Councilman Tate says it was never his intent to tear all houses down

City Councilman Jay Tate has clarified some of what was reported in the May 9 issue of **The Purcell Register**.

Tate sat down at **The Register** and made this statement.

“I never said I wanted them all gone,” Tate said.

“It was just a list for code (enforcement) to look at to see if they had been in contact with owners.

“Council person Engert mentioned (at the council meeting) that these are poor people so I suggested civic organizations and others around town trying to help,” Tate continued.





# Swayze helping with OSU program

## Operation Orange taking medical school around state

Purcell’s Cole Swayze is assisting with a key Oklahoma State University program this summer.

OSU’s Center for Health Sciences is headed to five cities across the state in June for Operation Orange.

That is OSU’s mobile medical school summer camps for high school students.

Assisting with Operation Orange is Swayze, who is an OSU Medical student and Purcell native.

Operation Orange will kick off at Cameron University in Lawton on June 4 and continue

on to Southeastern Oklahoma State University in Durant on June 5, East Central University in Ada on June 10, Sequoyah High School in Tahlequah June 11, Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Enid and Oklahoma State University in Stillwater June 14.

“Operation Orange is a fun opportunity for high school students from across Oklahoma to meet us close to home and learn more about our medical school,” said Kayse Shrum, D.O., president of OSU-CHS and dean of the College of Osteopathic Medicine.

“Our hope is that by showing students what it’s like to be a student doctor, we will spark an interest in medicine so that these students will want

to become physicians here in Oklahoma.”

Operation Orange participants experience a day in the life of a medical student by engaging in a variety of hands-on activities such as testing suturing skills, practicing simulated intubation of a patient and studying the anatomy of the human heart, lungs and brain.

Participants also have the opportunity to meet with current OSU medical students and learn about how to prepare for medical school.

Police said the victim’s mother said the vehicle was locked but there were no signs of forced entry. A flashlight that did not belong to the son was left in the vehicle. That flashlight was confiscated by police.

The investigation is ongoing.

# Navy Week in OKC

## Bands, Blue Angels and more May 27-June 2

Oklahoma’s “Big Friendly” readies for Oklahoma City Navy Week, May 27 through June 2, in conjunction with the Star Spangled Salute Air Show.

Historically, Navy Week events draw thousands of attendees to participate and create a dialogue between sailors and local residents.

The events are designed to raise awareness about the Navy in areas that do not have a large naval presence.

“Oklahoma City has historically been a great area for the Navy Week program,” said Lt. John Stevens, lead planner for the Oklahoma City Navy Week.

“This marks the sixth Oklahoma City Navy Week. It’s unique this year because it’s the first time we’ll be here for the Star Spangled Salute,” Stevens continued.

“In the past, we’ve participated in the Oklahoma State Fair and Navy Days in the fall.”

During Oklahoma City Navy Week, Assistant Secretary of the Navy Greg Slavonic and Rear Adm. Jeff Trussler, director of future plans at the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, will serve as senior

representatives.

They will meet with corporate, civic, education and government leaders throughout the week in an effort to increase awareness of the Navy, its mission and the importance of the Navy to the people of Oklahoma City.

Citizens of the area will have a chance to interact with sailors during the week at various public events and even hear from some of their own native Oklahomans.

Both Slavonic and Trussler have ties to the area and Navy Week provides the unique opportunity to bring them back, further strengthening the connection between the Navy and Oklahoma City.

“It’s always an honor to go back to your home state, especially when it’s Oklahoma City,” said Slavonic, the principal Navy Week host.

“It’s a city that has such a Navy heritage to it -- a cruiser named in its honor, a submarine named in its honor -- and a state that’s got a battleship named after it,” Slavonic continued.

“Oklahoma has a long history of supporting the Navy. We’ve had many famous individuals from Oklahoma, like Adm. Jocko Clark, and several civic leaders who have distinguished themselves in the

military,” Slavonic said.

Some of the major highlights during the week include the Navy’s Blue Angels at the Star Spangled Salute Air Show at Tinker Air Force Base, a virtual reality experience provided by Navy Recruiting District Dallas and Wreath Laying Ceremony at the Oklahoma City Bombing Memorial.

Several concerts are also scheduled to be performed around the city by Navy Band Southwest’s “32nd Street Brass Band,” full wind ensemble, as well as the woodwind and brass quintets.

During Navy Week sailors from the fast-attack submarine, USS Oklahoma City (SSN 723), USS Constitution, Navy Recruiting District Dallas and Strategic Communications Wing ONE will be participating in community relations projects with multiple YMCAs, Central Oklahoma Habitat for Humanity and reading to children during “story times” at multiple local libraries.

Oklahoma City Navy Week is one of only 14 Navy Weeks in 2019 that focus a variety of equipment and personnel in a single city for a week-long series of engagements designed to bring America’s Navy closer to the people it protects.

## Grand Army of the Republic

Grave marker sets ancestor’s service record straight

Decorating family graves for Memorial Day can teach a person some genealogy along with a bit of history.

Since Dad was career Army, we were never around to decorate graves in Oklahoma on either side of the family.

