Revenue extension

Penny tax to secure PMH future

If there is one thing David Shirley wants Purcell voters to remember when they go to the polls August 28, it's that they are being asked to support McClain County's only hospital by continuing an existing penny sales tax.

"This is not a new tax," the Purcell Municipal Hospital board chairman stressed.

Indeed, that misconception if it exists at all is the only bit of controversy surrounding the ballot measure.

As a new proposition put to the voters in the summer of 2016, the penny sales tax received overwhelming support.

And beginning Jan. 1, 2017, Purcell's local sales tax rate went from 4 to 5 percent. With a half-cent county sales tax and 4.5 percent state sales tax, the total assessed on local and online purchases is 10 percent.

It is set to expire on Dec. 31, 2019.

So why the rush to extend it 20 years through 2039?

That's simple enough to explain, Shirley said.

One need look no further than the hospital's

bottom line.

In 2016, city and hospital officials feared PMH was headed the way of other small rural hospitals which were forced to close in a business environment that can only be described as hostile to health care.

Conservative lawmakers led by Gov. Mary Fallin refused to accept federal dollars to expand Medicaid or to implement other health care reforms under the Affordable Care Act.

Their line in the sand, however, didn't eliminate poor people getting sick or needing hospital care.

It succeeded instead only in ensuring hospitals would not be reimbursed for providing that care.

Revenue tanked, leaving the hospital facing mounting debt to vendors whose invoices went unpaid for months.

It was so dire that the hospital's chief executive officer told the Purcell Public Works Authority that

Good neighbors are people and some are organizations or initiatives staffed by folks who simply want to help others.

Such is the McClain County Healthy Living Program which operates under the umbrella of Norman Regional Health System.

With a staff of three – program manager Clint Miller and sector coordinators Joe Johnson and Kelsey Harlan – Healthy Living touches thousands of McClain County lives.

Just as its TSET (Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust) predecessor did and continues to do.

There are four sectors to Healthy Living. Those are business, community institution/organization, cities and government and schools.

Four sectors, but just one vision. Healthy Lifestyle, Healthy Community, Healthy Oklahoma.

And, Miller pointed out, just one mission: "To foster a culture of health in McClain County by increasing physical activity opportunities, access to nutritious foods and tobacco-free environments."

Miller said TSET has been in McClain County 10 years through the Communities in Excellence Tobacco Control grant which focuses specifically on tobacco issues across the county.

Four years ago, there was a shift with implementation of physical activity and nutrition grants.

Harlan, a native of Blytheville, Ark., lived in Fayetteville, Ark., four years before moving here for her present position.

She has a bachelor's degree in public health from the University of Arkansas.

She started college with the intention of becoming a nurse. It was one of her professors who nudged her toward public health instead.

She hopes to eventually pursue a master's degree in either epidemiology or environmental health.

"I want to pay for it out of pocket," she said.

Harlan started work Christmas week. She lives in Norman but is a member of Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church in Purcell.

On Tuesday, she was at

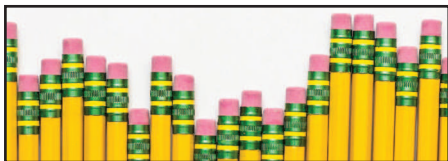

the Purcell Senior Citizens Center to present a Healthy Living program.

A similar program this week was on tap at the Wayne Senior Citizens Center and she is taking the Healthy Living message to Byars senior citizens next week. “I like working with people and seeing the outcomes myself,” Harlan said.

She enjoys the towns and people in southern McClain County.

Sharing her enthusiasm for seeing results firsthand is Johnson, who is a Purcell native.

He recalled going with Harlan to the Wayne Senior Citizens Center on an earlier visit.

“They needed to get the

numbers up (to stay open),” he recalled.

And if the center closed, that would mean the Meals on Wheels program which delivers dinner to shut-ins would go away too.

“It was neat to see all the elderly people get active ... and band together to do that,” he said.

Both coordinators thrive on that interaction.

Johnson, who has a business administration degree from Oklahoma State University, focuses on the business and government sectors in encouraging them to “put forth healthy policies.”

Before this job, Johnson managed three gym franchises in Moore, Mustang and Woodward. “This allows me to stay in health and wellness,” he said. “Plus, it brought me back home. Health and wellness is something I enjoy doing, working in a non-profit and helping people.”

Ideally, Miller said, the pair spend at least 50 percent of their time in the field.

They are constantly making contacts in the communities they serve.

Though both are relatively new to the job, there are statistics that show their efforts do have a

positive impact on people’s lives.

Since 2011, McClain County has been awarded \$1.24 million in grants.

Healthy Living Program grants awarded in McClain County since 2011 total \$520,000.

The cities of Purcell and Blanchard have received Healthy Communities Incentive Grants totaling \$10,000 and \$50,000, respectively, while Washington Public Schools has received a \$5,000 Healthy Schools Incentive Grant.

A total of \$655,000 in Communities of Excellence in Tobacco Control Grants were awarded between fiscal year 2011 and FY2015.

Statewide, in FY2017, TSET budgeted grants totaled \$16.246 million.

In addition, TSET has funded \$27.5 million over 5 years for a cancer research program, \$19 million over 5 years for the Oklahoma Tobacco Research Center and \$17 million over 5-1/2 years for the Oklahoma Center for Adult Stem Cell Research.

The goal is to reduce preventable deaths in Oklahoma.

Revenue:

the hospital wouldn’t survive past the end of the year without a new revenue source.

The penny sales tax was that source.

Eighteen months of receiving those sales tax dollars has exceeded expectations, Shirley said.

“It has allowed us to keep the doors open,” the chairman said. “It has made us positive (in finances). We have paid our debt off and there are no outstanding receivables.”

Shirley credits the hospital administration and staff, along with the sales tax, for the turnaround.

“They have ownership in it,” he said. “And of course, it’s been overwhelming to see the support of the citizens of Purcell.

“With health care, the state and in particular the federal government, it’s almost impossible to forecast what is going to happen.”

