



To stand trial

DA adds 4 more child abuse charges against former cop

Prosecutors upped the ante on Richard Kyle Glasgow, adding four more counts of child abuse by injury against the former Purcell police officer.

At a preliminary hearing June 19 in McClain County District Court, Special District Judge Trisha Misak found probable cause that Glasgow had committed the felonies and ordered him to stand trial.

His formal arraignment will be at 9 a.m. October 11.

Glasgow had been charged in November with two counts of child abuse by injury.

The alleged abuses occurred between 2014 and 2016 and were directed at Glasgow's son and daughter, now 11 and 8, respectively. They would have been 8 and 4 when the incidents began.

According to the charges, at different times the boy was held aloft against the wall by his neck and kicked, had his head shoved into the side of a car, struck in the back, kicked in the stomach and chest, kicked against a closet and

Nothing to CROW about

Hens in, roosters out

Purcell City Council calmed ruffled feathers Monday evening, approving changes to the city's animal and zoning ordinances to allow chickens inside the city limits.

Under the amended ordinances, residents may keep up to six laying hens. Roosters, however, are poultry non grata.

Code enforcement officer Teddy Boles said his office routinely receives calls from residents, all of whom ask the same question –

“Can I have chickens?” Now the answer will be “Yes.”

Boles said the new ordinances were drawn up at the request of David Claunch, animal control officer for the city.

“We already have chickens throughout the city,” Boles said, adding many of the new rules in the amended ordinances were lifted from the City of Norman's regulations for keeping urban chickens.

To be legal, the laying hens must be housed in a coop and run.

The council also approved a resolution setting new dues, fees and charges for responding to rural fires.

Council members also voted to purchase a 2018

Ford F150 4-wheel drive pickup from Bob Moore Ford for Emergency Management Director Kevin Rhoads. The pickup is available on state bid for \$33,887. Rhoads' existing city pickup will be turned over to code enforcement.

Acting on the recommendation of the project coordinator, the council rejected bids from MacHill Construction Co., for new basketball courts adjacent to the Multi-Purpose Building. The project will be re-advertised for bids.

MacHill, the lone bidder meeting the specifications, offered a base bid of \$217,000 with

Lawsuit proceeds

Brewer, McPherson out as defendants

A federal lawsuit alleging Washington Public Schools failed to take steps to stop sexual bullying of a middle school student will proceed.

However, Judge Stephen P. Friot last month dismissed the lawsuit against then-superintendent A.J. Brewer and former athletic director and middle school principal Stuart McPherson.

The youngster's parents, identified in court documents only as John and Jane Doe, filed the lawsuit in March on behalf of their son, who entered Washington Middle School as a sixth grader during the 2015-16 school year.

The alleged bullying began on Dec. 4, 2015, when a middle school football player reportedly shoved the boy so hard into a vent cover than he had to be taken to the hospital for stitches.

The incident was witnessed by a coach, who made a written incident report.

Then on Feb. 18, 2016, three football players reportedly sexually assaulted the boy in front of a music class while the teacher was out of the room.

When the assault was reported to McPherson, he dismissed it as "horseplay" among boys, but did briefly suspend one of the players, according to the

lawsuit.

That player reportedly sent the boy a text in which he threatened to kill the boy.

The harassment escalated in the boy's seventh grade year with classmates heckling him for being a snitch, the lawsuit states.

He was allegedly sexually assaulted twice more in late 2016 or early 2017.

The parents took their complaint to Brewer in April 2017. The superintendent reportedly told the parents an investigation by McPherson could not verify the allegations of sexual assault and bullying.

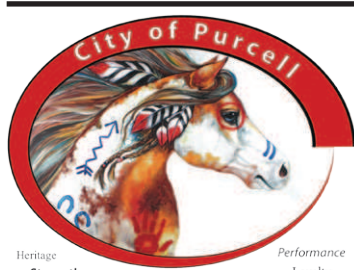
Hoping to protect her son, the boy's mother asked that he be held back to repeat seventh grade.

An anonymous letter to the Department of Human Services described the sexual assaults. DHS in turn alerted the Washington Police Department.

Police requested assistance from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

As a result of the assaults, the boy's grades suffered and he is in counseling, the lawsuit alleges.

The lawsuit accused the district of creating a "hostile educational climate where male-on-male student sexual assaults and harassment were tolerated."

New clues in the fight against food allergies

Peanuts. Shellfish. Eggs. Milk. While that may look like a grocery list to some, to those who are allergic to these common foods, it reads like the start of a horror novel.

