There's a proverb about bridges that states "Let every man praise the bridge that carries him over."

But since opening to traffic on August 22, the first phase of a long awaited

span over the South Canadian River between Purcell and Lexington has generated a fair amount of controversy and complaints on social media, but precious little praise.

The Purcell Register reached out to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation with some of those concerns. Following are the responses provided by Lisa Salim, public information manager:

OHP: No passing zone deadly crash

Head-on collision kills both drivers

Deadly head-on

Two people were killed in this grinding head-on collision early last Thursday morning on State Highway 39 just west of Union Hill Baptist Church.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said a car passing in a no passing zone caused a deadly accident last Thursday morning.

The head-on collision west of Purcell killed both drivers, according to the OHP.

The deadly crash occurred around 6:39 a.m. September 13 one mile east of Woody Chapel on State Highway 39.

Pronounced dead at the scene were Moses C. Antonio Jr., 36, of Pauls Valley, and Terry J. Branch, 62, of Lindsay.

OHP Trooper Brian Ozment reported Antonio was driving a 2000 Ford Mustang and was westbound on SH 39 when he attempted to pass a third vehicle in a no-passing zone.

That put him in the path of an east-bound 2008 Dodge Ram 1500 pickup driven by Branch.

Antonio was pinned for an unknown amount of time before being freed by Purcell firefighters using a Hurst tool.

Both men suffered head and internal injuries.



Municipalities received \$154,069,373, up \$8,370,818 from a year ago.

shared use tax returns of \$19,547,508.

Counties shared a \$28,413,504 sales tax disbursement and a \$3,960,683 use tax disbursement.

Fatality:

I-35 were closed near Purcell at mile marker 100 due to the accident. The on-ramps at mile marker 95 (Green Ave.) and mile marker 98 (Johnson Ave.) were also closed. Traffic was being diverted off at SH-74 to Goldsby and back on at mile marker 104.

Southbound lanes were opened back up at 4:34 a.m. Northbound lanes opened at 9 a.m.

As far as we can tell, the GreenScape project dates back to the city advertising for bids for landscaping in November of 2010.

The project was also mentioned in the Feb. 9, 2012 issue. That's when it was first reported in **The Purcell Register**. After that planning meeting, planting of trees was approved in April 2012.

By July of that year an advisory team was holding public meetings.

That was the same time Jeff Virgin was sworn in as a judge in Cleveland County.

There were several Gateway renderings like the one presented to be at Main and Green, which never materialized.


Allow us to continue. The GreenScape sidewalk design was approved by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) in January 2014.

As reported in the newspaper, the project stalled in January of 2015 with councilman Mike Pollok critical of the progress.

In the Oct. 16, 2016 edition of the newspaper the headline read, "Project finds traction".

In February of 2017 the Purcell City Council approved a budget amendment for GreenScape.

The Register reported actual GreenScape work would begin April 3.

That was in the March 30, 2017 issue.

By April 6 street lights in the median along Green Avenue began to come down.

May 4, 2017 works were being constructed for GreenScape sidewalks.

In the June 1, 2017 issue prophetic words were reported. "GreenScape lacks firm time line."

In the July 6 issue of the newspaper, city manager Dale Bunn said there was good progress being made from Washington to Van Buren on the sidewalk portion of the project.

In the July 27, 2017 issue

it was reported a traffic accident on Interstate 35 forced traffic off of the interstate and through Purcell, a traffic jam exacerbated by orange cones on Green Avenue.

In the September 21, 2017 issue Bunn declared the "GreenScape project is on track and thought to be completed by December 2017."

Early in November the turn lanes at Van Buren and Green were nearing completion.

In the November 23, 2017 issue residents were getting their first glimpse of the new street lights.

The city has been living with the infamous orange cones for what seems like an eternity with the exception of a couple of weeks leading up to the sales tax extension votes.

And people really don't care if it is Buffalo Grass or Bermuda.

People are just sick and tired of the cones.

One reader called in saying it is a \$250 fine for blowing your cut grass out into the street.

