Skydiving on your bucket list?

If jumping out of a perfectly good airplane is your wont, the day is coming that you will have to look no further than Purcell Municipal Airport. The Purcell City Council on Monday approved a lease agreement with a skydiving firm. Benjamin Squared LLC dba Scissortail Skydiving will build a 6,000 square foot hangar at the airport. The lease also includes a 5.5 acre tract south of the hangar where parachutists will land. City manager Dale Bunn said Purcell will be the second location for the company which is currently at the Shawnee airport. "They do a really good business there," Bunn said. The council also accepted

a \$50,270 base bid from Sun Construction to renovate two public restrooms and the staff restroom at Purcell Public Library. The city's initial budget for the restroom project was \$40,000. Library manager Rebekah Lynam said the work will make the restrooms ADA compliant and will include new toilets and dividers between the stalls. Sun Construction's was the lowest of three bids. Lynam also said the library has a verbal commitment from Purcell school superintendent Jason Midkiff to cover the alternate bid of \$13,980 for new flooring in the meeting room and new cabinets in the kitchen. Rather than accept both bids for a total of \$64,250 in hopes that the school district will pick up the tab for the additional

work, city attorney Ted Haxel advised the council to accept just the base bid and instruct Sun Construction to seek a contract with Purcell Public Schools for the balance. In other business, the council:

- approved the \$8,830 purchase of a new bed and rebuilt skid unit for the fire department's Brush 24, a 2008 1-ton truck
- voted to schedule the city's primary election for February 12, 2019
- approved a budget amendment for inspections at the new junior high school
- approved a budget amendment to Jordan Contractors for water system improvements for the Lexington bridge, and
- approved meeting dates and

Responsibility of Home Owner to Maintain Property

It is the responsibility of the home owner and or tenant to maintain their property or be subject to a \$260 fine. Violations are as follows:

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.
 2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.
 3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).
 4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.
 5. It takes all of us working together to keep Purcell a home to be proud of.

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Kelly's hat trick good for OU

Was it luck or fate for Caleb Kelly to play football at The University of Oklahoma?

Probably a little bit of both. Kelly, who won the Butkus Award for being the best high school linebacker in America in 2015, was heavily recruited.

Back to that a little bit later... Monday Kelly was honored at Purcell Intermediate School with the AllState AFCA Good Work Team award.

Before he was awarded the prestigious Community Service Award, he spoke to Purcell's third, fourth and fifth graders and made a riveting talk about his religious beliefs and how that helps him through life.

Kelly is part of the esteemed group of 22 college football players selected for their extraordinary commitment to making a lasting impact off the field.

Among his off-field activities, Kelly has served food to needy families, traveled with the Sooners For Haiti and volunteered with youth camps and a camp for children with special needs.

He has also served as president of the OU chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes for the past two years.

Kelly is the fifth Oklahoma football player named to the AFCA Good Works Team, joining Jacob Guterrez in 2006, Nic Harris in 2007, Gerald McCoy in 2008 and Quinton

Carter in 2010.

Area FCA Director Jeremy Tims introduced both Kelly and his fellow defensive player Amani Bledsoe to the eager Purcell youngsters.

Bledsoe also made some brief remarks before Tims started asking a few questions.

He asked them their favorite moment since coming to OU.

Bledsoe, who is from Wichita, KS, said just being on campus.

Kelly said it was in last year's Big 12 Championship game with TCU when Bledsoe knocked the ball loose on one of the game's first plays.

Kelly scooped the ball up and ran it in for a touchdown.

"My Mom was at the game so I was able to blow her a kiss," he said.

Tims told the students he was at the OU locker room earlier

this season after a practice.

"I went into the locker room hoping to recruit some new people to FCA but everyone was gone except for one person," Tims said.

Tims said the player was having a bad week.

But when Tims walked into the locker room, Kelly had a huge wad of trash in his arms.

Tims explained it was Caleb Kelly who was picking up the OU Football locker room all by himself.

Kelly had water bottles, sandwich bags, empty Gatorade bottle, tape and other pieces of trash that had been thrown down by players.

"It's doing the right thing when no one is looking," Tims said of Kelly.

That pretty well sums Caleb Kelly up.

And the hat trick?

Kelly said the recruiting process came down between Notre Dame and OU.

"I put two pieces of paper in a hat, prayed about it and then closed my eyes," Kelly told the Intermediate Schoolers.

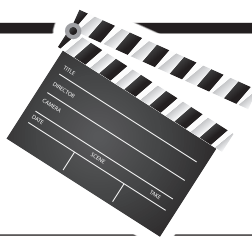
When he got the piece of paper in his hand he was saying oh no I hope it's not Notre Dame.

"It was OU and I was very happy," Kelly said.