More than 50 million people in the United States suffer from at least one food allergy, and many can result in serious health problems and even death.

Allergic reactions to food are most common in children, with the Centers for Disease Control

and Prevention reporting four to six percent of youngsters in the U.S. are affected.

With food allergies making such a significant impact on the population, are we any closer to solving the issue?

"We don't yet have all the answers, but we've found some important new clues in recent years," said Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation President Stephen Prescott, M.D.

Food allergies occur when the body has a specific immune response to a food. While our immune system is designed to fight off foreign invaders like viruses to keep us healthy, occasionally it can incorrectly identify a harmless substance—like peanuts or shellfish—as a threat.

Prescott said for many years, health experts focused on identifying allergens and telling people to stay away from those offending foods.

"This resulted in stringent requirements for food labels and measures like peanut-free classrooms," he said. "Still, the prevalence of peanut allergies kept increasing."

In an effort to understand why, scientists studied hundreds of infants deemed at high risk of developing a peanut allergy. They randomly assigned some of the babies to be regularly fed peanut products, while denying the others all foods containing peanuts.

By age five, less than two percent of those children fed peanuts developed an allergy, compared to almost 14 percent of those who'd avoided peanuts.

A second study involving children who already showed peanut sensitivities at the beginning of the study yielded similar outcomes.

"These findings suggest that we've been going about things all wrong," said Prescott, a physician and medical researcher. "Instead of protecting kids from food allergens at young ages, it looks like we'd do better by exposing them."

Indeed, the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases has issued new guidelines

recommending giving babies puréed or finger food containing peanut powder or extract before they are six months old.

"If parents follow this advice, I'd hope to see the peanut allergy numbers start to drop in the coming years," said Prescott. "If that happened, it would be a big step forward."

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You have to register to vote

There were cries from some voters, especially in Oklahoma County that said they were not given State Question 788 ballots.

But McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the number of 788 ballots issued matched exactly with the total number of ballots issued statewide.

So that was just a rumor. Another oddity in last week's election was the number of people trying to vote that were not registered.

McClain County had 15 provisional ballots cast in the June 26 election.

Provisional ballots are ballots cast by people at a precinct in case they actually are registered.

"Fifteen is a very high number for us," Haley said.

So it raises the question if there were people brought in to vote. The thing is, there is no way to prove such an accusation.

"But I think the real story is that people would just pull into Purcell off I-35 and think they could vote here," Haley said.

They didn't know they have to be registered. "We had a lot of 18 and 19-year-olds that came in to vote that didn't know they had to be registered.

There were people from as far away as Tulsa County that came in and wanted to vote.

"They work here so they thought they could vote," Haley

continued.

"It was just out of ignorance," Haley said. "They simply don't know you have to register."

For those wanting to change their registration now you can fill out the paperwork any time but it will not be effective until September 1 after the August 28 primary runoff.

The two questions I'm asked about most is why are the orange cones along Green Avenue out even when workers aren't present and why haven't all the limbs been picked up.

Here is the explanation by Purcell City Manager Dale Bunn.

"It costs the contractor \$1,800 to have the cones picked up and then put back out.

"We have asked them to be taken away for long weekends but it really isn't our call since it's not our project. It's an ODOT project.

The replanting of Mexican Fiesta Grass is supposed to

take 10-15 more working days.

Bunn said 7,500 plants were ordered to replace the grass that had winter kill.

As for the limbs, the street department has picked up at least 400 truck loads of limbs and will continue until the project is completed.

Currently, Bunn said crews are working 12 hour days but the problem is they have other duties.

"They are the guys that do the mowing, that fill the pot holes and take sand out to the beach," Bunn said.

"And we had one guy that filled up 20 truck loads. That took up half a day."

Currently, city crews are working on the limb collection from Grant south to state Highway 39 and east of Green Avenue.

Bunn gave a shout out to Purcell dentist Dr. Glenn Mead.

"He came in to vote at the courthouse on Saturday and noticed a big limb that had fallen behind Guadalupe's Mexican Restaurant.

"Dr. Mead asked the courthouse people if their crews were going to cut up the limb?"

"They said no, the city does that.

"So Dr. Mead got his own chainsaw and cut up the limb himself and stacked the wood," Bunn said.

"It's good to hear stories like that. Dr. Mead told me he just felt like it was his civic duty," Bunn said.