He wondered if a ticket was written for the grass clippings from the median on Green Avenue.

The contractor for GreenScape is Tri-City Seal in Newcastle.

MOVIES WITH DAVE



Lots of movies to cover this week. It's been awhile since they've released five films in one weekend, so I guess I was due a busy week.

We have a sequel to a film about a World War II prisoner of war, another Predator movie this time with somehow even more gore, the true story of the youngest known FBI informant turned drug kingpin, a drama featuring perhaps my favorite performance of the year with Glenn Close, plus Paul Feig's comedic take on a mystery thriller.

Let's get straight to the reviews.



First up is "Unbroken: Path to Redemption."

In this spiritual sequel to the 2014 film "Unbroken," this movie picks up where the last one left off, telling the story of Olympian and World War II veteran Louis Zamperini (Samuel Hunt) after his harrowing treatment at the hands of the Japanese as a prisoner of war.

Haunted by nightmares of his torment, Louie's quest for revenge drives him deeper into despair, driving a wedge between him and his new wife (Merritt Patterson), leaving the couple on the brink of divorce. Now this is a new one.

A faith-based sequel to an Oscar nominated film. Don't see that every day.

Frankly, from outside appearances, this movie seems to have everything going against it.

First of all, minus a producer and the people who played Louis's parents, none of the original cast or crew from the first "Unbroken" were involved with this sequel.

So while the movie does follow the same historical

character and is based on the same source material, the teams behind the two films are basically completely different.

Most worryingly though, the director for this spiritual sequel is Harold Cronk, the man who not only gave us two "God's Not Dead" movies, but most recently directed my least favorite film of the year so far, "God Bless the Broken Road."

So to say I was dreading this movie would be a massive understatement. After suffering through Cronk's handwork last week, I couldn't believe they were throwing out another film directed by him just a scant few days later.

Surprisingly though, this movie didn't turn out as badly as I expected it would. If fact, I dare say it may be the best Harold Cronk directed movie I've ever seen. Unfortunately, that's still not saying much.

Samuel Hunt does a decent job in the role of Zamperini. He's not amazing or anything, but he's believable and even does fairly well in some of the film's more emotional scenes. On the other hand, Merritt Patterson's performance stuck out like a sore thumb. It's not like her acting was terrible, but she just felt completely out of place.

It's like they took a woman from present day, gave her a 1940s wardrobe and threw her back in time. She didn't sound the part at all. I simply couldn't buy it.

Beyond our leads, the acting overall is a bit of a mixed bag.

Some of the side characters, like Louis's family are great, while other minor roles with just a line or two feel oddly forced.

And though Zamperini's story of overcoming PTSD and alcoholism is an interesting one, I can't help but wonder how the movie would have turned out with more competent filmmakers behind it.

Like I said before, this movie wasn't nearly as bad as I thought it'd be.

As far as films published by Pure Flix go, I'd rank this as one of their best. But from the studio that gave us three "God's Not Dead" movies, that's not saying too much.

It's far from a must see, but if the story of Louis Zamperini interests you and you're dying for a faith based film, you could do far worse than giving this movie a watch.

It's definitely not worth seeing in theaters though. Wait for the rental.

Next is "The Predator."

When a young boy (Jacob Tremblay) accidentally triggers the universe's

most lethal hunters' return to Earth, only a ragtag crew of ex-soldiers and a disgruntled science teacher (Olivia Munn) can prevent the end of the human race.

I'm writing this review a few days after seeing this film and I'm still not quite sure what to make of it.

Even though the Predator series isn't exactly known for cinematic excellence, beyond the first one, I still had hopes that this latest one would be entertaining.

Adding to those hopes was the film's director, Shane Black, who's responsible for his share of quality movies including "The Nice Guys" back in 2016 and "Kiss Kiss, Bang Bang," one of my favorite Robert Downey Jr. movies.

Seriously, if you like Robert Downey Jr. and you haven't seen "Kiss Kiss, Bang Bang," you're missing out on one

of his funniest performances.

