The annual Purcell 5K Lake Run is set for Saturday, June 30, at the Purcell City Lake.

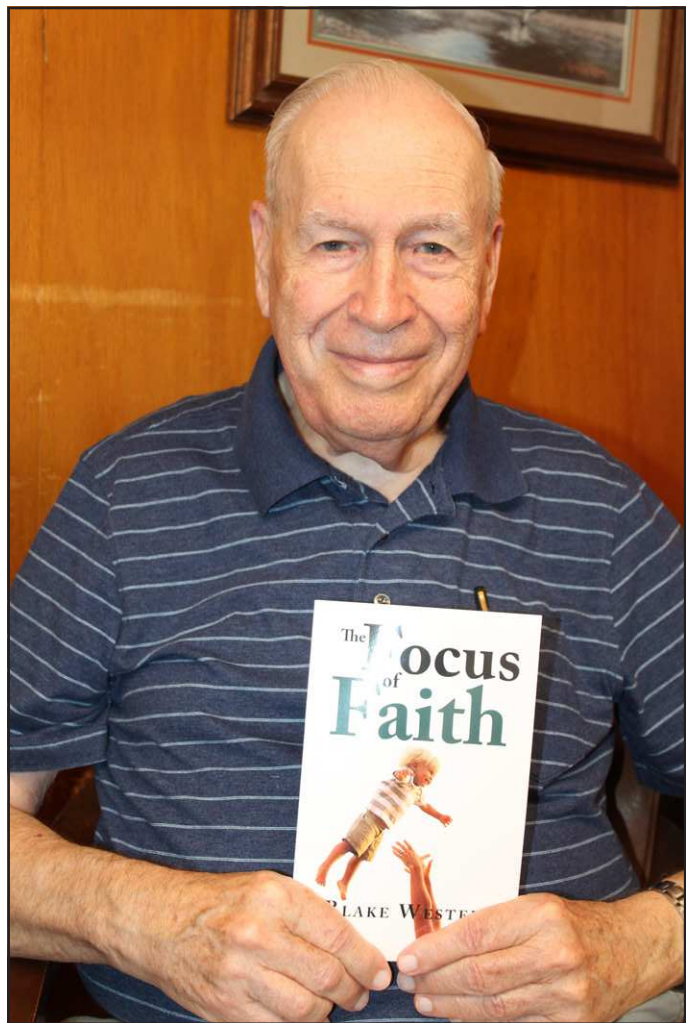
The run will start at the Rotary pavilion, located west of the old north pavilion.

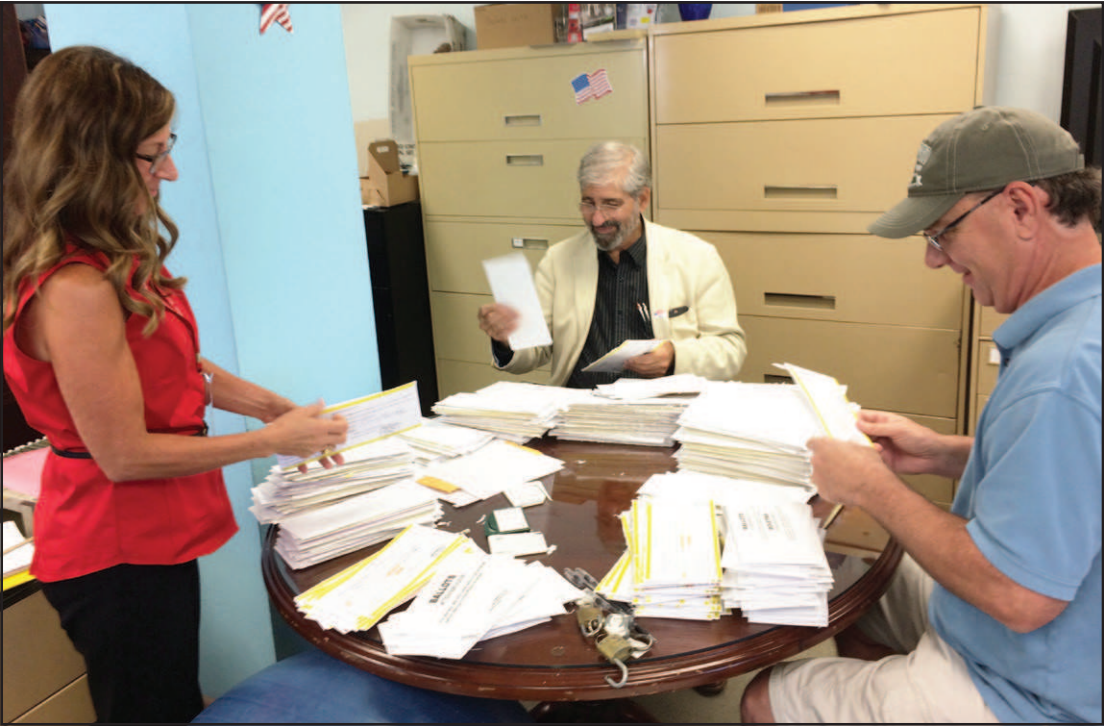

Sun safety

As summer hits Cleveland County, I would like to take a moment to spread some safety tips for avoiding sun overexposure and heat exposure.

All too often we catch ourselves having to work in the sun. Camps, pools, mowing lawns, and working animals are just some activities that are done during the summer.

Serious sunburns, especially during childhood and adolescence, can increase the chances of developing malignant melanoma, one of the most serious and deadly forms of skin cancer.

Unprotected skin can be harmed by UV rays in as little as 15 minutes, yet it can take up to 12 hours for skin to show

the full effects of sun exposure.

Summer also brings prolonged high temperatures that can cause illness and even death. The elderly, children, and people with certain medical conditions such as heart disease are at greatest risk.

Even young and healthy individuals can succumb to heat if they participate in strenuous physical activities during hot weather.

- Drink plenty of fluids, especially water. The recommended amount of water intake per day is nine-13 cups (more if you're in the conditions longer).

- Avoid caffeinated drinks. Caffeine dehydrates you and can cause heat related illness faster.

- Relax and avoid strenuous activity, especially after noon,

when the heat is highest.

Adults of all ages – and especially children – should take steps against sun exposure from April through September:

- Use sunscreen rated SPF-30 or higher with both UVA and UVB protection. Remember that last year's sunscreen may not still be effective – check the expiration date on the packaging.

- Apply sunscreen half an hour before you go outside for full effectiveness.

- Seek shade, especially during midday when the sun's rays are strongest and do the most damage. Avoid direct exposure between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., and seek shade under an umbrella

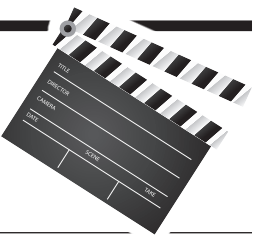

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Just a couple new releases this week.

One of them is one of my most anticipated summer movies of the year, featuring a land of wonders I’ve known since I was little. The other is another Jurassic Park movie.

Let’s get right to it shall we?



First up is “Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom.”

Three years after the disastrous incident at the Jurassic World theme park, the lives of the dinosaurs become threatened when the island’s once dormant volcano begins roaring to life.

Determined to save them, Claire (Bryce Dallas Howard) recruits Owen (Chris Pratt) to mount a rescue and protect the island’s remaining dinos from extinction.

What is there to even say about these movies anymore?

This is the fifth film in the Jurassic Park franchise.

Five movies and the people in this universe still haven’t figured out that messing with ancient killing machines with knives for teeth is a bad idea.

I guess that’s the whole message of these films. People as a whole are stupid and shouldn’t mess with nature. Not unless they want to become raptor food.

As if events from “The Lost World” weren’t proof enough that bringing dinosaurs to the mainland is a mind numbingly brainead idea, the geniuses here decide to do it again in this film.

Not only that, but in this movie they continue down the designer dino route that begun in the first “Jurassic World,” by creating an even more intimidating and deadly T-Rex-Velociraptor hybrid.

It goes about exactly as well as you’d expect.

Chris Pratt and Bryce Dallas Howard are back reprising their roles as Owen and Claire from the last movie, and they both give perfectly decent performances. Both solid actors, so no surprise there.

Jeff Goldblum is back too, but what you see of him in the trailer is about all you see in movie. I suppose a small cameo of Goldblum is better than no Goldblum.

Joining Claire and Owen on their rescue mission is a couple newcomers to the park, Justice Smith as Franklin and Daniella Pineda as Zia.

For better or worse, both are largely used for comedic relief in this movie, especially Franklin. Poor Franklin screams about as much as all the other characters in the “Jurassic Park” franchise combined.

I could definitely see some people finding their characters annoying, but for me they never quite crossed that line. And both certainly have a hand in keeping the film’s tone more on the light and fun side.

In fact I’d say the tone of this movie is a lot lighter than any of the other “Jurassic Park” films. It almost felt downright cartoony at times.

Sure, this movie still has people getting dismembered

and eaten by dinos, but half the scares almost seem played up for laughs.

None of that really bothered me though. I don’t mind laughing at rampaging dinosaurs.

What did bother me though was the story and the brand new character shoehorned in by the writers.

According to this movie, John Hammond (Richard Attenborough), the creator of Jurassic Park, had an old business partner named Benjamin Lockwood (James Cromwell).

Early on in this film, Claire gets a call from Lockwood’s estate, asking for a meeting. From Claire’s reaction and the way the film’s music swells, you assume this is some famous recurring character that’s appeared multiple times in the franchise. Someone everyone should know.

The problem? Lockwood has never even been mentioned once. Not a single time during any of the four previous films.

I was so confused. Everyone in the movie kept acting like this is a man we should be intimately familiar with.

Frankly, I felt like an idiot. Just a few days before I had marathoned all four “Jurassic Park” movies in the hope of being as informed as possible going into this new one, and here I was racking my brain trying to remember who this Lockwood guy was.

How could I have forgotten someone as important as Lockwood seemed to be? Turns out I hadn’t and the writers of this film were just lazy and incompetent.

It’s like they wanted to tell this story with John Hammond’s character, but since Attenborough died back in 2014, they just decided to create a Hammond replacement out of thin air and force him in the movie whether it made sense or not.

To say I was a little frustrated when I discovered Lockwood was a brand new character, and not a recurring role like the film implied, would be a vast understatement.

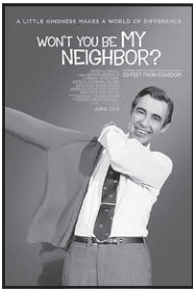
But despite Lockwood’s forced addition, I still ended up liking this movie okay.

Overall I’d rank it a little below “Jurassic World,” but above “The Lost World” and “Jurassic Park III.”

It’s not great, but it’s reasonably entertaining. It’s nowhere close to as good as the first “Jurassic Park,” but not even Spielberg could match that one.

