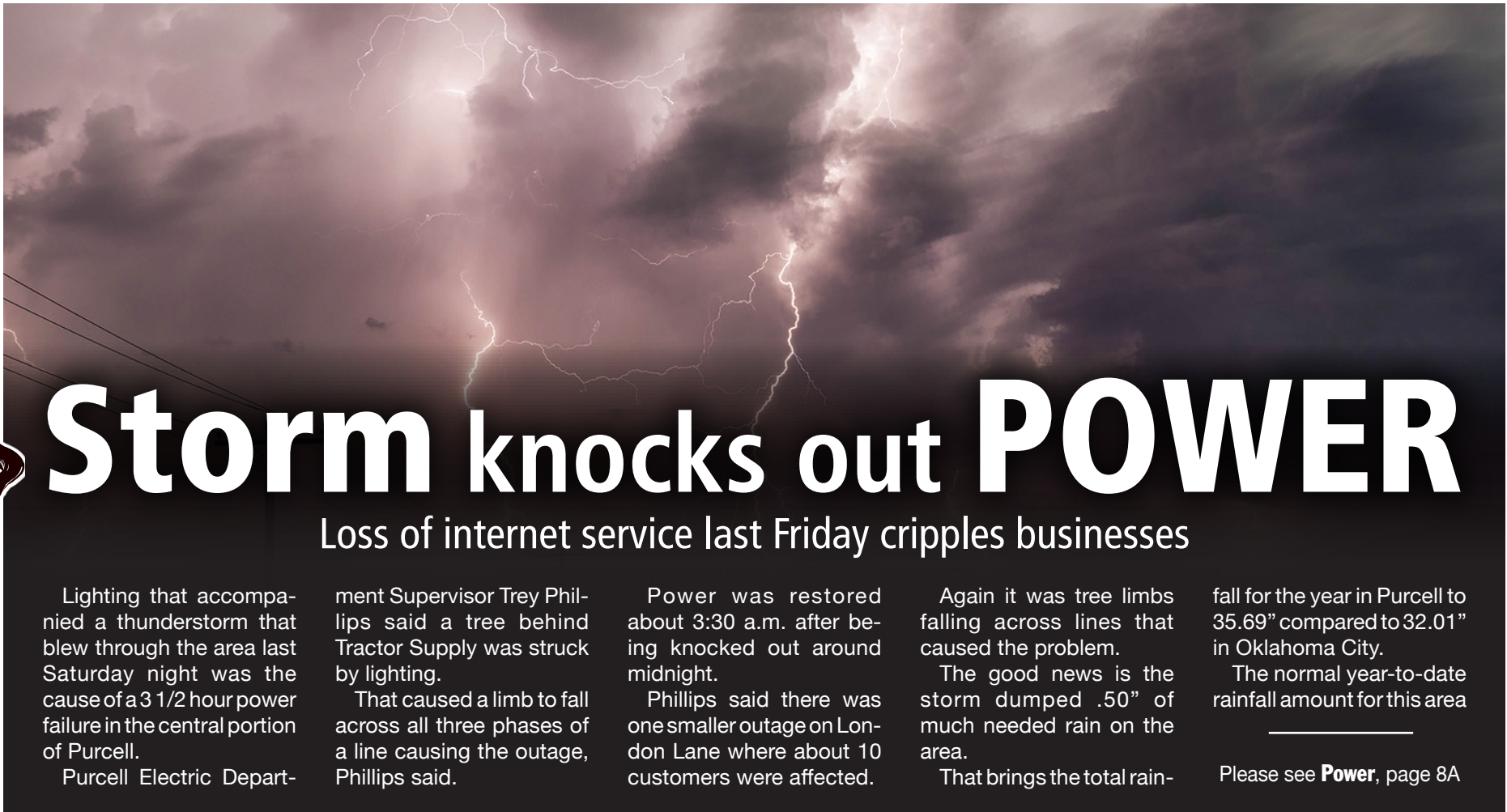
Arena action set for Friday, Saturday

Storm knocks out POWER

Loss of internet service last Friday cripples businesses

Lighting that accompanied a thunderstorm that blew through the area last Saturday night was the cause of a 3 1/2 hour power failure in the central portion of Purcell.

Purcell Electric Depart-

ment Supervisor Trey Phillips said a tree behind Tractor Supply was struck by lightning.

That caused a limb to fall across all three phases of a line causing the outage, Phillips said.

Power was restored about 3:30 a.m. after being knocked out around midnight.

Phillips said there was one smaller outage on London Lane where about 10 customers were affected.

Again it was tree limbs falling across lines that caused the problem.

The good news is the storm dumped .50" of much needed rain on the area.

That brings the total rain-

fall for the year in Purcell to 35.69" compared to 32.01" in Oklahoma City.

The normal year-to-date rainfall amount for this area

Pickup struck semi stopped on I-35

A Moore man died August 15 in a collision with a semi tractor-trailer that was stopped for construction on Interstate 35.

Pronounced dead at the scene with head and arm injuries was Roberto Nieto, 40.

He was taken to the State Medical Examiner's office in Oklahoma City.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Brian Ozment reported the fatality crash happened around 11:15 a.m. at mile marker 82 in the southbound lanes.

Old things, new life for Purcell's Hotel Love

From its inception, the imposing three story brick building at 200 West Main Street has been a Purcell landmark in a class by itself.

The Hotel Love, built in 1895, opened in March 1896 with 50 rooms boasting all the modern conveniences of the time – notably steam heat and electric lights.

It opened with some fanfare, covered by **The Purcell Register**, then a territorial newspaper, which declared the hotel "by far the finest hotel in the Chickasaw Na-

tion."

An article dubbed the Hotel Love "The Pride of Purcell," reporting the structure "superior to anything of its kind in the Indian Territory."

The 50-room hotel was built by Robert Jeremiah Love who started herding horses for \$8 a month when he was orphaned at the age of 14.

He saved his money and when he was 26 left Missouri for the Chickasaw Nation with two saddle horses and 32 cattle.

He met and married Sallie Gaines Criner, who was half

Chickasaw, in 1877.