Sadly, this movie is a bit more of a mixed bag as far as Shane Black films go.

It still has Black's trademarked witty dialogue, filled to the brim with quips and funny lines. Lines that had me laughing quite a few times throughout the film.

But despite often being funny, that joking, lighthearted dialogue was a bizarre contrast to the rest of the movie.

Namely the massive amount of over-the-top gore.

It was like the people in this movie were all water balloons filled with bursting with blood. It seemed the lightest touch made them all explode into massive pools of red.

It was absurd.

One moment the characters are all joking around, making the equivalent of "Yo Mamma" jokes, the next their intestines were being ripped open and put on display for the entire world to see.

The tone here is so erratic it's almost like they were trying to make a Predator parody movie mocking the series.

The whole thing plays more like a dark comedy than an action adventure film and isn't even close to anything resembling horror.

It didn't help that every drop of blood was incredibly fake looking.

I'm not usually one to complain about movies using computer generated (CG) blood, but here it just sticks out like a sore thumb.

It wouldn't be so bad, but they decided to flood just about every scene with gallons and gallons of the fake looking red stuff.

But phony CG blood is the least of this movie's problems.

What really doomed this movie was the incoherent, and quite frankly, dumb story.

I don't want to get into details to avoid spoilers, but my good-

ness is the plot here stupid.

What makes matters worse is the last third of the film decides to throw all sense out the window and becomes a blur of hollow hard to follow action scenes, muffled dialogue, and continuity errors.

I know beyond the first Predator film, the franchise isn't exactly known for its quality, but this film was just something else.

If you're a Shane Black fan, you'll probably still find stuff to like here. Like I said before, despite the uneven tone, this is still an often funny movie if you're into darker humor.

It's a shame the ridiculously stupid story held this film back. "The Predator" is rated R.

Cities become owners of nursing homes, eye Fed's windfall

A handful of small Oklahoma cities have become owners of dozens of Oklahoma nursing homes across the state in the past 15 months, hoping to tap into a federal program that will bring them millions of dollars.

The cities, which include Pauls Valley and Hugo, don't actually manage the day-to-day operations of the nursing homes. But they hold the licenses to operate the homes and sign management agreements, usually with the nursing homes' prior owners.

Pauls Valley now holds licenses for 28 nursing homes across the state, including homes as far away as Tulsa, Enid and Okmulgee. Hugo owns 12 nursing homes, including in Shawnee and Muskogee. In all, licenses for 46 nursing homes are now owned by cities or towns, which also include Frederick, Medford and Vici, according to a review of licenses filed with the Oklahoma State Department of Health.

One of the homes owned by Pauls Valley, located in Wynnewood, closed in November 2017.

The cities are pinning their hopes on the state's latest ap-

plication for a federal bonus payment program offered through the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). The Nursing Facility Upper Payment Limit program gives millions in extra Medicaid payments to qualifying nursing homes. For their status as license owners, the cities stand to get a cut of the extra payments, usually 25 percent.

The Medicare and Medicaid agency last year rejected Oklahoma's first proposal for the program, and the state reapplied in April. The Oklahoma Health Care Authority is answering a second round of detailed questions from the Centers and hopes to finalize its responses by mid-October, said Health Care Authority spokeswoman Katelynn Burns.

If the plan is approved, an extra \$7.7 million in Medicaid funds could go to nursing homes in the current federal fiscal year, with another \$18.5

million projected for next year. So far, 19 city-owned nursing homes have applied for the program.

The ownership transfer isn't based on a city's buying a nursing-home property and operation for cash. Instead, as defined under legislation in 2016, a city can become the designated license owner, or Upper Payment Limit owner, with the Oklahoma State Department of Health and strike an agreement for management services. (Upper payment limit refers to an extra payment to bring lower Medicaid payments up to the payments offered by Medicare.)

Critics question the deals, saying the extra money isn't necessarily earmarked for better patient care or higher salaries to attract and retain nursing home staff. They said the money will likely go to the nursing homes' managers, most of whom previously held the licenses for the facilities.

