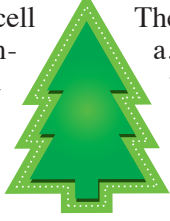


Christmas Bazaar set for December 7

Second graders are so innocent, bless their hearts. Ever helpful, they stand ready to assist parents in preparing next week's holiday meal.

But while their enthusiasm runs high, the same can't be said for their food safety knowledge.

They have no grasp of food borne illnesses like salmonella. So take it from **The Purcell Register**, parents. You may want to wait a few more years before you put them in charge of roasting the holiday bird.

I went to Purcell Elementary School this week to query kids – specifically second graders – on their food preparation knowledge.

Not that I'm picking on kids.

There are plenty of adults who struggle with Turkey Roasting 101.

I recall one holiday meal for which a family member volunteered to roast the turkey.

When others went to stuff the bird before placing it on the table, they discovered a charred paper bag filled with extremely well-done giblets still in the cavity.

But I digress.

Kiley Leonard, 7, assured me she can "cook scrambled eggs by myself."

"I really do like cooking," she said.

So how would she cook a turkey or a ham?

First you pre-heat the oven to 60 degrees before popping the turkey in for "30 or 20 minutes."

A solid 30 minutes to bake a ham and if 60 degrees was good enough for a turkey, it's "probably" good enough for a ham.

Westin Cunniss, 8-1/2, said he will make the pumpkin pie for his family and may handle the task of stuffing the turkey with, well, stuffing.

He is creative with his pumpkin pies, sometimes using a recipe "but not all the time."

As for cooking a turkey "maybe 25 minutes at 250 degrees" will get the job done.

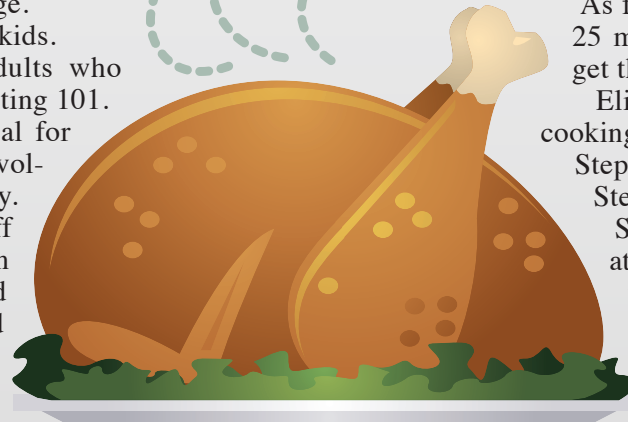
Elijah Haysler, 8, broke down cooking a turkey in simple steps.

Ponca Chief's statue joins greats in Statuary Hall

A new statue of a legendary chief of Ponca City's Ponca Tribe joined the silent sentinels in Statuary Hall of the U.S. Capitol.

The statue, submitted by the State of Nebraska from which Chief Standing Bear hailed and in which he is buried, is 12 statues down from the statue of Sequoyah, the creator of

the Cherokee syllabary, which made reading and writing possible.

Chief Standing Bear replaces a statue of Williams Jennings Bryan, a former Omaha World-Herald editor and Secretary of State under Woodrow Wilson.

Each of Oklahoma's two statues at the U.S. Capitol have indigenous roots, but Oklahoma Congressman Tom Cole said that it is so important for

Native Americans everywhere to have that representation.

"It is almost unthinkable to us today, that it wasn't until 1879 after Standing Bear's trial that Native Americans were declared to be persons for consideration of the law," said Nebraska Congressman Jeff Fortenberry (R).

"Chief Standing Bear didn't seek to be a civil rights leader," said Fortenberry. "He simply wanted to bury his dead on their ancestral homeland."

One-third of his tribe died along the way from their ancestral homelands to what became Ponca City. Among them was the Native American leader's 16-year-old son.

His son Shielding Bear's last wish was to be buried along the Niobrara River in Nebraska. Standing Bear returned to the state to bury his son and was arrested, according to the National Park Service.

His case was brought to Federal court where he made a famous speech Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi cited.

According to the National Library of Medicine, Chief Standing Bear held out his hand to the judge and said, "This hand is not the color of yours, but if I pierce it, I shall feel pain. If you pierce your hand, you also feel pain. The blood that will flow from mine will be of the same color as yours. I am a man. The same God made us both."

Pelosi and other leaders said this speech was one of the key turning points that gave Native Americans more rights and he became of the nation's first civil rights leaders.

