

An Interesting Veighbor Everyone has a story

For Jo Kelly, a breakthrough medical procedure means she no longer has to worry about the risk of having another stroke.

That isn't something she takes lightly.

The risk that another stroke could end her life was real. You see, Jo suffered four strokes in the past eight years. And she lost both parents to strokes.

The threat to her own life was very real.

That was before.

Before she saw an online advertisement about a study on atrial fibrillation at the Baylor Southwest Research Institute.

Before she met Dr. Brian DeVille, a Baylor physician specializing in arrhythmia management and electrophysiology who would change her life, literally.

"I had Afib almost 10 years," she said. "My first stroke was crippling."

It affected all of her left side.

Jo's life was that of an invalid.

After learning of the Baylor study, Jo consulted her cardiologist in Norman, Dr. Muhammad Anwar.

He forwarded all of her medical records to the institute.

Though she wasn't accepted for the study, Jo learned she was a candidate for a new medical stroke prevention procedure at the new heart hospital adjacent to the institute.

Jo was admitted to the heart hospital.

There she was placed on a heart monitor and began three days of treatment with a new drug, Tikosyn, which regulates the heart's rhythm.

For the procedure DeVille went into Jo's heart through her groin. Inside the heart,

DA officials report a misdemeanor charge of negligent homicide-motor vehicle has been filed against Marilyn McReynolds of Purcell in connection with a fatal accident in north Purcell

According to a probable cause affidavit, the victim, age 3, was on her bicycle about 7:18 p.m. September 1 at Arbor Drive and Bluestem Court, just a little south of the corner on the east

The affidavit states she was in the northbound lane of the roadway. A 2002 GMC Yukon driven by Mrs. McReynolds turned onto Arbor Drive from North Ninth traveling west.

The vehicle turned south onto Bluestem Court. Mrs. McReynolds said the setting sun made it difficult to see when she struck



Stop impaired driving

Dear Editor:

Oklahoma holiday festivities that include alcohol will be setting up prime opportunities for impaired motorists to be on our roads. AAA Oklahoma warns, if you feel differently, you're going to drive differently.

During National Impaired Driving Prevention Month drivers need to remember that illicit drugs and also prescription and overthe-counter medications can impair their ability to drive safely. When combined with alcohol, they can be even more deadly.

AAA's free RoadwiseRx.com allows you to enter prescription and over-the-counter drugs to learn if they may have an effect on safe driving as well as their interactions with each other.

The responsibility to drive sober or not drive at all if you have been drinking can't be neglected. Have a game plan before heading out the door.

These days, there is no excuse to get behind the wheel while buzzed when there are so many alternative options to get home safely - designated driver, taxis and ride shares such as Uber and Lyft. You can also call a sober family member or friend for a ride home.

While it might not be a happy conversation, they will be thankful they received a call from you rather than a knock at the door from a police officer.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 885 people nationwide lost their lives in traffic crashes involving a drunk driver during December 2017. Three died in alcohol/drug-related crashes on Oklahoma roads during the Christmas holiday period last year, according to the Oklahoma Highway Safety Office. Fourteen were seriously injured.

Be a responsible host if the celebration is at your home: keep plenty of non-alcoholic beverages on hand and be prepared to take the keys away from any of your impaired guests and arrange for them to get home safely or make them spend the night on your sofa.

Oklahoma law enforcement agencies are increasing patrols and checkpoints throughout the holiday season to keep roads safe, according to the Oklahoma Highway Safety Office. Several ENDUI activities are planned across the state during the holiday season as a part of the national "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign. These high-visibility patrols and sobriety checkpoints have demonstrated success in getting impaired drivers off our roads.

If you see someone driving that you suspect is impaired, ask a passenger to call *55 or 911 or pull over to a safe spot on the side of the road to make the call.

During the 2017 New Year's holiday period, zero alcoholrelated fatalities were reported by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol! Let's start now with focused attention on safe celebrating to prevent unnecessary loss of lives the entire 2018 holiday season.

With the holiday season coming to a close, those who work in and around the State Capitol will now heavily focus on what lies in wait: the 2019 regular session of the Oklahoma Leg-

Lurene was born September 18, 1936, in Wayne, Okla. She was one of four children born to James Floyd West and Winnie (Wyatt) West.



like if there were no Christmas? What would our world be like if God had not come (Josh. 6) This was all done with among us as a child?

Of course, if there were no no Easter. There would be no parable of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son or Sermon on the Mount. There would be no Pentecost because there would be no followers of Jesus.

For believers, most all of us would believe in the one God, the God of Abraham, Moses and the prophets. We would still be good people, of course, but the God that we pray to would be the God of the Old Testament.

He is a God who created a world that is good, yes. But he is also a God who destroys his people by a flood. He is a God who tests Abraham by telling him to sacrifice his only son. He is a warrior God who encourages Joshua to burn down the walls of Jericho kill-Joshua's army in its plans.

What would our world be spared all the gold, silver and bronze so that these could be put in the Temple of the Lord. God's approval.

He is a God whom we know Christmas there would also be mostly by poetic metaphor - a Shepherd, a Mother, a Father, a Spirit. He is a God who lives in the clouds and whose name cannot be pronounced. Our Veteran of the Week is Korean War Veteran Leonard Tucker of Oklahoma City. We were able express our appreciation to him as we introduced him to over 150 fellow veterans. We also presented a military cap representing his service during the Korean War. Many of those who we have recognized over the years tell me that no one had ever said thank you for your service before we did.

There were over 280 veterans and surviving spouses who were assisted last week with their claims and questions. When we first started helping veterans and their families, I thought that we would have everyone in our community taken care of within 10 years. Needless to say, that did not happen, and each week we are continuing to have from 40 to 50 veterans who never had a claim for VA benefits before.

Many of them are from our surrounding three or four counties who never thought they deserved benefits even though Weekly Worship Service they suffered injuries while on active duty. Another group we are seeing increased numbers who are filing for benefits are members of the National Guard

and Reserve. One of the reasons for this is the large number of them who have been activated to serve overseas. Many of them who were not activated are only recently finding out that they are eligible to file for VA benefits if they were injured while traveling to or from their unit. Veterans can file for disability from an injury that occurred on federal orders (summer camp).

A few years ago I worked a Kid's Choir and Bible Study, veteran who was injured in a deadly auto accident in 1959 while traveling to his summer office@fbcwashington.com, camp. He had been released from the Oklahoma Guard because of his permanent disability. We obtained a Line of Dale K. Graham Veteran's Duty report and requested service connection of the disability that occurred back then. When his claim for VA benefits was approved, he was rated at 100 percent. His question to me was why did not anyone let him that he could have been receiving that benefit for the last 50 years?

My answer is what I tell our visitors each week. The VA is not going to knock on any one's door to tell them that they may be eligible for VA Benefits. It's up to the veteran or surviving spouse to find someone or an organization like ours whose only goal is to help them with their VA claims and questions.

There should never be a cost All of us at our Veterans from anyone to help you to file Foundation understand the for benefits. One thing that we do differently than most other organizations is we file evidenced based claims. Before the 21-526 EZ form is sent to week transporting 40 veterans more than 1200 miles.

In the mailbag from the VA this week we received more 350 pieces of mail including VA decision letters for 30 veterans who received a rating at 100 percent. These folks will receive \$1,207,395 on an annual basis. Sixty-seven veterans were awarded benefits at the rate of 10-90 percent and will receive \$1,178,670 on an annual basis. Four surviving spouses were awarded benefits and will annually receive