The situation, he added, is “strictly politics.”

One major factor helping the hospital is the urgent care clinic and the public’s willingness to use it in lieu of a trip to the emergency room.

That, Shirley said, is just one example of the public’s support of the hospital.

“People ask how the hospital is going,” he said. “They see a need and ask ‘What can we do to help?’”

To which Shirley has an answer: Go to the polls Aug. 28 and vote yes.

Charged:

issued an arrest warrant for Joyce M. Holladay, 61.

According to an affidavit Holladay was driving a 1992 Ford F800 and pulling a small single axle trailer. The truck and trailer were part of a 2-vehicle convoy traveling north on the interstate.

Holladay was accompanied by Stuart Abdo, 55, and Thomas Hoskins, 41.

The three had picked up the Ford the night before in Texas and were attempting to drive it to Colorado, an Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper reported.

The Ford was known to have issues affecting the rear lights and the trailer lights were inoperable.

The small convoy pulled off the interstate south of Ladd Road to get fuel, but the gas station was closed. Hoskins and Abdo became lost and drove around for a time before finding the north-

bound on ramp at Ladd Road.

While Hoskins blocked the ramp, Abdo helped Holladay back the Ford and trailer onto the ramp. Then Hoskins drove onto the interstate with Holladay following him.

The Ford and trailer had just crested a hill and was traveling an estimated 40 mph when and was northbound in the outside lane.

It was struck from behind at 5 a.m. by a 2010 International semi pulling a 53-foot trailer and driven by Daniel Moghrabi, 55.

The impact pushed the Ford and trailer into the median where it rolled. The semi ran off the highway on the right, catching fire and killing Moghrabi.

Holladay and Abdo were able to get out. They were picked up by Hoskins, who continued north to State Highway 9 West, bypassing the Goldsby exit.

They arrived at Love’s at approximately 5:09 a.m., but didn’t enter the store until 5:23 a.m.

A store employee told investigators the three were acting strange. Abdo told the employee he and his wife had been arguing and she had reached over and yanked the wheel, causing them to hit another trucker.

Holladay and Abdo were taken to Norman Regional Hospital by ambulance. There Holladay allegedly told OHP Lt. Heath Meyer that she didn’t do drugs.

However, a blood sample taken from Holladay and sent to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation for analysis showed the presence of methamphetamine, amphetamine and lidocaine.

Abdo refused to give a blood sample, saying he had marijuana in his system, according to the affidavit.

Ironically, Conger only coached the Dragons 12 times on Conger Field since it was built and dedicated near the end of his reign as head coach.

Conger has the edge on Wilson in total overall games coached 145-141.

Bob “Doc” Holiday only coached at Purcell for two years but he made the best of it going 22-3-0 overall for a winning percentage of 88 percent. His 11-2 record at Conger Field was a amazing 91.67 percent,

The popular Milt Bassett coached from 1973-78 and had an overall winning percentage of 76.09 percent (52-16-1) and was 29-7 on Conger Field for a winning percentage of 80.56 percent.

Rick Clark, who took over the head coaching position when Bassett left, was 75-33 overall for a winning percentage of 69.44 percent.

Clark was 45-12 at home for a Conger Field winning percentage of 78.95 percent.

Clark is third in the number of games coached at Conger with 57 and is one of only four PHS coaches to be the head coach in at least 100 games.

He donned the PHS Red and White in 108 games at the helm of the Dragons.

Among the other top Dragon head coaches were Tom Red-

ding 28-17-0 (62.22 percent), Bob Yadon, 27-17 (61.36 percent), Greg Willis, 13-9 (59.09 percent), Phil Goostree 16-14-1 (53.23 percent) and Keith Robinson, 13-10 (56.52 percent).

Nemecek’s list of the top opposing coaches reads like a Who’s Who in the coaching fraternity with many of them in the Oklahoma Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

The list included Seminole’s Mike Snyder, Joe Tunnell at Lindsay, Jim Dixon at Sulphur, Jim Holloway at Wynnewood and Woody Roof at Watonga and Weatherford.

Also Phil Koons at Tuttle, Bob McClain at Marietta, Sevil Pickett at Marlow, Darvis Cole at Wynnewood and Marlow and Jody Weber at Davis.

Another Davis head coach on the prestigious list is Mickey Hoy, Cotton Wade at Durant, Elvan George at Ada, Wayne Estes at Seminole, Mike York at Hobart and Tim Crisp at Ardmore Douglass.

Dixon, who is still active, has the most wins at Conger Field. He is 6-4 against the Dragons on Conger.

Tunnell was 5-1 at Conger Field leading the Leopards.

Snyder’s Chieftains were next at 3-2 on Conger Field.

Koons, Roof, Picket, Weber, George and Wade were undefeated at Conger Field.

Wade was 4-0 while Roof, Weber and Koons were all 2-0.

Picket, Wade and Crisp were victorious in their only appearance at Conger Field.

York, McClain, Hoy and Estes were all 0-1 at Conger Field.

George and Roof were tied with the most State Championships with five each.

Holloway’s teams took home the Gold Ball three times.

Winning two State Titles were Tunnell, Dixon, Koons, Pickett, McClain, York, Weber, Wade and Hoy.

Holliday was the Purcell coach that won one State Championship in 1972.

Snyder has the most wins of the group. He was 353-114-0.

Also in the 300 win club are Tunnell at 322-137-7 and Dixon at 312-179.

Holloway, Roof, Koons, McClain and Pickett all have pocketed over 200 wins.

Hottest week of the year



Sales tax gains seen in state

In July, the Oklahoma Tax Commission returned sales tax revenue totaling \$159,632,406 to the state’s municipalities. That is \$13,140,339 over the \$146,492,067 a year ago. Cities and towns also shared a use tax disbursement of \$15,377,094. Counties received a total of \$29,514,804 in sales tax revenues and \$3,119,247 in use taxes. The returns are based on sales from May 16-31 and estimated sales from June 1-15.

