Bridge watch

Two lanes projected to open this month

The project engineer on the bridge construction over the South Canadian River between Purcell and Lexington expressed confidence Tuesday that the south half of the new span will open to traffic by the end of August.

Wade Vandevender with Webber Construction couldn't give a specific date, however.

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation closed the James C. Nance Memorial Bridge in January 2014 when cracks were found in the sup-

porting structure.

ODOT then fast-tracked the project to replace the bridge.

When complete, the new bridge will feature four lanes, as well as a sidewalk for pedestrian traffic.

Once traffic is routed to the two new lanes, the old bridge will be removed and work will start on the remainder of the span.

Contract for the new bridge is \$36 million. There is also a possible \$2 million bonus if the project is completed ahead of schedule.

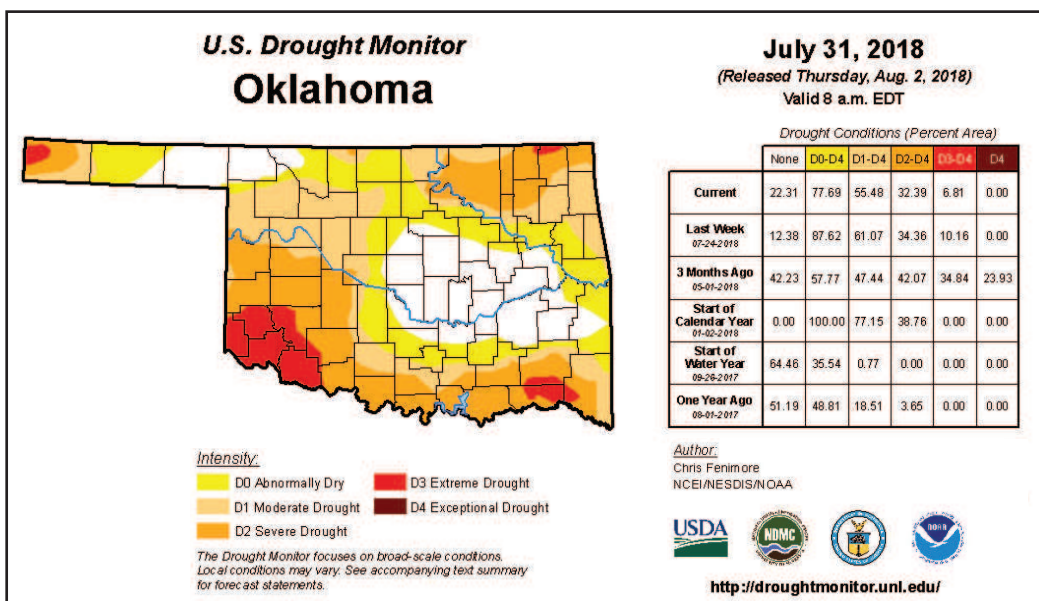

"Hopefully, we will be able to help more children in years to come," Mrs. Goldsby said.

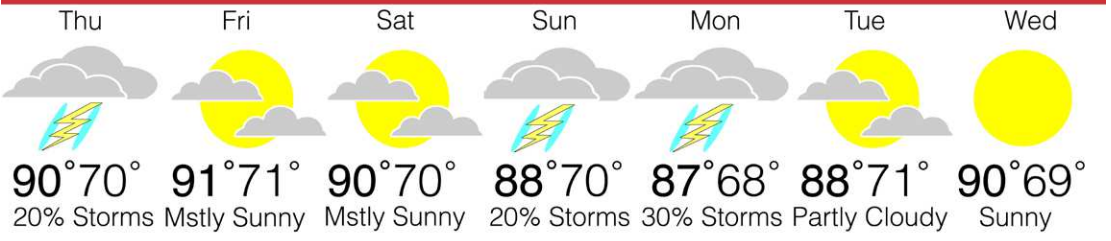
Organizers are asking for school supplies or monetary donations for the project this year. They can be dropped off at Delta Community Action, 223 W. Washington St., in Purcell.

When you watch the nightly news all you hear about are the bad things in life from the latest Trump fiasco to plane crashes, volcanoes, floods and wild fires.

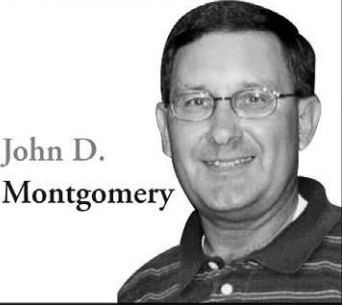
What many witnessed last Saturday was an outpouring of support for school children.

A shared alliance

As the United States continues its historic buildup of its defense capabilities, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) has committed to increasing security investments as well. Russia seeks to change the international order by stressing our alliances, undermining national institutions, and supporting conflicts around the world.

Its goal is to exert greater influence around the globe and demonstrate Russia is not only a nuclear power, but a Great Power. The NATO alliance shares a common strategic vision on how to counter this threat.

