New sewer rates effective July 1

Purcell residents will see an increase in their sewer rates starting July 1.

The Purcell Public Works Authority on Monday approved a resolution adopting the first rate hike since 2011.

Residential sewer rates will go up 41 percent, from the present \$8.50 to \$12 per month for up to 999 gallons.

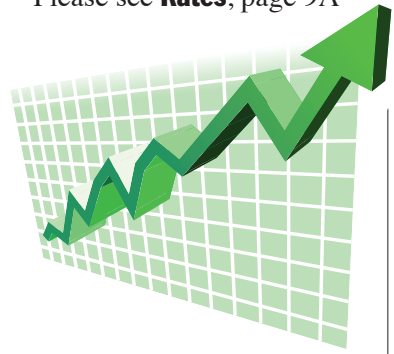
From 1,000 to 5,000 gallons, the rate per 1,000 gallons will be \$1.05. That is a 40 percent increase over the existing 75 cents.

For 5,001 and above, the rate per 1,000 gallons will be \$1.25.

Commercial sewer rates will remain unchanged.

After an extensive investigation by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) seven people including two McClain County jailers, are facing charges in the beating of inmate Brian Brannon.

OSBI Agents David Gatlin and Tony Navarro said the incident took place about 6 p.m. April 21 when several inmates, with assistance from jailers Devin Denton and Kyle Alexander Tecumseh, took Brannon to a different cell and assaulted him.

Couple cashes in with microgreens farming

Steve and Rebecca Dugas do everything small, but in a big way.

And that includes the business they launched earlier this year, Nature's Magic Microgreens.

What, you ask, are microgreens?

Steve Dugas uses seeds from Eckroat Seed in Oklahoma City and Ross Feed and Seed in Chickasha for his microgreens.

Well, simply put microgreens are any edible plant at the stage between sprouts and baby greens in which the earliest leaves turn green.

As to why microgreens, a flyer produced by the couple explains, "Microgreens are up to 40 times more nutritious than mature plants and the nutrients are more bio-available."

Even if the bites are, well, micro, too.

It was Rebecca, a novelist, who first came across the world of microgreens on Facebook.

There a microgreens "farmer" posted his experiences which got her to thinking she and Steve also could grow microgreens, make money with the sale of microgreens and give her more time to write her books.

After watching a video on the process, Steve was on board.

Death investigation continues

OSBI sorting out if shooting was an accident

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) is continuing its investigation into a possible homicide in Byars that occurred Sunday afternoon.

"But they are not ruling out an accidental death," McClain County Sheriff Don Hewett said.

The investigation is into the death of 76-year-old Byars resident Leroy Atkin-

son. He lived at 47077 110th Street in Byars.

"It appears, at this point, that a 60-year-old neighbor was target practicing from his residence and apparently one of the rounds struck Mr. Atkinson resulting in his death," the sheriff continued.

Hewett said it is the policy of the OSBI not to release the name of the person involved unless they are charged with

a crime.

"Our condolences to Mr. Atkinson's family," Hewett continued. "It is a very unfortunate accident."

Hewett said even though there is no state law about discharging a firearm in the county, it is still the person's responsibility to know where

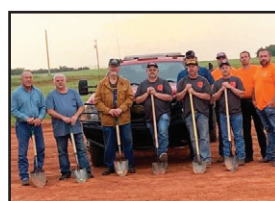

Okie Noodling Tournament, Festival set for June 14-15

The annual Okie Noodling Tournament is celebrating a landmark year with its 20th tournament and festival taking place in Pauls Valley June 14 and 15. For the past 20 years, the popular event has recognized the sport of catching fish using one's bare hands.

The festival was created for the Okie Noodling documentary in 2001 and has been a highlight of the summer ever since. The tournament has spotlighted the unique sport spawning multiple TV shows including Mud Cats on the History Channel.

Over the past 20 years, approximately 2,000 noodlers from across the U.S. have participated in this unique fish-

ing tournament, approximately 1,000 fish have been caught and attendance has grown to an average of 15,000 people per year.

The tournament has had numerous international competitors through the years including groups from France, Japan, China and Germany.

"The Okie Noodling Tournament began as a local event, and it's been incredible to watch it grow into the world's largest hand-fishing tournament," said Jason Selman, City of Pauls Valley tourism director. "Every year, the tournament is an economic boom to Pauls Valley and surrounding areas. It's so popular because it's a unique event that appeals to all types

of people from avid noodlers to casual fans."

In addition to noodling, the festival offers live noodling demos, food, vendors, live music, games, face painting, inflatables, and a kids' catfish eating contest.

The 5th Annual Okie Noodling Eve free concert featuring Casey Donahew with special guest Jason Boland & The Stragglers takes place at 7 p.m. on Friday, June 14, at Wacker Park in Pauls Valley.

On-site registration will be available the day of the run. Race T-shirts are not guaranteed for on-site registration.