Regulations for Garage Sales

1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall or each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.
 2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.
 3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.
 4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.
 5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.
 6. If you have any questions, call the City of Purcell at 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274.
- Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.



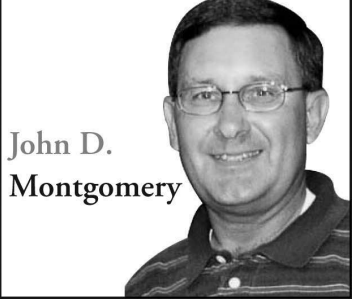

A good nominee

Congressman Tom Cole

Less than two weeks ago, Justice Anthony Kennedy announced his retirement from the Supreme Court after three decades of service.

Appointed by President Reagan in 1988, Justice Kennedy was one of the court's conservative voices, though in recent years he has been the deciding "swing vote" in many high-profile cases.

Following the death of Justice Antonin Scalia in 2016, then candidate Donald Trump made it one of his campaign promises to appoint a justice whose judicial philosophy would emulate that of the late Justice's.

After fulfilling his promise with the confirmation of Justice Gorsuch last year, President Trump now has another opportunity to appoint a justice equally committed to the preservation of our constitution.

During his campaign, President Trump released a list of 25 names from which he would select his Supreme Court nominee.

This list includes some of the brightest legal minds in our country and was extensively vetted, then reviewed after Justice Gorsuch's nomination.

After Justice Kennedy announced his retirement, President Trump returned to this list to choose the next appointment. After much thought, the President chose to nominate Judge

Brett Kavanaugh to serve on the Supreme Court.

Judge Kavanaugh is a "judge's judge," the kind of man who will apply our laws as written and adhere to an original understanding of the constitution. He is an exceptional choice who will decide cases based on an original understanding of the constitution, not personal policy preferences. Judge Kavanaugh is an upstanding jurist and American with an outstanding legal mind. After graduating from Yale Law School at the top of his class, he was one of Justice Kennedy's clerks.

Judge Kavanaugh excelled in the legal profession but took his service to the White House as an aide to President George W. Bush. After leaving the Bush administration, he was appointed to the Washington D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals in 2006 with bipartisan support.

As a visiting professor at Harvard Law School hired by Justice Elena Kagan in 2008, then the dean of the law school, he displayed an unmatched dedication to the law and his students.

Judge Kavanaugh will apply the law as written while also bringing the kind of depth of understanding of the law and constitution that is required of all Supreme Court Justices.

In the past he has remarked, "A judge's job is to interpret the law and not make policy." I appreciate Judge Kavanaugh's

strong pro-life background and advocacy for religious freedom, evident in his dissenting opinions which highlight the importance of the government's legitimate interest in life and in maintaining freedom of religion.

These opinions reflect that Judge Kavanaugh's service on the D.C. Circuit Court has made a lasting impact on jurisprudence.

In addition to his stellar legal record, Judge Kavanaugh is a family man who serves his community, coaches basketball, brings meals to needy families and tutors children at local elementary schools.

In his nomination speech, he spoke affectionately of his mother who inspired his legal career and his two daughters. Judge Kavanaugh is not only an incredibly qualified nominee but also a man of integrity and service.

As we are in an election year, Judge Kavanaugh will no doubt face a long confirmation process, though it would be difficult for Senate Democrats to question the credentials of such a stellar selection.

He was confirmed with bipartisan support to a federal bench back in 2006, and I urge my colleagues in the Senate to do so again.

Judge Kavanaugh will serve the Supreme Court well with his sound judgement and commitment to faithfully interpret, not change, the Constitution.

Learning from others' mistakes

In Kingfisher County, Red Bluff wants to drill the Herod 2-27MH well about 313 feet below a natural gas storage reservoir owned by Oneok. Prudence should be the order of the day.

Red Bluff offered one week for Oneok to assess the risk to the storage reservoir, which provides natural gas to power plants in the Oklahoma City metro, Enid, and as far away as Ardmore and Woodward. Oneok said the company needed more time and Red Bluff, eager to get the drill bit moving, balked. That led Oneok to the Corporation Commission,

where it sought an emergency injunction to block drilling until safety concerns were resolved.

Oklahoma has some of the country's most lax rules – the federal minimum – when it comes to drilling and hydraulic fracturing near natural gas storage. California, which once had similarly loose regulations, now has some of the most strict. That's because in October 2015 a massive leak occurred at Aliso Canyon near Los Angeles, taking nearly four months to plug and releasing an estimated 91,000 metric tons of methane gas into the atmosphere. That's a bigger environmental

disaster than either the Exxon Valdez spill or the BP Horizon blowout.

Although the Aliso Canyon incident was caused by worn-out parts, the possible consequences of any breach became clear and California heeded the lesson by tightening the rules.

Oklahoma hasn't had a similar experience, but there is value in learning from others' mistakes. Allowing Red Bluff to proceed with a rushed drilling and fracking plan shows no regard for the safety of the

Don't cry for Scott Pruitt, Oklahoma

Scott Pruitt's longtime belief in the durability of his exoskeleton may have been dented, but not demolished.

The former Oklahoma state senator and attorney general – and now former EPA administrator – has long played the role of industry's favorite marionette. The ethical chasm revealed in Washington was the foreseeable outcome of self-delusion. Have enough friends with influence and money tell you that you're special and pretty soon you believe it. But that sort of good-old-boy protectionism only goes so far, an axiom Pruitt may still not have grasped. A wink here, a nod there played well enough when few were paying attention to the antics in a flyover state, but the national spotlight burns brighter and hotter, often reducing the most cocksure to a soft pile of chicken feathers.

As attorney general, Pruitt spent lavishly and wastefully bringing unwinnable lawsuits against the EPA. That served no constituents, but as a campaign technique, it went a long way toward convincing the monied set that his conscience knew no bounds when it came to favors for friends. Who better to eviscerate environmental policy that would ensure cleaner air and water? Which other candidate could be counted on to make profitability easier for the biggest polluters at the expense of all others? It takes some audacity to eliminate rules such as the one requiring mining companies to prove they have the financial resources to clean up their own messes and the one requiring companies to monitor and reduce their methane leaks.