Kelly said his bedroom now is 1,250 miles away from his bedroom in California but with his faith and athletic ability he is doing fine. Just like Oklahoma.

MOVIES WITH DAVE

This is a week that can be summed up in a single word for me.

Expectations.

The image you've built in your head from previews, news, cast interviews and so on, can play a huge factor in how much you actually end up enjoying a film.

Sometimes when you go into a theater expecting complete and utter garbage, you end up lowering your expectations so much that any glimpse of quality makes the movie seem decent and even entertaining.

Other times there's films which seem to have everything going for them. By all accounts they're incredible, earning acclaim from critics and audiences alike. As a result your vision for the movie becomes larger than life, and sadly, almost impossible to live up to.

Even if the film is indeed quite good, it can never match what you imagined it would be. The end result can't help but leave you at least a little disappointed.

The two films I saw this week were fantastic examples of both and how expectations can color your overall movie experience, good or bad.

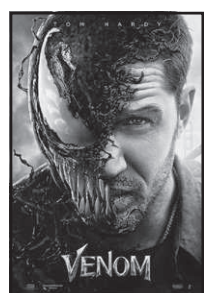
I guess the lesson here is getting over excited about a movie is a bad idea in general. You'd think someone who goes to the theater on a weekly basis would have learned that by now, but apparently not.

You know what they say. Keep your expectations low and you'll never be disappointed.

Anyway, let's get to those reviews.

First up is "Venom."

Following a scandal that ruins his career, investigative journalist Eddie Brock (Tom Hardy) accidentally becomes



the host of an alien symbiote that gives him a violent super alter-ego named Venom.

Hunted by a shadowy organization

seeking the symbiote, Eddie must rely on his newfound powers if he hopes to have a chance to survive.

I was not looking forward to this movie at all going into it.

Just the idea of the film itself seemed like a disaster waiting to happen.

Taking the most popular villain from the Spider-Man universe and throwing him in his own standalone movie with no Spider-Man in sight? That sounds like a terrible idea.

The whole thing felt like a soulless cash grab and before sitting down to see this movie my expectations could not have been lower.

That said, I ended up not hating this movie nearly as much as I thought I would going into it.

Not that I'd say this is a good film by any stretch, but compared to the dumpster fire I was expecting, the movie turned out kind of okay. Dare I say even entertaining at times.

For starters, the design for Venom here is really good. He's like a creature of deep black tar with teeth, shifting and flowing around his body. Very ominous looking.

It's certainly a massive step up from the awful Topher Grace version of Venom we saw back in 2007 in "Spider-Man 3" that's for sure.

I also really liked the banter between Venom and Tom Hardy's character. Venom with his deep bass booming voice and the meek Eddie Brock con-

The whole scenario certainly makes for few memorable moments. Some are laugh out loud funny, others are downright awkward and even uncomfortable to watch.

Whether you enjoy the awkward moments probably depends on how much you enjoy watching public freakouts. Personally, I'm not a fan.

I'm also not much of a fan of the movie's general story. It's not unbearable and it's easy enough to follow, but it's incredibly standard as far as superhero origin stories go.

Hero gains newfound powers, slowly learns how to use them with a couple major action scenes sprinkled throughout, all the while a generic bad guy is seeking the same powers as the hero, and in the end the hero and villain have a major battle in the film's climax, both having similar character designs and abilities.

It's the same basic framework as the first "Iron Man." Not to mention "The Incredible Hulk," and "Ant-Man." It's old at this point. Completely played out. Do something new please.

What makes the story even more odd is the movie forces Venom into being a self sacrificing hero by the end of it.

Venom isn't a hero. He's a villain. The guy bites off people's heads for crying out loud. Multiple times.

Making the guy who eats faces for fun into something heroic felt ridiculously forced to me.

It's the exact same problem "Suicide Squad" had last year. The writers for these villain lead movies can't seem to come

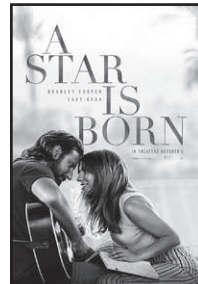
At the end of the day, the characters of Eddie Brock and Venom in this movie are still fun to watch. They keep things simple and they don't take everything too seriously.

I have been looking forward to this movie for months.

From the first moment I saw the trailer, I had nothing but the highest expectations for this movie.

I love Gaga's music, especially her acoustic work. If you haven't listened to Gaga sing without post-processing, you're definitely missing out.

There's so much power and emotion in voice. I can't help but be moved whenever I hear her sing.

And luckily, the music here didn't disappoint one bit.

Gaga's singing is incredible in this movie. I dare you to listen to "Shallow" from the film's soundtrack and not feel something deep within your soul.

