Customers get credit on electricity bill

Purcell residents found an unexpected bonus in their utility bills this month – a one-time credit on electricity charges.

City manager Dale Bunn said Tuesday there was a problem in how the fuel cost adjustment was figured in December and March.

The problem caused the city to under bill customers for their electricity usage in December and overbill in March.

Bunn cited an example -The Purcell Register electric bill for those two months. In December, the city billed the newspaper \$359.47 for electricity. The correct amount should have been \$361.38.





# No rate increase for OG&E

Oklahoma will keep its states for electricity under a settlement agreement approved today by the Oklahoma Corporation Commission (OCC).

Commission Chairman Todd Hiett praised the agreement as being in the best interest of Oklahoma.

"Oklahoma is an energy leader, and that includes electricity," Hiett noted. "This agreement keeps Oklahoma ahead of the pack when it comes to the electricity needed to power our increasingly high-tech economy in an environmentally responsible manner."

Oklahoma is one of the nation's most ecologically diverse states with more than 10 ecoregions. Each of these regions represents a wide array of unique plant and animal species, and while the vast majority of these species are completely harmless and in many cases beneficial to us, occasionally, a few insect and animal species become pests.

Additionally, while an insect or animal may be completely harmless in one situation, they may become a pest in another.


Which insects and animals are pests for someone depends on several factors including where you live, the home in which you live, the type of

habitat surrounding you, and Control Series. the type of activities in which you are engaged.

A newly built, modern home generally has fewer cracks and holes that insects can use as entry points. A home built on a 100 acre ranch is much more likely to encounter wild hogs than one built in the suburbs.

A home surrounded by large pecan trees may have different pests than one with no trees at all. Coyotes and vultures are a big problem for livestock producers but someone in the suburbs may only be concerned with the deer eating their vegetable garden.

To help farmers, ranchers, and homeowners address some of the more commonly confronted pest issues, OSU Extension Offices in Cleveland, McClain, and Garvin counties in cooperation with the Mid-America Technology Center (MATC) in Wayne will be hosting a five-part Pest Others.



The numeric system of Body Condition Scoring (BCS) is an excellent estimator of percentage body fat in beef cows. The body condition scoring system ranges from one which is an extremely thin cow to nine which is an extremely fat cow.

Cows in BCS of one or two in BCS of three or four are BCS of eight and nine are considered to be Fat.

All data on mature beef cows indicate mature cows calving with a BCS of five will have maximum reproductive performance in the following breeding season.

Calving-time BCS of six or greater will not result in higher pregnancy rates in mature cows and may indicate wasted feed resources to get cows to those higher BCS.





Especially for those Americans who rely on regular prescriptions, the high cost of purchasing their vital medicine is an all too familiar burden. Certainly, if something can be done to bring cost down, something should be done.

Unfortunately, while bipartisan agreement already exists on policies to do so, House Democratic leadership has thwarted the actual delivery of relief to the American people.

In March of this year, the House Committee on Energy and Commerce unanimously passed a package of bipartisan bills that would ease the burden of medicine costs. Fostering competition in the industry, the legislation would close loopholes that prevent the entry of generic drugs into the market. It would also ensure that the Food and Drug Administration maintains an updated database with lists of expiring patents so Substantively, it's a short-

that generic drug manufacturers sighted approach that likely will can develop competitive drugs not achieve its intended goals as soon as possible. However, rather than advanc-

ing the bipartisan work of the committee and bringing the bills as reported to the House floor, Speaker Nancy Pelosi chose to add poison pill policy riders pertaining to Obamacare that didn't stand a chance of getting support in the Republicancontrolled Senate.

Sadly, instead of solving the high cost of prescriptions in a bipartisan way, House Democrats continue to push nonstarter policies. In fact, the latest is a radical bill that would institute socialist price controls and ultimately bog down research efforts for life-saving medications.

Once again, this bill will receive neither the approval of the Senate nor the signature of the president it needs to become law. Politically, the Pelosi plan is another obvious messaging bill to satisfy her radical base.



# Historical look at impeachment

explain exactly what impeachhistorically.

The important things to remember are that, one, imremoving a sitting president; two, we have never removed a president before; and three, impeachment is very difficult because it is political. Both impeached presidents actually did what they were accused of, but neither were removed.

First things first, Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution reads, "The President, Vice President and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors."