Congress is at the forefront of the fight against opioids

In recent years, our country has been ravaged by a deadly epidemic that is destroying communities and families alike.

The opioid crisis has been a devastating battle for Americans young and old, and combatting this epidemic has become one of the most significant challenges facing families and communities across the nation.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 115 Americans die each day from an opiate overdose. That is one American every 13 minutes. In fact, drug overdoses are the leading cause of death among Americans under 50.

Sadly, the most significant contributor to this alarming fact is the misuse and abuse of opioids. Prescription drugs like oxycodone, codeine and morphine have become readily available through illegal channels and are being distributed without supervision from a prescribing health professional. Addiction to opioids, as well

as illicit use of heroin and fentanyl, have led to the deaths of over 50,000 Americans in just one year.

Congress has worked diligently to find multiple ways to combat this killer. Numerous pieces of legislation have been passed and signed into law to establish new sets of regulations and reforms for the medical industry.

Additionally, many parts of passed legislation are aimed at creating new health programs to support communities nationwide.

Significantly, the House Appropriations Committee has made it a priority to fund programs that target combatting opioid abuse. Since Fiscal Year 2015, the Committee has made significant increases in federal funds directed toward opioid prevention and response programs.

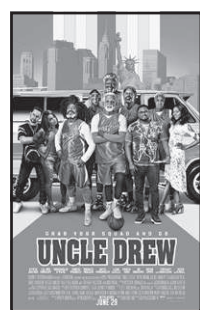
MOVIES WITH DAVE

I always love it when I have the opportunity to see a movie a little early. It makes me feel like I'm an actual movie critic. It doesn't happen too often, but it's still nice all the same.

This week I had that chance again thanks to a deal with Amazon and Atom Tickets, and I saw "Hotel Transylvania 3: Summer Vacation" a couple weeks before its scheduled release.

But don't worry, there's still a couple of my usual week late reviews here as well. Let's get right to them, shall we?



First up is "Uncle Drew."

After draining his life savings to enter his team in the Rucker Classic basketball tournament, Dax (Lil Rel Howery) is dealt a number of unfortunate setbacks, including losing his team to a lifelong rival (Nick Kroll).

Desperate to win the tournament, Dax stumbles across an old living legend, Uncle Drew (Kyrie Irving), and convinces him to return to the court one last time. Together the pair embark on a road trip to round up Drew's old basketball squad (Shaquille O'Neal, Chris Webber, Reggie Miller, Nate Robinson, and Lisa Leslie) to show these young bloods how the game is meant to be played.

Well it's not every day a movie based on a series of commercials gets released.

For those unaware, like myself a week ago, Uncle Drew is a series of Pepsi Max ads starring a white haired, old man who has a amazing knack for basketball despite his age.

In these commercials, Drew's always showing up to local basketball courts, and for one reason or another, ends up leaving the sidelines and joining the games.

To the amazement of everyone, Drew is amazing and practically runs circles around everyone on the court. This in turn draws a huge crowd of cheering onlookers, each of whom happen to be clutching a cool refreshing Pepsi Cola in their hands.

Of course behind the scenes, Uncle Drew is actually NBA point guard Kyrie Irving with a bunch of prosthetics and a face full of makeup.

All in all, for what they are, the commercials are pretty entertaining. Though the concept does wear a bit thin after the fourth or so ad in the series.

Apparently though, these commercials were so popular that PepsiCo, along with with Temple Hill Entertainment, decided to make a feature length film about the character. Which leads us to this movie.

It's certainly not my favorite comedy of the year and it's nowhere close to being my favorite sports comedy, but I think NBA and Kyrie Irving fans will probably have a good time.

Non-hoops fans looking for laughs should probably look elsewhere though.

take a break from running his busy hotel, Mavis (Selena Gomez) books him and the rest of her family on a luxury monster cruise ship.

On the ship, the lonely Dracula finds himself falling head over heels for the ship's captain Ericka (Kathryn Hahn), but unknown to Drac, his new romantic interest is harboring a terrible secret that spells doom for him and everyone else on board.

This is another series of movies I wasn't very familiar until just recently.

Oh, I had heard of them, but as soon as I saw Adam Sandler's name on the poster I wrote them off as dumb comedies not worth the effort of watching.

Quite frankly, I was wrong. Sure, they aren't on the same level as most the stuff from Disney or Pixar, but for what they're trying to accomplish, these are some pretty fun movies.

