the real life story of Forrest Tucker (Robert Redford), this

film follows the career criminal from his audacious escape from San Quentin at the age of 70, to an unprecedented string of heists that confounded authorities and fascinated the public.

Wrapped up in the pursuit are detective John Hunt (Casey Affleck), who becomes captivated with Forrest's commitment to his craft, and a woman (Sissy Spacek), who loves him in spite of his chosen profession.

This is such a cool story. An old man who robs banks and not only gets away with it for years, but does it with style, charming even the people he steals from.

Who could be better for a role like this than Robert Redford? This is perfect casting right here. The man oozes charisma and he's just plain fun to watch on the screen.

Unfortunately it's a bitter-sweet performance since this will reportedly be Redford's final film. But at least the man went out on a high note.

I adored the scenes with him and Sissy Spacek together. The two of them have great chemistry and I loved every second they were on screen.

I was less of a fan of Casey

Affleck, but I'm generally not a huge fan of his. Even in "Manchester by the Sea," the film he won an Oscar for.

He's just so bland and I can never emotionally connect with his characters. Still for what it is, he did fine in his role here. Nothing inspiring, but luckily he wasn't the focus of this film.

The other major thing of note is this definitely isn't a terribly action packed movie.

It's certainly a compelling story about a fascinating person, but despite that I still found myself struggling to stay awake at points.

I think that says more about my attention span than the quality of the film itself, but it's still something to keep in mind.

While there are bank robberies and a couple car chase scenes, this movie is much more focused on Forrest's friendships and personal life. Don't go into this expecting heaps of action. It's just not that kind of movie.

Regardless, this is a very charming film and a great send off for Robert Redford.

Perhaps it's not quite worth rushing out to see in theaters, but it's definitely one that should be on your list to see.

"The Old Man & the Gun" is rated PG-13.

Last this week is "The Hate U Give."

Starr Carter (Amandla Stenberg), a young high school student, is constantly forced to switch between two worlds. The poor, mostly black, neighborhood where she lives and the rich, mostly white, prep school she attends.

The uneasy balance between her two lives is shattered when Starr is witness to the fatal shooting of her childhood best friend at the hands of a police officer. Facing pressures from all sides of the community, Starr must find her voice and stand up for what she believes in.

Well this is a rough one. Hopefully I can get through it without making everyone from all sides hate me.

This film obviously tackles a topical and extremely polarizing subject. One that is an all too common story in communities across the country.

It's clear this movie falls on the side of movements seeking justice for black lives taken by

police officers. And I imagine upon hearing that, many of you will skip this movie without a second thought.

However, you'd be doing yourself a disservice because this is an excellent film.

For starters, the performances are fantastic.

Most notably from Amandla Stenberg. I haven't been all that impressed with Amandla's acting since her breakout role as Rue in "The Hunger Games," but she brought her A-game with this film.

She nails everything. Her emotions are palpable and you really feel everything her character is forced to endure here.

Not only with the aftermath of watching her friend die right in front of her, but also dealing with the pressures coming from her family, the people in her community, her prep school friends, even activists.

The plot itself, beyond telling a compelling story, feels like a point by point argument against the common defenses for police shootings.

They don't just gloss over the subject or say something ridiculous like "the police are evil and hate all black people."

The film is much more nuanced than that. It even goes as far to explain the perspective of an officer, citing frequent justifications of police action in circumstances like the one in this film.

Yes, it's definitely still preaching to the choir and I'm sure this film will attract much more black audiences members than white ones.

That's a shame though because I think this is a film just about everyone would benefit from seeing.

As a white guy who's lived a very sheltered life, I found the experience of watching this movie very enlightening. Not necessarily for the arguments it makes, I've heard almost all of them before, but for the perspective the film grants.

It gave me a greater understanding of what someone in Starr's position must go through.

And if there's one thing everyone could benefit from, it's becoming more understanding of one another.

I loved this movie. It's a well paced and engaging, emotional rollercoaster from beginning to end.

