## Casino crimes

### Auto burglaries lead to two felony counts

Bonds totaling \$8,000 have been set for a Norman woman charged in McClain County District Court with two counts of second degree burglary.

Both charges were filed after former felony convictions.

A preliminary hearing conference for Misty S. Mullins, 43, will be at 9 a.m. June 6.

According to affidavits, Mullins was at Riverwind Casino on May 22 where she allegedly broke into two Ford pickups.

The first theft was reported shortly after 4 p.m. when a casino patron reported someone going through a pickup and then leaving in a white Pontiac.

Surveillance video showed the tag number of the Pontiac as it left the casino, heading east on State Highway 9.

The pickup owner was identified. After checking his vehicle, he reported the loss of tools valued at \$430.

The second auto burglary occurred around 8:47 p.m. Three lawn chairs were taken from the bed of another pickup.

A Chickasaw Nation Light-horse police officer located the Pontiac driven by Mullins near Adkins Hill Road.

Lawn chairs were in the car, which was driven by Mullins.

Mullins denied taking them and said all the items in the car were hers.

The owner subsequently identified the chairs as the ones taken from her pickup.

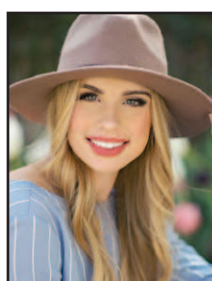

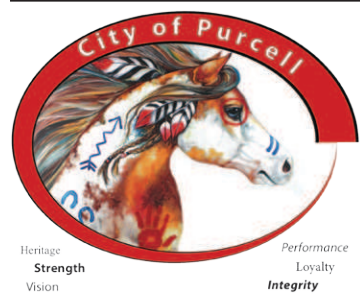

## NEWS from the City of Purcell

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

## OSU EXTENSION News Cleveland County Spring Pasture Tour

Northcutt Brothers Cattle Co. near Lexington will host a spring pasture tour presented by Cleveland County OSU Extension and the Cleveland County Cattlemen's Association on Saturday, June 9, from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The tour will feature man-

agement practices for 350 acres of established Bermuda grass hay as well as teff grass and newly sprigged Bermuda grass.

Participants will also see the handling facilities for the ranch's herd of purebred Angus and crossbred cattle.

The event will begin at the Cleveland Co. Extension Office Classroom C at 7 a.m. with breakfast and a presentation on seasonal fly and internal parasite control by Justin Talley, OSU Extension Livestock Entomologist.

Breakfast will be followed by a caravan drive to the ranch of Northcutt Brothers Cattle Co. near Lexington for the tour. The pasture tour will conclude

with lunch on the ranch. The pasture tour is free, open to the public, and a great opportunity for producers of any size to learn more about cattle and pasture management.

## Not his day when 22-cent ticket leads to felony

When Koby Townsend allegedly pulled a 22-cent ticket from a vacant gaming machine at Riverwind Casino, it was the start of a cascade of legal problems.

Townsend, 28, of Hinton, is charged in McClain County

District Court with possession of a stolen vehicle, resisting an officer and obstructing an officer.

He is being held in lieu of a \$6,500 bond. A preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. June 6.

He also has an outstanding warrant from a 2016 drug case in Grady County.

According to an affidavit,

Townsend's troubles at the casino began in the early morning of May 14.

That's when a Chickasaw Nation Lighthorse police officer saw Townsend allegedly take the ticket from the machine.

In the course of questioning Townsend, the officer ran a warrant check and found the Grady County warrant.

## Bill to protect publishers filed

In an effort to protect printers and publishers from unwarranted tariffs, Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Angus King (I-ME) introduced S. 2385, the "Protecting Rational Incentives in Newsprint Trade Act of 2018," or "PRINT Act." Senators Roy Blunt (R-MO), Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV),

Deb Fischer (R-NE), Johnny Isakson (R-GA), Doug Jones (D-AL), Claire McCaskill (D-MO), Jerry Moran (R-KS) and Roger Wicker (R-MS) joined as original co-sponsors.

The PRINT Act would suspend new tariffs currently being imposed on imported uncoated groundwood paper from Canada, which is the primary source of newsprint and other paper used by domestic newspapers, book publishers and commercial printers.

Simultaneously, the legislation would require the Department of Commerce to review the economic health of the printing and publishing industries.

Newspapers and printers across the United States have told Congress that the new import tariffs – as high as 32 percent – would jeopardize the viability of the industry and threaten to decimate the U.S. paper industry's customer base.

Many local newspapers and printers that use uncoated groundwood paper have experienced price increases and a disruption in supply since preliminary countervailing and antidumping duties were assessed earlier this year.

Even as the Commerce Department investigation is ongoing, the duties are already being collected on imports, causing immediate economic harm to printers and publishers.

A final Commerce Department decision is expected on August 2.

The new PRINT Act legislation would pause both the preliminary and any final duties while the Department completes its study.

In introducing the legislation, Senator Collins stated, "The U.S. printing and publishing industry is facing an unprecedented threat from crippling new import tariffs imposed on Canadian uncoated groundwood paper — better known as 'newsprint' — which is used by newspapers, book publishers, and commercial printers.

As a Senator representing

one of our nation's leading papermaking states, I have consistently fought for actions to ensure a level playing field for the domestic papermaking industry.

In this case, however, one domestic mill owned by a venture capital firm appears to be taking advantage of trade remedies to add to its own bottom line, putting thousands of American jobs at risk. I encourage my colleagues to support this bipartisan bill to fully evaluate the economic impact of these tariffs before they harm our local newspapers and printing industries."

