Three fatalities

Chain reaction wrecks claim lives

A pair of chain reaction collisions on Friday and Monday proved fatal for two Purcell residents and a 61-year-old Lindsay man who was riding a 3-wheel motorcycle.

Killed Monday in a three-vehicle pileup on northbound Interstate 35 at the Goldsby exit were Edgar O. Resendiz and Vanessa Felipe, both 26.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Ken Pittman reported a 2012 Freightliner semi

driven by Jeffery Jones, 49, of Pauls Valley, was slowing due to traffic conditions when it was struck from behind by a 2013 Toyota PreRunner driven by Resendiz. The Toyota was in turn struck from behind by a 2015 Nissan Altima driven by Misty Hicks, 46, of Norman.

Both the Toyota and Nissan were traveling at highway speeds, Pittman reported.

Hannah is "very spiritual," Shea said.

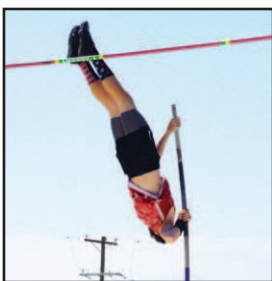
"She's into the Pentecostal Holiness lifestyle entirely," her father said. "She's also very artsy and craftsy. She paints."

Burn ban

McClain, Cleveland among
40 counties listed

McClain and Cleveland counties are included in a 40-county burn ban issued Tuesday by Gov. Mary Fallin.

The ban will remain in effect until midnight February 16.

"Critical fire weather and worsening drought have created an increased risk for devastating wildfires," the governor said. "A burn ban is now necessary to reduce the risk of preventable wildfires and to protect lives and property."

Oklahoma Forestry Services recommended the ban based on an analysis of fire activity, wildland fuel conditions and the predicted

continued drought.

Winds were an additional contributing factor.

Unlawful activities under the ban are campfires, bonfires and setting fire to any forest, grass, woods, wildlands or marshes, as well as igniting fireworks and burning trash and other materials outdoors.

LPG and natural gas grills and cooking with charcoal grills are permitted provided the activity is conducted over a non-flammable surface and is at least 5 feet from flammable vegetation.

Any fire resulting from grilling is still considered an illegal fire, however.

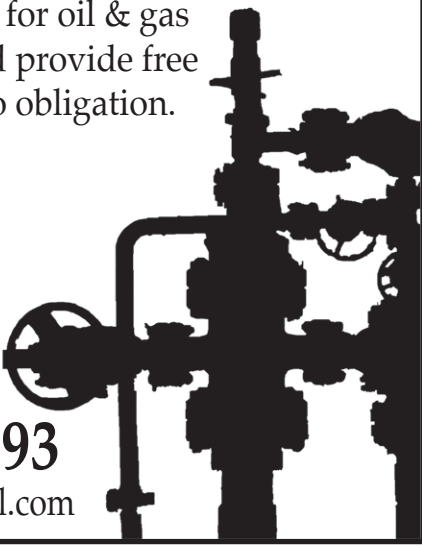

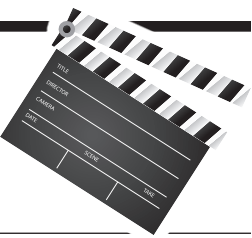

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Finally, after going through the entire first month of 2018, I was able to watch all of last year's Best Picture Oscar nominated films after seeing "Call Me by Your Name" this week. Next week I'll see if I can boil down a list of my favorite films from the previous year, but until then I have some new movies to talk about. So without further ado, let's get to the reviews.



First up is "Call Me by Your Name." Set in Northern Italy during the early 80s, this film follows

Elio (Timothée Chalamet), a 17-year-old who develops a relationship with Oliver (Armie Hammer), his father's visiting research assistant from America.

I'm not exactly sure what to think about this film.

On one hand it's a fairly uneventful movie. Just about a teenager exploring his sexuality over the course of a summer.

Though I did find Elio's character somewhat relatable.