Each Memorial Day, the folks sent family members money for flowers to be placed on the graves of departed kinfolk.

That is until 1966 when Dad retired from active duty and he and Mom moved back to Oklahoma.

At long last, they could do the grave decorating themselves.

For me, 1967 was my first participation in the ritual of visiting cemeteries to put flowers on the graves of my ancestors.

And that is where the genealogy and history lesson came in.

I went with Mom, an aunt and my grandmother to the Washington cemetery.

There I was told was the final resting place of my great-grandfather, Thomas Overley, who nobly served the Confederacy with distinction during

the Civil War.

Or as some die-hard Southerners prefer, the War of Northern Aggression.

We stopped by the graves of a couple of great aunts first, pulling weeds and trimming any errant branches before carefully placing flowers by each headstone.

Finally we moved to great-grandfather’s grave and I couldn’t help but bust out laughing.

Indeed, he was a Civil War veteran – resting eternally

under a Grand Army of the Republic marker!

Laughter isn’t your typical decorum, especially while honoring veterans on Memorial Day.

But I had to regain my composure before I could explain the cause for my chuckles.

I looked at Grandma and Aunt Willie and told them, “Well, you were right. Great-granddad Overley was a Civil War veteran. He fought with the UNION army, though.”

And really that shouldn’t have come as a surprise to them. He was born and raised in Indiana and if only by virtue of geography, he was destined to be a Yankee.

Thereafter, my aunt tried telling us that though he was in the Union army, he was a spy for the Confederacy and was so good at that undercover mission that the Yankees never cottoned to what he was up to.

Thus, the GAR headstone.

That tale became a family joke and no one ever took it seriously.

I certainly never did.

## Agency budgets closely analyzed

Senate appropriations subcommittees have been going over agency budgets line by line since last summer. Even though the state has more revenue available because of our strong economy, we have still wanted to be as fiscally efficient as possible with every dollar.

Our state just recently recovered from nearly a decade of budget shortfalls that caused most of our agencies to be cut significantly.

After some compromise, we’ve agreed to an \$8.3 billion budget that includes \$200 million in savings. This is the highest budget in state history, and with a continually strengthening economy, this is just the beginning.

I’m looking forward to next session to continue restoring agency funding and providing a financial boost to important state programs.

Among the highlights of this budget are pay raises for our hard working teachers and other certified personnel (\$1,220), state employees (up

to \$1,500), college and career tech faculty, correctional officers (\$2/hour, avg. \$4,000), and court reporters for district courts, Workers’ Comp Court of Existing Claims and the Corporation Commission (boosts their base salary to \$42,410).

Together, more than 73,000 dedicated Oklahoma public servants will be getting a much-needed raise for all they do for our state on a daily basis.

The overall education budget, which includes common and higher education as well as career techs, will see another significant bump in revenue of more than \$200 million.

Common education, which receives more than one-third of the state budget, will get nearly \$158 million of that additional revenue. It’ll be used for the raises, to fully fund the 3rd Grade Reading Sufficiency Act and more than \$74 million for local school districts to address their individual critical needs. These could include possibly hiring new teachers, counselors or other staff.

Ensuring public safety is a critical need in the state. This budget will cover the cost of two new OHP trooper academies, which will get around 80 more troopers on the roads next year.

This session, we passed three major bills to address the high number of sexual assaults in our state and help survivors get justice. Oklahoma has more than 7,000 untested sexual assault kits and the budget provides \$1 million to get those kits processed and prevent a future backlog.

These kits are vital to stopping and preventing future sexual assaults as these predators typically commit multiple crimes.

Another important aspect of the budget is helping to lower our prison population, reduce recidivism and get non-violent offenders back into the workforce. I’ll be discussing all of the policy changes we made



Finally, after three weeks in a row, a challenger has emerged to dethrone “Avengers: Endgame” at the top of the weekend box office.

The Keanu Reeves lead action flick, “John Wick: Chapter 3 - Parabellum,” surprised many over the weekend by nearly doubling the domestic opening of the last film in the series to the tune of a cool \$56.8 million.

highest grossing film both worldwide (\$2.616 billion) and in the U.S. and Canada (\$771.3 million).

Sadly it seems “Endgame” doesn’t have enough steam left to beat the incredible domestic record set by “Star Wars: The Force Awakens” back in 2015 to the tune of \$936.6 million.

At this point it’s still uncertain if “Endgame” will be able to surpass “Avatar” at the global box office. Currently it’s looking less likely that the film has the required \$171 million plus left in the tank to

In the meantime though, there’s always still new movies to talk about.

There’s the previously mentioned third installment of the “John Wick” franchise, a sequel to a movie about a dog who reincarnates after death, and a tale of two star crossed lovers brought together by fate.

Let’s get to the reviews. \*\*\*



Wick (Keanu Reeves) returns with a \$14 million price tag on his head and an army of bounty-hunting killers on his trail.

After killing a member of the shadowy international assassin’s guild, the High Table, John Wick is excommunicado, with the world’s most ruthless hit men and women following his every turn.