"Throughout Maine, small town newspapers remain a principal source of information for people looking to read the news, learn about the goings-on in their communities, and stay up-to-date on current events," Senator King said.

"But new tariffs on uncoated groundwood paper could jeopardize this access to information and impact hundreds of thousands of American jobs in the U.S. newspaper business and paper manufacturing industry, which are already operating on razor-thin margins. I have consistently fought for stronger trade enforcement, especially when it involves protecting the domestic paper industry, and must take action to ensure the Department of Commerce hears the serious concerns of the domestic paper manufacturing industry. The PRINT Act would help us better understand the damaging consequences of the DOC's decision to impose duties and help ensure local newspapers don't bear an undue burden from these misguided tariffs, so people in Maine and in rural towns across America, can continue to receive their local news from hometown papers."

## Kesha Montgomery talks CASA

CASA has changed its name.

That's according to Advocate Supervisor Kesha Montgomery (no relation).

The Court Appointed Special Advocates for children is now officially called South Central CASA of Oklahoma since it covers not only Cleveland County but McClain and Garvin as well.

Kesha (2002) was one of two Purcell graduates at last Friday's noon monthly luncheon of the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce.

Among those also present was Joe Johnson, a 2005 PHS graduate.

Johnson is a Sector Coordinator for Norman Regional Health System working with the TSET program.

Montgomery said her office is constantly needing more advocates.

It takes 30 hours of training to become an advocate.

Half of the training is in person and the other half is online, Montgomery explained.

"We usually meet on five Thursdays and try to have

interesting speakers like attorneys, judges or other interesting people to speak," she said to the chamber luncheon gathering at the Purcell School Administration Building.

On average about 1,200 children are brought into the CASA program each year.

Case workers can have up to 30 cases on their books.

There are currently about 60 children in the system in McClain County, Montgomery said.

CASA workers are advocates for the children that

come from homes that are not functioning at an appropriate level.

One interesting thing Montgomery said was the younger kids almost always want to go back home no matter how bad it is at home.

"I've had one younger kid that didn't want to go back home," Montgomery said. "We have to decide what is best for the kids (whether or not to send them home)."

It's a different ball game for the older kids in the system, Montgomery said.

"The older kids usually don't want to go back home," she said. "That's just the way it is."

Montgomery said CASA is in hopes of obtaining three to four more advocates by the end of 2018.

Garvin County is in the greatest need of advocates. They only have one at the current time.

After the 30 hours of training, the advocate can expect to spend 4-8 hours per month with their child, Montgomery said.

## Yes, please cry at work

The Oklahoman's Paula Burkes wrote recently about crying at work.

Her column sprung from a Robert Half survey, but unsatisfied with dry data, she put the question to her Facebook friends: Is it OK to cry at work?

She drew responses in about the same proportion that Robert Half did, a mix of yes, no and sometimes, a spectrum that started at that's unprofessional, wended its way through maybe if someone died and ended up at go ahead and cry, you'll feel better.

I hope I never work with someone who won't cry at work. I want to be with bona fide humans.

I want people who bring all of themselves to work, all their passions and frustrations and ideas and laughter, not just the part they put on in the morning for the office to see while the rest stays at home waiting for the cocktail hour. I don't want to be with the man who prides himself on keeping his cheeks as dry as the sand in an hourglass.

"Stop crying!" is a selfish phrase. We don't like that annoying sound and we just wish

she'd knock it off, it's ruining the ballgame, I just can't think straight with him making that terrible sound. "If you don't stop it I'll give you a reason to cry!" might be the silliest thing anyone's ever said. The child has a reason.

We love to say that someone broke down and cried, as though he were an automobile that just couldn't make it to the next gas station. I have felt broken, but never because I cried.

We cry when we don't know what we feel, when it's so big and so intense that it just pushes the tears out and later we figure out why, or we don't.

We do not cry only when we're sad; we cry for the joy of holding a newborn. We cry not when someone has gotten it all wrong, but when someone has gotten it just right. We cry when we feel something so strongly that we can't hold it all and some of it just has to leak out a little bit, emotion overflowing from our hearts onto our cheeks.

### Iran

Naw. Nothing nearly that serious. Those harsh reviews are merely a few of the remarks made by congressional Democrats after President Trump pulled out of that infamous "agreement" with Iran. We will be kind by not contrasting Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer's before and after comments. But in either case what he thinks is inconsequential now ... which is normally the case anyway.

# MOVIES WITH DAVE

When it comes to the box office, usually I only mention films here when they perform beyond expectations. It's fun to celebrate good movies doing good business.

But when a "Star Wars" movie dives lower than even the lowest projections, I can't help but talk about it.

"Solo: A Star Wars Story" wasn't expected to open at quite the heights of previous "Star Wars" films like "Rogue One" and certainly not "The Last Jedi," but it was projected to come home with a respectable \$100-125 million for the 3-day weekend and \$125-150 million including the Monday holiday.

But "Solo" couldn't even touch that low ceiling.

Overall the film made only \$84.4 million over the 3-day weekend and \$103 million including Memorial Day.

That's just domestically though. Internationally it performed even worse.

These days, most big blockbuster films make a huge amount of their box office from other countries. For some movies the amount from international markets makes up to 60-70% of the final gross.

So with "Solo" only nabbing a measly \$10.1 million from China, one of the largest movie going nations on the planet besides the United States, and a grand total of \$65 million internationally over the weekend, things aren't looking too hot for everyone's favorite spacefaring smuggler.