Not his exact circumstances mind you. I can't say I've ever pursued a homosexual relationship with an older man, but just the general feelings and frustrations of being a teenager. Emotions I imagine most have felt while growing up.

In that way Elio's character is very sympathetic and Timothée Chalamet manages to deliver a solid performance throughout. One that feels almost uncomfortably realistic at times.

The filming style itself also does a good job of setting this film apart.

One scene in particular goes on for a deceptively long time with zero cuts. It's just a moment with our two main characters having a conversation in a quiet Italian city, but the way the scene is filmed and framed obviously had a lot of thought put behind it. Just like many shots in this film.

And then there's the music. One of Elio's hobbies in the film is transcribing songs to sheet music, not to mention his knack for playing piano.

So naturally the movie is filled with a beautiful classical score that I can't help but love. I'm a sucker for piano music though, so your mileage may vary.

Despite all that though, I can't shake this uncomfortable feeling I felt while watching this movie.

At the end of the day this is a film about a 17-year-old having an intimate relationship with an older man, and at the risk of sounding childish, that just feels icky.

Not the fact that it's two guys. Seeing a gay relationship on film is nothing new to me. But there's just such a visual age difference between the two main characters.

It was like there was an alarm going off inside my head blaring "statutory rape" over and over again.

The movie also felt a little too long to me. It seemed to me that the film had a few good opportunities to roll the credits, but instead just kept going.

It never really got boring, but some parts towards the end just didn't feel all that necessary. Maybe that's just me though.

Overall, I'd say it's a well made and well acted film. It's probably not for everyone, heck, I'm not even sure how much I enjoyed the movie overall.

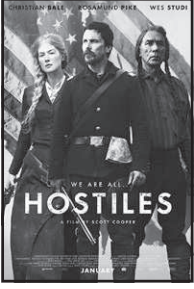
I liked aspects of it, but I just didn't connect to the characters. Sure they were relatable at times, but not enough to get me completely engrossed.

Next is "Hostiles." Set in 1892, this film follows Army Captain Joseph J. Blocker (Christian Bale) who

reluctantly is forced to escort his old rival, a dying Cheyenne war chief (Wes Studi), back to his home land.

Along their journey they come across a young widow (Rosamund Pike) and together they must band together to overcome the treacherous landscape and hostile foes they encounter along the way.

First thing to know about this film is it is not a fast-paced, guns blazing, rip-roaring kind of western.

This is more of a slow, realistic, and brutal window into the old west. It certainly doesn't pull its punches when it comes to violence and it very much earns its R rating.

But like I said, this isn't an action packed movie. For better or worse this film is very dialogue heavy.

That isn't necessarily be a bad thing. Quentin Tarantino has made a career out of such films.

Heck, simple conversations in Tarantino's movies can end up much more tense and thrilling than many action scenes you'll find in other films.

However Scott Cooper, the director of this movie, is no Tarantino.

Almost all of this film's dialogue is spoken in this hushed, whispered, monotone that I could barely understand half the time.

And unfortunately for me, dialogue is nearly the entire movie.

It basically went from one scene of gruff country men having a whispered conversation to the next.

It's like they all had some kind of aversion to enunciating their words.

But even if I could understand every line clearly, the scenes themselves were all filmed in the most boring, visually uninteresting style possible.

Both those factors combined slowed this film's pacing down to a crawl.

I don't know. I definitely didn't hate this movie.

I liked the story and in theory all the characters make for an interesting dynamic. I just had a hard time getting invested since I had trouble making out half the words they spoke.

Fans of the genre will probably enjoy it well enough as long as they don't mind the slow pace and harshness of it all.

I'd wait until it comes out on home video though. That way you can at least watch it with subtitles.

Last this week is "Maze Runner: The Death Cure." In this conclusion to the Maze Runner series, Thomas

(Dylan O'Brien) and his friends must take on their

most dangerous mission yet when they plan to break into the legendary Last City, a WCKD-controlled refuge built to keep out the Flare infected population, all in a hope to rescue their lost friends.