That one song alone had every hair in my body standing on end, goosebumps everywhere, and tears streaming down my face.

Even as I write this review I still get chills while listening to this song.

I would be shocked if I don't see "Shallow" nominated for an Oscar come awards season. It'll be an incredibly hard contender to beat, that's for sure.

Of course there's more than one song in this movie, and while I didn't think any of the film's other songs were nearly as electric as "Shallow," there's still plenty of fantastic music throughout the movie.

I had no idea Bradley Cooper could sing before this movie, but he has a surprisingly good voice. I certainly didn't have any trouble believing him as a famous country singer.

The acting here is nothing to sneeze at either.

Cooper and Gaga have fantastic chemistry together. My favorite part of the movie, beyond "Shallow," was probably the two of them just sitting around and getting to know each other through their shared love of music.

And seeing their relationship blossom only made it all the more heartbreaking to watch Cooper's character succumb more and more to his own self destructive tendencies.

If you've seen any of the three versions of this film, 1937 with Janet Gaynor, 1954 with Judy Garland, or 1976 with Barbra Streisand, you already have a good idea how this latest movie plays out.

Things are different here and there, but in the end this is still a remake. If you've seen one version of the film there isn't much in the story that will take you off guard. If you're expecting something brand new, you're going to end up disappointed.

That isn't a criticism though. This movie being remade three times only speaks to its timelessness. The same story that was told back in 1937 is still relevant in 2018.

I don't mind studios remaking films one bit as long as the filmmakers strive toward quality, and that was definitely the case with this movie.

But while I do think this is a great film, it sadly wasn't a perfect experience for me.

This might just be an issue for me, but I struggled to understand at least a quarter of the words coming out of not only Bradley Cooper's mouth, but also Sam Elliott's, who plays Cooper's brother in the film.

The two of them are peas in a pod. Both have this gruff country way of speaking that I couldn't parse together for the life of me. A lot of the time it just sounded like mumbling.

It was so bad I'm certain I missed a couple of the movie's plot points because of it. There were a couple times in the film where the story seemed a bit disjointed to me, but it was probably just my inability to not understand two of the film's characters.

The other thing I'd caution before seeing this movie is just because the film says it's a musical on paper, don't go into it expecting something like "Mamma Mia" or "The Greatest Showman."

When I think of a musical, I think of a movie where characters suddenly break out into song out of nowhere with elaborate song and dance numbers.

This movie is much more grounded than that.

Where the line between reality and fantasy is often blurred in most movies I'd consider musicals, all the singing in this film takes place in reality.

It's not a positive or a negative, but still you should probably know what kind of movie you're going into.

All in all, I thought this was a really well made film with some truly excellent musical performances.

It might not have quite lived up to my larger than life expectations, but I think that was more my fault in creating those massive expectations rather than problems with the film itself.

Regardless this is definitely a movie well worth your time. One that's very easy to recommend to movie and music lovers alike.

Chicken Roll Ups

8 pieces of uncooked chicken tenderloins

1 can of refrigerated crescent dinner rolls

1/2 cup of mayonnaise

1/4 plus 3 Tablespoons of grated Parmesan cheese

4 slices of deli-style mozzarella cheese

3 Tablespoons butter

1 cup marinara sauce

Salt and pepper

Heat the oven to 375° and spray a cookie sheet with cooking spray.

Season each side of chicken with salt and pepper and melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a skillet over medium high heat on the stove. Cook the chicken for about 10 minutes until each side is nicely browned, and set aside.

In a small bowl, mix together the mayonnaise and 1/4 cup of parmesan cheese. This will serve as a wonderful coating for the chicken to give it an extra kick of flavor.

Unroll each triangle of crescent rolls and place one piece of chicken at the wide end of each one. Spread a good layer of the mayonnaise mixture on top of each piece of chicken.

Divide the mozzarella slices in half to create 8 slices, and add to the top of each piece of chicken.

Roll the crescent dough around each piece of chicken and place on the prepared cookie sheet. Melt the remaining tablespoon of butter in the microwave and brush over the tops of each crescent roll. Then sprinkle each roll-up with the remaining grated parmesan cheese.

Bake for 14-15 minutes or until the roll-ups are golden brown.

Serve with warmed marinara sauce.

Over 1,200 young people from Blanchard, Bridge Creek, Newcastle, Purcell, Washington, Lexington, Noble, Wayne, Maysville, Elmore City, Stratford, Wanette, Wynnewood and Pauls Valley were given the opportunity to explore real life situations and make lifestyle, career, and budget choices at Reality Check.

The participating freshmen students in the Mid-America School District toured the mini-city set up in the conference room of the Health Sciences building on the Mid America campus.