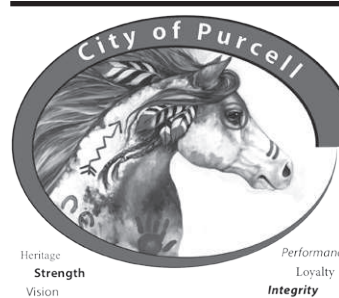

NEWS from the City of Purcell

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicles on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

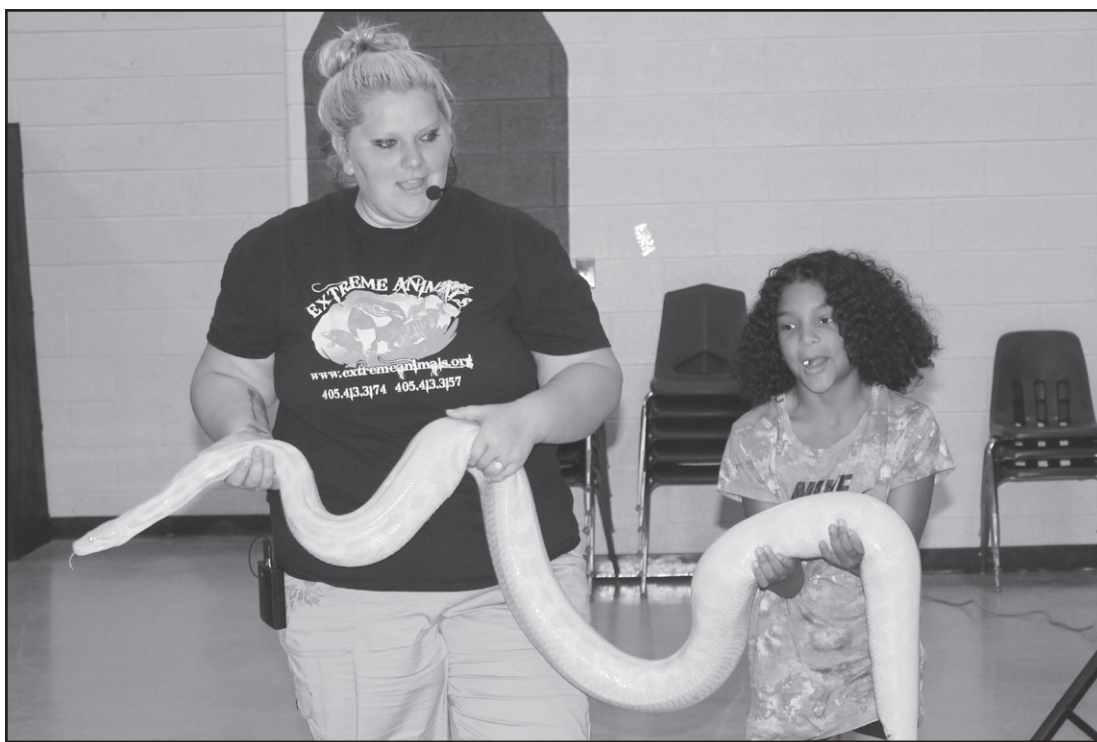

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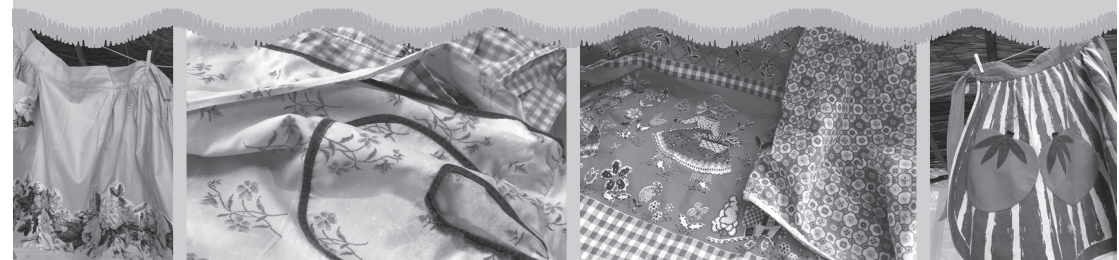

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Remembering D-Day

By the time many of you read this our flag will be proudly waving at our house in memory of D-Day.

June 6, 1944 was the largest seaborne invasion in history.

The combined forces of Britain, America, Canada and France were estimated at 156,000 troops and hit the beaches of Normandy.

Planning for the air and land assault began in 1943.

The amphibious landings were preceded by extensive aerial and naval bombardment.

That was preceded by landing 24,000 British and Canadian airborne troops shortly after midnight.

Despite less than perfect weather conditions, General Dwight D. Eisenhower gave the order to proceed.

The target, a 50-mile stretch of the Normandy coast, was

divided into five sectors: Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword.

Casualties were heaviest at Omaha with its tall cliffs.

The beaches were marred with all kinds of obstacles including mines, barbed wire, and wooden stakes.

There was a movie made about the Normandy landing in 1962 called *The Longest Day*.

The academy award winning

film chronicled some of the most of the important events surrounding D-Day, including the British glider missions to secure the Pegasus Bridge, the counterattacks launched by American paratroopers scattered around Sainte-Mère-Église, the infiltration and sabotage work conducted by the French resistance and SOE agents.

The invasion lasted for the next 24 days and proved to be a turning point in the Allies' victory over Germany.

We owe a huge debt of gratitude to all those who fought that day and the 10,000 Allied casualties that included 4,414 confirmed dead.

According to historical references the Allies didn't achieve any of their goals the first day but persevered, finally linking all five beaches by June 12.

June 6, 1944

D-Day's importance lingers even after 75 years

Here is a history lesson for you.

Seventy-five years ago today, Allied forces under the command of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower succeeded in carrying off the largest amphibious operation in history, laying claim to a 50-mile stretch of French coastline in Normandy.

It was D-Day, June 6, 1944, and it signaled the first glimmer of liberty for countries suffering under Nazi rule in Adolf Hitler's Third Reich.

More than 160,000 Allied troops made the English channel crossing in what Eisenhower called the "Great Crusade" in his invasion order to the Allied Expeditionary Force.

"The eyes of the world are upon you," Eisenhower said. "The hopes and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you."