"Everyone (who) comes through here will see that statue, hear that story and be inspired. From every part of the world, people will give witness to him. From all over America, people will see that for generations to come," said Pelosi.

The statue of Chief Standing Bear will make the 68th piece of art out of nearly 8,000 at the Capitol depicting Native American people, according to Architect of the Capitol. Only six of those depictions are statues.

Not only is Standing Bear's presence important in D.C., but Oklahoma Congressman Tom Cole says his influence is more significant due to Standing

Bear:

Bear's placement.

"The dominating force of the Statue, it is beautiful, and tells a very powerful story most Americans don't know very much about," said Cole. "Most Americans and even Oklahomans don't know that most Indians didn't have the right to vote until 1924. And the last Indians to get the right to vote were actually in New Mexico in 1962. So it's been a long struggle for Native Americans."

Cole said the statue is the largest and the most impressive in the room.

One of the attorneys who organized Standing Bear's statue dedication Katie Brossy

brought her 6-year-old son with her to see the dedication.

"The first thought that came to me that my children will be able to see one of our Ponca leaders here in the United States Capitol and I just can't tell you how much that means to me," said Brossy.

She said Native Americans are often thought of as an "invisible race," but she hopes that the statue will help people think twice and remember that Native Americans are still here.

A movement starting in the late 1990s encouraged states

to review their status in hopes of getting more diverse representation in the statues at the Capitol. Each state is allowed to have two statues placed in the Capitol. One of the first signs of change showed in Rosa Parks' statue in 2013, although the plans for the installation began before 2006, according to the U.S. Government Printing office.