Taxes

It was the work of an unlikely judicial coalition and came at least a decade after it should have, but however tardy, the Supreme Court of the United States finally opened the door last week to state and local taxation of internet sales. If Oklahoma handles the follow-up correctly (never a certainty), this should be a huge boon for the state, its large cities, some counties and a lot of smaller cities and towns.

Better late than never, we say. Hooray for the court.

Technically, what the justices did was overrule its previous 1992 and 1967 decisions that essentially established that in order to be taxed on sales, a business had to have a physical presence (a store, that is) within the taxing jurisdiction (in other words, the city, county or state). On a 5-4 vote with the dissenters essentially arguing that this ought to be left to Congress, the court upheld a South Dakota law imposing sales taxes on online retailers with at least \$100,000 in sales or 200 individual transactions within South Dakota regardless of whether that business had a "physical presence" there.

Get that, Oklahoma lawmakers? Remember that you lost a vital revenue source not long ago largely because not enough of you understood the difference between two three-letter words — "tax" and "fee." Just get a copy of that South Dakota law, change the name of the state to "Oklahoma," and roll. Don't do anything else. This gate has finally been thrown wide open.

But before we get deeper into this ruling and the impact it may eventually have on Oklahoma as well as other states, we want to take note of the unusual coalition that came together on the court and fashioned this common-sense solution. The five members who made South Dakota vs. Wayfair the law of this land range from the very conservative to the very liberal. On the winning side of this was Anthony Kennedy, who wrote

the opinion. He is a Reagan appointee and is generally considered to be a swing vote. He was joined by Clarence Thomas, a very conservative George H.W. Bush appointee (remember Anita Hill?) and Neil Gorsuch, another conservative and the newest member of the court. He was appointed by President Trump. The fourth vote came from Samuel Alito, also a conservative. He was a George W. Bush appointee. The vital fifth vote came from Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a confirmed liberal appointed by Bill Clinton. Say what you like but this decision, while rooted in conservative thought, spanned the philosophical width of this sitting court ... and that usually makes good law.

The Oklahoma state sales tax is 4.5 percent. Although some web vendors such as Amazon were voluntarily collecting sales taxes, most were not. After Oklahoma gets its ducks in a row, online vendors will have to comply. Good software will make a difference and while complicated, it is available. Just because a package is going to Zip Code 74873 doesn't mean

it is subject to Tecumseh's 3 percent city sales tax as well as the state and county tax.

A big difference in this new approach as opposed to the old "physical presence" rule is that in this new sales tax world, the money is much more likely to flow to where it is needed as opposed to where it was most profitable for a business to build a store. The older approach, which was magnified by Oklahoma law and practices, funneled most of the cash to regional or statewide retail centers and left rural areas and small towns without the resources to keep up the roads, maintain water and sewer systems and support their schools. Most states addressed that but in spite of years of alleged rural influence, Oklahoma never did.

Take a look at what is currently happening in Pottawatomie County and the surrounding area ... and, truth be told, all across Oklahoma. Since this editorial was written before Tuesday's vote, Shawnee (esti-

mated 2017 population 31,232) and Tecumseh (estimated 2017 population 6,608) both have 3 percent local sales taxes ... although citizens of Shawnee may have voted to increase that city's rate to 3.5 percent by the time you read this. The June sales tax check that Shawnee received from the Oklahoma Tax Commission came to \$1,423,043.36 or \$45.56 for each man, woman and child in town. The check Tecumseh received was \$82,814 or \$12.53 per capita. Both cities are expected to provide essentially the same services but on a person-for-person basis, one has almost four times as much money to spend on doing that. Does that mean Shawnee is doing something right and Tecumseh is doing something wrong? Of course not. It simply means that the people who live in Tecumseh have to do a lot of their shopping in Shawnee ... or Midwest City or Norman or Oklahoma City or somewhere else. Forty or 50 years ago, you could get most things in Tecumseh even though that community's total population was only 2,603 in 1960. Today there are many things you just can't buy in Tecumseh. Most of that out-of-town shopping

is done in Shawnee because it's right next door. Shawnee originally grew because it was a railroad center. Today, it has Interstate 40 and the interstate highways could be considered the "railroads" of today's culture. That's good for Shawnee and Shawnee is good for this entire area.

