Since October, Tim Carignan has been sharing the Word as preacher of the Church of Christ at 1207 N. 9th Ave.

Before coming to Purcell, he experienced almost as many Christian denominations as career hats.

Airman, soldier, student, stand-up comedian, attorney, all while focusing on the pulpit.

It's definitely made for an interesting life.

"I was born Methodist, raised Pentecostal and attended a Baptist college where I dated Catholic girls," he quipped.

His association with the Church of Christ began with his wife, Annie, who grew up in the faith.

Tim continued his education with a 90-hour master's degree.

By that time, he had 15 years in the pulpit and what he thought was a solid career path. He preached full-time until 2011 when he enlisted

How Much Wind Makes It Too Windy to Spray?

Have you seen the amount of wind in Oklahoma? This type of weather is definitely not conducive to spraying pasture. Fear of drift of product off site should be the main fear of many producers this year.

One of the main factors is if it drifts off site it is not doing you any good, and it may be damaging something on someone else's property.

There are two basic types of drift - vapor drift and particle drift. Vapor drift is the movement of product vapors resulting from the application of pesticides. Environmental conditions at the time of spraying or post spraying conditions

combined with product selection are the largest factors affecting vapor drift. The second type of drift is particle drift, more commonly referred to as spray drift.

Spray drift is the physical movement of a pesticide through the air at the time of application or soon thereafter, to any site other than that intended for application.

One of the most critical factors affecting spray drift is wind. Spray drift increases as wind speed increases. Nozzle manufacturers have brought new nozzle technology to the market in recent years that have significantly reduced the drift potential. Keep in mind that these air-induction or venture nozzles reduce drift - they don't eliminate drift completely.

When people shop for new nozzles one question they invariably ask is how much wind can I spray in with these nozzles? The answer is not as simple as you would like.

Here are some spray recommendations from a number of "experts".

Do not spray in winds greater than 5 mph. Spray when wind

speeds are between two and 10 mph. Do not apply when winds are gusty or in excess of 5 mph. Don't spray in winds over 15 mph, ideally not over 5 mph.

Before you pick your favorite, you should know that one of the above is actually a statement on a product label. That means that this is the legal way to use this product. If you use this particular product you don't have a choice, the label is the law. If you don't follow label directions you are off-label. Feeling lucky?

Most people read labels to determine what pests or weeds are controlled and the product rate to use in different crops. Also, on the label will be cautionary statements that address areas such as acceptable conditions at the time of application that include wind speed, temperature and relative humidity.

Read the label thoroughly every year even if you used the product in years past. Even though the product is the same, the label may have new information that has been added. Back to wind. Everyone knows that the drift potential increases as the wind speed increases. This would lead an individual to assume that zero wind or absolutely calm conditions would be almost ideal to eliminate drift concerns.

In fact, no wind conditions

can result in significant spray drift problems. The drift problem may not occur at the time of spraying but a couple of hours after the spraying is finished.

Here's what happens. Let's say your spraying early morning and there is no wind. You are using the latest air-induction nozzles which have good drift management capabilities. The temperature is cool and the humidity is high which means all the droplets stay as droplets. You finish spraying at 7 a.m. You think you have done a great job. Drift is the last thing on your mind.

As you were spraying, the larger droplets got to the target but the small driftable droplets are floating in the air just above the field. Yes, even air-induction nozzles produce some fine droplets. Since there is no wind these fine droplets are not blown off the field at the time of spraying.

Since the humidity is high, these fine droplets are not getting any smaller and are still spray droplets. So, we have small droplets of a pesticide floating above the field.

At some point in the morning the wind starts to blow and as soon as that slab of air containing floating droplets of a pesticide crosses the line fence you have spray drift. This movement may occur a number of hours after you finished spraying but it will happen.

Calm conditions or no wind conditions are not a sprayer's friend. A little bit of wind is desirable to create turbulent air movement which will carry the airborne droplets down to

the target. I know it is aggravating trying to spray but spraying in the wind, you may be killing plants in the flowerbed or the neighbor's garden. So please be careful and read the label.

Sending return by Pony Express would have been faster

A misused majority

It's now been more than 100 days since Democrats have held the majority in the U.S. House of Representatives.

And from day one, House Democrats have misused that majority by playing political games, casting show votes and embracing radical ideas—instead of working in a bipartisan manner to craft legislation that can realistically become law in divided government.

While the current Congress started amid a partial government shutdown, that shutdown was needlessly extended due to political games initiated by Democrats.

Even though President Trump and Republicans in both chambers were ready and willing to negotiate in good faith and reopen the government, Democrats chose to waste time on nonstarter appropriations bills that ignored the sticking point issue of border security.

To force Democratic participation in discussion, the president eventually looked past their drama and reopened the government for three weeks.

I was relieved that a compromise was reached, but it doesn't excuse the unaccept-

able delay caused by Democrats refusing to negotiate.

Since the shutdown, House Democrats have continued to waste time on purely partisan legislation that doesn't stand a chance in the Republican-controlled Senate or on the president's desk.

In early March, this included consideration of misguided gun control bills that would expand background checks. To be clear, Republicans are not opposed to screening prospective gun owners, and we certainly share the goal of preventing acts of mass violence.

But as we pointed out during debate on H.R. 8 and H.R. 1112, current federal law extensively covers many of the concerns that were raised by Democrats.

During March, House Democrats also brought up their hallmark H.R. 1, erroneously calling it "For the People Act." Filled with mandates that disrupt the constitutional role of states and egregious provisions limiting free speech, H.R. 1 was a clearly rushed and sloppy attempt to rewrite voting laws, election laws and campaign finance laws to get more Democrats elected. And its consideration wasted more

valuable debate and floor time.