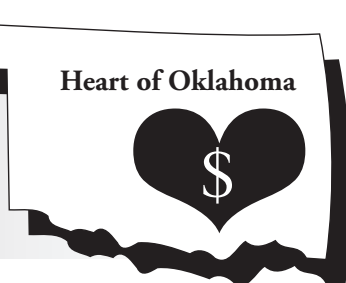

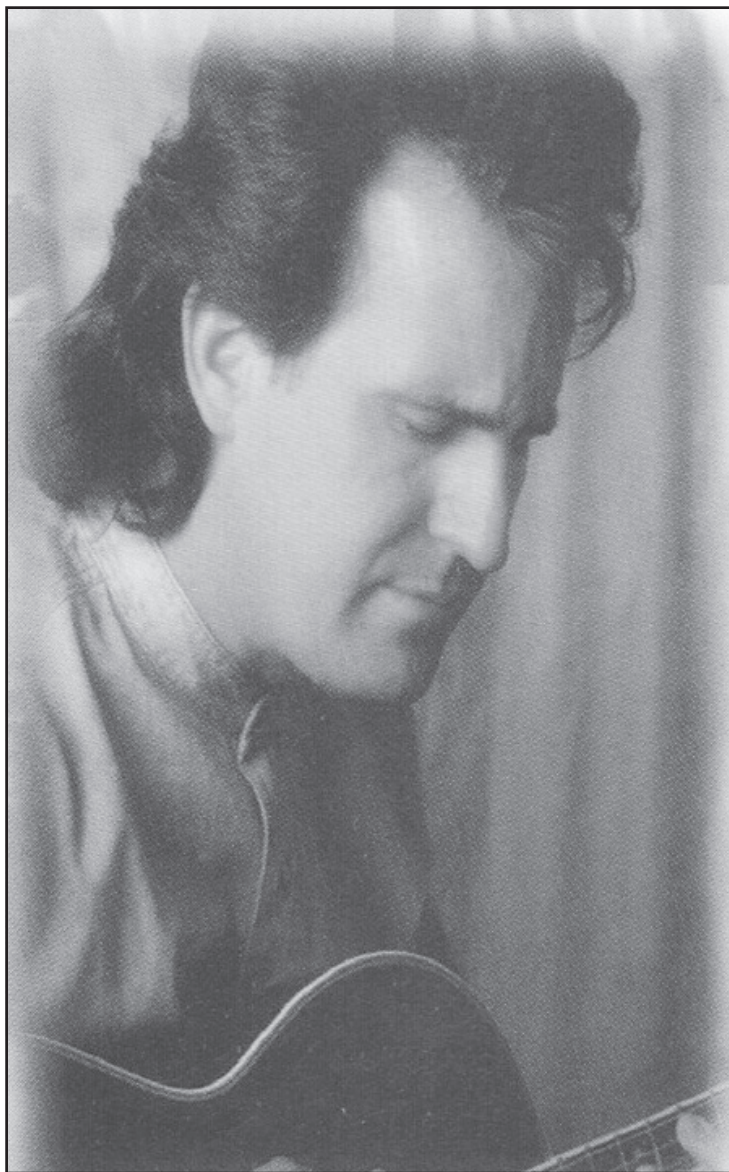

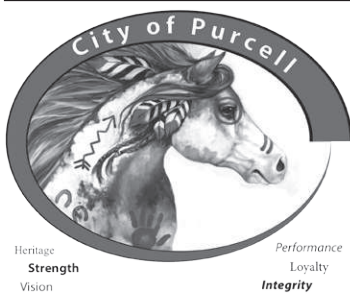

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.
 No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

Oklahomans rally at Supreme Court as DACA arguments begin for fate of 13,000

The fate of nearly 13,000 undocumented Oklahomans and 700,000 undocumented nationwide now rests with the six men and three women justices of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Thousands of advocates from across the country rallied at the court's steps as justices heard arguments regarding President Donald Trump's decision to end the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or DACA, an Obama-era policy that offered legal protection to individuals who came to the U.S. as children.

After Trump's decision to end the program was blocked by lower courts, the Supreme Court now faces a historic decision.

Among the crowd was DACA recipient Angelica Villalobos, a lead organizer for Dream Action Oklahoma, who made the trip from Oklahoma, to be at the forefront of the case that could determine her future.

"I think that for me, the biggest thing is having the justices see a face to the story," Villalobos said. "We're not just numbers. We are, at the end of the day, human beings."

Villalobos, of Oklahoma City, moved from Mexico to Oklahoma when she was 11 years old—a choice she said her parents made to give her a better life. Now 34, she has lived in the state for 23 years.

"This is my home," Villalobos said. "It's very hard

for me to even think about if I have to go back. That's not even something that I think about because I've been here for more than half of my life."

Although she faces the threat of deportation if the Supreme Court rules to rescind DACA, Villalobos and her husband, who is also a DACA recipient, are not fearful for themselves, but for their American children.

"I have a 19 year-old girl, and we talked about, you know, if we end up in this situation, you might have to be the legal guardian of your siblings," Villalobos said. "Back in 2017, when they terminated the program, she was not even old enough to, but we were already having this conversation."

Many have speculated that the decision will come down to Chief Justice John Roberts, a conservative justice who has ruled alongside liberal justices in recent controversial cases.

Trump wasted little time Tuesday in attacking DACA recipients in an early morning Tweet.

"Many of the people in DACA, no longer very young, are far from 'angels.' Some are very tough, hardened criminals. President Obama said he had no legal right to sign the order, but would anyway. If Supreme Court remedies with overturn, a deal will be made with Dems for them to stay!" he wrote.

Back in Oklahoma, college student and DACA recipient Carlos Rubio, who came to the U.S. from Mexico when he was

3 years old, recalled visiting Washington in 2017 to lobby for DACA.

"I've had the opportunity to sit down with members of Congress to talk about comprehensive immigration reform, specifically in the Oklahoma delegation," Rubio said. "They weren't super successful, but those are conversations that have happened."

Among the members of the Oklahoma delegation, Villalobos said advocates from Oklahoma have spoken mostly with Rep. Kendra Horn (D-OK), who has seemed open to discussing the fate of DACA.

"Congress should not hand over the reins on immigration policy to the Supreme Court. We need bipartisan action in Congress to provide a permanent solution that leaves Oklahomans and American businesses with a clear path forward on immigration," Horn said in a statement.

"Finding common ground takes hard work, and I will continue to push Republicans and Democrats to work together to make progress on this issue."

At a news conference following the Supreme Court hearing Tuesday, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi joined Democratic leaders in urging the Senate to pass legislation that would protect undocumented individuals.

Pelosi said the American Dream and Promise Act, a bill that would offer protections to DACA recipients and provide them with a pathway to citi-

zenship, passed in the House over 160 days ago. However, the bill has yet to be voted on in the Senate.

If the Supreme Court decides to rescind the program, DACA recipients across the country will be left wondering what comes next.

"Congress better be ready for us coming down on them because they promised to have protection for us," Villalobos said. "We are going to be holding them accountable for that."

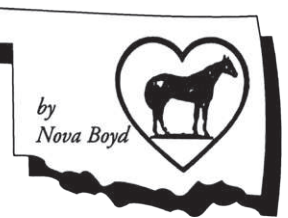
For Rubio, conversations regarding immigration policy should not end when the Supreme Court reaches a decision. Instead, he said an ideal solution would be to focus on comprehensive immigration reform.

