So what does one do when the sirens sound?

If you have a storm shelter or safe room, take shelter there.

If you don't, the Storm Prediction Center at Norman has potentially life-saving advice that starts with family drills.

The center recommends families conduct a tornado drill at least once a year.

Now might be a good time.

For starters, stay away from windows and seek out a small center room such as a bathroom or closet, under stairs or in an interior hallway.

To tell Mark Wyatt's life story, it's necessary to start with his father's.

Leonard Wyatt was a Purcell native, born in 1920. His wife, Gladys Marie Story, was from a little community called Hopping near Wayne.

I was in the field with my dad when I was 6 years old. I'd be on the tractor baling hay. We didn't grow up rich. Everything we made was put back into the farm.

They married in 1940 and in the waning years of the Great Depression set about sharecropping.

That's what they were doing when Leonard met Charlie Wantland and they bought a farm and ranch together.

## PMH nearing solvency

### Sales tax hailed for saving county's only hospital

The checks come monthly and with each one Kem Scully breathes a little easier.

And if institutions could also breathe, the largest sigh would surely come from Purcell Municipal Hospital.

Scully, chief executive officer at the hospital, said those checks from the City of Purcell are the revenue from a penny sales tax earmarked for the hospital and approved overwhelmingly by Purcell voters in 2016.

"It's allowed us to continue to provide services to the community. That's it in a nutshell," Scully said.

Shoppers in Purcell began paying the additional penny tax on their purchases on Jan. 1, 2017. That sales tax is set to

Her role models are her parents because they teach how to do things.

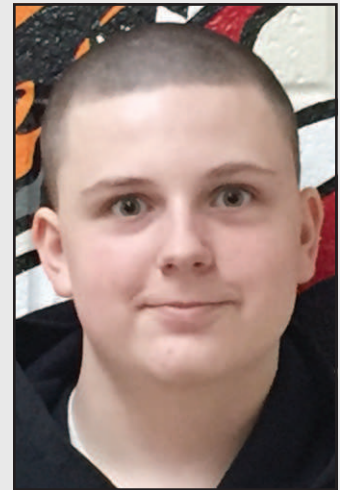

### Missing stop sign

Vehicles collide in intersection

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

A stop sign which had been knocked down is blamed for a collision late Friday that put two Ringling residents in the hospital.

OHP Trooper Aaron Nickell reported the wreck occurred around 9:30 p.m. at the intersection of State Highway 76 and 260th Street at Dibble.

A 2011 Ford Fusion driven by Gary D. Pack, 56, of Newcastle was westbound on 260th Street and entered the intersection at full speed, striking a southbound 2015 Nissan Frontier.

The driver of the Frontier, Randall D. Howard, 73, and a passenger, Vicky L. Howard, 60, both sustained head and trunk injuries. They were taken by ambulance to OU Medical Center where they were admitted in serious condition.

Randall Howard remained in serious condition. Vicky Howard has been discharged.

She accepted and actually lived not far from my house.

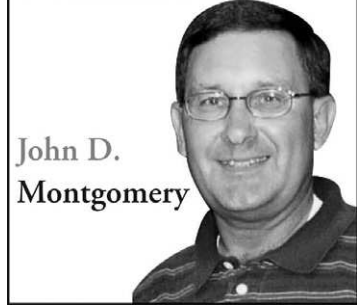
But when I got home I was admonished by two sons and spouse that I should not have done that.

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### Protection for our farmers and ranchers

#### Congressman Tom Cole

Oklahoma is a leader in multiple industries, like aviation and energy, but there is no question that agriculture is at the heart of the state's commerce.

Farmers and ranchers add incredible value to our nation's economy, and we should not take them for granted. Our national well-being depends on the health of the nation's agriculture production. To maintain healthy crops and produce, farmers and ranchers need protection and stability.

Congress provides those securities through the Farm Bill, which is comprehensive legislation aimed to support and to reform aspects that impact the agriculture industry in America.

The first farm bill passed in 1933 as the Agricultural Adjustment Act. This legislation sought to reform a variety of issues in the agriculture community, protect farmers and ensure access to healthy food for all.

Ever since the passage of that bill, programs have been reviewed and reformed, and funds reauthorized every five years. Policies have continued to address a variety of agriculture programs beyond just America's farms, including food assistance, crop support, and conservation.

This year, Congress will revisit the Farm Bill to address

critical issues that not only affect farms and ranches but the consumer as well. One of the more significant provisions in the bill encompasses nutrition and food assistance programs.

Currently, an average of 42.2 million people are enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), which may cost an estimated \$73.2 billion for Fiscal Year 2019. This year's Farm Bill will not only aid with those who struggle to put food on the table; it will establish solid work and training requirements that will help enrollees secure well-paying jobs and create financial stability.

Additionally, it will provide a variety of options along with work requirements that will increase opportunities for enrollees, including the guaranteed Employment and Training program - but should an individual decline Employment and Training, he or she will no longer be eligible for SNAP.

The Fourth District alone is home to more than 13,000 farms and ranches. However, farmers and ranchers across Oklahoma are far too familiar with unpredictable obstacles, like droughts, that can destroy crops quickly. Crop insurance is vital to protecting years of hard work and good harvests.

I am pleased that this year's Farm Bill will preserve and strengthen crop insurance coverage. The bill will require

more research and development to address risk management solutions and financial protection options should a natural disaster happen.

Conservation plays a fundamental role in maintaining healthy lands, clean air and water and vigorous wildlife. If farmers have quality lands to cultivate, then more crops can be harvested. This year's Farm Bill will continue to maintain the Conservation Reserve Program, which has been beneficial to Oklahoma's farmers for decades.

The program supports farmers with the most vulnerable lands and provides funds for them to revitalize those lands to appropriate farming standards. This program promotes soil conservation and protects farmers from going out of business. The Farm Bill will increase its enrollment cap for this program to 29 million acres, increasing opportunities for future production while improving the overall quality of the environment.