If you’re a fan of action movies and you haven’t, for whatever reason, watched any “John Wick” movies, you’ve certainly been missing out.

This series is home to some of the best, no nonsense fight scenes you’ll see anywhere.

And this latest film is no exception.

There are so many lazy action films which rely on camera tricks and quick editing to make poorly conceived fights seem more intense. I’m looking at you “Jason Bourne.”

Not this movie though. While the camera work here isn’t flashy, it perfectly frames the action letting you see every punch, every shot, every gut wrenching stab, never cutting away to hide any of the bloody details.

The fight choreography in this movie is absolutely incredible.

The director of the “John Wick” films, Chad Stahelski, has been a stunt coordinator in the industry for decades, including having the role of Keanu Reeves’s stunt double in “The Matrix,” and it definitely shows here.

Even after three movies, the filmmakers here manage to keep the combat fresh, adding new unique scenarios that keep the action sequences fun throughout. At least for the most part.

The movie really started out strong, with some incredibly visceral fight scenes against a variety of foes, all of them using the locations of the action to their full potential.

Unfortunately those scenes ended up being a sharp contrast to the end of the film.

In the final scenes, instead of fighting his fellow assassins, each of which had a unique look and fighting style, John is pitted against wave after wave of faceless men covered head

to toe in armor. Each and every one of them looking exactly the same.

The fights were still good, don’t get me wrong. Better than most movies in fact. It just felt like a huge step down to the raw and more personal scenes at the beginning.

Also at the end for a reason I still don’t understand, John’s foes oddly begin pulling their punches. Moments where his enemies ignore clear openings to swiftly end the fight, or even outright pausing the battle, giving John a chance to recover.

It was very odd. Worse of all it robs those moments of tension. Is John really in danger if the people he’s fighting against give him a chance to catch his breath when he needs it? He certainly doesn’t afford anyone else the same luxury.

Also, while the action scenes contained in the “John Wick” series is second to none, the actual overarching story leaves a bit to be desired.

Sure, it started out fine in the first movie.

A retired assassin, devastated by the death of his wife, gets back into the business of killing after a group of thugs steal his car and rob him of the last gift he ever received from his wife by brutally killing his dog.

It’s not complicated. It’s simple, straightforward, and even relatable. Afterall, who hasn’t felt grief at the loss of a pet? Most of us just aren’t trained killers with a clear enemy to seek vengeance against.

There’s also hints of a secret society of assassins, with strict rules and traditions. All that’s in the background though. Just a general framework to allow for some fantastic action.

This gets expanded on in the second film. They fill in more details, including explaining the leadership of the society called the High Table, and adding in the concept of blood debts.

Honestly though, I liked the setting a lot more when the details were vague.

Now there’s so much nonsense and ritual it’s ridiculous.

Rather than the story being a simple backdrop to the impressive fight scenes, now it’s constantly trying to take center stage.

Plus, the narrative here is simply too complicated for the film’s own good. Instead of being compelling, it’s convoluted. The rules of this world seem to only exist to be immediately broken.


All of it just makes me long for the uncomplicated story of the first film. Simpler times where a guy just decides to brutally murder dozens of people because they killed his dog.

Regardless of my complaints though, this is still a must see for action junkies.

Despite the haphazard narrative, the fight scenes here stand head and shoulders above nearly every film in the same genre.

That alone makes this movie well worth seeking out.

Next is “A Dog’s Journey.” After the events of “A Dog’s Purpose,” Bailey the dog (Josh Gad) is living the good life on the Michigan farm of his “boy,” Ethan (Dennis Quaid) and Ethan’s wife Hannah (Marg Helgenberger). He even has a new playmate: Ethan and Hannah’s baby granddaughter, CJ.

The problem is CJ’s mom, Gloria (Betty Gilpin), decides to take CJ away. As Bailey’s soul prepares to leave this life for a new one, he makes a promise to Ethan to find CJ and protect her at any cost. Thus begins Bailey’s adventure through multiple lives filled with love, friendship, and devotion as he, CJ (Kathryn Prescott), and CJ’s best friend Trent (Henry Lau) experience joy and heartbreak, music and laughter, and few really good belly rubs.

Here we go. We finally have the much anticipated third entry in the “A Dog’s” cinematic universe.

Not really though. “A Dog’s Way Home,” released earlier this year, is completely unrelated to this film beyond the stories sharing the same author for their respective novels, W. Bruce Cameron.

But despite sharing a writer, “A Dog’s Way Home” was produced by a different studio than the other two films, so the dream of having a spralling “A Dog’s” universe leading up to an “Avengers” like team up movie seems dead in the water.

Instead we just have a sequel to “A Dog’s Purpose,” a movie about a dog who dies and reincarnates as multiple canines with completely different owners, eventually returning to his childhood master after several years.

Though I never actually reviewed “A Dog’s Purpose,” I think I made my feelings for the film pretty clear when I talked about “A Dog’s Way Home” way back in January.

Simply put, these movies just aren’t for me.

I hate the writing for all three of these films. It feels like the screenwriters are treating everyone watching like they’re a bunch of morons.