For five years, they made their home in the Red River area.

In 1882, they moved to a ranch south of present day Purcell. He and a man named Sparks had hay pens and corals on the land that became Purcell.

Together they hired an engineer to lay out a town on the prairie.

The engineer platted four blocks on a piece of wrapping paper, with Canadian Avenue

Handle with Care

Lexington Schools included in partnership with sheriff

Cleveland County Sheriff Todd Gibson and members of the Cleveland County Sheriff's Office are partnering with area schools to protect children who have been exposed to violence or other trauma.

In conjunction with Lexington, Little Axe, and Noble Public Schools the Sheriff's Office is implementing Handle with Care, a program tailored to protect those children.

Handle with Care is a three-prong approach involving law enforcement, schools and counseling.

"Children who have experienced violence, abuse or other trauma in their homes or environments should not be traumatized again by other unsuspecting adults in their lives," Gibson said. "Through communicating with schools when a child has been through an adverse childhood experience, law enforcement can make a real difference in those children's lives."

Studies reveal that 60 percent of American children have been exposed to violence, crime or abuse, while 40 percent have been direct victims of two or more violent acts.

Prolonged exposure to violence and trauma can seriously undermine children's ability to focus, behave appropriately and learn, leading kids to act out.

When school officials don't

know why a child is acting out, the trauma can result in truancy, suspension or expulsion, dropping out, and even involvement in the juvenile justice system.

"Relationships are key to the success of the Handle with Care program," Gibson said. "We will give a heads-up to Cleveland County schools when we know a child has experienced a traumatic event."

"The schools then know not to punish the child for acting out, but rather to provide intervention to help the recovery process."

Handle with Care is designed to promote a safe and supportive environment through community partnerships that aim at ensuring children exposed to trauma in their home, school or community receive appropriate interventions.

The ultimate goal of Handle with Care is to help students succeed.

Examples of traumatic events include a domestic violence situation, a shooting, witnessing a malicious criminal act, being a victim of a crime or seeing a family member arrested.

Deputies will be trained to identify children at the scene, find out where they go to school and send the school a confidential email or text that simply says... "Handle (name of student, grade) with care."

That's it. No other details.

In addition to providing notice, deputies also will build positive relationships with students by interacting with them on the school campus. They will visit classrooms, stop by for lunch and simply chat with students to help promote positive relationships and perceptions of the law enforcement profession.

Schools can incorporate many interventions to lessen the negative impact of trauma.

Schools can also implement school-wide interventions to create a trauma-sensitive school. Examples would be using greeters, pairing students with an adult mentor, utilizing a therapy dog and using "thumbs up/thumbs down" to indicate if a student is having a good or bad day.

Counseling comes into play when identified students exhibit continued behavioral or emotional problems in the classroom.

The parents may be referred to a counseling agency which provides trauma-focused therapy.

Gibson said he appreciates public school superintendents Chad Hall of Lexington, Jay Thomas of Little Axe, and Frank Solomon of Noble, for partnering with the Sheriff's Office in this important endeavor and hopes to reach out to all schools in the Cleveland County area.

Samantha Carlson named 2019 Teacher Grant Recipient

Samantha Carlson from Purcell Public Schools was named by Oklahoma Educators Credit Union (OECU) as a 2019 Teacher Grant recipient.

Through its annual Teacher Grant Program, OECU has impacted countless Oklahoma teachers and students over the years.

Grants are used to fund a variety of projects that will enhance hands-on learning for students in

pre-k through 12th grade.

A total of 82 teachers from 65 different schools across the state of Oklahoma were awarded grants for the 2019-2020 school year. The total amount of grants distributed is close to \$30,000.

"Teachers inspire greatness within their students," said Cindy White, president and CEO of Oklahoma Educators Credit Union. "All of these grants play a major role in build-

ing up the next generation, and we are so grateful to be a part of their student's development"

Carlson, a music teacher at Purcell Intermediate School, received \$101.87 for "Glorious Music Games."

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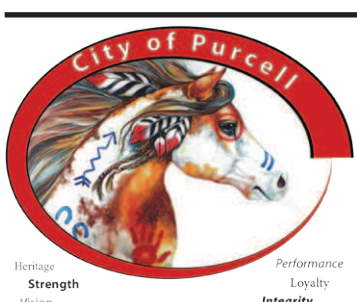

Bill signing held for \$5,000 tax exemption for foster parents

Governor Kevin Stitt recently ceremoniously signed legislation authored this session by Sen. Paul Scott to reinstate a \$5,000 tax exemption for Oklahoma foster parents.

Scott said he authored the measure to provide assistance to foster parents and reestablish an important incentive for families who are able to consider the responsibility of caring for a foster child.

"Fostering a child represents an opportunity to positively impact a child's life while enriching your own. It can be an extraordinary gift for these children," said Scott, R-Duncan.

"If you are able to consider caring for a foster child, I hope you will call the Department of Human Services and request further information. Living in a stable home is critical for a child's well-being, and we should all applaud those who serve as foster parents," he said.

Senate Bill 893 reinstates the exemption for a taxpayer who contracts with a child-placing agency for taxable years beginning on or after Jan. 1, 2019.

Johann was the third Doberman Pinscher to share my home.

Still at home are two others — Ziva and Kai — in the prime of their too-brief lives.

Johann was precious on so many levels and it will take time for the pawprints on my heart to fully heal. For certain, he took a big part of my heart with him.

He was whelped Sept. 11, 2008 so he almost made it 11 years which is considered long-lived in the breed.

As it is, he is eligible for a longevity certificate from the Doberman Pinscher Club of America because he lived past 10 years.

Time to advance USMCA

The economic success that America has experienced lately is truly historic. Even with unemployment as low as 3.7 percent, Congress has an opportunity to further improve the nation's economy and create more jobs by advancing the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA), which would replace the outdated North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

USMCA already has bipartisan support, and if it were brought to the floor in the U.S. House of Representatives, I think it would easily pass.

Mexico has already formally ratified the agreement and Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has signaled that Canada is ready to do the same.

