It's not that Hardy's acting was bad, but the way he de cided to portray Eddie Brock was completely baffling to me. The guy is supposed to be this famous television investigative journalist, yet he talks like a
5 -year-old trapped in an middle 5 -year-old trapped in an middle aged man's body.
He's always mumbling and fumbling with his words. Not just when he's freaking out with Venom's voice in his head, that's actually how he interviews people in the movie too It reminded me of James McAvoy's character in "Split" when he was pretending to be little boy. I just couldn't get my head around why he would have his character talk and act like that.
I'm nothere to shame anyone with a speech impediment. I myself have a hard time getting words out more often than I'd like, not to mention an annoying lisp, but I also don't have aspirations of being a TV news reporter either.
Idon't buy that anyone would hire this version of Eddie Brock to be a television journalist, let alone that he'd become a world famous one.
I think what keeps this movie from being a total failure is the film isn't bogged down with too many characters like "Suicide Squad" or "SpiderMan 3" and it isn't overloaded with plot points like "Batman v Superman.
At the end of the day, the characters of Eddie Brock and Venom in this movie are still fun to watch. They keep things simple and they don't
ake everything too seriously. "Venom" is filled to the brim with problems, really obvious easy to criticize problems, but fortunately that doesn't keep the movie from being entertaining to watch. Or at least they didn't for me.
This isn't a movie I'd rushout to watch, but it was certainly much better than I thought it'd be.
Strap in,lower your expectations as far as they'll go, and you just mightenjoy this messy theme park ride of a movie. "Venom" is rated PG-13.

That one song alone had ev ry hair in my body standing on end, goosebumps everywhere and tears streaming down my face.
Even as I write this review I still get chills while listening o this song.
I would be shocked if I don't see "Shallow" nominated for an Oscar come awards season.It'll be an incredibly hard contender to beat, that's for sure
Of course there's more than one song in this movie, and while I didn't think any of the film's other songs were nearly aselectric as"Shallow"there' still plenty of fantastic mus throughout the movie
I had no idea Bradley Cooper could sing before this movie, but he has a surprisingly good voice. I certainly didn't have any trouble believing him as a famous country singer.
The acting here is nothing to sneeze at either.
Cooper and Gaga have fantastic chemistry together My favorite part of the movie beyond "Shallow," was prob ably the two of them just sitting around and getting to know each other through their shared ove of music
And seeing their relationship blossom only made it all the more heartbreaking to watch Cooper's character succumb more and more to his own self destructive tendencies.
If you've seen any of the three versions of this film, 1937 with Janet Gaynor, 1954 with Judy Garland, or 1976 with Barbra Streisand, you already have a plays out

That isn't a criticism though. This movie t a criticism though. This movie being remade three limes only speaks to its timelessness. The same story that was told back in 1937 is still elevant in 2018.
I don't mind studios remaking films one bit as long as the filmmakers strive toward quality, and that was definitely the ase with this movie.
But while I do think this is a great film, it sadly wasn't perfect experience for me. This might just be an issue or me, but I struggled to understand at least a quarter of the words coming out of not only Bradley Cooper's mouth, but also Sam Elliott's, who plays Cooper's brother in the film. The two of them are peas in a pod. Both have this gruff country way of speaking that I couldn't parse together for the life of me. A lot of the time it just sounded like mumbling. It was so bad I'm certain I missed a couple of the movie's plot points because of it. There where the story seemed a bit disjointed to me, but it was probably just my inability to not understand two of the film's
notunderstand two of the film's
characters.
The other thing I'd caution before seeing this movie is just because the film says it's a musical on paper, don't go into it expecting something like "Mamma Mia" or "The Greatest Showman,"
When I think of a musical, I think of a movie where characters suddenly break out into song out of nowhere with labo rate song and dance numbers This movie is mumbers. This movie is much more grounded than that.
Where the line between real ity and fantasy is often blurred in most movies I'd consider film takes place in reality. It's not a positive or a neg ive, but still you should prob ably know what kind of movie
All in all, I thought this wa really well made film with some truly excellent musical performances.
It might not have quite lived up to my larger than life expectations, but I think that was more my fault in creating those massive expectations rather than problems with the film itself.
Regardless this is definitely movie well worth your time One that's very easy to rec ommend to movie and music "A Star Is Born" is rated R

1 can of refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
$1 / 2$ cup of mayonnaise
14 plus 3 Tablespoons of grated Parmesan cheese
4 slices of deli-style moz zarella cheese
3 Tablespoons butter
1 cup marinara sauce
Salt and pepper
Heat the oven to $375^{\circ}$ and spray a cookie sheet with cooking spray.
Season each side of chicken with salt and pepper and melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a skillet over medium high heat on the stove. Cook the chicken for about 10 minutes until each side is nicely browned, and set aside.
In a small bowl, mix together he mayonnaise and $1 / 4$ cup of parmesan cheese. This will serve as a wonderful coating or the chicken to give it an extra kick of flavor.
Unroll each triangle of cresent rolls and place one piece of chicken at the wide end of each one. Spread a good layer of the mayonnaise mixture on top of each piece of chicken. Divide the mozzarella slices in half to create 8 slices, and add to the top of each piece of chicken.

Joined by volunteers, staff from Open Range Archaeology LLC will document the cemetery's marked and unmarked graves.
The event, which will continue through Sunday, is observance of Oklahoma A chaeology Month.
Dr. Lauren Cleeland, principal investigator and staff archaeologist for ORA, said work to be performed will nclude cleaning headstones and doing rubbings on those that are too weathered to read. ORA will also utilize new echnology - ground penetrating radar and magnetometry to identify missing orunmarked graves.
Cleeland said ORA always does a project in association with Oklahoma Archaeology Month.
"I wanted us to find a cemetery thathadn'tbeenmapped", she said.

