Half-cent sales tax extended

McClain County's sales tax revenue is secured for another eight years, courtesy of the county's voters.

In a light turnout Tuesday, voters showed overwhelming support for everything from public safety to the McClain County Free Fair.

Two propositions on the ballot listed recipients of the half-cent sales tax.

Three-fourths of the revenue will be divided as follows: law enforcement, 35 percent; fire departments, 30 percent; county facilities, 10 percent and emergency management, two percent.

That measure passed with 82.74 percent support. McClain County

Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the vote was 1,208 in favor to 252 against.

The remaining 25 percent of the sales tax revenue was on a separate proposition, to be divided as follows – seven percent each to economic development, 4-H/OSU Cooperative Extension Service and senior citizen centers and four percent to the free fair.

Haley said that proposition passed on a vote of 1,219 (83.44 percent) in favor to 242 against.

McClain County Commission Chairman Wilson Lyles thanked the voters for their support.

"The citizens of McClain County

have stepped up in a big way to extend our existing 1/2 cent sales tax for another eight years," Lyles said.

"This tax has been in effect for 12 years and has benefited all our citizens in many ways from keeping our fire departments strong along with our sheriffs department to all the other entities involved within this tax. Our county is growing at a rapid pace and this will surely help provide the services that the citizens expect.

"We just say Thank You to the people for their support," Lyles concluded.

There are 23,851 registered voters in McClain County.

The grades are out

Honor roll status eludes area schools

Report cards are out for schools across the state and if area school districts didn't make the honor roll, they aren't failing either.

The Oklahoma State Board of Education changed the report cards this year to measure school performance across multiple indicators.

Those indicators for high schools are academic achievement, graduation, English proficiency progress, chronic absenteeism and post-secondary opportunities.

An overall grade is obtained from those.

Graduation and post-secondary opportunities were dropped from the report cards for lower grades and in their place, a category for academic growth was added.

Purcell and Washington High

Schools had overall grades of B, while the overall grade for Wayne and Lexington High Schools was a C.

Low absenteeism rates gave both Washington and Wayne High Schools their only A's, while Purcell High School received its only A for academic achievement.

Purcell was also the lone area high school to receive a grade – a C – for English proficiency progress.

At the junior high school level, Purcell led the overall grades with a B, followed by D's for Washington and Wayne Middle Schools and a C for Lexington Middle School. Purcell Intermediate School also received a C.

The lone A went to Washington

City amends OMPA contract

Action requested by Purcell Schools

Energy-conscious Purcell consumers who generate their own electricity will welcome the city council's action on Monday to amend the city's power sales contract with the Oklahoma Municipal Authority.

The amendment came at the request of Purcell Public Schools which plans to install solar panels on the new junior high school now under construction.

It specifically implements a behind the meter generation

program. The amendment defines BTM Generation as a "program offered by the public trust for its customers that install renewable energy systems to generate their own electricity."

That self-generated electricity can be used to offset a portion of the power delivered by the city's electric department and allows any excess energy generated by the customer to be returned

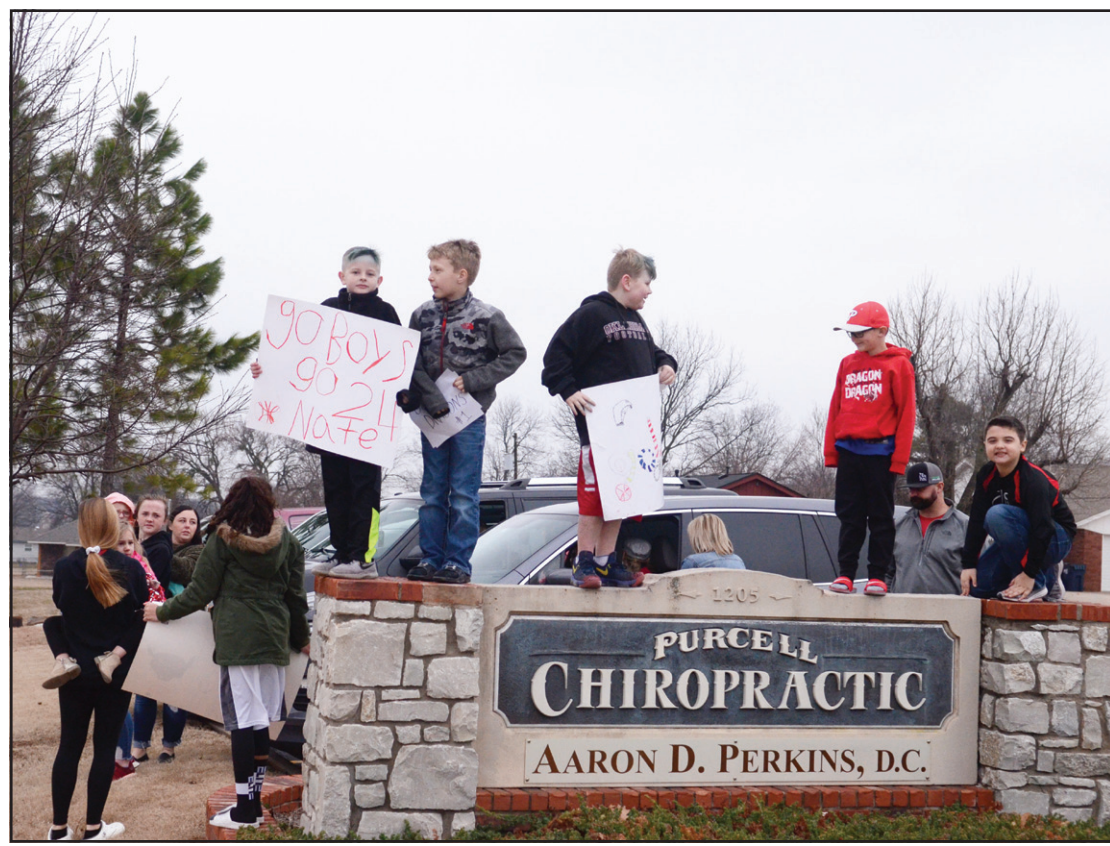

Rosedale polling place closed

First Baptist Church for April 2 election

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley has announced the Paoli I00525 has opted to close the polling place for Precinct 2 Rosedale First Baptist Church in McClain County for its scheduled election April 2.