Recently, I visited several NATO countries to understand their contributions to NATO and efforts to support U.S. defense initiatives in Europe.

Although President Trump has put pressure on NATO countries to contribute two percent of their gross domestic product (GDP) toward defense spending, it is important to realize additional contributions to our collective mission. Countering Russia requires not only a robust U.S. military, but strong alliances as well.

Congress has recently authorized \$716 billion in funding for national defense for Fiscal Year 2019 which will provide America's service members the training, resources and equipment necessary to take on threats around the globe.

Already, NATO partners

have agreed to the NATO Readiness Initiative, which is comprised of 30 land battalions, 30 aircraft squadrons and 30 naval ships within 30 days.

However, moving against threats like cyber, hybrid warfare and terrorism, that know no borders, requires not only monetary contributions, but troop contributions and infrastructure investments.

In recent years, missions in Bosnia, Libya, Iraq and Afghanistan have included the deployment of NATO Allies alongside U.S. servicemembers.

Sadly, casualties have not been a burden America shouldered alone. Denmark has the highest loss per capita of all the coalition forces in Afghanistan, with 44 Danish fatalities since January 2002.

Deploying in support of international NATO operations projects and western security interests influence the greater impact than could be accomplished independently.

Additionally, NATO nations have discussed counting infrastructure spending as part of their commitment because NATO leaders have recognized the enormous impediments to moving troops and military material across Europe.

Europe's tunnels and bridges are too narrow for wide transports, and the Baltics have never really been integrated into NATO's ground logistics. Improving rail and highway networks will take tremendous resources and support from

European governments.

The benefits will be an immense boost to not only the collective defense of NATO, but to the economic well-being and stability of Europe as well.

The Baltic countries have been strong NATO partners, and also contributed in ways other than through monetary investments. In 2007, the Russians launched a cyber-attack targeting Estonia, a tiny Baltic nation of 1.3 million people and a landmass roughly half the size of Maine.

Following a dispute with Moscow over the relocation of a Soviet war memorial, the attack affected parliament, banks, broadcasters and newspapers. As a result, Estonia bolstered its cyber defenses.

Estonia shares its technological expertise with NATO allies to prevent and mitigate disruptions caused by cyber-attacks. This key contribution to the alliance is not counted as part of its 2 percent "contribution" to NATO, but the benefit of this cooperation is arguably greater due to the prevention of enormous economic and civil disruptions.

We must expand cooperation with our NATO partners. However, there are additional ways to measure burden-sharing that will improve the partnership. The standard defense expenditure as a share of GDP at two percent and equipment expenditure is a start, but defining new metrics for cooperation will make for a stronger and more effective alliance.

Percentages of PMH patients from other towns are Lexington (24 percent), Maysville (7 percent), Wayne (7 percent), Washington (3 percent), Wanette (3 percent), Pauls Valley (3 percent), Lindsay (3 percent), Noble (2 percent) and Byars (2 percent).

So roughly 54 percent of the hospital's patients come from zip codes other than 73080.

A lot of our neighbors use the hospital too.

These people also buy prescriptions, food, gas and other necessities while in town.

The hospital's economic reach cannot be measured. The economic tentacles touch every aspect and livelong in town.

Half a paddle and a dipnet

Many years ago, my dad and I and another man were fishing in the Sandy Creek area of Lake Texoma.

We fished several hours without catching much and were headed back to the boat ramp when we noticed another boat by some willow trees in the distance.

There were two guys in the boat, one holding on to a willow branch and the other waving his arm at us.

Dad swung the boat toward them and you could see their relief from a quarter-mile away.

As we got closer, both of them slumped down in their seats, obviously tired.

As it turned out, the motor on their boat had died and wouldn't start, stranding them on the lake.

They had tried making their way to shore, but, one said: "All we got is half a paddle and a dipnet."

He held up an oar that had been split in half lengthwise along the grain. Sure enough, half a paddle.

They had drifted until the breeze took them near the willow trees.

The guy in the front of the boat latched on to a branch and held it for several hours to keep the boat from drifting to points unknown, where rescue might be less likely.

His friend waved at every boat in the distance, but no one saw him until we noticed him.

I have thought often of that day and how trying to row a boat with "half a paddle and a dipnet" so eloquently describes a near-hopeless situation.

Not long after that experience, I went deer hunting near Stringtown with my friends, Nelson and Big Richard.

We loaded up in Big Richard's 1954 GMC pickup on a Friday evening and headed for the deer woods in a hard rain.

As I recall, the rain didn't let up all the way from Latta to Stringtown.

The problem with that was the windshield wipers in the pickup didn't work.

We cleverly improvised a solution, which was to reach through the back of the glove box and grab one of the arms that moved the wipers. You could slide the arm back and forth and the wipers would move.