At Reality Check, ninth grade

students were assigned an occupation, salary and family situation. The students went into a Reality Check where they spent their salary on the necessities and luxuries they envision as part of the adult lifestyle. Students were also given the opportunity to visit the chance booth to pull out a "Chance" card. Those were unexpected items that affect their life daily.

Those students whose salaries could not meet the budgeted finance demands were directed to the SOS booth, where they received help in determining changes that could be made in their lifestyle that better suited their salary and budget.

Local businesses and volunteers representing the banking industry, Pioneer Libraries, DHS, McClain County Juvenile Services, Oklahoma Home and Community Education, Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Health Department, Delta Community Action, 4-H Volunteers and OSU Extension staff were present at Reality Check to help students determine how much of their income needed to be spent in each category in order to provide them with their

desired lifestyle.

The goal of this exercise was to help students learn whether their occupation will provide the type of lifestyle they want. After their trip through the Reality Check, students had a greater knowledge of what type of career they would like to have as an adult and to set goals to achieve that career.

Reality Check clarified the need for today's teens to examine their attitudes about their future and their career expectations, as well as motivate students to stay in school, stay away from drugs, and avoid teenage pregnancy.

Freshmen related to this project and discovered the value of making good educational and financial choices that will affect their future. Adults enjoyed the opportunity to interact with high school students helping to influence decisions regarding an important aspect of the student's future.

Financial education is not always the most stimulating course that can be taught, but by using this interactive venture, the educational experience is not only meaningful, but exciting.

Neighbor:

She'd intended to be a doctor but marriage and family put her pursuit of a pre-med degree on hold shy of earning her bachelor's degree. Her life was a busy one as a homemaker and mother raising four children.

For about 10 years she worked for Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church, serving as director of religious education.

But Peter kept pushing her to return to college. She finally agreed, but only after telling him if she went back, she wasn't stopping at an undergraduate degree.

By that time, medicine was off the table and Lauren was left to chart a new path.

She had two main interests — history and anthropology — and so she enrolled in one course each in her first semester back. In doing so, she had an epiphany.

Anthropology is "history without written documents," she said. "It provides a voice for people who aren't here to speak for themselves."

Peter thought she might become disenchanted during her first field exercise — digging in the ground while living two weeks in a tent.

Ha!
"I loved everything about it," she said. "Finding something that no one has seen in hundreds of years. It's a remarkable feeling."

A favorite find was a red seed bead she uncovered at an excavation near Newkirk.

It was a trade item used by early explorers when they encountered Native Americans.

The red ones, Lauren ex-

plained, are "very rare." Her undergraduate degree is in anthropology with a minor in history.

Sadly, Peter was killed in an industrial accident in 2012 and never saw Lauren follow through on her pledge to take her education to the highest limits.

She graduated in 2015 with a Ph.D. in molecular archaeology.

In research for her dissertation, Lauren studied human coprolites (those feces fossils mentioned earlier), using modern DNA sequencing techniques to bring new light on how ancient people lived and died.

Case in point was the Cave of the Dead Children in Mexico.

In the oldest section, eight burials of very young children were uncovered.

Also discovered were well-preserved coprolites buried beneath an adobe floor.

And therein lay the key to explaining the children's deaths.

DNA from *Physaloptera* was detected in the coprolites, although it was initially misidentified as *ascaris*, a common roundworm.

"*Physaloptera* is a interesting little worm," Lauren said.

It attaches to the inside of the stomach and intestines, eventually eating through those organs.

Untreated, the prognosis is infection and death.

Now 53, Lauren works as a principal investigator and staff archaeologist for Open Range Archaeology LLC near Norman.

The company is a culture

resource management research firm called on by entities dealing with projects on federal land or which receive federal funding.

Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act requires field work on properties 50 years or older to determine if the sites meet requirements for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places.

"We evaluate and document everything," Lauren said.

ORA utilizes drone technology, ground-penetrating radar, geo-archaeology and ethnobotany in this work.

"Some companies have due diligence and are doing the right thing for the right reason," Lauren said.

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation has an internal archaeology department for this work. In addition they also work with ORA.

Other ORA clients include municipalities and oil companies.

"I like to search things out to the end," Lauren said. "My husband used to say I was like a dog after a bone."

Co-worker and staff archaeologist Andy Richard puts it another way.

Lauren, he said, is a "critical thinker."

Lauren's family has grown to include five granddaughters and four grandsons.

So far no one has shown an inclination to follow her career path.

"The kids are interested, but daunted by the amount of schooling that goes with it," she said.

Grave mapping Project opens at Hopping Cemetery

Tombstones and Technology is a public event starting Friday at Hopping Cemetery near Wayne.