"In company with our brave Allies and brothers-in-arms on other Fronts you will bring about the destruction of the German war machine, the elimination of Nazi tyranny over oppressed peoples of Europe, and security for ourselves in a free world.

"Your task will not be an

easy one. Your enemy is well trained, well equipped, and battle-hardened. He will fight savagely...

"I have full confidence in your courage, devotion to duty, and skill in battle. We will accept nothing less than full victory."

And victory there was on that day, achieved at a great price.

In addition to 160,000 troops on the beaches, the invasion force employed more than 5,000 ships, 13,000 aircraft and hundreds of airborne troops who parachuted behind the Nazi lines.

The beaches where they

landed – Omaha, Utah, Gold, Juno, Sword – were sanctified by the blood of more than 10,000 Allied soldiers killed or wounded on D-Day.

Four soldiers would receive Congressional Medals of Honor for their actions.

Sixteen million Americans saw military service during World War II. According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, there were 496,777 World War II veterans still living as of Sept. 30, 2018.

The National World War II Museum in New Orleans reports these veterans, now in their upper 80s and 90s, are dying at a rate of 348 per day.

Given that rate, the estimated number of living World War II veterans today is 410,125. In 10 years time, their numbers will be negligible.

If you know any World War II veterans, reach out to them today and every day to thank them for their service and their sacrifice.

We won't have them with us forever or even much longer and they truly were America's greatest generation.

Think about that and thank God for them.

Cole praises House passage of disaster relief funding

Congressman Tom Cole

Congressman Tom Cole released the following statement after the U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation providing \$19.1 billion for disaster relief.

This supplemental funding package includes aid in response to numerous natural disasters across the nation.

"Communities hit by hurricanes, wildfires, tornados and other natural disasters have been waiting too long for relief," said Cole. "I am encouraged that the House acted to provide critical aid for states in desperate need, including

many communities affected in my own state of Oklahoma.

There is still a long road ahead for recovery efforts and rebuilding damaged infrastructure, but passage of this aid package marks a vital step forward.

"However, I am disappointed that funding is missing to deal with the humanitarian and security crisis at our southern border. The federal government is apprehending more than 100,000 illegal aliens at the southern border every month.

"In addition, it is providing support for the unprecedented influx of unaccompanied minors. President Trump has

requested more than \$4 billion to deal with these issues. Unfortunately, House and Senate Democrats have so far refused to appropriate a single dollar to address these pressing challenges.

"While Democrats claim they care about the livelihood of this vulnerable population, they won't approve the funds required to appropriately feed, house, clothe and provide for medical care.

"If we don't act soon, it's not a matter of if but when money will run out, leading to a catastrophic humanitarian disaster," Congressman Cole concluded.

This week we have a horror film starring Octavia Spencer, a new monster movie featuring everyone's favorite giant radioactive reptile, and a musical biopic based on the life of Elton John.

First up is "Ma." A lonely woman named Sue Ann (Octavia Spencer) befriends a group of teenagers after they ask her to buy some booze for them, ultimately leading to her letting them party at her house.

Just when the kids think their luck couldn't get any better, things start happening that make them question the intention of their host.

Well, we've finally come to the end of our completely disconnected, wholly unrelated, trilogy of horror films featuring evil mother figures.

For some reason three different studios decided to hop on the 'creepy mom express' this year, each releasing a movie about a demented maternal figure, all in the timespan of less than three

months.

The first was "Greta" at the beginning of March, a movie about an insane lady who lures unsuspecting young women into her house using abandoned handbags and the promise of a mother-daughter type relationship.

is a horror one.

Sue Ann isn't just trying to befriend a bunch of teenagers so she can lure them to their deaths. She's also using the kids as a way to get back at their parents, who treated her poorly during their high school days.

Much of the movie is dedicated to delving into Sue Ann's character, even showing flashbacks to her as a teenager.

I'd go as far as to say the main character of this film isn't actually any of the kids she lures into her house. It's Sue Ann. And Octavia does great job bringing this deeply troubled woman to life.

I like that the movie doesn't immediately make Sue Ann seem like a complete psycho. It makes the teens trusting her somewhat believable.

Plus, when the older women begins going completely off the deep end, the teenagers actually try to cut ties. Granted, they do get lured back into her clutches eventually, but at least they have some semblance of self preservation in their thick little skulls, unlike some horror protagonists.

For their part, the actors who portray the teenagers aren't half bad here. Sure, their dialogue wasn't always the best, and their delivery was weak at times, but at the very least they weren't too terribly annoying. In fact, I'd say they even came across as likeable at times.

Really, the major thing that'd keep me from recommending this movie to most horror fans, is this movie just doesn't have all that many scares. At least not until the very end where Sue Ann really goes off the rails.

That's not to say I thought the movie was a complete snooze fest.

There are a couple intense moments sprinkled in here and there, and I found the story with Sue Ann compelling enough to keep me interested for most of the runtime. I just doubt it'll be enough for those looking for a scare-a-minute.

Bottomline, if you really like Octavia Spencer as an actress, and the idea of her being a horror villain sounds fun to you, you'll probably have a good time. Those looking for constant scares should look elsewhere.

"Ma" is rated R.



Next up is "Godzilla: King of the Monsters." This film follows the efforts of the crypto-zoological agency Monarch as its members face off against a battery of god-sized monsters, including the mighty Godzilla, who collides with Mothra, Rodan, and his ultimate nemesis, the three-headed King Ghidorah.

