Half-cent sales tax extended

McClain County's sales tax revenue is secured for another eight years, courtesy of the county's voters.
In a light turnout Tuesday, voters showed overwhelming support for everything from public safety to the McClain County Free Fair.
Two propositions on the ballot listed recipients of the half-cent sales tax.
Three-fourths of the revenue will be divided as follows: law enforcement, 35 percent; fire departments, 30 percent; county facilities, 10 percent and emergency management, two percent.
That measure passed with 82.74 percent support. McClain County

Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the vote was 1,208 in favor to 252 against
The remaining 25 percent of the sales tax revenue was on a separate proposition, to be divided as follows - seven percent each to economic development, 4-H/OSU Cooperative Extension Service and senior citizen centers and four percent to the free fair.
Haley said that proposition passed on a vote of 1,219 (83.44 percent) in favor to 242 against.
McClain County Commission Chairman Wilson Lyles thanked the voters for their support.
"The citizens of McClain County
have stepped up in a big way to extend our existing $1 / 2$ cent sales tax for another eight years," Lyles said.
"This tax has been in effect for 12 years and has benefited all our citizens in many ways from keeping our fire departments strong along with our sheriffs department to all the other entities involved within this tax. Our county is growing at a rapid pace and this will surely help provide the services that the citizens expect.
"We just say Thank You to the people for their support," Lyles concluded.
There are 23,851 registered voters in McClain County.

## The grades are out

Honor roll status eludes area schools

Report cards are out for schools across the state and if area school districts didn't and if the honor roll, they aren't fail ing either.

The Oklahoma State Board of Education changed the report cards this year to measure schoo performance across multiple indicators.
Those indicators for high schools are academic achieve ment, graduation, English proficiency progress, chronic absenteeism and post-secondary opportunities.
An overall grade is obtained from those.
Graduation and post-secondary opportunities were dropped from the report cards for lower grades and in their place, category for academic growth
was added.
Purcell and Washington High

Schools had overall grades of B , while the overall grade for Wayne and Lexington High Schools was a C
Low absenteeism rates gave both Washington and Wayne High Schools their only A's, while Purcell High School received its only A for academic achievement.
Purcell was also the lone area high school to receive a grade - a C - for English proficiency progress.
At the juniorhigh school level, Purcell led the overall grades with a B, followed by D's for Washington and Wayne Middle Schools and a C for Lexington Middle School.Purcell Intermediate School also received a C. The lone A went to Washington

 The Purcell RegisterEnergy-conscious Purcell consumers who generate their own electricity will welcome the city council's action on Monday to amend the city's power sales contract with the Oklahoma Municipal Authority.
The amendment came at the request of Purcell Public Schools which plans to instal solar panels on the new junior high school now under construction.
It specifically implements a behind the meter generation
program.
The amendment defines BTM Generation as a "program offered by the public trust for its customers that install renewable energy systems to generate their own electricity."
That self-generated electricity can be used to offset a portion of the power delivered by the city's electric department and allows any excess energy generated by the customer to be returned

## Have you considered raised bed gardening?

What exactly is a raised bed garden? It is a garden area that is elevated anywhere from a few elos up to two or three feet above the soil level. It can be as simple as a rectangular plateau of soil or a more elaborate bed framed in sturdy material Not only can it add vis Not onl can interest to your landscape raised bed gardens also have several other benefits, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Exten-
sion consumer horticulturist.
"Gardeners tend to reap higher yields due to raised beds allowing more garden pace for growing plants. Also, amendments and fertilizer are applied only to the growing area," he said.
"There's little need to rototill, and the soil drains better. As, nd the soil drains better. ## Misguided gun control

## Congressman Tom Cole

Motivated by the desire to reduce gun violence, House Democrats last week brought up two pieces of legislation to expand background checks required for purchase and transfer of firearms.
While I share the goal of keeping guns out of the hands of dangerous criminals and preventing mass violence, the legislation falls short of providing actual solutions to do so.
Democrats are undoubtedly sincere and well-intentione about combating gun violence but the legislation they brough up and passed in the House is misguided. Sadly, the touted fixes included in the bills would not have prevented the devastating tragedies Columbine High School

## Sandy Hook Elementary or

 Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.In those and several other high-profile mass shootings from the last 20 years, the perpetrators either acquired weapons illegally or they would not have been stopped from purchasing a weapon even if the bills were law. For context, the two bills H.R. 8 and H.R. 1112 - seek only to complicate purchase or transfer of firearms. With a few limited exceptions, almost all purchases and transfers would be forced through a federal firearms licensee. It would also make the background check process longer, more onerous and undoubtedly more expensive for lawful gun owners. To be clear, Republican are not opposed to screen ing prospective gun owners.