Some of the nursing homes that changed ownership have

low ratings in the latest federal quality rankings, including seven owned by Pauls Valley that have the lowest possible rating — one star. Those include homes cited for deficiencies after the city took over the license, specifically over fire safety or violating residents' rights.

Wes Bledsoe, founder of A Perfect Cause, which advocates for better patient care at nursing homes, said nursing home owners have found a way to game the system in order to get higher federal reimbursements. He said the ownership by cities could also be a way to deflect liability if a nursing home is sued by a resident's family.

"It's appalling that the City of Pauls Valley, with less than 6,300 residents, can successfully operate 28 nursing homes across the state of Oklahoma," Bledsoe said. "What possible services and resources do these small towns bring to operate 16 percent of the nursing homes in the state? The monies they receive are for what?"

"The numerous widespread patterns of deficiencies in the first few months also raises questions about the management company or owner-operators who are now the contract operators for the City of Pauls Valley," he said.

homes have been approved in states such as Texas, Indiana and Utah, he said. Essentially, the program brings a nursing home's Medicaid payment up to the level of Medicare, which pays more.

"It's your low Medicaid payment states that were looking at programs like this (asking), 'Is that part of the solution to help fund the gap that the state can't cover?'" Gomez said. "But it is at risk, because you're actually having to give up your license to somebody else for the purposes of being able to keep your doors open."

"You know, it is an odd program. I don't think anybody would say it wasn't really. It's frustrating that you have to look at stuff like this in order to

life story.

Starting off with the good though, I thought McConaughey was excellent here. The man rarely puts out a poor performance and this film is no exception.

Thankfully by the time the third act rolls around, the movie


become much more streamlined and I enjoyed the film much more as a result.

This movie completely blindsided me.

I knew absolutely nothing about "The Wife" before sitting down to watch it. No trailer, no nothing. And I ended up being thoroughly blown away.

Glenn Close is absolutely incredible here.

Her character here is strong and brilliant, yet at the same time relatable and so much deeper than she appears at first glance.

Even if the rest of the film wasn't already compelling, it would have been worth it all just for that one scene alone.

Sadly this movie isn't quite perfect.

During a few scenes in the film, the movie cuts back to when Joe and Joan first met in college. And in comparison to the rest of the film, their acting just isn't up to snuff.

The younger actors aren't necessarily bad, but their performances just don't hold a candle to the skill of Close and Pryce.

They didn't even feel like the same people. The gap in talent was just too much.

Those few scenes didn't impact my overall enjoyment of the film too much though.

This movie is an absolute must watch if you're a fan of Glenn Close. Even if you're just someone who enjoys simple character driven dramas, this film is definitely not one to be missed.

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Lexington's Justin Rowe helping Haitian children

Like all Caribbean nations, Haiti is known for its hot and humid tropical climate, especially in Pwoje Espwa, an orphanage that supports over 300 children, many of them made homeless by the earthquake of 2010.

After learning that this year's AT&T Summer Bridge Program project through the Gallogly College of Engineering at the University of Oklahoma would benefit the orphanage, Justin Rowe from Lexington wanted to help Haitian kids of all ages stay cool and entertained for the summer with a watery twist.

In this year's program, Rowe is one of 50 University of Oklahoma incoming freshman students who developed splash pads specifically for the children in Pwoje Espwa.

"The ability to develop one of these structures goes beyond creativity," said Regennia

Johnson, program director. "Throughout the entire design and construction process, students learn the key skills to become a successful engineer including leadership, teamwork and resourcefulness."

Teams were challenged with a task to design, build and test splash pads. They had to consider environmental factors such as water waste, solar power and pressure.

Participants also had to evaluate the human components such as safety and security to complete their project. The winning designs will be taken to Haiti next summer.

"I participated in this program because I wanted to get a head start on college," said Rowe. "I'm thankful I had the opportunity to make new friends that share the same interests as I do."

Since its start in 2007, more

than 300 students have participated in the AT&T Summer Bridge Program, a four-week, on-campus residential program, giving participants an advantage in OU's rigorous engineering curriculum and helping them achieve math-readiness.

