# Time to VOTE

### Small sales tax serves all in county

The McClain County Sheriff's Department stands to gain if voters on Tuesday approve an 8-year extension for the county's half-cent sales tax.

That's the good news. Sheriff Don Hewett doesn't like to think about the impact on his department if voters opt to end the small tax instead.

Law enforcement receives 25 percent of the revenue raised by the present tax. Of that, the sheriff's department's cut is 19.4 percent.

In a year's time, that has totaled \$670,664 or just under \$59,000 per month.

Hewett said the revenue helps pay salaries and has enabled the department to obtain and equip a couple of vehicles.

"If it (extension) fails, I'll have to lay off some individuals," he said.

Hewett isn't sure of the exact number.

It depends, he said, if the county can dip into the general fund to replace any of the lost revenue.

He thinks the staff cuts could eliminate 4 to 6 jobs – a heavy hit in a department with just 33 full-time staff and one part-timer.

Including Hewett, there are 18 commissioned officers and two administrative assistants in the department.

The McClain County Detention Center has a staff of 13. There is also a transport deputy who works three days a week.

Purcell old timers may recall when a successful clothing manufacturer set up shop here.

But not many outside the family that owned it know the back story behind Sherri Classics.

The company was named for the youngest child of Elizabeth and Bud Perigo.

Elizabeth, now 95, was born in 1923 in Paris, Texas. She was eighth in a family of 11 children born to Emma and William Beaver, a sharecropper.

The family moved often to various towns in Texas and Oklahoma, eventually settling at Hutchins, Texas.

Elizabeth attended Wayne schools for a time. When she was 14 and finished seventh grade, Elizabeth met 21-year-old A.W. "Bud" Perigo on a hayride.

They dated every night for a week and then eloped to Oklahoma.

Emma's brother, the police chief at Dallas, advised Emma that she could file on Bud for kidnapping since he'd crossed a state line with

# Flying free

Mature bald eagle back home

More than 80 people were at the Wiley Post Lake on Tuesday to witness a once-in-a-lifetime event – a mature bald eagle released to reclaim her home territory following a lengthy rehabilitation.

A local family found the downed raptor four months ago and notified an Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation game ranger.

He in turn picked up the injured bird and took her to Wild Care in Noble.

Rondi Large, co-founder and executive director of the Wild Care Foundation, said although x-rays showed no broken bones, the medical work up revealed severe

## Contract awarded for overlay project

Enterprise set to begin in 60-90 days

Road work from the southeast part of Washington eastward one mile and back south 2.6 miles on Bryant could cause some traffic delays.

McClain County District 2 Commissioner Wilson Lyles has awarded Haskell Lemon Construction the asphalt overlay project of 3.6 miles.

Haskell Lemon was the low bidder at \$935,098.00.

"This project consists of a 4" asphalt overlay with safety markings to extend from Washington beginning on 230th extending east for one mile and turning south for 2.6 miles on Bryant Avenue to SH 39," Lyles said.

"This project has been solely funded with \$500,000 from surface transportation funding (STP) federal, with the remaining \$435,098 to be paid with state funds from county improvement to roads and bridges (CIRB)," Lyles continued.

The commissioner said these funding programs required a average daily traffic count, accident reports, connecting with township with school and state highways.

The project had to also undergo a complete environmental study of the right of way.

The footwork and paperwork began in November of 2015. "The construction of the

project should begin in 60-90 days," Lyles said.

ODOT will provide the inspection over site of the job, which is expected to take approximately three weeks.

"We want the local residents to know there could be delays as crews begin the construction process and may want to find alternate routes," Lyles said.

"We would like to express our appreciation for your patience and understanding throughout this project and to observe all warning devices," the commissioner said.

### Dormant sprays for fruit trees

During the winter while there is no foliage on the trees, concentrated sprays may be applied to fruit trees for control of certain insects and diseases. Such sprays are called dormant sprays.

In Oklahoma, the principal target insect of dormant sprays are the scales, particularly the San Jose Scale that attacks apple, pear, plum, and peaches. Dormant sprays such as dormant oils can be applied during the winter and early spring before leaves develop.

These are effective against

scales and other insects that overwinter in bark.

Peach Leaf Curl on peaches and nectarines is one of the most prevalent fruit tree diseases that can be controlled via dormant sprays. This disease causes infected leaves to pucker, become deformed, and turn a combined yellow and reddish-brown color.

Diseased leaves eventually wither and fall from the tree. New leaves emerge from dormant buds, but this weakens the tree and reduces yield. Defoliation over several years may kill the tree. Dormant oils used alone will not control

Peach Leaf Curl.

Materials such as copper fungicide or Bordeaux mixture can be applied to peaches and nectarines for Peach Leaf Curl. The mixture of liquid lime-sulfur and dormant oil sprayed in February or March before bud swell will control scale and Peach Leaf Curl.

Apply dormant oils only when the trees are dormant and the air temperature is above 40 degrees F to prevent damage to tender buds and shoots.

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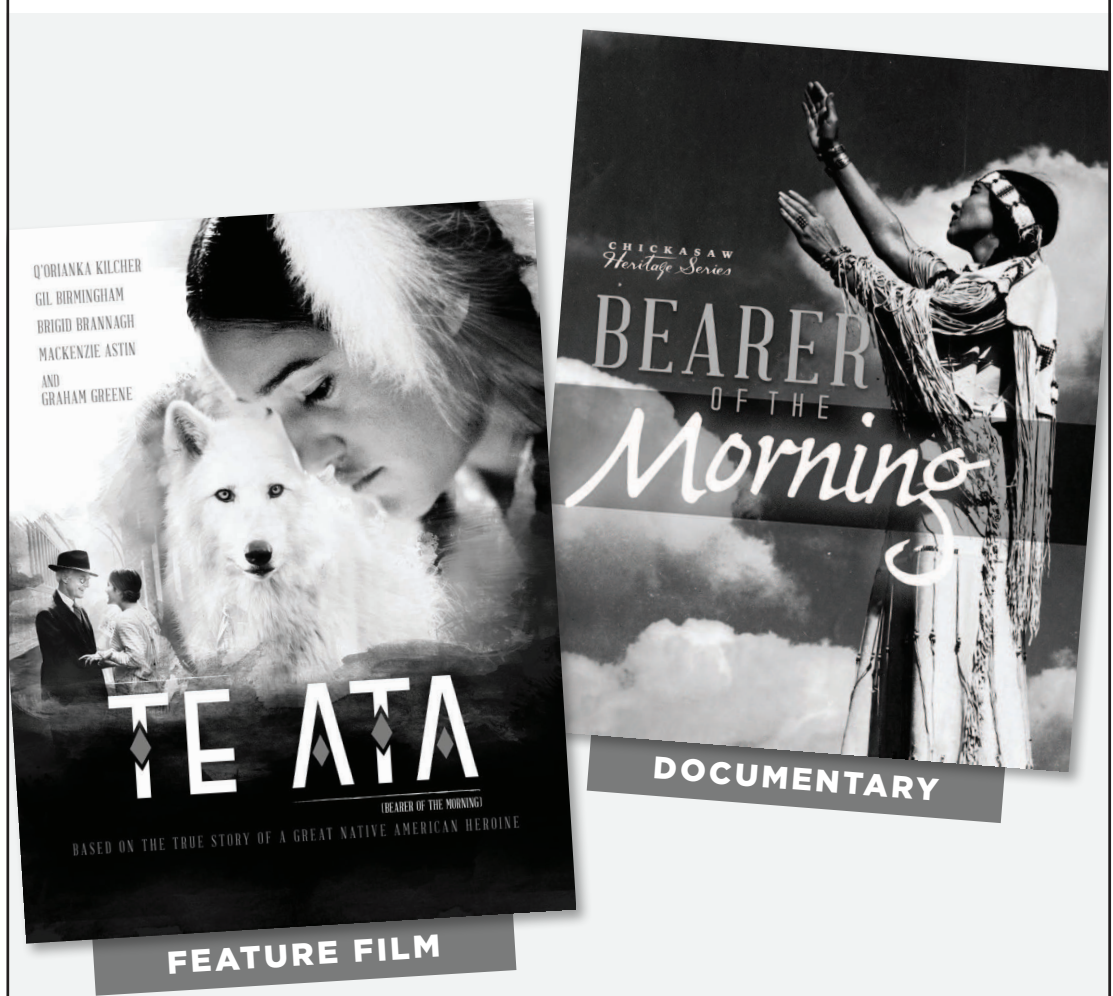