There's something massively flawed about all these young adult, post-apocalyptic books turned films.

They all start out interesting sure. The first story in the series always begins with some kind of interesting gimmick.

Whether it's children forced to fight to the death like in "The Hunger Games," a civilization where teenagers are forced into a certain faction based on an aptitude test like "Divergent," or a bunch of kids trapped in a glade with a deadly maze as the only way of escape like "The Maze Runner" series.

They all have an intriguing enough concept to sell a bunch of books, nab a movie deal, and generate enough interest for a trilogy.

Then comes the major problem.

For whatever reason, despite beginning with a variety of different concepts, all these young adult dystopian films end up devolving into the same exact story.

Overthrowing an evil, oppressive regime.

"The Hunger Games" did it, "Divergent" tried to do it, but their last film did so poorly at the box office the final movie was canceled, and now here's "Maze Runner: The Death Cure" doing practically the exact same thing.

Is this just the go to method of wrapping up the story in this genre? Is a high-concept young adult dystopian film incomplete without annihilating a government?

It wouldn't be so bad, but they all end up doing the same thing despite starting out with completely different stories. Why?

At least people behind the Maze Runner films had the sense not to split the last book into two separate movies. Thank goodness that terrible trend is dead.

But I've ranted about this genre enough, how is "Maze Runner: The Death Cure" as a film itself?

It's fine. It's not great, but it's okay.

Honestly I have to admit it was better than I thought it'd be.

The story's not very original like I mentioned before, and the writing for the dialogue isn't much better, but there's a fair amount of variety to the locations and the action itself isn't half bad.

Some scenes were actually more something you'd expect from a Fast and Furious film, rather than a series that started out with teenagers trapped in a maze.

Sure they were ridiculous, but they were still entertaining nonetheless.

And for as mediocre and cliched as the writing is, the acting itself wasn't too terrible.

I even found myself caring about some of these characters, which is much more than the last two films managed to accomplish.

To tell you the truth I think this was probably my favorite installment of the Maze Runner series.

Granted I didn't care much for the previous two movies, but still, this one wasn't as awful as I was expecting.

I imagine fans of the franchise will enjoy this conclusion to the Maze Runner story just fine.

Though I honestly don't think the series as a whole is worth watching in the first place.

Scott:

cases (child support, child custody, etc.), we're often able to assist with communication between the constituent and DHS offices.

Some cases can be handled with a simple phone call to facilitate communication. Other cases are more in-depth and information is confidential within DHS but we're happy to assist when we can within the limits of the law.

The main concern when someone calls about child cases is the children. We serve as a mediator when parents or guardians call our office. We have had constituents call with child support concerns and we were able to help direct them to the proper person to talk to about their case.

In other cases, we have had parents call about child custody issues and we inquired about their case with DHS. There have been cases where

DHS needed to investigate and others where our inquiry led to communication with a parent that solved their issue.

Most importantly, the child welfare hotline (800) 522-3511 should always be the first call that is made if a child is presumed to be in immediate danger. Otherwise, feel free to call our office Monday-Friday and we we'll do our best to assist you.

In the last year, my office has received calls from various constituents with concerns about their social security claims/benefits. Social Security is a federal issue, but we're able to direct our constituents to someone on the federal level who can help them.

One special situation involved a homeless individual who needed assistance claiming his social security benefits. We were able to connect him to someone to help him with his

claim. In the process, our office was instrumental in helping him with resources for some basic needs and, ultimately, his own housing.

There are many resources in our state (and in our own district) to assist constituents when needed. For example, there's assistance available for food, shelter and help with utility bills when there's a temporary urgent need. We're often able to connect you to the right resource for your specific needs and we're happy to do so.

Next week, I'll continue discussing the services our office provides.

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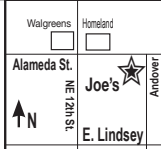

Cruelty case

Purcell couple facing felony counts

Additional felony animal cruelty felony charges were filed January 25 and Monday against a Purcell husband and wife who allegedly failed to get veterinary care for 14 dogs and two cats.