There are no better stewards of the land than those whose livelihood depends on it. Our farmers and ranchers are the foundation for the vitality of our nation. This year's Farm Bill will provide economic stability and protection for rural communities and the nation as a whole.

I look forward to supporting it when it comes to the House Floor for a vote.

### A red-light district, play & two gracious ladies

I met Barbara Bush at Storyville.

What do you mean, "Huh?"

Storyville was America's only legal red-light district. It covered about 38 square blocks in New Orleans from 1897-1917 and the city leaders thought it was a terrific idea to put all the brothels in one part of town where they could be monitored and regulated. It was Alderman Sidney Story who proposed the plan and for whom the neighborhood adopted its nickname. Never underestimate the importance of a proposition.

As the 19th century became the 20th, you could buy a Blue Book for 25 cents at the corner of Canal and Basin streets and have a guide to all the houses, right down to the services offered, prices and providers. They carried the motto, "Order of the Garter: Honi Soit Qui Mal Y Pense." Translated from the Latin, "Shame on Him Who Thinks Evil of It."

And there was jazz, so much jazz. Black and white musicians, segregated at the time, eventually took down that barrier in Storyville as jazz was born throughout New Orleans.

Just two blocks inland from the French Quarter, Storyville was among the city's biggest revenue centers by 1900.

Hold on, hold on. Don't get the wrong idea. I didn't say I met Barbara Bush in Storyville, I said I met her at Storyville. Never underestimate the importance of a preposition.

Seven years after Storyville was shuttered, Mildred Kayden entered the world in Brooklyn, New York. She studied piano at Julliard, music at Vassar, and received a master's degree from Radcliffe. She taught music at Vassar for 16 years before launching her career as a composer and lyricist, concentrating primarily on musical theater. Among her projects was the music and lyrics for Storyville, for which Ed Bullins wrote the book. It was first produced in 1977 and finished its most recent off-Broadway run in 2013. But in between, it came to Galveston, Texas, produced by Galveston Island Musicals in 2003. Maybe it was 2004.

I was covering arts for the Galveston newspaper at the time - now you see where this is going, don't you? - and set about to do a feature and maybe a review of Storyville. Kayden was so delighted that her show was being produced that she came to Galveston for the entirety of the two-week run and with little to do during the daylight hours she was readily available for an interview. Kayden was a delightful woman in her early 80s who was as happy to make a friend as she was to talk about her show. That's how we came to be seated next to one another for Storyville.

The petite, unassuming Kayden let me in on a secret. "The producer told me that Barbara Bush is coming to the show tonight and that she might want to meet me," she said. "And he told me to just act normal, like I don't know who she is. I guess she doesn't want to draw attention."

Indeed, the former first lady sat just a row in front of us and when the play was over she asked to meet Kayden. Bush did not introduce herself, but opened the conversation by telling Kayden how much she had enjoyed the show. Then she handed Kayden a program and asked for an autograph.

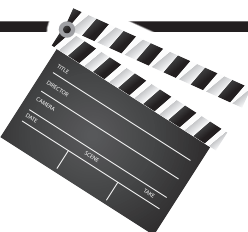
"Well, I just didn't know what to do," Kayden said. "They told me to pretend I didn't know who she was. So finally I just asked her who she wanted me to make it out to."

Bush was as gracious as Kayden that night. She died last week at 92. Kayden died in November at 96.

# MOVIES WITH DAVE

Wow. What an insane weekend at the box office this has been.

I knew "Avengers: Infinity War" would be massive, but this film's opening run has been nothing short of incredible.

Unknown to most, this whole weekend has been a fierce battle for the highest grossing domestic opening weekend, between "Avengers: Infinity War" and the previous record holder "Star Wars: The Force Awakens."

And for a while there it looked like The Force Awakens would continue to keep its #1 spot.

When Infinity War "only" opened to \$106.3 million on Friday, compared to The Force Awakens's \$119.1 million Friday back in 2015, it seemed this third Avengers film would have to settle for second place.

But then Saturday came roaring with a vengeance and Infinity War scored a gargantuan \$82.1 million, completely demolishing the previous Saturday record by over \$13 million.

This momentum carried over into the next day, leading Infinity War to also break the Sunday record, earning \$69.2 million.

All together "Avengers: Infinity War" ended up a \$257.69 million 3-day total, handily beating "Star Wars: The Force Awakens" domestic opening weekend by over \$10 million.

And that's just the U.S. and Canada. This film has been even more massive overseas.

Not only did Infinity War score \$641.5 million worldwide this weekend, beating the previous record holder "The Fate of the Furious" by nearly \$100 million, it did so without having opened in Russia or China.

That's right, I said China. Infinity War broke the previous worldwide opening weekend record without help from one of the largest movie going countries on the planet.

It's unreal.

Watching this film at the box office has almost been as entertaining as the movie itself.

Speaking of, there's only one film for me to talk about this week. No other movie even dared to release the same weekend as this behemoth. I can't say I blame them.

So enough about the box office, what did I think of the actual movie itself? Well for that we'll have to get to the review.

There's only one new movie this week, and its name is "The Avengers: Infinity War."

Facing their greatest and most anticipated foe yet, The Avengers and their allies must be willing to sacrifice everything in an attempt to defeat the all powerful Thanos before his plans bring devastation and ruin to the entire universe.

This series of films is absolutely unreal.

10 years ago, back in 2008, I would have never guessed that "Iron Man," a relatively unknown superhero back in those days, would be just the beginning of a sprawling, yet

interconnected, insanely massive cinematic universe.

Then in 2012 Marvel pulled off what seemed impossible with the release of "The Avengers," bringing together multiple heroes from their own separate films into one giant shabang, leaving both fans and critics utterly gobsmacked.