There is zero subtlety with the characters here. Either your a lovable main character like Ethan, Hannah, or CJ, or you’re the single most despicable person to walk the face of the Earth and you enjoy telling everyone about it.

It’s not only the film’s lack of finesse that bugs me though. It’s the fact that these antagonists are portrayed as “bad” in the most stereotypical ways conceivable.

CJ’s mom? Well she’s an easily offended single mom who enjoys wine and dates a man who owns a motorcycle,

so she’s a lost cause.

CJ’s first boyfriend? No luck for him either. He has a bit of face scruff so he’s clearly going to end up treating her poorly.

How about Trent’s fiancée? Honestly I don’t think they could have telegraphed her selfishness anymore if they tried.

There’s no depth to anyone. Whatever surface first impression you’re given is always correct. I guess you can judge a book by its cover if you believe this movie.

Plus it’s like every single one of these “evil” characters are constantly thinking “what’s the absolutely worst thing I can say in this moment that’ll make me come across as a biggest jerk?”

It’s the same kind of writing you see in shows for preschoolers. Everything’s black and white in this film, and there simply isn’t room for anything else.

On top of all that, the performances here range from semi-tolerable to downright terrible.

The actress who plays CJ as a child (Abby Ryder Fortson) is especially bad here.

I don’t necessarily blame her though. She’s a perfectly fine performer in other movies. She’s best known for her role as Cassie Lang in the “Ant-Man” movies.

Somehow though, despite having a completely different directors, both “A Dog’s Purpose” and this film had a huge issue getting decent performances out of child actors.

It’s like both the writers and directors had never heard a child speak. Not only did the dialogue never resemble the way a kid would talk, but also every child’s performance ended up being incredibly wooden and forced.

I don’t know how they managed to get acting this consistently awful in both movies, but bravo nonetheless.

The adults are a bit better off performance wise, but they’re still hampered by weak writing.

I’ll admit Josh Gad playing the reincarnating pooch is perfectly fine as a voice actor, but the dialogue he was given made me want to rip my ears clean off.

There’s only so many times I can watch an aloof, yet oddly perceptive animal, talk about food, marking their territory, and giving simplified yet poignant commentary about human relationships. It’s just obnoxious and frankly I’m sick of it.

Bottom line though, if you enjoyed “A Dog’s Purpose,” there’s no reason you wouldn’t like “A Dog’s Journey” too.

Personally, I can’t stand either one, and I wish none of W. Bruce Cameron’s popular dog novels were never adapted into film.

But if you like talking dog movies, and you don’t mind less than stellar acting, you’ll probably love this film despite my unrelenting hatred for it.

But with just hours left on the clock in what looks to be her last day in the U.S., Natasha is fighting against her family’s deportation as fiercely as she’s fighting her budding feelings for Daniel, who is working just as hard to convince her they are destined to be together.

As someone who watches nearly every movie whether I want to or not, teen romances are generally some of the films I dread watching more than everything else.

It’s nothing against romantic movies. I’ve enjoyed my fair share of rom-coms and straight up romances over the years, including many which star teenage characters. It’s just that, for whatever reason, the genre seems full of more duds than most.

With that in mind, it shouldn’t be a huge surprise that I had fairly low expectations going into this movie.

Surprisingly though, I ended up not hating this film nearly as much as I feared I might. In fact I’d say I downright enjoyed this movie. At least for the most part.

Sure, the story relies way too much on coincidence, and the character of Natasha can come across as insufferably practical at times, but what this movie lacks in writing, it more than makes up with the actors themselves.

Charles Melton and Yara Shahidi are absolutely fantastic here.

Both are insanely likeable and the two of them have this remarkable chemistry together. One I rarely see in

other teen romances.

I know this might sound silly, but the thing that thrilled me the most in this movie was the male romantic lead here wasn’t some moody, unbearable dingbat who treats every woman he meets like garbage.

What an incredible concept for a romance movie. A guy who’s actually charming and friendly from the get go.

this session to accomplish this but funding is also a major component of reforming the system.

We’re going to be investing more than \$33 million into pay-for-success and other proven diversion programs as well as additional mental health services for both those who are in prison or on parole.

We’ll also be investing more into our District Attorney offices to lessen the use of fees and fines that cause significant financial hardships for those trying to start their lives over

and is one of the causes of recidivism.

When a former offender is inundated with fees and fines, they think they can make more money returning to their life of crime than working a minimum wage job. We have to be smarter on crime and do what we can to help these individuals reintegrate into society after they’ve served their time in prison.

The budget provides \$105 million to boost provider rates for physicians, hospitals and nursing homes. It creates the

Rate Preservation Fund for the OHCA to be used for maintaining reimbursement rates to providers when the state’s Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP) decreases.

Funds will also be provided to decrease the Developmental Disability Services wait list and increase their provider rates as well. Nearly \$63 million will be invested in the Graduate Medical Education Program to support physician training for rural hospitals. As a healthcare provider myself, this is an area

very important to me.

This budget invests around half a billion of new spending into vital state services like education, health care, public safety and many others. I’ll discuss more of the details in coming weeks.