But the sales tax is not and never has been necessarily a fair tax, especially if all of it stays where the money is spent rather than being redistributed in relationship to where people live. This Supreme Court decision means that places such as Tecumseh and many other places in Oklahoma would be better off from now on if their citizens shop on line and have the goods delivered to them. That way Tecumseh would get all the local portion of the tax even though most of the money leaves Oklahoma and only a little of it will ever return. Yet if Tecumseh residents go to Shawnee or OKC or somewhere else to shop, their hometown will be left with absolutely nothing and the streets in front of their homes will continue to grow holes.

Tecumseh is only a handy example. Many communities are worse off. McLoud is one.

That community in northwest Pottawatomie County has a 4 percent sales tax and an estimated population of 4,637. Its sales tax check this month came to \$53,160.63 and that's a per capita take of only \$11.46.

It all boils down to this: Because of poor leadership under both political parties, Oklahoma has inexplicably failed to follow the lead of other sales tax states by compensating for changing retail strategies. No matter what else follows, that still needs to be done. But the first chore for the Oklahoma Legislature in the wake of South Dakota vs. Wayfair is to get up front in what will almost certainly be a line of 49 states passing similar legislation.

After that, there will be time for concerned legislators to seriously examine the state's tax structure and follow the lead of other states by insuring that tax proceeds flow evenly to where needs exist rather than simply piling up in pre-selected corners. There are plenty of good examples out there. Those need to be studied ... if only the Oklahoma Legislature will ever do that.

Are you paying attention, candidates? You need to be.

KALI: A Polar Bear's Tale

Chapter Two:

It was a cold day. The month of March offers no promise of budding trees or sprouting daffodils when you live high above the Arctic Circle. Not many people make their home there, but James had grown up in those parts and was used to the weather. Snow blanketed the ground, but the thin light of early spring allowed James better visibility to look for caribou and wolverine, anything he could hunt and bring back to his village.

James had been a hunter for most of his life. The Inupiat people of Point Lay, Alaska, on the coast of the Chukchi Sea, rely on skilled subsistence hunters like James and others. Alaska Native People along the northwest coast of Alaska hunt marine mammals, birds, fish and other land animals to keep their families healthy. Commercial food, which can be purchased for a few dollars in the lower 48 states, is very expensive there: noodles can cost \$13, and red or green peppers as much as \$10 each. What the meat hunters bring back is vitally important to the villagers' survival.

That day in March, James and his friend drove their snowmobiles 40 miles outside of Point Lay. He would have been happy to find any animal to bring back for his family and village, but a large animal, like a caribou, would be best. And that's when he saw the polar bear.

Being an Alaska native, James was legally allowed to hunt marine mammals like polar bears. Of course, it was rare for him to take a bear. In his lifetime as a hunter, this bear would only be his ninth.

James did not take killing a polar bear lightly. These animals were respected and revered in Inupiat culture. But James was tasked with providing meat for his village, so he took what opportunities that luck and nature presented to him. He shot the bear.

When the bear was down, James approached it. Once certain that it was dead, he rolled it over. That's when he noticed something different. The other eight bears that James

had hunted had all been large, burly males with gigantic paws and teeth. This bear was a bit smaller, and on its stomach was a row of dark teats. This bear was a nursing sow. "Somewhere," he thought, "she has a cub."

James was crushed. He had not realized that the bear was a female, especially a nursing mother. "We've got to find the den," James said to his hunting companion. "There's a cub out here, and it won't survive for long without her."

The two men set out through the bitter wind and spring sunlight, until they saw the opening of a polar bear den.

The mother bear excavates a small snow cave in a snowdrift just big enough for her to turn around in, and the snow will naturally close the entrance tunnel for her.

How long do polar bears nurse?

Polar bear cubs will nurse for at least 20 months.

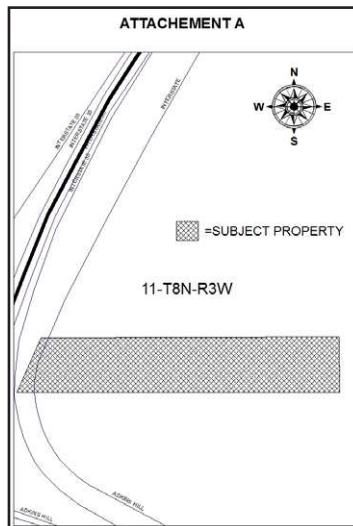

Council:

three alternates of \$10,000, \$163,000 and \$210,000, respectively.

Also approved was the purchase of 20 "Tough Pads" from Turn-Key Mobile Inc., for the police department. State bid price is \$3,992 each for a total of \$79,840. However, the McClain County 911 Trust Authority will offer to reimburse the city a minimum 40 percent of that cost.