According to election board officials, state law allows a school district to close a precinct polling place if the entire precinct is not contained within the district's boundaries.

And, if there are fewer than 100 registered voters in that part of the precinct that is inside the school district. There are approximately seven voters in the part of Precinct 2 Rosedale

First Baptist Church, located in the Paoli I00525.

Voters who are registered in Precinct 2 Rosedale First Baptist Church at addresses located in the Paoli I00525 will receive an application for absentee ballots from the county election board.

They may fill out, sign and return the application form to the county election board to have a ballot mailed to them. Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the county election board no later than 5 p.m. March 27 for this election.

Voters who receive their absentee ballots by mail must


return the voted ballot to the county election board by mail. Absentee ballots must be in the county election board's hand by 7 p.m. on election day to be counted.

These voters also may vote by absentee ballot at the county election board office from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. March 28 or March 29.

Any registered voter in Precinct 2 Rosedale First Baptist Church who believes that he or she may reside in the Paoli I00525 and who has not received an absentee ballot application from the county election board should contact that office immediately.

Have you considered raised bed gardening?

What exactly is a raised bed garden? It is a garden area that is elevated anywhere from a few inches up to two or three feet above the soil level. It can be as simple as a rectangular plateau of soil or a more elaborate bed framed in sturdy material.

Not only can it add visual interest to your landscape, raised bed gardens also have several other benefits, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist.

"Gardeners tend to reap higher yields due to raised beds allowing more garden space for growing plants. Also, you'll have better soil since amendments and fertilizer are applied only to the growing area," he said.

"There's little need to rototill, and the soil drains better. As an added bonus, plants grown close together will shade the soil, which decreases evaporation and keeps roots cooler. You'll water only the beds, not the walkways, which in turn also decreases water use."

Avid gardeners usually are itching to get to work in the landscape and raised beds can get you outside a bit earlier in the season. Soil in raised beds can be worked earlier in the year because it warms up faster than soil in traditional in-ground gardens.

In addition, rainy weather is less of a deterrent for working in the garden because mud likely would not be an issue. Another benefit is plants planted closely

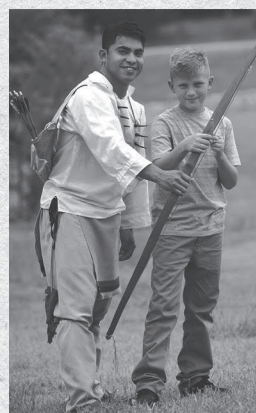

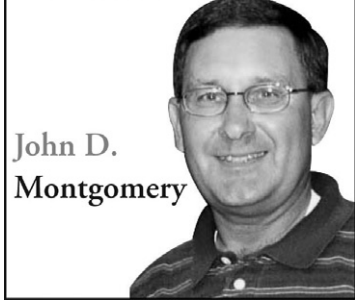

Misguided gun control

Motivated by the desire to reduce gun violence, House Democrats last week brought up two pieces of legislation to expand background checks required for purchase and transfer of firearms.

While I share the goal of keeping guns out of the hands of dangerous criminals and preventing mass violence, the legislation falls short of providing actual solutions to do so.

Democrats are undoubtedly sincere and well-intentioned about combating gun violence, but the legislation they brought up and passed in the House is misguided. Sadly, the touted fixes included in the bills would not have prevented the devastating tragedies at Columbine High School,

Sandy Hook Elementary or Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

In those and several other high-profile mass shootings from the last 20 years, the perpetrators either acquired weapons illegally or they would not have been stopped from purchasing a weapon even if the bills were law.

For context, the two bills – H.R. 8 and H.R. 1112 – seek only to complicate purchase or transfer of firearms. With a few limited exceptions, almost all purchases and transfers would be forced through a federal firearms licensee. It would also make the background check process longer, more onerous and undoubtedly more expensive for lawful gun owners.

To be clear, Republicans are not opposed to screening prospective gun owners.

However, current federal law extensively covers many of the concerns raised by Democrats. In fact, there are already prohibitions in place to keep communities safe from gun violence while respecting and protecting the rights of law-abiding citizens.

For example, federal law already limits who can engage in transfer of firearms and prohibits transfer to individuals known or believed to be barred from possession. It is also illegal for someone to purchase a firearm on behalf of a person prohibited from possession.

Moreover, there are also restrictions on purchase and transfer of guns across state lines and existing prohibitions

Senate focuses on bill on the Floor

We're starting our fifth week of session and have completed committee work and are now focusing on bills on the Floor. As of last Thursday, we had already sent more than 80 bills to the House and had around 460 left to consider in the Senate.

Our next deadline is Thursday, March 14. We'll be holding both morning and afternoon sessions, which will be streamed Live on the Senate website (www.oksenate.gov).