Elizabeth Trammell, 49, is free on \$3,000 bond.

She is charged in McClain County District Court with two counts of animal cruelty.

Her husband, James J. Trammell, 52, was originally charged in November with one count of animal cruelty and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia.

Prosecutors added a second animal cruelty count January 25.

He is free on \$10,000 bond and a preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. March 7.

According to an affidavit, Purcell police went to the couple's home at 103 W. Huron on the night of November 29 to arrest James Trammell on an outstanding warrant.

They reported the home was filthy and flea infested. Floor covering throughout the residence had been stripped and replaced with newspaper that was covered in pet urine and feces.

Animal control officer David Claunch reported at least two of the dozen female dogs was pregnant. In addition,

there were two intact male dogs and two cats in the home.

As the animals were removed from the house, two veterinarians outside assessed their condition.

Police had earlier documented two of the dogs with severe health problems. One, a pit bull, had been seen to have cysts that were oozing and bleeding. The other, a Boston terrier-mix, had lost an eye.

Trammell told police neither dog was taken to a veterinarian because he didn't have money. He said the smaller dog lost its eye in a fight with another dog in the home a year earlier. He said he treated the injury with Neosporin.

He reportedly blamed his wife for having all the dogs, telling police "she won't let me get rid of them. We both have a big heart," according to the affidavit.

The two veterinarians scored most of the dogs at 5 on a scale of 0-10, with 10 being perfect health. All were underweight and under socialized.

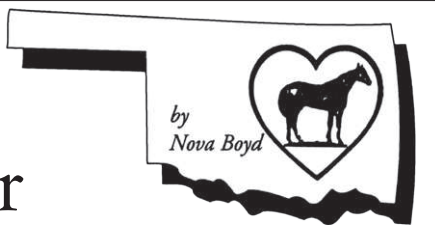
None were groomed and their nails were overgrown or broken. At least four were found to be missing patches of fur, due to either fleas or mange.

The pit bull was found to be in pain and suffering from cancerous mammary tumors. Euthanization was the veterinarians' recommendation.

Born in 1964 in Columbia, Mo., Luke, grew up on his family's commercial cow-calf operation with his parents, Bill and Anne (Dixon) Castle, and his six brothers. It was there that Luke had his first experience with horses while working cattle.

He entered his first open horse show with a palomino quarter horse mare. They entered every event and were hooked.

Luke began his first job when he was 16 years old working at James Bryce Quarter Horses during the summer. As his love for horses continued to grow, he began competing on the national level at American Quarter Horse Association horse shows as a youth competitor. Denny Hassett of Auburn, Kan., was his trainer and hauled Luke and his great mare Go Lucky Valentine to horse shows across the country.

After graduating high school, Luke went to work for Joe Edge, owner of Edgewood Farms, in Pilot Point, Texas. He spent three years there before taking a job with Roberto Guerra Velasco of RGV Quarter Horses in Purcell. While working for Roberto, Luke earned his very first AQHA World Championship in 1989 with Sugar Ray Cool. As a result of this accomplishment, he determined it was time to establish his own training operation. Luke wanted to model his business after his long-standing mentors, Denny Hassett and the late Jerry Wells. Over the years, he continued to seek their advice along with Glenn Cantrell and Frank Merrill.

While working at RGV Quarter horses in Purcell, Luke met the love of this life and future wife, Abbi, at a 4th of July cookout. They have been married 25 years and have two wonderful children, Cash, 17, and Coralee, 14.

Luke is blessed to have owned, raised or shown some legendary horses including Sparkle Sierra, Solaris, Kids Classic Style, Statutory and Mr Elusive. Luke has accumulated 39 AQHA World Championship titles and ranks 7th on the list of open exhibitors who have earned AQHA World Championships.

In addition to a thriving halter horse business, Luke is the third generation to continue his family's legacy of breeding and raising bulls to comply with the Professional Bull Riders Incorporated's rigid selection criteria. Luke also purchases and conditions yearling horse racing prospects.