They gain early exposure to course work; meet fellow classmates, faculty and staff; and earn early college credit.

The program is funded in part by an endowment from AT&T and continued support from Dolese Bros. Co.

"Through this program, students gained tremendous skills and knowledge," said Tom Landers, dean of the Gallogly College of Engineering. "They develop valuable relationships and execute challenging projects that will help guide them as they transition into the Gallogly College of Engineering."

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

As followers of Jesus, we may be proud of how others recognize that we are Christians. We can converse easily of Scripture and of prayer. We worship God every weekend. We may carry a holy card and a rosary so that we are reminded of the presence of Christ throughout the day.

And we make the sign of the cross frequently, to remind us that God reveals himself through God as Father and Creator, God the Son who walks with us day by day, and God the Holy Spirit who gives us energy and power to build God's kingdom on earth.

These are the things we do that mark us as Christians in a secular world. They are visible and religious symbols. But this is not necessarily the way the Bible asks us to identify ourselves to the world. The Bible asks us to engage in actions that are called "works of mercy." These are the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

The corporal works of mercy are the things we do to help meet the physical needs of our brother or sister - feed the hungry, visit the sick and those who are in prison, to bury the

dead. These are described in the gospel of Matthew, chapter 25, and in the letter of James that was read on Sunday. These are easy to understand, and they are works that we do as individuals and as a church. Whenever we do these works of mercy, we are engaging in the work of Christ just as surely as the priest who forgives us in confession.

The spiritual works of mercy are found sprinkled throughout the gospels and in the letters of the New Testament. When we engage in these works, we are also doing the work of Christ - to instruct the ignorant, to counsel the doubtful, to admonish the sinner, to bear wrongs patiently, to forgive offenses willingly, to comfort the afflicted, and to pray for the living and the dead.

So when we prepare a meal for a grieving family, we are doing a work of mercy. When we teach the catechism we are doing a work of mercy. When we listen to someone expressing her doubts and try to understand her, we are doing a work of mercy. When we pray for others, we are doing a work of mercy.

The hardest of these is per-

haps "to admonish the sinner." Whenever, out of love, we try to expose the sin in the life of a friend, then we are likely going to be rejected and despised. The prophets, especially Jeremiah and Isaiah, knew this from first-hand experience. And this is why Jesus was nailed to the cross. Pride is the root of all evil. And pride prevents the sinner from acknowledging his faults. As always we hate the sin, but we love the sinner.

In the end, these works of mercy are the most important ways in which people will see that we are Catholic Christians. These are the ways in which we are doing the work of Christ here on earth.

Welcome, friends, to the "front porch." This past Lord's Day we traveled again to one of the world's greatest writings: the gospel of John.

While he is in his early 20s when he walks with Jesus, John is up in years as he writes this narrative, likely between 80 and 90 years of age.

I think often of what John's life was like during those 60 years. He is so very young when he climbs up that Mount of Transfiguration and sees the brilliant glory of the Lord. And it is a young man who leans on the Lord at that last supper together and, later that evening, watches the Lord's passion in the garden. A young man's heart breaks in two, also, as he stands by the cross with Jesus' mother and witnesses her tearful farewell to her Son. When

the earth begins to tremble, so does his heart.

I try to imagine the fire that burns down deep in John's bones for those six decades. Think of the excitement when John comes through a town such as Ephesus, the ancient city from which John likely writes this gospel, sometime between 80 -85 A.D. Imagine the Ephesians' anticipation as they gather to hear the apostle John preach.

Ah, there is a distinct buzz in any place when the venerable old soldier, who once walked with the Lord, walks into the room. The time would come when he alone, of all of the apostles, would be left to follow the footprints of Jesus.

Imagine John's going home with one of the brethren and his sitting and telling many of the

stories we read in this gospel, as well as many more he omits. He cannot write down all the stories, for, as he himself says at the end of his gospel, "I suppose that even the world itself could not contain the books that would be written" (21:25).