While leaders in the Republican-led Senate are eager to pass USMCA, agreements pertaining to revenue are constitutionally required to originate in the House.

Each day that House Democratic leadership keeps this important trade deal from a vote represents another day that American manufacturers, farmers and ranchers miss out on its benefits.

The United States trades with our two North American

neighbors more than any other countries in the world. In fact, Canada and Mexico purchase more American goods than our next 10 largest trading partners altogether.

And according to the U.S. Department of Commerce, Canada and Mexico purchase over two-fifths of all the exported goods made in Oklahoma.

Trade with Mexico and Canada already supports 12 million jobs in America, including 10,400 jobs in Oklahoma. Jobs would grow and so would the economy under USMCA.

Earlier this year, analysis by the U.S. International Trade Commission found that ratification of USMCA would create at least 176,000 jobs nationwide and grow the economy by an estimated \$68 billion.

Indeed, a free and fair agreement is critically important between countries that engage in commerce as much as the United States, Mexico and Canada.

USMCA delivers an agreement that would create more American jobs, modernize trade in the digital age and foster innovation.

USMCA considers the massive role that the Internet plays as a sales platform by providing a modern digital trade chapter. The agreement also requires

robust intellectual property protections — strengthening patents, copyrights, trademarks and trade secrets.

These requirements allow entrepreneurs to confidently create and trade their products freely without fear of foul play.

USMCA also includes a section specifically with small and medium-sized businesses in mind. This includes provisions to help smaller business save time and money in the customs and shipping process.

Moreover, the trade agreement requires more transparent regulatory procedures, helping small businesses that may not have the resources to hire a large legal team.

There's no reason for further delay on USMCA. Frankly, the deal negotiated by the Trump Administration on America's behalf should have been ratified by Congress long ago.

Unfortunately, as long as Democratic inaction in the House continues, American entrepreneurs, farmers and ranchers will unnecessarily miss out on the benefits USMCA has to offer.

When lawmakers return for legislative work in September, I hope that Democratic leaders will finally choose to schedule this commonsense trade agreement for a House vote.

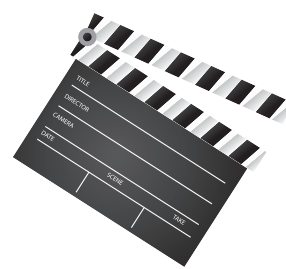

I guess this August was destined to be a movie dumping ground for studios. This past weekend there were five new wide releases dropped into theaters, and the week before that there were four of them.

But so many of the gags in the first *Angry Birds* felt so low effort, so unnecessarily crude for a kids film, that I just couldn't wait for the movie to be over.

Fortunately, this sequel ended up being a bit less grating. It still wasn't remotely my cup of tea, but for what it's worth I felt noticeably less annoyed while watching it.

I think part of what helped is the writers here had a bit more creative freedom this time around.

Next is "47 Meters Down: Uncaged." This film follows the diving adventure of four teenage girls

(Corinne Foxx, Sistine Stallone, Sophie Nélisse, and Brianna Tju) exploring a submerged Mayan City.

Once inside, their rush of excitement turns into a jolt of terror as they discover the sunken ruins are a hunting ground for deadly great white sharks. With their air supply steadily dwindling, the friends must navigate the underwater labyrinth of claustrophobic caves and eerie tunnels in search of a way out of their watery hell.

Ah, "47 Meters Down," the movie that put Entertainment Studios on the map.

Before their venture into shark based horror movies, Entertainment Studios was more known for distributing low

budget courtroom shows and maybe the occasional sitcom no one's ever heard of.

These days they're making a name for themselves by putting out films from all kinds of genres.

From terrible teenage horror movies like "Friend Request," to annoyingly awful action like "The Hurricane Heist," and even senseless sci-fi thrillers like "Replicas."

Heck, later this year Entertainment Studios is even dipping their toes into the lucrative children's movie market with the ludicrously low budget looking film called "Arctic Dogs."

As you might be able to guess, I haven't really been a big fan of the movies this studio has chosen to distribute. Even their best films like "Hostiles," a western drama starring Christian Bale, or "Chappaquiddick," a political drama revolving around Ted Kennedy, haven't exactly thrilled me.

It's gotten to the point where every time I see their logo before a movie, I immediately lower my expectations. I don't think there's any other studio out there that disappoints me more than they do right now.

They've just put out so many bad films, I can't help but dread whatever terrible thing they put out next.

Which of course brings me to this movie.

After all that, I have to admit, I didn't hate the first "47 Meters Down." Sure the characters were dumb, but it still had a lot of tense moments plus a fair amount of okay scares.

This time around though, they really amp up the stupidity of our main characters.

First of all, you have to be an exceptionally moronic person to go cave diving with little to no diving experience.

From the very beginning, it's very clear these girls have little regard for their own lives, regardless of the local shark population. It makes sympathizing with these characters very difficult from the get go.

So what about the sharks themselves? Well, for the majority of the film, they seemed pretty lethargic to me.

The scares in this movie, while not too inspired, did make me jump a few times, and even had me laughing out loud at one particularly absurd moment.

Like the last 47 Meters film, the best part by far ended up being the end. Just when I thought things were wrapping up, the sharks just kept on coming back for more.

Not only was it tense, but the ending did a decent job tying the entire film together.

So, bottomline, is this movie a good follow up to the previous "47 Meters Down?" Well it doesn't quite have the same knack for creating tension that the first one had, but it had its moments, especially during the final few scenes.

It's far from a great horror film, and it certainly doesn't raise my opinion of Entertainment Studios any, but for those looking for simple shark scares, this movie will probably satisfy just fine.

This week is "Where'd You Go, Bernadette."

Former architect Bernadette Fox (Cate Blanchett) seems to have it all. A beautiful home in Seattle, a successful and loving husband Elgie (Billy Crudup), and a brilliant teenage daughter Bee (Emma Nelson) who's about to attend boarding school.

But when Bernadette suddenly disappears without a trace, her concerned family sets off on an exciting adventure to solve the mystery of where she might have gone.

I had a bad feeling about this movie ever since I saw the trailer for it earlier this year.