The tricky part of the clause is impeached for and conviction of. It is a two-part process; you are first impeached and, second, put on trial. The House of Representatives impeaches a president and then the Senate, with the Chief Justice presiding, conducts the trial.

Two presidents have been impeached, Andrew Johnson and Bill Clinton, but neither were removed from office. I can already hear the question, tice. so I will answer it.



# First Amendment binds all American freedoms

Freedom of the press, of speech, of religion, of assembly and to petition the government are woven, like stars in the flag, into the fabric of the First Amendment.

The blood of patriots is the seed of the Republic. The founders and those who followed in their footsteps invested their lives in this country. They assured there would be freedom of religion, and from religion, so the government could neither bless nor ban what anyone believes, as occurs under radical theocracies and communist regimes.

The founders secured freedom of speech, to assemble and to petition the government to redress grievances, which is denied by China, North Korea. Saudi Arabia and others that fear opposition. They also created one freedom that binds and protects all others, and has done so from before the founding of the republic – freedom of the press.

More than four decades prior to the day when Congress ratified the Constitution, colonial printer John Peter Zenger in 1733 began to publish scathingbut-true stories about the misdeeds of New York's haughty royal governor.

Zenger languished in prison for nearly 10 months for the crime of truth telling about a politician. But Zenger and his attorney made jurors understand a new concept – truth is a defense-and Zenger went free. Shielded by truth, journalists for nearly three centuries have

been free to jab their pens at those who threaten the First Amendment. There are myriad examples involving religion alone.

They include news reports about Congress trying to disenfranchise Mormons in the late 1880s and extend to modern times and the painful recognition that even vile speech, such as that practiced by Westboro

mitted as a religious liberty. to question, learn and disagree. Now, as in the beginning, freedom of the press abides porter and editor at dailies press committees. in the courage of men and and weeklies in Illinois, Kansas women who report the news, whether those reports arise from between white columns in Washington, D.C., or beside the fountain at Lions Lake in Washington, Mo.

A reporter's work is often more routine than grandiose. On most days, reporters gather police and fire statistics; they report on the scandal de jour and the zoning board meeting; and they describe a range of human experiences, from a walk through a conservatory alive with iridescent blue morpho butterflies to a father and daughter found drowned on the Rio Grande's muddy banks.

But not all journalists complete routine days. A bullet killed Ernie Pyle in a safe zone on Ie Shima during World War II; he is one of many reporters who died to bring the public truth about war.

Last year, in Annapolis, Maryland, a man who rejected having his criminal record reported walked into The Capital Gazette and killed five employees. Routine days are not guaranteed.

Seasoned reporters understand the importance of safeguarding the First Amendment. They know, also, that though telling the truth is made more difficult in these topsy-turvy times – when truth is flippantly called "lies" and lies are defended as truth – if they do not do their duty, then no one will.

From time to time, explosions of criticism and unfettered hate may around them rage, but because reporters are loyal to the duties of a free press, including to challenge government leaders and policies, each of the First Amendment freedoms continues to wave like stripes in a flag emerging in the dawn's early light.







# LPXLP **Oklahoma Avenue thrives** despite mysterious history

Oklahoma Avenue, a diagonal,two-block-long residential street that sits two miles east of Capitol Hill, is one of the 50 state-named avenues in Washington, but it has an untraceable history.

In 1981, the Tulsa World published a story about the lack of documentation regarding when and why Oklahoma Avenue received its name. Thirty-eight years later, the mystery remains unsolved.

"All the 50 states have diagonal streets named for them here, and presumably, there's a record somewhere showing the naming," the Tulsa World reported. "But no one seems to know just when Oklahoma was honored with a street."

Prior to the late 1920s, the avenue was called Cool Spring Road, built before Washington was recognized as a district, said Kim Williams, an architectural historian with the D.C. Historic Preservation Office.

William Thomas McCoy was born February 10, 1936 in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the younger of two children born to Vernon Thomas "Dutch" McCoy and Izola (Rainbolt) McCoy. Tom was raised in Tahlequah, where he attended school, graduating with

the Class of 1953 as a proud Tahlequah Tiger.

Times were tough, and Tom learned at a very young age the value of hard work and a good education. After high school, he attended Northeastern State University for two years before joining the United States Navy. Tom served his country proudly; a distinguished pilot and a true patriot. He fondly recalled his time on the USS Yorktown and the USS Philippine Sea. Being a Navy pilot was one of his proudest accomplishments, as well as one of the most enjoyable times in his life.

