It's a numbers problem. On Monday of this week there were over 100 prisoners in the McClain County jail.

They have had as high as 142 for a brief period of time before shipping some off to Grady County.

The jail has 53 beds. The bottom line is McClain County needs a bigger jail.

By the Oklahoma constitution every county has to have a jail.

McClain County Under sheriff Landy Offolter says, looking into the future of one of the fastest growing counties in Oklahoma, McClain County needs a 200-300 bed jail.

"The county is going to have to pass something to construct a new jail," Offolter said.

It's as simple as that.

And shipping prisoners off to Grady County is no cup of tea. The county is charged \$45

## OSU Deer Food Plot Field Day

Wildlife enthusiasts and those managing deer on their land have many forage options for planting in their fall planted food plots.

It can be difficult to sort through the hype and find real facts on which to base their decisions.

For these reasons, OSU Cooperative Extension and Ross Seed Company of Chickasha have teamed up to offer a deer

food plot field day on Thursday, October 11, at 4 p.m.

The event will take place at Canadian Valley Farms located at 12781 Slaughterville Road in Lexington.

Participants can look forward to seeing 22 fall planted food plots containing individual varieties and mixes.

There will be eight legumes including alfalfa, four clovers, cowpeas, soybeans, and Austrian winter peas.

Chicory and brassicas includ-

ing radish, turnip, and rape are a few of the newer species becoming more popular that will be seen, along with the more common grasses such as winter oats, wheat, cereal rye, and triticale.

In addition to being able to see all these plots, Dr. Dwayne Elmore, OSU Professor and Bollenbach Chair for Wildlife Management, will speak about

## A mammoth find from early on I-35

Fossilized tooth mistaken for rock

When my dad retired from a 26-year career in the Army, he and mom moved back to Oklahoma and dad went to work as an engineer with the Oklahoma Department of Transportation. It was 1966 and dad worked out of the Ada residency office.

Interstate 35 was a work in progress and dad did a lot of work on the cuts through the Arbuckle Mountains.

One day he brought home this odd-looking thing from a job site. It was maybe 8 inches long, roughly oval in shape and flat on the bottom. There were ridges of decreasing circumfer-

ence rising from the base.

He thought it was just an unusual rock. A oddity of geology. It had a fair heft and for the next 40-odd years, he used it as a door stop in the master bedroom.

By 2011, both of my parents had passed and as I prepared to sell their home and its contents, I decided not to offer dad's door stop. After all, who would want to buy a funny looking rock? Besides, it had always intrigued me.

So I took it home, continuing to use it as a door stop.

At some point I began to suspect the "rock" was something

more. But I had no idea what and wasn't sure how to find out.

Last week, I photographed it and sent the pictures to Dr. Richard Cifelli, curator of vertebrate paleontology with the Sam Noble Museum of Natural History at the University of Oklahoma.

Did he had any idea what it was, I asked in an email.

I got my answer on Monday. "Nice!" Dr. Cifelli wrote. "That's a molar of a mammoth!!!"

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### Responsibly funding American priorities

Last week, Congress responsibly fulfilled its most fundamental duty to the American people by funding some of the nation's most critical and pressing needs.

The legislation signed into law by the president not only provides funding to strengthen and support our national defense, but it ensures vital programs and initiatives that serve all Americans can continue to do so effectively.

While this recent action by Congress and the president is unquestionably good news for the country, I am proud that it also marks a historic and much-needed return to governing by regular order.

For some time, lawmakers have relied on various short-term and long-term solutions to fund the government, including omnibus appropriations bills and continuing resolutions. The legislation enacted last week, however, marks the first time in over 10 years that Congress has sent more than one final appropriations bill to the president's desk before the beginning of the fiscal year.

Without question, this is a true testament to the hard work that has taken place over months on both sides of the aisle and in both chambers—culminating in the conference committee that put forth the final legislation. I was honored to be a part of those negotiations.

I am very proud that the resulting bipartisan, bicameral legislative package included two key appropriations bills—the Department of Defense (DOD) and Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies (LHHS).

In fact, the two bills included in the conference report together comprise 65 percent of all government funding that is determined and considered on an annual basis.

Specific to the DOD portion of the legislation, I am pleased that lawmakers advanced fund-

ing that strengthens our military and equips our dedicated service members with the resources they need to forge confidently ahead in every mission. It is important to note that this marked the first time in more than 10 years that DOD has received full funding before the start of the fiscal year.

Rightly so, the legislation reflects a much-needed increase in funding for our military, including the largest pay raise for our service members in nine years.

Especially following years of underfunding for our troops and the associated and inevitable decline in readiness, the measure is a step in the right direction that ensures our service members are able to confront threats both at home and abroad.