As someone who's loved superheroes since they were little, it was like a dream come true. And amazingly that film turned out to only be the start of Marvel's continuing saga.

Ever since "The Avengers" the writers at Marvel have been building up a new villain. One more powerful than all who's come before him and one so threatening that he has the potential to decimate entire planets with a mere thought.

His name is Thanos and he might just be one of the most over anticipated movie villains of all time.

It's been a long time coming. People have been speculating for years how Marvel Studios would handle this seemingly overpowered baddie.

After all this time could Thanos possibly live up to all the hype?

Well I'm here to tell you that not only did Thanos's character end up matching my expectations going into this film, he ended up greatly surpassing them. I dare say he might be the best villain in the entire Marvel Cinematic Universe.

In interviews before the film released, Kevin Feige, the president of Marvel Studios, described Thanos as the main character in Infinity War. After watching the movie myself, Feige couldn't have been more right.

Sure, all the numerous heroes Marvel has built over the past 10 years are present and almost all of them are given amazing, jaw dropping moments to shine.

But the real protagonist here, the central character of this film is Thanos.

He's the one with the most character development. He's the one with the hardest hitting emotional scenes. He's the one with best defined character arc.

I guess Marvel was tired of critics complaining about how mediocre their villains were, so they decided to go all out and make this one the star of the film.

It's was a risk, but man oh man did it pay off.

Despite Thanos's ultimate plan for universe wide destruction, he shockingly comes across as relatable and, dare I say, even sympathetic at times.

You understand why he wants to do all these horrible things and in the end you almost find yourself rooting for him despite the terrible consequences.

Of all the things Marvel got right in this film, their portrayal of Thanos rests firmly at the top in my opinion.

But it doesn't stop there.

This movie is filled to the brim with mesmerizing action scenes, one after another after another.

All of it is incredibly well shot and well edited helping

you not miss a thing moment to moment.

It just doesn't let up. From the very first scene, this film starts off intense and for the most part manages to stay at that level, becoming more and more extraordinary up until the very last frame.

Also, like most Marvel Studios' films, this movie is filled to the brim with humor. A particularly impressive feat considering the dire straits and potentially devastating consequences our heroes find themselves facing here.

Still the banter between all the heroes is very much on point, making for dozens of laugh out loud moments throughout.

It's especially fun to see all these heroes, some with massive egos, forced to all work together. Frankly it's every comic book nerd's dream.

I guess if I had a couple minor nitpicks, it seemed to me like the writing for the "Guardians of the Galaxy" characters felt a little off without writer/director James Gunn behind their dialog. At least I felt that way during the first couple scenes.

As the film moved on, things seemed to even out a bit and their interactions started feeling more natural.

Also I think the pacing seem to slow down a bit towards the middle of the film.

It never became boring or anything. I guess it just felt a tiny bit sluggish since the movie starts out at such a breakneck speed. Either way, it really picks up towards the end.

Regardless of those nitpicks, this film has become one of my favorite movie going experiences of all time.

As someone who's been following this cinematic universe for 10 years, it's like a dream come true.

If you've managed to keep up with all 18 films leading up to this movie, this is a no brainer to recommend.

I have a bit of a harder time recommending this film if you haven't seen all the movies that came before it though.

There are so many character arcs and story developments leading up to this one film, someone new to the series might find themselves completely lost.

A person unfamiliar to the series will probably be able to figure things out okay, but you'd be missing a ton of story, not to mention the emotional impact from getting to know all these characters.

Either way, see it on the biggest screen you can. Go to an IMAX showing if you're able to.

This is the first Hollywood feature shot entirely with IMAX digital cameras. Because of that, if you don't see this film in IMAX with it's taller screen, you end up missing 26% of the action compared to a regular theater screen.

As someone who experienced this film on a massive IMAX screen first hand, I can certainly say it was worth it.

era law that has now been allowed to expire, an independent counsel (Ken Starr). Pending some unanticipated change of heart on the part of an always fickle Congress, Mr. Starr may go down as the last of the "independent counsels." For all practical purposes as defined by law written in the wake of Watergate, the independent counsels were just too powerful. For one thing, they couldn't be fired.

Historically, these special attorneys and their special staffs really have done a lot of good. If there is a problem — and there may be with some of the things that are going on right now — it boils down to this: Earlier cases strongly suggest that most everyone who becomes one of these "super-lawyers" lets it go to their head. They are handed a lot of power but deep down they just know they need to grab more. OK. Take it. Don't worry. This is government work. Things like that happen every now and then. Yeah!

So probably the most common problem with this type of investigation is that it becomes its own monster and longs to devour everything. Ken Starr started out looking at a case that stretched back to President Clinton's days

in Arkansas and wound up impeaching but not convicting President No. 42. Under the Constitution, "impeachment" is the equivalent of "indictment" in a lower court. That decision is made in the House of Representatives. The Senate makes the decision.

Four articles were voted on in the House. He was impeached on two, perjury and obstruction of justice, both stemming from the president's response to a lawsuit filed by Paula Jones, who accused him of sexual harassment while he was governor of Arkansas. She was trying to bolster her chances by citing some other cases, including charges from Monica Lewinsky, an intern who said she had a relationship with the president while working at the White House. Mr. Clinton denied that anything had happened, both to the courts and to the public. Many of you doubtlessly remember the deliberate, slowly spoken television clip: "I did not have sexual relations with that woman, Miss Lewinsky."

It takes a two-thirds vote to impeach in the Senate and the Republicans held 55 of the 100 seats. It would have been necessary for 12 of Mr. Clinton's fellow Democrats to vote with all the GOP senators in order to convict. The

voting was along party lines. President Clinton was not convicted.