Besides, if you want dino action on the big screen, this film is the only game in town.

“Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom” is rated PG-13.



The other movie this week is “Won’t You Be My Neighbor?”

This documentary explores the life, lessons, and legacy of the iconic children’s television host, Fred Rogers.

I wasn’t joking when I said this was one of my most anticipated movies of the summer.

I’ve wanted to see this documentary since the moment I heard about it. Then I saw the

trailer, which just about left me sobbing, and I wanted to see it even more.

Which honestly is a bit odd, since I don’t remember being a huge fan of the show as a kid.

It was only after growing up and seeing the impact Fred Rogers made on others and the legacy he left with public broadcasting in general that lead me to appreciating his life and impact on those around him.

In a day and age when it seems like everyone’s childhood heroes are coming out as sexual assaulters and rapists, it’s so refreshing to see a man like Mister Rogers who was just as wholesome in reality as he was on television.

Going into this movie I was already aware of many of the events showcased in this film.

One of which was the time Fred appeared before congress in hopes of gaining funding for PBS. If you’ve never seen that video before, I highly recommend checking it out.

The speech Mister Rogers gives Senator Pastore back in 1969, pleading his case for public broadcasting and positive messages in children’s television, is amazingly powerful in its sincerity.

Fred never raised his voice to make a point. He doesn’t have to. The man is so genuine in his earnestness, you can’t help but listen to what he has to say.

The way Fred got along with children was truly something special. And that gift was wonderfully magnified through the power of television. His show gave many children something a lot of them just didn’t have at home, a voice of reassurance.

“Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood” never shied away from traumatic current events. After all, children aren’t blind to the world around them. They know when something terrible has happened in the world, even if they don’t quite understand it.

He talked about assassina-tion the day after Robert F. Kennedy was murdered. He dedicated an entire week to death and grief after the space shuttle Challenger exploded.

He was adamant about not ignoring children’s feelings as unimportant. To quote Fred directly, “Children have very deep feelings, just the way parents do, just the way everybody does. And our striving to understand those feelings, and to better respond to them, is what I feel is the most important task in the world.”

For me, very little of this movie came across as a surprise. I knew a fair amount about Mister Rogers’ life before sitting down to watch this documentary.

I still left the theater crying my eyes out though.

It was just wonderful to see it all in one film. To see the people Fred affected and to hear them all speak so fondly about the impact he had on their lives.

If you have the opportunity, I highly recommend checking out this documentary.

It doesn’t have the super-heroes, explosions, or giant monsters that other summer movies do, but what it lacks in action, it more than makes up for in sincerity.

“Won’t You Be My Neighbor?” is rated PG-13.

Children:

About an hour later, the Times reported, her son’s name was called. Mother and son stood up, and over Ms. Ortiz’s loud protests, Anthony was led away. A 12-year-old girl went with him.

As recently as Thursday, Anthony did not know that his mother was 900 miles away.

The effect on a child separated from his parent is devastating. Extensive research has shown that both the long- and short-term implications are disastrous.

“The effect is catastrophic,” Charles Nelson, a pediatrics professor at Harvard Medical School, told The Washington Post. “There’s so much research on this that if people paid attention at all to the science, they would never do this.”

When that bill pass out of full committee, the House will be expected to vote on all 12 measures, which will move the appropriations process forward in a timely manner, avoiding threats like government shut-

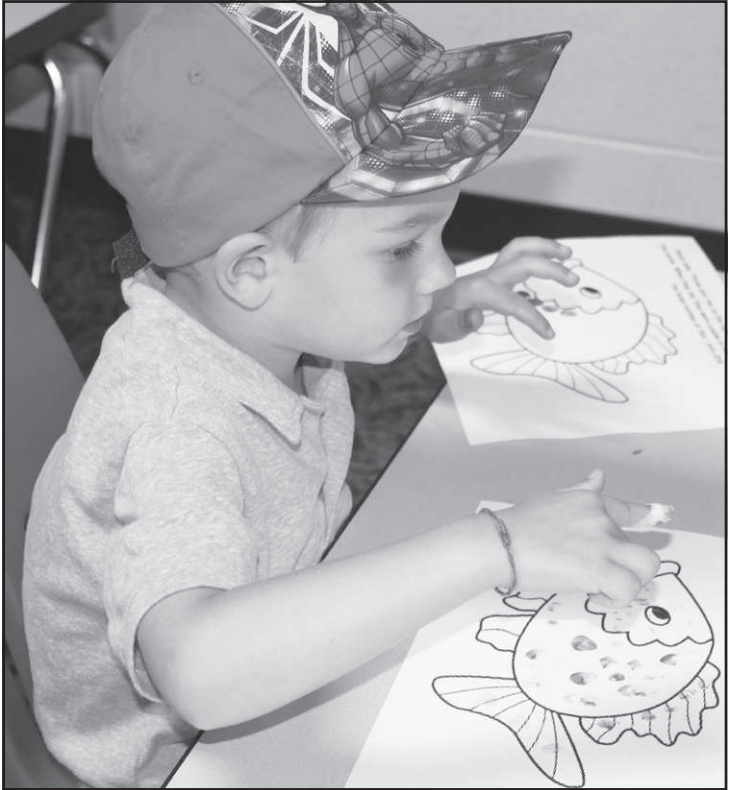
downs.

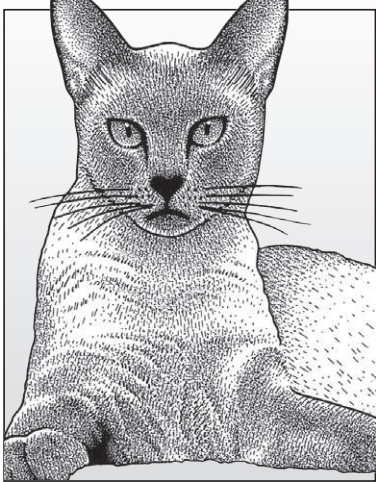



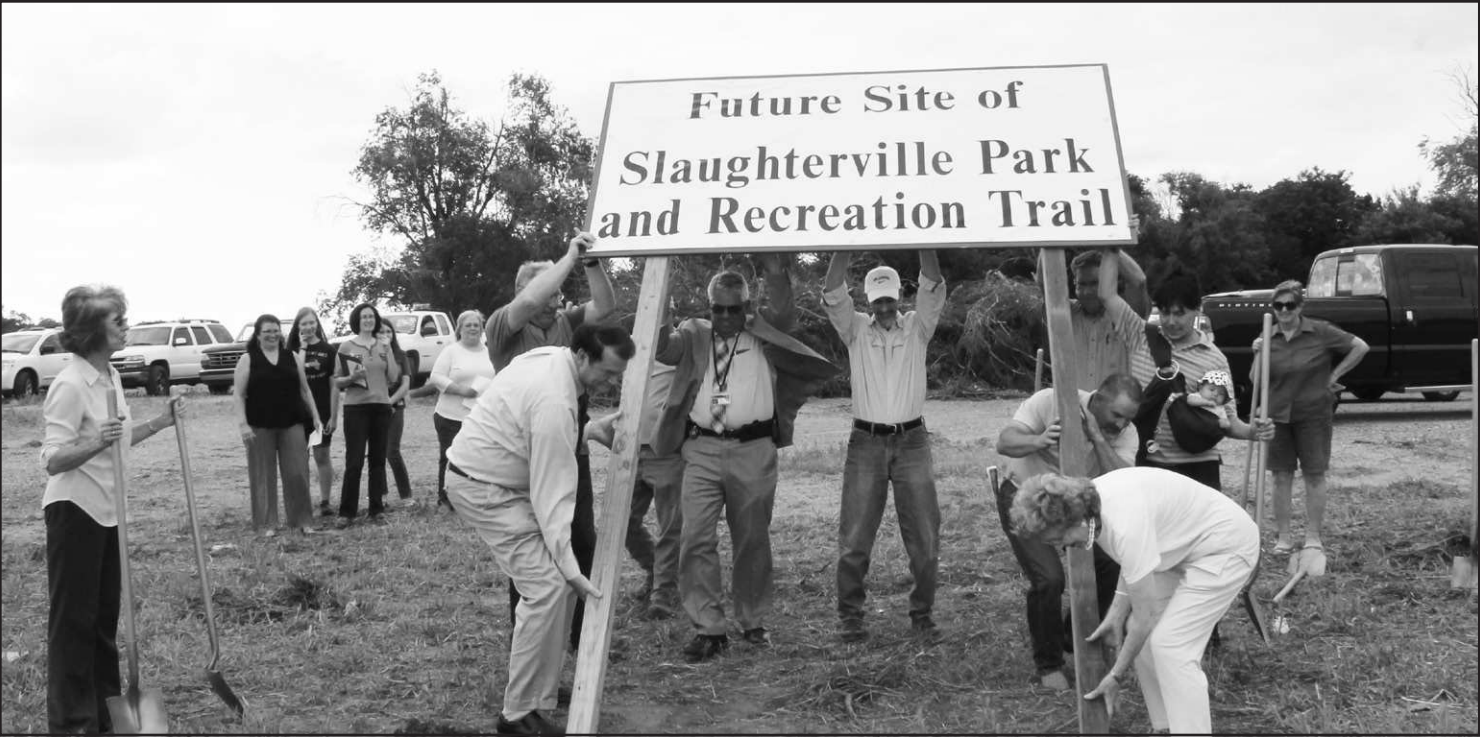

Before breaking ground June 19 for the new Slaughterville Park and Recreation Trail, supporters of the project first had to raise a sign on the site east of town hall on Slaughterville Road.

Sign raising starts work on park project

Though billed as a ground breaking, the first physical action at the 80-acre site Slaughterville is developing as a park with recreational trails was a sign raising on June 19.

“This is an exciting time here in Slaughterville,” Mayor Steve Easom told the gathering. “We as citizens have a great opportunity here in Slaughterville.”

The park is located at 7775 Slaughterville Road, about a

quarter-mile east of the town hall.

Easom remarked that Slaughterville is “country to the core but close to the big city.”

Speaking for the town’s land planning and development committee, Keith Strevett offered a brief history of the committee’s work, starting in 2014 when members drafted a 30-year plan for the tract.

Town administrator Marsha Blair then told committee

members they needed to implement the plan.

The committee designated the fitness trail as the first milestone, to be completed within the first 10 years.

A proposal was submitted to the Oklahoma State Parks Recreational Trails Program which in September 2017 awarded the town a \$200,000 reimbursable grant.

The town must pay all construction expenses and then

may request reimbursement of 80 percent of eligible expenses.

The 8-foot wide trail will be winding, asphalt paved and a half-mile in length, Strevett said. It will terminate at a scenic pond.

There will also be a parking area, pavilion with picnic tables and low-impact fitness stations along the trail.

Completion is expected in 2019.