Sure, it'll make you cry, but it'll make you laugh too. Most of all though, it might give you a chance to see the world from a different point of view.

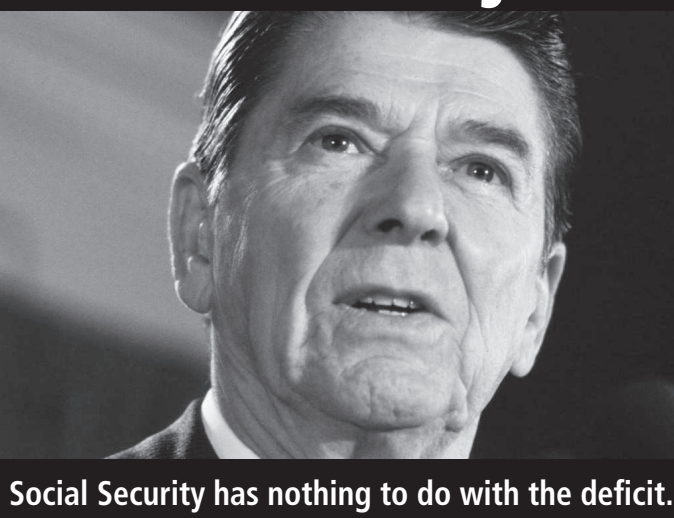

Vote:

tactile interface (ATI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or at their assigned polling place on election day.

- Voters who have moved since the last election, but who have not transferred their voter registration to their new address, may do so on Election Day by going to vote at the polling place where their registration has been in the past.

While voting, they may fill out a form instructing the County Election Board to transfer their registration to the new address before the next election.

- Those who became physically incapacitated after 5 p.m.

Tuesday, October 30, 2018 still can request an emergency absentee ballot. Those who might qualify for an emergency absentee ballot should contact the County Election Board office at 405-527-3121 as soon as possible for more information.

- Any violation of election law will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities. Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. It is also unlawful to remove a ballot from the polling location, possess intoxicating liquors within half a mile of a polling place or to disclose how you voted while within the election enclosure.

Lauren Allison entered this world on July 22, 1988 amid a flurry of activity and continued her journey in that manner until her recent departure on October 15, 2018.

In the 30 years of Lauren's life she was always aware that she was a part of something bigger than herself. Even though her body was a constant source of pain and frustration, her spirit soared with determination and a heart full of love and laughter. As a child, her sister Cassi made sure that she would experience life and often took her on their own adventures such as climbing trees and playing in the sand.

Lauren was funny, even as a kid and her therapists and doctors often would ask her to attend their classes and teach students about working with children who had developmental disabilities such as cerebral palsy. 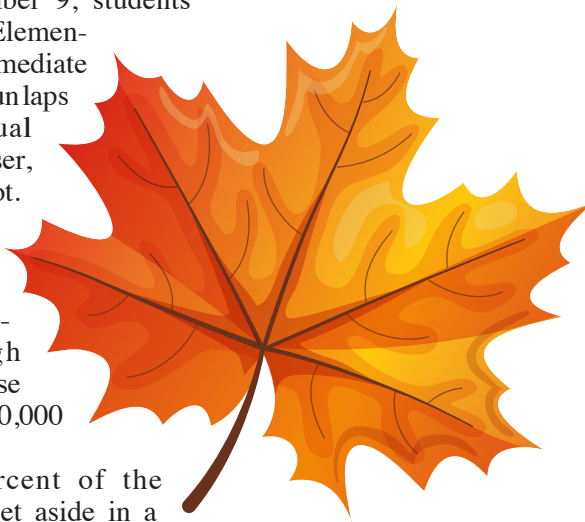

you learn."

Ackerman doesn't copy from photos, saying he knows from watching nature shows on television what the animal looks like, be it elephant, dolphin, giraffe or abominable snowman.

So you don't think the yeti is a real animal? Don't try telling that to Ackerman's grandson who now shares his room with the abominable 2' 8" critter.