## House passes teacher pay raise, train bills

Last week, the Oklahoma House of Representatives passed the second teacher pay raise in two years. House Bill 1780 by Speaker Charles McCall funds a \$1,200 across-the-board teacher pay raise on top of last year's historic increase.

Our state has a teacher shortage that we're working to address, and I believe this bill will help Oklahoma compete with our neighboring states so that we can bring in the best and the brightest teachers in the region. HB1780 helps move us closer to that goal. This raise was a top priority in Gov. Stitt's State of the State address at the beginning of session.

A second bill that gained a lot of attention last week was HB2472, which would fine rail companies who block intersections with stopped trains. These trains are a headache and can even be a public safety issue when they prevent emergency services from reaching a person in need.

This bill allows authorities to fine the rail companies up to \$10,000 per incident.

On Wednesday, the Board of Equalization announced a \$575 million surplus to put toward the FY20 budget. This number indicates how well our economy is doing right now, but we must be cautious.

Much of our state's economy depends on the fluctuating oil

and gas industry. We need to save more money for the future so that when our economy inevitably downturns, we won't have to cut core government services like we've seen over the last several years.

It isn't wise for our state to spend every dime we receive. Normal families have to balance their budget while saving for the future. Our state should do the same.

Also last week was Health Careers Education Day at the Capitol, and I was excited to visit with so many of our state's health care professionals.

As a nurse and the vice chair of the House Public Health Committee, I know the important role that health care professionals play in a person's life and I was glad to see the support of these professionals at the Capitol.

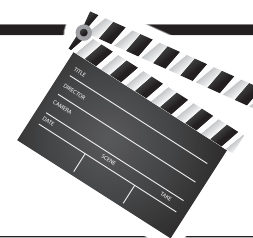
In the next few weeks, we'll continue to work hard to pass legislation that better the state of Oklahoma.

Well, the Oscars have come and went, and honestly the 2019 Academy Awards didn't go nearly as poorly as I expected.

Though it did seem a little odd at first for the awards show to go on without a host for the evening's events, it actually worked out quite well.

In fact, if anything, the lack of a host made things move along quicker.

Instead of opening on a grandiose song and dance number, the show simply began with Queen + Adam Lambert performing an abridged version of "We Will Rock You" and "We Are The Champions."

Adam Lambert is no Freddie Mercury to be sure, but as far as opening performances go for the Oscars, it was fine.

The closest thing we got to an

opening monologue was Tina Fey's, Maya Rudolph's, and Amy Poehler's quick comedy bit together before announcing the winner of Best Supporting Actress.

Overall, the efforts to shorten the show's overall runtime seemed to have worked. Instead of the Oscars hitting nearly four hour runtime like it has the past few years, this time it only clocked in at a measly 3 hours, 22 minutes.

As far as who the actual awards went to, while there were a few surprises, I didn't find the results all that shocking.

Mahershala Ali won for Best Supporting Actor in "Green Book," Rami Malek for Best Actor in "Bohemian Rhapsody," "Vice" won for Makeup and Hairstyling, "Free Solo"

won Best Documentary, and Lady Gaga unsurprisingly won Best Original Song for "Shallow" from "A Star Is Born." These were all basically layups. No surprises there whatsoever.

Alfonso Cuarón winning multiple times and accepting awards for Directing, Cinematography, and Best Foreign Language Film for "Roma" was also completely expected. What can you do, the man is an immensely talented filmmaker.

And though the competition for Best Supporting Actress was pretty neck and neck, I had a good feeling Regina King would walk away with the award for her performance in "If Beale Street Could Talk." She was certainly my favorite of the nominees.

As far as Best Animated Fea-

ture goes, you never know how the Oscars are gonna go. Reportedly many members of the Academy don't even watch all the animated films nominated. Leading to the most popular film winning, but not necessarily the best overall movie.

Luckily though this year the Academy got it right and "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse" got the Oscar it deserved.

On the more unexpected side of things, "Bohemian Rhapsody" ended up with four Oscars overall, which was two more than I had predicted.

Of course Malek winning was a no-brainer. And while I know some were miffed about John Ottman winning Best Editing for his work on "Bohemian Rhapsody," it's my understand-

ing it was less about the film being the best edited and more that Ottman's efforts saved the movie from disaster after a reported messy production.

To me "Bohemian Rhapsody" winning both sound awards was the bigger surprise. If there was one film last year that blew me away based on the way it sounded, it was definitely "First Man." Though I suppose the efforts in making Rami Malek's singing voice sound like Freddie Mercury and recreating the soundscape of being at Live Aid are worthy of recognition in their own right.

It’s not that I thought Close was owed an award just because she’s been nominated for an Oscar seven times, though it probably stings for her after so many losses.

She was legitimately my favorite out of everyone nominated. Indeed, I thought her role in “The Wife” was the best performance I saw last year period, man or woman.

I can’t be mad at Olivia Colman winning though. She was quite good in “The Favourite,” and her awkwardly endearing acceptance speech was hilarious and definitely one of the highlights of the evening.

Though less shocking, another surprise was “Green Book” winning Best Picture over “Roma,” which was the clear favorite at the beginning of the night.