The last couple of weeks have been extremely busy with lots of developments. The State Equalization Board announced that the legislature will have nearly \$8.25 billion to appropriate this session.

There is a surplus of around \$575 million but nearly half of it is already obligated for numerous areas including ad valorem reimbursement, teacher flex benefit increases, Capitol and DOC bonds, and the Children's Health Insurance program among other obligations.

When budget hearings with the state's 64 appropriated agencies concluded, their requests for new funding was nearly \$1.2 billion. Now that we have a budget amount and have heard from various state agencies, work can begin on writing the budget.

Leaders already have a good idea of what needs to be done. The leadership and Senate body will work together to prepare a balanced budget.

Many pieces of major legislation from the Senate Republican agenda were approved last week. First, the Senate passed and the Governor signed, a few hours later, HB 2597. This fast turnaround was impressive.

Normally, it would take a day or two for a bill to even get to the Governor's desk and then another few days before it was considered and signed. This is a good sign that things should move quickly this session.

The measure approves Constitutional Carry in Oklahoma just as 15 other states already have. This will allow citizens (21 or older) as well as veterans, active duty and reserve military (18 and older) to carry a firearm without a permit. It changes nothing else in the law.

Private property owners will still be able to prohibit individuals from carrying on their property. Under the new law, felons, those who have been ruled to have a mental illness or have domestic violence convictions will still not be able to carry.

Several Senate Republican Agenda items were also approved in committee. SB 1 seeks to improve government accountability and transparency by creating the Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency (LOFT). Oklahomans want more transparency and accountability in how their tax dollars are spent and LOFT will provide that.

It'll also help the legislature in making better budget and policy decisions because the information will be more precise than what is provided each year by the agencies themselves.

The office will conduct performance evaluations of agencies, programs and specific divisions. They will have open access to all agency data and budgets. It'll be made up of a small non-partisan, independent staff of financial experts and overseen by a bipartisan committee of House and Senate members. LOFT reports will be available to the public.

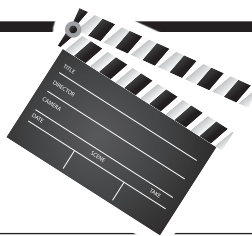

The first of which being a horror film about a young woman who befriends an older French lady with sinister intentions, a documentary about the historic moon landing of 1969, and yet another Tyler Perry comedy.

Let's get right to the reviews. ***



First up is "Greta." A sweet, naive young woman trying to make it on her own in New York City, Frances (Chloë Grace Moretz), doesn't think twice about returning the handbag she finds on the subway to its rightful owner.

That owner is Greta (Isabelle Huppert), an eccentric French piano teacher with a love for classical music and an aching loneliness. Having recently lost her mother, Frances quickly grows closer to widowed Greta. The two become fast friends, but Greta's maternal charms begin to dissolve and grow increasingly disturbing as Frances discovers that nothing in Greta's life is what it seems.

I'm really not sure what to think of this movie.

On one hand, it has a pretty decent creepy concept for a horror film. Something that I've noticed is quite the popular trend for 2019. The evil mother figure.

In April we're getting "The Curse of La Llorona," a story based on Latin American folklore about the a ghost of a woman who lost her children and causes misfortune to those in her vicinity.

And the month after that in May, we get another mother based horror film starring Octavia Spencer called "Ma." A movie about a lonely woman who befriends a group of teenagers and lets them party at her house. Until things turn sinister of course.

I guess this is the year of the scary moms.

But I'm getting sidetracked. In this case, we've got Frances, a young woman who just lost her mom, thrilled to find Greta, someone just as isolated as herself to spend time with.

But instead of a replacement mother, Greta turns out to be a crazy person who enjoys taking advantage of the loneliness of anyone well-mannered enough to return a handbag in the middle of New York City.

Not a terrible idea for a horror flick, and after watching the trailer I was actually looking forward to it.

Unfortunately though, while the concept is compelling, the execution of the overall film leaves a lot to be desired.

For starters, there's our lead actress, Chloë Grace Moretz.

I like Chloë. I've enjoyed her work in comedies like "Kick-Ass" and "Neighbors 2: Sorority Rising." I know she's been in some scary movies as well, but for me this is my first time seeing her in a horror film.

And to be honest, I was incredibly disappointed in her performance here.

In the first half of the movie she was so emotionless. She almost seemed detached from the character she was portraying here.

For this set up to work, the audience needs to believe that Chloë's character Frances actually becomes attached to Greta. That Frances actually cares about Greta and sees her as a surrogate mom.

That way when Greta's methods and true intentions are revealed, everyone watching feels the horror and betrayal of her deceit.

But from Chloë, I felt nothing. She just looked like she didn't want to be there.

Granted, as the movie goes along, Chloë does finally start showing a little more emotion. But by then it's too late, and the opportunity to make her character relatable is long gone.

And sadly, Isabelle Huppert as Greta isn't much better herself.

She never really came across as warm or motherly to me. Certainly not someone a young 20 something woman would want to spend all her free time with.

Maybe that's why Greta needs to use abandoned purses to lure her victims, because she feels so impersonal and fake. I somehow doubt that was the filmmaker's original intent though.

But again, just like Chloë, Isabelle's character improves drastically towards the end of the film. Her cold lunacy is pretty dang unsettling when allowed to blossom and definitely makes for a fair amount of chilling moments.

By then though, it's too late.

Frances never feels like a real person we could relate to, much less put ourselves in her shoes, and Greta doesn't come across as an actual threat because no one watching could imagine being lured in by someone so impersonal.

I was really disappointed in this movie. It has a few creepy moments, sure, but nothing you haven't seen done better in other films, and with more compelling characters to boot.