He's learned pine cones picked green will remain closed. But he also knows how to close a pine cone that has opened.

"Put them in water," he said, "and they will close."

Then it's simply a matter of coating the thing in hot glue and it will stay shut.

Each of the pine varieties produces a different kind of cone. The Australian pine grows the smallest cones while the slash pines provide the big cones.

Ackerman keeps what he doesn't give away.

So far, he's kept 24 of the 43 unique, sometimes realistic and sometimes whimsical sculptures.

Wife Debbie thinks the menagerie is cute, Ackerman said.

"But I think she thinks the house is getting full," he added.

Not everything he makes can be wholly pine cone. Ackerman also uses acorn caps, the fuzz inside of sweet gum balls and a select few other materials.

Astork, for example, carries a wee infant in a sling and a tiny ceramic frog is perched beside a pond on which two swans are a' swimming.

A large eagle, its wings spread to take flight, is perched

on a tree branch.

Working an hour or so at a time, the eagle was five weeks in the making.

"If I ever make another eagle, it won't take me five weeks," he said.

His pine cone zoo includes marine life - dolphins, orcas and even sharks.

No snakes, though. He doesn't make those, saying they would be too simple.

Ackerman was assistant manager of United for 25 years before retiring. For the past 10 years he's worked maintenance at the McClain County Courthouse.

That's where 30, give or take, women each have one of Ackerman's animals.

Another of his newest sculptures is a dragon. For that he used nails for horns. The wings are fashioned from a black plastic trash bag, shaped and stretched over a frame.

"I just made the dragon this week," he said.

He once made a gorilla, using a magnolia seed for the body.

"That's the only thing I made that doesn't have any pine cones," he said.

Other creations include poodles (one pink and one with two heads), a fox, squirrel and a buffalo.

Ackerman doesn't question this artistic side that showed up when he was well into adulthood.

"I can draw flies in the summertime," he quipped.

When he looks at a pine cone, its inner animal "just comes to me, what pops into my head," he said.

And his hands do the rest.

With just two seconds left in the first quarter, Colton Penner caught a Toby Prevoist pass for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead.