Local artist teaches photography classes

Classes held at ARTesian Gallery

Tanya Lowrance of Sulphur has planned a series of photography classes aimed at equipping shutterbugs with all of the insight, knowledge and skills needed to capture the perfect image.

The ARTesian Gallery & Studios, 100 W. Muskogee St., in Sulphur will host each class 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., once a month until September.

Lowrance has been involved with art since early childhood, when she enjoyed drawing tablets and colored pencils.

Her artistic inclination was shaped and supported by teachers and mentors in grade school, through college and still today. Now, she returns the favor by teaching art every chance she gets, whether it be at the college level or with community classes.

She’s a multimedia artist who creates and appreciates art which tells a story or allows the viewer to become emotionally involved with the piece. Much of Lowrance’s work reflects simple rural Oklahoma scenes and landscapes.

Lowrance’s photography classes at the ARTesian Gallery & Studios are \$10 per session

and can be taken independently, no requirement to attend them all. Dates and topics are as follows.

July 21 - Composition

The class will cover the different theories, techniques and rules involved in framing and composing appealing images. Following composition guidelines makes it easier to arrange the subjects and objects of an image on the fly. As an example, the well-known “rule of thirds” uses a grid which divides the image into three horizontal and three vertical sections.

The dividing lines and intersectional points of the grid make for quick and easy compositional reminders.

August 11 - Black and White Images

The class will focus on the simplicity of black and white images. Leaving out the color brings many of the core components in an image to the foreground. Shapes, contours, light, shadows and composition are all accentuated in black and white, or grayscale, photography.

September 22 - Shutter Speed

The class will focus on

manipulating shutter speeds for night photography and for shooting “silky” water. The class will work with long shutter speeds, which opens the camera’s sensor to light for an extended duration, so a tripod is recommended to reduce

unwanted blur.

The ARTesian Gallery & Studios is open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday-Friday, and 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday.

“I like doing it because I’m getting to see all my friends coming in to get sno cones.”

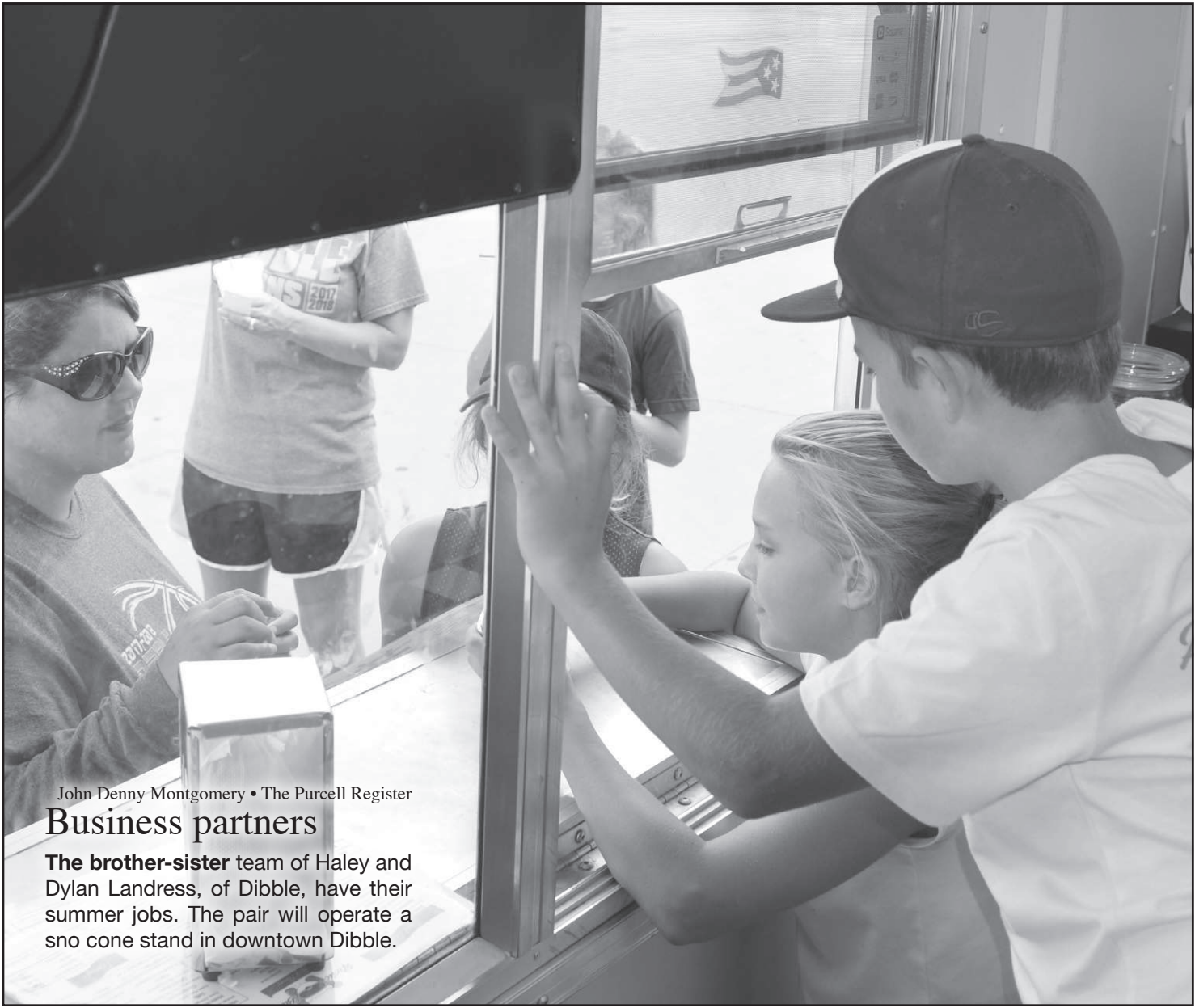
Haley said business has been “really good” the first two days.

in the United States Army during World War II.

The veterans and surviving spouses who visit us each week are some of the luckiest when it comes to receiving the VA benefits for which they are eligible. Two hundred and ninety-one veterans and spouses made the trip for assistance with their claims and questions.

During the last few weeks, we have been reaching our building capacity by 6:30 a.m. We have benches out front for those who did not make it in early enough to be signed in. As we continue to grow, there will be a need for more people to help us make a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served in the military.

To those of you who would like to be a part of what we do, please stop by for a volunteer application. We could also use another safe driver or two to help Clayton, Terry, and Louie transport veterans to our location or the OKC VA hospital for their medical appointments. Last week they spent 71 hours transporting 18 veterans more than 1,100 miles.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I'm able to access the veteran's files in the VA computer system. This allows us to view the evidence the VA upon which the VA relied on to deny a veteran's claim for benefits. We then have the information to determine what is needed for the VA to approve the veteran's application for service-connection of a dis-

ability. Having this option has enabled us to better help more veterans receive VA disability benefits.

Last week I received the following rating decisions on the veterans who we represent. Twenty-one veterans were awarded a 100 percent disability rating for their service-connected disabilities. Those awarded rating decisions ranging from 10-90 percent will receive an annual combined amount of \$585,738 per year.

Two surviving spouses were approved for DIC, Pension or aid and attendance benefits based on their veteran's military service. They will receive a combined annual amount of \$30,795 per year.

For those veterans who have not stopped by our location in Norman any Tuesday or Thursday morning, please consider this an open invitation to do so. We have 300 veterans and surviving spouses who visit us each week for assistance with their VA claims and questions about VA benefits. We don't advertise for people to come to us for help, but someone has referred them to us. Some of our volunteers have been helping other veterans and surviving spouses for more than 20 years.

The first veteran I helped receive VA benefits was awarded a 100 percent rating in the early 90s for his wounds and chronic PTSD. Until his death, that veteran suffered from the physical and mental disabilities that happened to him in Vietnam. I believe that many of the men and women who volunteer with us know that the time they spend helping our veterans and their families is also improving the life of that volunteer.

As most of you know, we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit and the funds we use to operate this organization come from the people we help or from local grants. Each month we spend close to \$30,000 in direct aid to veterans and their families. This money is used to pay for the operation of our transportation vans, food items, medical testing, rent, utilities and a host of other unforeseen expenses that many of the people have.

At one time I would say to a veteran on their first trip to see us to pick out the color of a new truck that they would like to have. What we were giving them was hope that maybe their lives would change for the better if they were approved for VA benefits. Many thousands of the veterans and surviving spouses we have helped over the years were living on social security benefits of under \$1,000 per month when they visited us for the

first time.

Since the beginning of this mission to help the men and women who served in our military we have had thousands of veterans awarded VA Disability Compensation. Currently, we are close to representing 20,000 veterans and surviving spouses with their VA applications for benefits. I'm very proud to be a Marine veteran and to be serving other veterans and their families. We are always looking for a few good men and women to join our team of volunteers at our Veterans Foundation so please stop and have a firsthand look at what we are doing to make this world a better place.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at 1268 North Interstate Drive Norman, OK 73072. Chickasaw Nation highlights artistic works of weaver Tyra Shackelford

Tyra Shackelford has prepared a selection of her award-winning, hand-woven textiles to show through June and July at the ARTesian Gallery & Studios, 100 W. Muskogee St. in Sulphur. Her exhibit is open to the public at no charge.

Shackelford specializes in three pre-European weaving techniques: finger weaving, twining and sprang.

The name of the technique tells the story for finger weaving and twining.

Finger weaving is a ver-

satile technique which uses only fingers and leaves out the loom. Usual finger-woven items include belts, sashes and straps. Patterns like the simple diagonal weave, chevrons, lightning bolts and diamonds are all achieved with slight changes to the weaving process.

Twining, much like the material by the same name, is the process of interlacing strands in a winding pattern to make textiles.

It’s the sprang technique

which leaves folks scratching their heads upon first hearing of it and standing in awe when first seeing the finished product.

Sprang weaving is an ancient technique for producing textiles with a natural elasticity owing more to the weave than the fabric.

Any number of garment styles can be created with sprang, including lace and elegant women’s finery.

A prime example is Shackelford’s sprang creation “The Lady,” which is a part of the permanent collection at the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art in Indiana. It is a visually delicate piece, almost spectral.

Technique is not the only common thread running through Shackelford’s work; there’s also inspiration.

“I take my inspiration from prehistoric artifacts, Mississippian iconography, and Chickasaw culture and stories,” Shackelford said.

In her own words, she expresses cultural identity as a Chickasaw artist by “integrating traditional techniques and materials with innovative shapes and forms.”

Her father, Randy Shackelford, introduced her to Chickasaw culture and traditions as a child by attending stomp dances, language classes, stickball games, and art and craft classes. She learned finger weaving at the age of 12 from a Seminole elder, Wisey Narcomey, who she danced with at stomp dances.