I guess we'll just have to wait for "The Curse of La Llorona" and "Ma." Hopefully the other mother based horror films this year will turn out better.

"Greta" is rated R. ***



Next up is "Apollo 11." This film is a look at the Apollo 11 mission to land on the moon led by commander Neil Armstrong and pilot Buzz Aldrin, featuring never-before-seen large-format film footage of one of humanity's greatest accomplishments.

There's not really all that

much to say about this movie.

It's a documentary about Apollo 11 from beginning to end.

From just before the launch of the Saturn V, to the various rocket stages and separations, the historic landing with Neil Armstrong taking humanities first steps on a celestial body that isn't Earth, and finally their return home.

It's also a 'direct cinema' film. Which means it's a documentary that features no voice-over narration or interviews beyond what was recorded during the event.

An interesting choice to be sure, but personally I don't think this kind of documentary is for me.

It makes the film a little too dry and too reliant on the old footage being captivating on its own.

However, that brings me to the strongest aspect of this film by far. The footage here is absolutely incredible.

Granted if you've been alive within the last half century or so you've probably seen some of the video used in this film. It is one of mankind's most iconic events after all. But it's never looked as good as it does in this movie.

Not only is much of it restored beautifully, making the film hardly look like footage from 50 years ago, it's also edited together quite spectacularly.

The movie stitches together multiple camera angles in the same frame, and blends shots of the astronauts, mission control, onlookers, and the rocket itself seamlessly.

If you've ever just wanted to spend 93 minutes of nothing but Apollo 11, you won't find a better film. And it all looked amazing in IMAX.

Unfortunately for me, I need a bit more than high quality, well edited footage.

Though this movie was remarkable, it also put me right to sleep.

I need something more than just old film. Give me interviews. I want behind the scenes. I need to know what people were thinking, what they were feeling during this incredible world changing event. Otherwise it's just pretty images and scratchy audio edited together.

The experience lacks what I truly desire the most when watching a documentary. The human element.

I'm sure there's many fans of this 'direct cinema' style of documentary, so for them this is probably their perfect Apollo 11 movie.

Plus I'm sure there's some who've always wanted to see the historic launch without fluff or filler, and they'll probably love this documentary too. It just isn't for me though. "Apollo 11" is rated G. ***

Last this week is "Tyler Perry's A Madea Family Funeral." A joyous family reunion



turns into a nightmare as Madea (Tyler Perry) and the crew, Joe (Tyler Perry), Brian (Tyler Perry), Aunt Bam (Cassi Davis), and Hattie (Patrice Lovely) travel to backwoods Georgia and unexpectedly plan a funeral, which threatens to reveal sordid family secrets.

I honestly don't even know why I'm doing this.

Anyone who's read my reviews know I don't care for Tyler Perry movies, most of all ones featuring Madea.

In the vain hope of protecting the tiny shred of sanity I have remaining I haven't seen nearly all the Madea movies. However, the ones I have had the displeasure of viewing have all been low budget, low effort, and flatout lazy films.

For the most part, the humor can be summed up in three aspects. Old people talking about sex, old people talking about drugs, and old people talking about breaking the law. Mix in a little cross-dressing and you've got yourself a Madea movie.

I suppose I do have to give this film a little credit. It certainly has a bit more of story than the other Tyler Perry comedies I've seen, in that there's a plot of any kind.

It doesn't amount to anything more than cheap soap opera level drivel though.

Apparently everyone in Madea's family is compulsively unfaithful to their significant other. So instead of just being a dumb onenote comedy, the film switches from brain dead humor, to pointless melodrama, and back again.

But honestly, who cares what I think about this movie?

Madea's been a character of Tyler Perry's for 20 years. At this point you've got to know what you're in for.

Much to my continuing surprise, there's still tens of thousands of people who love his style of comedy.

More power to them though. You can't help what you enjoy.

The theater I went to was jam packed with Tyler Perry fans. And as far as I could tell, every single one of them had the time of their lives watching this movie.

They all laughed constantly and seemed to adore all these characters Perry has created over the years.

If that's you, if you're someone who dearly loves Tyler Perry's style of comedy, I imagine you'll love this film just as much as everyone I shared that theater with.

Personally, I despise every single Tyler Perry directed film I've ever laid eyes on.

But if you aren't like me, and you just love Madea, this seems like a must watch. No matter how much I didn't enjoy it.

together in a raised bed help keep weeds crowded out.

Consider covering pathways between the raised bed with landscape fabric to choke out weeds in those areas.

Something gardeners hate to see is a garden damaged by pests. Raised beds are very easy to cover with insect screening fabric. Rotation of crops also is easier, which helps prevent buildup of pests.

Hillock said raised bed gardens also are great for individuals with physical limitations.

"If built tall enough, they eliminate the need of weeding on your knees, as well as making harvest easier," he said. "Raised beds can be accessed from all open sides, which is great for gardeners who may use assistive walking devices."

While a raised bed can be any shape you can imagine, it's recommended not to exceed four feet wide. This helps ensure gardeners can reach to the back side of the bed if it's adjacent to a structure.

Gardeners who would like to incorporate raised beds into their landscape should take some things into consideration. For best light exposure, build

beds in a north/south orientation.

Make sure paths between beds are wide enough to walk comfortably, push a wheelbarrow or accommodate an assistive walking device or wheelchair. Before beginning construction, stake out the beds and walk through them to make sure it is a workable arrangement.