## Artist crafts special weapons for festival

Ancient weapons expert Eric Smith’s meticulous descriptions of his tribe’s heritage, culture and traditions are a time machine taking people back to the 14th century.

A love of the Chickasaw people is dispensed with a flowing narrative concerning

clothing, weapons, footwear, gorgets, quivers, bows, arrows and buckskin lavishly adorned with feathers and accoutrements, both utilitarian and fashionable.

Smith is bringing something quite special – and extremely rare – to the Artesian Arts Festival May 25.

A full archery set, crafted solely with tools available to Chickasaws 500 years ago, will be among many items Smith will display.

“I’ve made a beautiful southeastern woodlands style bow, with genuine animal tendon and sinew string. I have crafted river cane arrows with all flint points. The bow has been treated in the ancient method by applying bear grease,” Smith said.

A brain-tanned buckskin quiver is included. Smith said the technique of brain tanning hides is centuries old and preserves the item almost

indefinitely.

“Turkey feathers are attached to the quiver using homemade glue from animals, just as my ancestors would have used.

“It is my wish people will appreciate the set. It illustrates what Chickasaws would have made prior to ever coming in contact with a European. It is something that is beautiful and functional. The set is powerful enough to harvest any animal in North America, yet made with all natural materials,” he said.

Smith’s expertise, attention to detail and dedication to replicating historically accurate ancient weapons has had Hollywood moviemakers knocking at his door for decades.

He made all the bows and arrows used in the thrice Oscar-award winning movie “The Revenant,” a 2015 film starring Leonardo DiCaprio, voted Best Actor for his part as mountain man Hugh Glass. Glass allegedly was horribly mauled by a bear in 1823 but miraculously survived the attack.

In fact, Smith said he just finished making weapons for another film but, as usual, the Chickasaw expert had little to say about his efforts due to confidentiality agreements with clients.

All his expertise, trial and errors, immense knowledge and laborious investigation are included in a book he wrote late last year that has become a “must have” for bowyers and historians.

“The Warrior’s Tools: Plains Indian Bows, Arrows and Quivers” was released in hardback December 2018. Smith said he will have the book – which recently was released in paperback – at the festival.

He’ll be honored to autograph

### Slow Cooker

#### Creamy Italian Chicken

4 medium boneless skinless chicken breasts

Mrs. Dash’s Original seasoning blend

Black pepper

2 10 ounces cans cream of chicken soup

1 envelope Good Season’s Zesty Italian dressing mix

8 ounces low fat cream cheese, cubed

¼ to ½ cup milk, as needed

Cooked noodles, rice, mashed potatoes to serve chicken over

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# Some playing a losing game

May’s distribution of sales tax collections from March 16 through April 15 may have been a gain statewide, but several area towns saw revenue drops.

The Oklahoma Tax Commission returned \$160,347,064 to municipalities, an increase of \$3,259,524 from a year ago.

Cities and towns shared a use tax disbursement of \$21,055,780.

Counties got \$27,889,173 from sales taxes and \$4,117,133 from use taxes.

## Flood insurance: Why you need coverage

Spring has already made its presence known this year in Oklahoma with strong storms and above normal amounts of rain. To get ready for more rain, it may be a good time to consider flood insurance.

According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), floods – including flash floods and flooding from seasonal rains – occur in every region of the United States. In fact, 90 percent of all natural disasters in this country involve some type of flooding.

Oklahoma is no exception. Last month was the 22nd wettest April since records began in 1895, according to the Oklahoma Climatological Survey. Flooding was widespread across the southeastern part of the state, and flash flooding was reported in at least three counties on April 30th alone.

The bottom line: Where it can rain, it can flood.

What is flood insurance?

One of the reasons it’s important to consider flood coverage is because most standard homeowners and renter’s insurance policies don’t cover flood-related losses. Flood insurance is a separate coverage you can purchase through an agent or insurer participating in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which FEMA manages.

Federal flood insurance is available where the local government has adopted

adequate flood plain management regulations under the NFIP, and many communities participate in the program. If your community doesn’t participate in the NFIP, contact your licensed insurance agent to ask about private flood insurance. If your agent or insurer doesn’t sell flood coverage, contact the NFIP Referral Call Center at 800-427-4661.

Flood insurance typically covers the building itself. Things that are permanently fastened to the home like light fixtures, carpet or flooring and cabinets are considered part of the building. For an additional premium, you can buy coverage for your contents. The NFIP provides coverage of up to \$250,000 for the structure of a home and up to \$100,000 for personal possessions.

Also, flood insurance doesn’t go into effect immediately after you buy it. These policies have a 30-day waiting period unless a policy is bought at the same time as a newly purchased home. So, now is the time to consider adding flood coverage, not when there is a large storm on the horizon.

Why do I need flood insurance?

A 2018 Insurance Information Institute poll found that only 15 percent of U.S. homeowners have flood insurance. This may be because of a common myth: you have to live in a flood zone to purchase this type of coverage. But that is not true. Anyone can buy flood

insurance.