But Best Picture is often one of those awards that defies anyone who tries to forecast it. As for me, I’m quite happy “Green Book” won. It was one of my favorite films last year. In fact, out of all the movies nominated for Best Picture, it would have been my number one pick.

All in all, the Academy Awards weren’t nearly as big of a mess as I’d feared they’d be.

After this year, I wouldn’t be surprised if they decided to go without a host from now on. The whole thing felt like it went at a brisk pace compared to previous Oscars, not to mention notably less cringe worthy moments.

Either way I think I’ve talked about the Oscars more than enough this week. There’s still new movies to talk about.

The first being the conclusion to DreamWorks’ “How to Train Your Dragon,” while the other film tells the true story of Paige, a female pro wrestler in the WWE.

Let’s get right to the reviews. \*\*\*



First up is “How to Train Your Dragon: The Hidden World.”

Now chief and ruler of Berk alongside Astrid (America Ferrara), Hiccup (Jay Baruchel) has created a gloriously chaotic dragon utopia.

When the sudden appearance of female Light Fury coincides with the darkest threat their village has ever faced, Hiccup and Toothless must leave the only home they’ve known and journey to a hidden world thought only to exist in myth. As their true destinies are revealed, dragon and rider will fight together to the very ends of the Earth to protect everything they’ve grown to treasure.

It’s hard to believe the first film in this trilogy released nearly nine years ago.

In that timespan, Dreamworks has gone through three separate distributors. Paramount for the first film in 2010, 20th Century Fox for the second back in 2014, and now Universal for the third one all the way here in 2019.

And though each film has had a four to five year gap between releases, the series has stayed remarkably consistent in quality. Something that definitely isn’t a given when it comes to trilogies.

The animation here, while not as drastic of a jump in quality

from the first to the second, is quite beautiful, with one location in particular being drop dead gorgeous.

The dragons are just as creative and varied in design as the first two films and the characters themselves have never looked better.

Sadly no one scene was quite able to match that amazing feeling of flight from the first film or even the second one. As amazing as the previous movies were in 3D, I’d say it’s not worth the extra \$3 here.

I suppose I should address my biggest concern going into this film. After seeing the trailer for this movie, it looked to me like a complete retread on the story from the second one.

Another person wants all of Burk’s dragons? Again? Isn’t there a different plot you can come up with for Vikings who ride dragons?

Though to be fair, while the villain in both the second and third film have similar goals, the two characters couldn’t be more opposite.

Say goodbye to the overly gruff and brutish Drago Bludvist and give a big welcome to the conniving, if slightly effeminate, Grimmel the Grisly (F. Murray Abraham).

Grimmel is easily the best villain in all three films. It’s not even a competition. Granted, it isn’t very hard to beat the mindless behemoth from the first film or the boorish warlord who controls a mindless behemoth from the second. Regardless, Grimmel makes for a pretty fun baddie.

He always seems to be one step ahead of our heroes, manipulating them into doing what he wants every step of the way. He’s just really fun to watch on screen. I’m thrilled this series finally got a villain with some personality.

Of course all three of these films have been this coming of age tale for our main character Hiccup.

The first one he was the outcast who proved himself capable to his peers, and most of all, his father.

The second showed Hiccup that you can’t change the hearts and minds of everyone, no matter how earnest your argument.

And this third film is Hiccup growing up and learning to let go.

It really has been quite the character arc for our little Hiccup. My only complaint is his growth seems to come at the expense of nearly everyone else in the series.

Almost no one besides him has any character development whatsoever.

The only other real character growth in the series that doesn’t directly serve Hiccup’s character, comes from Hiccup’s dad Stoick, and that’s mostly in the second film.

Hiccup’s mom is basically just there to be proud of him.

Astrid is quite possibly the most capable person in the entire series, but after rewatching the entire series, I can’t help but see how flat her character is.

The only development she gets is learning to trust Hiccup in the first film. That’s it. In this latest movie all she does as a character is try to love and support Hiccup more.

Is Astrid strong and good in a fight? Oh undoubtedly. But a fleshed out, three dimensional person? Sadly not so much.

And then there are all the other Berkians, who are more or less just there for comic relief.

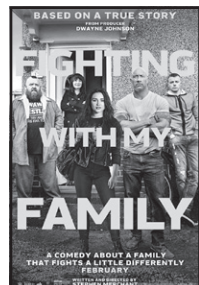
I guess over the course of three films I wish some of the other characters could have gotten a little bit of the spotlight. Especially Astrid. I guess that wasn’t to be though.

Either way, despite my character nitpicks, I thought this was a solid conclusion to a pretty great trilogy.

If you care about this series at all, this film is a must watch. If nothing else, watch it for the

scene at the very end. It’s sure to warm the heart of anyone who’s followed “How to Train Your Dragon” from the very beginning.

The other film this week is “Fighting with My Family.” Based on the incredible true story of WWE superstar Paige (Florence Pugh). Born into a tight-knit wrestling family, Paige and her brother Zak (Jack Lowden) are ecstatic when they get the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to try out for WWE.

But when only Paige earns a spot in the competitive training program, she must leave her family and face this new, cut-throat world alone. Paige’s journey pushes her to dig deep, fight for her family, and ultimately prove to the world that what makes her different is the very thing that can make her a star.

So, to get this out of the way, I know almost nothing about the WWE or pro wrestling. I don’t have anything against it, it’s was just never something I watched growing up.

Of course you always hear about the whole thing being fake, and I suppose in a sense that’s true. But then again, it’s not supposed to be real Olympic style wrestling.

It’s more dramatic than that, and potentially, even more brutal. These wrestlers put their entire body through the ringer. Just because they pull their punches doesn’t make the ground feel any softer when they slam into it.

Pro wrestlers are actors, yes, but it’s some of the most physically taxing live acting you could think of.

As Vince Vaughn’s character in the film puts it, pro wrestling is soap opera in spandex.

And as a fairly pro wrestling illiterate person, I think this film does a fantastic job showing just what makes wrestling fun for its fans.

I loved this movie.

Everything about it felt so charming, so exceedingly genuine, I couldn’t help but fall in love with every single character in the film.

Paige’s entire family is so fascinating to me. Wrestling to the Knight family is a way of life. It’s what they do for a living. To them there isn’t a thing more important in the entire world than wrestling.

As foreign as an obsession with wrestling is to me, I still felt a sort of comradery with all of them.

My family didn’t quite wrestle with each other, but we did spend a lot of time together, and the biggest, most important day of the week was children church every Sunday morning.

You see my parents were children church pastors. But it wasn’t just them. Me, my older brother, and my older sister all did children church together.

Each week always felt like this giant production.

We had songs, puppets, Bible stories, games that tied into those Bible stories, and skits that tied into the lesson with scripts and all. Heck at one point we even ran a Chuck E. Cheese’s style prize store with custom printed currency that the kids earned for behaving well.