Week after week, Democrats have also refused to allow a vote on the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act—which simply requires that attending medical professionals provide the same life-saving care to abortion survivors as they would to any other babies born alive.

No matter what side Americans fall on the issue of abortion, this bill is commonsense. Protecting vulnerable children shouldn't be a divisive issue, but House Democrats have refused all 30 Republican requests brought by unanimous consent.

Last week, the House debated a rule that would provide in part for consideration of a Democratic "caps bill" instead of an actual budget. Buried within the procedural measure was language that would approve (or "deem") budget numbers whether the caps bill had enough votes to pass or not.

As a former member of the House Budget Committee, it's disappointing that Democrats chose not to present their fiscal vision by crafting a budget. In

Legislature continues to hear education bills

Throughout session, the House has focused heavily on education. While we were campaigning, education was definitely the top issue we heard on the doorsteps.

We've spent the last three months of session focusing on both teacher pay and classroom funding, and now that budget discussions are ramping up, so is the attention on our education bills.

The House passed another teacher pay raise in addition to last year's historic raise. House Bill 1780 would provide teachers an across-the-board \$1,200 pay raise. The bill has already passed Senate Appropriations Committee and is now eligible to be heard on the Senate floor.

The House has also passed a bill to increase the "in lieu of" amount for teachers that opt out of receiving the flexible benefit allowance for health care from \$69 to \$300. This is HB2470, which passed the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education and will soon be heard by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

We also passed HB1360, which allows National Board Certified Teachers to apply for a \$1,000 grant toward certificate renewal.

To provide districts additional recruiting tools, the House passed HB1781 to give school districts the option of paying their student teachers. This is a useful recruiting tool that would help keep our new college graduates in the state. HB1781 passed its Senate committee and can be heard on the Senate floor.

Another great recruitment tool is HB2521, which creates the Oklahoma Educator Loan Repayment Program that will assist classroom teachers with student loan forgiveness.

The Senate Education Committee passed the bill, making it now eligible to be heard by the Senate Appropriations Committee before moving to

the floor.

To address the statewide teacher shortage, we also passed HB2645 to provide a one-time incentive bonus up to \$5,000 for certified teachers who return to public school classrooms.

In the area of classroom funding, we approved HB2502, which provides a \$1,000 tax credit for teachers that purchase supplies for their classrooms or fees related to the teacher certification process. Both bills are in the Senate committee process.

Given the productive and positive session we've had thus far, my colleagues and I in the Legislature were all shaken by the hated-fueled destruction a few weeks ago in Oklahoma City and Norman.

Those disgusting displays of hate and racism are incredibly disturbing. There's no place for this kind of hatred and ignorance in our state or our country.

Although I've been saddened by these terrible displays, I've also been uplifted by the overwhelming public outcry condemning these actions and the strong show of support for those who were targeted. As we move forward and continue with our day to day lives, we must continue to combat the roots of these actions to prevent such instances of racism and discrimination from occurring again.

Lawmakers at the Capitol will continue to move through the legislative process. You will likely begin to hear more on the budget as the House and Senate continue to work with the Governor and agency heads to draft a budget funding necessary programs.

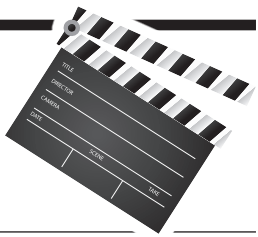

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Lot's of ground to cover this week, so we'll just get right into it.

We've got a reboot starring a superhero straight out of hell, a rare stop motion animated film featuring an old-fashioned explorer and his Sasquatch sidekick, a comedy about a tech mogul who learns a little humility by becoming a kid again, and a romance based off a best-selling novel. Let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Hellboy." The legendary half-demon superhero known as Hellboy (David Harbour) is called to the English countryside to battle a trio of rampaging giants. There he discovers The Blood Queen, Nimue (Milla Jovovich), a resurrected ancient sorceress thirsting to avenge a past betrayal.

Suddenly caught in a clash between the supernatural and the human, Hellboy is now determined to stop Nimue without triggering the end of the world.

You know as a whole, I'm not generally opposed to movie remakes or reboots.

Sure, oftentimes the result is a shallow rehashing of the original without any improvements whatsoever. But sometimes retelling an old story, or revamping a popular character under different creative leadership, can result in something unique the original work wasn't able to capture.

Unfortunately though, this film is definitely not one of those cases.

By creating this reboot of "Hellboy," it seems the filmmakers behind it are seeking to discover if loud music, excessive profanity, and copious amounts of gore can make up for the lack of a coherent story.

It doesn't, for the record. This film is an editing disaster.

In an attempt to divulge character backstory, flashback scenes are inserted seemingly at random, with absolutely zero regard to narrative structure or proper pacing.

It's like the poor editors didn't know where to throw in some of these scenes, so they just tucked them away wherever they could kind of fit.

Not only that, but the way they splice scenes together in general feels off oftentimes.

For example, there's a section early on where Hellboy is dispatched to help a group of giant hunters. After a few minutes in the lovely English countryside, Hellboy is attacked, chaos ensues, and our hero is knocked to the ground.

What happens next? Well apparently the movie isn't

keen on telling us, because suddenly we're whisked away to an extended scene with the film's villain.

Luckily afterwards action resumes and we finally discover the fate of Hellboy, but the whole time I couldn't help but be completely baffled by the strange edit.

Why would they interrupt an action scene with something completely unrelated? It's not like the scene enhanced conflict or upped the stakes in any way, it was just thrown in the middle for no reason, killing the film's pacing in the process.