"My parents have never been a part of the conversation. They're just excluded as felons or victims of systems in their countries, and for them to come over to a country and give up everything like that's their fault...They have as much of a bargaining claim to citizenship or comprehensive immigration reform as we do," Rubio said. "It's not just for me, it's also for them."

A final decision for the case is not expected to be made until 2020. Until then, the future of nearly 700,000 DACA recipients in the U.S. remains unknown.

Lydia Moore's years of involvement in barrel racing and all women's segments of rodeo, as well as her years of

being a rodeo secretary for many different stock contractors throughout the country, and as being executive secretary for the Women's Professional Rodeo Association, made her an excellent choice. She is a Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association and Women's Professional Rodeo Association gold card member.

Moore was raised in a rodeo family in Missouri. Her parents, Hazel and Percy Moore, worked for many rodeo and wild west show companies, traveling all over the country with daughters Maudie, Lydia and Percyna in tow. She learned the art of trick roping from her dad and her mom taught her trick riding. Mom Hazel was a noted circus and wild west show performer, and her dad was a rodeo saddle bronc rider and steer wrestler. As a youngster, Lydia performed with her family in dressage and trick roping acts and won many talent shows as a teen with her skills.

Her introduction to barrel racing came purely by accident. At the St. Louis Fireman's Rodeo in the early 1960s, they did not have enough barrel racing contestants, which was a new event for rodeo. They reached out to a local arena and Lydia was one of the ladies to enter.

As Lydia's interest grew for the sport of barrel racing, she was drawn into the politics and business side of rodeo. In the early 1960s she helped form one of the first Girls Rodeo Association (GRA) chapters (Missouri), which was the predecessor of the Women's Professional Rodeo Association (WPRA), as it is known today.

In 1967, Moore moved from Missouri to Oklahoma City and worked with Stanley Draper and Bobbie Steenbergen of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, and National Finals Rodeo management, Clem McSpadden and Buster

and June Ivory. She was hired to be the liaison for barrel racers at the National Finals Rodeo, which was held in Oklahoma City from 1967 to 1985 before moving to Las Vegas.

She served five years on the GRA board of directors as bull riding and southeastern region director before being hired as the executive secretary for the organization in 1973. She served in that position, a job she loved, for nearly 25 years.

Lydia also took on the task in those early years of the NFR as the GRA Awards Chairwoman, collecting thousands of dollars in awards for the ladies each year.

A prized honor she received in 1991 was the WPRA Coca-Cola Woman of the Year, which was awarded for her years of service, passion and devotion to women in rodeo, and rodeo in general.

Moore says she feels fortunate to have seen firsthand the phenomenal growth in the sport of barrel racing that it enjoys today—barrel racing as a standard rodeo event, equal money at rodeos and equal money in the NFR.

I think we can call this lady a real trailblazer!

Rodeo Hall of Fame inductions and awards are sponsored and selected by the Rodeo Historical Society, an organization that is a division of the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, whose worldwide members share an interest in preserving both rodeo history and the sport itself.

Membership supports the Museum's rodeo programs, including research, an oral history project, acquisition of materials for the American Rodeo Gallery and the distinguished Hall of Fame.

inductions, the Ben Johnson Award is presented annually during the ceremonies.

Ben Johnson, Jr., of Pawhuska, Oklahoma, was a "cowboy's cowboy." Ben Johnson, Sr. made sure that young Ben was proficient in ranching, roping and riding skills for use in everyday ranch life. Ben, Jr., however, was a natural with a rope and went on to join the Rodeo Cowboy's Association, winning the World Champion team roping title in 1953.

The same year he would also act in his first movie. An opportunity presented itself for Ben, Jr. to provide horses for a Hollywood movie company filming a western, the preferred movie genre of the era. He had a mild demeanor, an easy going way of speaking and excellent horsemanship skills and was hired on for the movie as – you guessed it – a cowboy! He would go on to star in a multitude of movies and even win an Academy Award.

Ben's outstanding character in and out of the rodeo arena did not go unnoticed. The establishment of an award titled after the cowboy was created by the Rodeo Historical Society. The first recipient, Clem McSpaden, earned this award in 1998.

According to the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, which presents and displays those earning the tribute, it is presented to a living person who has contributed to the development of rodeo sport, been involved in community and youth activities, and whose life reflects the character of Ben Johnson.