Especially when you consider the film's enormous budget, which reportedly is over \$250 million, the biggest for any "Star Wars" film period.

That's not even including marketing, which can sometimes equal the cost of the film's production itself.

Current projections have "Solo" finishing its box office run at around \$400 million total worldwide.

There's a good chance this film won't even break even. I never thought I'd see the day where "Star Wars" bombed at the box office.

But enough about "Solo's" abysmal box office performance. What did I think about the film itself? Let's get to my review of "Solo: A Star Wars Story."

The only movie this week is "Solo: A Star Wars Story."

Set before the events of the original "Star Wars" trilogy, this film follows a young Han Solo (Alden Ehrenreich) on an adventure through the criminal underworld.

Along the way he meets his future copilot Chewbacca (Joonas Suotamo) and encounters Lando Calrissian (Donald Glover) years before joining the Rebellion.

This movie feels like a turning point for me.

Let me go on a bit of a "Star Wars" tangent here. I promise it's going somewhere.

I've been a fan of "Star Wars" as long as I can remember. Ever since one day, as a kid years ago, when my dad suggested we borrow a copy of "Return of the Jedi" on VHS from the local library.

Even though I happened to see the last film in the trilogy first, I was hooked from the very beginning.

Since then I've probably watched every pre-Disney acquisition "Star Wars" movie dozens, if not hundreds of times.

As I've gotten older though my opinion on the series has started to sour little by little.

At first it was just George Lucas's prequel trilogy that I started seeing in a new light. As I began to learn more about movies and what made films good, I enjoyed those movies less and less for their poor direc-

tion and even worse dialogue.

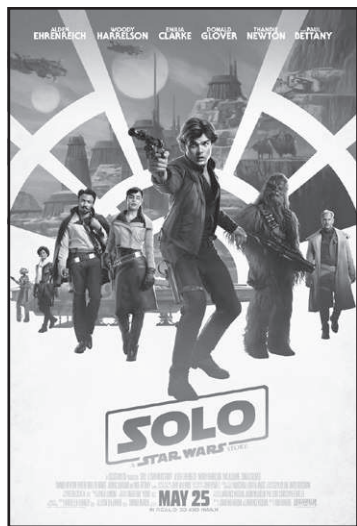
I still loved "Star Wars," I just didn't care for one of the trilogies was all.

Then came the acquisition of Lucasfilm by The Walt Disney Company back in 2012 and the promise of new "Star Wars" movies.

Quite frankly, I was thrilled. This acquisition came right on the heels of Disney's major success with Marvel Studios and "The Avengers."

After that film, I couldn't think of anyone I'd rather have holding the future of the "Star Wars" universe.

I was sure Disney would do for "Star Wars" what they did for Marvel and their sprawling, yet well constructed, interconnected universe.



So in 2015 Disney releases "The Force Awakens," the first new "Star Wars" film in a decade, and frankly I enjoyed it quite a bit.

It has likeable characters, snappy dialogue, and fun sci-fi action. Everything you want in a "Star Wars" movie.

Sure, the story borrowed heavily from the original 1977 film, but I didn't mind. "Star Wars" was back, and it was fun.

Then Disney comes out with something a little different. A promise of new anthology films or "Star Wars Stories" not part of any trilogy, but movies meant to stand alone and fill out the "Star Wars" universe a bit more.

So one year after the release of "The Force Awakens" we get "Rogue One: A Star Wars Story," a movie about the crew who heroically stole the plans for the first Death Star.

And this is where things start to go down hill for me.

The more I thought about "Rogue One" after watching it, the less I began to like it. Yes, it has amazing action and a good overall aesthetic, but it has some of the worst character development in any "Star Wars" movie, including the prequels.

Who cares if our characters are in an amazing battle with the fate of the galaxy on the line when almost everyone involved is boring and forgettable?

Then a year later "The Last Jedi," the much anticipated sequel to "The Force Awakens," releases. And just like "Rogue One," the more I think about "The Last Jedi" the more I begin to hate it.

Instead of continuing the story and character arcs set up in "The Force Awakens," the filmmakers behind "The Last Jedi" seemed completely obsessed with subverting everyone's expectations, regardless if it made the story more interesting or not.

It was like it was their mission to kill every single narrative thread possible. Sure, subverting people's expectations can be amazing if done well, but not when we're left with something way less interesting than what we were hoping for in the first place.

Frankly, after "The Last Jedi," I don't even feel compelled to see the last film of that trilogy. I just don't care about that story anymore.

If 10-year-old me could hear me now, he'd think I had gone

insane. Yet here I am, feeling nothing but apathy about "Star Wars," the series I've loved since I was a child.

Which leads me to "Solo: A Star Wars Story."

This film has had a troubled production from the get-go.

There's been negative rumors floating around this movie for months, but no news was more damaging than the announcement that the movie's original directors, Phil Lord and Chris Miller, were fired after filming nearly the entire picture and were replaced with Ron Howard.

Reportedly Lord and Miller went too overboard on improvisation.

Improv was a huge boon for the comedy of Lord and Miller's previous films "21 Jump Street" and "The Lego Movie," movies I adore, but apparently it was frowned upon by the executives at Lucasfilm.

For better or worse, Howard ended up reshooting around 70% of the film, ballooning the budget to over \$250 million and resulting in the final product, and previously mentioned box office failure, that we have in theaters today.

So, with the ousting of two directors I love and my apathy from "The Last Jedi" still fresh in my mind I went to see "Solo: A Star Wars Story" with low spirits and even lower expectations.