Along with critical funding for our nation's defense, I am also incredibly proud that the LHHS bill was included in the conference report and that it maintained many of the priorities first advanced by the appropriations subcommittee I chair. Even more remarkable, the inclusion of LHHS marks the first time in 22 years that the bill has been completed in full and on time.

Following the work within my subcommittee earlier in the year, I was grateful to be part of the discussions that secured funding for several vital programs and initiatives—including a significant boost for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and focused funding for successful educational and workforce programs.

The increase in NIH funding ensures more attention can be paid to medical research in order to tackle vexing health problems like Alzheimer's disease, cancer, and the opioid crisis.

That same commitment to combating real health issues and concerns was similarly reflected in funding provided for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which is the government's first line of defense in battling public health

emergencies and fighting infectious diseases.

Along with resources for the nation's health-related needs, the LHHS bill contained funding for proven programs that help develop students and workers, setting many Americans up for better opportunities and lifelong success.

For example, the bill contained worthwhile increases for Impact Aid, Head Start, TRIO, Gear Up and early childhood education programs. The bill also devoted funding for workforce development programs as well as career and technical training. Without question, this legislation helps ensure Americans are healthier, better educated and trained for our collective future.

Combined with other appropriations bills recently signed into law, the latest action by Congress means that more than 75 percent of annual funding has now been provided for fiscal year 2019.

As negotiations for the remaining bills continue in the days ahead, the legislative package passed last week responsibly includes a short-term solution as well. While not ideal, the extension gives lawmakers in both chambers more time for a thoughtful agreement on funding and to ultimately achieve the best result for the country.

More importantly though, the continuing resolution prevents the damaging consequences of a partial shutdown in the interim and ensures the government remains fully funded, open and operational.

Without question, lawmakers voted in support of priorities we all share for a safe, secure and thriving country. The monumental legislation passed last week not only provided for services across broad areas of the government, but it fulfilled our promises to the American people: to patients, to communities, to business owners, to the military and to Americans of all stripes.

### Time again to shop for best Medicare deal

Now's the time for Oklahomans with Medicare to check their health and drug coverage for 2019.

Medicare's open enrollment period runs from October 15 to December 7.

Open enrollment is the best time to make sure your health and drug plans still meet your individual needs, especially if you've had any changes in your health.

By now insurers should have notified you of any adjustments in your health or drug plan coverage or any changes in your out-of-pocket costs for next year.

Even if you've been satisfied with your health and drug coverage, you may benefit from reviewing all your options. Shopping around may save you money or improve your coverage.

Medicare Advantage remains a strong alternative for people who prefer to receive care through a private insurer

rather than through Medicare's original fee-for-service program. Most plans include drug coverage.

The number of people buying Medicare Advantage plans is expected to grow by 11.5 percent to 22.6 million nationwide in 2019. Nineteen percent of Oklahomans with Medicare now opt to get their health care benefits this way.

Many Advantage plans charge a separate premium on top of the Part B premium you'll pay for Medicare's medical insurance. Nationally, the average monthly cost for that separate Medicare Advantage premium will be \$28 in 2019 -- \$1.81 less than this year.

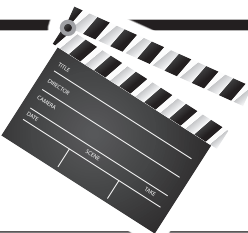
Oklahomans in Medicare's traditional fee-for-service program who want to add prescription drug coverage can choose from 28 drug plans with monthly premiums ranging from \$15.50 to \$143.70—about the same premium range as a year ago. Nationally, the average premium for a basic drug plan in 2019 will drop by \$1.09 to \$32.50 per month.

The market for kids films has seemed awfully barren as of late. Sure, "The House with a Clock in Its Walls" was released last week and "Christopher Robin" last month, but neither are movies I'd want to take a six or seven year old to see.

"The House with a Clock in Its Walls" is just a bit too creepy for most kids under 10, while "Christopher Robin" felt like it was more aimed to appeal to nostalgic adults than to children.

Luckily "Smallfoot" fills that void of young children's entertainment pretty nicely. Sure, the film isn't exactly groundbreaking, but there's still a lot of fun to be had here.

The animation is solid all around. Brutal at times, but in a comical way. At times it reminded me of some of the old Looney Tunes cartoons.

I love the concept. In the movie the Yetis believe that the entire world, nay the entirety of creation, is just the mountaintop they've made their home on. Which isn't a mountain to them at all, but an island floating on a sea of clouds, carried on the backs of giant mammoths.

Plus they have to ring a gong to make the sun rise in the morning, which to them is a giant glowing snail that travels across the sky.

It's like an entire Yeti mythology. The whole thing is a fun spin on the old ideas people used to have about our place in the cosmos. Specifically the Earth being flat, at the center of the universe, and carried on the back of a giant tortoise.