You had to bend over and crook your arm to reach that far, but it worked. Sort of.

It took 10 seconds for the wipers to make one swipe.

Nelson and I took turns and kept the windshield wiped well enough for Big Richard to go about 40 miles an hour.

The drive lasted a week, it seemed, but we finally made it to Stringtown, where I mentally added windshield wipers to paddles and dipnets.

A fibrous stitching material is pulled through the pine needles to help create and maintain the shape of the basket.

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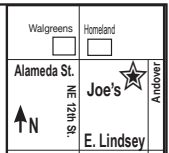
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BLM invites public to a free off-range tour in Sulphur

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is hosting two free tours on Saturday, August 11, at a wild horse off-range pasture in Sulphur.

Attendees will have the opportunity to view approximately 200 mares roaming on approximately 3,875 acres called the Chickasaw Ranch.

In addition, attendees will have the opportunity to visit with BLM staff to learn more about the Wild Horse and Burro (WHB) Program and members of the Chickasaw Nation to learn more about their cultural and their upcoming movie called The Chickasaw Rancher.

Shuttle buses will transport attendees to and from the off-range pasture site from the designated pick-up and drop-off location.

Personal vehicles, glass containers and cans are not allowed on the tour, only drinks with lids are permitted.

The buses will be equipped with USB ports, air condition-

ing, and restrooms to provide a comfortable experience. Cameras and videotaping are also welcome. It is advised that those who are attending dress in comfortable attire for the summer weather.

The departures on August 11 will be at 8:45 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. Boarding will begin 15 minutes before each departure. Look for Kincaid buses.

Those planning to attend are asked to RSVP to 866-468-7826 or wildhorse@blm.gov. Please specify tour time and number attending. Reservations are capped at 110 per tour. Pick up and drop off location will be the Chickasaw Cultural Center, 867 Cooper Memorial Dr., in Sulphur, www.chickasawculturalcenter.com.

Wild horses and burros essentially have no natural predators, resulting in a rapid increase in population. If not appropriately managed, herds double in size in just four to five years.

To maintain wild horse and burros in good condition and protect the health of public land, BLM must manage the population growth of wild horses and burros.

As of July 24, 2018, there are nearly 44,000 wild horses and burros that are fed and cared for at off-range pastures, corrals and eco sanctuaries. The wild horses and burros roaming the public rangelands are protected by the BLM under the 1971 Wild Free-Roaming Horses and Burros Act.

The BLM estimates about 81,951 wild horses and burros roaming the BLM-rangelands in 10 Western states.

The Chickasaw Nation is providing all attendees with coupons for a tour and lunch at the Chickasaw Cultural Center.

Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the county election board no later than 5 p.m. August 22 to be processed in time for the election.

Absentee voters may apply in person at the county election board office or may send their applications by mail, fax, or e-mail. An online version of the form may be filled out and submitted electronically <http://www.elections.ok.gov>.

Any registered voter eligible to vote in the election may vote by absentee ballot without stating a reason, Haley said.

However absentee voters can activate certain special conditions in the following circumstances:

Registered voters who are physically incapacitated, who care for physically incapacitated persons who cannot be left unattended or who are confined to nursing homes may apply for absentee ballots only by mail, fax, e-mail, online or via an agent who is at least 16 years of age and who is not employed by or related within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity to any person whose name appears on the ballot.

Military personnel, residents of McClain County living overseas, and the spouses and dependents of each group may apply only by mail, fax or e-mail. For more information and instructions, military and overseas voters may visit the Federal Voting Assistance Program website at <http://www.fvap.gov/oklahoma>.

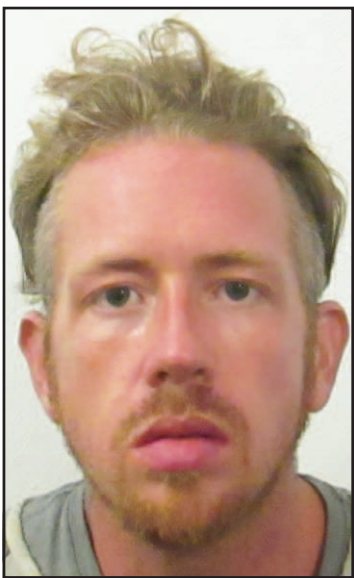
Homeless man found in towed car

Chamber supports PMH sales tax extension

During our July Board Meeting your Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors voted to place its support behind Purcell Municipal Hospital. Our hospital remains a vital part of our community. Not only is it an important health service, but our areas' health care personnel are either directly employed by or supported by our local hospital. This includes, but is not limited to, businesses such as medical practices, pharmacies, nursing homes and ambulance service. Further, our hospital continues to stimulate our local economy by bringing outside dollars into the community through third-party payors, provides jobs (122 for PMH alone), local purchasing, as well as helping attract new business and retirees to the area. A recent study by the National Institute

of Health states that a loss of a rural hospital reduces per-capita income by four percent and increases the unemployment rate by 1.6 percentage points. It is for these reasons the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber voted to support the Purcell Municipal Hospital.

