## Sticker shock

## City ups ante on retail liquor licenses

Renewing city permits for businesses selling beer, wine and spirits may include sticker shock this year.

Purcell city council on Monday approved an ordinance amending the city's code on alcohol sales to comply with state law allowing sales of

wine and 0.6 beer in grocery and convenience stores.

The new ordinance also raised the ante on city permits to sell alcoholic beverages.

The city had charged \$10 per year for permits to sell retail wine, beer and spirits.

## An Interesting Neighbor Everyone has a story

There were detours but never roadblocks - on Andrea Romine's career path with Lexington Public Schools.

The Lexington native retires Friday and was honored at a reception on Wednesday.

When she was just a young girl, say 7 or 8, home economics was the one thing that resonated with her.

And that pull never let up. Her mother taught her to cook and sew and she grew up immersed in the homemaking arts as a 4-H member.

After graduating from Lexington High School, Andrea enrolled at East Central University as a home economics major.

She was at ECU for a year when that first detour happened.

She was expecting her first child and dropped out of college to be a full-time mom.

She raised six children - three of her own (Nic Gwin, Nathan Gwin and Natalie Hughes) and three step children (Addie Zelker, Ben Romine and Logan Romine) – and by the time she was serious about finishing her delayed degree, public schools were on the verge of eliminating programs like home economics and shop.

So she shifted gears and graduated with a degree in special education, determined to "help kiddos who struggled." She was 38 when she

graduated from ECU and began teaching full time. She had, however, amassed six years as a substitute teacher. After 26 years in the class-

room, "retirement comes fast," she said.

"I'm sure I will miss it," she added.


The Purcell Public Library is on the lookout for local teens to help out as volunteers for the library this summer.

## Phone scam fight

AG Hunter advises Oklahomans

with Tulsa area codes.

Local authorities believe the calls are part of a scam known as a wangiri scam, or one ring phone scam, where an individual's phone will only ring once in an attempt to get the individual to call the number back, resulting in charges for high international rates or connection fees.

The majority of the calls are showing up from the '232' area code, the African nation of Sierra Leone.

Hunter said while his office accepts consumer complaints on phone scams, they are extremely hard to trace.

"These types of scams are malicious and my office is urging Oklahomans to pay close the Federal Communications attention to the calls they are receiving," he said. "In addition to these scams charging high international and connection fees, the longer someone is on the phone, the more the scam call costs. My office gladly accepts consumer complaints.

In March, Hunter and 53 attorneys general from across the nation urged Congress to pass the TRACEDAct, which would require service providers to adopt technology that verifies incoming calls are legitimate before they reach consumers' phones.

In October, he was among 35 attorneys general to encourage Commission to adopt new rules to allow telephone service providers to block robocalls.

## Medicare for none

## **Congressman Tom Cole**

Committee held the first ever legislative hearing on the Democrats' so-called Medicare for All proposal. Both the inaugural forum and the legislation itself reveal a lot about the Democratic majority's priorities in the U.S. House of Representatives.

While not unheard of, it is certainly unusual for the Rules Committee to conduct legislative hearings. During most weeks, the committee serves as the last stop for major legislation before it can go to the House floor for consideration and a vote.

Usually, members of the committee are focused on setting the terms of debate, including how much time is allowed and whether any additional amendments can be brought up or accepted on the floor.

While I was tapped to serve Last week, the House Rules as the top Republican on the committee this Congress, I have sat on this influential panel for some time and know firsthand the rarity of having a legislative hearing.

So why did a committee that typically guides procedure conduct such a consequential hearing? I suspect the recent use of the "Speaker's Committee" was intended to signal to the American people what is most important to Speaker Pelosi and the Democratic majority in the House.

That suspicion is confirmed since the Rules Committee can only claim jurisdiction over one page of the 120-page bill. On the other hand, other House committees are much more relevant to weighing in and considering the Democrats' proposed one-size-fits-all, government-run health care system.

Following last week's hearing, I am encouraged that one of those committees – Ways and Means - is expected to conduct a hearing on the legislation. I hope others will soon follow. Considered alone, the title

sounds promising. After all, Medicare is a popular program among current recipients across the country.

Unfortunately, the socialist proposal would really lead to a government takeover of the nation's health care system requiring all Americans to pay more in taxes, wait longer for care and receive potentially worse care. Moreover, it would put current Medicare recipients at risk.

While it's uncertain how much the specific legislation would cost taxpayers or how





## USDA accepting applications to help cover producers' costs for Organic Certification

USDA's Farm Service Agen- Fordyce. cy (FSA) announced that organic producers and handlers can apply for federal funds to assist with the cost of receiving and maintaining organic certification through the Organic Certification Cost Share Program (OCCSP).

Applications for fiscal 2019 funding are due Oct. 31, 2019.

"Producers can visit their local FSA county offices to apply for up to 75 percent of the cost

"This also gives organic producers an opportunity to learn about other valuable USDA resources, like farm loans and conservation assistance, that can help them succeed.

"Organic producers can take advantage of a variety of USDA programs from help with field buffers to routine operating expenses to storage and handling equipment," he said.

OCCSP received continued of organic certification," said support through the 2018 Farm FSA Administrator Richard Bill. It provides cost-share as-

sistance to producers and handlers of agricultural products for the costs of obtaining or maintaining organic certification under the USDA's National Organic Program.