This year the recipient is Doug Clark, Clark Quarter Horses, Wayne. Doug and his family had the pleasure of knowing Ben Johnson personally and felt the same way about the man as the award's criteria reflects. The recognition for Clark is the best tribute this quiet cowboy could ever have received.

Clark is no newcomer to rodeo. He grew up honing his roping and horsemanship skills in the family arena with the help of three generations of family cowboys before him. Four other members of his family are in the Rodeo Historical Society Hall of Fame, his great-grandfather, Monroe Veach; grandparents, Charlie Beals and Imogene Veach Beals; and an older brother, Derek Clark. He also spent many hours in his family's saddle shops, the Veach Saddlerys in Trenton, MS and Tulsa, OK.

Clark earned his PRCA gold card status and has spent his career competing in all timed events - tiedown, steer and team roping. He has earned many

top-20 year-end standings in tiedown roping, rodeoing only on a part-time basis.

One of his more memorable wins was the 2005 Pendleton Roundup Steer Roping Championship. This boosted his year-end winnings, qualifying him for the National Finals Steer Roping, the same year that he was reserve in the average, as well as had the top horse of the Finals.

As one of the top horse trainers in the country, Clark has earned accolades in the rodeo and the horse show arenas. Several of his horses have been voted on by the top cowboys annually as American Quarter Horse Association/PRCA Horses of the Year in tie down and steer roping. Doug was part of the team winning the 1999 AQHA Superhorse Championship at the Word Show, riding the stallion, Look Whos Larkin.

Horses that Clark has either trained, sold or ridden for cowboys have appeared at every PRCA NFR or National Finals Steer Roping for more than 30 years, in events from tiedown roping to steer wrestling.

Earning championships in PRCA's Prairie Circuit, Clark is in the record books as the tiedown roping year-end champion and steer roping champion. He is a past All-Around Champion at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo, the "Daddy of 'em All", earning the win from money earned in two or more events, as well as setting an arena record there in 1987 in the tiedown roping. His time was a blistering 11.0 seconds.

Many of the top contestants from the junior rodeo level to the professional ranks have spent time at Clark's horse training facility. Trevor Brazile, Tom Ferguson, Joe Beaver and Roy Cooper are but a few of the

“The Lady” is a specialized “sprang” technique of weaving shown to Shackleford by Margaret Roach Wheeler, a Chickasaw recognized globally for her textile artistry.

“The Lady” was added to the Eiteljorg permanent museum collection but is on loan to “Visual Voices: Contemporary Chickasaw Art,” currently on exhibit in Santa Fe, N.M., through 2020. It is more than eight feet in length, elegantly

displayed to hang as if a woman was wearing it.

“I am very honored NMAI purchased the shawl and pleased it will be a part of a museum celebrating Native culture encompassing all of North America,” she said.

While “Finger Woven Shawl” doesn’t quite have the elegant moniker of “The Lady,” Shackleford said the piece is one of the more difficult she has tackled. “‘The Lady’ is a looser weave, and it flows. ‘Finger Woven Shawl’ is a tight weave. Both techniques require different sets of skills

and each challenges me as an artist,” she said.

Shackleford burst onto the scene in 2016, claiming a first place and top spot in the textile division at the Southwest American Indian Art and Market, the nation’s largest and most prestigious Native American art show held annually in Santa Fe. The show is juried and art must be available for purchase during Indian Market and Festival.

In mid-2017, “The Lady” was purchased by Eiteljorg.

This year, “Finger Woven Shawl” was acquired by NMAI.

Carl Albert bust placed back in U.S. Capitol after years in storage

A bust of the highest ranking Oklahoma politician in history made its way from a storage basement back into the halls of the U.S. Capitol on Monday.

A crowd gathered as the sculpture of former Speaker of the House Carl Albert rejoined those of prominent politicians in the Capitol. All five Oklahoma representatives stood alongside current House Speaker Nancy Pelosi to welcome the bust back to the building.

“It’s fitting that we have, again, members with us today from both sides of the aisle because Speaker Albert was a leader. He saw past partisan politics, who rose above rhetoric to represent the best interests of everyone who served,” Freshman Rep. Kendra Horn (D-OK), who led the effort to bring the bust out of storage, said.

Carl Albert’s grandson, Luke Albert, was working as a congressional intern for Horn this summer when he noticed the bronze bust was missing from the Capitol.

The bust was originally placed in the Capitol in 2004, but its time in the spotlight was short-lived when the statue of the Democrat was moved to storage during Speaker of the House John Boehner’s term.