In the 1990s, Luke began participating in the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association. What began as only a membership grew into an OQHA Directorship. Then, he was elected to the OQHA Executive Board, and ultimately the 2006 OQHA president. In 2008, OQHA elected him to become an AQHA National

Director. He has been on the AQHA Show, Nominations & Credentials, Hall of Fame, Judges, Public Policy, and Animal Welfare Committees.

Resendiz was transported by ambulance to Norman Regional Hospital where he was pronounced dead.

Felipe died at the scene.

Jones, Hicks and a passenger

in the Nissan, Dan Shepard, 44, of Wayne, weren’t injured. They were wearing seatbelts.

Assisting Pittman at the scene were OHP Lt. Alan Beaty, Troopers Barry Campbell, Bryan Landers and Donald Curtis, the McClain County Sheriff’s Department, Norman and Goldsby fire departments and EMSTAT.

church ladies and used her own seamstress skills to sew dresses for her pet hamster.

When he got out of the Army, Shea wanted to be a truck driver. It was in his blood; his father drove a truck.

His plans for long-haul trucking took a detour, however, when he learned his wife was expecting their first child.

For a time he drove for K.D. Arnold in Purcell and for Milligan Trucking.

And finally he listened to his mother, Katie Shea, and cousins who all worked at LARC.

He put in an application and was hired as a security officer.

It was a good fit.

“Ex-military does very well out here,” he explained. “I enjoyed the military. And it is like being in the military again – the camaraderie and teamwork.”

Shea recalled as a boy “passing by this place hundreds or thousands of times.”

And never once imagining it would give him a career he loves and livelihood for his family.

On completing his CLEET certification, he also moonlighted for about a year as a Paoli police officer.

Catherine raised Standard Poodles. Although hesitant at first, Shea was soon won over by the breed’s intelligence, playfulness and willing nature.

“They are very loving,” he said of Poodles. “I would love to have a red.”

For now there’s just a single white Poodle sharing the Shea home, although Olivia also has a German Shepherd.

“I’m surrounded by animal lovers,” he said, recalling the time his wife and daughters spotted an ill or injured dog at Purcell Lake.

Nothing would do for the females in the house but Shea rescuing the poor canid, which turned out not to be a dog at all, but a coyote not at all interested in any well-meaning attempt to remove it from its den.

At LARC, Shea has definite goals to achieve as chief of security.

“I feel I can make the work environment safer, more secure and productive for all my officers,” he said.

Just so you’ll know, Shea’s command numbers 121, including lieutenants and captains.

While a captain, he included

a message in every shift briefing: “When you walk into the gates, keep security in mind. And when you leave at the end of the shift, make sure your ethics are intact.”

“The employees here are a special kind of people,” he said. “They deal with a society that society itself cannot deal with. And they do it every day. These people need more pay for what they do.

“To be a leader of those type people, I like that.”

Shea is also an historian and admirer of leaders like Maj. Gen. James Gavin, who parachuted into France with his troops in the 82nd Airborne on D-Day.

That, Shea contends, is the epitome of leadership.

Working security in a prison isn’t unlike law enforcement, Shea contends.

“It’s many, many hours of monotony filled with a few seconds of terror,” he said. “De-escalation is a word we use a lot.”

One of the hardest elements of his new job is retention. Turn-over is big and that’s a problem.

For now, LARC is holding its own in retention and Shea is encouraged by Oklahoma Department of Corrections Director Joe Allbaugh and LARC Warden Jeord Braggs Jr.

“But they (officers) are not getting paid enough and that really needs to change. We have officers who live paycheck to paycheck and they have families,” he explained.

In Shea’s view, LARC is the flagship for the DOC and is unique in that it houses all three levels of inmates.

“I never really had a job I didn’t like. But I wouldn’t have done any of them for free.”

Shea reminds his officers it’s possible to find common ground with anyone, including prisoners.

“By no means be a friend, but talk with them. They live vicariously through us.”