And sadly, I got pretty much exactly what I expected.

But that's not to say this is a bad movie per se.

To start, I think the production design is fantastic. The sets, locations, and character designs all seem very well thought out and executed.

Indeed, this movie is amazing to look at and it brings a stunning aesthetic to the "Star Wars" universe.

I'd also say the acting is pretty solid all around.

Alden Ehrenreich is a good actor. I liked him in 2016's "Hail, Caesar!" and I thought he made for a perfectly fine space criminal in this film.

He's no Han Solo though.

I think the entire extent of his Solo impersonation was squinting a lot and smirking at everyone. His acting was perfectly okay, but he's not even close to mimicking Harrison Ford. Strangely though, it's like he's not even trying to.

Donald Glover on the other hand went for the gold with his role as Lando Calrissian. And for the most part he did great. He had the walk, the talk, and the attitude of Lando down pat.

I guess it did feel like Glover overdid it a bit during a few scenes here and there, but that's just nitpicking. Overall I thought his performance was the best in the entire film.

Comedy wise though, almost all of the movie's humor fell completely flat. Both with me and the people in the theater I saw this with.

The only time I heard anyone chuckle was when a character references something in the original trilogy.

I get it, winks at the audience can be fun, but if that's the only thing getting laughs in a Han Solo movie, you have some serious comedy problems.

As for the story, I just couldn't bring myself to care about anything happening in this film for a second.

It just seemed like an effort to squeeze as many references to the original trilogy as possible.

We've only had two "Star Wars Stories" so far, but both of them just seem obsessed in taking offhand comments from the original movies and creating entire screenplays based on them.

Han mentioned the Kessel

## Waste:

from slamming that window on their fingers.

Such is the case with a little-noticed bill Gov. Fallin signed into law, House Bill 2578 by Rep. Tess Teague, R-Choctaw, and Sen. Paul Rosino, R-Oklahoma City. Teague's bill and funding mechanism SB 1607 appropriated \$445,000 from the general fund to create the Aerospace Commerce Economic Services unit within the Department of Commerce. It's supposed to bring together the chambers of commerce, Aeronautics Commission and Department of Commerce to work together to grow the aerospace industry in Oklahoma. Teague originally filed another bill, HB 2719, which would have appropriated \$1 million to the program, but that failed.

In practice, that means the Commerce Department gets a big check to pass along to a third party that will hold some strategic planning meetings. Until times got tough at the Capitol, the Aeronautics Commission did that for \$100,000 per year and, according to Teague's remarks when she was pitching the bill in the House Committee on Banking and Business, produced a \$237 million economic boost. That led Rep. David Perryman, D-Chickasha, to ask why a million-dollar program was needed when a hundred-thousand-dollar program had been so successful.

Teague said the Aeronautics Commission no longer had the resources to run the program without an outside vendor. And the outside vendor, Logistics Specialties Inc., just happened to have helped draft the bill and had a representative, Hank Walkman, standing by to answer the committee's questions. Teague deferred to him frequently because even fellow committee members only want to hear "I don't really know"

and "it works really well in Utah" so many times.

LSI wouldn't automatically get the contract, but they were the only company pushing the bill and standing in the room. LSI's website, though, touts procurement of government aerospace contracts, not statewide aerospace sector development. The only governmental customers they mention involve a financial literacy class called "Your Family, Your Money" and a

vocational rehab program for students with disabilities age 14-21.

Utah does have a \$4.7 billion aerospace industry, but the credit for that more likely goes to U.S. Senate President Pro Tem Orrin Hatch's 40 years on Capitol Hill.

Where does all the money go? Sinkholes like this one posing as economic development.

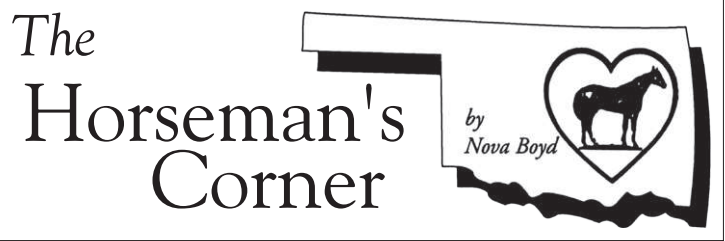
I wish I could be excited. I couldn't think of anyone I'd rather handle a story about the famous bounty hunter.

## Fresh herbs add flavor without the calories

Using fresh herbs in meals can enhance the appearance of foods as well as providing fantastic flavors, and even better, they do all this without adding extra calories. Herbs are easy to grow or can be purchased. But either way, adding fresh herbs is a quick way to transform ordinary meals into extraordinary meals.

Besides helping flavor foods when cutting back on salt, fat and sugar; herbs may also offer additional benefits of their own. Researchers are finding many culinary herbs (both fresh and dried) have antioxidants that may help protect against such diseases as cancer and heart disease.

Take some thyme (pun intended) to cook with fresh herbs. Here are some tips to help you enjoy the flavor and health benefits of fresh herbs in your cooking:

1. Purchase herbs close to the time you plan to use them. Or, when growing herbs in your own garden, the ideal time for picking is in the morning after the dew has dried but before

the sun gets hot. This helps ensure the best flavor and storage quality.

2. Fresh herbs can be stored in an open or a perforated plastic bag in your refrigerator crisper drawer for a few days.

3. Wait to wash herbs until you are ready to use them. Wash smaller amounts of herbs

## Why forgery is bad

Signature, court order were falsified

Forgery is never a good thing. But it is an especially bad thing when the signature forged is that of a judge on a purported court order.