For crying out loud, put the villain's scene after the hero is out of imminent danger. Believe me, the audience would have been just fine going a few minutes without seeing Milla Jovovich's disembodied head again.

I know I'm really harping on this one section, but it's so indicative of the lack of care that went into the editing of this film.

Throughout the film, relatively unimportant scenes are inserted wildly, while important pieces of character development seem to be mysteriously missing.

Again, for example, at one point Jovovich's character of the evil Blood Queen gets a moment to speak one-on-one with our hero Hellboy.

In an attempt to persuade him to her side, she appeals to Hellboy's feelings of being out of place and not belonging with those he's allied himself with.

The only problem? Hellboy never once expressed those feelings in the film. Not once.

Sure, that was a common theme of past Hellboy movies. But this is a reboot. Heck, this is practically a different version of the character.

It's like the filmmakers forgot to film the scenes where Hellboy is made to feel like an outsider, but just said "oops" and made that character trait a central plot point anyway.

Beyond the ridiculously incompetent storytelling, the dialogue here ranges from edgy and dark to just plain juvenile.

There are a lot of really dumb, groan worthy one-liners in this film. Many of which seemed to have been inserted well after filming as they were often said while you couldn't see the character's faces.

At some point the filmmakers must have just stopped caring, because they even dubbed in a line for Hellboy while we could still see the his face. I guess they hoped

no one would look at his lips during the scene, because they clearly didn't match what was said.

I assume the first cut of the movie just didn't turn out funny enough for whoever was in charge, but they didn't have the cash to refilm anything, so they decided to squeeze in jokes and snide remarks every second they could.

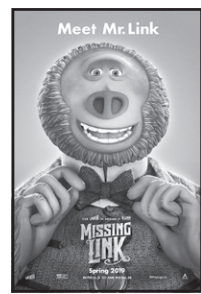
"Hellboy" is far from the first film to dub in a few extra lines here and there, but the amount of times it's done here is absurd.

The whole thing just feels like a sloppy hack job, cobbled together at the last second in the hopes of making any return on investment.

I guess if all you want out of a movie is ridiculous levels of profanity and computer generated gore, this is your movie.

Otherwise, stay away from this miserable mess.

"Hellboy" is rated R.



Next is "Missing Link." Tired of living a solitary life in the Pacific Northwest, a lonely Sasquatch

(Zach Galifianakis) recruits fearless explorer Sir Lionel Frost (Hugh Jackman) to guide him on a journey to find his long-lost relatives in the fabled valley of Shangri-La.

Along with adventurer Adeline Fortnight (Zoe Saldana), our fearless trio of explorers encounter more than their fair share of peril as they travel to the far reaches of the world to help their new friend. Through it all, the three learn that sometimes you can find a family in the places you least expect.

I have to admire Laika, the animation studio behind this film.

They're just about the only studio around still making stop-motion animated films.

The effort the filmmakers there put into the animation is truly impressive and often quite captivating to watch.

And while their latest movie doesn't quite measure up to the thoughtful narratives of their past films like "Coraline" and "ParaNorman", nor is it quite as visually captivating as "Kubo and the Two Strings," "Missing Link" is a more than competent addition to Laika's collection.

The story for this film is pretty straightforward. If you've seen an adventure film set in the 1800s, you probably have a good idea of how this movie's gonna go.

Starting off with our hero. Sir Lionel Frost is your typical old fashioned British explorer. Dashing and fearless, but lacking the respect of his fellow adventurers on account of his obsession with creatures of myth. Frost sees proving the existence of Sasquatch as the perfect opportunity to earn acceptance from his peers.

You have the Sasquatch himself, dubbed Mr. Link, who more or less plays the role of Frost's comedic sidekick.

Then naturally, there's our romantic interest Adeline Fortnight, who hates our hero at first thanks to a complicated history between the two of them.

And of course you can't forget the villain Lord Piggot-Dunceby (Stephen Fry), who will stop at nothing to keep our hero from succeeding in his mission.

The story practically writes itself, and for better or worse there aren't all that many surprises along the way.

I am grateful this film managed to avoid annoying sources of conflict though. Stuff like our hero betraying his partner for personal gain is nowhere to be seen in this movie thankfully.

Instead, the main obstacles our heroes have to overcome revolve more around internal self worth, instead of gaining validation from others. Which is a fine message to be sure.

It's not nearly the most innovative story I've ever seen, but it's well executed and entertaining throughout.

Performance wise, the voice acting here is great all around, but unsurprisingly the biggest highlight here definitely has to be Hugh Jackman.

Jackman is always a treat to watch, even in animated form. His voice is dripping with passion here and he does a wonderful job portraying the likable 19th century adventurer.

But even though I enjoyed this movie fairly well, I'm not sure how well it'll appeal to younger audiences.

Beyond the stop-motion animation look of the film, which has fallen out of favor among most viewers these days, much of the movie's comedy will just go right over kids' heads.

It's not that the humor is particularly adult orientated and it's definitely not raunchy, it's just more on the subtle side of things.

Not only that, but a fair amount of the jokes require some pretty quick reading, including one scene which even had subtitles.

Even so, while this movie

might not keep the interest of the youngest of children, "Missing Link" is still a very well made animated film and makes for a fun adventure for nearly all ages.

"Missing Link" is rated PG.



Third this week is "Little." A ruthless tech mogul, Jordan Sanders (Regina Hall) receives the chance to relive the life of her younger self (Marsai Martin), whether she wants to or not, after a girl she offends wishes she was little.

Stuck as a 13-year-old girl (Marsai Martin), Jordan receives help from her overworked assistant, April (Issa Rae), in hopes of finding a way to find a way to revert back to her normal adult self.