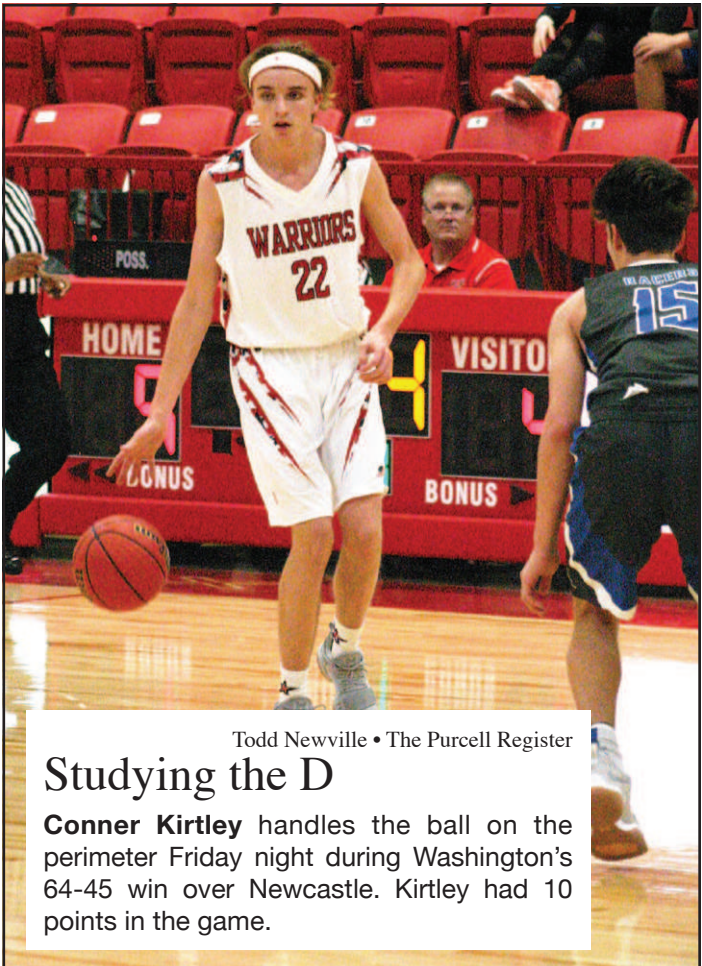

Good week to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

Each month we are blessed to go on a little "tour" of Houston and Little Rock, as well as the Purcell, Lexington areas. As we go, we take a couple of sermons with us to share with the brethren in each place. The January sermons took us to the bank of the Jordan River and to the Israelites' triumphant crossing of it.

The question we invariably ask when we come to this scene in the third chapter of Joshua is this: What is the difference between this new generation of Israelites and their predecessors 40 years earlier?

We arrive at one answer: The difference lies in the schools of thought to which they turn in making their life decisions.

One, you see, looked to their own intellectual understanding. They ask: How does the problem with which we're faced look from the empirical eye of man?

The other bypassed man's intellectual experience and placed an absolute, unwavering faith in God's power.

We know that answer may sound like good "theory" without real "substance."

But an examination of both of these accounts will leave us with something very "practical." An understanding of what makes the one group victorious spiritually and the other a failure can get us from wherever our camp is right now all the way across the Jordan!

So, let's go a step further: What exactly does the victorious group do? What practical, physical steps do they take to get across the raging river?

Joshua's campers, simply, choose to take God's word at face value—to accept what God has promised without reservation or doubt.

The other? They decide they had better weigh God's command against their experience and scholarship. Sound familiar?

It all stems from a choice. I don't know how many times we will come across this singular idea in our "front porch" discussions: Faith is a choice. I suspect we will meet often to remind ourselves of that.

Why is it we choose to do or not do something? Is it because we have figured it out intellectually (And, besides, we really like one way a little better, if the truth be told). Or is it because we can read in plain black and white what God's Word says?

In the words of my cousin preacher, Allen: That is where the rubber meets the road.

It really is.

The first generation hears God's promise to go on over into Canaan, but – before acting – they ask that troublesome question: "How?"