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Two years ago, PMH was facing imminent closure with expenses far outstripping income.

That's when Purcell voters overwhelmingly approved a penny sales tax for a term of 3 years with all proceeds earmarked for the hospital.

That tax is scheduled to end Dec. 31, 2019, and the reality is without that revenue, the hospital's financial clock will soon turn back to 2016 when PMH was within scant months of closing forever.

On Aug. 28, voters will have an opportunity to extend the hospital sales tax for 20 years, ensuring the progress to date will continue.

And so, too, will the hospital's four-star standing with CMS.

Hospital Compare ranks the quality of care at more than 4,000 Medicare-certified hospitals nationwide and reports the results from 1 to 5 stars.

According to Medicare.gov, the assessment program is designed to help individuals make decisions on where to obtain their health care. It also encourages hospitals to improve the quality of care they provide.

In short, a win-win scenario. McClain County's only hos-

pital fares well in comparison with the closest hospitals to the north and south. Those are Norman Regional Hospital and Pauls Valley Health Authority.

All are acute care hospitals that offer emergency services. All receive lab results electronically and track patient lab results, tests and referrals electronically between appointments. They also use a patient safe surgery checklist.

The assessment spotlights seven major categories when looking at a hospital – general information, survey of patients' experiences, timely and effective care in a variety of ailments, complications and death, unplanned hospital visits, use of medical imaging and payment and value of care.

Among the most telling is the survey of patients' experiences.

Here are those results:

Nurses always communicated well – PMH, 84 percent; Norman Regional, 77 percent; Pauls Valley, 81 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 81 and 80 percent, respectively.

Doctors always communicated well – PMH, 93 percent; Norman Regional, 78 percent; Pauls Valley, 78 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 84 and 82 percent, respectively.

Staff always explained medi-

cations – PMH, 70 percent; Norman Regional, 63 percent; Pauls Valley, 63 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 68 and 66 percent, respectively.

Patient room and bathroom always clean – PMH, 61 percent; Norman Regional, 70 percent; Pauls Valley, 81 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 70 and 75 percent, respectively.

Area around patient room always quiet at night – PMH, 64 percent; Norman Regional, 65 percent; Pauls Valley, 73 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 70 and 62 percent, respectively.

Patient given information about recovery at home – PMH, 80 percent; Norman Regional, 88 percent; Pauls Valley, 84 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 87 and 87 percent, respectively.

Patients rating hospital 9 or 10 on scale of 1-10 – PMH, 72 percent; Norman Regional, 72 percent; Pauls Valley, 69 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 75 and 73 percent, respectively.

Patients who definitely recommend the hospital – PMH, 75 percent; Norman Regional, 70 percent; Pauls Valley, 69 percent; Oklahoma and national averages, 74 and 72 percent, respectively.

Depending on the number of birthdays in a given month, the volunteers will decorate one or more tables with balloons where the honorees will be seated in the school lunchroom.

Each birthday child will receive a birthday card stating "the day you were born was a beautiful day."

They will also get a Beautiful Day bracelet and then feast on pizza and Sprite.

Following lunch, every child in the school will receive a "sweet treat."

Volunteer recruitment will be ongoing throughout the year.

Montgomery said the goal is to have 40 to 50 volunteers.

"Not every volunteer is required to attend every birthday party," she said, adding the average time commitment will be about three hours a month.

Prospective volunteers may register online at www.beautifuldayfoundation.net.

The foundation runs a background check on all volunteers at no cost.

Once accepted, volunteers' only monetary outlay is \$10 per person for a Beautiful Day T-shirt. That will comprise half of the volunteer uniform of T-shirt and jeans.

Montgomery is hoping local businesses will provide donations of goods for the parties, including pizzas, Sprite, cupcakes/sweet treats and balloons.

A representative from MacHill Construction Company in Ada first questioned the wisdom of constructing two of the new courts at McCurdy Park, citing possible soil problems in the unused ball fields.

MacHill was underbid by \$5,761 on the contract, which the council awarded to TCS Construction in Tulsa.

TCS' bid on two basketball courts and additional concrete work at the former pool site, as well as two courts at McCurdy

Park totaled \$346,939.

MacHill's total bid came to \$352,700.

Two other companies submitted bids of \$385,942 and \$397,829 for the four basketball courts.

The MacHill representative next tried to convince the council that TCS erred in pricing the courts at McCurdy Park for \$16,576 less than the courts by the recreation center, when other companies varied less than \$5,000 between the two sites.

He continued to raise objections even after a motion was seconded and a vote was pending to award the contract to TCS.

The council took no action on a request they support The Actors Pavilion effort to offer a public access television channel in McClain County.