Joined by volunteers, staff from Open Range Archaeology LLC will document the cemetery's marked and unmarked graves.

The event, which will continue through Sunday, is in observance of Oklahoma Archaeology Month.

Dr. Lauren Cleeland, principal investigator and staff archaeologist for ORA, said work to be performed will include cleaning headstones and doing rubbings on those that are too weathered to read.

ORA will also utilize new technology — ground penetrating radar and magnetometry — to identify missing or unmarked graves.

Cleeland said ORA always does a project in association with Oklahoma Archaeology Month.

"I wanted us to find a cemetery that hadn't been mapped," she said.

Cleeland, who lives in Purcell, had heard there are missing graves in Hopping Cemetery. She called Wilson-Little Funeral Home and was directed to Brian Sharp.

"It will be a nice little project," Cleeland said. "I am super excited about it."

The ground-penetrating radar will show a void when passing over a grave.

"We expect it will show where there are bodies and where there aren't," she said. "Staff will be there and anyone who would like (to help) can come. We won't turn anybody away."

Starbucks has agreed to furnish coffee in the mornings, but volunteers should bring a lunch or make lunch plans.

Hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday through Sunday.

Solar:

junior high school.

The cost for the 150 kWh solar system would be \$412,000. A \$50,000 rebate is available, Midkiff said, which would lower the district's cost to \$362,000.

Bond funds could be used to purchase the solar system outright or there is a lease-purchase option similar to what the district has to switch lighting in all schools to LED.

The panels have a 25-year warranty.

Assuming no change in electrical rates, projected savings from using solar at the school is estimated at \$2,415 per month, Midkiff said.

The superintendent told the board that a decision will need to be made "within the next couple of months."

Tyler Graves, construction superintendent with Goldsby Construction, told the board there has been good progress on the junior high school site in the past month.

At least three more weeks of dirt work will be needed.

"Our goal is to start paving the road and start the foundation by the first of November," Graves said.

At Conger Field, the roof is going on at the new fieldhouse this week. The structure should be enclosed in 1-1/2 weeks.

In his report to the board, Midkiff had praise for last week's homecoming and congratulations to the Hall of Fame inductees, as well as the high school band for winning the Mustang Invitational on

Saturday.

Also, he said, it was "really cool" to host University of Oklahoma linebacker Caleb Kelly as he received an Allstate Good Hands Team plaque and recognition.

The award was one of a dozen presented across the country, Midkiff said.

"It was neat for our kids to be able to see someone they can look up to getting recognized for helping others," he said. "It sets a great example."

Mid-term adjustments in state funding based on the October 1 enrollment count should clarify the district's budget picture, Midkiff said.

"The budget is definitely different this year," he explained.

"Expenditures are up quite a bit due to the teacher pay raise. It makes it a little hard this early to tell if we are right on track."

But Midkiff noted that revenues coming in to the state are strong.

In other business, the board:

- approved the general fund and building fund revenue and expenditure plans for the 2018-19 school year;

- approved revised board policies for federally funded programs;

- approved a resolution for the annual school election; and

- appointed Midkiff, Jerry Swayze, Tina Swayze, Tammy Dillard, Bret Petty and Jay Solomon as personnel evaluators.