“We did not know it had been moved,” Katherine Albert, the granddaughter of the Carl Albert, said. “We only found out it had been moved when we found out that they were moving it here.”

Albert served as Speaker from 1971 to 1977 during President Richard Nixon’s impeachment. Because Vice President Spiro Agnew resigned in 1973, Albert was next in line to become president following the Watergate Scandal.

“Lesser people would have

leveraged that opportunity to make themselves President of the United States. Speaker Albert could have done that, but he chose not to,” Rep. Frank Lucas (R-OK) said.

Joel Jankowsky, a former staffer for Albert, said today’s unveiling was especially meaningful because it is the 40th anniversary of the Carl Albert Center’s opening, a nonpartisan institution at the University of Oklahoma that works to inform and engage citizens on democracy.

Although Albert died in 2000, many at the placement ceremony remembered him as the “Little Giant.” While he was only 5-feet, 2-inches tall, speakers at the unveiling said he was known as a proverbial giant who put country over self.

Lindsay scored with about seven minutes left before halftime, making the score 27-12.

in the second half," Sharp said. "It was one of those games that we had our backs against the ropes. They had all the momentum after they got the second score."

Lewelling shouldered some of the load on the ground and racked up 84 yards on 13 carries.

Dustin Scoggins ran for 21 yards on three carries and Ibarra had four carries for 16 yards.

"It seems like every time we run a jet sweep with Scoggins it gets called back," Sharp lamented.

As a team Wayne finished the night with 428 yards rushing.

"We continued to rush the ball," Sharp said.

Pawnee Wayne will face a stiff Pawnee Black Bear club Friday night in the second round of the State Playoffs.

Pawnee (11-0) was the Class A District 5 champion and is coached by Russell Cook.

"It will be a tough game," Sharp said. "At this point in

the season there are no teams left that can't play."

Pawnee is a heavy running team similar to Wayne.

"They'll be in double (tight end) wing T out of the shotgun," Sharp said. "It's going to be smash-mouth football and they will line up and say 'here we are'. They run their offense well."

Defensively they have run a 3-4 in several games but have also shown a 4-3 look. Sharp expects them to have plenty of defenders in the box.

"We may even see a five-man front with three backers," he said.

They aren't overly big up front but the team plays fast and their linebackers are active and physical.

Their secondary is made up of their running backs, Sharp said.

"I hope we can continue the trend of playing good run defense," Sharp said.

"Their kicker doesn't get the ball into the end zone but he kicks it to the five or 10 and they cover really well," Beller said.

Kingdom of God, as portrayed by the life and teachings of Jesus, is the ultimate ideal for which we give our lives. It is something much larger than petty divisions amongst ourselves.

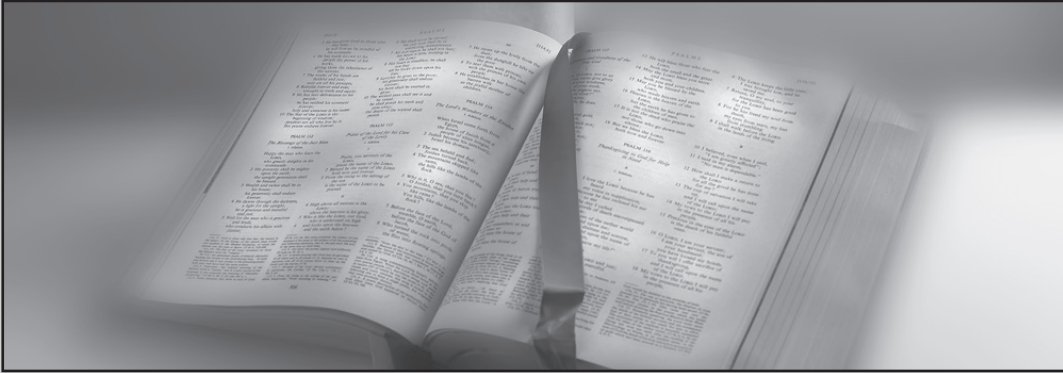

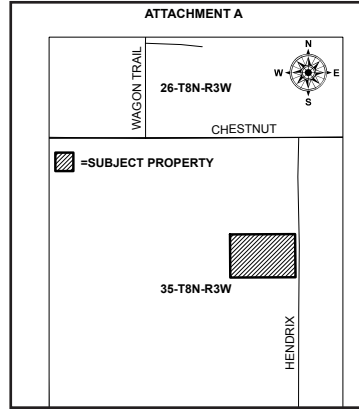

It could be time for some new (food safety) traditions

The holiday season is upon us and in full swing. Menus are being planned and long standing family favorite recipes will likely grace the table as family and friends gather to celebrate.