When these ancient super-species, thought to be mere myths, rise again, they all vie for supremacy, leaving humanity's very existence hanging in the balance.

Oh boy. Godzilla's back, and this time he brought some friends.

Honestly, I can't say I have any particularly affection for these movies.

The original 1954 one is obvi-

ously a classic, and frankly it's more of an commentary on the use of nuclear weapons than just a straight up monster movie.

I haven't nearly watched all 35 Godzilla movies, but my favorite has to be the Japanese produced 2016 film "Shin Godzilla."

The movie has a really interesting commentary on the bureaucracy of government, especially the failings of it. Plus, despite its campy nature, the destruction scenes in that movie awed me more than any other monster flick I've ever seen.

But I'm not here to talk about that movie unfortunately.

"Godzilla: King of the Monsters" is the third film in Legendary Pictures' so called MonsterVerse.

The series started with the 2014 film "Godzilla" starring Bryan Cranston, a movie that I didn't hate, but I wasn't a particularly big fan of it either. Common complaints were the lack of strong characters and, most of all, not enough on-screen action from the titular character.

Then, a few years later Legendary produced a film about a completely different, yet equally famous, larger than life monster, "Kong: Skull Island."

And out of both of these movies, I enjoyed Kong much more.

It was just more entertaining as a whole. There was a much more action in in it, the human characters weren't especially deep, but they were likeable for the most part, and it had a really cool post Vietnam setting. And I wasn't alone. Most fans and critics enjoyed this movie more out of the two films.

So here we are in 2019. Legendary is gearing up for a big team-up movie next year, bringing Godzilla and Kong together for the first time in over 50 years.

Does this next chapter in the MonsterVerse, "Godzilla: King of the Monsters," excite audiences like "Kong: Skull Island" did? Or does the series regress, dipping even lower in quality than the 2014 film?

Unfortunately, it's definitely the latter.

I straight up hated this movie. As far as I'm concerned there isn't a single redeeming thing about it. It's like the filmmakers learned absolutely nothing from the 2014 movie.

Oh, audiences didn't like the bland, uninteresting characters in the last movie? Well this time we'll make them all aggravating brainless morons.

The characters in this film are some of the dumbest human beings I've had the displeasure to see on the big screen.

Out of the three, dad probably gets off the easiest. But only because he's too boring to care about. His main character trait is speaking in gruff whispers.

The daughter is quite a bit more annoying. She enjoys making really dumb decisions, risking her life every opportunity she gets.

Neither one would ruin the movie on their own. Heck, the dad practically acts like every hero in a monster movie.

But then there's the mom. And let me tell ya, momma Emma is a real piece of work.

She's a paleobiologist who works for Monarch, a group of halfwits who enjoy coddling monsters the size of mountains, capable of destroying cities without a second thought.

Instead of trying to stop these behemoths from rampaging through your favorite city block, they just like to watch them do their thing, all while getting just close enough to be accidentally murdered by one of them.

But luckily for humanity, the large majority of these city killers are sound asleep, quietly being studied by irresponsible scientists.

Of course we can't have that though. Emma, being the reasonable level-headed person she is, decides to start awakening these monsters one at a time.

Why does she decide to release armageddon on the planet you might ask?

Well she thinks she's a super smart activist who believes humans and these so called titans, can exist together in harmony. In releasing all these beasts she thinks she's restoring balance to the Earth and saving the environment.

To the surprise of no one, she's actually a moron.

Her plan immediately goes awry after waking up a monster no one in the film seemed to actually understand called the Ghidorah, a three headed lightning breathing hydra.

This Ghidorah, not grasping the carefully laid out plans of our big brained scientist lady, decides to usurp her and wake up all the monsters at once. Something that our Dr. Russell didn't even consider to be a possibility, despite being an expert in the way these creatures communicate.

Naturally, what follows is rampant destruction on a global scale, threatening the very existence of the human race.

Despite being the single most stupid and irresponsible person on Earth, we as the audience are supposed to feel sorry for her, even though she knowingly pursued worldwide genocide.

After all, she just made an oopsie everyone. She didn't want to kill all 7.5 billion people on the planet, she just wanted to murder half of them. She's practically a saint.

If it wasn't already clear, I hated this character to my very core. Her body count is higher than even the ambitions most Bond villains. The Third Reich wishes they were half as effect at murdering people as she was in this film.

Despite that, the writers of this movie expect us to feel sympathy for Godzilla Hitler because she had a change of heart? That's not tragic, that's just her being a imbecile with zero foresight.

I didn't like a single character in this movie. I haven't even mentioned the dialogue, which is terrible in its own right, featuring some of the dumbest lines I've ever heard in a feature film.

But "Dave," you might say, "I don't care about the people

in a Godzilla movie. I just want to see monsters fight each other and destroy everything in their path."

Well this film disappoints on that front too. Surprisingly the action in this movie is almost as bad as the characters themselves.

During the few fights this film actually features, most of the time you can hardly even tell what's going happening on-screen.

In the filmmakers' infinite wisdom they decided to set most of the action in dark, lightning filled hellscapes, with constant rain to obscure any rare glimpse of excitement you might see.

Not only that, but for the most part the monsters here are filmed in close up, zoomed in from ground level, similar to Michael Bay's "Transformers" series, so you can hardly even tell who's slamming into who.

And the cherry on top? In addition to all the bad weather and ridiculous closeups, the people filming decided to shake the cameras as hard as they could, making it nearly impossible to follow any of the action.

There's just nothing redeemable about this movie. I guess the design of the monsters doesn't look half bad. You can hardly ever see them though because, for whatever reason, it never stops storming when they're on the screen.