So I guess the month of April is the perfect time for "Little" reimaginings.

For those who don't know, "Big" is a 1988 film about a boy unhappy with the way he's treated as a child and wishes to be big. The next day he's finds himself transformed into a grown-up, played by

Tom Hanks.

Of course last week there was "Shazam!," which features a very similar concept to "Big," with the addition of the kid gaining superpowers while he's an adult. There was even a cute little reference to "Big" in the middle of "Shazam!" involving a giant piano.

Then of course there's this film, which basically turns the idea on its head, transforming a grown-up into a child.

Unfortunately, "Little" doesn't nearly measure up to the bigger film it so eagerly imitates.

For starters, Regina Hall is no Tom Hanks.

Granted very few actors can stack up to the charm and charisma of potentially the most likeable man in Hollywood.

Even so, Hall seems bound and determined to be as aggressively unlikeable as possible in this film.

It's like she's channeling her inner Ebenezer Scrooge with her character here.

I know that's what the filmmakers are going for. Powerful people learning a little humility through a dramatic transformation is a

Allocate 80 percent of your refund for "smart uses" and the remaining 20 percent as cash for enjoyment or to make a special purchase.

Consider the following smart uses to improve your finances and make the coming year more enjoyable.

Paying down credit card debt will save you money on high interest rate debt. Credit card debt and can be hard to pay off when making only the minimum payment, because most of the payment goes to interest.

If you carry over a balance every month, only a few dollars of each minimum payment goes toward reducing the principal owed. Reducing credit card debt will improve your financial security.

Disasters can alter a family's normal routine with little warning. Neighborhood streets can be closed because of large debris or downed power lines. Suddenly, an area that is a familiar part of a normal daily routine is now unrecognizable. In times like this, it is crucial for a family to have a plan to reunite and meet at a safe location.

With severe storm season around the corner, the Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) encourages families to create a plan for both adults and children to follow.

A family may not be together when a disaster strikes so it is important to plan in advance: know how to get to a safe place; how to contact one another; how to get back together; and what to do in different situations.

During a disaster, roads are often blocked or closed, and alternate routes must be used. Knowing multiple routes of travel in advance can save time and frustration when trying to reach loved ones.

OSDH also encourages families to have a basic, 72-hour emergency kit consisting of water, snacks, first-aid kit, flashlight, batteries, prescription medicine and important paperwork.

Parents can help reduce the effect of disasters on children by adding a few simple kid-friendly supplies such as books, games, a favorite toy or comfort item and medical items such as infant/child fever reducer to the kit.

Those with babies should consider a three-day supply of formula, diapers, antibacterial

wipes, non-perishable baby food and sealable plastic bags for soiled items.

Scott Sproat, director of the Emergency Preparedness and Response Service at OSDH, reminds families who have members with medical conditions and disabilities to consider any unique needs during and after a disaster.

"If you have, or care for someone, with a disability or access and functional needs, it's especially important to include needed supplies, equipment and medications as part of your planning efforts," said Sproat. "If evacuating from the home is necessary, it is important to take medication and specialty equipment such as hearing aids, oxygen, a wheelchair, diabetic supplies, food for a special diet or supplies for a service animal."

During a disaster response, the OSDH works with a number of other partnering agencies which support essential functions such as patient care and movement, food safety, health surveillance and mass fatality management.

"Public health preparedness is an important function in disaster response and recovery," said Interim Commissioner of Health Tom Bates. "The OSDH is proud to partner with emergency management officials as we work to mitigate the effects of a disaster which may threaten the health and safety of Oklahomans. Our role is to ensure a smooth transition to recovery while a community rebuilds their capability to provide needed services."

OSDH and the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-

tion (CDC) offer the additional following tips for families preparing for disasters:

- Check with your mobile carrier for options on wireless emergency alerts being delivered to your cell phone or other device.

- Practice your plan by quizzing your children periodically, and conduct fire and other emergency drills.

- Check emergency supplies throughout the year to replace batteries, food and water as needed.

- Plan alternate ways to charge communication and assistive technology devices if there is loss of power.

- Plan for medication requiring refrigeration.

Severe storms are often followed by flash flooding. If an evacuation of a neighborhood is ordered, it is important to leave immediately.

If possible, make arrangements to stay with a nearby friend or relative as hotels will be filled quickly. A disaster shelter may be used as a last resource.

Remember that not all shelters allow pets, and plan to bring your own emergency supply kit.

OSDH released videos in English, Spanish and American Sign Language to ensure the message of preparedness is available to various populations. To access these videos, visit the OSDH YouTube channel and select the Preparedness playlist.

OSU deer food plot field day May 16

Wildlife enthusiasts, and those managing deer on their land, have many forage options for planting in their food plots.

It can be difficult to sort through the hype and find real facts on which to base their decisions. For these reasons, OSU Cooperative Extension and Ross Seed Company of Chickasha have teamed up to offer a deer food plot field day on Thursday, May 16, at 5 p.m. The event will take place at Canadian Valley Farms located at 12781 Slaughterville Road in Lexington.

Participants can look forward to seeing 22 fall-planted food plots containing individual varieties and mixes. There will be eight legumes including alfalfa, four clovers, and Austrian winter peas.

Chicory and brassicas including radish, turnip, and rape, are a few of the newer species becoming more popular that will be seen. Participants will also see the more commonly grown grasses including winter oats, wheat, cereal rye, and triticale.

In addition to seeing the food plots, Dr. Dwayne Elmore, OSU Professor and Bollenbach Chair for Wildlife Management, will speak about total land management to increase and support the deer population, as well as food plot variety selection, establishment, development, and management.