Early on, she focused on perfecting and presenting traditional techniques. Now, Shackelford has successfully expanded these traditional crafts into a conceptual art

form. Though, she still uses her work to educate others about Chickasaw culture.

Since 2011, her art has been shown in numerous native art markets, shows, and exhibitions across the United States.

In addition to her exhibit at the ARTesian, Shackelford’s work is a component of a traveling exhibit called “Visual Voices: Contemporary Chickasaw Art.” Stops on this traveling show include the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art, Mississippi Museum of Art, Briscoe Western Art Museum and Institute of American Indian Art’s Museum of Contemporary Native Arts.

For nearly a decade, Shackelford has taken home first, second and third place awards--returning year after year at festivals and markets such as: the Santa Fe Indian Market, Cherokee Art Market, Eiteljorg Indian Market and Festival, Red Earth, Artesian Arts Festival and Southeastern Art Show and Market.

Shackelford, a Purcell High School graduate, is one of many artist with a current presence at the ARTesian Gallery & Studios.

Also on display are the works of Paula Loftin, Billy Hensley, Mary Ruth Barnes, Brent Greenwood, Elihu Johnson, Shawn Harjo and Juanita Hanna, among others.

Their creations consist of photographs, paintings, jewelry, basketry, pottery and beadwork.

Five separate studio spaces are also occupied by various artists. Joanna Underwood Blackburn, James Blackburn, Margaret Wheeler and Patta

This past week renowned Fox News journalist Charles Krauthammer lost a battle with cancer that he thought he would be able to win. But Mr. Krauthammer graciously gave up the fight a few weeks ago, writing that he had done what he was meant to do and that he had no regrets. I could not help but admire his stoicism as he faced the end.

One analyst said that Mr. Krauthammer may have been the smartest man in the world. To hear him speak, to read his writing, you have little doubt that was the case.

The night after his death, I watched with interest as Fox rehearsed Krauthammer's amazing life, illustrating his brilliance at every turn. I particularly was intrigued with his view of God.

"I don't believe in God," he said with an honest smile, "but I fear him greatly."

That paradoxical quote gripped me this week as I thought of his conclusion about life, and I even lamented that—despite his unparalleled secular brilliance—he had failed to come to an understanding of the greatest truths known to man. There is, without a doubt, a deep sadness in his quote about God; but it is curiously refreshing as well.

It is refreshing that he was

honest enough to admit that he really could not figure out this phenomenon of God. He could not deny categorically God's existence, as some presumptuous philosophers do.

The dilemma of a power much higher than we and the empirical evidence the eye cannot reasonably deny were far too great for this honest man to dismiss with a wave of the hand. Admirably, he refused to do that.

Krauthammer had spent many long nights, no doubt, gazing at the stars and studying the vastness of the solar system, wondering what was out there, what was there that was far too big for his understanding.

Unlike some atheists or agnostics who arrogantly lash out at the thought of God, Mr. Krauthammer seemed to long to know more, to believe. But there was a threshold in his thinking that blocked his ability to grasp the God of the Bible and to cling to Him with all that he had.

The sadness is that Mr. Krauthammer had all the intellectual advantages. Despite being crippled during medical school due to a pool accident, he had the mental strength not to allow his tragedy to change the course of his life. He proceeded with medical school and branched out

deeply into other disciplines before launching into political journalism.

But one discipline seemed to evade him forever: the discipline of faith. Even though he dabbled in Judaism, he never seemed able to lay aside human reasoning and intellect and grasp Jesus Christ, putting all his hope, faith, and dreams into the Rock of Ages. He knew that when he looked into the vastness of the universe he was looking into an awesome infinity, but he never understood that the answer to the infinity problem is the eternal Alpha and the Omega.

His final conclusion, unfortunately, came in the form of a question instead of an answer.

Oh that honest men could come to the place where Peter comes years ago and pose a different question and give a different answer: "Lord," says Peter, "to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life" (John 6:66).

Like Krauthammer, Peter, looks into the eyes of Infinity and faces a life-defining question. Peter's is, "To whom shall we go?"

Mr. Krauthammer's answer was to go to good works.

Peter chooses to follow the good Shepherd.

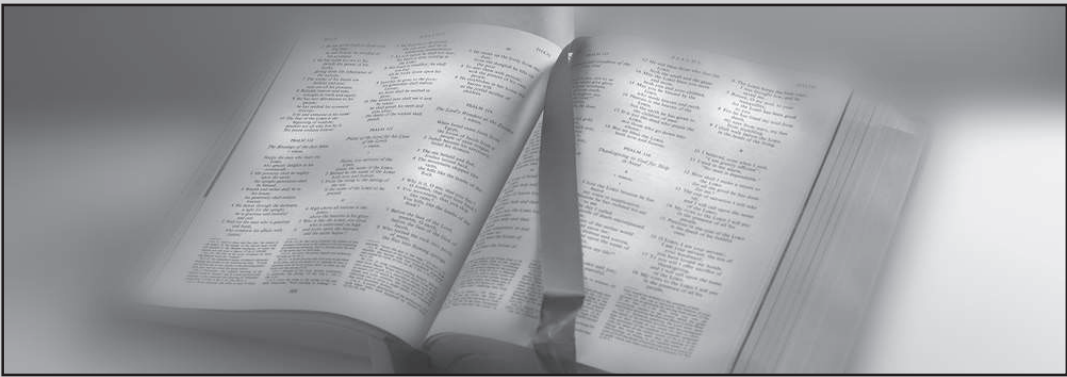

Of the four winds, come worshipers, come apostles, come faithful to gather around the Messiah. Of the four winds, the prophecy says that all nations will be blessed. The hope born of unity with God and tends to unify with him.

In history, sometimes hope has been misinterpreted. There are many detours away from the evangelical essence of this theological virtue: fatalism, despair, suspicion, spiritual nervousness. It reminds me of the Thessalonians, who were confused yet believed the coming of Jesus was imminent.

Paul writes two letters to make them realize that the true meaning of hope in God is direction and the meaning of life. The wait is not distance without personal implications.

It is close, because we know that “God is near, at the very gates”, which is close to us. Not only in time, because God is eternity, but in space, because God is love and is life.

There is a written document about hope by Pope Benedict: Spe Salvi, which relates to the Pauline expression, “in hope we were saved.” There I find this sentence:

“Let us say once again: we need the greater and lesser hopes that keep us going day by day. But these are not enough without the great hope, which must surpass everything else. This great hope can only be God, who encompasses the whole of reality and who can bestow upon us what we, by ourselves, cannot attain. The fact that it comes to us as a

gift is actually part of hope.” (Spe Salvi, 31).

Finally, here is a note on the concept of final day or the end of the world. Some sects exaggerated destruction, neglecting the redemptive meaning of the offering of Jesus. From the harmony God wants the good of mankind.

We should not move the fear of a universal catastrophe but love the kingdom of God who recapitulates all things in Christ. That is the true closeness of hope in God.

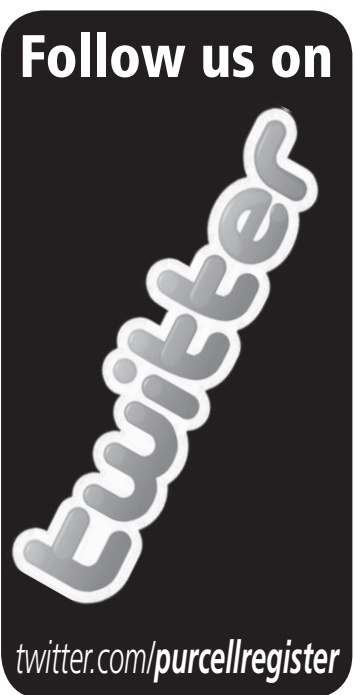

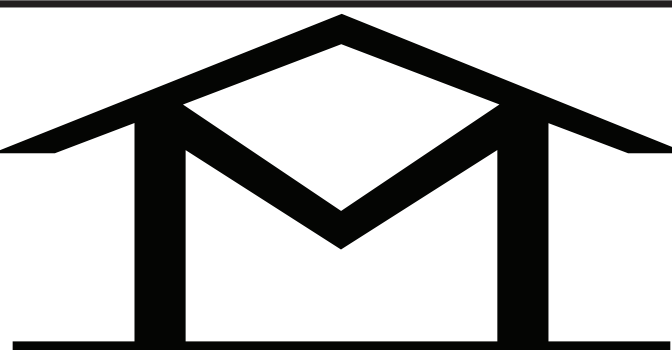

Hometown hero

Taliban ambush killed Steven Shephard in 2005

From the time he was 4 years old, Steven Shephard wanted to fly.

“He wanted to fly,” said his mother, Barbara Shephard. “He would watch the birds – how they were able to take off, land, glide. He was fascinated.

“Every kid has a talent. They all just need a chance.”

It wasn’t a passing interest.

By the time Steven graduated from Purcell High School in 1993, he’d earned his pilot’s license at the University of Oklahoma.

He graduated in 1998 with a bachelor’s degree in aviation from Oklahoma State University, where he was captain of his flight team during his senior year.

After college, he got a job teaching flying at the Air Force Academy.

He spent one year at the academy and then took a job teaching flying at Kansas State University. He stayed there 18 months.

It was a different, post-9-11 world by then and in March 2002, Steven enlisted in the Army.

“He had a guarantee of an aviation spot going in to the Army,” Barbara said. “All he had to do was get through boot camp and Officer Candidate School.”

The Army even gave him his choice of what he wanted to fly.

All of his experience until then was flying fixed-wing aircraft. Steven opted for the Apache AH64 Longbow, a helicopter gunship.

In January 2005, the Army deployed him to Iraq.

He was in Iraq six months, flying a variety of missions daily.

On June 27, 2005, that mission was to provide security for the military’s peace talks with the Taliban.

“They got ambushed,” Barbara said.

The Taliban fired a Russian-made SS16 missile that took out the Apache’s hydraulics, sending it crashing to the ground approximately 20 miles north of Baghdad.

The SS16, a black market weapon, is the equivalent to our Stinger missile, Barbara said.



Hero:

The Apache carries a crew of two – a pilot in command and a gunner. The crew regularly traded jobs for training purposes. That day, Steven, a chief warrant officer 2, was the pilot in command and CW4 Keith Marriotti was gunner. Both were killed instantly.

Until their Apache was downed, the military was unaware the enemy had the SS16 missiles.

Barbara was in Springfield, Ill., that day when she heard a news report that an Apache helicopter was shot down and its two pilots killed.

“They had to tell me by phone” that Steven was one of the dead.

The Army had sent two from Ft. Sill to notify Steven’s wife, Meleah, who had moved back to Purcell from North Carolina to be near her parents while she awaited the birth of her daughter.

She was six months pregnant when widowed.

“The Taliban meant to capture the ship when it crashed,” Barbara said. “They were prepared to retrieve it. But there were Marines on the ground.”