I've heard from some Godzilla fans that they've actually enjoyed this movie, though I can't for the life of me fathom why. I get that watching all these iconic monsters in a larger than life Hollywood production is really cool in concept, the the execution here is just plain terrible.

Godzilla deserves better. All the monsters here do. I hope the next film in the series, "Godzilla vs. Kong," learns from this movie's mistakes, and I pray it doesn't regress even further.

As of now though, this franchise is as radioactive as the king of monsters himself.

"Godzilla: King of the Monsters" is rated PG-13.



Last this week is "Rocketman." The film follows the fantastical journey of transformation from shy piano prodigy Reginald Dwight into international superstar Elton John (Taron Egerton).

Set to Elton John's most beloved songs, this movie tells the story of how a small-town boy became one of the most iconic figures in pop culture.

Hot off the wild box office success of "Bohemian Rhapsody," a film which followed Queen's legendary lead singer Freddie Mercury, here we have another music biopic featuring another one the world's most popular musicians.

Despite its popularity with audiences, I was not the biggest fan of "Bohemian Rhapsody." Sure, Rami Malek was fantastic as Freddie, and the music was by Queen, which is incredible to listen to anytime.

But the movie took so many liberties with the story of Fred-

die's life, throwing in outright falsehoods. Not only to create a more dramatic narrative, but also to fit the generic music biopic formula we've all seen a dozen times, regardless of what actually happened.

And in the process the filmmakers of "Bohemian Rhapsody" completely sanitized Freddie himself, making his life more appealing to a wider audience and earning a coveted PG-13 rating.

"Rocketman" takes a different approach.

Instead of presenting the glamorized history of Elton John, this movie shows the life story of the famous musician, warts and all. Not even attempting to make his life PG-13. But at the same time, the film still keeps a fun and fairly lighthearted tone throughout.

How do they do it? Well, in short, they turned Elton's life into a fantasy.

Like many biopics, this film begins with a flashback to Elton's childhood. But instead of just showing a few miserable scenes of him as a kid, the movie opens with a full on musical number, with elaborate dance choreography and everything.

That's right. "Rocketman" is one of the rare R-rated musicals. And boy is it a treat.

There's so many surreal elements in this movie. It almost feels dreamlike at times. Which actually works quite well, because the entire framing of the movie is Elton recounting his life story in front of a group of strangers.

It makes sense that the whole thing would be a daze set to song in his mind.

I'm quite certain many events in this film aren't completely historically accurate, but honestly it doesn't matter.

The movie is trying to capture what it felt like to be Elton during his rise to fame, and the emotions that came with it.

And like I said before, just because this is a musical fantasy, doesn't mean the filmmakers hid the less savory aspects of Elton's life.

While Elton John is a talented musician, back in the 70s and 80s he was also an alcoholic, a drug addict, and a serial fornicator. This movie isn't intent on hiding any of those facts.

In fact, Elton's substance abuse is one of the main focuses

of the narrative. And rightfully so. To censor that would be doing his story a disservice.

Another aspect of Elton's life this film doesn't sanitize is his sexuality. Elton John is an openly gay man, and they don't hide it one bit here. Fair warning, if the idea of watching two men get it on makes you feel uncomfortable, this probably isn't the movie for you.

Moving on to the dialogue, I love that this film frequently uses bad language. After all, the people in this movie are rock-stars and music executives. Of course they wouldn't all speak like saints. It really helped add an edge that movies like "Bohemian Rhapsody" are just missing. Not to mention a fair amount of humor.

Performance wise, this film is fantastic across the board.

I don't know if Taron Egerton will end up winning an Oscar like Rami Malek did for Freddie, but he was great here all the same.

Not only did he nail the emotion and depth of Elton's character, he actually sings too, and quite well I might add. Sure, it's not an exact imitation, but that wasn't the goal here. Again, like with all things in this film, it's more about capturing the spirit of Elton, not creating a carbon copy.

Overall, I think Taron does a pretty bang up job playing the famous rockstar. It really felt like he put his heart in the role.

Everyone else in this movie was quite good too.

I especially loved Jamie Bell as Elton's long time lyricist Bernie Taupin. Him and Elton had a fascinating relationship together, and the two actors portraying them did a great job showcasing their musical chemistry on the big screen.

I really don't know what else to say.

If you love Elton John, and the idea of an R-rated musical doesn't scare you off, I think you'll have great time with this movie.

The songs are wonderful, the performances are excellent, and best of all, it's a unique music biopic which doesn't completely fall into the same tired, overused formula we've seen reused over and over.

All that and more makes this a very easy movie to recommend. "Rocketman" is rated R.

Mexican Casserole

- 1 lb extra lean ground beef
- 1/2 cup onion (chopped)
- 1/4 cup canned jalapeno slices, chopped (I used tamed jalapeno and lots more than 1/4 cup)
- 2 cups fresh tomatoes, chopped or a 15 ounce can diced canned tomatoes
- 15 ounce can kernel corn (drained)
- 15 ounce can black beans (rinsed and drained)
- 1-1/4 ounce package taco seasoning mix
- 8 corn tortillas
- 3/4 cup nonfat sour cream
- 1 cup reduced-fat Mexican cheese blend, shredded
- Heat oven to 350°.

Brown ground beef and chopped onions in large skillet; brown 10 to 12 minutes or until thoroughly cooked, stirring constantly. Drain well; return beef/onions to skillet.

Add corn, black beans, tomatoes, chilies/jalapenos and taco seasoning mix; mix well. Reduce heat; simmer 5 minutes.