The format of our program changed multiple times over the two decades or so, but for years and years it was something we all did together as a family.

I imagine it’s similar to how it must have felt for Paige and her brother Zak growing up. Sure, it was a vastly different activity, but I still found the family dynamic really relatable.

And I have a feeling anyone who grew up “learning the

family business” would feel similar. This film really captures the sense of growing up and doing something together as a family, week in and week out, in a way I haven’t seen in a movie before. And I couldn’t have loved it more.

Acting wise, everyone is stellar.

Florence Pugh and Jack Lowden are fantastic. Their brother/sister dynamic is spot on and both of them gave heartfelt and often hilarious performances.

Nick Frost and Lena Headey are a bit of an odd couple on the surface, but they’re perfect as Paige’s and Zak’s wrestling obsessed parents. Both of them are incredibly funny together and steal the show every single scene they’re in.

Also, I just have to mention Dwayne Johnson. Not only is he a producer for the film, but he got featured in couple scenes where he gets to play himself. And it’s exactly as entertaining as you’d expect.

If Dwayne isn’t the single most charismatic man in Hollywood right now, he’s definitely up there. Even in bad movies, he’s always fun to watch.

I don’t have a bad thing to say about this film.

As a story, I found it fascinating for it’s insight into pro wrestling culture. The dialogue was hilarious, yet incredibly touching at the same time. And if you haven’t guessed by my gushing, I dearly loved every single performance.

If you have any affection to the WWE, this has got to be a must see. But even if you’re like me and know basically nothing about pro wrestling, this is a very easy film to recommend.

2019 is still young, but if you’re interested in the year’s best, this movie is a must add to your watch list.

## Stretching your food budget

Does your family ever have trouble making your food dollars stretch to the end of the month? There are many ways to save money on foods that you eat.

The three main steps are planning before you shop, purchasing the items at the best price, and preparing meals that stretch your food dollars. The choosemyplate.gov interactive website offers these great tips to help you save on your food budget.

#### 1. Plan, plan, plan!

Before you head to the grocery store, plan your meals for the week. Include meals like stews, casseroles, or stir-fries, which "stretch" expensive items into more portions.

#### 2. Get the best price

Check the local newspapers, online and at the store for sales and coupons. Ask about a loyalty card for extra savings at stores where you shop. Look for specials or sales on meat and seafood—often the most expensive items on your list.

#### 3. Compare and contrast

Locate the "Unit Price" on the shelf directly below the product. Use it to compare different brands and different sizes of the same brand to determine which is more economical.

#### 4. Buy in bulk

It is almost always cheaper to buy foods in bulk. Smart choices are family packs of chicken, steak or fish and larger bags of potatoes and frozen vegetables. Before you shop, remember to check if you have enough freezer space. If space is an issue, consider shopping with another person, and dividing large packages between you. Be sure to label each package with the contents and directions for preparation.

#### 5. Buy in season

Buying fruits and vegetables in season can lower the cost and add to the freshness! If you are not going to use them all right away, buy some that still need time to ripen.

#### 6. Convenience costs...go back to the basics

Convenience foods like frozen dinners, pre-cut vegetables, and instant rice, oatmeal, or

grits will cost you more than if you were to make them from scratch. Take the time, to prepare your own—and save.

#### 7. Easy on your wallet

Certain foods are typically low-cost options all year round. Try beans for a less expensive protein food. For vegetables, buy carrots, greens or potatoes. As for fruits, apples and bananas are good choices.

#### 8. Cook once...eat all week!

Prepare a large batch of favorite recipes on your day off (double or triple the recipe). Freeze in individual containers. Use them throughout the week and you won't have to spend

money on take-out meals.

#### 9. Get your creative juices flowing

Spice up your leftovers, use them in new ways. For example, try leftover chicken in a stir-fry or over a garden salad, or to make chicken chili. Remember, throwing away food is throwing away your money.

#### 10. Eating out

Restaurants can be expensive. Save money by getting the early bird special, going out for lunch instead of dinner, or looking for "2 for 1" deals. Stick to water instead of ordering other beverages, which can add to the bill.

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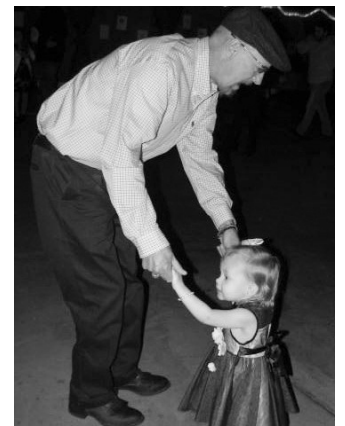
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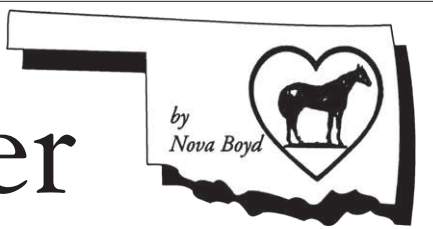

The inductees were, horses: Laico Bird, Easy Jet and The Old Man; individuals: Ronnie Austin, Ringling; Jerry Burgess, Poteau and now Grand Prairie, Texas; Rick Chayer, Sperry; Rodney Reed, Wapanucka; and Dwight Van Dorn, Woodward and Edmond; ranches Belle Mere Farm owned by Dee and Betty Raper, Norman and formerly of Lexington and Char-Lin Ranch, owned by Charles and Linda Cline, Cushing; and Bud Breeding Oklahoma Spirit Award winners Dr. Josh Blyden, Interstate Equine, Goldsby, and Bill Anotubby, Governor of the Chickasaw Nation.

You have previously seen biographies of Laico Bird, Belle Mere Farm, and Governor Anotubby, as they have ties to our area. Easy Date was owned and raced by Walter Merrick, Sayre, one of Oklahoma's early premier horsemen in the Quarter Horse racing world, and The Old Man was owned later in his life by Roy Browning, Shawnee.

### Easy Date

A look at the pedigree of Easy Date reveals exactly why this bay filly took the racing industry by storm in the mid-70s.

Foaled in 1972, Easy Date was from Easy Jet's second crop of foals, and she was out of the Roman Sandal (TB) mare Spot Cash. Easy Jet won the All American Quarter Horse Futurity in 1969.

With bloodlines rich in speed, Easy Date out-shined the other racing prospects because of her

even temperament and her aggressive attitude on the track. Legendary breeder and owner Walter Merrick of Sayre first noticed these traits.

"She had a wonderful disposition from the first," Merrick said. "Easy Date was always quiet and calm. She never did act up, and she was real sensible. James McArthur trained her, and he never had a day of trouble."