The field day is free and a great opportunity for the public to learn more about land management for the deer herd. For more information, please call the Cleveland County Extension office at 321-4774.

in the Army.

"I planned to go into the Army as a chaplain," he said.

Whether it was God or the Army at work, that isn't how things played out.

He didn't become a chaplain — not even close. The Army trained him as a broadcast technician and then put him "in charge of gas masks."

Tim spent most of his Army enlistment at Ft. Bragg, N.C., continuing to preach when and where he could.

And in his spare time, he did stand-up comedy across seven states.

One year at the Army's Festival of Arts, he won an award for best comedic performance.

"They called him the funniest man in the Army," Annie said.

At the end of his Army enlistment, he considered his options anew.

"I always wanted to be a lawyer," he said.

So pretty much on a whim he took the law school exam "just to see."

He scored high enough to get a full scholarship to law school and graduated in 2018.

He took and passed the Tennessee bar exam about the same time that he moved to Purcell. Now he's in the process of being admitted to the Oklahoma bar.

Preaching will remain his main calling, but Tim would like to use his law degree to "mostly do wills, contracts, etc., for veterans. And help out people who need it."

It takes some time to get bar exam results in Tennessee and during the wait, Tim had a family to support.

Though there is no central organization governing Churches of Christ, the denomination has "a pretty good grapevine."

It didn't take him long to map out a four-week itinerary to visit and preach at churches seeking preachers.

"This was the first stop," he said.

The rapport was immediate and mutual and he received an invitation from the Purcell congregation to become their preacher.

Tim accepted, but also continued on the planned tour to western Tennessee, Washington, D.C., and northern Florida because he didn't want those churches left in the lurch for the dates he had scheduled to preach.

"We loved the people here so much," Annie said.

"When it's right, it's right," Tim added.

Samantha, 27, is an Army veteran and lives in Kansas. Daughter Skye, 20, is a junior majoring in criminal psychology at Faulkner Christian University in Montgomery, Ala.

Shay is an eighth grader at Purcell Junior High School and is taking singing lessons.

He also preaches, something he's been doing since the tender age of 7.

It's always interesting to ask a member of the clergy about their typical week. Because so much of what they do isn't typical at all.

"Things change so much," Tim said. "I have put in many hours working in hospital emergency rooms. I try to work (on sermons) early in the week so if things come up, I have time to adjust."

Tim is an admirer of Robert Taylor, a preacher who reads the New Testament every month and the Old Testament every year.

"I try to put in the study," Tim said. "I'll find something interesting and say, 'Let me show you what I found.'"

"I try to take things people have heard before and show it to them from a direction they haven't looked at before."

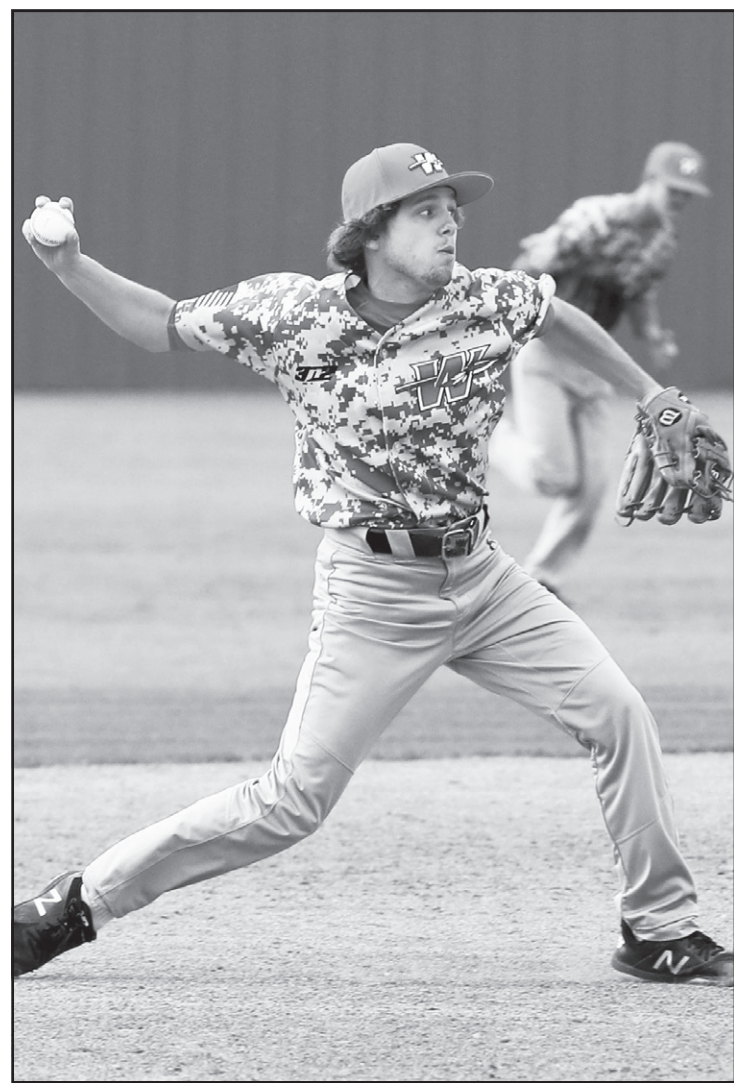
"Lucas Jones kept us off balance early," Kulbeth said. "Gabe settled in after the second and found his breaking ball and change up."