Eligible producers include any certified producers or handlers who have paid organic certification fees to a USDAaccredited certifying agent.

application fees, inspection costs, fees related to equivalency agreement and arrangement requirements, travel expenses for inspectors, user fees, sales assessments and postage.

Certified producers and handlers are eligible to receive reimbursement for up to 75 percent of certification costs each year, up to a maximum of \$750 per certification scope, including crops, livestock, wild crops, handling and state chicken, chips, queso, beans, organic program fees.

This announcement also includes the opportunity for state agencies to apply for grant agreements to administer the OCCSP program in fiscal

State agencies that establish agreements for fiscal year 2019 may be able to extend their agreements and receive additional funds to administer the program in future years.

FSA will accept applications from state agencies for fiscal year 2019 funding for costshare assistance through May 29, 2019.





The versatility ranch horse division demonstrates the performance, versatility and conformation of the American Quarter Horse in six classes – ranch riding, ranch trail, ranch reining, ranch cutting, ranch cow and ranch conformation.

All-Around Versatility Ranch Horse cash awards are \$500 for open, \$500 for amateur and \$250 for youth. To be eligible for points for the all-around versatility ranch horse title, one horse one rider must enter and show in all three categories. meeting.

Teddy Boles, the city's chief code enforcement officer, noted that 13 of the addresses are already on the city's radar. It is complicated in that seven of the 13 structures are city-owned buildings at the city yard.

Additionally, 17 more on Tate's list are addresses where the code enforcement is working with the owners.

"We want other people to take care of properties so we don't have to," Boles said. Boles pointed out that in the

past 20 years, 148 dilapidated structures have been removed - 132 by the owners and 16 at city expense. The average cost to remove

a house is about \$5,000. But to remove some buildings like those at the city yard can run \$20,000 to \$50,000.

And the city's expense doesn't stop there because the city is then responsible to pay four years upkeep on the lot.

That increases the city's investment to roughly \$9,000 for a single residential removal.

Over the course of two decades, Purcell has paid \$144,000 for demolition and upkeep of the 16 properties.

Had owners not demolished the structures themselves, the cost to the city would have been \$1.332 million.

Mayor Ted Cox told Tate he would "like to see your wording on how you would change the ordinance" while council member Graham Fishburn reminded him that property rights are paramount in the United States.

Boles pointed out that code enforcement officer Jimmy New maintains a list of individuals and organizations willing to help elderly or incapacitated residents with property upkeep.

That prompted Tate to say he is willing to help in his neighborhood. The council then tabled for

After reviewing the increased number of VA rating decisions I received last week, it looks like the VA was working overtime. Twenty-six veterans received a disability rating of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. Those veterans will receive an annual combined dollar amount of \$1,142,631 per year. They will also be eligible for the Oklahoma State property tax exemption on their primary residence.

While we are writing about veterans who receive a 100 percent rating, it has come to my attention that some people say that I receive a percentage of their monies. As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I could charge 20 percent for my services on any claims that are on appeal. For me to charge veterans and their surviving spouses to represent them would be an insult won't be denied because they

They are always free.

Fifty veterans received dis-Senior Lunch, 4th Tuesday at ability ratings from 10-90 percent. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$858,654. We had three surviving spouses approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their spouse's military service. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$46,893.

When I write about those approved for service-connection of a disability, some are not aware that most of them will receive their disability payments for the rest of their lives. We send our own notification letter to veterans encouraging them to return for a follow-up visit to review what benefits Mission Friends (Pre-K and they may be eligible for from VA or our state governments.

> Our thoughts and prayers go out to the family of one of our drivers, Clayton Lee, whose spouse Linda passed last week. During the more than 10 years that Clayton has been transporting veterans, Linda always supported him no matter the long hours that he was away from home. Linda will be dearly missed by all of us at our Foundation. We appreciate Clayton for his continued service.

We continue to improve our skills to assist all veterans who visit us for assistance with their VA Claims and questions. The number of veterans and surviving spouses continues to grow with each passing week. As more trained volunteers are added from other locations, we will be able to open other satellite locations in Oklahoma and other states.

The reason we are successful where others are not is our evidence-based claims system. Ordinarily, we do not submit a veteran's claim for VA benefits without first asking the veteran to obtain evidence that supports his or her case. We use the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire available from the VA website for most disabilities that we ask for the serviceconnection of.


As I review every decision that is made by VA the DBQ form is listed under the evidence that was submitted and reviewed. I'm not saying that to just ask for service-connection of a disability won't be approved, just that the veteran to their military service. We did not have a current diagnosis

Many scholars believe the mortarboard style cap graduates don was developed from the biretta, a similar-looking Italian hat worn by Roman Catholic clergy. In the 12th and 13th centuries, students and teachers typically wore clerical clothing because the church was highly influential at this time. Medieval universities helped inspire academic dress, including the familiar graduation cap.

Mortarboards are shaped like a square, perhaps to give them a scholarly appearance like a book or to represent the shape of a quad on the campus of England's Oxford University, where many graduation dress customs are believed to have originated. Others theorize that the mortarboard, which is named after the flat board used by bricklayers and masons, represents the skill of

According to the Gap Year Association, a gap year is a year "on" during which students, typically after graduating from high school, do not go directly to college.

Burnout from the competitive pressures of high school is another reason many students take gap years.