This time of year can be nostalgic for some old family holiday traditions. While some of these traditions are perfectly fine, it may be time to change things up just a bit in an effort to keep foodborne illness at bay, said Barbara Brown, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension food specialist.

"It may be an old habit to thaw a frozen turkey or other meat on the kitchen counter. You may even try to speed up the process by putting the meat in a sink of hot water," Brown said. "To prevent the spread of harmful bacteria, develop the new tradition of thawing meat in the refrigerator or in a sink filled with cold water. Both of these processes will take a few hours to several days, so plan accordingly."

If your holiday celebration includes a trip over the

river and through the woods to grandma's house, and you are responsible for bringing part of the meal, be sure the food maintains proper temperatures. Keep cold food cold and hot food hot.

Brown said a cold dish can be packed in a cooler with ice packs to keep it cold while traveling and should maintain a temperature of 40 degrees or less Fahrenheit. Hot dishes can be transported in insulated bags. Covering the dish with foil also will help it retain heat.

Maintain hot foods at 140 degrees Fahrenheit or above. If the hot temperature cannot be maintained for that amount of time, cool the cooked food and pack it in the ice chest.

"It's important to pay attention to how much time each of the dishes will be out of the refrigerator or oven. Foods that are outside of these temperature zones for more than two hours should be discarded," she said. "Once you arrive at your destination, place the foods in the oven to reheat, or store in the refrigerator until mealtime."

is not a holiday meal without gravy. While most cooks bring the gravy to a boil before serving it, a boiling temperature may not be a habit when reheating. Do not rock the gravy boat and serve it without first bringing it to a boil for subsequent meals.

Following the meal, most folks simply want to claim the recliner or a section of the couch for a nap, but make sure all the food is put away first. Remember that gravy that was brought to a boil before the meal?

If it still is relatively hot, pour it into a shallow dish so it will cool quicker in the refrigerator. Consider leaving the lids off containers until the food has cooled down. The lids can trap heat in the storage container which will make the foods take much longer to cool down. Once the food is cool, put the lids on the containers.

"The holiday season is a wonderful time to bring back those long standing family traditions, but it's also a great time to create new ones, especially if they help ensure a safe meal," Brown said.

For many families, it simply

Foreign entities are exploiting veterans via social media

A veteran organization and the nation's largest social media companies told a congressional hearing this week that imposters from foreign countries are using social media to exploit former service members.

Representatives from Facebook, Twitter and Vietnam Veterans of America testified before the Committee on Veterans' Affairs to explain how foreign infiltrated social media exploits veterans and spreads misinformation while acknowledging what is currently being done to combat veteran identity theft.

Imposters from Eastern Europe; especially Russia, Bulgaria and Ukraine are posing as the Vietnam Veterans of America organization on Facebook, Twitter, Google, Instagram and Reddit to sway the public with fake news and inflame national divisions with xenophobic messages.

"These Macedonians had staged a hostile takeover of two [Facebook] pages originally owned by real American veterans and then used them to build up xenophobic hatred against four women of color in Congress," said Kristofer Goldsmith, the chief investigator and associate director of policy for Vietnam Veterans of America.

Since the beginning of the investigation, the organization has already found election interference related to the 2020 presidential campaign by these foreign entities. Vietnam Veterans of America, or VVA, has documented what they believe to be campaign finance fraud with well known Macedonian criminals who used followers from the Vets for Trump PACs Facebook page into sending political donations overseas via PayPal.

Separately, the veterans group discovered a number of foreign entities from eastern Europe and the Asian Pacific selling counterfeit merchandise featuring their trademark

logo alongside racist, political propaganda.

Additionally, Nigerian scammers are using the names and photos of veterans to lure Americans into romance scams.

"Nigeria hosts a massive organized criminal empire," said Goldsmith.

Some of the photos used by scammers are of soldiers who were killed in action. "Their gold star families are re-traumatized as their deceased loved ones continue to be used as bait for financial fraud," he said.

The veterans group also completed an analysis of the Russian ads released by the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence circling on platforms such as Facebook. Among them were at least 113 ads directed at veterans, using them as props in Russia's mission to divide Americans, said Goldsmith.