Decide whether an unframed or framed bed best suits your needs. For an unframed bed, eliminate weeds and turf from the area, then dig a furrow on both sides of the area and pull up the soil around the edges to create a mound.

If building out of wood or other hard materials, level the area and put the basic frame in place before preparing the soil. Materials can include treated lumber or landscape timbers, concrete blocks, rocks or bricks, snap-together plastic blocks, hay bales or even recycled materials.

"Be creative with your materials for the beds and the plants you select. Raised beds are a great way to add visual interest and texture into your landscape," Hillock said.

How to properly take a soil sample

A soil test is a chemical analysis that estimates a soil's ability to supply nutrients.

Results from a soil test allow you to monitor chemical conditions, tap existing nutrient supplies, identify nutrient deficiencies, and to apply optimum fertilizer amounts.

Based on results from your soil sample, the County Extension Office will provide you with the following:

- 1) The type of fertilizer that is best for your soil and the crop you are growing;
- 2) How much fertilizer that should be applied for each application;

3) The time of year each application should be made;

4) Whether your soil pH is in the proper range.

For your soil test to be accurate as possible, collect the soil sample before fertilizer is applied and use the following steps to collect the sample.

- The sample should be representative of the entire area, whether that is a lawn, garden, or pasture;

- Scrape plant debris from the soil surface before sampling;

- Samples should be taken from a four-six-inch depth;

- Use a clean bucket and a soil probe to collect at least 10 cores from areas scattered throughout the area to be tested.

Soil probes can be checked out from the McClain County Extension Office;

- Mix the soil thoroughly in the bucket and fill a pint size container with the mixture;

- Bring the sample to Extension Office to be sent for testing.

The Extension Office will send the sample to the OSU Soil, Water, Forage Lab for testing.

The cost of the samples is \$10 per sample and results will be completed within two-three weeks.

Soil testing is more environmentally and economically friendly than guessing which fertilizer to use.

Lankford, Hassan bill has teeth

Legislation aimed at preventing government shutdowns

Senators James Lankford (R-OK) and Maggie Hassan (D-NH) today introduced the Prevent Government Shutdowns Act, a bipartisan Senate proposal to address the threat of government shutdowns.

The bill is fairly simple.

If all appropriations bills are not passed by both houses and signed by the President by October 1, no official travel will be allowed for Office of Management and Budget (OMB) leadership or staff, Cabinet members, or Senators and Representatives along with their committee and personal staffs (except for official travel within the DC metro area).

"Oklahomans and people around the country have asked for a solution to end government shutdowns that puts the punishment for failing to appropriate funds on the House, Senate, and White House, not our federal families," Lankford said.

"Americans have suggested that simply cutting Member pay would help prevent or quickly end shutdowns.

"I believe the real way to punish Washington dysfunction is to prevent Congress, the White House and relevant staff from leaving until the job is done," Lankford continued.

"Preventing travel and holding mandatory roll call votes ensure the negotiators remain at the table until the job is done, while the automatic funding mechanism ensures federal employees are paid and prevents the waste of tax dollars that comes from shutting down and re-opening the government. This is a common-

sense, bipartisan bill, and I look forward to its full consideration in the Senate."

"It is the height of irresponsibility that government shutdowns are becoming a frequent occurrence, and we need to come together across party lines to end this madness," Hassan said.

"Our bipartisan bill would prevent future shutdowns by providing automatic funding to keep the government's doors from closing and forcing members of Congress to do their jobs and remain in Washington until a funding agreement is reached. Ending shutdowns is common-sense, and I'm glad to be working with Senator Lankford on this important issue."

Bill Highlights

During a period of lapsed appropriations, there will be:

- No taxpayer-funded travel allowances for official business (except one flight to return to Washington DC) for the following:

- White House OMB staff and leadership
- White House Cabinet Members
- Members of the House and Senate

- Committee and personal staff of the House and Senate
- Official travel permitted within the national capital region (DC metro)
- No CODEL or STAFFDEL delegation travel
- No travel reimbursement (meals, per diem, or any type, including for state staff)
- No use of campaign funds by congressional offices to supplement official duties or

travel expenses

- No other votes made in order in the House and Senate unless they pertain to passage of the appropriations bills or mandatory quorum calls in the Senate
- No motions to recess or adjourn the Senate or House in order for more than 23 hours
- A waiver process for these restrictions in the House or Senate if they meet a two-third majority vote threshold in each chamber
- Implementation of an automatic continuing resolution (CR) on October 1 at last year's spending levels until passage of a law to appropriate all remaining lapsed spending for that fiscal year
- A required recorded quorum call vote each day at noon in the House and Senate to confirm attendance, which keeps Members in town for mandatory votes

Lankford served on the Joint Select Committee on Budget and Appropriations Process Reform, where he worked to develop reforms to our federal budget and spending processes. Lankford also serves on the Senate Appropriations Committee.

As Ranking Member of the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Federal Spending Oversight and Emergency Management and the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Fiscal Responsibility and Economic Growth, Senator Hassan is committed to working across party lines to maintain fiscal responsibility and improve innovation and efficiency within government.

