



1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.

2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.

3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).

4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.



I was coming off the sideline at halftime of the Meeker-Kellyville game Thursday night when I heard: "Brian! Hey, Brian!"

Behind the chainlink fence was a guy giving me the "come here" wave, so I went over.

"You know who I am?" he asked.

I knew I had seen his face before, but I couldn't remember where.

"You look familiar, but, no, I'm afraid I don't."

"I'm Bryan Blansett," he said.

And then everything fell in place.

Bryan has been my Facebook friend for several years, as has Brian Blancett from the great state of Tennessee and Brian Blansett from Mississippi.

I was feeling unique a few years and did a Google search on my name and close variations.

Those three popped up, as well as a Brian Blansit from Colorado who had died shortly before I did the search.

So, I found them on Facebook and sent friend requests.

Bryan lives in Bristow and we had talked about meeting for coffee but had never done it.

We had several things in common. Both of us were Air Force guys and had suffered the loss of a wife in what should have been the prime of life.

At the game, talk turned toward the inevitable question of how closely we might be related.

I told him that I didn't know any of my Blansett relatives closer than cousins because my great-grandfather had undertaken some criminal activity in the Ozarks in the late 1880s and was lynched for his efforts.

Expectations.

Sometimes when you go into a theater expecting complete and utter garbage, you end up lowering your expectations so much that any glimpse of quality makes the movie seem decent and even entertaining.

Other times there's films which seem to have everything going for them. By all accounts they're incredible, earning acclaim from critics and audiences alike. As a result your vision for the movie becomes larger than life, and sadly, al-

most impossible to live up to. Even if the film is indeed quite good, it can never match what you imagined it would be. The end result can't help but leave you at least a little disappointed.

The two films I saw this week were fantastic examples of both and how expectations can color your overall movie experience, good or bad.

Hero gains newfound powers, slowly learns how to use them with a couple major action scenes sprinkled throughout, all the while a generic bad guy is seeking the same powers as the hero, and in the end the hero and villain have a major battle in the film's climax, both having similar character designs and abilities.

It's the same basic framework as the first "Iron Man." Not to mention "The Incredible Hulk," and "Ant-Man." It's old at this point. Completely played out. Do something new please.

What makes the story even more odd is the movie forces Venom into being a self sacrificing hero by the end of it.

Venom isn't a hero. He's villain. The guy bites off а people's heads for crying out loud. Multiple times.



Chickasaw Lighthorse Police officer patroling the parking garage at Newcastle Casino noticed a Mazda with a paper tag which appeared to have been altered.



Grave mapping Project opens at Hopping Cemetery

Tombstones and Technology is a public event starting Friday at Hopping Cemetery near Wayne.

Joined by volunteers, staff from Open Range Archaeology LLC will document the cemetery's marked and unmarked graves.

The event, which will continue through Sunday, is in observance of Oklahoma Archaeology Month.

Dr. Lauren Cleeland, principal investigator and staff archaeologist for ORA, said work to be performed will include cleaning headstones and doing rubbings on those that are too weathered to read.

ORA will also utilize new technology - ground penetrating radar and magnetometry to identify missing or unmarked graves.

Cleeland said ORA always does a project in association with Oklahoma Archaeology Month.

"I wanted us to find a cemetery that hadn't been mapped," she said.

Cleeland, who lives in Purcell, had heard there are missing graves in Hopping Cemetery. She called Wilson-Little Funeral Home and was directed to Brian Sharp.

"It will be a nice little project," Cleeland said. "I am super excited about it."

The ground-penetrating radar will show a void when passing over a grave.

"We expect it will show where there are bodies and where there aren't," she said. "Staff will be there and anyone who would like (to help) can come. We won't turn anybody away."

Hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday through Sunday.

Scott praised the play of Jake Berrey, who returned after an injury two weeks earlier. Berrey snagged six passes for 112 yards and the score.

"Kroth did a good job of throwing the ball," Scott said. He got good protection from linemen Jalyn Shea, Elijah Fixico, Gage Askew, Malachi Parrish and Jaysen Shea, the coach said. The line played well both in the run game and the passing game.

In addition to Fink's defensive scoring play, Galyean intercepted a pair of Trojan aerials.

"We put him on their stud receiver and he played well," Scott said.

Galyean ran one pick back nine yards and the other he returned eight yards.

Junior Nickk Albright was praised by the head coach for his play at safety.

"He led the team with eight tackles, forced a fumble and had a nifty interception," Scott said.

"We came out a little flat in the second half after getting up on them," Scott said.

The Dragons led 37-6 at the halftime break.





Paul Ratliff honored at football game

AngieSteele Washington Correspondent

Paul Ratliff, a United States Navy Pilot in World War II, presented the game ball at the Washington High School football game September 28. At 96 years young, he is a decorated war veteran and a long time member of the Washington community.

Clarence "Paul" Ratliff was born June 16, 1922 on the family ranch five miles west of Washington. He was next to the youngest in a family of seven boys and four girls. After graduating from Washington High School in 1940 and working on the ranch for a time, Paul enlisted in the Navy in 1942 and obtained his commission as a naval aviator.

Paul served in both the European and Pacific theaters of World War II. His first duty assignment was on the aircraft carrier USS Humboldt and then the USS Kasaan Bay in the Mediterranean Ocean flying the Grumman F6F Hellcat. At the age of 20, Paul was taking off and landing on carrier decks flying numerous missions over Italy and providing air cover during the invasion of southern France.

He was then transferred to the Pacific and served on the USS Saratoga and USS Monterey participating in the invasions of Iwo Jima, Leyte Gulf (Philippines) and Okinawa. 