Such a channel would be aired through SuddenLink and licensed by the Federal Communications Commission.

City manager Dale Bunn was instructed to contact SuddenLink for more information.

The city will pay \$41,636 for the design of Purcell's

Downtown StreetScape.

The total engineering cost for the two phases will be \$208,180, of which the federal government will pay 80 percent or \$166,544.

Engineering company for the project is HALFF.

The council also approved a resolution establishing the city's participation in the Oklahoma Municipal Management Services program of shared city management and best practices.

Also approved was a policy in which the city will provide at no cost an electric transformer to new hotels/motels offering 80 or more units.

Bunn said the \$20,000 per transformer expense will be "easily recouped" by the city.

A \$28,027.45 budget amendment increasing revenue for permits and fees was approved for the new field house at the high school and for the new Holiday Inn Express.

In other business, the council denied tort claims from Heather Askew and Larry Cornforth for damages caused by a power outage and power surges in June.

"That was totally a set up undercover operation that we did, a sting basically. And it worked," Flowers said.

Working undercover, the agent was seated behind the sale barn desk. When Draughon came in to collect her \$7,500 check, Flowers was ready.

"When the clerk handed her the check for the sale of the cattle, I took her into custody and arrested her right there on the spot," he said.

Draughon and Temple reportedly confessed to stealing the cattle.

They told Flowers they were trying to get enough money to leave Oklahoma and go to Arizona.

Draughon's 6-month-old infant was with them.

"They were fixing to haul that kid across the country and no telling what else they were going to do being desperate for money," Flowers said.

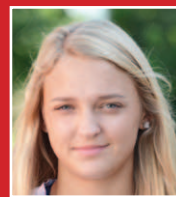

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

A lot was going on last Tuesday and Thursday morning. Mick Cornett, one of the Republican candidates for governor, stopped in early Tuesday morning to visit with some of our veterans who served in our military.

Mr. Cornett is the former mayor of Oklahoma City. We appreciate him taking the time out of his busy schedule to listen to veterans on the types of issues that they face today.

One of the ladies who volunteered with us in our mail room, Linda York, passed away last week. She will be missed by all of us who knew her by her quick wit and smile each day.

As a volunteer, she was one of our ladies who spent each Tuesday morning addressing and mailing our correspondence to hundreds of veterans each week. Our condolences go out to her family and friends.

As a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization our funding comes from people in our community and grants from local charities.

We also accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles and other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise money to support what we do for veterans and their families.

Last week a couple in Norman called to say they had a useable car they wanted to donate. When I went to pick it up, they told me that we had helped their son with rent and other items last year and that they wanted to give back to a local organization. We appreciate everyone who helps us make a difference in the lives of our veterans their families.

During the first seven months of 2018, we set a record having 475 veterans receive a 100 percent disability rating for their service-connected disabilities. We have served veterans and their families from all 77 counties in Oklahoma and 45 states in the Nation.

For those of you who ask why so many veterans and surviving spouses visit our organization, it is because many of our volunteers have walked in their footsteps before. We are fortunate to have so many wonderful volunteers who donate their time each week to help others.

Some examples are our drivers who donated 82 hours last week transporting 22 veterans 1,483 miles. All our volunteers understand the needs of those who have served in the military. Some veterans will experience difficulties in the transition process from structured military life to civilian life.

To help veterans who are having difficulty with mental health issues, the Veteran Centers in Oklahoma City and Lawton will have a counselor available each Tuesday and Thursday morning at our Norman location. We are very pleased to have these representatives here to help our veterans who need assistance.

Seems to me, there are a lot of great things going on at our Veterans Foundation for our veterans and the surviving spouses of the men and women who have served in the military. For those of you who have not stopped in with your claims and questions about possible VA benefits we start each Tuesday and Thursday morning at 5:30 a.m. accepting the first 140 veterans and spouses. We have usually reached our maximum building limit by 7 a.m. each day.

One of the benefits of being an Accredited Claims Agent is that VA sends me a copy of every rating decision and correspondence that the people represented receive. This allows me to open the VA computer system to review the claims folders on all of those I serve.

Last year we helped a WW II veteran who is 103 years young from Clinton file his first application for VA benefits. We are happy to report he was approved for a disability rating of 100 percent. When we called him to make a trip back to see us to apply for the state benefits, he was a very happy veteran.

One of the rating decisions we received on Saturday was for a local veteran whose case we have been working on for several years. He had been denied several times since 2012 for service-connection of a disability that was caused by exposure to Agent Orange.

We appealed the original denial to the Board of Veterans Appeals in Washington DC. The Saturday letter announced the veteran was awarded service-connection of his disabilities and received a 100 percent rating dating back to 2013. Needless to say, he was thrilled, and he received more than \$140,000 in back payments for those disabilities.