As a Blanchard man has learned after he allegedly did just that and then attempted to file the bogus order.

Prosecutors here charged Brian E. Brannon, 30, with forgery of records.

According to an affidavit, the suspect signature first came to light in May 2016 in the midst of a child visitation issue involving Brannon's then 5-year-old son.

That is when Deborah Rhodes sent a photograph of a motion for enforcement of co-custodial parent visitation rights to the McClain County Court Clerk's office.

Listed as plaintiffs were Brannon and his son. The defendant was Whitney Rhodes,

the boy's mother.

The motion appeared to have been signed by Brannon and Special District Judge Leland Shilling.

The court clerk's office suspected the court order was fraudulent and that Shilling's signature was a forgery. When the judge saw the photograph, he confirmed he'd never signed the order.

Whitney Rhodes told an investigator with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation that Brannon had called her on May 23, 2016, and wanted to see their child. She turned down his request because she didn't have time.

That's when Brannon reportedly said he would bring the police along with a new court order that gave him permission to see the boy.

Unaware of a new court

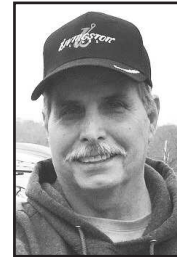

## Herbs:

thoroughly under running water. Shake off moisture or spin dry in a salad spinner. Pat off any remaining moisture with clean paper towels.

4. For most recipes, unless otherwise directed, mince herbs into tiny pieces. Chop with a chef's knife on a cutting board or snip with kitchen scissors.

While some recipes call for a sprig or springs of herbs, normally the part of the herb you harvest will be the leaves.

For herbs with sturdier stems, such as marjoram, oregano, rosemary, sage and thyme, you can strip off the leaves by running your fingers down the stem from top to bottom.

With small-leaved plants such as thyme, you can use both leaves and stems for cooking early in the season. Later in the season, as the stems become tougher, use just the leaves.

For herbs with tender stems, such as parsley and cilantro, it's okay if you snip some of the stem in the leaves when you are cutting these herbs.

5. Unlike dried herbs, fresh herbs are usually added toward the end in cooked dishes to preserve their flavor.

Add the more delicate herbs - basil, chives, cilantro, dill leaves, parsley, marjoram and mint - a minute or two before the end of cooking or sprinkle them on the food before it's served.

The less delicate herbs, such as dill seeds, oregano, rosemary, tarragon and thyme, can be added about the last 20 minutes of cooking. Fresh herbs can be added to refrigerated cold foods several hours before serving.