Perhaps after one of John's long, powerful sermons - or, maybe, during one of those late-night living-room discourses - a brother or sister speaks and says, "Brother John, won't you write all of this in a book for us, even as Matthew, Mark, and Luke did? Won't you write for us the Gospel of John?"

If so, we thank that good brother for encouraging John to write the world's greatest piece of apologetic literature: The Gospel of John.

His universal ministry is measured by the messages he related to the people he lived among and for whom he died.


It wasn't the village or cities Jesus visited that declared Him to be the Son of God. It was His spoken words and the miracles he performed while walking throughout the land.

Deadline nearing October 12 last day to register to vote

The last day to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the November 6 General Election is fast approaching.

The deadline to register is October 12.

There will also be a McClain County EMS Special Election, according to the McClain County Election Board.

Persons who are United States citizens, residents of Oklahoma and at least 18 years old may apply to become registered voters.

Those who aren't registered or need to change their registration may apply by filling out and mailing an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application form in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight October 12.

The election board said applications postmarked after that time will be accepted and processed, but not until after the general election.

The election board responds

in writing to every person who submits an application for voter registration.

The response is either a voter identification card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place location or a letter that explains the reason the application for voter registration was not approved.

Election officials said any person who has submitted a voter registration application and who has not received a response within 30 days should contact the election board office.

Oklahoma Voter Registration Application forms are available at the election board office, located at 121 N Second Avenue in Purcell.

They are also available at most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries in the county.

Applications also are available at www.elections.ok.gov.

The church is located at 300 Clemens Street. Haley said there is ample parking and the entrance to the polling place is located on the south side of the building.

There will be signs to direct voters, she added.

Cities:

improve your financial stability, to take care of your senior residents."

(The Health Care Authority recently voted to increase Medicaid reimbursement rates, including for nursing homes, for the first time in a decade.)

The speed at which cities have taken ownership of nursing homes has surprised state officials and left regulators playing catch-up. In one case, they accidentally issued a license to Hugo that should have gone to Pauls Valley. Most of the ownership transfers came in June 2017, just weeks after an attorney general's opinion clarified the ownership status of nursing homes in the program.

The attorney general's opinion, which has the force of law unless it's overturned by the courts, was requested by former Health Commissioner Terry Cline. He asked the attorney general's office to give guidance on a nursing home law passed in 2016.

House Bill 2549, by then-Rep. Doug Cox and Sen. Marty Quinn, defined the terms of ownership when a city- or county-owned nursing home participates in the Upper Payment Limit program. A companion bill, Senate Bill 1149, by Sen. AJ Griffin and Cox, allowed cities, counties and hospital districts to own nursing homes outside their boundaries if they participate in the enhanced payment program.

In his opinion, Attorney

General Mike Hunter said cities that want to own nursing homes under the program won't have to go through the lengthy change-of-ownership and certificate-of-need process required of private owners and operators of nursing homes. The state Health Department is in charge of licensing nursing homes.

The cities do have some skin in the game. They will have to put up money, likely from sales tax revenue, in order to attract the extra funding from the federal government. They remit that money, called an intergovernmental transfer, to the Health Care Authority, which then puts it in a pot of money to get the additional federal Medicaid funds.

Hugo would need to put up about \$800,000 for eight of its nursing homes that applied for the program, according to information filed with the federal Centers. Pauls Valley would contribute \$2.3 million for 10 of its nursing homes. The cities would get back far more than that in supplemental payments if the program is approved.

Meanwhile, federal officials had a 10-page list of questions for the state following its

second proposal. Among them were questions over the cities' expertise and higher management fees for nursing home operations.

"Based on the available information, the city council members and city employees do not appear to have any experience operating nursing facilities. Please explain how the cities will ensure the nursing home residents receive quality care," the Centers asked in May.

Another question asked if the state could ensure the city's cut of the payments didn't go to general city operations. The agency also was curious about the city's involvement in the quality of care.

"Will any of the cities hire additional employees or retain outside consultants to oversee the quality of care at the facilities?" the agency asked.