## However, current federal law

 extensively covers many of the concerns raised by Democrats. In fact, there are already prohibitions in place to keep communities safe from gun violence while respecting and protecting the rights of lawabiding citizens.For example, federal law already limits who can engage in transfer of firearms and prohibits transfer to individuals known or believed to be barred from possession. It is also illegal for someone to purchase a firearm on behalf of a person prohibited from possession.
Moreover, there are also restrictions on purchase and transfer of guns across state lines and existing prohibitions

## Senate focuses on bill on the Floor

We're starting our fifth week of session and have completed committee work and are now focusing on bills on the Floor. As of last Thursday, we had already sent more than 80 bills to the House and had around 460 left to consider in the Senate.
Our next deadline is Thursday, March 14. We'll be holding both morning and afternoon sessions, which will be streamed Live on the Senate website (www.oksenate.gov).
The last couple of weeks have been extremely busy with lots of developments. The State Equalization Board announced that the legislature will have nearly $\$ 8.25$ billion to appropriate this session.
There is a surplus of around $\$ 575$ million but nearly half of it is already obligated for numerous areas including ad valorem reimbursement, teacherflex benefit increases, Capitol and DOC other obligations.
When budget hearings with the state's 64 appropriated agencies concluded, their requests for new funding was nearly $\$ 1.2$ billion. Now that we have a budget amount and have heard from various state agencies, work can begin on writing the budget. Leaders already have a good idea of what needs to be done. The leadership and Senate body will work together to prepare a balanced budget.
Many pieces of major legislation from the Senate Republican agenda were approved last week. First, the Senate passed and the Governor signed, a few hours later, HB 2597. This fast turnaround was impressive.
Normally, it would take a day or two for a bill to even get to the Governor's desk and then another few days before it was considered and signed. This is a good sign that things should move quickly this session.
The measure approves Constitutional Carry in Oklahoma just as 15 other states already have. This will allow citizens ( 21 or

the valley. You preach to those the valley. You preach to those people down

## as you and I

Brother Miller, as folks around the country still call him, always wielded a twoedged sword: On one blade he had an undying courage, and on the other a strong conviction in what he believed. Brother Miller had one belief, in particular, that he knew could lead to trouble
It involved Christians' in
volvement in certain worldly organizations that he felt required them to compromise their faith. Such was likely the case,biblically, with the church in Pergamos which had many of their members involved with various guilds associated with their jobs (Revelation 2:12-17). Brother Miller believed being involved with certain of these groups would cause a conflict of allegiance, forcing him occasionally to step int the pulpit with that two-edged word and try to sway them in way - and the only way
About half the folks in this back-woods church up in Ken ucky where he was preaching were heavily involved with such an organization putting Preacher Miller in a potition to jeopardize any popularity he had
His unpopularity wasn't like the mellow kind I might enjoy No, his could get him killed right in the middle of the 20th century. Undeterred, though he announced to the congrega fon one night in his booming "Tofter-shaking voice
"Tomorrow night," he announced, "if you'll all come back, you'll hear me preach a sermon that you may not want o hear..." And he went on to ay out his topic.
He knew as soon as he belted out that announcement that the tide was going to turn against him. Sure enough, a crew of those mountain-men had a
stern warning waiting for him after services. They could have saved their breath, because he knew he had no choice but to preach it. A greater authority told him to declare "the whole counsel of God." Like it or not he was about to jump into that "whole counsel" head first. When he left the building, he ound a pay phone and called Grandma waiting for him back home in LaGrange.
"Zona Belle," he said, "if on't make it back home, g the best lawyer you can and have them look into this," T've often wondered how Grandma made it through the next 24 hours as she waited for the next call from Granddad. I expect she waited with a healthy portion of prayer and faith. The next afternoon, several hours before the preacher was scheduled to deliver his sermon, a car-load of big, country Kentuckians paid him a little visit at the hotel where he was staying. Two or three of them jumped out and approached Preacher Miller threateningly in the parking lot.