The whole thing looked so unfocused. Like the film didn't know the story it wanted to tell or how to tell it. Well it turned out that's exactly how the actual movie ended up being too.

I guess the star of the movie is Bernadette Fox, but the way the narrative plays out here feels so disconnected from her character.

Most of what we learn about Bernadette is from either third party narration, performed by her daughter Bee, Bernadette using text-to-speech on her

phone to send emails, and a faux documentary about Bernadette which tells the audience how wonderful she used to be before she became a total shut-in.

I'm sure this contrived storytelling method is due to influence from the book this movie was based on, but it simply did not translate well to film.

Instead of being clever, it just ended up feeling cold. Leading to Bernadette, and indeed every character in this film, coming across as very unsympathetic.

It also didn't help that everyone in this movie is clearly obscenely wealthy. Poor Bernadette. Despite living an incredibly privileged life, she can't be bothered to treat anyone outside her family with the least bit of respect.

It can't be Bernadette's fault she's been sitting around doing nothing for 20 years. You see, someone bought a house she designed and decided to demolish it. That's perfect reasonable justification to sit around and do nothing for two decades, right?

The movie's trying so hard to portray Bernadette as some kind of poor mistreated genius, but all I see is someone completely self-absorbed.

Performance wise, Cate Blanchett does do a fantastic job portraying this loathsome person. I did not care for the character in the least, but I have to give credit to Blanchett for bringing her to life as she was written.

Sadly Emma Nelson, who plays Bernadette's daughter Bee, was less than inspiring. Her lines constantly lacked conviction, especially during the more emotional moments. A shame considering Bee's main purpose in the movie is to be our window into Bernadette's world.

In fact, most of the scenes in this film meant to be poignant, ended up just being dull and uninteresting.

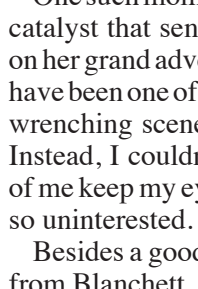

Coming in at number four this week is "Good Boys."

Invited to his first kissing party, 12-year-old Max (Jacob Tremblay) asks his best friends Lucas (Keith L. Williams) and Thor (Brady Noon) for some much-needed pointers on how to pucker up.

When they hit a dead end, Max decides to use his father's drone to spy on the teenage girls next door. When the boys lose the drone, they skip school and hatch a plan to retrieve it before Max's dad can figure out what happened.

I gotta say, this past weekend was looking pretty bleak before this movie came along.

From a mediocre animated film, to a passable horror movie, and a mind numbingly dull family drama, I was just about ready to call this week a wash.

Luckily this film, along with "Blinded By The Light," completely turned my weekend around.

It took a little while for me to warm up to this movie, but by the midway point I was laughing almost constantly all the way until the very end.

Much of the humor comes from these 12-year-old boys dealing with, and completely misunderstanding, more mature subject matter including alcohol, sex, drugs, pornography, and the most terrifying thing of all to a young boy, kissing a girl.

But even though these kids are constantly immersed in raunchy affairs, the film knew where to set its boundaries and never crossed the line to become disturbing. Something that could have been an easy thing considering how young the stars are here.

Luckily the filmmakers managed to keep the tone very lighthearted, despite all the obscene material here, and part of what helped keep everything on the funnier side of things was the kids themselves.

The director here managed to get really good comedic performances out of the young actors here. Not only from our three main boys, but the entire cast.

Of course Jacob Tremblay isn't a stranger to the acting world, as he's starred alongside Brie Larson's Oscar nominated performance in "Room," and more recently the lead role in critically acclaimed family film, "Wonder."

It's no surprise Tremblay does a bang up job in this film as well, but the other two boys are quite good here too. Especially considering this was their first acting gig in a feature film.

The boys here are incredibly relatable. After all, everyone's been a 12-year-old at some point. At that age most of us kind of had an idea about sex or drugs, but didn't quite grasp the full picture. That's where a large chunk of the comedy in this movie comes from.

The rest of the humor mostly involves these kids trying to act grownup in front of their peers, while looking like complete dorks in the process.

Sure, the story isn't particularly innovative, nor does it reach the same emotional heights as some of its comedic forebears like this year's "Booksmart" or even "Superbad."

But similar to those films, this is a movie about growing up. Sometimes that means growing up and staying close to the people you've known your whole life, and sometimes that means growing apart as your interests and circumstances change over the years.

Bottomline though, this is a fun movie. The humor is on point, the comedic timing is excellent, and the three boys are incredibly easy to identify with for anyone who's ever been a sheltered preteen.

An easy film to recommend to anyone who loves the rauncher side of coming of age comedies.

"Good Boys" is rated R.

Finally, the last movie this week is "Blinded By The Light."

Set in 1980s England, during Margaret Thatcher's administration, this film follows Javed (Viveik Kalra), a Pakistani teenager who writes poetry as a way to escape the racial and economic turmoil intolerance of his hometown, plus the stubborn views of his traditional father (Kulvinder Ghir).

When a classmate introduces him to the music of Bruce Springsteen, Javed sees parallels between the singer's

powerful lyrics and his own working-class environment. Springsteen's melodies soon inspire Javed to find his own voice and follow his dreams.

This movie ended up being quite a bit heavier than I had originally assumed.

It seemed like a common enough story. You have a teenage boy, frustrated with his place in the world, just like every other teenager ever. Of course he doesn't want to be a doctor or a lawyer like his dad wants him to be. He likes poetry, and enjoys writing more than anything else.

The obvious twist being, this Pakistani adolescent oddly finds solace and inspiration in the work of American singer-songwriter Bruce Springsteen.

It sounded like a cute, yet familiar concept. One set to the tune of Springsteen's fantastic music, so I was definitely looking forward to it despite how clichéd I expected it would be.

But then came the neo-Nazis, marching down the street with my presumptions, incinerating them as eagerly as they would a wick on a cheap tiki torch.

To be clear, this movie does hit a lot of of the same story beats many coming of age stories do, but unlike similar stories, it's set in an environment of constant prejudice.