The Health Care Authority said the detailed list of questions meant it had to consult with numerous stakeholders.

Frizzell, the Pauls Valley city manager, said the city's participation in the Upper Payment Limit program came through its former hospital consultant, which managed

the city's hospital until earlier this year. (The city's hospital authority and the consultant, NewLight Healthcare LLC, are now embroiled in a federal lawsuit over management fees and delinquent loans.)

Frizzell said he wasn't aware of inspection violations at the homes licensed by the city. One facility, a 25-bed nursing home in Wynnewood, closed in February. It was operated by Ada-based BK Strategies.

"Our impressions are that we do not assume any risk," Frizzell said. "I'm not an attorney and I don't know how courts operate, so you know for me to sit here and tell you 100 percent there's no risk, I can't tell you that. Our contracts are written in such a way that with these nursing homes, they're the ones at risk and not the city."

Still uncertain is what happens if federal officials again reject the state's application for the nursing home Upper Payment Limit program. Will the cities still have the appetite to own the nursing homes when they don't get a financial cut from higher payments?

"CMS said you have to own the home first and then apply for the program, so it has been a chicken and egg situation for these facilities," Gomez said.



Bridge:

old bridge. Are there flooding concerns? Could water from the Canadian River breach the new structure?

A: We've done extensive hydrology studies and feel confident this bridge is in no danger of flooding. The lower height was approved to save costs.

Q: Why is there a strip of asphalt in the south lane?

A: The way the lanes are placed, lanes are moved over for pedestrian and bicycle crossing which will be in place when both phases of construction are complete. Motorists who are in the lane correctly shouldn't hit the patches.

Q: Why are there temporary guardrails and not permanent?

A: We have traffic moved over. It's a temporary configuration, not permanent, because we work under traffic.

Q: Will the north part of the bridge touch the already completed part?

A: We're building the bridge in an old footprint (of the James Nance Memorial Bridge). In a sense, there will be separate bridges, but they will function as one.

Q: Will work continue on the south part while the north phase is being completed?

A: There will be more work on the south half after the traffic switch. At some point, we will push traffic to the north half. There is still work to be done on the entire structure. In general, we will keep two lanes open at all times.

Construction is expected to continue until the end of summer 2019.

“It could be September,” she added. “The bridge will be a huge improvement and will benefit both communities.”



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Mistakes doom Lexington

Berglan: You can't make those kinds of errors and win

The Lexington Bulldogs' football team dropped to 1-2 after a disheartening 18-13 loss to rival Purcell last Friday night. "Bulldogs defeat Lexington," head coach Dale Berglan said on Monday. "That should be our headline for Friday night's game against Purcell. Lexington lost a hard fought battle to our rival Purcell. But, you cannot beat a team of Purcell's caliber by making mistakes. They are too good of a program and too well coached to not take advantage of the errors that we made Friday night."

On the score sheet, the game appeared to be Lexington's without a question. The 'Dawgs out gained the Dragons on offense. Lexington had 350 yards compared to 187 for the Dragons. "Statistically, the game was not close," Berglan said. "We led in every category statistically. Lexington almost doubled the





Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Several organizations have services at our location each week. Legal Aid for veterans is available each Thursday morning. Counselors from the Vet Center will be available each Tuesday and Thursday morning to answer questions about their services.

Our Foundation celebrated its one-year anniversary at our Norman location September 12. Many of our volunteers and board members were in attendance for this historic event. Our featured speakers, Board President Jeri Towler Holmes, and our Executive Director, Lora Malone, delivered a great update on where we are and where this organization will be in the future. Entertainment was provided by international guitarist Edgar Cruz and was appreciated by all in attendance.

Our Veteran of the Week is Gene Anoatubby who served honorably during the Korean War. As he made his first visit to our Foundation, we recognized him with a cap representing his service. Mr. Anoatubby served in the United States Air Force. As he was exposed to many types of acoustic trauma from artillery to gunfire, we are going to file a claim for service-connection of hearing loss and tinnitus. I'm sure that we will be seeing more of him and his wife as the VA processes his claim for VA benefits.