Easy Date won the 1974 All American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso, N.M., beating Tinys Gay by a nose before a standing-room only crowd at the track and more than 20 million people who watched the live telecast of the \$766,000 race. She was the first All American Futurity winner by an All American Futurity winner.

Easy Date won nine stakes races at six tracks in three states, including the Kindergarten Futurity and the Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso, the Champion of Champions at Los Alamitos, and the Golden States Derby at Bay Meadows. Easy Date finished off the board only twice in her career. She also set the quarter-mile track record at Bay Meadows in 1975. Easy Date retired with \$849,710 in earnings, putting her at the top of the all-time money earners list in 1977.

She produced 11 foals that earned \$101,931. The highest individual money earner was Toast The Host, a stakes-winning son of Raise Your Glass (TB).

Easy Date was inducted into the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 2002.

### The Ole Man

Bred by Frank Vessels, Sr, The Ole Man was by Three Bars (TB), arguably the most all-around influential Thoroughbred sire in Quarter Horse history. This sorrel colt was out of the Chicaro Bill mare, Chicado V, and was foaled shortly after the death of Vessels, Sr. The Ole Man lived up to his name. Foaled in 1963, he was breeding mares well up to the day he died at age 32.

The stallion was named for his AQHA Hall of Fame breeder, Frank Vessels, Sr, "the Ole Man" who founded Los Alamitos Race Course, and both his sire and dam are AQHA Hall of Famers.

With a speed index of 100, The Ole Man garnered eight wins, four seconds and seven thirds, and earned \$20,657 out of 33 starts. He won the Stallion Stakes and the Lightning Bar Stakes, possessing the stamina, heart and soundness to run 24 races in his 3-year-old year.

In September, 1966, The Old Man was purchased for

\$100,000 by Roy Browning, who at that time lived in Fort Worth, Texas, and later stood the stallion on his Roy Browning Ranch at Shawnee. A true all-around horse, The Ole Man sired 1,878 named foals in 28 crops, to be one of the very few sires of Superior champions in racing, performance and halter.

The Ole Man sired 554 horses that started in official Quarter Horse races, with 250 returning as winners and 15 of those in stakes races, for earnings of \$1,077,061.

In AQHA shows, the stallion is represented by 10 AQHA Champions; 78 horses that earned 1,335.5 points in open halter and 14 that earned 702 points in youth halter; and 106 earners of 1,439.5 points in open performance, 21 earners of 48.5 points in amateur performance and 35 earners of 1,029.5 points in youth performance classes, for a total of 4,555 points.

Few horses have ever had as much influence as a sire, or for that matter, a more appropriate name. The last-known surviving son of Three Bars, The Ole Man died in February 1995, after breeding 100 mares in both of the previous two years.

The stallion was a major factor in owner Browning being the AQHA Champion Breeder in 1987 and 1991.

The Old Man was inducted into the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 2018.

## Voter registration Deadline March 8 for April election

March 8 is the last day to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the April 2 board of education/municipal general election.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the requirements for registering are that the individual is a U.S. citizen, Oklahoma resident and at least 18 years old.

Those who have never been registered to vote, who aren't currently registered in their county of residence or who need to change their registration information may apply.

They need to fill out and mail an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight March 8.

Applications postmarked after that deadline will still be accepted and processed, but won't be approved until after

April 2. The county election board responds in writing to every person who submits an application, Haley said.

The response is either a voter identification card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place or a letter explaining why the application wasn't approved.

Anyone who has submitted a voter registration application and who hasn't received a response within 30 days should contact the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Application forms are available at the county election board, as well as most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries in the county, Haley said. They are also available online at [www.elections.ok.gov](http://www.elections.ok.gov).

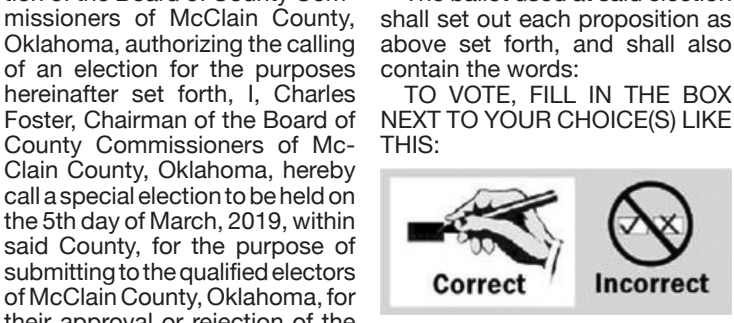

## How to pay yourself first

OSU Extension News "America Saves Week" is February 25 to March 2.

So many Americans are living paycheck to paycheck, and savings rates have fallen to less than 7 percent and have fallen close to zero several times in the past few years.

Financial experts recommend that you save at least 10 percent of your income. A savings account will increase your financial security. But lots of people say they can't save money.

One tip for saving is to pay yourself first by making saving a part of your budget. When you pay your other bills, just pay your savings "bill" too. Just deposit the money into your savings account.

If your employer offers direct deposit, have part of your paycheck deposited into your savings account at your bank.

Some other tips for savings include:

- Save any extra income that you get. Your tax refund, overtime pay, gift money, refunds and rebates.

- Save coupon money. Keep track of how much you save by using coupons, and deposit that same amount into your savings

account.

- Save installment payments. After you pay off a credit card or a loan, make that same amount a payment into your savings account.

- Collect extra change. At the end of every day or week empty the change from your pockets or billfold. Put this change into a jar and when it gets full, deposit it into your savings.

- Break a habit. Every time you don't smoke a cigarette, eat a candy bar, or drink a soft drink, you'll save money.

- Save lunch money. Pack your lunch to avoid having to eat out. Save what you would have spent on lunch.

- Keep track of sales savings. Every time you purchase an item on sale, save the difference between the full price and the sale price into your savings account.

- Have a "buy nothing" week. Try to go an entire week without spending. Don't eat out. Instead of going to the movies, borrow a DVD from the library. Play board games, go to the park, think of ways to have fun without spending.

- Use a crash budget. Set a time limit, like one month. Cut out all unnecessary spending and try to save as much as you can.

Why Save? Savings provides you with a safety net for life's uncertainties. Emergency savings funds should have enough money to cover about three months of expenses. If you are saving to build your emergency fund, aim to have enough money to cover one month of expenses.

Once you've established an adequate emergency fund, you can use savings to the goal of buying a car, going on vacation or making a down payment on a home.

Keep two questions in mind when you save money: What do you want to do with the money you have? and how much will you need to achieve your goals?

The Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence announced the recipients of its prestigious 2019 Academic All-State Awards. These 100 top public high school seniors, selected from 535 nominations statewide, hail from 83 schools in 75 Oklahoma school districts.

The 2019 Academic All-State Class is the 33rd to be selected by the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence. Since the award program's inception in 1987, some 3,300 high school seniors from 325 school districts have been named All-State scholars. Three high schools will celebrate their first Academic All-Stater: Blair, Kansas, and Oklahoma School for the Blind in Muskogee.