So when a human suddenly appears, something that shouldn't exist as far as the Yetis are concerned, it completely flies in the face of everything they thought they knew.

It makes for a fun spin on the common Yeti folklore and gives the movie a very strong anti-dogma, pro-science, and critical thinking message. All of which I'm very much a fan of.

Beyond that, the film is full of colorful and mostly likeable characters.

I think this is Channing Tatum's first major role in an animated movie and I'd say he does a pretty decent job bringing his character to life.

In fact I'd say the voice talent is good all around. Danny DeVito, who plays Channing Tatum's dad in the movie, was probably the stand out to me, delivering one of the film's more emotionally potent scenes.

Even those like LeBron James, Zendaya, or Common, who were probably casted more for their popularity or musical talent than their acting ability, still voiced their roles well.

Speaking of music, this movie has songs! More than that, it's a downright musical, complete with giant upbeat dance numbers and everything.

I had zero idea this film was a musical going into it. Not that I'm complaining, I love animated musicals, but I could have definitely gone without hearing James Corden's character singing about his financial woes and wavering popularity, all set to the tune of Queen's "Under Pressure."

I already didn't care too much for Corden's character at that point, I certainly didn't need an entire musical number to emphasize how greedy and desperate he was on top of it all. Other than that, I enjoyed the music just fine.

The kids in my theater seemed to love the songs too. In fact some were so into them, they were up dancing during the end credits.

I guess if I had a major complaint, it'd be with the way the story wrapped up.

Like I said before, the film has a fun concept, but the ending did end up feeling a bit rushed.

Also I'm pretty sure the filmmakers didn't quite know what to do with Common's character in the movie. He basically has a complete change of heart at the last second for no reason whatsoever. It didn't ruin the movie for me, but a little more motivation for his character could have gone a long way.

All in all this is a pretty easy movie to recommend.

It certainly doesn't pack the punch of something like a Disney or Pixar film, but it's still entertaining all the same.

If you're wanting to take your young kids to the theater over the weekend, this is definitely the movie to see.

remember basic facts.

I'll admit, the movie made me laugh once or twice here and there, but overall I just didn't get much out of the comedy here.

On the positive side though, at least the movie isn't mean spirited.

Even though the film didn't make me laugh much, I didn't really end up hating anything in it either. I just didn't find it all that funny.

That's just me though. I imagine if you're a huge Kevin Hart fan, there's a good chance you'll adore it.

I base this mostly off the constant joyful laughter I heard from just about everyone else in the theater I was watching this with on Saturday.

People seemed to love it. Every scene they were cracking up, shouting at the screen, repeating lines they thought were funny to their friends. All in all they were having a great time.

I may have not gotten much out of the humor myself, but seeing this movie with an engaged, enthusiastic audience made the experience a lot more pleasant than it would have been otherwise.

Overall, this movie might not be for me, but if you enjoy other Kevin Hart comedies chances are you'll like this one too.

It's definitely not the smartest comedy I've seen this year, but for fans of Kevin Hart there's certainly plenty to like here.

Look beyond premiums, though. The only way to determine the true cost of your drug coverage is to consider other factors like deductibles, co-payments and coinsurance.

Medicare's website - www.medicare.gov - has the best tool for helping you narrow your search for a new health or drug plan. Just click on "Find Health and Drug Plans."

After entering your ZIP code and the list of your prescriptions, you can use the "Medicare Plan Finder" tool to compare your coverage and out-of-pocket costs under different plans.

The quality of a health or drug plan's customer service should be considered, too. To help you identify the best and worst, the Plan Finder provides star ratings for each plan. The ratings range from five stars (excellent) to one star (poor); three stars are average.

Higher-rated plans deliver a higher level of care, such as managing chronic conditions efficiently, screening for and preventing illnesses,

and making sure people get much-needed prescriptions. Higher-rated plans also have fewer complaints or long waits for care.

Besides using Medicare.gov, you can call Medicare's toll-free help line at 1-800-633-4227 or consult your "Medicare & You 2019 Handbook," which you should have received in the mail in the last few weeks.

One-on-one benefits counseling is also available through your State Health Insurance Assistance Program. In Oklahoma, you should call 1-800-763-2828.

Medicare's drug benefit continues to improve. You'll enjoy more savings on your prescriptions. The "doughnut hole," or coverage gap, will go away for brand-name drugs in 2019, which means you'll receive a 75 percent break on those drugs after you pay your annual deductible and until you reach the threshold for catastrophic coverage, when you'll pay substantially less.

The coverage gap for generic

drugs will remain for only one more year and will kick in for you once you and your drug plan have spent \$3,820 in 2019. At that point, you'll receive a 63 percent discount on your generics - a bigger discount than this past year.