The FEMA flood map service allows you to determine your flood risk. Risk levels are divided into three categories:

High-risk areas have at least a 1 percent chance of flooding each year. Homeowners in these areas with mortgages are required to buy flood insurance.

Moderate- to low-risk areas have less than a 1 percent chance of flooding each year, but there is still a possibility the area could flood. Flood coverage isn’t required in these areas, but it is recommended. Some mortgage lenders still require you to have flood insurance in non-high-risk areas.

Undetermined risk areas are areas where flood-hazard analysis has yet to be conducted, but risk still exists.

It is important to note that approximately 20 percent of flood insurance claims come from outside of high-risk flood zones. Remember, anywhere rain can fall, there is a potential for floods.

Finally, consider this: the damage a flood can cause can be devastating financially. According to FEMA, an inch of water in a home could cause more than \$25,000 in damages. Without flood coverage, recovery could be more costly than you can afford.

## Chickasaw Nation Lt. Governor to step down

Chickasaw Nation Lt. Governor Jefferson Keel has announced that he plans to step down, effective at the end of his current term, September 30.

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby said Lt. Governor Keel has served the Chickasaw Nation and the Chickasaw people well.

“We appreciate him for his leadership at home and representing us on a national level,” Governor Anoatubby said. “We look forward to his continued service to our tribe.”

Keel, who is serving his fifth term as Lt. Governor, wrote a personal message to the Chickasaw people, stating that he began considering the decision when he was diagnosed with cancer in 2017.

“We have been diligently seeking the Lord’s direction since then,” Keel said. “I completed my treatments, and by the Grace of God there is no sign of cancer. The Lord healed me and I know that He has a plan for me.”

Keel, who also serves as president of the National Congress of American Indians, said that he and Gov. Anoatubby spoke together about the decision and agreed that it was time “to begin a new chapter” in his life.

Gov. Anoatubby said that he has had discussions with Keel about continuing to serve the Chickasaw Nation in another role.

Chickasaw jewelry artist preps exotic items for festival

In 2018, Tulsa artist E. Dee Tabor was aware her bolo tie creation titled “Treaty” could well be the most provocative piece displayed at the Artesian Arts Festival.

Tabor encapsulated a small bit of a Chickasaw-U.S. government treaty in its design. “I found the treaty of 1786 (historically the Treaty of Hopewell) and printed it. I cut a piece out of that and placed it behind double refractive calcite. The calcite displays the words of the treaty but distorts them. It is like seeing double,” Tabor said.

“Treaty” sold last year, kicking off 2018 into a productive season for the artist.

“It was a very elaborate piece and took many 12-hour days to finish,” Tabor said of “Treaty.”

At the top of the calcite-distorted treaty was a peace pipe. A war club adorned the bottom of the circular shield, and a silver warrior shield served as the bolo’s background.

Etched on the shield are the moon, stars, Mississippi River and the treaty date. The treaty defined Chickasaw Nation boundaries in the Homeland and vowed peace and friendship between the tribe and the fledgling U.S. government.

For the upcoming arts festival, Tabor is dedicating herself to work in many artistic mediums to produce jewelry that will appeal to thousands of art lovers.

She is producing exotic-material jewelry she hopes will excite patrons who will venture to Sulphur May 25.

From earrings, necklaces, bracelets and one-of-a-kind creations, Tabor is thrilled to be an exhibitor as the show enters its fifth year. It is one of the fastest growing Native American arts festivals nationally.

Tabor is retired, having spent more than 30 years in classrooms teaching kindergarten to higher education.

“I hated retirement,” she said with a laugh. “I just was not happy. I wasn’t doing enough. I was volunteering and doing odds and ends. So, I returned to the classroom to learn gerontology at Tulsa University.”

Upon earning her degree, the entrepreneur in Tabor emerged. She started Senior Transitions which she owned 14 years. The whole time, she admits, she was dreaming of making jewelry. She attended workshop sessions at Firehouse Arts Center, a Norman, Oklahoma, adult training and arts education facility.

Owning and managing Senior Transitions required 24/7 dedication. In July 2016, she sold the business and opened Tabor Designs a month later.

Tabor had created fine jewelry for years. The pieces were gifted to her daughters, sisters and other family members.

She did not go public with her creations until the Chickasaw Nation reached out to her to participate in the 2016 Southeastern Arts Show and Market (SEASAM), the premiere artist venue for the Chickasaw Nation Annual Meeting and Festival.

“It was my first juried show. It was the first time my creations were seen by the general public.

“I enjoyed meeting people and the positive vibe. I felt like I had come home,” Tabor said of her debut. “I thought, ‘This is who I am. This is what I need to be doing. This is fabulous.’”

Tabor said SEASAM demonstrated her creations were appreciated. “I do not measure success merely in dollars. There are greater factors I consider.

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# Chickasaws join 2020 census task to count Native Americans

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby announced a partnership between the U.S. Census Bureau and Chickasaw Nation to help ensure Native Americans are counted accurately during the 2020 census.

During an April 1 "Shape Your Future" press event here, Governor Anoatubby said the task to count all Native Americans is a priority for the Chickasaw Nation.