Each of this year's All-Staters will receive a \$1,000 merit-based scholarship and a medallion. The All-Staters will be recognized at the foundation's 33rd annual Academic Awards Banquet May 18 at the Renaissance Tulsa Convention Center.

David L. Boren, chairman and founder of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence, describes the selection of the scholars as "Oklahoma's most rigorous academic competition."

To be nominated for Academic All-State, students must meet one of the following criteria: an American College Test (ACT) composite score of at least 30; a combined SAT evidence-based reading and writing and math score of at least 1,370 or be selected as a semi-finalist for a National Merit, National Achievement or National Hispanic Scholarship.

This year's All-Staters scored an average of 33.6 on the ACT, with six recipients scoring a perfect 36. The students' average GPA was 4.28. In addition, 33 of this year's All-Staters are National Merit semifinalists, and two are National Hispanic Scholars.

Academic All-Staters are selected on the basis of academic achievement, extracurricular activities and community involvement, as well as an essay submitted by each nominee.

Instead, she took no action.

Elizabeth and Bud set up housekeeping next door to his mother.

The newlyweds' family grew. Ason, Bobby, was born in 1941, followed by daughters Carol and Nancy in 1943 and 1944, respectively.

It was the height of World War II and Bud worked in clothing factories at Dallas.

Eventually, Elizabeth joined him and they began a small business producing custom-made shirts.

Following Sherri's birth in 1957, Elizabeth started contract sewing from home.

As demand grew, Elizabeth and Bud added a building behind their house. They named the business Sherri Classics and brought in a designer.

Jessie Graham, who had sold shoes with Bud, came in as a partner for a brief time.

With Bud doing the cutting and selling and Elizabeth the sewing, the business grew. They sold their product to JC Penney and they added a second building in back of the first.

They were approached in 1961 by Elizabeth's brother-

in-law who encouraged them to move their operation here.

They first set up shop on Main Street and later built on what is now Sherri Classics Street.

Elizabeth and Bud found a good friend in Gene Rainbolt at First American Bank.

Gene was a visionary and trusted the couple's knowledge of the garment industry. The bank provided financing so Sherri Classics could expand.

Bobby left college in 1961 and joined the business. Lester and Carol Stapp moved to Oklahoma in 1962.

Lester learned to work on sewing machines and helped Bobby in the cutting room. Carol handled the office work.

After Nancy married Harold Enox, he also worked in the cutting room. Nancy worked part-time in the sample room and other areas. Sherri worked in shipping.

Soon Sherri Classics expanded to Lindsay and the family built two more plants. Bobby ran one and Lester the other.

There was also a sales office in Dallas.

Employees became like family over the course of a

quarter century. There were designers Jo Ann Weigel and Virginia Schehl, sample and pattern makers Peggy Owens and Glenda Wade, June Jones in shipping, Pauline Lee and Mary Witt in pressing, Ruth Clifton in inspecting and Betty Brady, floor supervisor.

Bud died in 1971. He was 54.

After Elizabeth retired in 1972, Harold moved into sales.

Competition from overseas manufacturers and Walmart influenced the family's decision to close the business in 1985.

There followed several owners of the factory here until the Chickasaw Nation purchased the property.

The building that housed Sherri Classics was recently demolished and the children kept a few of the cement blocks as mementoes.

Elizabeth continues to enjoy life and her family.

"As children, we have benefited from her work ethic and her independence," Carol said. "She is the matriarch of our family. She has achieved much as a woman in a man's world and has shown us that love of family and hard work is the best motivation there is."

soft tissue damage and head trauma.

"It was a bit of a case for us," Large told the gathering. Restoring the eagle to health was a four-month process.

Based on plumage and size - bald eagle females are larger than the males - staff determined the injured eagle was female and was at least 5 years old.

Large said the release site on Boat Dock Road was selected because it is "six to eight miles from where she was found."

"If this is her true home ter-

ritory, she will be back there before most of you leave the parking area," Large said.

When the door to the large vari-kennel was finally removed, the eagle waiting a few seconds before going to the opening.

She then launched herself aloft, circled a couple of times as she gained altitude and set out for the treeline on the opposite shore.

Large founded Wild Care with her husband, Dr. O.T. Sanders in the mid-1980s.

Since then, Wild Care has

taken in and treated more than 96,000 injured or sick wild animals.

That number will exceed 100,000 sometime in 2019, he added.

"Unfortunately, not all animals can be returned to the wild," Large said.

The bald eagle on Tuesday was one of the success stories.

"It's really been a privilege," she said of treating some 7,000 wild animals a year.

Wild Care is rated in the top 10 wildlife rehabilitation centers in the United States.

the voters will raise the outlay for law enforcement to 33 percent, of which 30 percent would go directly to the sheriff's department.

The 5 percent bump will mean Hewett can hire "at least two more deputies."

"We really need that," he continued. "If it loses, we may not be able to have 24-hour coverage. We won't have the personnel to do it."

The proposed distribution of sales tax revenue will also allot 30 percent of the proceeds to fire departments in McClain County.

There are 11 fire departments in the county and each will receive an equal share. They are Blanchard, Byars, Cole, Dibble, Goldsby, New-castle, Payne, Purcell, Rose-

dale, Washington and Wayne.

Anticipated annual income per department is \$103,824.

The public safety measure before voters also includes 10 percent for county facilities and 2 percent for emergency management.

In a separate proposition, essential services would share the remaining 25 percent as follows - 7 percent each to 4-H /OSU Cooperative Extension, economic development and senior citizens and 4 percent to the McClain County Free Fair.

In-person absentee voting is today (Thursday) and Friday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the McClain County Election Board office in the courthouse.

Polling places across the county will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday.

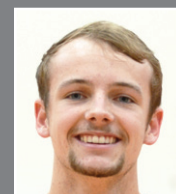

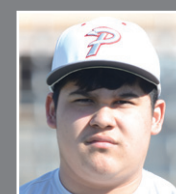

## Pesticide storage

Pesticides can be useful tools when trying to maintain a healthy lawn, garden, or pasture. Most pesticides can be kept and used from one year to the next. However, it is usually best if you buy only what you can use in one season.

If pesticides must be stored remember that most are toxic to some degree. Care must be taken to ensure they are stored safely out of the reach of children and pets.

The first thing you must do before using or storing a pesticide is read the entire label. It provides more than

just information on how to use the product effectively. It also gives instructions on storage and disposal.

All pesticides should be stored in a dry locked cabinet. The cabinet should be located in an area where temperatures will not go below freezing or above 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Extreme temperatures can impair the effectiveness of the chemical.

Pesticides should always be stored in their original container and care should be taken to keep labels clean and readable.

Be sure to replace caps and lids tightly on all containers

before returning them to the storage area.