Last Tuesday and Thursday morning, we were able to assist 297 veterans and surviving spouses with their VA claims

and questions. Currently, we are on schedule to assist 14,000 to 15,000 veterans and their families with their VA applications for benefits. If you're not able to visit us in Norman, my advice to you is to obtain evidence that supports your claim for a service-connection of a disability.

The best way is to use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires that are available on the VA website. These forms are used to provide a diagnosis of a disability, describe the severity of the condition you are asking VA to re-evaluate or to request service-connection of a new disability. There were veterans from South Carolina, Georgia, Texas, Kansas, Arkansas, and Missouri who visited our location last Tuesday and Thursday morning.

As you've heard me mention before, as a VA Accredited Agent I receive a copy of the letters sent to the folks I represent. This creates both a huge benefit and a slight burden. The number of letters Rhonda Reynolds and I open and review each week are normally more than 300. There were 318 just this week but not that long ago we received 652 letters in one week. This is a huge benefit as we can now see from the letters what the VA awarded, what percentage level the VA assigned, and what we can do to get the veteran to the next level of benefits.

In the mailbag last week, we received notification that 21 folks were awarded benefits at the 100 percent rate. This group, on an annual basis, will receive \$811,862, plus the various state benefits that are available. In the category of 10-90 percent rating, there were 36 recipients, and this group will receive \$506,832 on an annual basis. Two surviving spouses were notified they would receive benefits and these will total \$29,509 on an annual basis.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch." Let's take a walk back to an eye-opening scene in the life of the disciples.

One day as they walk with the Lord on the shores of Caesarea Philippi, He asks them whom men are saying he is. The Lord is well-known for getting right to the point, to cutting to the chase, as we say. At such times, I am sure the disciples would often look around at each other with a confused look and with eyebrows raised.

The Lord's questions were not always easy, because they were probing. You have to make sure you get the answer right when someone sets one of those questions before you. The Lord would ask: Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? Or, what do you think about the Christ? Or - one of my favorites - Where is your faith? (Luke 8:25).

As you see, there seldom was a right answer, and the

questions, I'm sure, made the disciples more than a little nervous.

On this particular occasion there in Caesarea Philippi, they offer the Lord various answers they had heard in the market place or on the streets. The general consensus, they say, is that you are Elijah, Jeremiah, one of the other great prophets.

The Lord takes in those hypotheses, then - perhaps with the smile of the teacher who knows he is about to shatter all the students' misconceptions - asks that wondrous age-old question: "But who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15).

Perhaps there would have been an awkward silence had the others had to come up with an answer to that question, but not so with Peter. Unhesitatingly, Peter speaks up, as Matthew records: "Simon Peter answered and said, You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (v. 16).

In many ways Peter is like many of us: quick to speak, quick to mis-speak, and quick to do the wrong thing. But in this case, maybe surprisingly, he does not misspeak nor do the wrong thing. He is not unsure, either, of what he is about to declare.

His voice likely does not elevate at the end as if he is asking a question rather than giving a definitive, life-changing, character-defining answer. Peter may be as sure of what he says as anything in the world.

No truth in his mind is greater, makes more sense, or has more substance than the one he had just blurted out. And his answer does not even have the added benefit of being rehearsed in his mind a time or two before releasing it to the world.

No, he said it without revision: "You, Sir, are the Christ. You are the Son of the living God."

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

The Exodus is the most important event in the formation of the Jewish people. It is celebrated in the Psalms, in the Passover and other celebrations, and is the event in which the people were formed as a people of God. The Exodus event was an experience of an entire people. But it is the same thing that happens to us when we experience a crisis.

A crisis is any event, self-chosen or thrust upon us, which marks a turning point in our lives. It could be good, such as a new job, a new marriage, or having a child. Or it could be bad, such as the loss of a job, a divorce, a move to a new city, or the death of a loved one.

Theologians speak of this sequence as orientation - disorientation - reorientation. We were oriented, or comfortable, in our old life. Then this crisis

comes upon us. Now we are disoriented. We are uncertain, ambiguous, and uncomfortable, until we reach a new orientation.

And we might do what the Israelites do - look back upon our old life with nostalgia - "things were much better back then. At least we had something to eat." (Exodus 16:2-4). But they forget that they were slaves and were bound to hard labor under the Egyptians.

We too might only remember the good and forget the bad. "Before I was married, I could leave my dirty socks around the house." I forget that I was lonely and desired a companion. "Back when I was a student, I had so much more free time." Yes, but you also had no money.

But our God is a God of the present. He is a God of the here and now. His graces

are being offered for us now. His graces are always forming us into a person of greater capacity to love and be loved, greater ability to be generative (fruitful), and greater ability to make meaning out of our lives. St. Paul writes: "Put away the old self...put on the new self, created in God's righteousness and holiness of truth." (Eph. 4:20-24)

One of our recent Adult Sunday School lessons was on "The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant" (Matthew 18:21-35). The story drives home the message about our need to forgive others as we have been forgiven by God.