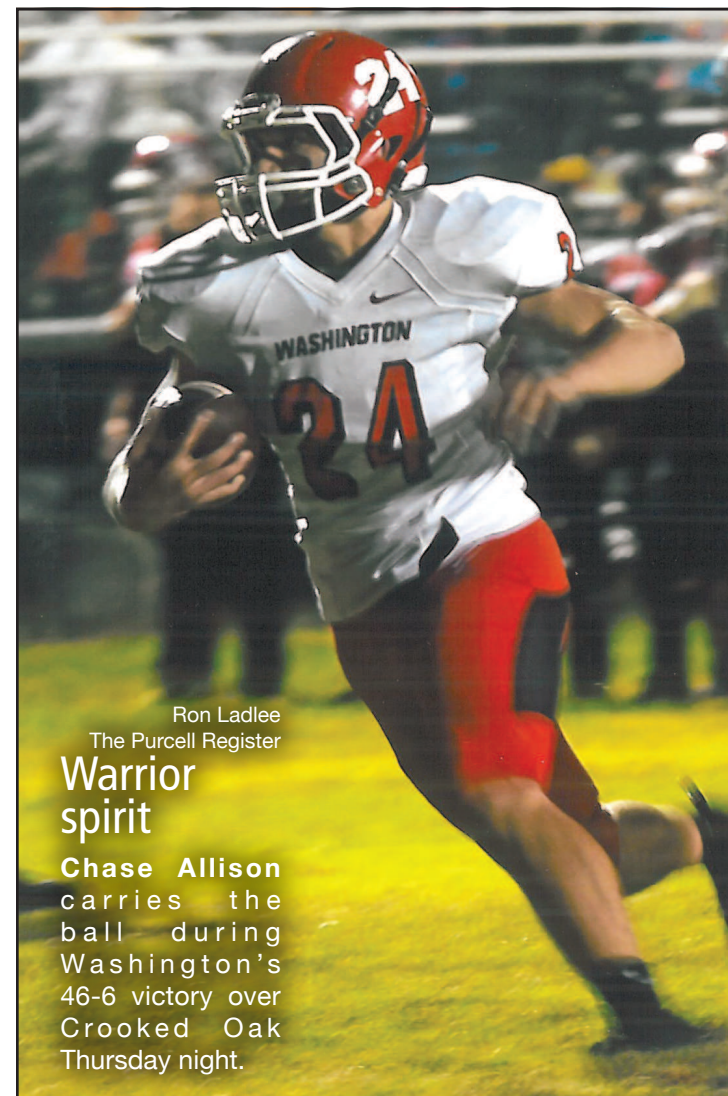

“Last week, we had things going against Millwood in the first quarter,” Ibarra said. “We just stopped executing as a team. This week, we came out and we knew what the plan was. We had to respond and that’s what we did.”

Prevost had another big game. The senior carried the ball nine times for 53 yards.

More importantly, he completed 18-of-26 passes for 182 yards and four touchdowns.

Lexington defensive coordinator Keith Bolles had nothing but positive things to say about his club’s defensive effort.

“Clegg saw the motion and he was able to make a great play,” Bolles said of Clegg’s interception.

“That was a big momentum swing. It really helped us out and he did a great job. I thought our defensive ends and linebackers played a really good game.

“Avery Armstead and Ryan Hailey were solid. Auston McWaters is always tough and then we had Jordan Land who played great at linebacker.

“I was just very pleased with the defense. Every year we hope that (a playoff berth) is what is in store. That’s what our goal is every year. These kids have reached that goal. Now, it’s time to set more goals and anything can happen.”

After going 6-4 last year but missing the playoffs in his first year at the helm of the ‘Dawgs, Berglan is happy to see his team going to the post-season this year.

“It’s a big win that puts us in the playoffs,” Berglan said.

“These guys deserve to get a taste of the playoffs. We played great defense in the second half.”

“Destrie Shea replacing Ma-

son Hamm at tailback was a very big key to this win. He did a great job of blocking against that 3-3 stack defense where they’re always bringing people.

He was able to pick them up on those situations and, when we slipped him out on the flare, he was a dangerous weapon.

They started double covering Jaylen Cottrell which opened up some other guys.”

Berglan noted his team is not looking past Crooked Oak (1-7 overall, 0-5 district) this week.

The ‘Dawgs will host the Ruf-Nex at 7 p.m. Friday night at Floyd West Field.

“We’re not the prettiest team to watch but we find a way to reach the end zone,” Berglan said.

“We’re entertaining and that’s what it is about. Last week, we got our teeth kicked in against Millwood.

This week, though, we proved what we’re made of. We came out and had a great game on both sides of the ball against a very good team.

“Crooked Oak has a lot of athletes. It’s a trap game for us. We can’t look past anyone.”

This week we recognize Dwain McCraw as our Veteran and Volunteer of the Week. Dwain celebrated his 80th birthday Monday, October 22. He has been helping us for several years at the front desk where he always shares his quick wit and a smile for everyone who comes through our doors. Please join

us in wishing Dwain a Happy Birthday and telling him how much we appreciate his military service along with everything he does to help veterans and their families.

As most of you know, each month we provide more than \$25,000 in services to the men and women and their families who have served the United States Military. Some of those services are transportation to the VA Hospital for medical appointments, medical testing, food items, rent, utility payments along with a host of unexpected expenses that we all will have. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit we are dependent on the people we help to help the next veteran who needs assistance. Your contributions are tax deductible.

Currently, only 10-12 percent of the people we help will pay it forward to the next veteran or their family. Another way you can help us fund our services is to donate a vehicle to our veterans. We give those donated vehicles to a needy veteran, or they are sold to raise funds to support our mission.