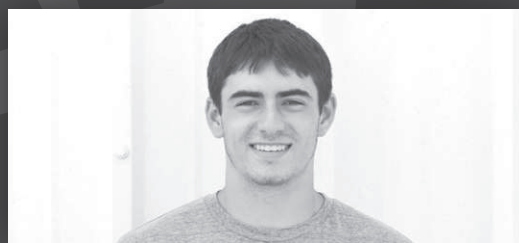

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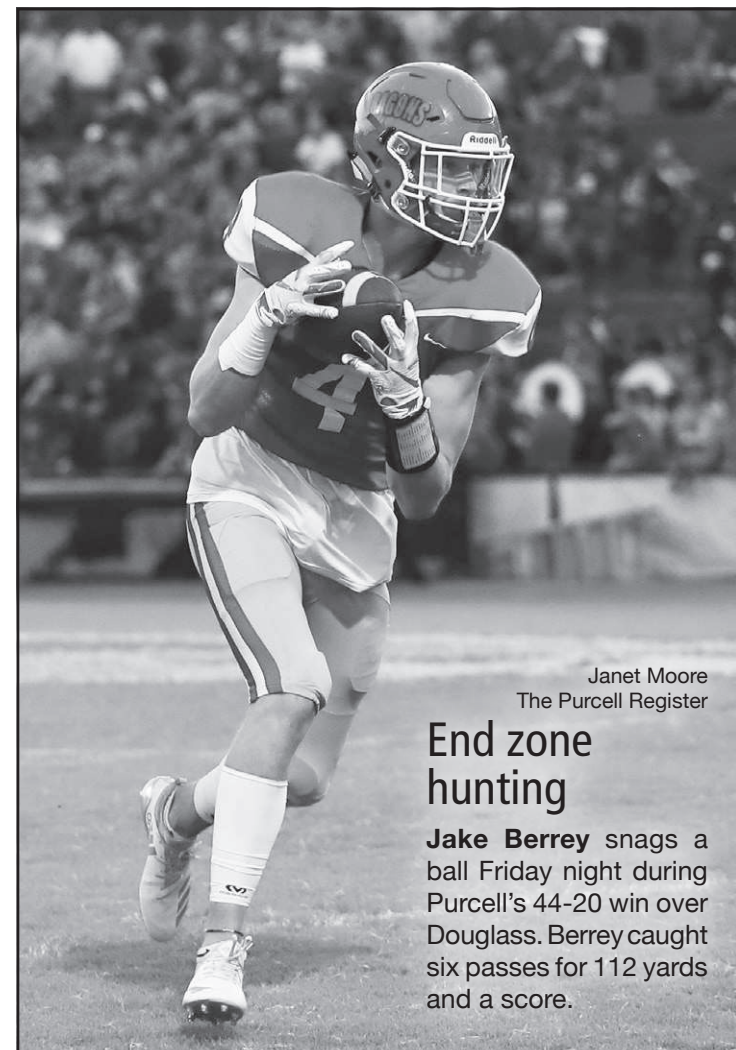

Paul Ratliff honored at football game

Paul Ratliff, a United States Navy Pilot in World War II, presented the game ball at the Washington High School football game September 28. At 96 years young, he is a decorated war veteran and a long time member of the Washington community.

Clarence "Paul" Ratliff was born June 16, 1922 on the family ranch five miles west of Washington. He was next to the youngest in a family of seven boys and four girls. After graduating from Washington High School in 1940 and working on the ranch for a time, Paul enlisted in the Navy in 1942 and obtained his commission as a naval aviator.

Paul served in both the European and Pacific theaters of World War II. His first duty assignment was on the aircraft carrier USS Humboldt and then the USS Kasaan Bay in the Mediterranean Ocean flying the Grumman F6F Hellcat. At the age of 20, Paul was taking off and landing on carrier decks flying numerous missions over Italy and providing air cover during the invasion of southern France.

He was then transferred to the Pacific and served on the USS Saratoga and USS Monterey participating in the invasions of Iwo Jima, Leyte Gulf (Philippines) and Okinawa. And at the end of the war, from the deck of the USS Monterey while anchored in Tokyo Bay next to the USS Missouri, he witnessed the signing of the Japanese surrender.

Paul is a decorated war veteran receiving numerous medals and honors, but the most prestigious and memorable was also the most recent. During an event at the Oklahoma state capitol in 2016, the consul general for the French government presented the Legion of Honor (France's highest military medal & equivalent to our Medal of Honor) to Paul along with 10 other WWII veterans from Oklahoma for their roles in the liberation of France. He also received a bottle of "real" French champagne.

Paul still lives on the family farm in Washington and has three great-grandchildren who attend Washington Schools, Faith, Kaydence and Jace Andrews, children of Joseph and Makenna Andrews.

We will be closed on Thursday, November 22, for Thanksgiving.

Our Veteran of the Week is Mr. Michael Laing, a Navy veteran who served during the Korean War. We recognized him for his service and presented him a military cap representing his military service.

I want to express my appreciation to the two families who donated their cars to us this week so that we can give the vehicles to another veteran or use them to raise funds to help others. During the last year, we have received motorcycles, cars, trucks, farm tractors and handicap equipment. These items have helped to pay for

some of the services we provide to veterans and their families. If you make a monthly contribution or an annual one you are helping us make a big difference in the amount of aid we can provide to our brothers and sisters who served in the United States military.

Monthly we are spending more than \$25,000 to provide services to veterans and their families. Currently, 12 percent of the people we help will give back to help the next veteran or their family. I wish that everyone would step up to help us make a difference in the lives of other veterans.

We could use another driver to help Louie and Clayton transport veterans to their VA appointments. These two volunteers spent 84.5 hours transporting 23 veterans 1,331 miles this week. We have another van just looking for the right person to start driving veterans to their appointments. The CART bus system in Norman makes three or more trips to the VA Hospital in OKC each day. I have met several veterans from Norman who uses that service for their transportation to their VA appointments.

As an example, there are more than 300,000 veterans in Oklahoma many of whom have never filed a claim for benefits. We can only accommodate 10,000-15,000 or so each year. There is no way that we could help all of them in my lifetime. What is needed is a coordinated effort to get the word out about VA benefits to every veteran and surviving spouse of veterans. Most of the veterans I meet are eligible to receive some type of benefits if they would only apply for them.