In this parable, Peter asks about how many times we should forgive those who sin against us. He is wanting to know a specific number (seven times?) that would satisfy the need to forgive others. Jesus replies that we should forgive not only seven times but as many as 77 times. (Some translations of the passage says to forgive even 70 x 7 times.) However, the truth is that Christian forgiveness is about quality, not

quantity, as illustrated in the rest of the story.

Jesus tells the story of a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. One servant owed him 10,000 talents. The Greek word used here indicates the largest number possible in accounting debt in the ancient world.

A talent was equivalent to at least 15 years of wages for a common laborer. So the amount this first servant owed was equivalent to 150,000 years of wages! This was more money than any person could pay in a single lifetime, but Jesus may have used this to indicate how laughable the magnitude of this debt was.

The master called this first servant in and asks him to pay his debt. The man obviously couldn't pay the total amount, so the master orders that he should be sold into slavery along with his wife and children and that everything the family owns be sold to be used toward repaying the master.

The servant pleads for patience from the master and promises that he would repay the debt. The master feels compassion for this first servant and releases him from the loan.

The story could have ended right there with a good lesson on forgiving others, but it doesn't. The first servant

leaves the master's home. He then goes to a second servant that owes him 100 denarii, grabs the second man, and demands, "Pay me back what you owe me."

Now a denarius was about 100 days' wages for a common laborer, or approximately three months wages--in other words, not nearly as much as the first servant owed the master.

This second fellow falls to the ground and begs him, "Please be patient with me, and I'll pay you back." But, the first servant ungraciously refuses to consider this and throws the second servant into prison until he settles the debt.

The other servants that worked for the same master were offended by what they saw the first man do, so they went to the master and told him what had occurred. The master called the first servant back before him, calling him "wicked" while pointing out that the master himself had forgiven his own debt in response to this servant's plea for more time.

"Shouldn't you have mercy on your fellow servant, just as I showed mercy to you?" In his fury, the master hands the first man over to the guard who is

in charge of punishing prisoners, requiring the ungrateful so-and-so to pay back his whole debt.

Jesus closes the story with, “My heavenly Father will also do the same to you, if you don’t forgive your brothers or sisters from your heart.”

Note that Jesus never did answer Peter’s question directly. Instead he tells a parable, a story that describes a situation of common life that leads the hearer to think about what his own actions should be in the given situation. We would probably have felt like the other servants felt about the unfairness shown by the first servant to the second man who was in debt to him.

Most of us are willing to forgive a person once or twice for the same sin. However if we are called forgive more times than that, we begin to doubt the sincerity of the one asking for our forgiveness. (Isn’t it a blessing that God doesn’t doubt our own sincerity?)

But Jesus is teaching us about the nature of forgiveness. Forgiveness is a process, a necessity of human life. For Him, forgiveness is at the heart of what it means to be a part of the community of Christian faith, and this chilling parable is a lesson to the whole church about forgiveness. We as believers need to practice this forgiveness habit in order to remain a faithful and intact community.

As the church, we can’t just talk about forgiving--we have to actually forgive. In this lesson, Jesus reminds us that, if we can remember how much God has forgiven us, it should be much easier for us to let go of our own resentments toward others. If we hang on to them, it hinders our witness to the wider world.

We always have choices, whether we see them or not, or whether we even want to admit that an action we took was a choice. From this parable, we see that the first servant had the chance to change his attitude. We do too, either to offer forgiveness or to withhold it. May we work toward always choosing to make ourselves into consistent “forgivers,” remembering the model prayer Jesus gave to His first followers and to us: “Forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors...”

No. 762-August 9-1 Time ORDINANCE 2018-14 AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AMENDING CHAPTER 18, ARTICLE 5 OF THE GOLDSBY CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ADDING A NEW SECTION THERETO REQUIRING VEHICLES TO COME TO A FULL STOP ON FRONTIER TRAIL AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE AND AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE; ON STAGE COACH TRAIL AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE AND AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE; ON TOMBSTONE TRAIL AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE AND AT ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE; WITHIN THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of Trustees has determined that the movement of vehicular traffic:

ON CHUCKWAGON TRAIL APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE OR APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE

in the Town of Goldsby could be controlled with greater safety to life and property or with greater efficiency in the use of said streets if vehicular traffic approaching each of said intersections is required to come to a full stop before entering such intersection;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, that:

Section 1. Chapter 18, Article 5 Amended. Chapter 18, Article 5 of the Goldsby Code of ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section as follows:

Vehicular traffic within the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma:

ON FRONTIER TRAIL APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE OR APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE;

ON STAGE COACH TRAIL APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE OR APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE;

ON TOMBSTONE TRAIL APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE OR APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE;

ON CHUCKWAGON TRAIL APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH BOOMER AVENUE OR APPROACHING ITS ENTRANCE TO THE INTERSECTION WITH LANDRUN AVENUE;

shall come to a full stop before entering such intersection. Stop signs shall be erected at each entrance to said intersection where a stop is required by this ordinance. From and after the placing or posting of official stop signs giving notice of such required stops, it shall be an offense for any person except when operating an authorized emergency vehicle (as provided in this Chapter), to fail to come to a full stop before entering such intersection.