Javed not only struggles against the overbearing will of his father, a man so controlling he automatically collects the wages of everyone living under his roof, he also has to deal with white supremacists who constantly go out of their way to threaten and degrade not only himself, but his family and friends as well.

But through it all, Javed has the words of Springsteen to inspire him along the way.

I know on the surface this sounds like an odd combination. I'll definitely admit it was jarring at times.

One second we see Javed out singing and dancing in the streets with his friends to "Born to Run," barely one step away from being a scene straight out of a musical. The next we see a news report about a heinous hate crime.

Remarkably though, this film manages to balance these unabashedly corny moments with the depressing reality of racist morons marching in the streets quite well.

I'm not quite sure how filmmakers made it work, but they did. And it made for some surprisingly thoughtful and emotionally moving moments throughout.

Even the clichéd father-son story ended up being deeper than it first appeared. Yes, the dad is incredibly overbearing, but he himself is a victim of his own upbringing and culture.

And as the film goes on Javed begins to discover he and his father are more alike than he realizes.

In that vein, the message of this film wasn't simply "strike out on your own and don't let anyone stand in the way of your dreams." A common lesson for stories like these.

Instead the meaning here is closer to "forge your own path and follow your dreams, but don't forget where you came from and the people who made you who you are."

I ended up appreciating this film a lot more than I expected to going into it. What I thought would just be an upbeat music filled coming of age tale, instead ended up delving into some surprisingly heavy subject matter. And all while keeping a lighthearted tone.

The movie might hit a few clichés along the way, but don't let the feelgood music fool ya. There's definitely more to this late summer flick than you'd expect at first glance. All together making this film an easy one to recommend.

1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 teaspoons chili powder
2 teaspoons kosher salt
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1/2 cup uncooked long grain white rice

2 tablespoons tomato paste
14.5-ounce can diced tomatoes with juice
1 cup water
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

In a skillet that has a tight fitting cover, heat olive oil over medium high.

Add onion, peppers, garlic, ground beef, dry mustard, chili powder, salt and pepper. Sauté until ground beef is no longer pink, breaking up beef as you cook.

Add rice and cook for two minutes letting rice absorb liquid.

Add tomato paste and cook for one minute.

Add canned tomatoes with juice, water and Worcestershire sauce. Stir, cover and simmer for 20 minutes covered.

After 20 minutes, remove lid and fluff the mixture then serve. If the mixture is too wet, cook for another few minutes with lid off.

Sprinkle cheese on top for the last few minutes of cooking time with lid on.

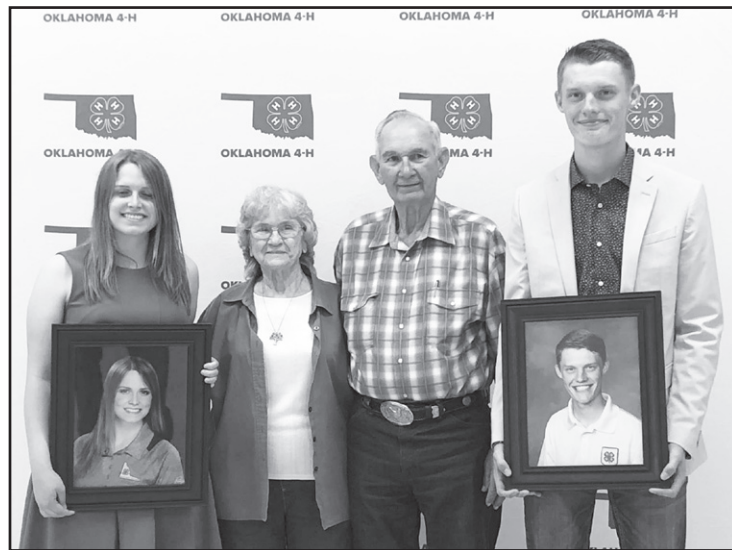

The Horseman's Corner

Oklahoma Horsewoman Debbie Schauf Dies August 10
 Debbie Schauf, the executive director of the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Racing Association, died on August 10. The respected horsewoman was serving on the AQHARacing Council, and worked tirelessly to help horse racing not only in her own state, but the rest of the world. She worked to represent horse racing in regard to racing laws, rules and regulations, medication issues and promotional efforts. An AQHA life member, she served as a member of the AQHARacing Committee, the AQHAAffiliate Council and as an AQHA director. She was the recipient of the Mildred N. Vessels Special Achievement Award in 2001 and also accepted the John Andreini Special Recognition Award on behalf of OQHRA in 2009. She was inducted into the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 2014. All of her life, Debbie had an immense infatuation with the horse business, and has always been involved since she got her first horse at eight years old. For over 20 years, Debbie was a real estate broker and owned and managed a residential construction and real estate company. She was recognized with many special awards for her work in Real Estate and continuing education. In 1986, Debbie was elected to two terms in the legislature before taking up a new career providing representation for Quarter Horse racing horsemen. After her four years in the Kansas Legislature, Debbie became the director of the Kansas Horsemen's Association. In 1991, she accepted a position as general manager of the



Schauf

Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association, and from 1994 through March 1996 she was director of racing and executive director of the Texas Quarter Horse Association. Since then, she served in her position with OQHRA, but more than that, she served as a consultant in Quarter Horse racing issues for Idaho, Wyoming, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, and a number of other racing jurisdictions. "Debbie Schauf's leadership, intellect and tireless dedication to Quarter Horse racing was unsurpassed," said Remington Park general manager Scott Wells. "She was a major positive influence nationally as well as regionally, but it is in Oklahoma where her impact was greatest. She will be sorely missed by all of us here at Remington Park and across the industry." Debbie was quoted as saying her favorite role in the horse industry was being a grandmother and watching her grandchildren grow in their love for the horses in their lives, and still being able to go to work every day and help make racing as good as it can be for horsemen. She says she could not dream of a life she would like any better. Services will be held at 2 p.m., Thursday, August 22, at Heritage Place.

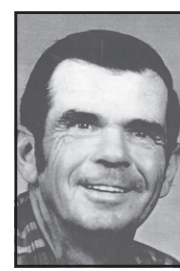

Love and Sparks then plowed furrows to mark the streets and alleys.