Initially, the Marines were told to not go to the crash site.

“But a medic went in and got my son out,” Barbara said.

Marriotti’s remains were recovered later.

The ambush set out Operation Falcon’s Fury, a combined operation of the Air Force, Army and Marines. It included three days of house-to-house searches for enemy combatants and round-the-clock bombings.

“We’ll never know if they got the ones who fired the missile, but they rounded up a lot of them,” Barbara said.

Steven’s body was accompanied home by one of his friends. He was laid to rest July 6 at Hillside Cemetery.

One month later Purcell’s airport was renamed Steven E. Shephard Field in his honor.

And in 2009, a section of Interstate 35 was designated CW2 Steven Shephard Memorial Highway.

Life has gone on for those he left behind.

Meleah has remarried and now lives at Moore. Barbara sees her often – and also Meleah and Steven’s daughter, Sierra, who will be 13 in September.

“She is smart, funny and looks like her mom,” Barbara said. “But she has so many traits of Steven which is

strange. She never even knew him.”

Sierra studies and loves all animals.

Her stepfather has raised her since she was 3, but hasn’t formally adopted her. He says that will be her decision when she turns 18. For now, she goes by the last name Shephard-Blaze.

“When I think about it, it’s like it was yesterday,” Barbara said. “People tell you that you need to get over it or it will get better with time. No, you just learn how to live with it.”

She visits his grave “probably more than I should” even though she knows he’s not there.

She’s heard it all, too, from those who claim the war on terror is about oil or we went into Iraq to feed the ego of then-President George W. Bush.

She sees it differently.

“Most soldiers don’t express their opinions,” she said. “I don’t know any soldier who wants war. It’s the fact, you stand up and take an oath.”

Three months after Steven was killed, the Army released its official report.

By that time, the family had spoken with other pilots and Steven’s friends enough that they were able to ask questions.

It was how they found out about the black market missile.

“The Army only gives you what they want you to know up front,” she said. “The Army always sent people who didn’t know anything. I don’t think that was their intent, but it was the fact they were here and it happened over there.

“I try to remember this for my grand-

daughter. One day she is going to want to know. He was going to learn to fly helicopters, get out and fly for the government.”

What he really wanted was to fly for the Customs Service – but not a one-seater plane.

“They get shot down too easily,” he told his mother.

A 'Can-Do' man

John Hughes was a perfect fit for the Seabees

John Hughes has lived every one of his 91 years with a can-do attitude.

So it's little wonder the Seminole County native was a Navy Seabee during the waning months of World War II.

After all, the Seabees have always been the "Can-Do Boys."

Hughes, now a resident of Lexington Nursing Home, recalled a Seabee slogan — "The difficult took a while; the impossible took just a little bit longer."

He enlisted in the Navy before sharing his decision with family.

"Papa was afraid of water. He raised hell when he found out I went in the Navy," Hughes recalled.

He entered the service in July 1945 and went through boot camp at San Diego, followed by more training at Camp Parks north of Oakland.

By Christmas Eve he was overseas, first stop Hawaii. From there he shipped to Guam and eventually Okinawa and Saipan.

He remembers the sailors on deck chanting "Golden Gate in '48" as their ships headed west.

It was a period of flux in the Pacific, where the Japanese surrender on V-J

Day officially ended hostilities in World War II.

"I went in the 134th Seabees," he said. "The next day it was the 109th and the day following the 103rd. At one time our battalion had 52 people. Within days it was up to 1,000."

Hughes was with Seabees who rebuilt typhoon shelters on Okinawa. At some of their island stops, they encountered Japanese soldiers living in caves, unaware the war was over.

"I was in charge of enlisted welfare and recreation," he said, "and I drew 10 prisoners each day. I had some of them talking English. They were nice old boys, just like we were. They thought Hirohito was God and what he said, they did or tried to do."

Hughes, who was a machine gunner, ran into bureaucratic red tape when the Navy kicked back his promotion to a specialist A rating.

The promotion was saved, albeit with some changes, when an officer tested Hughes on knot-tying. He came out of that a bosun's mate third class.

From the tropical Pacific, the Navy shipped Hughes to Point Barrow, Alaska.

'Can-Do':

The temperature was minus 73 degrees the day he arrived at the base which is north of the magnetic pole.

In addition to the brutal cold, it's a place where the sun never sets. Hughes missed chow his first day there because he was waiting for dusk before heading to the mess hall.

Initially, the Navy was going to put Hughes in the M.A., a police force unit.

That wasn't to his liking and he told the personnel staff that he was a welder when he entered the outfit. So they sent him to the metal shop.

There a lieutenant commander took momentary exception to Hughes' presence.

"What the hell is a bosun's mate doing in my metal shop?" the officer asked.

Hughes explained what had happened. The officer studied him and then asked, "How many degrees are there in a circle?"

"360," Hughes replied.

"You are now a 3rd class metalsmith," the officer said.

He was at Point Barrow for seven weeks and then was ordered to Adak Island. He was supposed to serve a six-month rotation on Adak and other islands in the Aleutians. He still chuckles at the line he was fed before he was shipped to Adak.

"They told me there was a woman behind every tree," he said. "There's not a tree on that island!"

At 4-1/2 months into the rotation, it was changed to a year. And after a year, it was extended to 18 months.

The rotation was never supposed to exceed 24 months, but through another paperwork glitch, Hughes' stay in the Aleutians was 25 months.

When the Navy realized the error, they shipped Hughes out the following day on a flight to Seattle and then on to Fort Wayne, Calif.

"They sent me to Long Beach. My time was getting pretty short. They said 'We'll let you out two months early if you join the Reserves,'" Hughes said. "I got out in November 1949 and was called back in April 1950. I was down on the Blue River fishing when the notice came."

The notice gave him a scant 7 days to report to the West Coast..

He processed in at San Francisco and sailed with orders for Japan on the USS Missouri, dubbed "Truman's Mud Hog."

The ship was grounded on a sandbar at Pearl Harbor and no one was permitted off. A chief petty officer looked Hughes up and said the ship needed a welder.

"They made me temporary ship's company," he said. "They wanted a hatch in the armor plate."

He stayed aboard the Missouri for

nearly a month, during which the ship put into Japan.

"That's where I caught my boat," he said.

The USS Kermit Roosevelt was a non-rotating repair ship, named for a nephew of the late president who was killed in action during the early days of World War II.

The ship arrived in Korea during the coldest winter on record. The ship carried munitions, diesel fuel and some aircraft fuel, serving as an offshore supply depot.

Hughes said the U.S. military lost 3,000 troops at the Chosin Reservoir, which was soon dubbed "Frozen Chosin."

The troops had been sent in with no cold weather gear and many men froze to death. Hughes recalled six-by cargo trucks arriving from the reservoir with bodies "stacked like cordwood."

"The cold was worse than Alaska. It was

a wet winter and Alaska was dry," he said.

The going only got worse for the ground troops.

Hughes said the U.S. "like to have lost the war" at Pusan when units that weren't combat trained were sent to engage the North Koreans and Chinese.

According to Hughes, the war was mismanaged by Gen. Douglas MacArthur who refused to acknowledge the Chinese involvement. Also MacArthur wanted to use the atomic bomb on North Korea, an action opposed by President Harry Truman. Eventually, Truman would fire MacArthur.

In 1953 Hughes returned to the States. His time was nearly up. He left the Navy as a petty officer 2nd class and was up for promotion to 1st class.

"I should have stayed in," he said.

But the Oklahoma oilfields beckoned with what was big money at the time - \$3.25 an hour.

He worked for a time as a driller for an independent oil company, but later left the oil patch to go into the service station business.

Then one day his brother-in-law at Norman suggested he apply for a job at the physical plant at the University of Oklahoma.

"I applied and talked to the chief engineer. He asked 'When can you start?' I told him, 'Now.'"

He didn't start right then, though, because he was in dress clothes for the interview. But within an hour, he had gone home, donned work clothes and reported back.

He stayed with OU for 30 years, retiring

as shift supervisor.

"I had a lot of fun in life," Hughes said. And he's not done yet.

Though he is going blind, Hughes makes heavy use of books for the blind. He prefers westerns and detective stories.

In all, it's been a remarkable life for a man who has been a lifelong learner.

"I was in the third grade as a 6-year-old," he said. "I was reading and writing a long time before I started school."

He left school at 14. It was his sophomore year.

"I made a crop," he recalled, "19 bales of cotton, 1,500 bales of hay and 3,900 bushels of corn."

He completed his high school education and received his diploma through a correspondence course while in the Navy.



"When I got home, Mom and Dad took me out to eat overlooking the bay," New said.

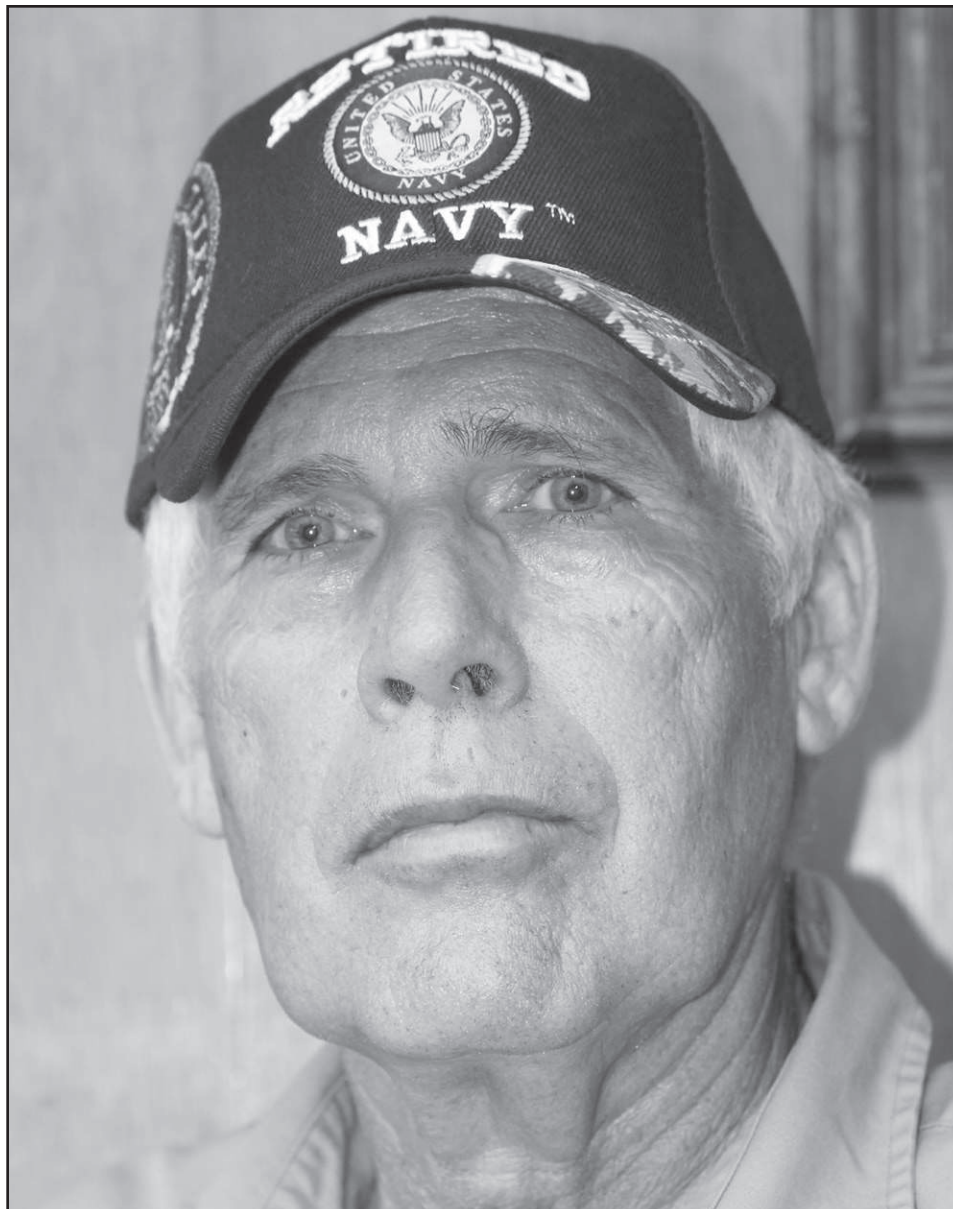
His father had been in the Navy and after leaving the service joined the Coronado Fire Department. He told New he ought to join the Navy.