A Matter of Attitudes
As a preacher, I deal with death and dying a great deal. I have noticed that there are two attitudes that people tend to have when a loved one dies. A few days ago, I attended the funeral of an acquaintance a few years younger than me (which, by definition, means he died far too young). Over 100 people were laughing as they remembered the life of the one they lost and his hobby of

collecting and playing board games. His widow and three young sons left for a camping trip, but made plans for a night of board games with the church. Were they hurting after losing a husband and father? Of course. In 1 Thessalonians 4:13-16, Paul told the church not to sorrow like those who had no hope; they could have hope and peace with the knowledge that this separation was only

temporary. As much as they might miss that person now, they knew that he was no longer dealing with the pain and suffering of this world. They reacted to their loss by coming together with the church and growing closer together. On the other hand, I've spoken with several people who have reacted by turning away

When we say that Jesus was "true God and true man," we must admit that he experienced all of the same fears, anxieties and uncertainties that we do as part of being human. A big part of being human is the "fear of the unknown" - what is going to happen next, and how will I endure it? Jesus, as fully human, experienced this fear in the last week of his life. This Sunday we begin our celebration of his last week. We call it "Holy Week," the holiest week of the year. We walk together with Jesus as he

enters Jerusalem with songs of praise (Palm Sunday), shares a final meal with his disciples (Holy Thursday), and is made to carry the cross upon which he is crucified (Good Friday). But Jesus had to make a choice to enter Jerusalem, knowing that he would likely be killed. His last temptation was surely to give up the project, to return to Nazareth and live a quiet life as a carpenter, like his father Joseph. How frightened he must have felt as he turned towards Jerusalem! None of us wants to face his

own death. When someone faces chemo treatment for cancer she turns, like Jesus, towards the unknown, with fear and uncertainty. We will all, one day, have to carry our own cross, if we are not already doing so. Let us pray that we have the courage to turn our face towards Jerusalem, take up our cross, and walk, with Jesus, the Way of the Cross. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday Masses (April 14) and

Front-Porch Gospel: 'Last Chance'

Welcome to the "front porch"! Men and women and boys and girls of all ages have lined the Jericho Road to welcome the crowd plodding noisily along. The noise of the procession is no unusual thing, as well-wishers commonly pack the streets to encourage the travelers to Jerusalem on their yearly pilgrimage. But the commotion is louder than usual today. One special traveler has taken His place in this crowd heading up to Jerusalem for the Passover. It is a strong, young Galilean they had all heard about, Jesus of Nazareth. His fame has grown

daily as he walked the streets and shores of Galilee elegantly for some years, hushing the Pharisees, calming the storms, offering peace to all. The noise has grown to such a level that one particular man sitting up ahead on the side of the road turns to the nearest person and asks what all the commotion is. "Don't you know," he must have replied in shock. "Don't you know that Jesus is passing by?" This news is what this man by the name of Bartimaeus has waited for years to hear. Perhaps that is why he chooses to sit in this very spot today.

Bartimaeus, you see, is a blind man; and he must have known that if he ever had hope of seeing a sunrise or looking into the eyes of his loved ones, this is the Man he must meet. 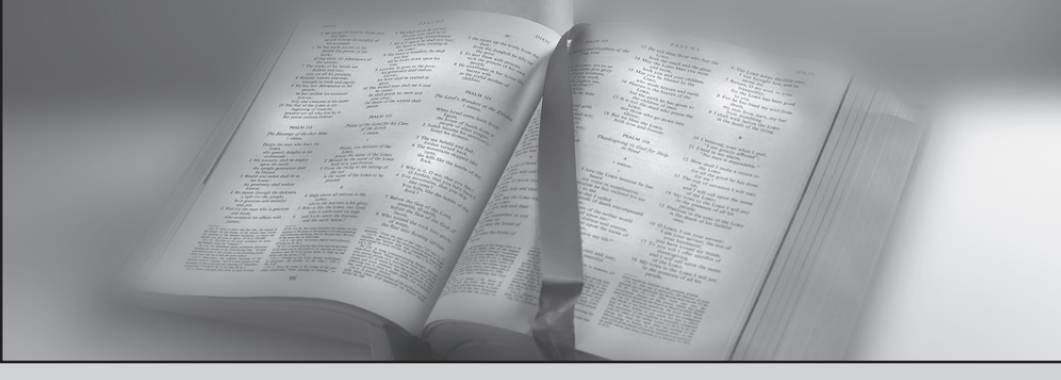

from God. After a loved one died, they declared that they would never go to church again because God took that person from them. Even Charles Darwin (who, by the way, had been schooled as a minister, not a biologist) became an atheist after his daughter Annie died.

The attitude seems to be that, if God exists, He would allow your loved ones to die, but not mine. They blame God for taking their loved ones from them, even while some of them will agree that they are now free from the pains of this world. It's as though everything in the universe should be focused on them.

Death is not a pleasant part of life for us, even when it comes as a release from suffering. We don't like separation and we don't like not being able to see what is on the other side. However, if we're honest with ourselves, we have to realize that it will come, both for ourselves and for those around us.

The attitude that we have toward death depends on the preparation that we make beforehand. It can be seen as something to fear and a reason to hate, or it can be seen as the culmination of a life's journey and the time to receive life's reward.

How would you react if someone close to you were to die? Would you blame God, or would you grow closer? Perhaps more importantly, how would those around you react if you were to die today?

want to give our town a bad name? ... And on and on.

But I want to tell you that this man not only is blind, but he is deaf, too – deaf to the criticism and the rebukes. This is his chance for salvation, and he is not about to let it pass him by. The inspired writer tells us – and it is a beautiful thing – that “he cried the more a great deal, Thou Son of David, have mercy on me!” (v. 48) – this accelerated clamor much to the dismay of spectators nearby.

Bartimaeus is different from all of the others, and – perhaps – he is different from you and me, too. Bartimaeus is a complete and absolute desperate man. He has no worry in the world about what he is wearing, or how he might be perceived, or who particularly His only concern is to get the

attention of the Master, to call and cry and plead, laying it all on the line, until by chance the Lord mercifully turns his face toward him.