6. A general guide when using fresh herbs in a recipe is to use three times as much as you would use of a dried herb.

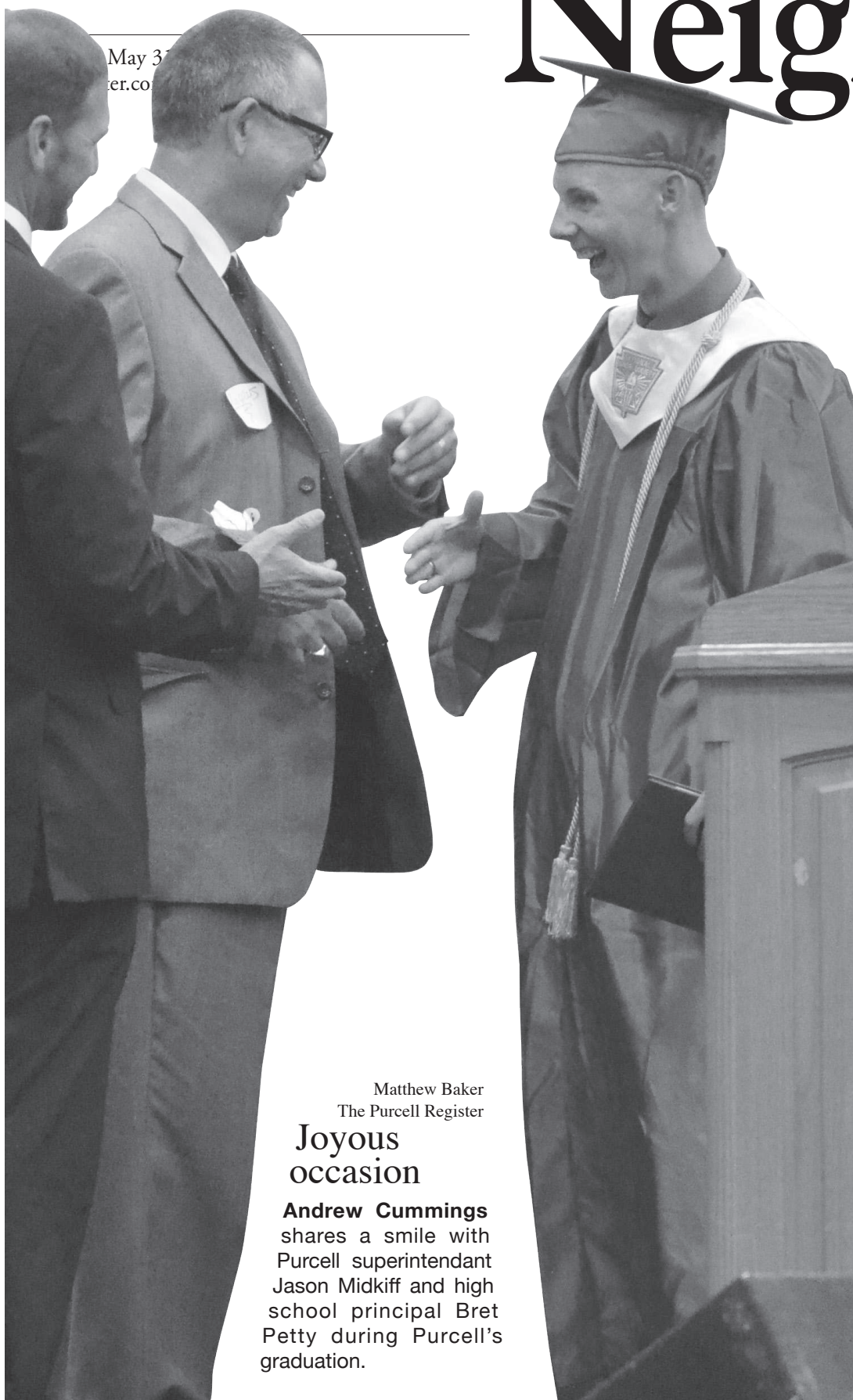

In many ways, last week was one for the record books. Tuesday morning started out the same as it always does with 50 or 60 veterans coming through our doors before 5:30 a.m. That was the only part of the day then went as usual.

Our volunteers were able to assist 153 veterans. By the time we finished around 2:30

p.m., most of us were ready for a nap in our recliners. Thursday we were not as crowded, but it was still a very busy day with over 140 visitors. We assisted all the veterans and surviving spouses with their claims and questions.

Our biggest challenge was the large amount of mail we received from the Department of Veterans Affairs during the week. I'm copied on every VA rating decision and other communication that VA sends to the veterans and spouses represented at our foundation.

There were 652 rating decisions or other types of letters received in five days. Each of these mailings is opened and evaluated so our volunteers may send the proper letter explaining what other benefits they could be eligible to receive along with instructions

about next steps.

It took three of us more than four hours to open and sort through those letters. We were counting the number of veterans who received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities and we had to go back and count them over, as there were more than I thought we could ever receive in one week.

Are you ready to hear that number? There were 61 veterans who received VA Disability Rating of 100 percent. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,939,803. We thought maybe the mail clerk went on vacation and there was no one to send it. Also, there were 116 veterans who

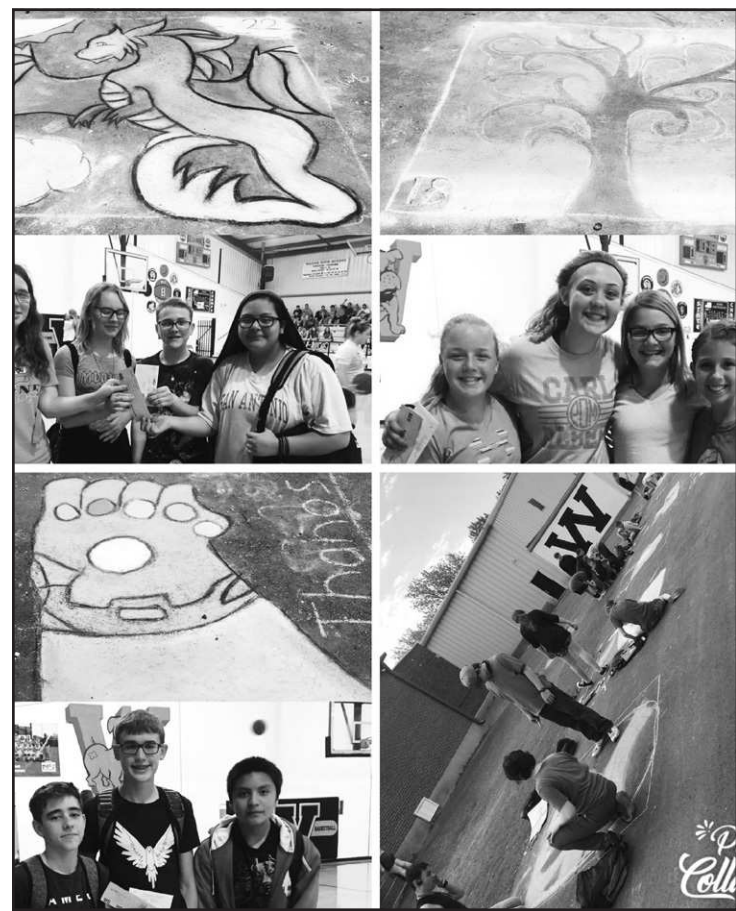

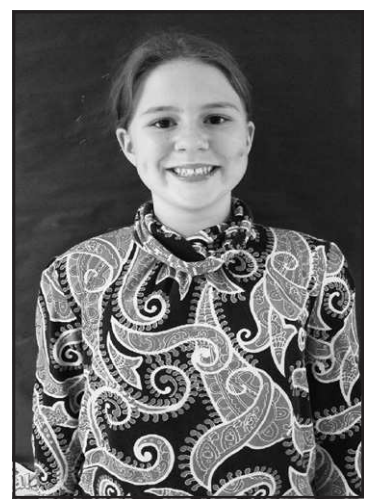

### Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

Recently, we have begun writing a series of letters to many of those who watch the "Let The Bible Speak" TV program that airs in many states, including Oklahoma.

Undertaking that task reminded me of the importance of "letter writing," although the younger generation may not know much about writing letters. They have Twitter, Facebook, Facetime, Instagram -- I believe that's what you call it -- and many other tools I don't even know about. I actually don't even know much about most of the ones I mentioned, I just name them so you might at least be a little impressed.