If you're having difficulty affording your medications, you may qualify for extra help with your drug coverage premiums, deductibles and co-payments.

The amount of help depends on your income and resources. But, generally, you'll pay no more than \$3.40 for each generic drug and \$8.50 for each brand-name drug in 2019.

Thirty percent of Oklahomans with Medicare's drug coverage now get such a break.

There's no better time to check your Medicare health and drug coverage. Any changes you make will take effect January 1.

### Slow Cooker

#### Sloppy Joe Casserole

- 32 oz. package frozen shredded hash brown potatoes thawed
- 10.75 oz. can condensed cheddar cheese soup
- 1 egg lightly beaten
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 small onion, finely chopped
- 15.5 oz. can sloppy joe sauce
- Shredded cheddar cheese for topping

Spray your 5-qt. with nonstick cooking spray. In a large bowl, combine shredded potatoes with the soup, egg, salt and pepper.

Stir well then spread it in the bottom of the crock pot.

In a large skillet, over medium heat, brown and crumble ground beef along with chopped onion. Drain excess grease.

Stir in sloppy joe sauce. Spoon sloppy joe mixture over hash brown mixture in crock pot.

Cover and cook on low for about 4 to 4 1/2 hours.

**Note:** Shredded hash browns can be substituted for southern style hash browns, which are the smaller cubed potatoes, or you can use the Potatoes O'Brien that have peppers and onion mixed in with the cubed potatoes. If you'd like, about 10 minutes before it is ready, add about a cup of shredded cheddar cheese to the top of the casserole. Then put lid back on crock pot and allow the cheese to melt.

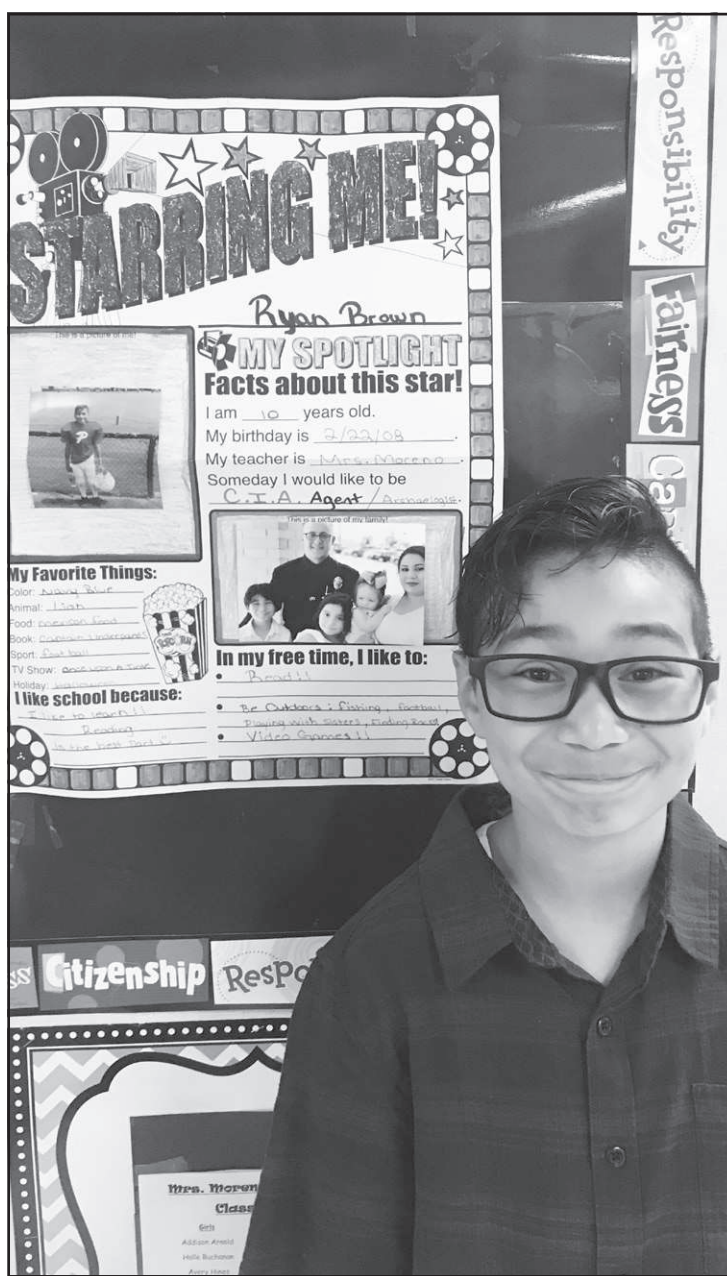

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

In chapter 8 of Mark's Gospel, Peter tried to dissuade Jesus from talking about his passion and death. Do you remember what Jesus said to him? "Get behind me, Satan. For you are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." (Mk 8:27-35) Your ambitions are not God's ambitions. Your thoughts are not God's thoughts.