I continue to be very proud of all our volunteers who are giving their time helping us to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. As most everyone knows our services are provided free to everyone we assist. Many veterans have tried for many years to receive VA benefits for injuries that occurred in the military but were denied. The reason we are successful where others are not is that we ask each veteran to use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire forms the VA provides for a diagnosis of a disability. These forms are also used to measure the severity of the veteran's disability.

We also ask veterans to obtain statements from people who were with them when the incident or injury occurred. Also, we ask the veteran to obtain statements from family members who know about the event and what it has done to the veteran. Another type of

evidence we use are letters written home telling what happened along with any pictures or newspaper articles. The most important thing a veteran can do is obtain all the evidence that will support their claim for service connection of a disability.

As more people become aware of the Me-Too movement and the sexual assaults that some in uniform experienced, we are seeing an increased number of veterans stepping forward to ask us for help with filing a claim. When we triage a veteran, one of the questions we ask is: Were you ever assaulted in the military? If their answer is yes, we then ask them to visit with one of our same gender volunteers who specializes in those types of disability claims. We then usually suggest they see a psychiatrist who will fill out a VA Disability Benefits for an evaluation regarding whether the veteran has PTSD or other types of mental disabilities.

While talking to a veteran last week, he told me he uses the CART bus service in Norman to go to the Oklahoma City VA hospital for his doctor appointments. He said for \$1.50 it's hard to beat and that it makes four trips to and from there daily. That could save our drivers a lot of time and gas money if more of our local veterans used that service.

I had a veteran from California call me needing a ride to his medical appointments from an Oklahoma City hotel to Norman. As we did not have a driver available, we set him up with an Uber driver who transported him at a fair price and on time. I'm going to encourage some of the people we transport to start using Uber for some of their transportation needs. Using alternative transportation options will benefit our drivers too who last week spent 65 hours traveling 1,464 miles transporting 25 veterans.

I have not said anything about the VA Claims Process in a while so maybe it's time to tell you what we have seen in the last year. On average, the claims that we are helping veterans to file are being processed quicker than we have seen in many years. We are continuing to see an increased number of veterans who are receiving a 100 percent rating decision for their service-connected disabilities. As of Sept. 16, 2018, we have helped 625 veterans receive that rating since Jan. 1, 2018.


I believe two main factors can account for the increase. The first reason is the VA has set up a program called RAMP (Rapid Appeals Modernization Program) to process the hundreds of thousands of VA claims appealed by veterans who were dissatisfied with their VA rating decisions. Some of the appeals were filed several years ago. We are seeing some of the RAMP cases being resolved in just a few months.

The second reason is the Fully Developed Claims process established several years ago. The Fully Developed Claims process enables veterans or surviving spouses to supply all of the evidence needed to support their claim for an increase of their current rating. The Fully Developed Claims process can also be used to request service-connection of a new disability when applying for benefits.

By using the Disability Benefits Questionnaire ("DBQ") forms that are available from the VA some claims get approved without the veteran going out for an evaluation by a VA doctor or contract medical provider. We are continuing to use the VA 21-0966 Intent to file to establish a start date for VA benefits which is the first day of the following month. This gives the veteran one year to gather all the evidence needed to file the Fully Developed Claim, which could grant payments back to the start date of the 21-0966.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the rating decisions, and other correspondence the VA sends to the veterans and surviving spouses. Having the ability to see all the records and decisions helps us to understand better why benefits were denied or the award was low. I can also review what the examiner with QTC, LHI, and the VA Hospital C&P examiners stated on a veteran's DBQ reports. Sometimes we will find discrepancies or errors in the QTC, LHI, or the VA's C & Preps that may allow us to challenge a service-connection request that was wrongfully denied.

Last week there were 25 veterans who received a 100

percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$923,869 per year. Thirty veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive a combined annual income of \$431,950 per year. We also received award letters showing two surviving spouses approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance. They will receive a combined annual amount of \$30,795 per year.