The biggest problem with these special prosecutors is the speed with which they work. It's a second cousin to continental drift. While major newspapers and television news operations bristle daily with sometimes unsubstantiated leaks and/or outright speculation, legislation moves slowly and governance suffers. Mr. Mueller, a former director of the FBI, has officially been in this office about the same length of time that Donald Trump has been president while reports and rumors continue to swirl.

If you're going to do something, Mr. Mueller, do it ... even if it's nothing. In fact, nothing just might be the best idea ... provided it's the truth ... the whole truth ... and nothing but the truth.

## Okeyha Mothers Club honored at OAMC Convention

In the 1930s, our nation was in the grips of The Great Depression and President Franklin Roosevelt had implemented his 'alphabet soup' of agencies to provide jobs and income for the masses.

The Works Projects Administration (WPA) provided the funds to build the old rodeo grounds and most of the sidewalks in Purcell.

There was the Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC) camp on the west end of Main Street which implemented construction jobs such as building dams and bridges.

Women were also concerned that the nuclear family had suffered from the catastrophic effects of this era. In 1937 a female home economics professor at the University of Oklahoma decided to establish women's clubs that would focus on educating women with better ideas about rearing their children.

The first meeting was held at OU with over 100 women from all over Oklahoma attending. They formed the Oklahoma Association of Mother's Clubs, OAMC. The Okeyha Mother's Club of Purcell was one of the original clubs.

After 80 years, the Okeyha Mother's Club is the only founding club still in existence. At one time there were 33 clubs, currently there are 11. Many Okeyha members have been in the Club 30-35 years but setting

the bar for length of service is Valerye Haley, who has been an active member for 53 years.

The word Okeyha is derived from the Dakota word 'Okih' which means to accomplish many things. The Okeyha's goal is to improve the lives of members of our community. They have donated thousands of dollars to causes such as Backpacks for Children, which provides food for children to take home on the weekends when food might be scarce, purchased coats, underwear and clothing for kids.

Also provided pj's and toiletries for the elderly in nursing homes, given grants to local teachers to buy innovative teaching materials, given funds for the Women's Resource center in Norman for displaced mothers and their children, supported The Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation and fund an annual scholarship to a PHS graduate.

The club raises \$3,000-\$4,000 dollars a year through their Holiday Home Tour, which is held the first Sunday in December and various other fundraisers.

Okeyha Mothers Club was honored by the Oklahoma Association of Mothers Clubs at the recent annual convention held at the Skirvin Hotel April 13-14 for being the only original charter member remaining after 80 years.

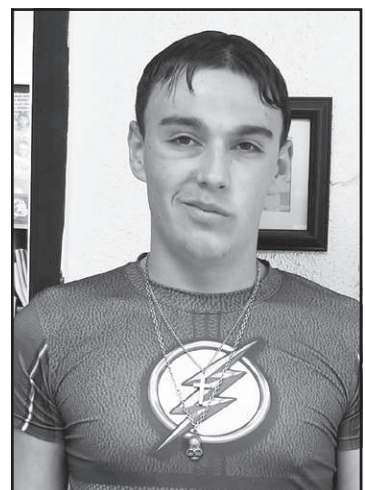

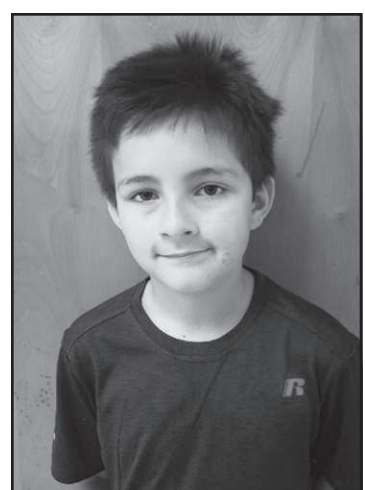

Oklahoma City and Tulsa lawyers will staff the statewide toll-free hotline on Thursday, May 3, between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. Those who speak only Spanish can call the hotline with legal questions from 3-9 p.m., as Spanish-speaking attorneys and translators will be available to take calls. The toll-free number to call is 800-456-8525 or email AskALawyer@okbar.org or PregunteAUnAbogado@okbar.org.

"We have recruited hundreds of volunteer attorneys to answer legal questions at no cost to callers," said OBA President Kimberly Hays of Tulsa. "It's part of our annual effort to educate the public about their rights under the law, but even more importantly, to create better awareness of the role of the American legal system. We hope all Oklahomans take advantage of this free community service."

Lawyers in other counties will also be giving free legal advice. About 300 lawyers will be volunteering statewide.

The Ask A Lawyer free legal advice project is one of several events in which Oklahoma law-

yers participate to observe Law Day. This year, more than 900 students statewide entered Law Day art and writing contests.

Other students are taking part in various Law Day activities, such as classroom visits from lawyers and judges and learning how legal rights and obligations change after one's 18th birthday.

The accompanying Ask A Lawyer television program will air across the state on May 3 at 7 p.m. on OETA.

The show is designed to share information about legal issues in easy-to-understand language.

This year's topics are mental health court, estate planning and expungement of criminal records.

Though Law Day is celebrated across the country, it was Wewoka attorney and 1953 OBA President Hicks Epton who originally had the idea of celebrating the law and how it affects our lives in 1952.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower established Law Day nationally by proclamation in 1958; in 1961, Congress set aside May 1 as a day for all Americans to celebrate their freedom and the ideals of equality and justice under the law.

abuse/assault and battery.

Haerich has submitted paperwork claiming to be indigent. He is in the McClain County Detention Center in lieu of bonds totaling \$207,000.

According to an affidavit, McClain County Deputy James Goins was called to the Blanchard Police Department the evening of March 20 to take a report from the 17-year-old girl.

The girl told Goins she was in the bathroom when Haerich forcibly entered the residence and came into the bathroom.

He reportedly began slapping and hitting her, causing her to fall. The girl said she struck her head on the tub and was dizzy when she stood up.