It is advisable to store herbicides separate from other pesticides if possible. Pesticides stored improperly or for long periods of time could have changed chemically and should be tested on a small area before general use.

Allow enough time to determine the pesticide effectiveness, and to determine any toxic reaction to desired plants.

These suggestions, if followed, should ensure your family and pets will be safe from accidental poisonings, and help keep the pesticides active for longer periods of time.

## Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Barney Owens could really preach it!

(Even when we didn't agree) It is often said that a great coach can take his players and beat you. Or he can switch players with you and still beat you.

The same, I think, goes for preachers: A great preacher often can take one of your sermons and preach it a lot better than you. That's the way I always felt about my friend Barney Owens who left us suddenly last week of an apparent heart attack. I don't know if Barney could hunt or fish or fix a car. But I know he could preach better than about anybody I ever heard.

Barney held a couple of gospel meetings in Lexington over the past several years. When he came for the first one, he and I spent time together for the first time in decades. I always had a great respect for him, largely because he was 14 years my senior.

Fourteen years is a big gap when a young man is 12 and sits 10 nights in a row listening to a 26-year-old traveling Ohio preacher bark out the gospel with power and ease. I've found that, as you get older, that gap seems to wider more than it narrows, a lesson I want the younger generation to take note of.

Barney and I both stayed at Rubys Inn when he came to town. So, we had much time to talk about life and the Bible over breakfast or, often, over coffee and a piece of Richard's coconut or chocolate pie in the afternoon. It took me a year to break that bad habit Barney got started.

Barney and I shared a mutual respect. On his end, the respect, I sensed, was more because of the great respect he had for my grandfather Brother Miller, who taught him a great deal when Barney was a young preacher. It was that respect for each other that really served us well over these last few years. We disagreed on one particular topic, but we had never talked about it before - until recently.

One day at Rubys, after we had some pie and coffee, thus, putting Barney was in a happy mood, we had that talk. Barney was well-known for having somewhat of a gruff personality. I even heard that some of the young preachers were afraid of him. He was that imposing.

Our disagreement centered

around the Holy Spirit. He had long believed the Holy Spirit dwells in a Christian representatively, only through the Word of God. I believe firmly that the Spirit Himself dwells, that His indwelling is not merely through a representative.

So, among many other topics we had been discussing, we discussed the Holy Spirit briefly that afternoon back in my hotel room. Our discussion was based on Romans 8 where Paul says the Spirit intercedes for us when we pray. I read that passage, and Barney said, "Don't you believe the Spirit there is the human spirit?"

And I said, "No, it can't be. It has to be the Holy Spirit in that context." That was basically it. We moved on to another subject, and never brought it up again. And every night, without interference, I listened to him preach and navigate the scriptures as smoothly as a sea captain gliding his ship.

One night he preached on Paul's journey to Jerusalem over in Acts, and I thought the whole time he was preaching that there may not be but about two preachers I ever knew who could navigate that sermon as seamlessly.

And all through the meeting, he never entertained the subject of the Holy Spirit in a controversial way. But that changed about three years later when he preached at a bigger meeting not far from my home in Texas. The crowd was upwards of 800 that night, as people came from all over the country; and Barney had the last sermon of the meeting.

Toward the end of the sermon, he got over into that Romans 8 passage, and he bellowed out his views in a way that I thought was far to the extreme. I never wondered where Barney stood, but that night I felt he stood squarely in the wrong place.

After services a young man came up to me and asked if I was going to talk to him. I said that I would, I just wasn't sure when. As the young man and I talked, I noticed an older brother was over to the side talking to Barney intently. I had an idea what it was about.

After a minute, Barney left that conversation and strolled by where the young man and I were standing. I stepped away from my friend and walked over to Barney and greeted him

by asking how he was doing.

He stopped and looked at me - I've wondered since what he thought right then - and it seemed that in that moment an hour passed. As I looked at him, he seemed more tired than I had ever seen him. He gave me a wry smile, then said in his patented drawl, "Aw, Steve, I don't feel like much. Good to see you." We shook hands, and I said, "Yes, good to see you, too, Barney. God bless." And he ambled slowly on. When I stepped back to the young man, I could tell he was curious at what he had just witnessed. Later he told me he understood.

There are two things I learned being raised down South by two great old preachers. One is that when a preacher stepped down from the pulpit, he had to be willing to defend what he preached. If he wasn't, he never should step into it.

But, two, they taught me - maybe without saying a word - to have great, utmost respect for those whose years make them far more venerable. And if I could ask my granddad or Uncle Alton Bailey about it today, I think they would tell me that you should never let taking care of that first lesson make you lose sight of the second.

I really loved to hear Barney preach. He was a man's man - and, more, he was a preacher's preacher. And that night in Grapevine, Texas, I made the decision to let my great respect for him trump any need I may have felt to take him to task. Whether that was the right decision or the wrong one, you can decide.

My friend Barney and I never had that talk, even though we had one other opportunity. Then - when I heard that he had collapsed while walking in the hospital in Cincinnati last Wednesday after a surgical procedure, bringing a lifetime of preaching the gospel to an abrupt end - I was glad that we had not. Barney was tired, and I suspect he wished he had never preached that little sermon. When he saw me afterwards, he remembered where I stood and what I believed. He even used to believe the same thing.

But he didn't need a young whippersnapper to let him know about it when he stepped down from the pulpit. coachbowen1984@gmail.com, frontporchgospel.com, lexingtoncoc.com

At the end of Bourbon Street in New Orleans the Baptist's

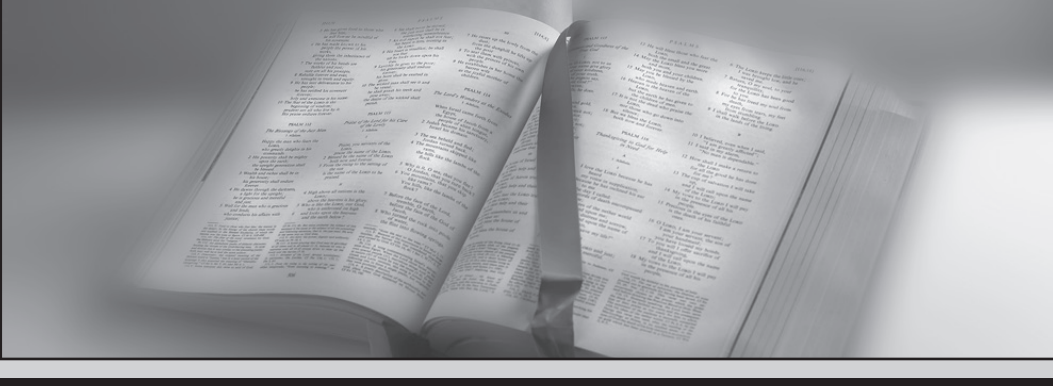
ran a mission to serve the hungry and homeless.