But Scott Pruitt is Mr. Audacious. Anyone who can justify leading the agency charged with protecting the environment while doing all he could to eliminate environmental protections isn't going to have too much trouble convincing himself that there's nothing wrong with making a deal with the devil for a cheap condo or putting himself in first-class seats on the taxpayers' dime – nevermind the now-infamous phone booth and security detail.

Appointing Pruitt to head the EPA was like electing Tartuffe to the papacy. And the predictable, Tartuffian response was to blame the media instead of the sinner. "It's scandal, Madam, which makes it an offense," Tartuffe says in Act IV, "And it's no sin to sin in confidence."

With 13 legal and ethical investigations hanging over his head, Pruitt should slither home on a slug trail and vanish from public life. He won't; too many want audacious favors that few are willing to fulfill.

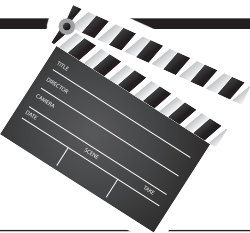

MOVIES WITH DAVE

It's been a pretty wild past few days for me this week.

I flew up to Minneapolis last Wednesday to visit some friends, my first flight since I was a little kid, and I'm still in the Land of 10,000 Lakes as I'm writing this column.

But new movies don't stop coming out just because I decided to take a vacation.

Luckily I was able to watch one of this week's releases, "Hotel Transylvania 3: Summer Vacation," a couple weeks early. Feel free to check out our July 5 issue or visit our website if you're interested in that film.

There's still a couple other new releases this week though, including a new action movie starring Dwayne Johnson.

So enough of my ramblings, let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Skyscraper."

Former FBI agent and U.S. war veteran Will Sawyer (Dwayne Johnson)

leaves the agency after losing his leg in the line of duty.

Using his expertise, Will goes on an assignment to Hong Kong to inspect The Pearl, the world's tallest skyscraper, with both his wife (Neve Campbell) and children (McKenna Roberts and Noah Cottrell) in tow.

But when a plot to destroy The Pearl sets the towering building ablaze, Will must fight to save his family from the deadly fire while also dealing with those responsible for putting his loved ones in danger.

Can anyone say "Die Hard?" Because it's really hard to talk about this film without at least mentioning "Die Hard."

I mean it's a movie about a law enforcement officer facing off against a group of terrorists to rescue his kin, all set in a massive skyscraper.

It's impossible not to draw parallels between the two movies.

It's basically the same idea, except the building is in Hong Kong instead of Los Angeles. Obviously in an attempt to better appeal to Chinese audiences.

It's pretty clear this movie was not made with American viewers in mind and is instead hoping to strike a chord with theatergoers from the east.

From casting one of China's favorite actors with Dwayne Johnson, to the location, not to mention having a sizeable amount of the film's dialog in Chinese.

It's pretty hard not to be cynical about the whole thing.

Does any of that necessarily make this a bad movie? No, not at all.

There's nothing wrong with targeting a specific audience with your film. I don't even have much of an issue with them wholesale copying "Die Hard's" narrative.

As far as I'm concerned, stories are meant to be retold in new and interesting ways. Ways that could possibly even improve on classics like "Die Hard."

So, does Dwayne Johnson's "Skyscraper" do any of that? Well no. No it doesn't.

The writing here is incredibly simple, ridiculously predictable, and any amount of critical thinking would lead to discovering a myriad of plot holes.

The dialog isn't anything

to write home about either, though surprisingly the acting itself isn't too terrible.

No surprise that Dwayne Johnson is the standout performance here.

The man is absolutely dripping with charisma. Even in a movie like this, with less than stellar dialog, the guy is still a ton of fun to watch on the big screen.

Unfortunately, everyone else in the film isn't nearly on Dwayne's level.

The villain here, played by Roland Møller, has zero personality and is completely forgettable.

As a foil for Johnson's character, he's a complete waste.

They would have been better off casting a wet paper sack as the baddie. It wouldn't have made a difference. His character was that bland.

The acting from the rest of the cast is at the very least passable. Or at the very least it's not like listening to nails on a chalkboard for two hours straight.

But clearly, the writing and acting wasn't the focus for the filmmakers here.

This movie's goal was to put Dwayne Johnson in a fiery tower with dizzying special effects and massive explosions.

In essence, this film set out to be a dumb 80s action movie.

Did they succeed? Well it certainly wasn't the best movie I've seen recently.

But if all you're for in a summer action movie is a charismatic lead, towering action, and a crowd pleasing ending, this will probably satisfy you just fine.

Just don't forget to check your brain at the door.

"Skyscraper" is rated PG-13.



The other movie this week is "Sorry To Bother You."

In an alternate present-day version of

Oakland, black telemarketer Cassius Green (Lakeith Stanfield) discovers a magical key to professional success, using his white voice (voiced by David Cross).

But the upswing in Cassius' career raises serious red flags with his girlfriend Detroit (Tessa Thompson) and as his friends and co-workers organize in protest of corporate oppression, Cassius falls under the spell of his company's CEO Steve Lift (Armie Hammer), who offers him a salary beyond his wildest dreams.

There is so much to take in this movie. I'm writing this review a couple days after watching this film and I'm still not quite sure what to make of everything.

When I said this movie is set in an alternate present-day, I wasn't kidding.

The world of Cassius Green (Cash Is Green, get it?) is completely dominated by corporations and their interests.

One such company, WorryFree, offers employees a life free from the worries of paying bills, food, lodging, but at the cost of a lifetime contract of working.

In essence, slavery is completely legal in this world.

Not exactly the setting you'd expect for a comedy, especially considering how lighthearted the trailers make this movie appear.

That's not to say this film isn't funny. Far from it in fact.

There's just something amazing about hearing the voice of David Cross come out of the mouth of a black man.

There are quite a few laugh-out-loud moments throughout, thanks to some really witty dialog and absolutely absurd situations.