That is when Haerich allegedly pulled her jeans off, dragged her to her room and raped her.

After the assault, the girl was able to get away and ran outside to where Haerich's friend was waiting in a vehicle, according to the affidavit.

The girl asked the friend to call the police and later drove herself to the station.

Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation Agent David Gatlin interviewed the friend on March 22.

According to the friend, Haerich was mad at his former girlfriend.

The friend confirmed that Haerich entered the house, that the girl did come out and ask for help and that Haerich told him he raped the girl.

When the agent interviewed Haerich, he admitted being in the house and arguing with the girl, according to the affidavit. He said he slapped her and that they had sex.

were early Purcell settlers, had been a star football player at the University of Oklahoma in 1907 and later was a coach at Central State College in Edmond.

Eventually, Wantland went into the oil and gas business which is where he made his money.

“He was the money man and Dad was the labor,” Mark said.

After Wantland died in 1964, Leonard bought out his share of the partnership, acquiring 1,200 acres fronting State Highway 39 West across from Hillside Cemetery.

Mark would eventually sell that land in 2010, ending 46 years of family ownership.

Leonard started with hogs and then had a cow-calf operation before finding his ranching niche with stocker cattle.

“Dad worked really close with the Noble Foundation in Ardmore,” Mark said. “He was the oldest living cooperater they had until he died in 2002.”

It was through that association with the Noble Foundation that Leonard became a guinea pig of sorts to convince banks that running stocker cattle was viable.

“In the old days – 1950s – banks wouldn’t loan money on stockers,” Mark explained.

At a young age, Mark worked on the ranch.

“I was in the field with my dad when I was 6 years old,” Mark said. “I’d be on the tractor baling hay. We didn’t grow up rich. Everything we made was put back into the farm.”

One of his jobs in the summer was picking up limbs and sticks and taking them to the burn pile.

“I think that’s how I learned to throw a baseball,” Mark said.

Baseball was his recreation and he excelled at it and, truth be told, he harbored a dream of playing professional baseball.

He graduated from Purcell High School in 1974.

He had the talent to back up the dream, recalling the time a scout from the New York Mets watched him play and then asked his parents, “Does your son really like college? If he would drop out, we could draft him.”

Well, he didn’t drop out and later in the season suffered a total knee blowout while tagging out a runner who collided with him.

He had surgery but without proper aftercare his knee never wholly recovered. He was out for a year before returning to play two more years.

It was a grueling regimen of game, rest, and drain the knee. “We would play three Big 8 games on the weekend and a doubleheader during the week,” he said. “I never practiced for two years.”

His pursuit of an ag econ degree was also sidelined when Leonard got sick during Mark’s senior year at OSU.

“He didn’t have much help on the farm and I came back at Christmas to help. I stayed seven years.

“I took over the feedlot side, wrote a couple of computer programs back then. I started making more financial decisions, but he still had veto over me.”

Eventually, Leonard told him, “If you want to do this, fine. But guarantee me you

will stay five years and learn the production side.”

Mark agreed – with one caveat.

He told his father, “If I do, you can’t fire me for five years.”

Mark did eventually return to finish his degree. But instead of the 18 hours shy when he left OSU, he learned he would have to complete 30 hours. He changed his major from agecon to general agriculture.

In 1983 or ‘84, Mark moved to Amarillo where he owned different cattle feedlots in the Texas Panhandle.

Then in 1992, he suffered a heart attack.

“I was 37 years old and single. I decided I wanted to come back home,” he said.

In 1994, he purchased 100 acres northwest of Purcell and built a home.

The day before Thanksgiving 1999, Mark took his mother to Norman for an MRI. He noticed Cyndi Strawn working at the desk. As he was leaving, the normally shy Mark took a bold action. He handed her his card, saying “If you’d like to call me, I’d like to talk to you.”

That night after choir practice at the First Baptist Church in Lexington where her father was pastor, Cyndi called and accepted his invitation to come to his house. They watched OU basketball and talked.

On their second date, she took him to the emergency room.

“That’s where I met his mom and dad,” Cyndi said.

Mark and Cyndi dated 14 months before marrying in January 2001.

Their blended family includes his two sons – Michael

in Wayne and Zac in Norman – and her son, Jordan Strawn of Dallas and daughter, Alyssa Lampkin of Davis.

There are also seven grandchildren.

Mark had slowed down, a concession to his own health issues when Leonard was diagnosed with ALS around 2000. He died in 2002.

“Dad didn’t want me to sell it till after he was gone,” Mark said of the farm.

In 2010, medications Mark had been taking for his heart “backfired on me.”

They attacked his lungs and legs and he spent 60 days in the hospital.

When he woke up, his first question was about the farm.

That year, he leased the property to a “very nice caretaker.” Gladys died in 2012 and the farm eventually sold in 2013.

He’s also sold half of the 100 acres he purchased after returning from Texas.

“I’ve got eight cows now,” he said. “The grandkids like them. And I dabble in a couple of other enterprises.”

Physical labor is very limited. “I just can’t do it anymore,” he explained. “My health didn’t let me do lots of things. So I found different little niches in agriculture. I have country in my blood, I guess.”

total for the year-to-date to 8.38”.

So far this year Oklahoma City has received 5.72” with the normal for this time of year at 9.10”.

One year later and with the influx of the sales tax monies starting, the hospital had a negative balance of \$760,762. And to date in FY 2017-18, that number has been pared to just \$54,010.

“And there are three months left in the fiscal year,” Scully said.

It is possible PMH will end the year in the black.

“We’re trending towards that and working really hard,” she added.

The influx of sales tax dollars and increased revenue realized from switching the clinic from weekday appointments only to a walk-in clinic/urgent care offering expanded hours has enabled PMH to upgrade the radiology department to digital x-ray equipment.