We continue our study of the apostles with Bartholomew, who lived in the first century AD. Not much is known about his early life, and he, like all the first disciples called, was brought to Jesus by family or friends. Philip introduces him as "Nathanael of Cana in Galilee," but mostly we see him referred to as Bartholomew.

He is one of the more obscure members of the 12 apostles, given one personal story in John 1:45-51 and John 21:2 to flesh out his personality. But what is known about this apostle is generally positive. He is represented as a good Jew, honest, a just man who devotes much time to quiet reflection and prayer.

Described as a true child of Israel, Nathanael was a man well read in the Scriptures, who knew what was said of the Messiah and where the Messiah would come from. Bartholomew has been awaiting the Holy One of God his whole life.

Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses and the prophets wrote—Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." His extensive study makes Bartholomew skeptical of Phillip's claim that Jesus is the Messiah, commenting "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

But Nathanael's intentions are pure and his openness to reality made him ready to recognize and surrender to the truth when he encountered it. He remained open to his friend Phillip's invitation to "Come and see."

Jesus mentions that before Philip called Nathanael to come with him, "When you were under the fig tree, I saw you." In Judaism, the mention of the fig tree is a symbol for the study of Law (Torah). In rabbinic literature, the proper place to study the Torah is under a fig tree.

Nathanael responded, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" Nathanael has the distinction of being the first recorded person to confess belief in Jesus as the Son of God and as Savior. He then became a disciple of Jesus the Christ.

What we know of Bartholomew as an apostle comes from Matthew 10:3; Mark 3:18; Luke 6:14, and Acts 1:13. Otherwise he isn't mentioned in the New Testament, at least not under the name Nathanael. He reappears as "Nathanael of Cana" at the end of John's gospel, as one of the disciples to whom Jesus appeared at the Sea of Galilee after the Resurrection.

Like most of the other disciples, Nathanael abandoned Jesus during his trial and crucifixion. He was a witness to the Resurrection and the Ascension of Jesus Christ, but nothing is known for sure about his life after the Ascension. He became a missionary, an evangelist spreading the gospel.

Church tradition says Nathanael carried a translation of Matthew's gospel to northern India and is credited with many miracles related to the weight of objects. In art St. Bartholomew is most commonly depicted with a beard and curly hair at the time of his martyrdom.

He is said to have preached in the East and died a martyr's death there. Legend claims he was crucified upside down in Albania, yet according to other traditions, he was either decapitated or skinned alive in Armenia for having won converts to the Lord Jesus. He is often shown in art as beheaded, holding either his flayed skin or the curved flensing knife with which he was skinned, reminding us that his was not a pleasant death at all.

To renew our spirit weekly, we practice "Open Hearts...Open Minds...Open Doors..." We are a community of recovering sinners--you don't have to be perfect to join with us in sharing God's love. ## Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Our Veteran of the Week, Tommy Blankenship, served in the United States Navy during the Korean War. We presented a cap representing his war and recognized him for his military service in front of several hundred fellow veterans.

Last week we served 258 veterans and surviving spouses with their claims and questions on VA benefits. The cold, wet weather we had on Tuesday morning kept a lot of people at home as there were only 101 brave souls who visited us that day.

One of the things that I don't understand is why other organizations have not followed our lead using evidenced-based claims when filing for VA benefits. It should be apparent to anyone that if a veteran supplies evidence of a diagnosed disability and evaluation of the severity of that condition their chances of receiving service-connection of that disability will be greatly improved.

In the old days, veterans service officers would file claims for service-connection of disability without any type of evidence to support the veteran's request. Needless to say, many organizations are continuing to file claims for veteran's benefits using that philosophy. That is one of the main reasons that we are seeing people travel thousands of miles for help with their applications for VA benefits. Currently, we are assisting veterans from as far away as Alaska and Florida.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all correspondence that VA sends to the veterans and surviving spouses I represent. Each week I review each one of them to see what VA decisions were made and why they were approved or denied. We then use that information in our training program to improve our processes and procedures.

I'm very happy to report that when it comes to training our volunteers are more than willing to continue their education enabling them to be more proficient at their jobs. We are in the process of training volunteers in the Tulsa area who want to join our team with a satellite office in that part of our state.

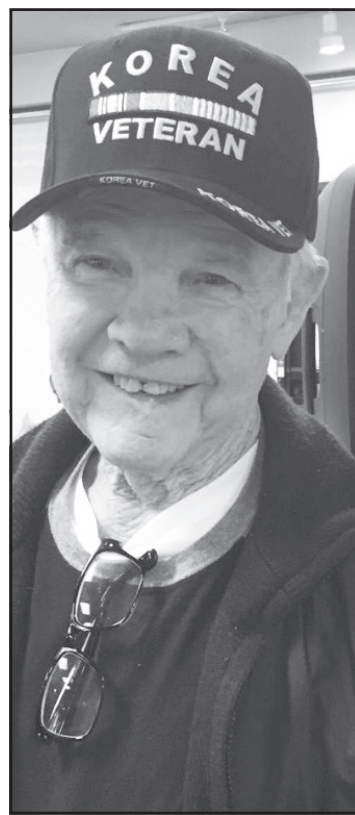
Several of our volunteers are visiting the Lawton Vet Center one day a month to help those veterans who are not able to make the drive to Norman. Currently, they are assisting from 15-25 veterans each time they go there.

Many changes are going on at the Department of Veterans Affairs that will affect veterans. One of which is the VA is matching Social Security records with VA records. This new program resulted in over 600 of our veterans who are receiving unemployment to receive a VA form 21-4140 employment questionnaire. This form must be filled out and returned, or the veteran unemployment may be discontinued. For those folks receiving the explanation letter, no action is necessary. However, when receiving VA letters directing action on the part of the claimant, we always recommend bringing the letter in for us to review.

I believe one of the most critical services we offer each Tuesday and Thursday morning is the opportunity to talk with some of the counselors from the Vet Centers. They provide the opportunity to speak one on one about any difficulties that veterans may be having after returning to civilian life. I personally used their services in the late 80s and early 90s to help to understand what happened to us in Vietnam and changed so many of us. That understanding is what guided me to do what I do today for other veterans and their families. I do recommend that others use the programs that they have that may change their lives for the better.

The VA decisions received this week included those for twenty veterans awarded benefits at the 100 percent rate. They will receive \$79,419 annually. Thirty-six veterans were awarded benefits at the 10-90 percent rate. Last week there were 39 in that category, so we are excited about this jump. This new group will receive \$560,270 a year. A surviving spouse was awarded benefits and will receive \$15,830 per year.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday mornings at the 1268 North Interstate Drive

in Norman. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients at 8 a.m. and urge you to arrive as early as possible.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session, and a Legal Aid representative is on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.