We have made a few changes for the upcoming winter months. We now bring the first 90 veterans and surviving spouses in when we open the doors. Those remaining will be given a number and asked to wait in their cars until seating is available. By using our new system, we were able to assist more than 175 people last Tuesday and 159 on Thursday. We also now use assigned seating.

For the increased number of veterans and surviving spouses, we will look at ways to shorten their wait time for our services. We are looking at setting up satellite offices in other parts of Oklahoma along with adding other states where we have volunteers. We have several veterans in eastern Oklahoma who are planning to join our team along with veterans in Florida, North Dakota and a couple of other states. Our services are free to all veterans and surviving spouses.

Many of the veterans were making their first visit to our Veterans Foundation last week. Some of them traveled hundreds of miles from their homes to receive help from our volunteers. When I asked some of them why they traveled so far for help with their VA claims, they answered their friends or family recommended us to them. Many of the men and women we help to receive VA benefits say they have tried for years but had been denied before coming to us for help.

Some of them told me they only wanted the VA Health Care but had been told they did not qualify because they made too much money. That is the standard answer the VA gives to many veterans who do not have a service-connected disability. What they are not informed about is that if they have a service-connected disability the door opens for VA health care.

Most veterans could be service-connected for Tinnitus

and hearing loss if their military job exposed them to loud noises. We encourage all veterans to stop by to fill out an application for benefits. One of the things that are very important to a veteran's spouse or dependents is DIC benefits. A surviving spouse may be eligible if the veteran dies from a condition that is presumptive to their military service or one that is service-connected and listed as a contributing factor on the veteran's death certificate. I do not believe it makes any difference what service-connected disability is named as long as the disability is listed as a contributing factor on their Death Certificate.

While we are talking about benefits for surviving spouses, 15 spouses were at our location Tuesday and 12 on Thursday. We find it much easier to help the surviving spouses of veterans who were receiving benefits from the VA. Many veterans could probably receive VA benefits for a disease that was presumptive to their service if they would have only applied before it was too late.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all the decisions the VA makes on the claims of all of the veterans and surviving spouses represented at our Foundation. Of the rating decisions received this week, 17 veterans received disability ratings of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$667,973 per year. They will also be eligible for other Oklahoma State tax benefits and other VA benefits.

Twenty-nine veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent. These veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$498,049 per year. Some of these veterans will be eligible for other benefits. Three surviving spouses received approval for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance benefits from VA.

The letter to the Hebrews presents Christ as one who has gone before us as our great High Priest (Heb. 4-5). The Jewish people would have understood this very well. They were accustomed to having a priest who would offer live animals as burnt offerings to God in the Temple.

But Jesus offered not another animal, but Himself. This important concept might be more important to us if we have a personal experience to which it will relate.

When I was 26 years old, my father died. My mother had died two years earlier. I watched as my father grieved for her, but I could do little to help him in his suffering. I could hear him sob in his room at night.

We were good friends. He and I would play tennis together, work in the yard together, and sing together with the rest of the family. My Dad loved to sing!

He and I also made a few trips together during the summer when I was home from seminary. After a visit to Mexico City, on the way home from the airport, my father and I were cramped in the back seat next to luggage. I leaned my head on his shoulder and started to cry. I

don't know why I did this. But I felt such emotion. He began to sing to me softly a lullaby that my mother sang to us when I was a child. I just wept with my head on his shoulder.

The next day he traveled to visit a friend up in Michigan. A few days later, he died of a sudden heart attack. I never saw him again.

Over the next several years, I would occasionally have a dream in which Dad came back to see me. One time I asked him "What is heaven like?" He said "It is like the best places you have ever been on earth. It is the best of what you have already seen."

But in this dream, I also remember a wooden cross being visible in the background. When I awoke, I knew that the dream was reminding me that to reach heaven, one must first carry his cross. I knew that I could do it, since Dad had already done it before me.

My father had lived this life and carried his cross. Now he had returned to tell me that I too could both carry my cross and live in heaven at the same time. Our faith in Jesus teaches us that there is no glory without suffering. There is no light without contrast with the dark-

ness. There is no life without the cross.