and it seemed likely that any sailor would find himself bound for Southeast Asia.

Such was not New's fate, however.

After basic training, the Navy sent New to landlocked Millington, Tenn., to be trained as an aviation support technician/mechanic.

His job would be to "work on everything supporting aircraft or a carrier or naval air station," he said.

His training at Millington lasted six months. While there, New played on a base basketball team and filled out his "dream sheet" of possible assignments.

Anxious to see the world, he put in for numerous foreign ports of call.

When his orders came, he was assigned to the Naval Air Station, San Diego.

He did eventually make it offshore, though no one would consider Vieques, an island off the east coast of Puerto Rico that the Navy utilized as a gunnery range an exotic port of call.

As an active duty sailor and reservist, he also was attached to NAS North Island and NAS Key West, just 90 miles from Cuba.

In 1976 after his enlistment was up, New had joined the Navy Reserves.

As a civilian, he went to work painting aircraft. It wasn't long before he noticed previously healthy co-workers dying in their 30s – poisoned by the toxic paints used on aircraft in the 1970s and '80s.

When he was 33, New went for a ride-along with the San Diego Police Department and looked to law enforcement as his life's work.

"I thought, 'Hey, this is my calling.' It was just very exciting," he said.

He worked five years with Naval Security Forces and civilian law enforcement was enticing.

His father, who had grown up in this area, retired from the fire department and moved back to Oklahoma in the mid-1980s.

New and his wife, Brenda, followed with their family in 1988.

With no Navy Reserve unit nearby, New joined the Oklahoma Army National Guard to complete his 20 years military service with an artillery unit at Pauls Valley.

On the civilian front, he became a correctional officer at Lexington Assessment and Reception Center where he stayed for six months.

He next attended a basic police academy in Norman and on Sept. 1, 1989, joined the Purcell Police Department as a patrolman.

Before retiring from the department, he would have the rank of captain and serve as assistant police chief.

New is now employed as a code enforcement officer for the City of Purcell.

Parents signed for Butler to enlist in Navy at 17

Doug Butler found himself between a rock and a hard place in August 1955. The young Charlottesville, Va., native, five months shy of turning 18, was looking everywhere for a job so he could support his parents who were both in ill health. His father had suffered a stroke. It was peacetime, or at least as peaceful as the Cold War ever became and Butler knew he was close to being drafted. A haircut changed it all. He'd gone to his neighbor's barber shop in town and was talking about his plight. The barber knew a chief petty officer who had just retired from the Navy. He sent Butler to see the man. "He broke out books and showed me pictures," Butler recalled. "After World War II ended he was on the first Navy ship to Australia." Butler was impressed, but the Navy retiree told him his parents would have to sign for him to enter the service as a 17-year-old. His parents did sign and one of Butler's first acts in the Navy was to set up an allotment, by which a part of his pay would be sent home to care for his folks. He would return to Virginia just once, in

1959 when his father died. Butler went to basic training at Baimbridge, Md. "I was in one of the last companies before the Navy turned the base over to the Waves," he said. After basic, he stayed at Baimbridge for advanced training. "What I ended up being was a postal clerk," he said. He was ordered to Brooklyn, N.Y., to join the crew of his first ship, the USS Banner. He arrived by train at Grand Central Station and was overwhelmed by how big and crowded it was. Unsure how to reach Brooklyn, he was directed to one of the trains. There he spotted a group of sailors waiting to board. He followed them, leaving the train when they did and catching the same bus they did. Fortunately, they were also bound for the Brooklyn shipyard. "I thought I'd seen some places, but that New York City was BIG," he said. The Banner (DDR807) was a destroyer that had just been converted to a radar ship. It wasn't long before the Banner was

ordered to California with stops enroute at Cuba and the Panama Canal before making port at Long Beach.

"I was there for not quite a year," Butler said, "and then transferred to Inchon, Korea in late 1956."

The war had been over for 2-1/2 years, not that one could tell by appearances.

"It looked like the war had ended the day before I got there," Butler said. "Oh, that was a mess over there."

He drew shore duty at Inchon and when that ended was ordered to the Nuclear Weapon Training Center at San Diego for two years.

"I worked in the vault where they had top secret documents," he said, adding he had top secret clearance.

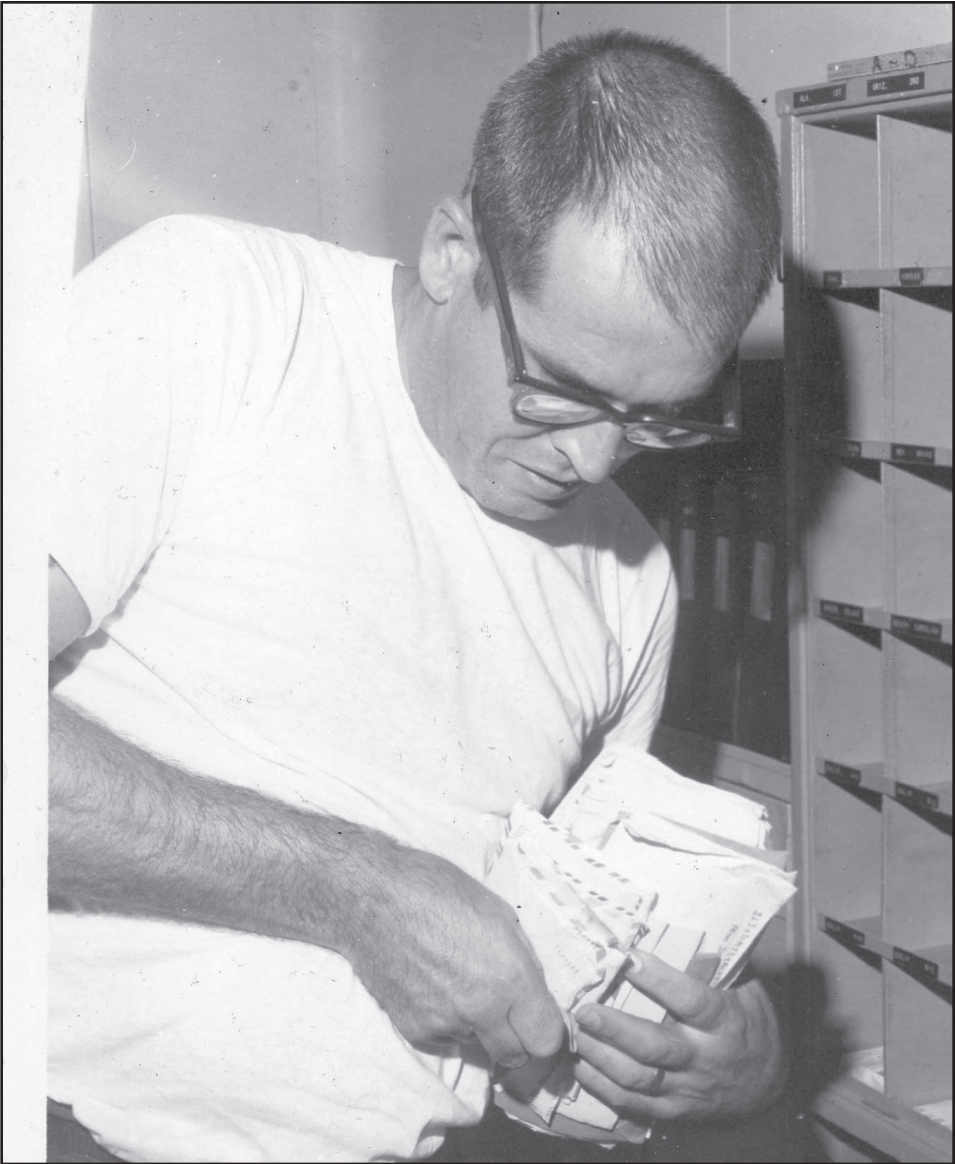
From 1961-64, he worked in a big terminal post office at Yokohama, Japan. He got orders to ship out a month before the Toyko Olympics.

His next shipboard posting was aboard the USS Cogswell (DD651) which was bound for Vietnam in 1965.

"It seems every time I went over there (Asia), it was summer and was hot, hot, hot," he said.

The Cogswell was a defense ship in Da Nang Harbor. It stayed anchored in the harbor during the day, providing artillery support to Army and Marine troops inland.

At night the ship would get underway and patrol back and forth across the harbor entrance.

It was hot and muggy. Whenever there would be a rain squall, the sailors would grab bars of soap and head up on deck where they showered in the rain.

"We were almost 300 on that little ship. My post office was right beside the mess hall," he said

The Cogswell's constant companion was the USS Independence, an aircraft carrier.

His next assignment was at the Naval Air Station at Alameda, Calif. It was there he met his wife, Patricia Nelson. She was a Choctaw Indian who came from a large family of 13 children at Durant.

She worked at Safeway and after work would stop by a neighborhood tavern with friends. He saw her there and struck up a conversation. They dated for three or four months before marrying in 1967. They were together until 2013 when Patricia died. She is buried at Durant and to this day, Butler visits her grave every two weeks to leave fresh flowers.

In 1968, Butler got orders to join the USS Saint Paul in the Philippines. It was the last all-gun cruiser in the Navy.