The movie is also filled to the brim with tons of little subtle details. Details that would be incredibly easy to miss on a casual viewing.

Heck, I tried my best to pay attention and I still feel like I missed a bunch. This seems like one of those films you could watch four or five times and still notice something new with each viewing.

This movie has so much to say about things like unions, minimum wage, corporate greed, and racism.

It isn't afraid to hold back on any of these subjects, and frequently takes them all to staggeringly absurd degrees.

Especially towards the end. I don't want to spoil anything, but this movie takes a pretty drastic turn during the last third of the film.

In fact, it's a turn I could see ruining the movie for some, even if you enjoyed everything before this one scene.

I'll admit, it threw me for a loop as well. If it wasn't for all the ridiculousness building up to that moment, I could see myself disliking it too.

It's like the entire film is like a pot of water and the audience is the frog.

If the movie started out as crazy as it ended, people would have jumped out, or in this case left the theater, without a second thought.

But since the absurdity, or heat since I'm still using the frog metaphor, builds on itself throughout the film's runtime, the ending seems like a natural progression.

It certainly made for a wild ride. One that I won't soon forget.

But beyond the fantastically ludicrous story, I just have to mention the look and style for this film.

I love how the movie physically drops Cassius into people's homes while making calls for Regal View. Literally putting him right in front of families sitting around the dinner table and other interesting locations like that.

It's a great way of visualizing how bothersome telemarketers actually are in real life, plus it makes for some really hilarious moments.

There's also some really wild transitions during a couple of pivotal moments in the film.

It was almost like something out of a stage show. The amount of creativity and effort to pull off something like all this is staggering to me, but the results ended up being fantastic.

All that said though, as much as I enjoyed the movie, this film definitely won't be for everyone.

The amount of off-the-wall situations in this movie, especially towards the end, is pretty overwhelming.

Those looking for a dumb, funny movie to kill some time on a hot summer afternoon definitely won't have a good time here.

But if you're someone who doesn't mind comedies with a heavy amount of political and social commentary, plus a large dose of absurdity, this is a film that will keep you pondering long after you've left the theater.

replacing it with Buffalo will require spraying to get a good kill on the Bermuda so it does not come back from any roots, scalping off the Bermuda and laying the correct turf," Bunn said.

"These costs are on the contractor or sub-contractor, not the city, as per the agreement between ODOT and their contractor Tri-City Seal (TCS)," Bunn continued.

Bunn said he has asked ODOT and TCS that the traffic control barriers be removed for any period of inactivity for several days.

But it is up to TCS that bears the \$1,800 cost of taking down the cones and replacing them.

"I argue the delay stretches the limits of reasonableness for them and us," Bunn said. "The city can ask for cooperation, but the contract is between ODOT and TCS."

the Purcell Senior Citizens Center to present a Healthy Living program.

A similar program this week was on tap at the Wayne Senior Citizens Center and she is taking the Healthy Living message to Byars senior citizens next week. “I like working with people and seeing the outcomes myself,” Harlan said.

She enjoys the towns and people in southern McClain County. Sharing her enthusiasm for seeing results firsthand is Johnson, who is a Purcell native.

He recalled going with Harlan to the Wayne Senior Citizens Center on an earlier visit.

“They needed to get the

numbers up (to stay open),” he recalled.

And if the center closed, that would mean the Meals on Wheels program which delivers dinner to shut-ins would go away too.

“It was neat to see all the elderly people get active ... and band together to do that,” he said.

Both coordinators thrive on that interaction.

Johnson, who has a business administration degree from Oklahoma State University, focuses on the business and government sectors in encouraging them to “put forth healthy policies.”

Before this job, Johnson managed three gym franchises in Moore, Mustang and Woodward. “This allows me to stay in health and wellness,” he said. “Plus, it brought me back home. Health and wellness is something I enjoy doing, working in a non-profit and helping people.”

Ideally, Miller said, the pair spend at least 50 percent of their time in the field.

They are constantly making contacts in the communities they serve.

Though both are relatively new to the job, there are statistics that show their efforts do have a

positive impact on people’s lives.

Since 2011, McClain County has been awarded \$1.24 million in grants.

Healthy Living Program grants awarded in McClain County since 2011 total \$520,000.

The cities of Purcell and Blanchard have received Healthy Communities Incentive Grants totaling \$10,000 and \$50,000, respectively, while Washington Public Schools has received a \$5,000 Healthy Schools Incentive Grant.

A total of \$655,000 in Communities of Excellence in Tobacco Control Grants were awarded between fiscal year 2011 and FY2015.

Statewide, in FY2017, TSET budgeted grants totaled \$16.246 million.

In addition, TSET has funded \$27.5 million over 5 years for a cancer research program, \$19 million over 5 years for the Oklahoma Tobacco Research Center and \$17 million over 5-1/2 years for the Oklahoma Center for Adult Stem Cell Research.

The goal is to reduce preventable deaths in Oklahoma.

the hospital wouldn’t survive past the end of the year without a new revenue source.

The penny sales tax was that source.

Eighteen months of receiving those sales tax dollars has exceeded expectations, Shirley said.

“It has allowed us to keep the doors open,” the chairman said. “It has made us positive (in finances). We have paid our debt off and there are no outstanding receivables.”

Shirley credits the hospital administration and staff, along with the sales tax, for the turnaround.

“They have ownership in it,” he said. “And of course, it’s been overwhelming to see the support of the citizens of Purcell.

“With health care, the state and in particular the federal government, it’s almost impossible to forecast what is going to happen.”

The situation, he added, is “strictly politics.”

One major factor helping the hospital is the urgent care clinic and the public’s willingness to use it in lieu of a trip to the emergency room.

That, Shirley said, is just one example of the public’s support of the hospital.

“People ask how the hospital is going,” he said. “They see a need and ask ‘What can we do to help?’”

To which Shirley has an answer: Go to the polls Aug. 28 and vote yes.

issued an arrest warrant for Joyce M. Holladay, 61.