It has also facilitated the addition of a general surgeon and eye surgeon at the hospital and has paid for new air conditioning units for the physician’s clinics.

In 2016, the hospital implemented a reduction in force. Today, staffing levels are holding true and when vacancies occur, they are filled.

In all, Scully said, what she does now isn’t that far from what she did as a nurse.

“Nursing and caring for people is in my heart,” she explained. “I see nursing as caring for people holistically. I’m still caring for people by fighting to keep their hospital alive.”

ding – a mattress, blankets, pillows, etc. If you have one, put a helmet on.

Do NOT try to shelter in place in a mobile home or vehicle.

If caught in the open, lie flat and face down on the ground, as far away from vehicles and trees as possible. Protect the back of your head with your arms.

Do NOT seek shelter under bridges.

The following is taken from the National Severe Storms Laboratory’s Severe Weather 101: Tornado Basics:

### What is a tornado?

A tornado is a narrow, violently rotating column of air that extends from the base of a thunderstorm to the ground. Tornadoes are the most violent of all atmospheric storms.

### Where do tornadoes occur?

Tornadoes occur in many parts of the world, including Australia, Europe, Africa, Asia, and South America. Even New Zealand reports about 20 tornadoes each year. Two of the highest concentrations of tornadoes outside the U.S. are Argentina and Bangladesh.

### Where is tornado alley?

Tornado Alley is a nickname for a broad area of relatively high tornado occurrence in the central U.S. Please remember, violent or killer tornadoes do happen outside “Tornado Alley” every year.

### When are tornadoes most likely?

The peak “tornado season” for the Southern Plains is May into early June. But, remember, tornadoes can happen at any time of year. Tornadoes can also happen at any time of day or night, but most occur between 4 and 9 p.m.

What is the difference between a Tornado WATCH and a Tornado WARNING?

A Tornado WATCH can cover several states. Watch and prepare for severe weather and

stay tuned to NOAA Weather Radio to know when warnings are issued.

A Tornado WARNING means a tornado has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar and there is a serious threat to life and property to those in the path of the tornado. Act now to find safe shelter! A warning can cover several counties in the path of danger.

### How is tornado strength rated?

From the damage, we can estimate the wind speeds. An “Enhanced Fujita Scale” was implemented by the National Weather Service in 2007 to rate tornadoes in a more consistent and accurate manner. The EF-Scale incorporates 28 damage indicators such as building type, structures and trees. For each damage indicator, there are 8 degrees of damage ranging from the beginning of visible damage to complete destruction.

### How do tornadoes form?

The truth is that we don’t fully understand. The most destructive and deadly tornadoes occur from supercells, which are rotating thunderstorms with a well-defined radar circulation called a mesocyclone. Tornado formation is believed to be dictated mainly by things which happen on the storm scale, in and around the mesocyclone.

### What do storm spotters look for when trying to identify a tornado or a dangerous storm?

Inflow bands are ragged bands of low cumulus clouds extending from the main storm tower usually to the southeast or south. The beaver’s tail is a smooth, flat cloud band extending from the eastern edge of the rain-free base to the east or northeast. Both suggest the presence of rotation.

A wall cloud is an isolated cloud lowering attached to the rain-free base of the thunderstorm. The wall cloud is usually to the rear of the visible precipitation area. A wall cloud that may produce a tornado usually exists for 10 to 20 minutes before a tornado appears.

Rear flank downdraft is a downward rush of air on the back side of the storm that descends along with the tornado. It’s this motion that causes the hook echo feature on radar.

A condensation funnel is made up of water droplets and extends downward from the base of the thunderstorm. If it is in contact with the ground, it is a tornado; otherwise it is a funnel cloud.

expire on Dec. 31, 2019.

Because of the way sales tax disbursement is handled by the Oklahoma Tax Commission, it was March 2017 before the first hospital taxes were returned to the city and eventually forwarded to the hospital.

From March through June 2017, the financially strapped hospital received \$362,498.

A new fiscal year began July 1, 2017 and from then through February 2018, the checks from the city totaled \$764,013.

In the first full year, the hospital sales tax generated \$1,126,511.

What has that meant for the hospital’s financial picture?

Scully said before the sales tax money was available, the hospital was \$1.175 million

in arrears in accounts payable.

“We were in danger of our vendors cutting us off,” she said. “We’ve been working really hard to reduce that and we’re presently down to \$313,000 in accounts payable. “We are current with all of our vendors.”

Scully sees hope and a future for the hospital. Without that sales tax revenue, she said, McClain County’s only hospital would be just a memory by now.

The hospital ended fiscal year 2012-13 in the red to the tune of \$1,991,724. That deficit swelled to \$3,781,392 at the close of FY 2013-14.

The red ink showed a balance of \$860,508 as FY 2014-15 ended and jumped to \$1,492,113 at the end of FY

The foursome of Spain, Liz Caralampio, Keith and Swayze won the 1600 relay Regional Championship in 4:06.40.