"How in the world are going to be able to defeat those giants over there?" (Numbers 13).

The other group hears the very same promise, then breaks camp and starts their confident march toward the uncrossable river.

"Oh, we know the river is spitting, and sputtering viciously. But God says, 'Arise and go.' So, we think we will arise and go (Joshua 1:2).

In these Sundays leading up to Lent, we have been reading chapter 7 of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Corinth was a busy seaport with lots of people and, consequently, lots of temptations to sin and immorality. You might think of it as the Mediterranean version of

a caricature town in the lawless Old West – with saloons and gambling and loose women.

Paul had founded a small church. And now these new Christians were learning how to live out their lives of baptism in the midst of much immorality and decadence. They believed that Jesus would come again soon.

Some of them also must have believed that greater holiness was obtained with sexual abstinence even between husbands and wives. In some families, one spouse became a believer and the other did not. This created tension within the marriage, especially if one spouse desired sexual abstinence.

Paul's answer to this was very practical and reasonable. Paul himself was a celibate man by choice. But he recognized that not all people were able to live a life with such single-minded devotion to the work of the

Lord.

Paul's response is given in this chapter. He encourages a believer to "stay with your spouse who is an unbeliever." Perhaps your witness and example will one day be a source of conversion for this person. You will bring him/her to the Lord, as we know now has happened many times over the centuries. Holiness has an attractive power.

Secondly, Paul insists that we be practical. You can forego sexual intercourse for a short while – a period of prayer or fasting, perhaps. But then return to what is your marital duty to your spouse. Both marriage and celibacy will lead to holiness. Celibacy is good, and sex within marriage is good. But sexual activity (porneia) outside of marriage leads to

disaster for the community.

Finally, Christians must learn to live with attention, but not anxiety. Be attentive to the Lord's coming. But don't be anxious. Be grateful.

Those are the things he says. But Paul also teaches us by how he goes about his thought process. Jesus didn't tell us everything we need to know. Paul quotes Jesus: "a wife should not separate from husband." But then he adds: "But it seems to me..." Paul invites us into faithful discernment, using the words of Jesus as a starting point.

Our faith has to be realistic and reasonable, because our God is realistic and reasonable! If you don't think you can live without the pleasures of sex, then celibacy is not for you. You should be married. If you already have 2-1/2 children and you don't think you can give a good life to another one, then don't have another child. We

practice our faith within our own practical limitations of being human.

Paul also encourages us to avoid extremes. In Corinth there were those who said "I must abstain from everything" and those who said "I am free to do anything." But Paul gives simple earthy counsel "Husbands and wives should cling to each other and fulfill each other's needs." This is very practical advice – good for the first century, and good for our century as well.

As many of you know, we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit group that serves veterans and their families. Most of our funding comes from the people we serve with a small amount coming from local grants we may receive.

Your financial support enables this organization to make a positive difference in the lives of veterans and their surviving spouses. Your continued support is needed to keep the doors open for the thousands who visit.

In addition to monetary donations, we also accept the donation of cars, trucks, tractors, boats, and motorcycles or other types of items that can be given to veterans in need or sold to raise money to support our mission.

Some of those who visit do not have funds for the basic necessities of life. We can help some of them with the cost of medical examinations, transportation and other needs on a case by case basis.

We recognize a veteran each week who served in either WWII or the Korean War with a hat representing their military service. Our Veteran of the Week is Peter Pierro from Oklahoma City who served our country honorably in the United States Navy during World War II. We appreciate the sacrifices that he made during his military service.

Last week was a busy one for our volunteers. More veterans visited than we were able to accommodate on both Tuesday and Thursday morning. We were able to assist 275 visitors even though several of our volunteers were off with the flu. Those who had to be turned away were asked to return this week. We have been reaching the maximum we can accommodate by 8 a.m. or so most of the time.

For those of you who can't understand why so many veterans and surviving spouses visit us, we invite you to stop by for coffee some time to see what goes on at 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman.