Our task throughout life is to put on the mind of God, to think as God does, and to desire what God desires. In many of the verses that follow this passage in the Gospel, Jesus is teaching us more about the mind of God. Immediately after this incident with Peter, Jesus explains to Peter and to the other disciples: "If you want to become my disciple, deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me." (Mk. 34-35)

The meaning of Jesus' words is this - When we deny ourselves we are denying those things that lead us away from God. We have to die to these kinds of desires - for some, these desires are bitter feelings towards another person. For others, the desires are for alcohol or strong drink. For others it is pornography or gambling.

We have to die to these things, so that we might have new life with God.

Then, in chapter 9, the dis-

ciples were not able to cast out the demon out of a boy. They asked they were not able to drive out the demon. Jesus answered: "This kind can come out only through prayer." (Mk. 9:29) There are things that we cannot do without God's help.

Again, they were discussing who was the greatest among them. Jesus said "Whoever wants to be first, let him be the last of all, a servant of all." (Mk 9:35) This is the way God thinks. God desires us to be as servants to one another.

And in today's Gospel, we are given one more example of the mind of God. The disciples complained that someone else outside of their group was also casting out demons. Jesus told them: "Do not stop him. Whoever is not against us is for us." (Mk. 9:40) Whoever is doing God's work on earth is blessed.

Since the dawn of humanity, we have tended to divide ourselves into "tribes", e.g., nation-states, or political parties - Democrats or Republicans. Or we divide ourselves into religions - Catholic or Protestant.

But God does not look at us as members of a group. He only sees the good that we are doing. He only sees the work of building His kingdom on earth. It does not matter to God which group gets credit for it. He only

desires that the work be done.

And what is the work of God's kingdom that he desires? The work is casting out demons of anger and bad feelings. The work is bringing water to the thirsty and health care to those who cannot afford it. The work is giving victims a voice. The work is helping the homeless find a home. The work is casting out hatred that comes from tribalism. That is the work that God desires.

Let us put on the mind of God. May we rid ourselves of the things that lead us away from God. May we become servants of others. May we not discriminate against others because they belong to a different group. May we do the work of the kingdom. May we think as God thinks.

This Sunday, October 7, our parish will celebrate our Feast day, the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. All are invited to pray the rosary (bilingual) while in procession with the Blessed Sacrament beginning at 2 p.m. at the church. Bring the children as we will conclude with ice cream sundaes for the kids!

Our Adult Sunday School lesson was taken from Genesis 2, as a part of the Creation stories. In this chapter, we read the description of God's heartbreak over how sin altered the relationship between humans and God.

God had been in the habit of walking in the garden with the humans created earlier in Genesis. The Lord was looking for them, calling, "Where are you?" The humans were hiding in the middle of the garden. The man said he was afraid because he was naked and had hidden himself. God knew that the man had eaten fruit from the tree that God told them to avoid. When questioned, the man said the woman had given him the fruit and he ate it. When God asked the woman about it, she told God that the snake had tricked her and she had eaten the fruit.

God cursed the snake, one of the wisest animals, humiliating him to crawl on his belly and eat the dust. The snake and the humans and their offspring would be enemies from now on. God then punished the humans' disobedience by increasing the woman's pain during pregnancy and the man's pain in farming the land.

God didn't curse the humans themselves but gave them consequences of their actions as a good parent will do, though it broke God's heart to do so. The humans had made clothing from fig leaves to cover their nakedness. This wasn't a sign of the loss of sexual innocence, but a symbol of having lost the battle of willfulness and obedience. God provided them new leather garments that would be better protection for the humans and was an indication that their relationship with God was not completely severed.

Now that the humans knew the difference between good and evil, God sent them out of the Garden of Eden to farm the land from whose dirt the man had been made. The Lord didn't want to risk the humans eating the fruit of the Tree of Life and to live sinfully forever, so God stationed winged creatures wielding flaming swords to guard the path to the Tree of Life.

What was the humans' sin? They chose to do something that they knew was wrong. They blamed someone else for their own actions. They failed to be honest with God. They even tried to deflect some of the blame onto God for creating the tree, the snake, and the woman. Sounds familiar doesn't it? Why do we lie about whose fault it is and blame others for our own sinfulness?

God had compassion on them and made the man and woman new garments. This is one of the earliest acts of God's forgiveness seen in Scripture. Both hu-

mans were guilty, tried to blame others, and had violated God's instructions. But both were redeemed and reunited with God, made possible through God's love and grace—not by anything they did for themselves.