Facebook's head of security policy, Nathaniel Gleicher, said that Facebook does not allow people to use fake accounts, artificially boost the popularity of content or impersonate someone else.

"We recognize however, that there are bad actors intent on misusing our platform and some of those bad actors target individuals and groups that are considered trustworthy, like veterans," he said.

Gleicher said that Facebook sees foreign governments distort veterans issues. However, he said that this is less common than financially motivated fraud.

"Any amount of this type of deception is too much," he said.

Currently, Gleicher said Facebook uses four components in efforts to stop inauthentic behavior. First, their investigators who hunt and remove sophisticated threats. Second, their technology programmed to detect and remove common threats.

Third, their transparency and reporting tools intended to give users context about who they are following and

communicating with. Fourth, working closely with civil society, researchers, governments and industry partners so issues can be flagged and eventually resolved.

Gleicher said, "Combining these four strategies allows us to pursue what we call adversarial design; continually adopting our platforms to make them more resistant to deception and more conducive to authenticity."

On the other hand, Twitter's public policy manager, Kevin Kane, said that they take a more holistic approach to dealing with fraudulent accounts.

Kane said that over the last year and a half, Twitter has found and challenged about 520 million accounts as a result of their investment in automated detection systems to look for coordinated networks.

"We want to massively disrupt these networks and not just focus on certain segments they seek to interfere with the conversation," he said.

Although there are efforts established to combat fake accounts, U.S. Congressman and Chairman, Mark Takano (D-Calif.), said that he is convinced that more can and must be done to protect veterans' voices.

"More importantly, we need to understand what loopholes, roadblocks and barriers are needed and implement more effective enforcement and protections and perhaps identify an opportunity for legislative action to address any policy gaps," he said.

Takano said that the integral piece of the solution to the problem lies with law enforcement. This led the committee to schedule a closed briefing for their members and staff with the FBI to learn how they and other law enforcement agencies are engaging with social media platforms.

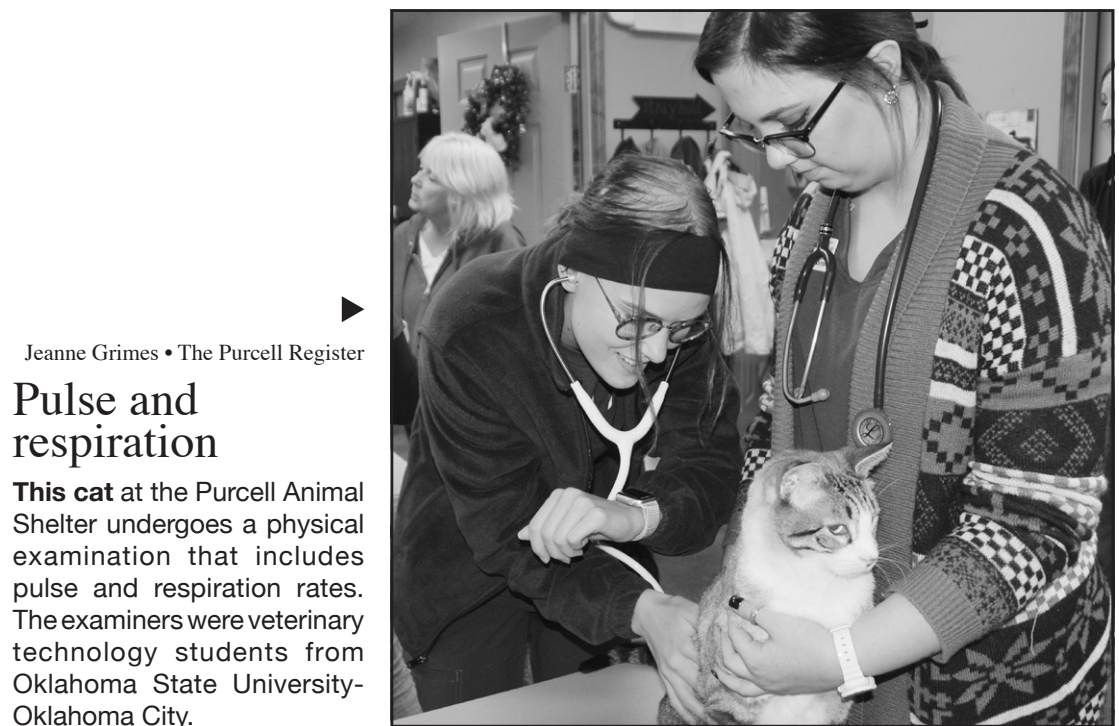