Chickasaw Nation citizens who applied before June 1887 were given residential and business lots.

The early business district consisted of frame buildings and was razed by fire in 1895.

That's when the business district shifted to Main Street where entrepreneurs were constructing brick buildings.

The Loves finally settled in the town in 1896. Here they raised 10 children.

By then Love was an established businessman. With two other men, he purchased the Bank of Purcell. In 1892, he organized the Chickasaw National Bank, serving as president until his death in 1899 at the age of 46. A later addition which now houses a new gift shop and Queen of T's, gave the hotel a total of 63 rooms which rented for \$2 a night, a considerable sum for the time when a big steak dinner could be purchased for a nickel.

Between 1887 and 1901, many hotels sprang up in Purcell. But only the Hotel Love would survive.

The Hotel Love continued to operate as a hotel.

Kennedy Drug was founded in 1906 and originally was across the street and near McClain Bank.

The pharmacy relocated to the Hotel Love lobby in the 1940s. It would eventually be owned by Jerry Butler, a registered pharmacist, and his wife, Elaine, who leased the lobby space.

In 1982 the building's owner, James C. Nance, decided to sell his real estate holdings downtown.

He offered the building to the Butlers.

"The price was right so we bought it," Elaine said. "If we didn't buy it, someone could give us 30 days to vacate."

Jerry became friends with an auctioneer who set up shop in a former lumber yard behind the hotel.

He invited Jerry to attend an antique auction.

"We'd never been to an auction or inside an antique store," Elaine said.

They began buying some items.

The upper two floors of the hotel were unused so the Butlers decided to store some glassware, antiques and collectibles in one of the rooms.

The corner room selected had been the ladies parlor during the hotel's heyday.

Butler's Antiques opened in February 1986 – Purcell's first large antique store and still the only one not operating as an antique mall.

Spurred by the city's participation in the Main Street Program, the couple began restoring the hotel in 1991.

"We attended several historic preservation workshops offered through the Main Street Program," Elaine said.

One fact they learned is that the hotel was originally green.

The hotel was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on Dec. 7, 1995 – the same year the Butlers moved their home into the hotel.

Any building that survives 123 years being occupied by travelers and townfolk too numerous to count will eventually generate interest among ghost hunters.

It's not uncommon for visitors to ask if the Hotel Love is haunted.

Absolutely not, Elaine insists. "My office is upstairs," she said, "and I've never been

afraid to go upstairs. There are no haunts. No spirit is up there unless it's the Holy Spirit."

Today numerous upstairs rooms are filled with antiques.

The Butlers haven't been to an auction in at least 20 years.

"We have bought estates and parts of estates," Elaine said. "But our best purchases come from individuals. We buy something almost every day from somebody who comes in."

They have strict requirements for those purchases. Elaine pointed out that real antiques are at least 100 years old. But condition is also a large factor.

"Since it is all ours, we can control when we're open," she said.

"He's 80 and I'm 78 and we wouldn't do this if it wasn't fun. We won't ever quit liking it. Antiquing gets in your blood."

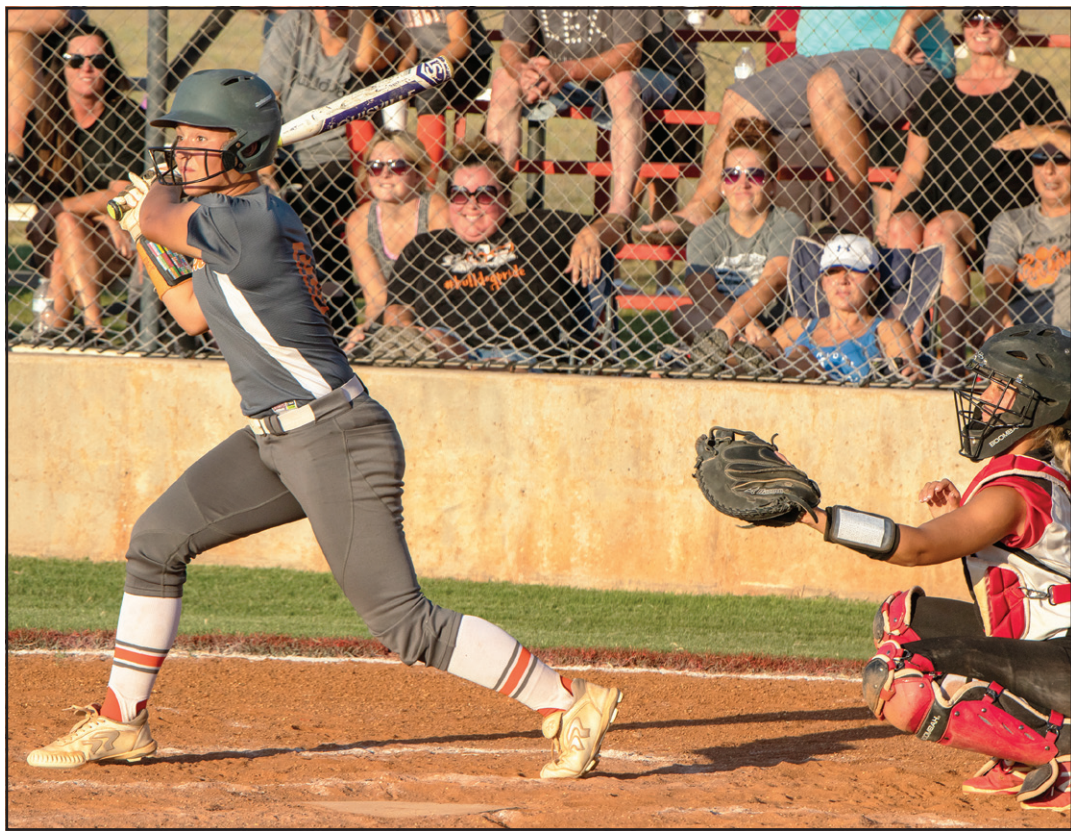

The VA uses the same Disability Benefits Questionnaire to evaluate a veteran's disability. These DBQ Forms are available at the VA webpage for most any disease or disability.