Christ is our great High Priest who has been here before. He knows what we suffer. He knows our pain. He knows our temptations. He knows the anguish of living. He also was afraid to die, as we are. And yet he offered these up to the Father.

Let us offer ourselves, with Christ and with those we know who have gone before us, to our Heavenly Father.

Much thanks to the men who volunteered last Saturday to remove the old roof on our Annex office and replace with new shingles. Many hands make lighter work, and yet it still took all day! We were blessed with beautiful weather for this work and the new roof looks fabulous.

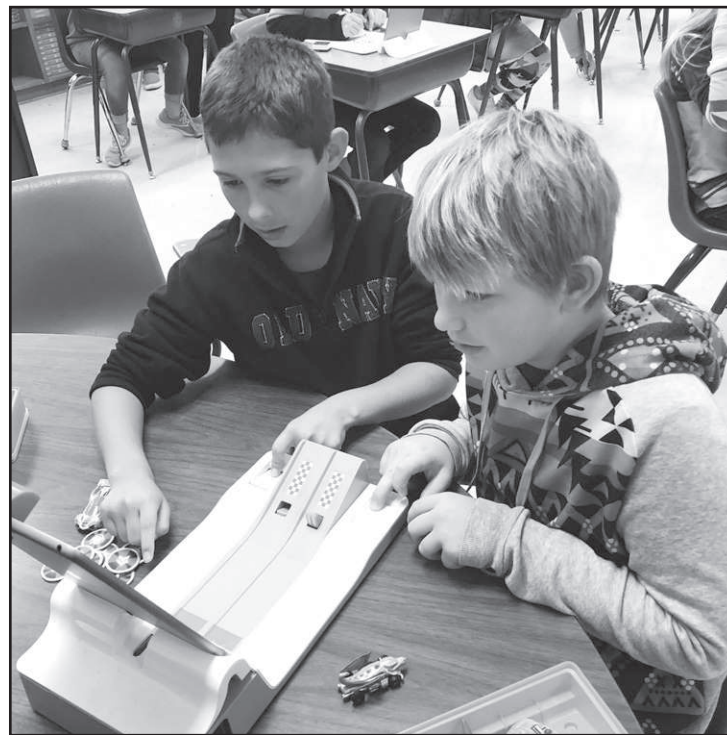

Front-Porch Gospel: "We have come to Mount Zion"

Welcome, good friends, to the "front porch."

As we came to Hebrews recently in our stroll through the Bible, we paused for a sermon at Hebrews 12:22, a passage that contains a final plea for the faithfulness of those first-century Christians.

"But ye are come unto mount Zion," he says, "and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels ..."

In other words, says the Spirit: You haven't come to the place Moses went to bring the old covenant. You haven't come to a mount filled with thundering and lightning, a place of petrifying fear. You have come, instead, to the city of the living God. You have come to the heavenly Jerusalem. You have come to Mount Zion. That, alone, is reason enough to remain faithful during these hard times.

When the Holy Spirit speaks of this Zion, you see, He is talking about the church of our Lord, the church we have grown to love. We have so many reasons, today, to love this Zion, the church of Christ, with her vast history.

Her beginning is the first Pentecost after the Lord's death and resurrection. Convicted by the knowledge that they had crucified Jesus, that Jerusalem crowd interrupted Peter at the apex of his sermon and pleaded: "Men and brethren, what shall

we do?" (Acts 2:37).

Peter's answer is clear and concise: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

Three-thousand men and women move with tremendous fear that day, and they immediately respond to Peter's command (v. 41).

Upon their obedience in baptism, they become heirs of God and heirs of all the benefits that accompany being in the family of God. In addition to the Lord's forgiving their sins and giving each of them the personal gift of the Holy Spirit, He "added to the church daily such as should be saved" (Acts 2:47).