He would make three more tours to Vietnam aboard the Saint Paul, finding himself returning to that war in 1968, 1969 and 1970.

"One year, they shot the guns more than in the entire time the ship was in World War II," he said "It was firing day and night and almost every morning was resupplied by an ammo ship or a stores ship.

"After the 1970 cruise, I was ready to get out. I'd had enough," he said.

He left the Navy in January 1971.

A civilian for the first time in a long time, Butler went to work for a Montgomery Ward catalog store in Oakland, Calif. He stayed in that job for 16 years and then went to work repairing airplane engines for 8 years at Oakland Airport.

"Pat and I had talked a little about coming back to Oklahoma," he said.

Pat's uncle was Bobby Foraker of Maysville. Bobby's wife, Vickie, is the advertising manager at **The Purcell Register**.

"Vickie was sending us papers and we could see the prices of things here," he said.

Pat retired from Safeway after 30 years and Butler was ready to start his second retirement in 1994 when they moved to Purcell.

A boomerang life

Hanger joined Navy to see the world in 1950

Like a boomerang that's path is measured in decades instead of distance, Charles Hanger came back to his hometown of Purcell – 68 years after he left it to join the Navy and see the world.

Hanger's father owned a service station and small grocery store not far from where railroad tracks once crossed Green Avenue.

It was there Hanger was born on Jan. 25, 1932.

When Hanger was 5, the family moved to the Goins Community. That's where he started school and attended for almost three years before the family returned to Purcell.

His parents owned one of three grocery stores on Main Street.

His father had built a house for the family on 8th Avenue.

But after Pearl Harbor and the country's entry into World War II, his father moved to the city to work at Douglas Aircraft.

The elder Hanger deserted his family "out of a clear blue sky" in 1943, when Hanger was just 11 years old.

Hanger broke up with his high school sweetheart, Nonie Jackson, and, at 18, enlisted in the Navy.

He left Purcell for the induction station in Oklahoma City on Jan. 9, 1950, and was sent to San Diego, Calif., for basic training.

In 1952, he married Marilyn Potter from Lexington and they set up house-keeping in an apartment at San Diego.

Initially, he was stationed at Coronado Amphibious Base.

"I got in with a group that repaired landing craft hulls, engines and everything," he said. "I worked with them and learned a lot."

Eventually, he was assigned to APA196, an amphibious landing craft ship.

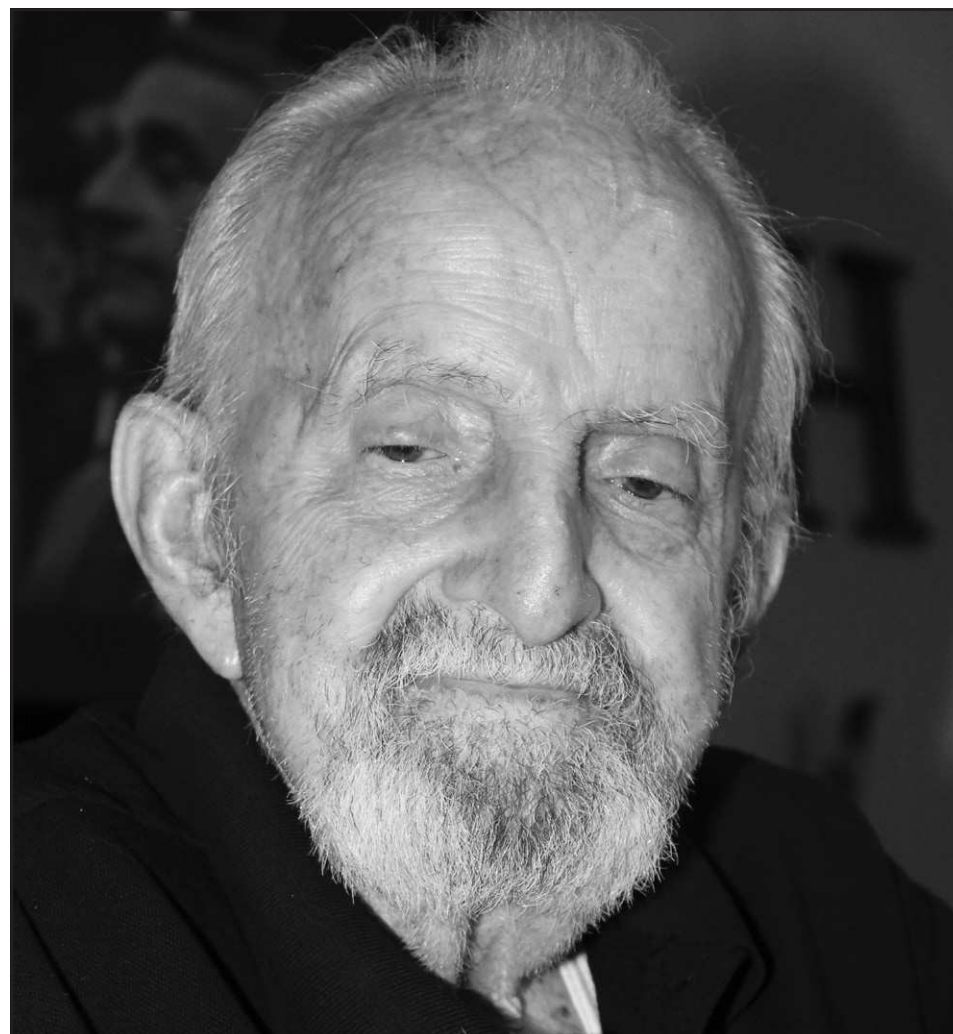
He stayed aboard ship a little over a year, serving at sea for 11 months, putting in at "about every port in the eastern Pacific."

He shipped out July 3, 1952, leaving behind a very pregnant wife.

"My daughter (Chardale) was born Aug. 2," he said. "She was 10 months old before I got to see her. That took care of the Navy as a career."

"I was in Korea when they shut the war down. I was in and out of Hong Kong, the Philippines, Iwo Jima. Don't let them tell you the Marines were the first ones

in. The Navy had to go in first.”

Among his most memorable ports of call was Hiroshima, site of the first atomic bomb ever deployed in combat.

Hanger spent a week at Hiroshima and found the Japanese people “very nice and courteous, all very congenial.”

It was much nicer than Hong Kong, where crossing a street at one point put you inside Red China.

“You always had to have a buddy with you in Hong Kong,” he added.

Hanger left the Navy when his 4-year enlistment was up and moved back to Oklahoma, settling at Ponca City.

As a teen, Hanger had worked managing the meat department for Mantooth Grocery in Purcell.

He remained friends with John Mantooth and Frank Wilson and the three went into the construction business together in Ponca City.

“I was a cabinet builder, a finish carpenter,” he said.

For 15 years, the company built homes. Then they started building commercial steel buildings and installing steel roofs on houses.

The business closed in 1983 and Hanger was supposed to go to work for another man. Instead, he struck out on his own and was self-employed for the next 22 years.

His sons, Jay and John, worked for him. Hanger closed the family business in 2015.

In 2013, Hanger went to a heart surgeon for a heart valve issue. It was determined he’d suffered a heart attack years earlier and that he was living with what was in effect half a heart. Only the two top chambers are functioning.

“The Lord had been good to me and let me survive it,” he said.

Marilyn died in 2016.

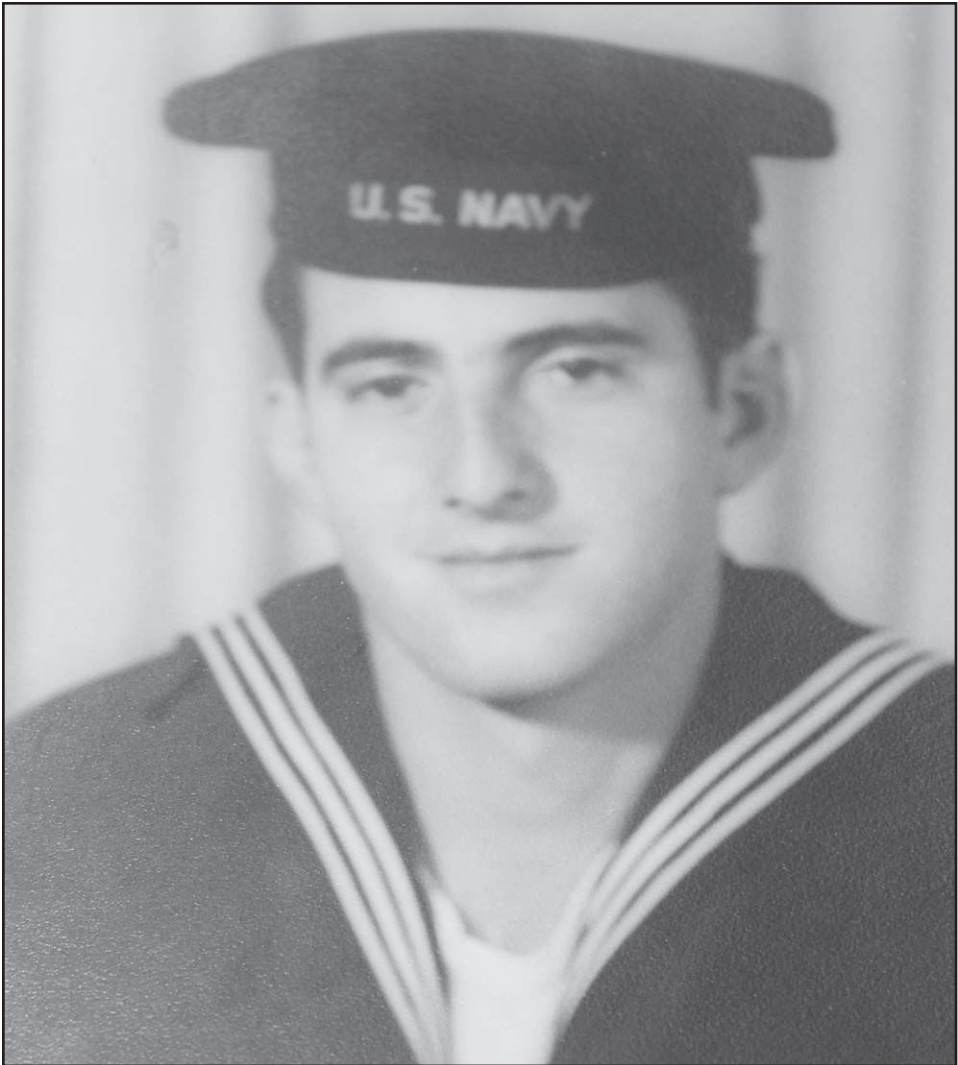
Over the decades, Hanger would see Nonie at the occasional Purcell High School reunion. He knew she was twice widowed, though he hadn’t seen her for six years.