If you need a ride to come see us, please contact our drivers Clayton and Louie. Last week these volunteers spent 77 hours transporting 25 people 1,492 miles. When others just seem to talk about what they do, our volunteers commit their time and efforts to do everything they can to help each person to receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

We had a veteran visit us Tuesday who had flown in from

Veteran of the Week

Maryland for help with his VA claims and questions. I don't know what's going on in other states, but there are sure a lot of veterans and surviving spouses coming from other states for assistance. On a weekly average, we will see from 10 to 15 people who are from other states.

One of the things some may not know is that several years ago the VA changed the rules on benefits for military retirees. Before the changes, the VA would reduce a veteran's retirement as they increased their disability benefits. Today retired veterans may receive both VA compensation and military retirement benefits if they are service-connected at fifty percent or higher. This could mean that if they are approved for a 100 percent VA disability rating they would receive an additional \$3,000 per month.

I always encourage all veterans and the surviving spouses of veterans to visit us with their questions about possible VA benefits. I have been working with a veteran who is a retired Marine Pilot who served in Vietnam and has never filed a claim for VA benefits. The couple did not buy survivors benefits when he retired. The surviving spouse will not be eligible for surviving spouse benefits from the military. The veteran did serve in Vietnam and has several of the diseases presumptive to Agent Orange exposure.

We have requested service-connection of those conditions which should result in a 100 percent VA rating. This will enable them to receive the \$3,000 each month until his death. Then his wife should be able to obtain DIC benefits from \$1,250-\$1,500 per month. There are certainly a lot of veterans and spouses who are not aware of the VA benefits that they may be eligible to receive.

Twenty-five surviving spouses visited us this week with questions about DIC or Pension benefits. Some were here with questions about possible benefits while several were recently approved for DIC and came by to file for other benefits for which they are eligible. One of those benefits is the Champ-VA medical insurance that is available at no cost to surviving spouses approved for DIC.

Surviving spouses whose veteran retired from the military will not be eligible for that insurance. I encourage all surviving spouses to visit us about possible VA benefits. Another thing I see occasionally are surviving spouses who may have lost more than one spouse. They can file for surviving spouse benefits based on the military service of either of them. We always review their records to see if they may have died from a presumptive condition to their military service. For more information on benefits for surviving spouses visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning.

One of the first questions we try to ask each veteran or surviving spouse is where and when the veteran served in the military. We do this because of the presumptive conditions associated with chemical contamination. VA has a registry for Veterans who served in Vietnam, Gulf War and (Camp Lejeune 1953 to 1987). We have applications for these registries available. There may be VA benefits available to these surviving spouses.

As an Accredited VA Representative, I receive notices from the VA on the folks we help. Last week, those notices included 10 letters to veterans who received a rating of 100 percent. They will receive \$339,678 on an annual basis. There were 18 veterans notified of a rating between 10-90 percent. Those folks will receive \$225,046 annually. One surviving spouse was notified of the benefit of \$14,112 yearly.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

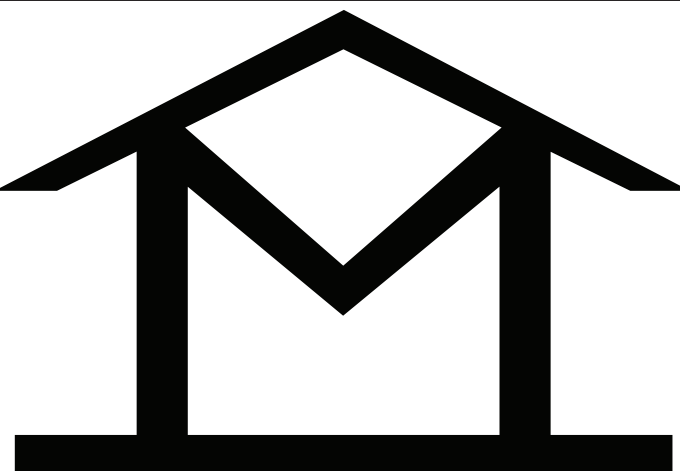