These 3,000 do not join anything at all. They obey the gospel by faith, repentance, and baptism; and God adds them to the church of His Son. That day their own personal history with the churches of Christ begin. Note that when we say "churches of Christ," we speak — as does the Bible — of those individual local churches spread out all over the world (Romans 16:16).

While our personal history begins when we come up soaking wet out of that water (Acts 8:38), the history of the church of Christ goes further back than our lifetimes and our parents and grandparents (2 Timothy 1:5). The church's history is rich and deep, going

back, prophetically, thousands of years to the Old Testament.

Remember Isaiah's great sermon, in the second chapter of Isaiah:

"And it shall come to pass in the last days that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established in the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow unto it. And many people shall go and say, Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths: for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem" (verses 2-3).

What a timely prophecy of the future coming of the Lord's church! What a rich and powerful history! We have come today to the church Isaiah prophesied about a thousand years before the Lord's coming. We have come to the "mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob."

We have come today to tell you that we are glad to have come to the heavenly Jerusalem, the glorious "city of the living God." We have come to the Lord's church with all of her glories and benefits.

To quote the Hebrew writer, we have come to a special mount, a mount from which all blessings flow. We have come to Mount Zion.

Samples online

One election, many differing ballots

Voters in McClain County can review sample ballots before casting their votes in the November 6 general election.

Karen Haley, McClain County Election Board secretary, said sample ballots may be viewed by using the online voter tool on the Oklahoma State Election Board website, www.elections.ok.gov.

Sample ballots will also be posted at every precinct polling place on election day.

In addition to state, judicial and one Congressional race, every ballot will include the five state questions.

Voters in the Dibble, Blanchard and Newcastle school districts will also find a proposition for a \$900,000 bond issue to construct and equip an emergency medical services facility in Newcastle for the McClain County-Grady County Emergency Medical Services District.

A similar bond proposition was turned down by voters earlier this year.

Beyond that, ballots will vary by precinct for two Oklahoma House races and one McClain County commissioner race.

Voters in Precincts 1,2,3,14,17, 23 and 28 will receive ballots that include the McClain County District 1 Commissioner race and State House District 20 race.

Those in Precincts 4, 7, 21 and 24 will have ballots listing the county commissioner race and State House District 42.

State House District 20 will also be included on ballots in Precincts 9, 13, 18, 20 and 27. Receiving ballots that include House District 42 will be 5, 6, 8, 10, 11, 12, 16, 19, 26.

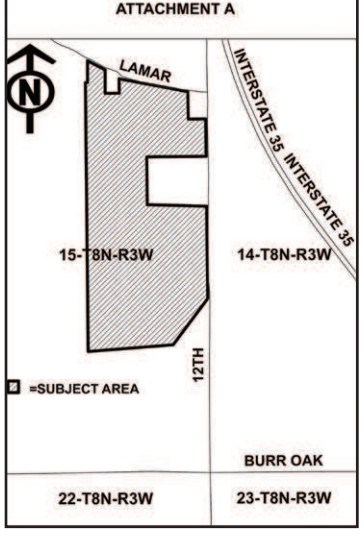

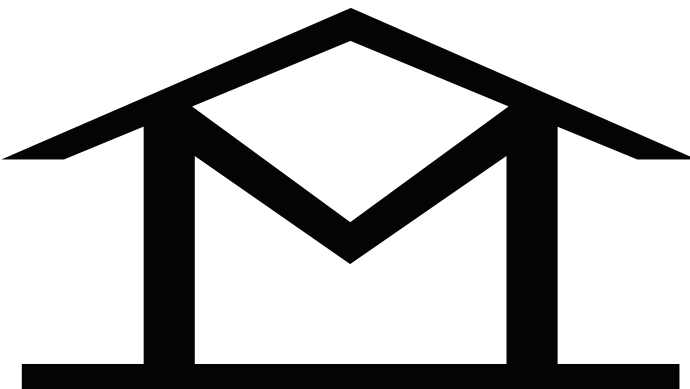