Meanwhile spray 12x8-inch (2-quart) baking dish with non-stick cooking spray. Cut each tortilla in half; place 8 halves in bottom of sprayed baking dish, overlapping slightly.

Spoon half of beef mixture evenly over tortillas. Spoon sour cream over beef mixture; spread evenly. Top with remaining 8 tortilla halves and remaining beef mixture. Top with cheese.

(Cover tightly with foil and freeze to save for later. Thaw overnight if frozen. If freezing put the cheese on before cooking.)

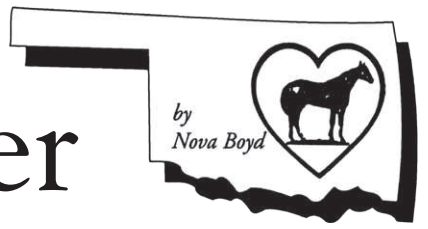

American Horse Councils Unwanted Horse Coalition Renamed United Horse Coalition

Recently the American Horse Council's Unwanted Horse Coalition, which was formed in 2006 to bring attention to the issue and challenges of unwanted horses, has been renamed and rebranded as the United Horse Coalition, with the responsibility of ensuring that horses are treated humanely and with dignity, reducing the number of at-risk horses and working toward eliminating the issue, and raising awareness about the issue of horses at-risk and its impact on the horse industry.

The United Horse Coalition grew out of the Unwanted Horse Summit, which was organized by the American Association of Equine Practitioners and held in conjunction with the American Horse Council's annual meeting in Washington, D.C. in April 2005.

The summit was held to bring key stakeholders together to start a dialogue on the plight of horses at-risk in America. Its purpose was to develop consensus

on the most effective way to work together to address this issue. In June 2006, the UHC was folded into the American Horse Council and now operates under its auspices.

The changes reflect the industry's unity around the importance of aftercare, and the progress and extensive resources that have come to fruition since the UHC's inception. The UHC's new mission statement reads: "Through industry collaboration, the United Horse Council promotes education and options for at-risk and transitioning horses."

The industry has responded with significant resources dedicated to aftercare, and the United Horse Council has moved to a new phase by focusing on serving more as a clearing house for education and options available to help at-risk and transitioning horses. The power of the coalition has long been its ability to promote and encourage industry collaboration, so it's a natural evolution that the UHC now embrace that role more fully, given the programs

offered by organizations such as the Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance, The Right Horse, ASPCA, EQUUS Foundation and Thoroughbred Charities of America, and more locally through state horse councils and others.

The UHC has refocused its services by redesigning its website as a single source to help horse owners learn about resources and options available to place horses in need of new homes. The website also will provide information to potential adopters including how to adopt, best practices when adopting, places horses are available for adoption, and owners responsibility. There is a very good article on the website on "What does it mean to own responsibly."

Treating "bobcat fever" in domestic cats

Cytauxzoonosis (aka bobcat fever) is an acute, often fatal tick-borne disease caused by the hematozoan parasite *Cytauxzoon felis*. Cytauxzoonosis often strikes healthy, young adult cats who have access to or live outdoors.

Cats become infected after being bitten by an infected *Amblyomma americanum* tick (also known as the Lone Star tick because of the single white mark visible on it). Up to 15 days after being bit, the cat will become ill with symptoms of lethargy and decreased appetite.

Infected cats will have a high fever (104-106°F) and may show signs of anemia (pale gums) and jaundice (yellow discoloration to the skin due to a build-up of bilirubin in the blood).

Cytauxzoonosis results in protozoal sepsis, characterized by a profound systemic inflammatory response. The result of this systemic inflammation is

a high body temperature, increased respiratory rate, clotting abnormalities and damage to such organ systems as the liver and kidneys.

The infection is often complicated by the formation of blood clots, which may result in reduced blood flow to vital organs. Without treatment, cytauxzoonosis can kill within a few days of symptoms appearing.

Ordinary antibiotics for common infections are not effective against *Cytauxzoon felis*, a protozoal organism. Standard therapy for cytauxzoonosis is a combination of an antimalarial drug (atovaquone) and antimicrobial medication (azithromycin) in addition to supportive care to provide hydration and electrolyte balance, oxygen supplementation and nutritional support.

A 2013 study found that the combination of atovaquone and azithromycin resulted in a 60 percent survival rate.

Cats included in this study

were from various states across the South and southeastern United States, including Oklahoma.

But OSU clinicians have observed that cats infected here with cytauxzoonosis have a lower survival rate, possibly due to a different strain that may be more severe or resistant to standard therapy. Current research is studying the potential differences between infections in different geographical regions.

Cytauxzoonosis is a seasonal infection, with most cats becoming infected between March and September. Usually there are two waves, with the first starting in March/April and ending in late June and the second wave between August and September.

There may be annual variations in peak months based on rainfall and temperatures, as these variables may impact tick transmission.

Because cytauxzoonosis is a tick-transmitted disease, the best prevention is tick preven-

tion. All cats in Oklahoma (indoor and outdoor) should receive tick prevention year-round, especially from March through September.

Combining multiple tick prevention products (when safe) may be recommended in cats with outdoor exposure, especially in regions near wooded areas or forest, as the combination of bobcats (the natural host and carrier) and ticks are likely in these areas.

Discuss tick prevention options with your veterinarian to ensure the products you are using are safe for your cat.

If you believe your cat is exhibiting signs that could be cytauxzoonosis, have your cat evaluated by a veterinarian immediately, as rapid intervention and treatment may improve the chance of survival.