The Lord never stops loving even the most grievous sinner. Being driven from Eden probably wasn't as painful as making the humans deal with the internal consequences of their disobedience. Shame, regret, sorrow, and a sense of failure stays with us and comes to our mind for quite a while when we have sinned. But this heart-brokenness doesn't last forever.

Without feeling our sinfulness fully, we can't appreciate the gift of God's love, mercy, and grace. The Lord God who created the garden and is with us even now will be forever a God of grace, peace, love, and mercy, even to the vilest of sinners. Thanks be to God!

### Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Last Friday night Washington High School hosted Warriors for Freedom Night at their high school football game. Active duty military and veterans were honored before the game and during half-time.

Dale K. Graham was surprised with an award for the service he has given to veterans in the community of Washington. The plaque reads "Our Country and community are proud of you! It is with sincere gratitude and appreciation that with our flag waving, we proudly stand and honor you."

Graham appreciates Washington Schools and the community for the award and for supporting our nation's military members and veterans.

We have power wheelchairs and ramps available for veterans and their families. If you know someone who needs one, please contact us.

We received a check from Rosenfelt Auctions last week. A veteran in the Purcell area consigned his Ferguson tractor to them with the sale proceeds being donated to our Veterans Foundation. We appreciate this veteran for helping us to help other veterans.

As we have moved into the fall of 2018, many of us will be thinking about the plight of homeless veterans and their families who will be feeling the colder weather with no place to call home. Our staff of volunteers will be working overtime to do everything we can to help them to receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

Many times, we can help them receive a disability rating for injuries that occurred to them in the military. One of the most common for homeless veterans is going to be PTSD or another type of mental health issue such as depression. We have found that some veterans who were injured in the military either directly or who have a disability that is presumptive to their service will suffer from depression or other types of mental conditions.

We believe that any type of mental condition can lead to a veteran becoming addicted to alcohol or drugs which may lead to being homeless or suicidal. We encourage families of veterans who are at risk to ask their veteran to visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning for assistance with their application for benefits.

We believe that every veteran who served in the military may be eligible for VA benefits. The most common disability that we have helped veterans to receive service connection for is hearing loss and tinnitus (ringing in ears). Those conditions might be presumptive to a veteran's military service if they worked in a hazardous noise job. If tinnitus is approved for service-connection, it is always rated at 10 percent. Hearing loss can be rated from zero up to 100 percent depending on the severity of their hearing loss.

A secondary condition that may be linked to the veterans hearing loss and tinnitus is a depressive disorder. Many of the veterans that I meet suffer from depression that is caused by their inability to hold a conversation with most of the women and children in their lives. I can certainly relate to that statement as I have a tough time communicating with anyone who talks in a higher pitch tone.

Did you know that veterans who served in the Reserves or National Guard are eligible for VA benefits? Most of those who served in either are not aware they are eligible for benefits. After we help them to become service-connected for a disability they are also eligible for VA Health Care. For many veterans who only have Medicare the VA

medical benefits will be significant. The veteran only needs to be rated at zero percent for any service-connected disability to be eligible for VA Healthcare.

Each week we are averaging 300 or more veterans and surviving spouses who are making their way to our location in Norman. People tell us we are changing their lives when they receive their VA benefits. We are successful at what we do because of our volunteers and the VA Disability benefit Questionnaires used as evidence to support veteran's claims.

All our volunteers have but one goal and that is to help each veteran or surviving spouse receive all of the VA benefits for which they are entitled. During the years we have been helping veterans, the volunteers we have today are probably the most knowledgeable that we have had in the last 15 years.

Each week I receive hundreds of letters from the Department of Veterans Affairs for the veterans and surviving spouses who are represented by our organization. In them will be rating decisions and other types of correspondence related to veterans' applications for benefits. That is where we sort out the rating decisions for veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Last week there were 29 of them who awarded a 100 percent rating. These veterans will receive a combined annual amount of \$1,090,856 per year. Thirty-six veterans received ratings ranging from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$576,194 per year.

We have been able to help several male surviving spouses who were married to women who served in the military. If it were not for the DIC and VA Pension benefits, there would be a lot more surviving spouses who would not have enough money to have a place to live. One of the problems I have seen over the years is when a surviving spouse of a veteran is receiving VA Pension benefits and decide to remarry a veteran who is also receiving VA pension benefits, one or both of them will lose a part of their VA benefits. Maybe the VA will address some of the rules that force veterans or surviving spouses who are receiving Pension benefits to give up all or some of these benefits when they marry.

\$2,500 for a permit when the city's current maximum fine is \$200.

"To me the penalty has to be more severe than the permit," Cox said.

The police aren't without concerns, either.