Last Thursday one of the first veterans we assisted was from New York City. When we asked them where they heard about us it's always the same, either friends or family members who had used our services themselves. To me we must be making believers out of thousands of people each year from all over this United States. Maybe we can keep our organization going until all veterans and their families receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. Each day we are open we are seeing an average of 20 veterans from other states who had given up on receiving VA benefits in their home state.

Our mailbag was full last week. Twenty-six of our veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities and will receive a combined annual income of \$1,053,984. Thirty-four veterans were rated 10-90 percent and will receive a combined annual income of \$595,391. Three surviving spouses were approved for benefits and will receive a combined \$50,134 a year.

Our organization is a 501(C) (3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles, or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your

donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.

We have power wheelchairs and scooters that have been donated. If you know a veteran who needs one, please contact us.

“The girls are starting to really work together and trust each other,” the coach said.

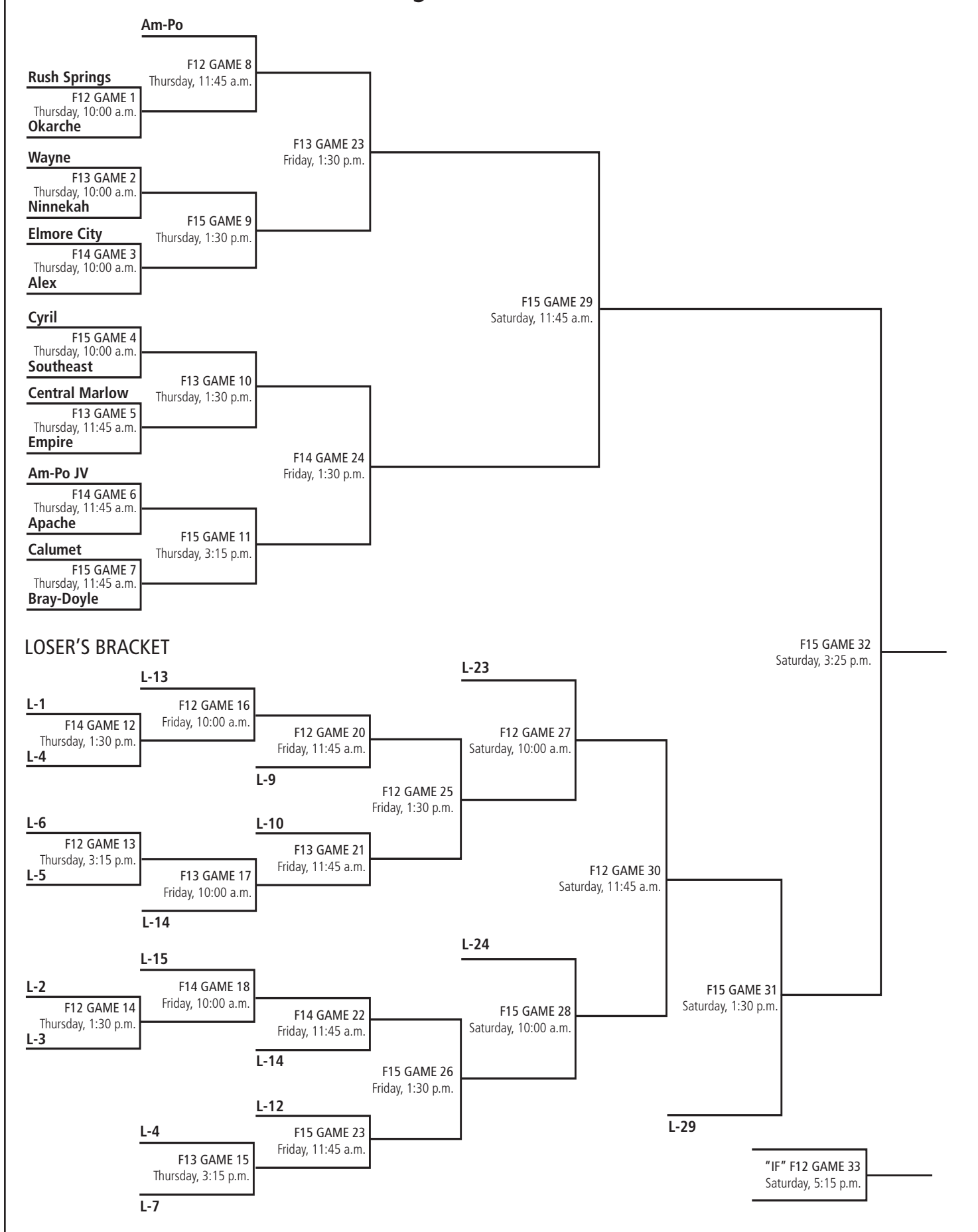
“Coty (Sessions) pitched a fantastic game only allowing one run.

The Greatest Answer

Good week to all. Welcome to the “front porch.” Let’s take a walk today with the Lord on the shores of Caesarea Philippi.

He abruptly turns to his disciples and asks them whom men say he is. The Lord is well-known for getting right to the point, to cutting to the chase, as we say. At such times, I am sure the disciples would often look around at each other with a confused look and with eyebrows raised. The Lord’s questions were not always easy, because they were probing.

You have to make sure you get the answer right when someone sets one of those questions before you. The Lord would ask: Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?

Or, what do you think about the Christ? Or – one of my favorites – Where is your faith? (Luke 8:25). As you see, there seldom was a right answer, and the questions, I’m sure, made the disciples more than a little nervous.

On this particular occasion there in Caesarea, they offer the Lord various answers they had heard in the market place or on the streets. The general consensus, they say, is that you are Elijah, Jeremiah, or one of the other great prophets.

The Lord takes in those hypotheses, then – perhaps with the smile of the teacher who knows he is about to shatter all the students’ misconceptions – asks that wondrous age-old:

“But whom do you say that I am?” (Matthew 16:15).

Perhaps there would have been an awkward silence had the others had to come up with an answer to that question, but not so with Peter. Unhesitatingly, Peter speaks up, as Matthew records: “Simon Peter answered and said, You are the Christ, the Son of the living God” (v. 16).