One of the more significant problems that are affecting the number of surviving spouses who apply for VA benefits is the fact that their veteran did not file a claim for benefits. We have found that if a veteran is receiving VA benefits and their service-connected disability is

on their Death Certificate the spouse will probably be eligible to receive VA DIC benefits from \$1,250 to \$1,500 per year. Those benefits could make a big difference in how the surviving spouse of a veteran lives out their years. We encourage all surviving spouses of veterans to visit with our volunteers any Tuesday or Thursday morning. I am a VA Accredited Claims Agent that provides services to veterans and their families at no charge. I receive a copy of all VA correspondence to the veteran and surviving spouses represented. On any given week we receive over 500 letters from the Department of Veterans Affairs. Some of these will be requests for information, rating decisions (award letters) along with many other

types of notices. By receiving this information, we can send a notification to the veteran explaining what they need to do next to continue their applications for benefits.

Another way this helps is that I'm able to review the veteran's claims folder in the VA Computer system. Many times, that access will enable me to review the VA's C&P performed by the VA Hospitals or by one of the contractors like QTC or LHI. Both receiving VA the rating decisions and our ability to view the VA electronic claims folder has helped to improve the claims process we provide to veterans and their families.

Five years ago, when the Archbishop of Buenos Aires became Pope, he took the name Francis, of Francis of Assisi. Why? Because Pope Francis knew that one of the greatest challenges of his papacy would be to call his Catholic flock to an awareness of the abuse of our world, our home, our sister, our Mother Earth.

St. Francis was the saint who loved the earth. He loved all creatures, large and small. These are the words that Pope Francis wrote in his encyclical letter, 'Laudato Si': "St. Francis was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. He loved, and was deeply loved for his joy, his generous self-giving, his openheartedness.

He was a mystic and a pilgrim who lived in simplicity and in wonderful harmony with God, with others, with nature and with himself. He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace." (10)

Pope Francis, like St. Francis, is urging us to an ecological conversion. This conversion is the realization that we

are all connected - to each other and to every other part of creation. We are connected to the earth, to the air, to the trees, to the birds. We are connected because we need each other to live more fully in the glory of God.

And because we need each other, we have a responsibility to protect and defend our earth. What does this mean? It means that we do not waste food. It means that we are careful to recycle and reuse as much as possible, so as to limit the trash that finds its way into our oceans and rivers. It means that we are careful not to burn more fuel than we need. This increases the warming of the planet. It means that we are careful not to harm the creatures of God.

Again from the Pope's encyclical letter: "Praise be to you, my Lord." In the words of this beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. 'Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who

produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs.'

This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life." (1,2) We have much work to do. St. Francis, pray for us.

Our parish celebrated the Feast of Our Lady of Victory on Sunday with a procession and walking rosary around the neighborhood. About 30-40 people participated, and we ended by releasing a colorful blue and gold balloon rosary into the sky! We finished by serving ice cream sundaes at the Hall for the many children who were there.

Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

On Lord's Day, October 7, we paused again to examine some of John's narrative on the life of our Lord, including another John's encounter with Jesus: John the Baptist. On the Monday morning that followed, I was able to pause early to continue our literary work chronicling John's memories of Jesus and his view of faith; and we were able to capture at least one important thought to share here.

As we talk about faith, we learn something invaluable from this John for our walk with the Lord: This walk is not about us. Sometimes this lesson is a hard one to learn. Whatever our status in the world may be, or whatever our position in the Lord's church may be, the focus of all of our

devotion and adoration is on Jesus Christ. It is not on us, and it is not on some other.

If any man could have boasted of his position in God's scheme, it would have been John the Baptist. But he refuses. He preaches to hundreds of thousands, no doubt, and the number who submit to his baptism go to into the thousands, as well. But he was not preaching his gospel, and he was not baptizing men and women unto himself. He was preparing them as well as the whole world for the coming of Jesus, He in whom all of our faith lies.

The apostle John establishes the importance of knowing where we stand in the scheme of things in the very first chapter. The Pharisees come to John asking who he is, even questioning if he were the Christ

that was to come to the world.

"He confessed," John writes, "and did not deny, but confessed, 'I am not the Christ' (John 1:20). There is a rare nobility in John's declaration here. In fact, there is a special nobility in two of John's powerful statements. His second one is his declaration that Jesus to be the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (v. 30).

But the first declaration is important in its own right, as John declares, "I am not the Christ." Perhaps every follower of Christ needs to pause a moment for some of the Baptist's self-reflection and consider not only who Christ is but to understand who we are not.

Special music was provided Sunday morning by Gynean Gentry.