The Oklahoma State University Veterinary Medical Hospital is open 24 hours a day, and our veterinarians are trained to treat this life-threatening infection.

Steve experimented, growing microgreens on the counter.

By the time they returned to their tiny home south of Ladd Road in March, both were committed to the project.

They set up a small greenhouse next to the tiny house, giving half of the space to growing microgreens and half to Rebecca's flowers and full-size vegetables. Her small outdoor vegetable garden in 2018 was laid low by cabbage looper moths and grasshoppers.

They took their first microgreens to Norman Farmers Market on April 27 and on May 24, they added Harvest from the Heart Farmers Market at Chandler Park.

Now they are growing demand for microgreens.

Steve said it is a delicate balance of time, temperature and moisture to bring microgreens to their peak on any given market day.

The entire process depends on the type of seed. Some like sunflower and radish require four to eight hours soaking before they are spread on very thin hemp fiber netting to germinate.

Steve sanitizes all the seeds with a solution of white vinegar and hydrogen peroxide.

Plants are grown without pesticides or fertilizer. The clamshell containers in which they are placed for customers are made from a corn-based bio-plastic that is compostable.

But they encourage conservation by offering a discount on future purchases to customers who bring their cleaned clamshells with them to market.

The seed matting is placed in plant trays and covered with seeds by hand. The trays remain in the tiny house until the seeds germinate. Then they are moved to the greenhouse.

Steve said there's nothing special about the seed varieties used. He purchases most seeds from Eckroat in Oklahoma City.

Illegal tobacco sales to minors threaten children's health

Oklahoma tobacco retailers are increasingly not complying with state law regarding underage tobacco sales.

Last year, Oklahoma tobacco retailers posted an overall non-compliance rate of about 18 percent.

That's troubling for local prevention professionals who say that the rising underage tobacco sales rate means that some retailers are placing profit ahead of young lives.

It also risks federal funding that supports vital Oklahoma health initiatives.

States are required to have a compliance rate of at least 80 percent (or a non-compliance rate of no more than 20 percent) regarding the sale of tobacco products to minors, and must demonstrate compliance in

order to receive their full Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) award.

Shreder reminds local retailers that it is important to be aware of the law and ensure that all staff are trained to prevent underage tobacco sales.

Community-based education is available to business owners and clerks regarding youth access to tobacco. This service is free. Retailers may contact Shreder at the University of Oklahoma Southwest Prevention Center at (405) 325-4282 for more information.

who are no longer with us. As veterans, some of us remember the men and women who paid the ultimate sacrifice so that others could live. Our prayers are with the families of those men and women who have gone before us.

Each week we recognize the veterans who served in either World War II or the Korean War. We introduce them to our volunteers and the hundreds of veterans who visit us each Tuesday and Thursday morning. We would like to honor World War II veteran Albert Gallaher of Blanchard as our Veteran of the Week. Mr. Gallaher served honorably as a member of the United States Army. A military cap signifying his military service in World War II was presented to him.

Last week the rainy weather did not prevent over 290 veterans and surviving spouses from visiting our veterans foundation for assistance with their VA claims and questions. For many years we thought that at some point in time we would see a decrease in the number of veterans who visited us each week. As many of you know, just the opposite has happened as we continue to see an increased number of veterans each year.

When we first started helping other veterans, most of us did not understand what was required by the VA for their claim to be approved. Today the first thing we do is file an (Intent to File) VA Form 21-0966. This establishes a start date for either a new claim or for a re-evaluation of an existing service-connected disability.

We then ask the veteran to request that their medical provider fill out a VA (DBQ) Disability Benefits Questionnaire. These completed forms are then used as evidence to support the veteran's application for benefits Form 21-526 EZ. When a veteran claim for increase or service-connection of a new disability is filed using DBQ evidence, their chance or an increased rating or approval of a new disability will be improved significantly over those that file without evidence.

Maybe one of the reasons we are so successful helping veterans to receive VA benefits is our system of filing evidence-based claims using the VA DBQ Forms. Since the VA uses similar forms to evaluate the veteran's disabilities,

we should do the same.

Last week our volunteers assisted 140 veterans and surviving spouses on Tuesday and 150 on Thursday. Needless to say, by the time we finished, most of us were exhausted. Some of us arrive at four a.m. to start preparing everything that is required to serve the men and women who served in the military. We stay until the last person has been assisted, which means our days are from 11 to 12 hours each Tuesday and Thursday.

For those of you who would like to help us to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families, volunteer applications are available.

If you would like to be a donor to our organization, please contact Lora Malone, our Executive Director at our location or by calling 405-550-8806. There are always veterans and their families who will need a hand up at some point in their lives.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all of the VA correspondence that those who we represent. On a weekly average, this is over 700 separate pieces of mail received, each of which we review and send letters to those who need to return for a follow-up visit. Twenty-five veterans were approved at 100 percent and will receive a combined annual \$1,016,368.68. Sixty-one veterans were approved for service-connected benefits rated 10-90 percent and will receive a combined annual amount of \$1,078,456.44.

Our organization is a 501(C)(3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles, or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.