On the advice of city attorney Ted Haxel and council member Mike Pollok, the council rejected Red Sky Land LLC's offer to lease mineral rights on 34.66 acres owned by the city. Both said the offer of \$500 per acre for a 3/16 royalty for three years was too low.

Also approved were the appointments of Tim McGown and Ron Davis to the Rural Fire Advisory Board and Dennis Dickens to a vacancy on the Airport Board.

Three Purcell detectives – Lt. Kevin Austin, Sgt. Scott Stephens and Cpl. Gaetano Cipriano – were presented with meritorious service awards for their work on a recent kidnapping that led to the safe recovery of the victim who was taken by

force from her employment at Subway.

City manager Dale Bunn said work is nearing completion on the GreenScape median on Green Avenue. The city will prepare a punch list for the contractor within two weeks. Bunn added that the traffic cones will remain in place on Green Avenue until all of the work is complete.

It costs the contractor \$1,800 every time the traffic cones are removed and set back, Bunn said.

The Purcell Public Works Authority issued a proclamation of appreciation recognizing assistance from the cities of Edmond, Wynnewood and Lexington, as well as the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority in helping Purcell restore electrical power after the May 2 storm.

Trustees also approved presenting a proposal for a water line extension into Green Tree Farms to the Department of Environmental Quality and authorized city engineer Kenny Sullivan to prepare a multi-step proposal on options to bridge a 1,000-foot gap connecting water mains in Districts 2 and 7.

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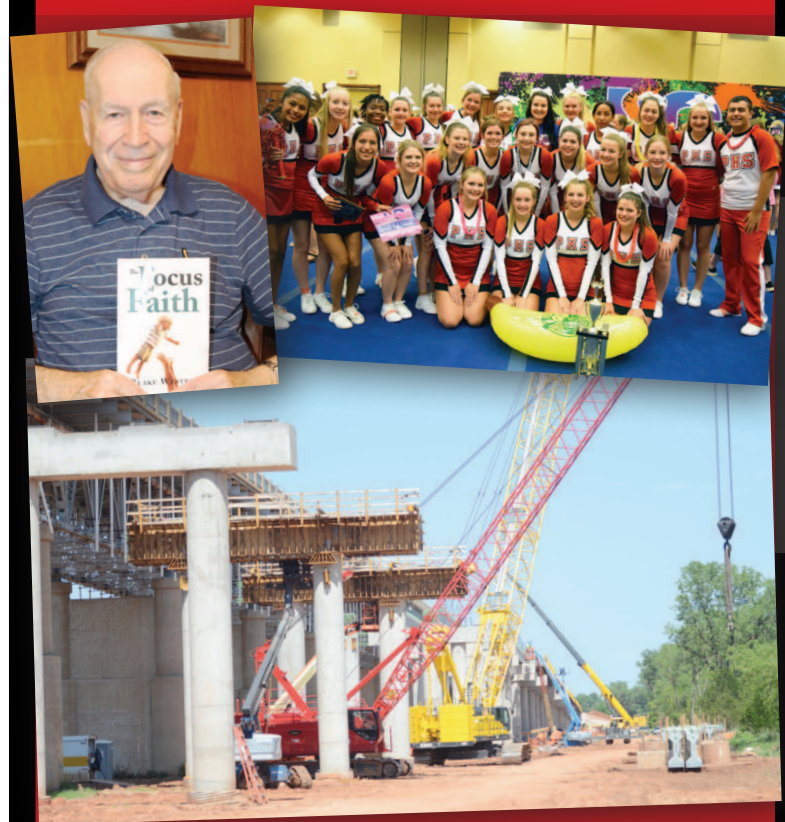

"When Jake grows up, Steele Family Farm will be his so he won't have to sack groceries," Angie Steele said in an interview in 2015.

But the company's beginning had an even more practical start.

Expensive prescription creams to treat Jake's eczema worked only a brief time. And then one day someone suggested trying goat milk soap.

The Steele's already had goats as pets and Angie Steele began milking them while researching how to make soap from the milk.

It took some experimentation, but the couple developed an extensive line of soaps and lotions.

The farm joined the Made in Oklahoma program this year.

Glasgow:

held against the garage wall by the neck with enough pressure to cause his nose to bleed.

One count alleges Glasgow held his daughter aloft by the neck and kicked her.

According to the affidavit, he children reportedly said Glasgow repeatedly swore at them while choking and striking them.