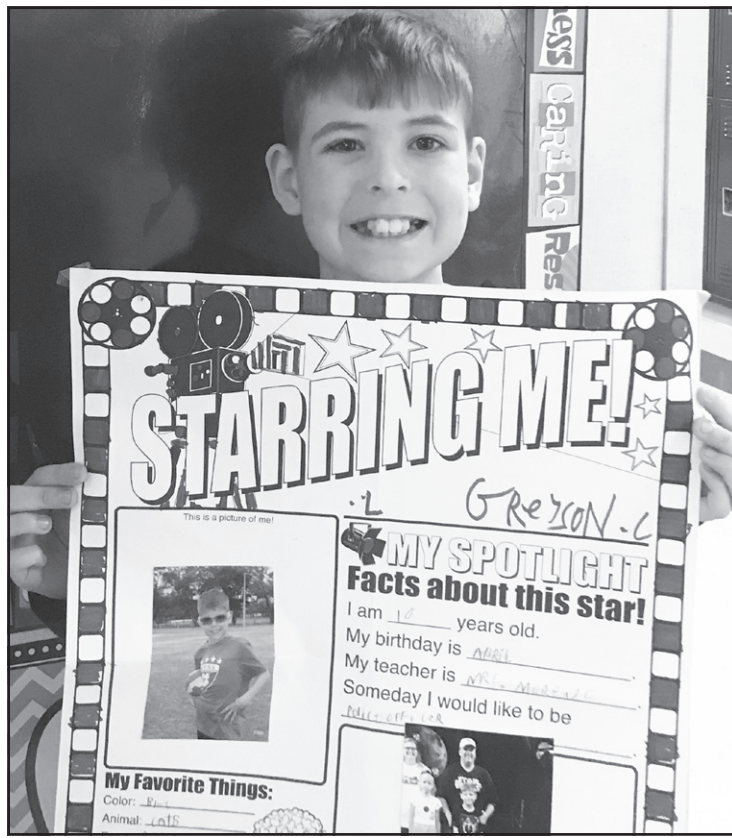

Glasgow prelim

Embezzlement count downgraded

A special district judge in Garvin County dismissed two of three felony charges against former Purcell police officer Richard Kyle Glasgow.

Trisha Misak's ruling also reduced the third felony count of embezzlement of public property to a misdemeanor.

McClain County prosecutors charged Glasgow on Jan. 3, 2018, with two counts of embezzlement of public property and one count of violation of Oklahoma statute via computer.

The ruling came at the conclusion of Glasgow's preliminary hearing.

The ruling notes that the statute cited for the two counts of embezzlement requires the defendant be a "county treasurer or other officer or person charged with the collection, receipt, safekeeping, transfer or disbursement of the public money belonging to the city."

However, the judge did find sufficient evidence that a misdemeanor embezzlement

occurred when Glasgow took a Poulan blower/vacuum from the police department evidence room.

Capt. Bobby Elmore allowed Glasgow to take the blower/vacuum home to repair it for the police department's use.

However, Glasgow told an investigator he forgot to return it to the department and used it at his home.

Glasgow was suspended with pay after being charged in March 2017 with reckless conduct with a firearm, a misdemeanor, after he allegedly shot a neighbor's dog.

He was later acquitted on that charge.

Subsequently he was charged with violating a protective order in July and on November 30 prosecutors added two felony counts of child abuse by injury.

Four additional child abuse counts were filed at the conclusion of his preliminary hearing in June. A jury trial in that case is on the August docket.

Glasgow resigned from the department on Dec. 16, 2017.

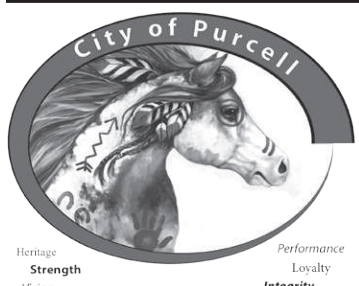

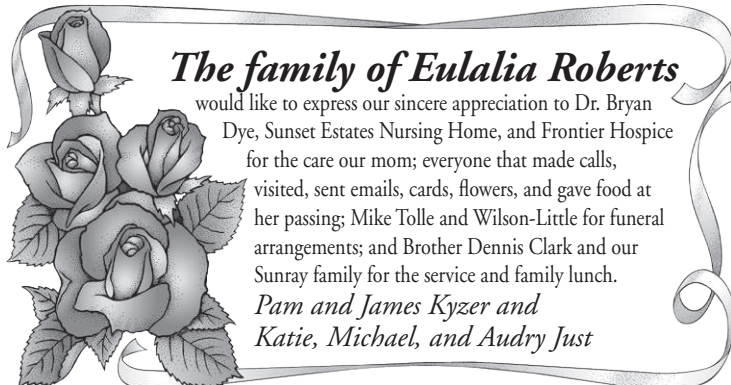

BTM program parameters adopted in the amendment limit the program to "eligible facilities" that are operated solely by an eligible customer on that customer's premises to solely offset all or part of the customer's electric energy requirements.

In a separate issue, the Purcell Public Works Authority adopted a resolution that raises the base rate for an electric meter to cover 200 kilowatt hours.

Mayor Ted Cox explained the city's fixed cost for a limited use electric meter is \$50, although the minimum paid by a customer is \$5.70.

By implementing the 200 kWh threshold, the minimum is raised to \$21.22.

"It gets us closer to recovering the fixed cost for limited

use meters," Cox said.

The measure also raises the base rate for commercial customers 32 cents per month.

The new rates go into effect July 1.

on Friday at 2 p.m.













Front-Porch Gospel: Preacher Miller faces death up in the Kentucky hills

Sometimes people may not like what we stand for, or preach, or write.

But I doubt any of us has ever received a death threat.

Years ago, though, my grandfather Preacher Miller did. Not only that: His enemies suggested it would happen before he ever stepped down from the pulpit.

Back in the 1950s, he went to preach way up in the hills of Kentucky. Folks in those hills back then were rough. But, in Preacher Miller's way of thinking, that put them in greater need of the gospel; and nobody was better equipped to deliver what somebody needed than this Georgia preacher.