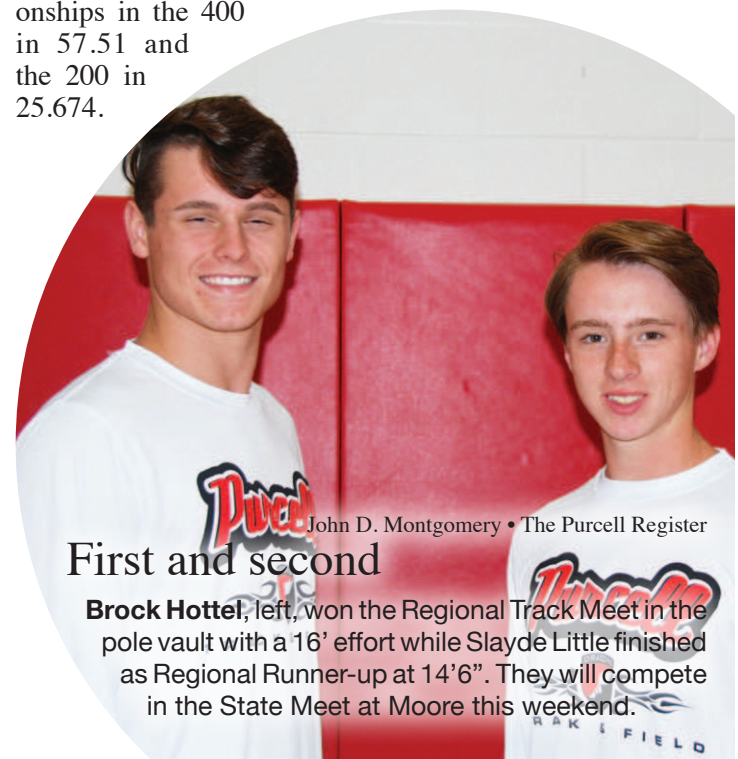
Makayla Williams qualified in the shot. She was fifth with a 34'8" effort while Jacie Carr qualified with a fourth place finish in the discus at 96'7".

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## Lexington baseball ends season with 10-13 record

The Lexington baseball team's season came to an end last week when they lost in district play to the Washington Warriors.

Washington beat the 'Dawgs in the first game of a doubleheader, 11-2, last Thursday, followed by a 4-0 shutout win in the second game.

Washington (ranked No. 11 in Class 3A with an 18-10 record) moves on to Regionals.

Meanwhile, the two losses brought Lexington's season-ending record to 10-13 on the year and squashed a chance for the 'Dawgs to extend a somewhat impressive season.

They started out 3-5 this year. But the 'Dawgs started playing better baseball midway through their schedule and looked like a team to reckon with.

At one point, Lexington was 8-5 on the season and had amassed a solid five-game winning streak through April 5.

The doubleheader against Washington was sort of a microcosm of Lex's season.

They played well most of the time. But, at key moments, the 'Dawgs fell just short.

"Seth Comer threw exceptionally well in that second game against Washington," said Ennis about his starting pitcher.

"They just had some hits that fell in and we had some times where it didn't fall in for us. That's just kind of how the game goes sometimes. We played well enough to win. We just didn't get enough breaks to fall our way."

In the first game versus Washington last week, Caden Jones was 2-for-3 with one RBI.

Andre Ibarra was also 2-for-3. In the second contest, Jones again was 2-for-3 and Ibarra was 2-for-4.

## Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation recognized the Veteran of the Week, Harold McClellan, who was a member of the United States Army serving in the Korean War. We are very proud to recognize him for his military service with an introduction and presentation of a military style cap representing his war.

Our fundraising program accepts the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles and recreational vehicles to raise funds by selling them or giving them to veterans in need. I received a call a few days ago from a veteran we are assisting who wanted to donate an older motorhome. Of course, I said bring it on down and we will either give it to someone for a place to live or sell it to raise operating funds.

Each month we are spending more than \$30,000 providing services to the veterans and surviving spouses who are in need. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit your donations are tax deductible. The person donating an item establishes the value for deduction from their taxes.

For those of you who have not stopped in lately, we have several new ways to help us help veterans and surviving spouses who are in need of assistance. We now have what is called a Dip Jar. It is a device that will withdraw \$20 from a debit or credit card and deposit into our Foundation account.

We also have a Wish List of consumable items we use

each day such as paper, coffee supplies, paper towels, bottled water and other items.

Our most costly program is helping veterans to pay for medical exams that are needed to help veterans to service-connect their disability.

For those of you who need a ride to your VA medical appointments or our location, in Norman Clayton Lee and Louie Metseff are available by calling (405) 550-8806 and option 105 or 106. For transportation for those in a wheelchair needing transportation, please call the same number and select option 101 to reach Lora.

Recently I wrote about the donation we received of one of the Department of Veterans Affairs handicapped accessible vans. Last week Signarama of Edmond added our organization's name and logos at a discounted price. We have already used it to transport several wheelchair bound veterans to their appointments. We will keep it on display at our location in Norman at 1268 North Interstate Drive. Please call us if you need this service.

The van is capable of transporting three or four wheelchair veterans or 13. We have been praying for a way to transport veterans with mobility issues to their VA appointments. As always all of the services we provide are free.

These forms were developed by the VA to speed up and improve the accuracy of VA rating decisions. As I am the Accredited VA Representative, I receive a copy of all these rating decisions. Since we began using this program initiated by the Department of Veterans Affairs, the approval rate for the veteran's claims we assist with has increased dramatically.

Recently one of the veterans we assisted several years ago in receiving a 100 percent rating for hearing loss visited with us. His wife of 50 years told me that he was suffering depression because of his hearing loss. The couple returned a month later with a diagnosis of depressive disorder caused by his inability to communicate due to his profound hearing loss effectively. We filed a 21-526EZ requesting service-connection for depressive disorder secondary to his

service-connected hearing loss.

The VA then sent him to their psychologist for an opinion of his condition and granted service-connection of depressive disorder at the 100 percent rate secondary to his hearing loss. This new rating enabled him to receive what VA terms as Housebound which pays an extra \$500 or so each month. The term Housebound is used when a veteran has one disability rated at 100 percent or others based on common etiology of that disability.

For your information, if a veteran rated 100 percent has a dependent who becomes totally disabled before age 18 they may be eligible to receive VA benefits under the Helpless Child program. For questions about these benefits visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning or call VA at 1-800-827-1000 for more information.

When a veteran's or surviving spouse's application for VA benefits is denied several times a Notice of Disagreement (NOD) may be filed by the veteran or an accredited representative. We file those only as a last resort as it may take many years for the Board of Veterans Affairs to make a ruling. Our philosophy has always been to provide the evidence required for their

claims to be approved before filing a NOD.