In the Bible days, though, they certainly did not have all of our modern devices. They did not even have "mail carriers," as far as I know. Various brethren would hand-deliver letters from one place to the next.

You may remember that much of the New Testament actually consists of "letters." We call them "epistles," but, really, they are just letters that the apostles and a few other inspired writers sent out to

share the gospel story and to assist in the work of the church throughout the known world of their time. The letters would be great tools to address issues that cropped up continually but also to help deepen the faith of the brethren and to increase their "knowledge of God, and of Jesus Christ our Lord" (2 Peter 1:2).

The apostle Paul, in particular, is an astute letter writer. Sometimes he writes a letter to a church with his own hand, and sometimes he dictates his thoughts to another -- such as Timothy -- who will pen the words. But the words and the thoughts always belong to the apostle who is endowed with the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

It is almost certain, for example, that Paul leans on the hand of Timothy to write the letter to the Philippians. He begins that "epistle" with, "Paul and Timotheus, the servants of Jesus Christ, to all the saints in Philippi ..." (Philippians 1:1).

The great apostle -- trapped in a Roman prison and, perhaps, chained to a Roman guard -- must have looked out over the Roman landscape from his

rare prison vantage point. As he does, he pours his heart out to the Philippians church by the hand of Timothy. It is the most beautiful of Paul's letters, largely because it is very much just a "letter" from one loved one to another who was far from home.

As we write to you each week here on the "front porch," it is very much like writing such a letter as the ones Paul and the others wrote. We understand that Paul writes by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, an advantage we do not have, of course. Still, we try to write each week in the same spirit Paul writes, with the same love of brethren, love for souls that are lost, love for the church of our Lord, and, above all, a love for our Lord Jesus Christ.

We very much enjoy our time with you and always are thankful for each reader. To use Paul's sentiments in his benediction to the Philippians: "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you" (1:3).

Thanks for reading this week's "letter" and we'll look forward eagerly to next week's "front porch" visit. Blessings to you all

### Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

The city of Jerusalem has been in the news lately, a city that is central to the world's three great faiths - Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Why do Zionist Jews and many evangelical Christians believe that Jerusalem should be given solely to the Jews? Because the Bible says so.

The most often-cited text is 2 Chronicles 6:5-6, wherein King Solomon quotes God as saying, "I have chosen Jerusalem that my name may be there and I have chosen David to be over my people Israel."

These same Christians believe that the book of Revelation predicts the future in a literal way, and that the people will all be converted to Christianity once they have recovered Jerusalem. But Catholic (and most mainline) Christians have a slightly different understanding. Jerusalem was, most of all, the place of the Temple, where good Jews would come to worship.

Jesus, in all four of the Gos-

pels, made very clear that His body was the new Temple, and that the presence of God was found in a unique way in His person. Such a presence was not confined to a single temple or a single city.

In the rest of the New Testament, the "New Jerusalem" refers to the Church, the body of followers of Jesus, which is the image of heaven on earth. Revelation 22 goes on to describe a river of the water of life that flows down the middle of the great street of the city from the Throne of God. The tree of life grows in the middle and "The leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations." (Rev. 22:2). This inclusion of the tree of life in the New Jerusalem harkens back to the Garden of Eden.

The story of our salvation has come full circle. On a visit in 2009, Pope Benedict said "Jeru-

received VA disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,393,101 per year.

I don't know how all these men and women could receive that rating in one week unless the VA did not send out a lot of their mail in the last month or so. Two surviving spouses were awarded either Pension, DIC or Aid and Attendance benefits based on their spouse's military service. They will receive a combined annual amount of \$30,795 per year. Veterans who receive Disability Compensation may be eligible for other state and federal benefits based on the percentage of their service-connected disability.

The State of Oklahoma has been very helpful in many ways to our disabled veterans. One of the biggest benefits for those rated at 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities is the property tax exemption on their primary residence. Since the value of our homes have escalated in the last few years that could be a savings of thousands of dollars per year. Those who are rated at 100 percent are also eligible for the state sales tax exemption on all their purchases. Auto tags are also reduced for a veteran when a 60 percent service-connected disability rating is granted. Spouses and dependents whose Veteran receives a 100 percent VA disability rating may be eligible for the Champ-VA medical insurance.

One of the things I have noticed over the last 15 years is the number of places available for veterans to seek assistance with their VA claims and questions. Almost every town has a veteran's organization that helps veterans file for benefits. Some

of them will be able to help a veteran or spouse receive VA benefits while other organizations will not. I look at it as one of our Marine volunteers Dick Clark of Norman put it several years ago he said if you are going out to eat and one restaurant has a line of people waiting to get in while the restaurant across the street is empty, you must ask yourself which one serves the best food?

We look at helping veterans and spouses the same way because there is always a line of folks going into our Foundation. As of a few weeks ago, we have had visitors from 44 states and four countries who have made a trip to see us for help with their VA claims and questions. One of the veterans we helped Thursday had driven from the state of Minnesota for assistance from our volunteers.

I doubt you will find anyplace else in this nation that is doing so much for so many for free. Our local eating establishments, hotels, and motels might consider offering some discounts or other amenities to the many veterans who are making the trip to Norman to see us each week. Many of them will be staying for several days as they schedule their appointments.

For those of you who have not visited our home in Norman, we are open at 5:30 a.m. each Tuesday and Thursday morning to serve all veterans and their spouses. Coffee and doughnuts are always available to everyone at no charge. I would like to make this an open invitation to anyone who has never visited with us to stop by to see what goes on those two days each week. I believe the men and women who volunteer their time each week helping to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families

are the best and brightest in our state. We are here for only one reason, and that is to make a difference in the lives of Americans who have served our nation's military.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

It looks like summer is getting close now. Even though it is suppose to be about 18 days until summer really hits, I think 90 degrees and over is summer time.