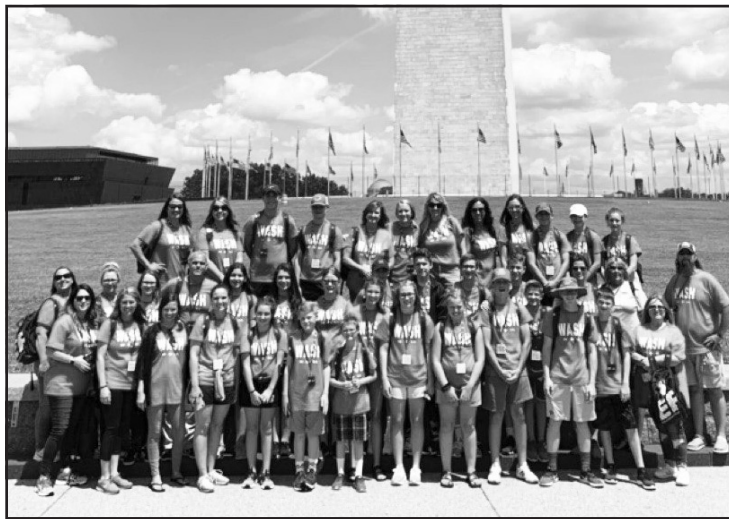

The Day After

What is the connection between America's ridiculously high divorce rate and the phenomenon known as "bridezillas"? There's an incredible focus on having "the perfect wedding," and anybody who's seen "Bridezillas," "Four Weddings," "Say Yes to the Dress" or "Judge Judy" knows that a wedding will never go 100 percent perfect.

But afterward, even if the photographer didn't get every single shot, if the caterer didn't quite make enough chicken piccata for all the guests, or if your new brother-in-law told a joke that was completely inappropriate, you're still just as married as if everything had gone flawless.

But while people dream about walking down the aisle in the perfect dress, people don't often

dream about picking up another person's socks for 20 years. When the reality of married life hits them, it's often such a shock that it can damage the marriage for a long time after. There was a lot of preparation for the wedding, but not for the day after.

Preachers often debate what the Bible says about salvation - and that's not a bad thing, considering how much is taught in the religious world that is in conflict with the Bible. But along with that, there needs to be a little more emphasis on the day after salvation.

Every church I have ever heard about has more people on the church records than in attendance on any given service. Why is this? My best guess is that they figure that they're done - but they aren't "done," any more than a bride

and groom are "done" once they've said, "I do."

The Bible speaks of salvation as being "born again" (John 3:3), and while birth is the end of one situation, we usually think of it as the beginning of life. We need to remember the day after salvation, to the quite-often less glamorous activities that go along with the Christian walk.

This could be what Jesus meant when He warned the church in Ephesus that they had left their first love (Revelation 2:4), when the celebrations of baptisms were in the rear-view mirror, and they were looking at washing feet again (John 13:14; 1 Tim 5:10).

We need to start thinking of both marriage and Christianity as life-long commitments, not single events. Twenty years down the road, a \$500 cake seems a lot less important.

When the 12 spies in Moses' day go over to spy out the land of Canaan and come back with a glowing report, you would think that such an occasion

would end in an immediate God-driven assault on their enemies, resulting in a resounding victory and a return home to the Promised Land. You would think.

But we know things don't always go the way we think they should. This Israelite generation looks at the giants over in Canaan, then looks at how puny they are in comparison, and says, "Why, we're nothing but grasshoppers," and the whole generation tucks its tail

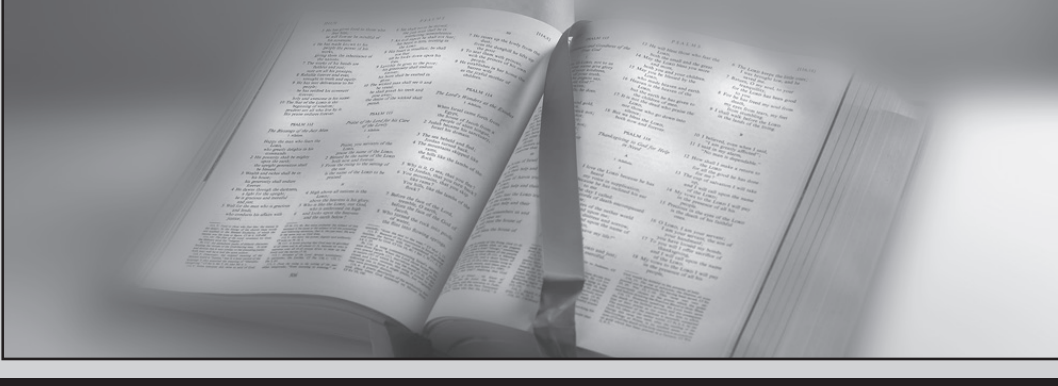

The task given her by Christ, who called her the Beloved Disciple of the Sacred Heart, was to teach and encourage devotion to His Sacred Heart. It was based on this Christly inspiration that St. Margaret Mary was moved to establish the Holy Hour and Sacred Heart Devotion in the modern form.

Prior to this time, there was a devotion to the love of Jesus and to the wounded Heart of Christ, but not established as the devotion is today. The practice encouraged by the saintly woman, at the guidance of Christ, included the Holy Hour on Thursdays, to share in the mortal sadness He endured when abandoned by His Apostles in His Agony, and to receive Holy Communion on the first Friday of every month. Additionally, He appointed

through St. Margaret Mary for the Friday after the octave of the feast of Corpus Christi to be the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart.

It is he who is determined

who wins the prize, and there are no men in the Bible more determined. After nearly half a century, they eventually will cross over the Jordan River into Canaan.

So, today, determine to take on all the challenges of the summer of 2019 with Caleb's vibrant spirit burning deep in your heart. And when someone comes along, and they will, and says, "Nah, we can't do that. It just won't work."

You will be well-prepared to say, "Oh, no sir, that's where you're wrong. You forget I've got the Lord fighting right along beside me."