Section 2. Emergency. It being necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, peace and welfare of the citizens and residents of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, that this Ordinance shall become effective immediately, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, by reason whereof, this Ordinance shall take full force and effect immediately upon its adoption, as provided by law.

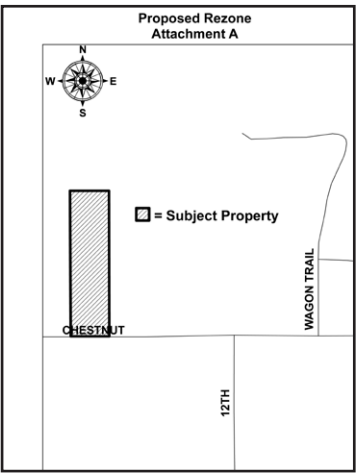

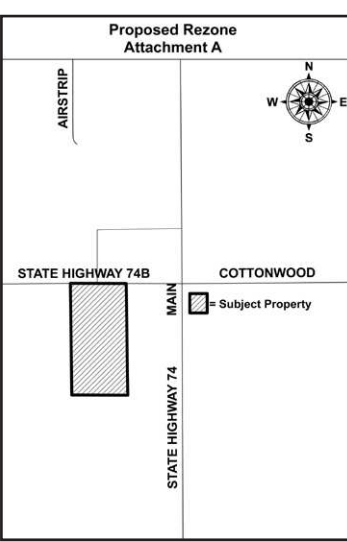

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AMENDING CHAPTER 18, ARTICLE 2, SECTION 18-6 OF THE GOLDSBY CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ESTABLISHING A SPEED LIMIT OF 25 MILES PER HOUR ON FRONTIER TRAIL, STAGECOACH TRAIL, TOMBSTONE TRAIL, CHUCKWAGON TRAIL, AND POSSE TRAIL AND ESTABLISHING A SPEED LIMIT OF 35 MILES PER HOUR ON THAT PART OF 320TH STREET BETWEEN LANDRUN AVENUE AND NW 24TH AVENUE, WITHIN THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of Trustees has determined that the movement of vehicular traffic within the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma upon Frontier Trail, Stagecoach Trail, Tombstone Trail, Chuckwagon Trail, and Posse Trail could be controlled with greater safety to life and property or with greater efficiency in the use of said streets if the speed limit is set at 25 miles per hour and that the movement of vehicular traffic within the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma upon that part of 320th Street between Landrun Avenue and NW 24th Avenue could be controlled with greater safety to life and property or with greater efficiency in the use of said streets if the speed limit is reduced to 35 miles per hour

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, THAT:

Section 1. CHAPTER 18, ARTICLE 2, SECTION 18-6, AMENDED. Chapter 18, Article 2, Section

18-6, of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto two (2) new sub-paragraphs to read as follows:

From and after the placing or posting of official signs and markers giving notice of such speed limit, no person shall drive or operate any vehicle, except an authorized emergency vehicle (as provided in this Chapter), at a speed greater than 25 miles per hour within the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma upon Frontier Trail, Stagecoach Trail, Tombstone Trail, Chuckwagon Trail, and Posse Trail.

From and after the placing or posting of official signs and markers giving notice of such speed limit, no person shall drive or operate any vehicle, except an authorized emergency vehicle (as provided in this Chapter), at a speed greater than 35 miles per hour within the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma upon that part of 320th Street between Landrun Avenue and NW 24th Avenue.

Section 2. EMERGENCY. It being necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, peace and welfare of the citizens and residents of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, that this Ordinance shall become effective immediately, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, by reason whereof, this Ordinance shall take full force and effect immediately upon its adoption, as provided by law.

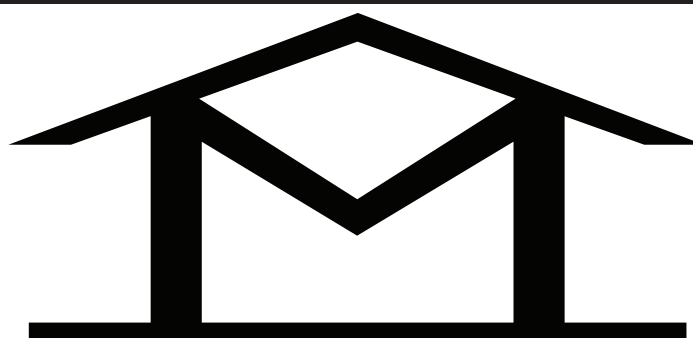