The boy said his father kicked him against his bed so hard that the bed broke. He also said in a forensic interview that Glasgow forced him to drink hot water and then slapped the cup from his hand because he hadn't given fresh water to the dog.

The girl said Glasgow squirted alcohol into her eyes.

An older daughter corroborated the siblings' accounts and said while Glasgow was never physically abusive to her, he was verbally and mentally abusive.

Glasgow's legal troubles began in March when he was charged with reckless conduct with a firearm, a misdemeanor. That charge stemmed from an incident the previous summer in which he allegedly shot a neighbor's dog.

On June 23, 2017, his estranged wife sought a protective order and on July 3, 2017, she filed for divorce.

That same day, Glasgow was charged with another misdemeanor for violating the protective order.

The divorce was granted May 23, 2018.

Glasgow had been suspended with pay. After the child abuse charges, that was changed to unpaid administrative leave. He resigned from the police department on Dec. 16, 2017.

He faces additional felony charges, as well. On January 3, prosecutors filed two counts of embezzlement of public property and one count of violating Oklahoma statutes via computer.

Braggs told the prisoners they had achieved a "true accomplishment" they will be able to utilize when they are released.

The commencement speaker was Gary Doty, a retired Oklahoma City firefighter who is now chaplain of the Norman Fire Department.

"It doesn't matter where you start as long as you look forward," Doty told the graduates.

He recalled sharing coffee with the next shift at his station

one morning in 1983.

Hours later, the station responded to a fire and three of those firefighters were caught in a flashover and were killed.

There was no information at the time on how to deal with trauma or stress.

"We never talked about it," Doty said. "I was able to function well."

Then on April 19, 1995, the Murrah Building bombing happened.

Doty was on duty that day and recalled working downtown amidst the "chaos and tragedy and loss of life."

The mind's walls and fences couldn't pigeonhole that and Doty began attending training.

"The way you know you are struggling, you start drinking or using drugs.

"I found out how to deal with it and function."

Doty became active with the state's Critical Incident Response Team and now serves as director.

Near the end of his career with the Oklahoma City Fire Department, Doty was ordained a deacon at First Baptist Church in Lexington.

For the past 11 years, he has been the chaplain for the Norman Fire Department.

"You've been subjected to trauma. The only way to deal with trauma is to talk about it. You need to find someone helpful to talk to."

His own strength, Doty shared, comes through his relationship with God.

"Educate yourself," he encouraged. "That's where hope comes from, what God has in store.

"I hope you stay encouraged. I'm proud of you all. Anytime you can, change your course and find ways to deal with your past. I'll pray for you guys. I'm a phone call away," he said, adding that he lives 5 minutes from LARC.

Other encouragement came from one of their own.

Mary Gann, principal/college coordinator at LARC, introduced Keitt, whose essay recently won an award from Rose State College. The college published the essay in its magazine, Pegasus.

Keitt dedicated the essay to his son, who passed away in an accident last year.

More words of encouragement came from Dr. Jeana Ely, school superintendent for Oklahoma Department of Corrections.

"If you have a group, you are truly blessed," she said. "Workforce Oklahoma is chomping at the bit to help you when you get out. Take your God-given talent and use it for good."

Aware that he risked a lawsuit that could end his career, the doctor decided to save the drunk driver's life. The man survived and fully recovered. A few days later, the resident told one of his senior professors the story. The professor peered over his glasses and his eyes narrowed. "Well, you did the right thing medically of course. But, James, do you know what you put at risk by doing that?" he said sternly.

twice about the consequences of our involvement - and then to shrug our shoulders and walk away. Three times in today's Gospel, however, Jesus tells his disciples not to be afraid, that we have nothing to fear before God who has proven his love and acceptance of us unreservedly. Fear is most destructive when it chokes us off from creating or accomplishing what is right, - but the realization that we have nothing to fear from any person, group or institution is the ultimate liberation and empowerment. 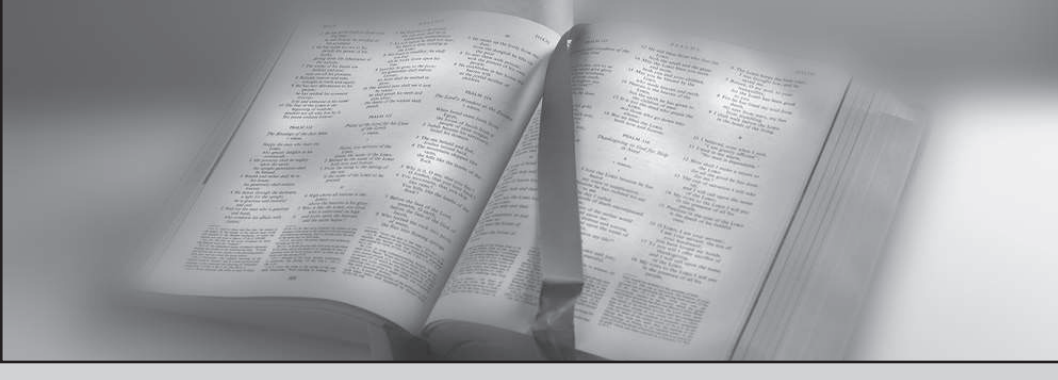