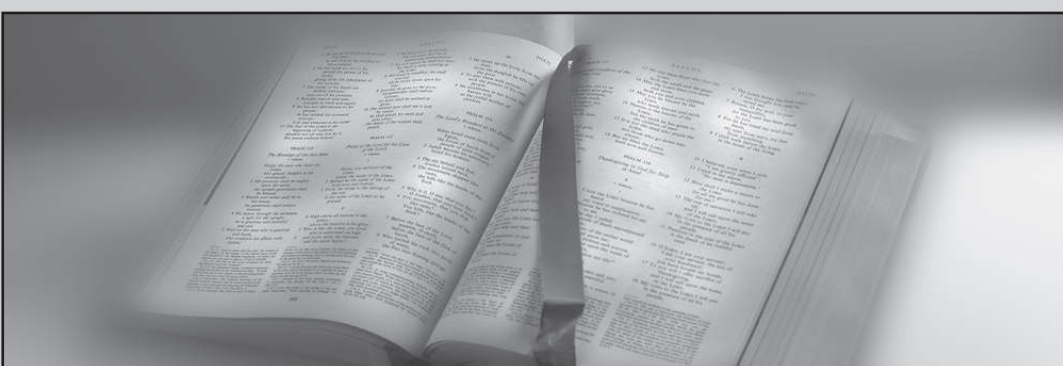

rating decisions that granted a 100 percent evaluation to veterans. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,736,405 per year. They will also be eligible for other state and federal benefits. Fifty-seven veterans received ratings from 10-90 percent. These veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$841,796 per year. Those with a 50 percent or higher rating will receive some state benefits.

Two surviving spouses received DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance benefits based on their spouses' military service. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$29,509 per year.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

We are not the Christ. We are not the ones with the authority to decide, invent, institute, innovate, or reconstruct the church of the Lord or the commandments He has given. "He who rejects Me, and does not receive My words, has that which judges him," says Christ later in John's gospel, "the word that I have spoken will judge Him in the last day" (John 12:48).

Any talk of faith necessitates our considering the positive and negative aspects of it. It

is something John does, and the same burden falls upon us. This subtle reminder here in the opening of John's gospel will serve us well as we proceed on in the gospel of faith.

And let us be assured of this one thing: For us to attain the faith that leads to eternal life, we will have to lay ourselves aside, as does John the Baptist, and we will have to follow the Lord on His terms and not on our own.

Lex:

Then, some magic happened for the Lex squad.

"Right before the second quarter expired," Berglan explained, "Toby Prevost connected with Andre Ibarra for a 56-yard touchdown strike and Trejo's PAT sent us in at the half with a 14-8 lead. That was very important for us."

The third quarter was dominated by the Stratford Bulldogs. They racked up 19 points off of their power run game and play action passing.

But, Lexington was able to answer Stratford (right before the end of the third quarter) with another Prevost-to-Ibarra pass for a 43-yard touchdown strike. The Trejo PAT made it 27-21, in favor of Stratford going into the fourth quarter.

Then, the fourth quarter came. Lexington was all over Stratford for the final calling.

"The fourth was owned by the Lexington Bulldogs," Berglan said. "We were able to put together three scoring drives that sealed the deal for us. A '3-and-out' and a bad snap gave Lex great field position and, in one play, Toby Prevost hit Jaylen Cottrell on a 28-yard touchdown pass.

"Trejo's PAT put Lexington in the lead for good. After the kickoff, Stratford mounted a long drive deep into Lexington territory. However, big negative plays by (defensive men) Nathan Clegg and Ryan Hailey stopped the Stratford threat."

Prevost connected with Cottrell for a fantastic 7-yard touchdown pass and Trejo kicked the extra point to seal the deal for the 'Dawgs.

"That gave us a little breathing room," Berglan stated. "A fumble recovery by Andre Ibarra gave Lexington the ball back with 1:42 left. In district play, points are a commodity and are very rare. Toby Prevost was then able to take a 30-yard run in for a TD to give the Bulldogs a 14-point victory."

Despite the 19-point outburst by Stratford in the third quarter, Lex's defense played very well. They allowed Stratford 164 yards on 47 carries rushing. Stratford was 14-23 for 157 yards passing.

Lexington was outgained by Stratford in total offense - 321 to 307. But, Lex made the big plays and no one was more adept at making those

than Prevost. The senior QB completed 14-of-21 passes for 259 yards, no interceptions, and four touchdowns. He also had 30 yards rushing the ball.

Next on the schedule is defending Class 2A state champion Millwood. The Falcons are unbeaten and seem to be on a roll to another gold ball. But, the Lexington bunch isn't one to roll over and play dead.

"We're going to lay it all on the line," Berglan said. "It should be a great contest."