"This will be a huge learning position for everyone," chief Kevin Williams said. "There will be a lot of case law made out of this."

City attorney Ted Haxel conceded that, realistically, "the legal stuff will go out the front door and the illegal stuff out the back door."

Still, Haxel pointed out, "this is better than you have now. What this gets you is a starting point and I don't have a dog in this fight."

What remains to be seen,

however, is exactly where inside the city limits any medical marijuana facilities will be permitted.

The list of restrictions eliminates many possible locations.

Property line to property line, those businesses won't be permitted within 1,000 feet of:

- private or public preschool, elementary, secondary, vocational or trade school, college or university
- library or museum
- public playground
- child care center
- place of worship or religious assembly
- public park, pool or recreation facility
- juvenile or adult halfway house, correctional facility or substance abuse rehabilitation or treatment center

• residentially zoned area  
• another medical marijuana or retail marijuana establishment

In addition, the eight-page ordinance sets the fees due the city. Those won't come cheap.

The annual permit for a retail establishment will be \$600 per year, which the ordinance notes is to "offset municipal expenses covering costs related to licensing, inspection, administration and enforcement" of those establishments.

Further, the location must be zoned commercial.

Buildings where marijuana is stored or dispensed must have a ventilation/air filtration system so no odor is detectable off site.

The ordinance even sets the business' hours - 9 a.m.

to 9 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays. And the business must be closed on New Year's Day, July 4, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

The ante goes up for commercial growing and wholesale facilities with the annual permit set at \$1,500.

While the commercial growing facility may be on land zoned commercial, industrial or agricultural, any agricultural site cannot be an area that is zoned residential.

In addition, the enclosed structure must be surrounded by a 10-foot security fence offering limited access. Gates must be locked at all times and the plants must not be visible to the public.

Wholesale facilities must be on land that is zoned com-

mercial.

The ordinance also outlines regulations for marijuana storage facilities. The annual permit for these will be \$2,500.

These facilities must have an electronic security system, as well as the 10-foot security fence.

The ordinance also takes into account individuals who may opt to grow their own medical marijuana for personal use. That annual permit will be \$500.

Growing marijuana for personal medical use will be limited to the inside of a single private residence.

For rented homes, the written and notarized consent of the property owner is required.

All facilities are subject to inspections by city officials.

It's billed as the No. 3 Game of the Week in Oklahoma and for good measure.

Senior quarterback Trevor Stuever threw a touchdown pass, caught a touchdown pass and scored on runs of five and 70 yards in the game.