According to an affidavit Holladay was driving a 1992 Ford F800 and pulling a small single axle trailer. The truck and trailer were part of a 2-vehicle convoy traveling north on the interstate.

Holladay was accompanied by Stuart Abdo, 55, and Thomas Hoskins, 41.

The three had picked up the Ford the night before in Texas and were attempting to drive it to Colorado, an Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper reported.

The Ford was known to have issues affecting the rear lights and the trailer lights were inoperable.

The small convoy pulled off the interstate south of Ladd Road to get fuel, but the gas station was closed. Hoskins and Abdo became lost and drove around for a time before finding the north-

bound on ramp at Ladd Road.

While Hoskins blocked the ramp, Abdo helped Holladay back the Ford and trailer onto the ramp. Then Hoskins drove onto the interstate with Holladay following him.

The Ford and trailer had just crested a hill and was traveling an estimated 40 mph when and was northbound in the outside lane.

It was struck from behind at 5 a.m. by a 2010 International semi pulling a 53-foot trailer and driven by Daniel Moghrabi, 55.

The impact pushed the Ford and trailer into the median where it rolled. The semi ran off the highway on the right, catching fire and killing Moghrabi.

Holladay and Abdo were able to get out. They were picked up by Hoskins, who continued north to State Highway 9 West, bypassing the Goldsby exit.

They arrived at Love’s at approximately 5:09 a.m., but didn’t enter the store until 5:23 a.m.

A store employee told investigators the three were acting strange. Abdo told the employee he and his wife had been arguing and she had reached over and yanked the wheel, causing them to hit another trucker.

Holladay and Abdo were taken to Norman Regional Hospital by ambulance. There Holladay allegedly told OHP Lt. Heath Meyer that she didn’t do drugs.

However, a blood sample taken from Holladay and sent to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation for analysis showed the presence of methamphetamine, amphetamine and lidocaine.

Abdo refused to give a blood sample, saying he had marijuana in his system, according to the affidavit.

Conger has the edge on Wilson in total overall games coached 145-141.

Bob “Doc” Holiday only coached at Purcell for two years but he made the best of it going 22-3-0 overall for a winning percentage of 88 percent. His 11-2 record at Conger Field was a amazing 91.67 percent,

The popular Milt Bassett coached from 1973-78 and had an overall winning percentage of 76.09 percent (52-16-1) and was 29-7 on Conger Field for a winning percentage of 80.56 percent.

Rick Clark, who took over the head coaching position when Bassett left, was 75-33 overall for a winning percentage of 69.44 percent.

Clark was 45-12 at home for a Conger Field winning percentage of 78.95 percent.

Clark is third in the number of games coached at Conger with 57 and is one of only four PHS coaches to be the head coach in at least 100 games.

He donned the PHS Red and White in 108 games at the helm of the Dragons.

Among the other top Dragon head coaches were Tom Red-

ding 28-17-0 (62.22 percent), Bob Yadon, 27-17 (61.36 percent), Greg Willis, 13-9 (59.09 percent), Phil Goostree 16-14-1 (53.23 percent) and Keith Robinson, 13-10 (56.52 percent).

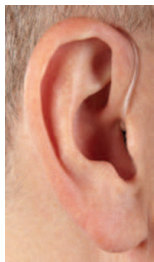

OSDH warns about high temperatures for children’s safety

As temperatures climb, so does the risk for heat-related illness due to hyperthermia (overheating). The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) reminds parents that children’s bodies overheat easily, and infants and children under age four are among those at greatest risk for heat-related illnesses.

Heat stroke is one of the leading causes of non-crash, vehicle-related death for children. In the United States, a child dies from heat stroke in a vehicle every 10 days.

Parents and caregivers of young children should especially keep in mind that vehicles heat up quickly and can be extremely dangerous for children.

A report from the National Safety Council indicates more than half of deaths of kids in hot cars were at home, and 25 percent of deaths occurred at the caregiver’s workplace. The report also states there were 21 deaths of children in hot cars in Oklahoma from 1998-2017.

OSDH offers the following safety tips to keep Oklahoma children safe in cars during extreme heat:

- Never leave a child unattended in a vehicle, not even for a minute, even if the windows are open.
- The temperature inside a vehicle can rise to more than

140 degrees Farenheit when the outside temperature is 101 degrees Farenheit, and a child’s body temperature can increase three to five times faster than an adult’s body temperature.

- Even in cool temperatures, cars can heat up to dangerous temperatures very quickly. Interior temperatures can rise almost 20 degrees within the first 10 minutes, even with the windows cracked.

Look before you lock. Always check the back seat. Check to ensure all children are taken out of the vehicle when reaching the destination.

More than 50 percent of cases of children dying in hot cars occurred when a distracted caregiver forgot that a child was in the back seat. Even great parents can forget a child in the back seat.

- Set up a reminder—a phone call from a friend or spouse, a note on the vehicle dashboard, or place something needed for the day (such as a purse, briefcase, or cell phone) in the back seat so you will check the back seat and see the child before leaving the vehicle.

- Be especially careful when changing routines for dropping off children for child care. Heat stroke incidents occur when people’s routine is disrupted.

- If transporting children and cargo, such as groceries,

take children from the vehicle first.

- Make sure the child care provider has a system in place to prevent leaving children alone in their van or bus.

Keep vehicle doors and trunks closed and locked. Up to one-third of heat-related deaths among children occurred when a child was playing in an unlocked vehicle and became trapped inside.

- Keep vehicle keys out of reach and out of sight. Teach children not to play in or around vehicles.

- Teach children that vehicle trunks are not safe places to hide. Show children how to use the emergency trunk release if they become trapped inside.

If a child is seen alone in a locked, parked car, it is permitted by law to forcibly enter the vehicle to rescue the child. Call 911 immediately for emergency assistance.

Once the child is out of the vehicle, stay with the child in a safe place near the vehicle until emergency responders arrive.