Preacher Miller understood that when the Lord sent him to preach that he didn't say to go preach to a bunch of angels flying around in the sky. No, preacher, you go way down in the valley. You preach to those people down there, people such as you and I.

Brother Miller, as folks around the country still call him, always wielded a two-edged sword: On one blade he had an undying courage, and on the other a strong conviction in what he believed. Brother Miller had one belief, in particular, that he knew could lead to trouble.

It involved Christians' involvement in certain worldly organizations that he felt required them to compromise their faith.

Such was likely the case, biblically, with the church in Pergamos which had many of their members involved with various guilds associated with their jobs (Revelation 2:12-17).

Brother Miller believed being involved with certain of these groups would cause a conflict of allegiance, forcing him occasionally to step into the pulpit with that two-edged sword and try to sway them in what he considered the right way — and the only way.

About half the folks in this back-woods church up in Kentucky where he was preaching were heavily involved with such an organization, putting Preacher Miller in a position to jeopardize any popularity he had.

His unpopularity wasn't like the mellow kind I might enjoy. No, his could get him killed, right in the middle of the 20th century. Undeterred, though, he announced to the congregation one night in his booming, rafter-shaking voice:

"Tomorrow night," he announced, "if you'll all come back, you'll hear me preach a sermon that you may not want to hear..." And he went on to lay out his topic.

He knew as soon as he belted out that announcement that the tide was going to turn against him. Sure enough, a crew of those mountain-men had a

stern warning waiting for him after services. They could have saved their breath, because he knew he had no choice but to preach it. A greater authority told him to declare "the whole counsel of God." Like it or not, he was about to jump into that "whole counsel" head first.

When he left the building, he found a pay phone and called Grandma waiting for him back home in LaGrange.

"Zona Belle," he said, "if I don't make it back home, get the best lawyer you can and have them look into this."

I've often wondered how Grandma made it through the next 24 hours as she waited for the next call from Granddad. I expect she waited with a healthy portion of prayer and faith.

The next afternoon, several hours before the preacher was scheduled to deliver his sermon, a car-load of big, country Kentuckians paid him a little visit at the hotel where he was staying. Two or three of them jumped out and approached Preacher Miller threateningly in the parking lot. They had a message, and the preacher knew what the bottom line was: If he wanted to live, he would have to change sermons fast. There was no middle ground.

He made a decision, and he knew that night he would have to live or die with the consequences.

As Jesus has said "No one can see God". We cannot see the Father or the Risen Son or the Holy Spirit. But we do see the manifestations of goodness and faithfulness, or gentleness and self-control. "Every tree is known by its fruit." (Luke 6:44)

When I was in seminary I took a course in Christian spirituality. We studied the many ways of spirituality — mysticism, devotion to Mary and the saints, and types of prayer. Even modern people claim to have visions of Jesus or of one of the saints.

How do we assess whether these are authentic or not? We judge them all in the same way — what difference does it make in the lives of the individual? What fruits are manifested

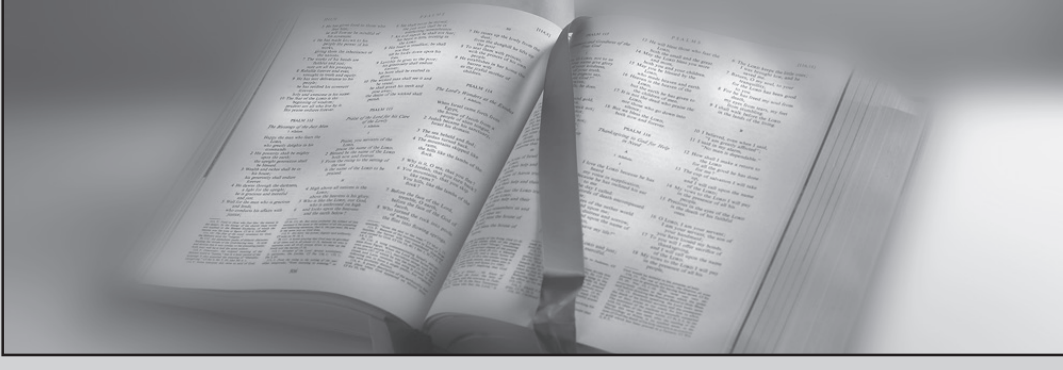
because of the spiritual experience? Did the experience make a difference in the way a person lived her life?

Lent begins this week with Ash Wednesday. The word "Lent" comes from the Old English word "lencen", which means "spring". In Latin, the season was called "Quadragesima", similar to Spanish "Cuaresma", both of them meaning "40 days". This is a 40-day retreat with the Church worldwide.

During this retreat, I suggest that we do not need to live lives of heroism.

Let us live lives of fruitfulness. Choose a fruit of the Holy Spirit that needs to blossom in you. Perhaps you desire more self-control of your tongue. The words we speak and the words we write can be used to tear down another person, to be

We take a short break from our study of Jesus' disciples and their ultimate fates this week. Yesterday began the liturgical season of Lent. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word *lencten*, which means "spring."

Many Protestant churches, particularly evangelical denominations and independent churches, don't observe the liturgical Church Calendar. The seasons were omitted along with most of the sacraments and the use of liturgy in their approach to faith. Many of them do observe Christmas and Easter, and some might even celebrate Pentecost.

Primarily, Lent is observed in the Roman Catholic, the Eastern Orthodox, and the Oriental Orthodox churches, as well as the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran and Methodist denominations. Some Anabaptist and some evangelical churches also observe Lent.