He stressed the Chickasaw Nation will engage other tribes to provide accurate information about Native American populations.

"There has been an undercounting of certain populations and, as Native Americans, we have had a long-term issue that affects us," Governor Anoatubby told top census officials.

Native Americans were undercounted by about 4.9 percent, a rate more than double the next population group.

The Chickasaw Nation has formed a complete count committee to address this disparity. An awareness campaign includes advertising in both tribal and local outlets as well as direct mail pieces encouraging citizens and employees to participate.

Census participation takes place throughout the year online, through social media, as well as informational booths and kiosks at facilities and events.

### Meeting Tribal Needs

"We encourage all tribal Nations to institute their own initiatives to encourage their citizens to participate and to form their own complete count committees for the 2020 census. Every tribe can form its own complete count committee," Governor Anoatubby explained.

The unique government-to-government relationship

between tribes and the U.S. government is at the heart of accurately counting all Native Americans.

According to Governor Anoatubby, the census is essential to governmental operations and the allocation of funding.

"An accurate accounting of Native Americans is particularly important because of the government-to-government relationship. The federal government has treaty responsibilities to provide certain services (to Native Americans). Education is one; health care, housing and other services," he said.

"For these reasons and others, it is vital we conduct an accurate census. It is very important we all be involved in the gathering of this important information."

### Rural Challenges

Many tribes are isolated and in rural areas that might be overlooked during the census count. Governor Anoatubby called the problems "logistical obstacles."

"According to the 2010 census, roughly 26 percent of Native Americans live in 'hard to count' census tracts. For instance, some reservations are in remote locations and they are difficult to access," Governor Anoatubby pointed out.

"In some reservations, you do not have street names; you do not have convenient ways to identify households," Governor Anoatubby said.

"It is important that we, as tribes, step up and become partners. By participating, we speak for the generations of Native people that preceded us and for those yet to come."


"The funding that results from our participation will help us to continue to build a bright future for our people. We will do our part to ensure that every Native American is counted in 2020," he added.

SEASAM showed me my work was good,” she said.

Unfortunately, learning of her Chickasaw roots involved tragedy.

Her family was stationed in San Antonio, Texas, when her father, Marvin, was killed in a military plane crash. She was 4.

The family moved to Durant to be near his relatives. Her father’s ancestors attended Bloomfield Academy, a Chickasaw school for females located in Achille. It was moved in the 1930s to Ardmore as a coed facility and later became Carter Seminary.

Tabor’s family remained in Durant. She graduated from Durant High School and attended Southeastern State University and Oklahoma State University.

She remembers seeing copies of the “Chickasaw Times” at an aunt’s home. It wasn’t until she became an adult that Tabor’s

search shed light on ancestors who signed the Dawes Commission Rolls for land allotments, thus making her eligible for tribal citizenship.

“I knew as a child I was Native American but didn’t have all the answers,” Tabor recalled.

Hosted by the Chickasaw Nation at the Artesian Plaza, more than 100 esteemed artists representing 25 Native American tribes throughout the United States and Canada will be featured during the Artesian Arts Festival, Saturday, May 25.

The Artesian Plaza is located adjacent to the Artesian Hotel and Spa, 1001 W. First St. Festivities begin at 10 a.m. and end at 6 p.m.

“We started this journey and the money started coming in,” Blankenship said in a video posted to the church’s Facebook page.

The church hosted a gala to generate interest in the project and funds began coming in from outside the congregation.

Presently, the church has raised \$80,000 and money is still coming in.

Blankenship expressed confidence that the remaining \$20,000 will be raised within the next week or two.

He said the church will give the \$100,000 to Hope Center Ministries, which will immediately look for a suitable site – preferably a home with some land.

Women accepted into the work-based rehabilitation program will pay \$700.

Instead of offering 30- to 90-day rehab programs, the Purcell Hope Center program

will be 8 to 12 months.

Because it is work-based, the cost of treatment is covered and there is no out-of-pocket expense for women in the program. The cost of the treatment will be covered by the work performed.

On successfully completing the program, each woman will get the \$700 back.

“We are so very excited about bringing the Purcell Hope Center here very soon,” Blankenship said. “We’re going to do this together.”



**Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation**

Last week we recognized Kenneth Follist of Midwest City as our Veteran of the Week. He served in the Korean War. In recognition of Mr. Follist's military service, we presented a cap and introduced him to over 200 veterans and their families. As no one ever recognized many of our veterans, we are very proud to have him at our Foundation last week

As many of you know, we recognize both the Korean Veterans and those who served in World War II each week. Making a presentation to these men and women is one of my favorite duties each Tuesday and Thursday morning. I, for one, appreciate the sacrifices that all veterans have done for this United States of America.

We know that our military is what keeps us free to make the choices that we make every day.

Not everyone on this earth believes that our country should be a democracy where we choose our leaders, worship who we want to, and to follow our dreams through our lives.

Twenty-five veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities last week. They will receive combined annual payments of over one million dollars each year. Those men and women will be eligible for the Oklahoma property tax exemption on their primary residence. They will also be eligible for the Oklahoma sales tax exemption on the first \$25,000 of purchases each year and are eligible for the reduced rate for two license tags.