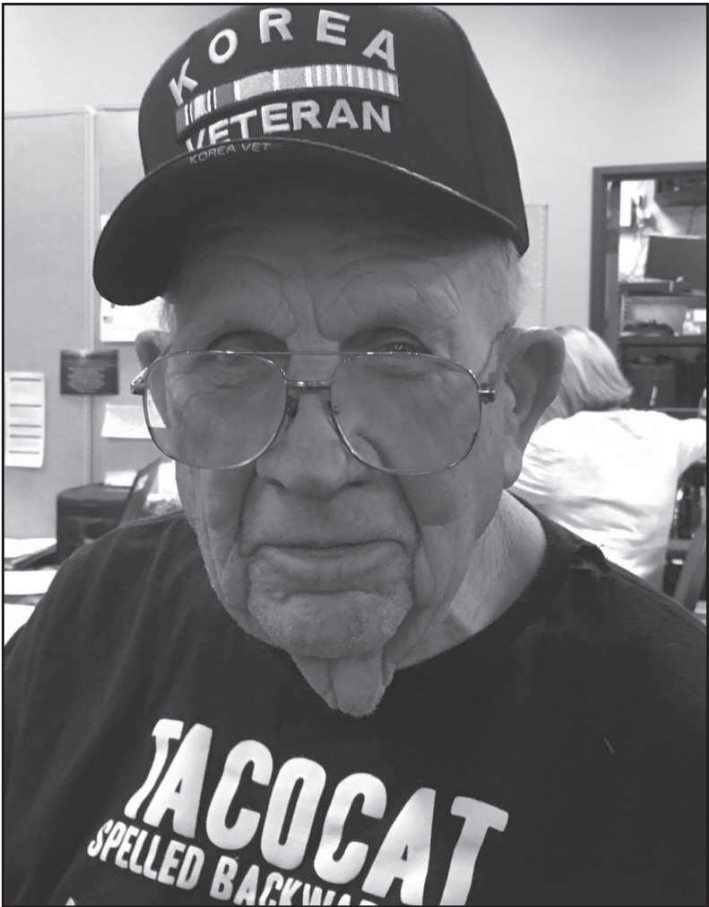

Good week to all. Welcome to the “front porch.”

In the sixth chapter of John’s gospel, the apostle takes us to a scene where the disciples come face to face with one of the Lord’s most piercing questions. How they answer this question will be a defining moment in their lives:

There on a grassy hillside in Capernaum, the Lord asks, “Will you also go away?”

In other words: What are you going to do? It’s time for you to make a decision!

The reason the Lord turns to His disciples with that question is because hundreds of followers had just turned their backs on the Master and began their sad plights back down that grassy hillside. The crowd had followed for a while and were so enthusiastic and excited about the Lord and His teaching.

But things change.

The Lord’s demands are too great, and, when times get hard, they turn and go away ... “Many therefore of his disciples, when they had heard this, said, This is a hard saying; who can hear it? From that time many of his disciples went back and walked no more with him”

(John 6:60, 66).

Where they go, we do not know. We do know all too well that “away” leads to many long, winding worldly roads.

As that crowd turns their backs on the Lord, Jesus – disappointment written all across His face – asks that great question: “Will you also go away?”

Such a piercing question demands an answer, a response. It leaves no choice! Often it is answered not with the tongue but with the life a man lives. Too often the answer is that of the multitude: They turn away in search of something else.

The Apostle Peter must have fidgeted at the Lord’s question until he digs a hole in the ground with his foot. The question bothers him. It rings in his ears and his conscience, and he has no choice but to make a decision, right then!

And he does!

“Lord, to whom shall we go?”

he says with all the resoluteness he can muster, “You have the words of eternal life” (v. 68).

Oh, what a response! Peter has learned that – even if he should search every crook and valley of the world – in the end he would not find anything as fulfilling, precious, meaning-

ful, and saving as that which stands in front of him at that moment – the Lord Jesus!

I wonder, today, if you have turned away, if you’ve gone searching for something that will quench a thirst that can only be quenched by the Lord. There is no shortage of back roads that promise wells of satisfaction.

But if you’ll really look at a life chosen apart from the Master, I know you’ll agree with Peter. In the end, worldly searches do not satisfy. The Lord alone “has words of eternal life!”

Some years ago, songwriter J.B. Coates considered this compelling scene, and he put the dilemma into a beautiful song:

“Where could I go? Oh, where could I go? Seeking a refuge for my soul. Needing a friend to save me in the end, where could I go but to the Lord?”

What a beautiful question! But we have to offer a gentle warning: The answer is not as easy as it seems. It demands a complete surrender, a change of life. But, in the end of it all, there really is nowhere else to go!

On March 19 of this year, on the Feast of St. Joseph, Pope Francis wrote a letter to the world. It was entitled “Rejoice and Be Glad.” The letter is a call to holiness. It is a call to holiness for everyone – not just priests and bishops, not just monks and nuns. It is a call for all of us – mothers, fathers, children, and grandchildren – to be holy in the world today. It is a call to live a holy life – in our way, in our own place – in this modern time.

In a way, he is sending us out into the world, just as Jesus did with his disciples in Sunday’s Gospel (Mark 6:7-13) He is sending us out to be disciples of Jesus in the world. Indeed, there are many similarities between the way Jesus sent his disciples and the way the Pope is sending us.

First, Jesus always sent his disciples out in pairs, two by two. They were never asked to be disciples alone. We are never

asked to be disciples alone. We have each other. We have our own community of faith. And we have the saints as our companions.

Second, both Jesus and Pope Francis prepare us for rejection. People will not like our message of trust in God. They will not like the way that we live our lives, since it will be a challenge to them.

Third, we must not take ourselves too seriously. We must have a sense of humor about ourselves. As St. Thomas More once said: “Grant me, O Lord, a good digestion, and also something to digest.” This is why Jesus told his disciples to shake the dust off their feet in a place where they were not welcome. If people do not accept you, or they do understand your faith, do a little dance and then move on!