Remember to take your precautions during the day when it is so hot. Drink lots of water, stay inside in the air conditioning and do not go out in the heat of the day and try to work your flower beds or your mini gardens. Be smart.

The bouquets for Memorial Day turned out good. We had about three left that did not sell.

We are still feeding between 45 and 50 meals a day. It is a good room full of people. Remember if you are planning to come to the center to eat lunch, it is necessary that you call by 8 a.m. that day or the afternoon before to make reservations for your lunch. This is necessary so the cooks can get a correct count for lunch.

We would like to remind everyone the senior center is not based on income. Some people do not understand the center is a good place for anyone who is 60 or older to hang out and enjoy cards, dominoes, pool or exercise. Age is the determining factor for who is eligible to attend the center.

Anyone who is 60 or older

is invited to come visit the center where there is always something cooking and plenty of activities. Individuals under 60 are welcome to visit the center. The only difference is meals for people 60 and over are \$2 and the cost of meals for other individuals is \$5.85. This is the amount set by ASCOG, a state entity which governs all senior citizen centers. Remember, if you plan to eat lunch at the center, you will need to call the kitchen at 527-9462 the day before or by 8 a.m. the day you plan to eat.

Activities are continuing on a regular schedule. The seniors have especially enjoyed the exercise class which is held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and walking on Tuesday and Thursday. Some of the people have extended the walking time each day after their exercises. We have seen such a difference in some of the ladies since we started the exercise class.

The senior garage sale for this week will be Thursday, May 31, and Friday, June 1, starting at 8 a.m. and lasting until 3 p.m. We have several eight foot tables and two good White sewing machines. Come by and check out the items in the sale.

Thursday is bingo day every

week. Bingo starts promptly at 10 a.m. Everyone needs to be in their chair at 10 a.m. so the games can begin on time. Everyone is a winner before we are finished. We have been having a full house each week. Thursday morning is an exciting time at the center as we usually have new people.

If you know someone who needs help with their noon meal at their home, call the Delta Nutrition Center at 527-9462 and ask for John, the site manager. Once an application has been submitted, the site manager will do an evaluation and if you meet the criteria, meals will begin being delivered to your home.

Need a place to have a special event? The center is available for \$70 a day. If you're interested call 527-5070 and ask for Fredda or Hester. Call early so you can get the date you want.

# Pioneer Library System to go fine-free for youth materials

For 60 years, the Pioneer Library System has worked to be a literal "pioneer" in library service to its communities.

And PLS is moving forward in that commitment to its customers with the upcoming implementation of fine-free youth materials, beginning to coincide with the start of the annual Summer Reading Program.

Starting June 1, overdue fees will not be assessed for any checkouts related to youth materials. Staff recommended the move and it was approved by the PLS Board of Trustees at its April meeting.

The goal of the plan is to remove a roadblock for young cardholders in the system who may be unable to use their cards due to concerns about accruing fines.

"We recognize that eliminating fines on youth materials will have a small impact on system revenue," said PLS Executive Director Lisa Wells. "But the feeling is that the amount is manageable given the outstanding benefits we see in reopening access to our younger customers.

"Ultimately revenue from these fines adds up to less than a quarter of one percent of our operating budget," Wells added, "and our conclusion is that the roadblock is greater than the revenue for this group of most impressively young minds."

Pioneer is the first library system in Oklahoma to do away with fines for a group of cardholders, following a trend that's taken place in many libraries and systems around the country in recent years.

Among these libraries are the Columbus (Ohio) Metropolitan Library System, which is fine-free for all customers, and the Salt Lake City and St.

Louis County library systems, which have a similar offering to what PLS is implementing with fine-free materials for children and teens.

PLS has taken multiple steps in working with young readers over the years. In 1998, PLS established a relationship with Norman Public Schools for students to be able to use the library's resources. Since then, the service has been rolled out in several districts, including the Noble and Dibble schools.

In 2015, PLS created an optional "MyCard" for children and teens that does not require parental signature, is fine-free and gives users a chance to have three items checked out at a time.

Anyone who lives, goes to school, works or owns property in either Cleveland, McClain or Pottawatomie counties is eligible for a Pioneer library card.

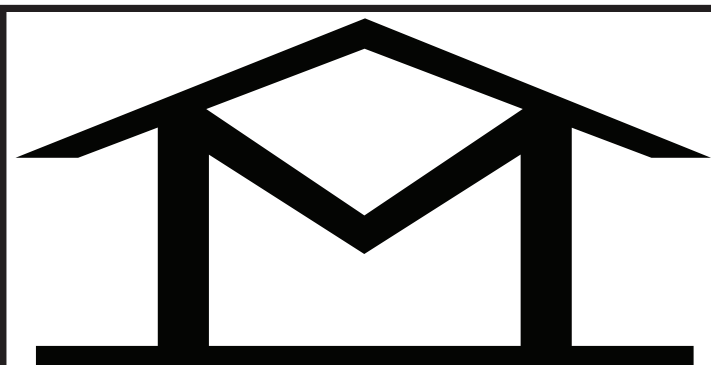

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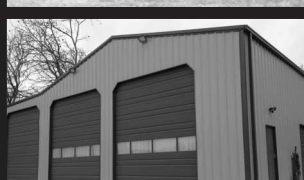