Cleeland, who lives in Purcell, had heard there are missing graves in Hopping Cemetery. She called Wilson-Little Fuheral Home and was directed to Brian Sharp.
"It will be a nice little project," Cleeland said."I am super excited about it."
The ground-penetrating radar will show a void when passing over a grave.
"We expect it will show where there are bodies and where there aren't," she said. "Staff will be there and anyone who would like (to help) can come. We won't turn anybody away."

## Paul Ratliff honored at football game

Paul Ratliff, a United States Navy Pilot in World War II, presented the game ball at the Washington High School football game September 28. At 96 years young, he is a decorated war veteran and a long time member of the Washington community.
Clarence "Paul" Ratliff was born June 16, 1922 on the family ranch five miles west of Washington. He was next to the youngest in a family of seven boys and four girls. After graduating from Washington High School in 1940 and working on the ranch for a time, Paul enlisted in the Navy in 1942 and obtained his commission as a naval aviator.
Paul served in both the European and Pacific theaters of World War II. His first duty assignment was on the aircraft carrier USSHumboldtand then
the USS Kasaan Bay in the the USS Kasaan Bay in the Mediterranean Ocean flying the Grumman F6F Hellcat. At the age of 20, Paul was taking flying numerous missions over flying numerous missions over Italy and providing air cover during th
France.
He was then transferred to the Pacific and served on the USS Saratoga and USS Monterey participating in the invasions of Iwo Jima, Leyte Gulf (Philippines) and Okinawa. And at the end of the war, from the deck of the USS Monterey while anchored in Tokyo Bay next to the USS Missouri, he witnessed the signing of the Japanese surrender.
Paul is a decorated war veteran receiving numerous medals and honors, but the most prestigious and memorable was also the most recent. During an event at the Oklahoma state capitol in 2016, the consu general for the French government presented the Legion of Honor (France's highest military medal \& equivalent to our Medal of Honor) to Paul along with 10 other WWII veterans from Oklahoma for their roles in the liberation of France. He also received a bottle of "real" French champagne
Paul still lives on the family farm in Washington and has three great-grandchildren who attend Washington Schools, Faith, Kaydence and Jace AnFaith, Kaydence

his military service.

I want to express my appreciation to the two families who donated their cars to us this week so that we can give the vehicles to another veteran or use them to raise funds to help others. During the last year, we have received motorcycles, cars, trucks, farm tractors and handicap equipment. These items have helped to pay for
some of the services we provide to veterans and their families. If you make a monthly contribution or an annual one you are helping us make a big difference in the amount of aid we can provide to our brothers and sisters who served in the United States military.
Monthly we are spending more than $\$ 25,000$ to provide services to veterans and their families. Currently, 12 percent of the people we help will give back to help the next veteran or their family. I wish that everyone would step up to help us make a difference in the lives of other veterans.
We could use another driver to help Louie and Clayton transport veterans to their VA appointments. These two volunteers spent 84.5 hours transporting 23 veterans 1,331 miles this week. We have another van just looking for the right person to start driving veterans to their appointments. The CART bus system in Norman makes three or more trips to the VA Hospital in OKC each day. I have met several veterans from Norman who uses that service for their transportation to their VA appointments. As an example, there are more than 300,000 veterans in Oklahoma many of whom have never filed a claim for benefits. We can only accommodate $10,000-15,000$ or so
each year. There is no way that each year. There is no way that we could help all of them in
my lifetime. What is needed is my lifetime. What is needed is a coordinated effort to get the word out about VA benefits to every veteran and surviving spouse of veterans. Most of the veterans I meet are eligible to receive some type of benefits if they would only apply for them. One of the more significant problems that are affecting the number of surviving spouses who apply for VA benefits is he fact that their veteran did not file a claim for benefits. We have found that if a veteran is receiving VA benefits and their service-connected disability is

On Lord's Day, October 7, we paused again to examine some of John's narrative on the life of our Lord, including another John's encounter with Jesus: John the Baptist. On the Monday morning that followed, I was able to pause early to continue our literary work chronicling John's memories of Jesus and his view of faith; and we were able to capture at
least one important thought to least one important thought to share here.
As we talk about faith, we learn something invaluable from this John for our walk with the Lord: This walk is not about us. Sometimes this lesson is a hard one to learn. Whatever our status in the world may be, or whatever our position in the Lord's church may be, the focus of all of our
devotion and adoration is on Jesus Christ. It is not on us, and If is not on some other.
If any man could have boasted of his position in God's scheme, it would have been John the Baptist. But he refuses. He preaches to hundreds of thousands, no doubt, and the number who submit o his baptism go to into the thousands, as well. But he was not preaching his gospel, and he was not baptizing men and women unto himself. He was preparing them as well as the whole world for the coming of sesus, He in whom all of our faith lies.
The apostle Johnestablishes the importance of knowing where we stand in the scheme of things in the very first chaper. The Pharisees come to John sking who he is, even questioning if he were the Christ
hat was to come to the world "He confessed," John writes, and did not deny, but confessed, 'I am not the Christ" John 1:20). There is a rare obility in John's declaration ere. In fact, there is a special nobility in two of John's powrful statements. His second ne is his declaration that Jesus to be the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the orld (v. 30).
But the first declaration is mportant in its own right, as John declares, "I am not the Christ." Perhaps every follower of Christ needs to pause a moment for some of the Baptist's self-reflection and consider not only who Christ are not.