In many ways Peter is like many of us: quick to speak, quick to misspeak, and quick to do the wrong thing. But in this case, maybe surprisingly, he does not misspeak nor do the wrong thing. He is not unsure,

Big challenges can be overcome by taking small steps

The Bible is a collection of stories. It is a collection of stories about how God acts in our lives.

These stories are about real people who had experiences of God’s love in tangible ways. Our children are starting school this week or last week. They will be facing new challenges – a new teacher, meeting new friends, learning again how to focus attention for a period of time.

Some challenges will be more substantial. For example, one student really struggles with math. Another student is being bullied by a classmate. Perhaps just the act of being still for a full hour in class is a challenge for some.

From the stories of the Bible, there are several ways in which God helps us meet a big challenge.

In rare cases, God may send an angel to help us out. St. Peter was once put in jail for preaching the Gospel. But God sent an angel during the night to open the doors and give him freedom. (Acts 12:3-19) As Abraham and Mary Magdalene can attest, oftentimes the angel looks just like another person!

Sometimes it is another person that will come to help us. Jeremiah was a prophet who spoke God’s word. God’s word is always true, but sometimes people don’t want to hear it. So Jeremiah was thrown into a deep water well – muddy, cold,

and damp. He could have died there. But a friend, a person who believed in God, went to the king and asked that Jeremiah be set free. (Jer. 38:4-10)

So sometimes God will send an angel or another person to help us when we need help.

But there are other times in which we have to meet the challenge completely on our own. Before he was king, David was just a little shepherd boy when the army of Israel was faced off against the giant, Goliath. What did David do to conquer the giant? He used little stones in his little slingshot. Stone by stone, he knocked down the

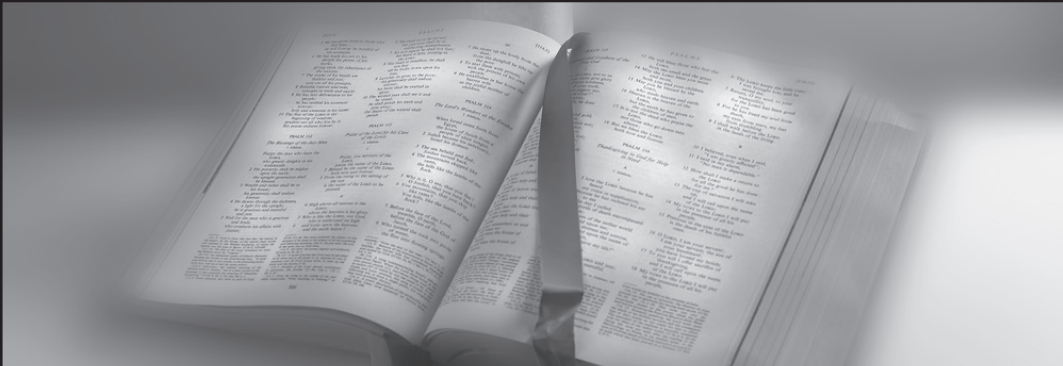

Methodist:

Ruth is no different. The book starts with Naomi, her husband, and their two sons moving to Moab, a land of pagans. The sons both marry women of Moab even though their parents were not happy with this and feared that the women would influence the sons to become worshippers of the pagan god Chemosh, who demanded child sacrifice.

In less than the first five verses, the husband and both of the sons die, leaving Naomi and her two daughters-in-law, Ruth and Orpah, widows. Widows had no status without a husband or a son, so there was no man to give the widows protection and resources. All Naomi could think to do was to go back to Judah since the sons had left no children (in particular, sons) from their 10-year marriages to the Moabite women.

Ruth and Orpah decide to go with Naomi, who keeps trying to convince them to go back to their own families on the chance that they might make it there, possibly by marrying again. They follow Naomi who continues to implore them to leave her. Finally, Orpah agrees to go back to her family, but Ruth refused to go back. The words quoted above shows that Ruth is committed to Naomi and her God, even though Ruth knew that she would be seen as an outsider and that her life would most likely be difficult.

Naomi and Ruth still had trouble providing for themselves. Naomi cared enough for Ruth to encourage her to seek out Naomi's kinsman Boaz, in the hope that Ruth could experience a home once again. The story of Ruth is not that of a romantic love between Naomi, Ruth, and Boaz, but that of a sacrificial, risk-taking type of love.

Ruth had been providing for herself and Naomi by picking up the fallen grain leftover from the harvest called gleaning. She had been finding grain in a field that was owned by Naomi's husband's kinsman, Boaz. As such, he would protect Ruth if she stayed in his fields.

When Naomi heard about this, she encouraged Ruth to wait until Boaz was alone, in order to avoid embarrassment on both Ruth's and Boaz's part. This was risky for a number of reasons: culturally women did not approach men on their own; Boaz was a landowner and Ruth a servant; additionally Ruth was a Moabite while Boaz was an Israelite elder and a man of prominence.

Because Ruth trusted Naomi, she obeyed the instructions given. Ruth was to wait until the harvesting day was over and went to the threshing floor where Boaz would be resting overnight. After he was asleep, she should lie down at his feet and take the corner of his robe to cover herself. In that culture, this amounted to asking him to

protect her by marriage. But, if he chose not to marry her, she had come alone in order to protect both their reputations.

When he awoke and saw her, he understood what she was asking. According to Jewish law, as a kinsman, he was expected to marry her. However, he said there was another kinsman who was closer in relationship and that Boaz would see if that man would marry her. He sent Ruth home to Naomi with a significant amount of barley to seal the bargain and fulfill the covenant.

The other kinsman didn't want to marry Ruth, so Boaz took her as his wife and provided a home for both Ruth and Naomi. In the closing of the book, Ruth mentions Tamar, whose story is in Genesis 38. Ruth is the only book of the Bible named after a Gentile, and Ruth, the Moabite widow, and Tamar are both integrated into the messianic heritage of Israel and its powerful king David. Both women become part of the lineage of Jesus the Messiah.