During the last few weeks we have traveled to Muskogee four times to represent our clients at their video hearing before a Judge in Washington, D.C. A decision will be made in the near future on the surviving spouses and veterans we represented.

Last week we received the following rating decisions from the Department of Veterans Affairs. Seven veterans were awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$269,536 per year. There were 11 veterans who received a VA Disability rating from 10-90 percent. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$86,587 per year. We had four who were approved for DIC benefits, Pension Benefits or Aid and Attendance benefits.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

## Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Welcome, good friends, to the "front porch."

This coming Sunday, Lord willing, we will open God's Word to the book of Philippians and to one of the greatest passages in all of the Word of God.

You'll remember the passage well: "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God ..." (Philippians 3:5).

That is how Paul begins a great Philippians text designed to remind those Christians of the need to cloak themselves with a pure, Christ-like humility. In that endeavor, Paul may have written his most powerful text showing the power and glory of Jesus Christ (vs. 5 - 12).

When a speaker prepares for a Sunday sermon, he, of course, must spend a great deal of time with that passage. He likely keeps it in his mind all week long, not only when he sits down to study and to write but as he walks about the day, even when he lies down to sleep. Often it will be the last thing he'll have on his mind before falling to sleep and the first thing on his mind when he awakes to a new day.

I have found that what it takes to share adequately what the Spirit has in mind in a passage is to "live those words" for a while—think on them, meditate on them, "slosh them around in our minds" until they begin to "speak" to us.

We do not mean a literal voice from heaven, of course, but, instead, meditating on them until a powerful message comes alive (Colossians 3:16; Psalm 1:2).

I learned this lesson in a little different way from one of our old preachers from years ago—Brother Lynwood Smith, who was also a great songwriter. I remember his talking about what he would do sometimes when a songwriter would send him the music to a song for him to put the words to. It was at times like these that Brother Lynwood Smith lived up to his name, for he was, indeed, a skilled "wordsmith."

He received some music in the mail once and looked over it carefully. But the piece of music didn't seem to connect with him; so, he put it in the bottom drawer and left it for a while.

It was some years later he needed a song for a particular occasion, and he remembered

that song "germinating" down in the bottom drawer. He took it out and, suddenly, found it to be one of the prettiest pieces of music he had ever gotten. He hummed it around the house for a while, and it wasn't long before it started to "say something to him," as he put it. So, he sat down hurriedly and put words to the music:

"From a land of sad good-byes," he wrote, "where no tears be-dim our eyes, God's children are gathering home ..."

"God's Children Are Gathering Home" became one of Lynwood's most popular songs, sometimes being sung by a thousand voices at our annual New Year's Meeting up in Oklahoma City.

Much as it was with Brother Lynwood and that great song, we will meditate on Philippians 3:5-12 for a while between now and the Lord's Day. Perhaps by then, we trust, we will be able to share Paul's great message to the Philippians in a way that the great text will be a blessing once more to all who gather. That is our hope and prayer.

I hope you'll come join us at 10:30 a.m. Until then, God bless!

Our God, the Father of Jesus and our Father, is ineffable, indescribable. If we could describe him, he wouldn't be God! And so Jesus gives us metaphors that will help us understand how God acts in the world.

This past Sunday, God was described as the "vine grower," the One who prunes the branches of the vine—Jesus—that they might bear more fruit

(John 15). Life can indeed be described as a series of "prunings." Sometimes the pruning is a result of our own decision, our own cooperation with God.

For example, a man gets married. He decides to stop his old habits, or even lets go of old friends who are not good for his vocation. A woman realizes that she is a shopaholic. And so she prunes her own spending habits, maybe even gives over the credit card to her husband. During Lent, we prune ourselves of certain habits so that we more fully experience the nourishment of the Vine that sustains us, Jesus our Lord.

Sometimes the pruning is not of our own doing, but of God directly. My parents died when they were fairly young. And so I (Fr. Jim) was orphaned at an early age. This experience forced me to learn how to make friends among strangers more easily. Or perhaps a parent becomes sick and needs special care.

Our routine gets changed by this drastic pruning event. Or

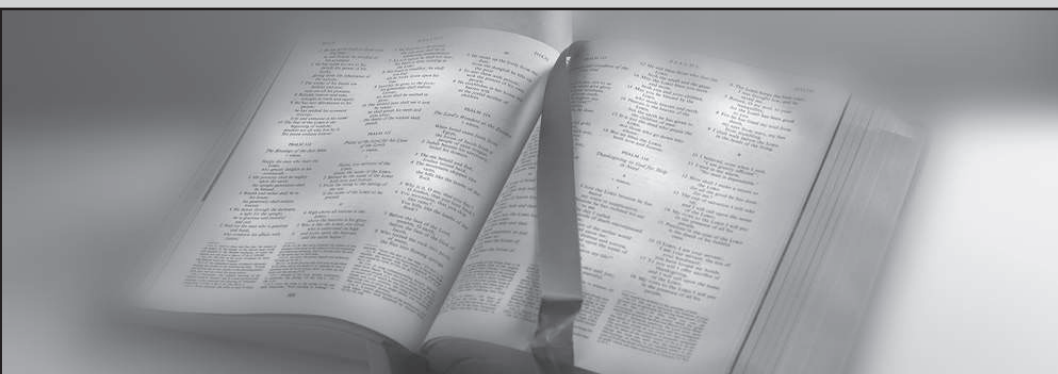
a divorce happens against our own will. One woman began using her journal to work through her feelings—of shame, of guilt, and finally into new life, after her husband left her.

We are not only the sum total of our own decisions, but also those circumstances over which we have no control. If we are fully connected to the Vine of spiritual life, Jesus, then we can understand these events as God's way of shaping us and forming us into the person that we are being called to become. And we will bear much fruit.