The length of Lent was established in the 4th century as 46 days (40 days, not counting Sundays). It begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. In 2019, this lasts from March 6 until April 21.

The 40 days is based on two Biblical accounts: the 40 days of wandering in the wilderness by the Israelites and the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness where He was tempted by Satan. The six Sundays in Lent are not counted in the 40 days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter," and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

Lent is a period of preparation of the believer for the coming of Easter through prayer, fasting, repentance of sins and doing penance, almsgiving, general self-denial, self-examination and inner reflection.

In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others.

Many Christians from more orthodox and traditional denominations will still observe the fast strictly, abstaining from meat, fish, eggs and fats until Easter Sunday. Some people ab-

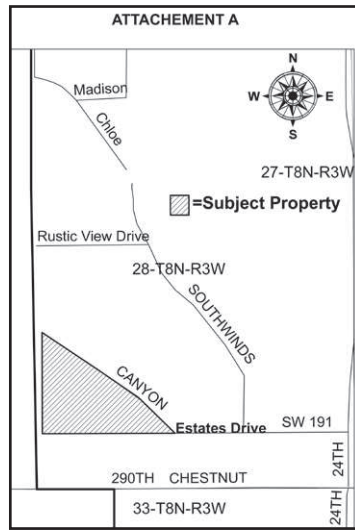
stain from only meat and poultry on Ash Wednesday and every Friday during Lent. Dairy, eggs and fish could still be eaten.

Some ethnic groups prepare special foods: pierogies (Polish) & Central European dumplings), pastas, quiche, fish tacos, cheese ravioli. Fast food establishments sometimes feature fish sandwiches during Lent even if they don't have them any other time of year.

Others will choose to give up just one item for Lent, more commonly a "luxury" such as chocolate, meat or alcohol. It is also becoming increasingly common for people to give up other things in order to refocus their faith during this time, such as watching TV, going to the gym, even social media. Some participants eat sparingly. It's not uncommon for people to give up smoking during Lent, or to swear off watching television or eating candy or gossiping. It's six weeks of self-discipline.

In Lent, you can practice – daily – a different way of using your words. As the book of Sirach says: "The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had; so too does one's speech disclose the bent of one's mind." (Sir. 27:6) In other words, our words reveal the peace in our hearts.

Or, you can choose the fruit of gentleness. During Lent, how can you walk more gently on God's earth? Can you be

less wasteful? Can you use less electricity and fuel? Can you produce less one-time use plastic and paper? The native Americans wore soft shoes on their feet so they could move quietly through the forest. How can we move more quietly on God's green earth?

In the Eucharist we share the fruits of bread and wine. But these are meant to be

symbols of the fruits of our own lives. May the fruits of the Holy Spirit ripen in our lives this Lent.

As an Accredited VA agent, I receive copies of the award letters sent to each claimant we serve. The combination of having this information, coupled with being able to review a claimant's electronic VA file, creates powerful tools we use to gather the correct

Veteran of the Week

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation Veteran of the Week is Desmon Johnson, who served in the Korean War as a member of the United States Army. We appreciate Mr. Johnson for his continued service.

A long time ago, our group improved our practices to work with the client to obtain current medical evidence where needed. We see our role as a guide helping veterans navigate the complex VA claim process and a partner in gaining access to the necessary evidence.

Many times, that evidence is found in a veteran's electronic VA record. It often takes a while to review that evidence, but it is worth it. We find such things as the papers relating to a soldier's entrance physical and treatment records. We supplement this data with a Disability Benefits Questionnaire signed by a medical professional to provide proof of a nexus between a condition and military service.

In the hundreds of VA letters I receive each week, we were notified 18 veterans received a rating of 100 percent. These folks will receive \$766,450 on an annual basis. These men and women will also receive many other Oklahoma State benefits from reduced two auto tags, property tax exemption on their primary residence.

Another benefit for veterans who are not retired military and are rated 100 percent service-connected is Champ-VA for their spouse and dependents. This is free medical insurance that may also be available to surviving spouses who are in receipt of DIC benefits.

In the category of benefits awarded in the 10-90 percent range, 31 of our clients were awarded benefits and will receive \$532,307 on an annual basis. Last year we helped more than 1,000 veterans reach their 100 percent rating. Given these results, maybe it's time for you to come in and see if we can help you.

One of the things that people asked us is why we have dedicated our lives to assisting veterans and their surviving spouses. That answer is one that can most easily be answered by a veteran who has faced the hardships that come from being away from friends and family for a year or more at a time. We know that if we do not help each other no one else is going to.

We know that every person we see are there because they need the assistance that our volunteers provide. We have had veterans who have told us that they were nearing the end of

their lives before receiving the VA benefits that we were able to help them with. I believe that the services that our volunteers provide to the veterans and surviving spouses each week has saved countless lives.

When a veteran makes their first visit for help with their VA claims and questions, we encourage them to visit with the counselors from the Vet Centers that are at our location each Tuesday and Thursday morning. I'm a firm believer in mental health counseling for all of us, especially veterans who are transitioning back to civilian life.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday mornings at the 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients at 8 a.m. and urge you to arrive as early as possible.

We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

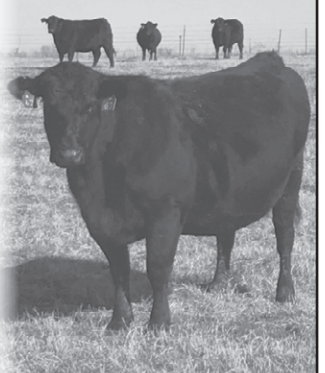