Forty-three veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent last week. They will receive an annual combined amount of almost \$800,000 per year. Our state has several other benefits that veterans rated 60 percent, or higher may be eligible to receive. When it comes to benefits for veterans, our state ranks near the top. We always try to help veterans apply for all the benefits that they may be eligible for from our state along with any federal benefits they might qualify for.

Three surviving spouses were approved for DIC. This means that their spouse passed away due to a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to their military service. Their combined annual amount is just under \$50,000 per year. A benefit that surviving spouses, dependents and some veterans who were awarded a 100 percent disability rating is the Champ-VA medical Insurance that some may be eligible to receive at no cost.

Our organization is a 501(C)(3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles, or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.

He continued, “It is as if there are two wolves inside me. One is good and does no harm. He lives in harmony with all around him and does not take offense when no offense was intended. He will only fight

when it is right to do so, and in the right way. The good wolf represents things like kindness, bravery, and love. We can call him the good wolf, or the Courage Wolf. He resides in our heart.”

“But the other wolf—he is full of anger. The littlest thing will set him into a fit of temper. He fights everyone, all the time, for no reason. He cannot think because his anger and hate are so great. It is helpless anger, for his anger will change nothing. This bad wolf represents things like greed, hatred, and fear. We can call him the Fear Wolf. He lives in our mind.”

Since the beginnings of Christianity, there have been three distinct periods of faith. In the beginning, in the stories from the Acts of the Apostles, Peter, Paul and the other disciples are preaching about Jesus to a world that did not know of him. This was the original evangelization – the spreading the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

But then, as Christianity grew along with Western culture, a flourishing took place in the Middle Ages. The culture breathed Christianity as part of its natural pulse. Many of our greatest saints come from an era in which Christianity formed the basis of many lives

and peoples.

From this era came St. Francis, St. Catherine of Siena, St. Ignatius, St. Dominic, and many others. This was an era in which people relied on God who was the only source of hope and healing.

Since the beginning of modern medicine, however, people tend to rely more and more upon science and technology to heal them and make them happy. Our teachers of modern times, popes and bishops, speak most often now of “new evangelization”. They are reminding us that we now must distinguish ourselves in a different way. We set ourselves apart from non-Christians, not

by our feast days and rituals and peculiar habits, but by our love for one another.

At his last meal with his disciples, Jesus said: “I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another.” (John 13:34-35)

Why was this a new commandment? The Jewish faith already taught that I should love my neighbor as myself. And Jesus had already taught me to love my enemy, to do good to the one who hates me. How was this a new commandment?

Jesus had just finished wash-


Sunday morning the adult Bible had five visitors. We studied from 2 Corinthians 1-4 and next Sunday will study from 2 Corinthians 5-8.

The boy looked intently into his grandfather’s eyes and asked, “Which wolf wins, Grandfather?”

The grandfather smiled and quietly said, “The one I feed.”

As you may have realized, this is a good parable for any human, but how do we feed these wolves?

Front-Porch Gospel: ‘Thin-ice Faith’

Good day to all. Welcome to the “front porch.”

On my trips, I always pack a little book called The Case For Faith, by Lee Stroebel. I have long been intrigued by the idea of “faith” and how fragile it sometimes can be. You understand, I’m sure.

In one section toward the end of the book, Stroebel interviews an elderly Canadian teacher, writer, and scholar named Lynn Anderson. This interview is one of Stroebel’s most important because Mr. Anderson teaches him that doubt is not our biggest threat. The biggest threat, as you’ll see, is shocking. Read on.

I have found that when you choose the road of faith, you had better be prepared to detour down some dark sideroads – such as the cul-de-sac of Doubt, or the crooked highway of Disbelief. We cannot travel very far before we realize we are prone

to wander off the main road far more than we would like.

In the interview, Stroebel is curious to find out if such a man of knowledge as Anderson had wrestled with the doubts himself. Mr. Anderson answers the question by considering the true nature of faith and doubt. To combat doubt, he says, we need to establish a clear object for our faith. What, exactly, is our faith based on? Is it founded on something very solid? Is it, in the words of the great apostle, based on true “substance”? (Hebrews 11:1).

The theologian drew an illustration from his homeland to clarify. “We Canadians,” he said, “know there are two kinds of ice: thick and thin. You can have very little faith in thick ice and it will hold you up just fine,” he says, “and you can have enormous faith in thin ice and you can drown. It’s not the

amount of faith you can muster that matters up front. It may be tiny, like a mustard seed. But your faith must be invested in something solid[SB1].”

Interestingly, “Doubt,” it seems, is not the problem. The problem may be that we have too much faith. That’s right. We have a great deal of faith, but that that faith is based on the wrong things. We can base our faith on human reasoning, current trends, eloquent sermons, long-held prejudices, or on the things that appeal the most to us.

We can have absolute faith in any of those things and go about our lives believing with all of our hearts that we are walking on ice as thick as building.

But thin ice will break, no matter how much you believe in it.