About a year after losing his wife, Hanger called Bob Powell, a friend, and asked if he knew what had become of Nonie. It turned out Powell and Nonie were in the same Sunday School class at First Baptist Church here.

He gave Hanger her phone number. When Hanger called, he got the answering machine and left a simple message, “It’s Charles. Call me.”

Within the hour, she did just that and they spoke for four hours. It was the first of regular nightly calls.



Later she would make the trip to Ponca City to visit him over a weekend.

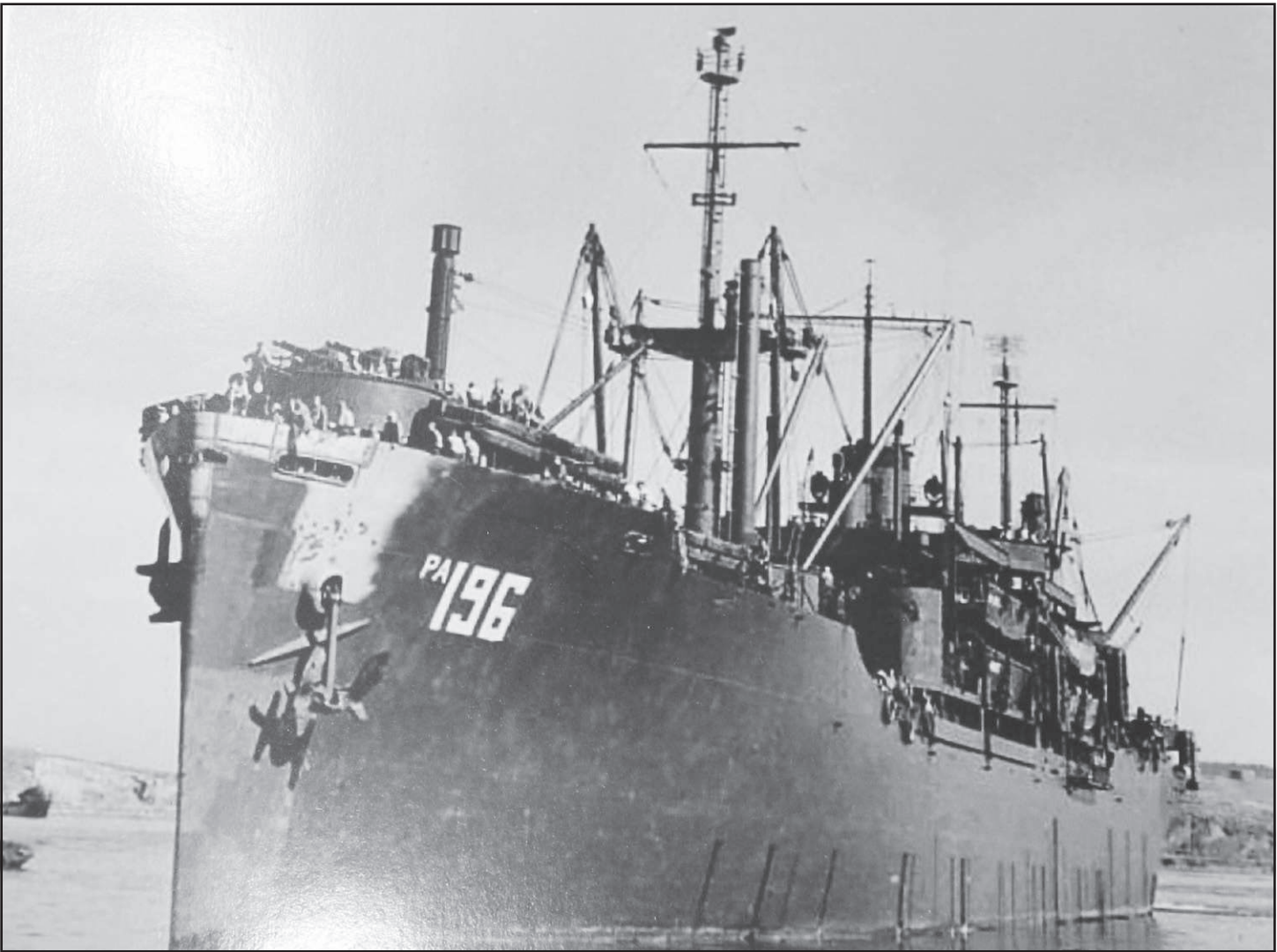
When she was leaving to return to Purcell, Hanger told her that in “about 3 to 4 weeks, we ought to get married.”

Four days later, he was back in Purcell. They went to Arkansas where there is no waiting period and got married.

Now he is back in Purcell.

“Nonie and I have had a lot of fun together,” he said. “We dated in high school – I was a senior and she was a sophomore. She’ll admit it, I was the one who dumped her. I had good reason I thought at the time.

World War II

World War II veteran Willie Easton of Lexington will be 98 on November 10.

In Hurtgen Forest

Landmines ended the war for Willie Easton

War is terrible. That's all there is to it. It is terrible.

For Willie Easton, it was doubly so.

For starters, his brother, Frankie, was killed in action in France on Feb. 5, 1945.

It was nine days before his father back in Oklahoma received the news via telegram.

And longer still for his father's letter informing him reached Easton in a hospital outside London.

Willie Easton had been seriously injured Dec. 2, 1944, hit by shrapnel from a land mine detonated when a soldier nearby stepped on it during a battle in the middle of Hurtgen Forest in Germany.

The shrapnel would hit him in six places and even now decades later he still carries some of it in his body.

He would spend months in hospitals in Germany, Belgium and England, before the Army sent him to Brooks Army Hospital in San Antonio and eventually home.

But for Easton the war began in 1942.

When the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor and the United States entered World War II, the Ada man was working at a CCC camp in Purcell.

He was drafted July 8, 1942. Easton

went to Ft. Sill, which was the induction center for the state.

From there he was shipped to Ft. Carson, Colo., for 18 months of training. That was followed by three months of maneuvers at Ft. Polk, La., and then on to California for still more combat training with the 89th Division.

When the division was preparing to ship out, Easton learned he would be staying behind to train new troops. But at the last minute, he too was shipped out in the place of another soldier who hadn't returned from a furlough.

First stop was Ft. Meade, Md., for still more training. That's where Easton was on D-Day, June 6, 1944.

Twenty-four days later, he sailed from New York on the Queen Elizabeth. On July 6, the ship landed at Glasgow, Scotland. They then took a train to southern England.

On July 12, he and others made their own Normandy landing. As a replacement, Easton was assigned to the 4th Infantry Division.

His unit was about 3 miles north of St. Lo on July 25 when it was bombed.

Hurtgen:

“The ground was shaking and all you could see to the south was a cloud,” he told his son, Mark, in March 1995. Mark Easton has compiled the account of his father’s World War II service that covers the period July 1942 to April 1945.

“You couldn’t see anything but dust and all you could hear was boom, boom, boom.”

The dust got thicker and the bomber pilots couldn’t see their targets. It wasn’t long before they were dropping bombs on their own troops, Easton recalled.

He was in a reconnaissance squad, scouting enemy placements and sometimes serving as a flanking guard as the division advanced in a convoy.

“It seemed like the closer we got to German soil, the more resistance they started putting up,” his memoir reads. “They were really wanting to protect

their own land.”

By Dec. 1, 1944, Easton was in heavy combat in the Hurtgen Forest.

On Dec. 2, he got hit.

“I was walking behind a Sherman tank which had an extended chain boom to ignite a mine when it hit one,” he recalled. “Well, it hit a mine and it blew the track completely off the tank. I moved over to the left side and continued pushing forward.”

“One of our men was about 15 feet in front of me when he stepped on a land mine. All I could see was the form of his body as it was going down.”

During the subsequent firefight, Easton captured two German soldiers. When the shooting stopped, he joined about six or

seven of his buddies.

"Two men had started digging a foxhole when one in the group stepped on a land mine. I don't know how many got killed or how many got hit. It blew me down on the ground.

"I was hit in six places by the blast. I was bleeding pretty bad and coughing up blood.

"The medics brought in four stretchers for the ones that was injured. They brought in four and carried out two and never came back that night.

"Finally some more men came and laid me on a stretcher. One of the men was going to pick up the end of the stretcher where my feet was and he stepped on a mine. I felt my legs go up in the air and they went numb. I was hit in the thigh and legs by that blast. The man that had picked up my stretcher had both of his legs blown off."

Badly injured, Easton spent a second night waiting to be carried out.

The next day he was finally taken to battalion aid and the first hospital where he was examined before being shipped to a field hospital at Autchen, Germany.

He underwent his first surgery there and doctors removed some – but not all – of the shrapnel.

He was in the field hospital 10 days and traveled by train to another hospital

at Brussels, Belgium. His stay there was two days.

He was taken by ambulance to Paris where he stayed five or six days, then on the Cherbourg and a hospital ship to cross the Channel.

He was approximately two weeks at a hospital outside London. Finally he was sent to a lung hospital. It was there he got that letter from home about his brother.

While being treated for the shrapnel in his lung, the bits of metal embedded in the left side of his face caused an infection that required more surgery.

His hospital stay in England stretched to about four months. Finally, he was put on the USS Westpoint to return to the States.

After a few days at Camp Patrick Henry in Virginia where someone stole his cigarettes and the small bag containing all the bits of shrapnel doctors had removed, he was sent to the hospital at San Antonio.

He was discharged about a week later and used a 30-day furlough to return to Oklahoma City.

"When I left the train depot, I had to walk all the way out to Crosby Drive which was four miles or more."

His homecoming also gave him the opportunity to finally meet a young woman with whom he had been exchanging letters since entering the service.

Easton and Euva Jean Eeds were married April 17, 1945.

He was honorably discharged from the Army on Oct. 16, 1945.

Easton received the Purple Heart for his injuries and the Bronze Star for his actions in combat.

Other medals received include the Good Conduct Medal, Ruptured Duck, European-African-Middle Eastern Victory Commemorative, World War II Victory Commemorative, United States Army Service Commemorative, Combat Service Commemorative and Overseas Service Commemorative.

War claimed brother

Seriously injured, Willie Easton was evacuated to a hospital outside London. It was there he received word that his brother, Frank, was killed in action in France.

One brother killed and another wounded in action point up the heartless cost war exacts from many families. Such a case is that of S/Sgt. Frank T. Easton and Pfc. Willie A. Easton.

Sgt. Easton was killed in action on Feb. 5 while leading his squad in combat. He was with an infantry unit of the 45th Division.

Pfc. Easton was wounded in action in Germany in December and is now in a hospital in England.

Sgt. Easton, who would have been 22 on Feb 28, went into the army from Ada.

He leaves his widow; his father W. N. Easton, who lived in Ada from 1930 until three years ago, when he moved to Oklahoma City; three sisters and three brothers.