Indeed – if you know this great story – you know our Lord hears the desperate cries of the blind man, and Jesus does an amazing thing when those cries come to His ears. He stands still (v. 49).

No, it is not that Jesus is not busy. He likely has never been busier. He is on a mission, His “face set toward Jerusalem.” He is a man with a purpose. But he lays aside His busy schedule, diverges from his itinerary for a minute, and calls for the man. Our Lord must have known before He set foot on the ground that morning that He would meet such a man, a Bartimaeus, one to whom He could give a great blessing.

Dale K. Graham Veterans' Foundation

One of the things we do that I find very rewarding is to recognize a veteran who served during WWII or the Korean War as our Veteran of the Week. We have been doing this so long that we have already recognized hundreds of them. We know that some of those we recognize have never had any type of welcome home before visiting our organization. All of us at our Foundation understand the sacrifices that the men and women who served in the military have endured.

Our Veteran of the Week is Leon Burke from Hartshorne who served during the Korean War. We presented him with a new cap representing his military service in that war.

All our volunteers were very busy both Tuesday and Thursday morning assisting 352 folks last week with their claims for VA benefits and questions. Some of the men and women who visit us are suffering from PTSD or depression or physical disabilities that were caused by or aggravated by their military service. We want each person who comes to us for assistance to know that we will do everything possible to help them to be approved for VA benefits.

As you know, we have assisted veterans from all 77 counties in Oklahoma along with 48 other states and several other countries. As many of our retired military members reside in other countries, we have assisted veterans from eight different countries. Currently, we see 25 or more each week from other states.

At some point in time, we will be looking at ways to increase the number of veterans and surviving spouses we can assist each week. Currently, we will see an average of 150 each working day. Our record number for one day was 195 or so. That day was too much for many of us, so we scaled back to 150 or so as the maximum we accept.

We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit that is made up of volunteers who understand the needs of the men and women who have served in our military. Many of them either served themselves or had family members who are veterans. Our team of Surviving Spouse volunteers includes two who are Surviving Spouses of veterans who have walked in the shoes of those they are assisting

each week.

As a non-profit we are funded by the people we help along with grants from organizations that want to give back to our nation's veterans and their families. Each week we spend an average of \$25,000 in direct aid to veterans or on the services that we provide. Some of our biggest expenses include the cost of a medical provider to fill out a VA Disability Benefits Questioner (DBQ). These are used to diagnose a condition and to show the severity of a condition.

Many times, if the veteran does not have a diagnosed dis-

ability, the VA will deny their claim for benefits. By using the DBQ as evidence many claims by the veteran will be approved the first time they request service-connection for their disability. It can also be used to request a re-evaluation of a disability if it becomes more severe.

Sometimes the VA will service-connect and rate a disability from the DBQ that the veteran sends in with their 21-526EZ. There are many ways that the Department of Veterans Affairs is striving to improve the way they operate both at the Claims Department and the VA Health Care system. Most of us who use the VA medical centers have seen the improvements in care and wait time for veterans. I'm sure that as time goes on, there will be many other improvements to their systems.

Last week 20 veterans received disability ratings of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual income of \$788,034 per year. They will also be eligible for the Oklahoma State Tax benefits such as Sales Tax, Property Tax on a primary residence and other state benefits.

Fifty-two veterans received ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected

disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$883,548. They may be eligible for other benefits depending on their percentage rating.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

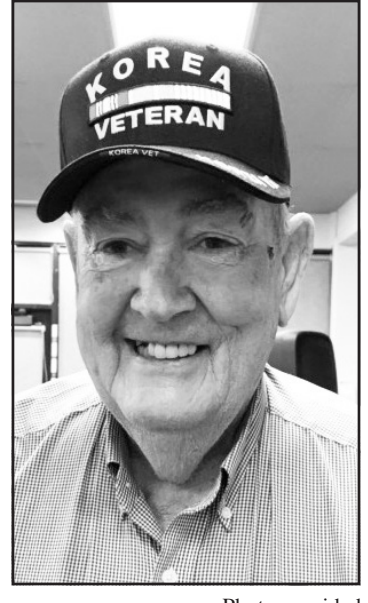

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AMENDING SECTIONS 18-32 & 18-35 OF ARTICLE 3 OF CHAPTER 18 OF THE GOLDSBY CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES; PROVIDING FOR DURATION OF IMPOUNDMENT, CONDITIONS FOR RELEASE FROM IMPOUNDMENT; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF AN IMPOUND FEE; ESTABLISHING CAUSES FOR IMPOUNDMENT; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY UNATTENDED VEHICLE LEFT UPON ANY BRIDGE, VIADUCT, CAUSEWAY OR WITHIN THE STRUCTURE OF A GRADE SEPARATION; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY VEHICLE WHEN THE DRIVER OR PERSON IN CHARGE OF ANY VEHICLE IS PLACED UNDER ARREST, TAKEN INTO CUSTODY AND DETAINED BY POLICE OR ANY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY VEHICLE LEFT UNATTENDED UPON ANY STREET, ALLEY OR THOROUGHFARE, AND SO PARKED ILLEGALLY AS TO CONSTITUTE A DEFINITE HAZARD OR OBSTRUCTION TO THE NORMAL MOVEMENT OF TRAFFIC; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF A TRESPASSING, UNATTENDED VEHICLE; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY UNATTENDED VEHICLE PARKED AT THE STREET CURBING OF ANY ZONE WHERE PARKING IS PROHIBITED, ANY VEHICLE ILLEGALLY PARKED IN SUCH A MANNER THAT IT BLOCKS A FIRE ESCAPE, LADDER OR EXIT, OR BLOCKS READY ACCESS TO A FIRE HYDRANT, AND ANY UNATTENDED VEHICLE ILLEGALLY PARKED IN ANY STREET INTERSECTION; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY VEHICLE LEFT UNATTENDED AND IMPROPERLY PARKED ON A STREET OR HIGHWAY, LEFT UNATTENDED LONGER THAN TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS ON THE SHOULDER OF ANY STREET OR HIGHWAY, OR WHEN THE PERSON IN CHARGE OF THE VEHICLE IS PHYSICALLY INCAPACITATED TO SUCH EXTENT AS TO BE UNABLE TO PROVIDE FOR ITS CUSTODY OR REMOVAL; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY DERELICT VEHICLE PARKED UPON ANY STREET IN THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS, OR MORE; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF ANY VEHICLE LEFT UNATTENDED LONGER THAN TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOURS ON THE SHOULDER OF ANY STREET OR HIGHWAY; PROVIDING FOR STOLEN VEHICLES; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, THAT:

Section 1. Section 18-32 of Article 3 of Chapter 18 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances Amended. Section 18-32 of Article 3 of Chapter 18 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended in its entirety to read:

Section 18-32. Duration of Impoundment, Release; Impound Fee

A. Unless otherwise provided hereinafter, any vehicle impounded under the provisions of this Code of Ordinances shall be stored and held safely until a written order for its release, signed by the Chief of Police, (or a designated representative or law enforcement officer), has been issued.

B. The written order for release shall be conditioned upon:

1. Payment of all impoundment costs and accrued storage charges assessed against the vehicle, by the person to whom the release is issued; and

2. Payment of an impound fee in the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) by the person to whom the release is issued. This impound fee shall be independent of any fines, costs or fees which may be assessed from citations issued to any person for violation of traffic laws or other ordinance violations involving the impounded vehicle.

3. Payment of all fines and costs due the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, because of traffic law or other Law violations involving the vehicle, or proper security posted for said fine or Law violation.

Section 2. Section 18-35 of Article 3 of Chapter 18 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances Amended. Section 18-35 of Article 3 of Chapter 18 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended in its entirety to read:

Section 18-35. Causes of Impoundment.

A. A disabled vehicle upon a street or highway may be impounded, under the following circumstances:

1. If left unattended and improperly parked on a street or highway;

2. If left unattended longer than twenty-four (24) hours on the shoulder of any street or highway; or

3. If the person in charge of the vehicle is physically incapacitated to such extent as to be unable to provide for its custody or removal.

B. Any unattended vehicle left upon any bridge, viaduct, causeway or within the structure of a grade separation, may be

impounded.

C. Whenever the driver or person in charge of any vehicle is placed under arrest, taken into custody and detained by police or any law enforcement officer under circumstances which leave, or will leave, a vehicle unattended on any street or highway, the vehicle may be impounded.

D. A vehicle left unattended upon any street, alley or thoroughfare, and so parked illegally as to constitute a definite hazard or obstruction to the normal movement of traffic, shall be impounded.

E. When any derelict vehicle is discovered by the Police Department or law enforcement officer to have been parked upon any street in the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, for a period of twenty-four (24) hours, or more, the Police Department or law enforcement officer is authorized to impound the vehicle, and if the owner of the vehicle may be ascertained by reasonable diligence, the owner shall be notified of the action by the Police Department or law enforcement officer.

F. A trespassing, unattended vehicle may be impounded when the required complaint has been properly made and filed. The owner or legal occupant who complains shall sign a complaint against the person parking the vehicle on the owner's (or legal occupant's) property; if the identity of the person parking the vehicle is unknown, then the complaint may be filed against the registered owner of the vehicle. The complaint shall be verified and shall allege that the complaining party is the owner or legal occupant of the property upon which the vehicle is parked or standing. Upon filing of the complaint by the property owner or legal occupant, and if there appears to be proper cause to believe a violation has occurred, the Police Department or law enforcement officer shall cause the vehicle to be impounded and placed in storage.

G. Any unattended vehicle parked at the street curbing of any zone where parking is prohibited, and where official signs are in place giving notice thereof in violation of the prohibition, may be impounded.

H. Any vehicle illegally parked in such a manner that it blocks a fire escape, ladder or exit, or blocks ready access to a fire hydrant, shall be impounded.

I. Any unattended vehicle illegally parked in any street intersection, shall be impounded. A disabled vehicle in an intersection with the person in charge of the vehicle being present, shall be moved out of the intersection and to the nearest available legal parking space at the street curbing.

J. Whenever a stolen vehicle is located by police or any law enforcement officer and the registered owner cannot be found within a reasonable time, not exceeding eight (8) hours, or cannot be determined from the registration papers or other identification in the vehicle (or from records or information available from reports of stolen cars), the vehicle may be removed to the nearest authorized place of impoundment and the registered owner of the vehicle notified of the location of the place of impoundment as soon as possible by the Police Department or law enforcement officer. If the registered owner is identified, located and notified of the recovery of the stolen vehicle, the owner shall be given the right to make arrangements for the removal of the vehicle within a period of twenty-four (24) hours from the time he or she is actually notified of its recovery; if the owner is unable or unwilling to effect the removal within the time specified, the vehicle may be impounded.

Section 3. Emergency. It being necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, peace and welfare of the citizens and residents of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, that this Ordinance shall become effective immediately; an emergency is hereby declared to exist, by reason whereof, this Ordinance shall take full force and effect immediately upon its adoption, as provided by law.