lives of hundreds of veterans and their families.

All of us who volunteer at our Veterans Foundation look forward to spending those two mornings with the men and women who have served the United States of America. One of the volunteers said to me that they were not cut out for retirement and they now have a new purpose in life after joining our organization.

What I have found out as a volunteer is that we are not only assisting our veterans and their families we are also helping ourselves to be better both physically and mentally. Many of the people I have known who retired would sit around and watch the world go by before they died from boredom or lack of a reason to get up and about. Those who continue being active and have a purpose in their lives continue to live longer and be healthier. The men and women who volunteer with us certainly have an important reason to be with us.

For those of you who would like to join our team, we have a job for almost every skill level that you have. We are continuing to take applications for a driver to use one of our vans to transport veterans to their VA appointments.

Last week there were 285 veterans and surviving spouses assisted with their VA claims and questions. After reaching the maximum capacity for our building, we are letting people sign in and wait outside on our benches until space becomes available. This system is working for many, yet we are still having to turn people away each day when we reach our limit of 150 veterans and surviving spouses.

Please remember we open our doors by 5:30 a.m. so you will probably have to come back another day if you don't arrive before 8 a.m.

We received a call from an Air Force Base in Texas asking us to spend a week at their location helping veterans and military retirees file for their VA benefits. As much as we would like to offer our services to everyone, we can only do so much. It seems to me that we have developed a system that could be duplicated across this United States to help veterans and their families.

Our Veteran of the Week is John Lassiter who served honorably in the United States Air Force and Navy during 1940s through the 1970s. He served in World War II, the Korean War and Vietnam. He was recognized for his service and we presented him a military cap representing World War II.

As most of you know, I'm an Accredited VA Claims Agent for the Veterans and Surviving Spouses I represent. By having this status, one of the most important benefits is my ability to review information the VA used when deciding to grant or to deny benefits to one of our veterans or surviving spouses. Another important part of being accredited is that I receive a copy of all the rating decisions made on everyone that I represent.

This week I received rating decisions granting a 100 percent for 25 veterans we represent. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$947,925 per year. Other state and federal benefits are also available to veterans who received a permanent 100 percent rating. We send a letter to each of those approved at that level detailing what they need to bring to us to file for these benefits. When you receive your 100 percent rating letter from the VA we want you to return so we may assist with signing up for the other benefits you've earned. You will receive a letter from us with instructions and a list.

There were 45 veterans awarded disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group will receive an annual combined amount of \$653,392 per year. They will receive a different letter from us describing what other additional benefits they may be eligible to receive. On the Surviving Spouse DIC and pension benefits, there was one and will receive an annual amount of \$15,397 per year. Surviving Spouses approved for the DIC benefit may also be eligible for Champ-VA Medical Insurance at no cost.

One of the things that bother our volunteers is the large number of veterans who are not aware of the VA benefits they could be eligible to receive. There is no process that I know of that notifies veterans or their surviving spouses of diseases that maybe presumptive to their military service.

If you have questions about types of exposures or need a list, please Google presumptive conditions to exposure of each of those listed. Plus, here's a shout out to everyone one of you who are reading this newsletter. You may know someone who is entitled to benefits. Please do us, and the person you know, a huge favor and tell them about us. Perhaps they will come see us and we can help them get the benefits to which they are entitled.

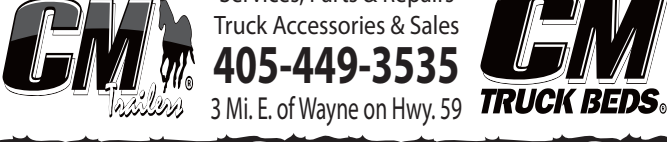