To be a disciple of Jesus means to build our house of faith

upon a rock so that the storms of life do not blow it away. It means to listen to God’s word and do all we can to keep it. It means to walk with others and not alone.

It means to understand that we may sometimes face rejection, but to do the right thing anyway. And it means that we must always have a sense of humor about ourselves.

May God’s kingdom come. May his will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Amen.

What name could they give the cub before he set out into the world to meet his future? The school children in Point Lay had heard about the cub and were able to see him when he was brought to the village. A teacher even provided a large dog crate for the cub’s transport. It was the school children who suggested the bear cub be named after their village: Kali. “Kali,” pronounced “Cully,” means mound and is the Inupiaq name for their village. It was decided. The polar bear cub had a name. The next day, Kali was flown to the town of Barrow from Point Lay. The 18-pound cub arrived in the teacher’s dog crate with a little dish of water. Kali had not had anything to eat since he’d been rescued from the den. With Kali’s mother gone, the veterinarian would have to find something to replace her fatty polar bear milk, so he could continue to grow big and strong.



The veterinarian offered Kali a mix of seal blubber and muktuk, a traditional Inupiaq meal of whale skin and whale blubber. The bear sniffed the doctor’s offerings, but would not eat it. She’d have to try something else. The veterinarian began blending a concoction of distilled water, an electrolyte solution, dog-milk substitute, and half and half. She scooped Kali up and offered him the mixture in a bottle. The little bear licked the offering a few times and then began to drink. The doctor was overjoyed! The most important part of raising any baby is getting it to eat. This is particularly important for a polar bear. The Alaskan Arctic can reach temperatures well below zero degrees Fahrenheit on an average winter day, making the land inhospitable to most mammal species. But polar bears thrive here. They’re made for it. Polar bears are equipped to handle the cold, arctic weather in several ways. One adaptation is the 4.5-inch layer of fat that surrounds their bodies. The blubber keeps them warm, and helps them float while swimming and provides fat reserves to live off when food is scarce.

Are all polar bears white? Even though polar bears look white, a polar bear’s fur is made of clear, hollow tubes filled with air. They have black skin under their coat, which helps them soak up the Sun’s rays and keep warm.

Between January 1 and June 30, 2018, our volunteers have assisted more than 400 disabled veterans to receive a rating of 100 percent rating. There have been thousands of veterans who have received disability ratings from 10-90 percent during this same six-month period. Moving our Veterans Foundation from Goldsby to Norman has enabled us to make a difference in the lives of more than 10,000 veterans and their surviving spouses each year. Our doors open at 5:30 a.m., so please come visit. We usually reach our building capacity before 7 a.m., so early arrival is encouraged. Our Veteran of the Week is Robert Reed of Choctaw who was a member of the United States Army. He served in the Korean War. Our guests and volunteers celebrated this fine member of our U.S. Military and presented him with a hat representing our gratitude for the sacrifices he and his family made for our country. Last Thursday, Oklahoma City VA Homeless program brought seven veterans to us for assistance with their VA claims. We filed for benefits and sent each of them to an audiologist for an approved VA hearing test. In the mailbag this week we received letters announcing the latest decisions for those we help. There were 24 receiving a 100 percent rating. These folks will receive \$919,381 on an annual basis. In the category of 10-90 percent, we got notified that 38 folks would be receiving \$528,488 annually. One of the ways that we raise funds to support our mission is our vehicle donation program. Some of the veterans we have assisted will purchase a newer car or truck when they get approved for their benefits. Some of them will donate their old vehicle to our organization to be given to other veterans or sold to raise funds to support our programs. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit all donations may be tax deductible. If the vehicle is sold, the monies raised are used to support veterans and their families with rent, food items, and transportation to their VA appointments. Last week our drivers volunteered 64 hours transporting 18 veterans more than 1,000 miles. Our funds are also used to pay for the medical testing to support a veteran’s claim for service connection of a disability. During the last 28 years, I have seen many veterans who went to their deathbed being denied for service-connection of disability by VA. Most people who are trying to help veterans do not understand that just because the veteran tells them that they were injured in the military unless they submit evidence to support their claim most of the time the application is going to be denied. I have found it is much easier

Being President Distinguished means that many of the members have achieved their Speech Goals for the year and are now Compentant Toastmasters, Advanced Toastmasters and Compentant Leaders or Advanced Leaders. to help a veteran or surviving spouse of one to receive VA benefits if evidence to support their request is filed with the claim. This evidence could be a diagnosis of a condition, buddy statement, or newspaper articles supporting the veteran’s statement that something happened. Of course, those medical records from your military service certainly help if they are available. Most of our veterans over 60 or so do not have any of their military records. Another area that is difficult for some is VA benefits for the surviving spouses of veterans who did not file a claim for benefits. It is difficult to help these ladies if the veteran did not have a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to their military service. Surviving spouses of veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and died from one of the presumptive diseases may have an easier route to receiving DIC benefits. If one of the presumptive diseases is listed on the veterans Death Certificate as a contributing factor, benefits may be payable. Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack. If you need a ride to and from a VA Medical Appointment, please contact 405-550-8806 to reach Clayton at Extension 105 or Louie at Ext. 106. We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at the 1268 North Interstate Drive Norman, OK 73072. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. 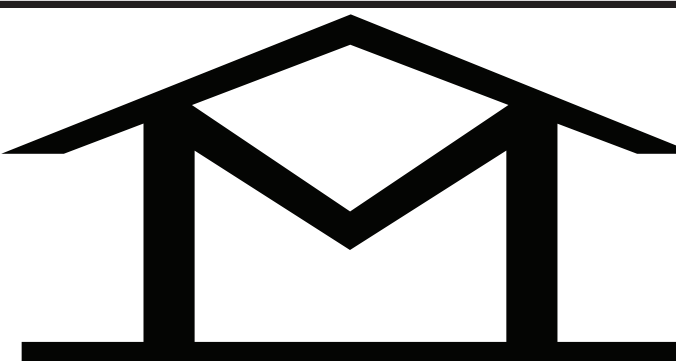