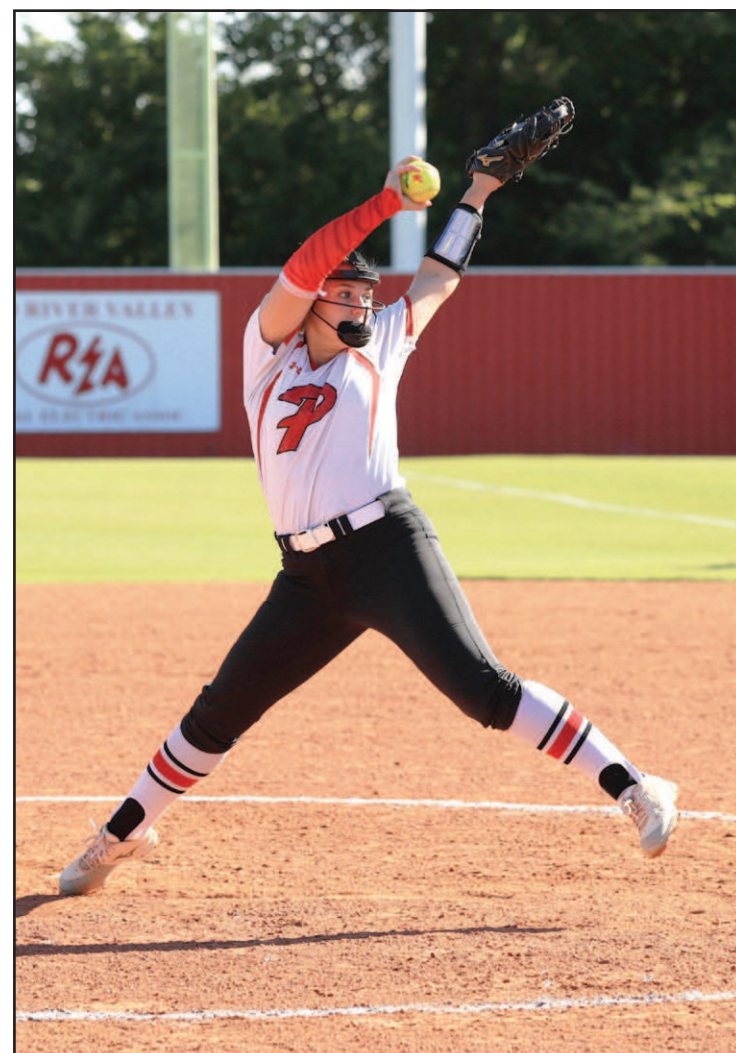

"The trio of Avery Armstead, Cam Conner and Ryan Hailey harassed the Star backfield all night long," Berglan said. "The three of them totaled 11 tackles for loss on the night. Ryan Hailey led the onslaught with seven tackles for loss - including three sacks. 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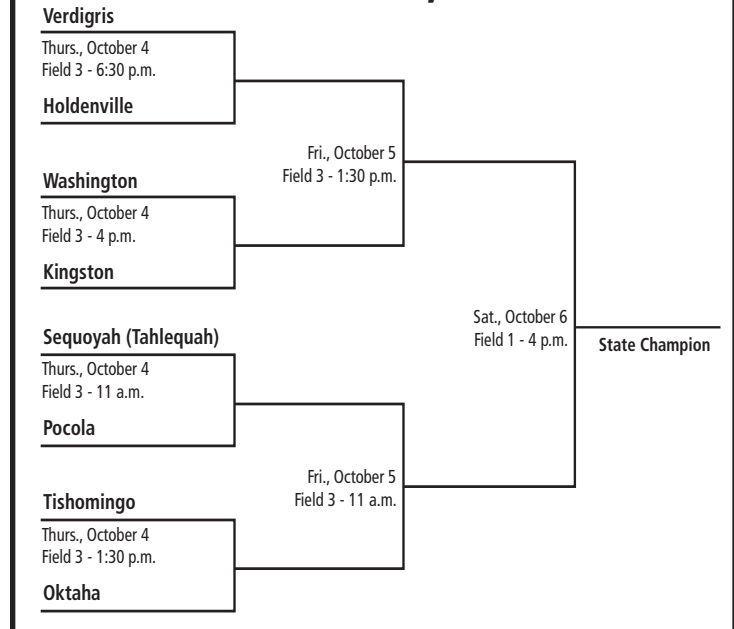

Green was a two-time state champion in track 1980 and 1981. Member of the 1980 State Champion track team. All district performer in football and a three year letterman.

Green was best known for his come-from-behind anchor leg victory on the two mile relay at the state championship in 1980.

Brother to Hall Of Fame Members Gerald Green and Jimmy Don Green.

**Jayson Howard**

Howard was a three sport letterman and three-time state champion in track. Member of the 1980 State Champion track team and the 1978 State runner up team. Howard was an All-District performer in football and is the current school record holder in the 300 intermediate hurdles, a record that has stood for 37 years.

**Lee Reimer**

Reimer coached his high school Alma Mater Medford to the State Championship in 1984.

After taking over the head coaching duties at Purcell in 1989, Reimer led the Dragons to the State Championship in 1994 and to the State semifinals in 1995.

He was selected as an All-State coach in 1990 and was Little All-City Coach of the Year in 1994.

As a freshman, she was a member of the first girls track team to ever win a meet title. This team continued to win multiple meet and conference titles over the next few years. She was a track All-Stater as a freshman, winning the title of Class 2A high jump state champion.

She was the first leg on the mile and two mile relay teams, which came in fourth at state two consecutive years.

She was also a state qualifier in the 800m run. She held school records in the 800m, as well as the mile and two mile relay teams. The record that inspired her the most was the school high jump record she shared with her sister, Lynn. Being compared to or measuring up to her big sister was a thrilling accomplishment. She was a member of the girls cross-country team of 1984. This team was the first Purcell team to earn the honor of Regional champions and qualify for the state meet, ultimately winning third place.

As a basketball player, she averaged 23 points per game during her sophomore and junior years.

She was named Little All-City Honorable mention her sophomore year, and Little All-City as a junior.

She was also named to the Heart of Oklahoma All-Tournament team and an All-Conference selection for the Arbuckle conference. Three of her most prized awards were being named PHS MVP of girls’ track, basketball’s “Most Dedicated Offensive Player” and the coveted Jack Angel award for the outstanding female athlete. She suffered a career-ending knee injury before her senior basketball season, but received the Southern and Central Oklahoma Region 5 “Injured Athlete of the Year”.

She continued her studies at OU, participating in the President’s Leadership Class and graduated with a degree in education in 1991. This is her 18th year of teaching, with the last ten teaching English at Purcell High School. She has four children including son, Jake Sheehy of Norman, and daughters Jordan Simmons and husband, Jake, of Purcell, Kaitlyn Sheehy of Edmond, and Abby Sheehy of Purcell. She also has two grandchildren.