Tom returned home to Oklahoma and continued his education at the University of Oklahoma, and this decision would change his life forever. By chance, on a blind date, Tom met his best friend and life partner, Carolyn Joyce Gentner. They followed their hearts and united in marriage on January 28, 1961, at the Wesley Center on the University of Oklahoma campus.

Tom graduated from OU in 1964 with a Bachelor's Degree in Mechanical Engineering. He accepted an engineering job with Southwestern Bell. As a supervisor, Tom moved to several different locations around the state. After settling in Enid for four years, he transferred to New York City for 2-1/2 years to work for AT&T. The family returned to Oklahoma and lived in Muskogee for 12 years where Tom served as the District Plant Manager for Southwestern Bell. They later moved to Jenks. "All three of your commissioners wanted to hear all points of view in order to make certain we used our limited resources to best serve the citizens for at least 30 years," he said. "After hours of discussion and deliberation in the committee, all of its 911 services under the commissioners' meetings every Monday morning and with architects, engineers, legal counsel and financial advisors, we decided to try to accommodate as many needs as possible."

The biggest request wasn't ment director. about the bricks and mortar. It came from the cities that depend on sales tax to realize their long range goals.

"In order to be a good neighbor we agreed that we would honor the cities' biggest request and would ask the citizens to approve this project using general obligation bonds instead of revenue bonds."

That means the \$23.75 million bond issue will be repaid over 30 years not by increased sales taxes, but by not more than a 5-mil annual assessment on real property. That cost to owners will be between \$2.50 and \$4 per month per \$100,000 home value.

"We are asking the citizens to help us meet our critical need for this facility and to support our financing compromise," Lyles said.

The new jail in the state-ofthe-art facility will house up to 220 inmates. The current jail has just 53 beds and the daily census over nearly two years hard work and support this has topped 100 prisoners.

To deal with the overcrowding, Sheriff Don Hewett has contracted with other counties to house the overflow and avoid fines imposed by Oklahoma inspectors.

"We sincerely believe that the citizens, especially the municipal leadership, appreciate the county's effort to compromise in order to help everyone," Murray said.

"We looked at all kinds of options, all kinds of designs and all kinds of financing," Daniel added, "and we believe our citizens committee helped create a good project that is in the best interests of everyone in the county. We hope the voters will appreciate everyone's initiative."

Clegg again pulled out the big guns – going 72 yards on the ensuing kickoff for a touchdown.


The two-point conversion was good giving the Bulldogs a 48-16 lead.

Washington's other pitchers are freshmen Ellie Loveless and Maggie Place.


On the opposite side of Washington's bracket are Kellyville and Comanche.

The Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Services Block Grant, Title V of the Social Security Act, is the only federal-state partnership program devoted to improving the health of all women, children and families.

In 2018, Oklahoma served approximately 1.3 million women and children with programs focused on important issues like reducing infant and maternal mortality, teen pregnancy prevention, infant safe sleep, children with special health care needs and family involvement.

Oklahoma's current MCH priorities include reducing the number of babies who die before their first birthday, reducing injuries among children, improving the mental and behavioral health of women and children and reducing unplanned pregnancies.

That's why the Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) partners with the National Council on Aging (NCOA) and the Falls Free<sup>®</sup> Coalition to celebrate Falls Prevention Awareness Day.

Every second of every day in the United States an older adult falls, making falls the number one cause of fatal and nonfatal injury among older Americans.

Every week in Oklahoma, approximately 124 adults age 65 and older are hospitalized and 11 die from a fall. Acute care hospital charges alone total more than \$250 million a year. Falls are not a normal part of aging, and an individual has the power to prevent them.

The OSDH offers the following tips on simple tips to prevent falls:

• Exercise regularly. Exercises that improve strength, balance, and coordination are the most helpful in lowering the risk of fall-related injuries.

• Speak up. Talk to your doctor about fall risks and prevention.

• Ask a doctor or pharmacist to review both prescription and over-the-counter medications for side effects and interactions. The way medications work in the body can change with age. Some medications or combinations of medications can contribute to drowsiness or dizziness, which increases the

> • Reduce hazards in the home that may lead to fall-related injuries.

> > Maintain adequate lighting throughout the home, especially near stairways.

> > Remove throw rugs or use non-skid throw rugs in the home, and use non-slip mats in the bathtub or shower.

> > Install handrails on stairways and grab bars in bathrooms.

> > Keep regularly needed items in easy-to-reach places that don't require the use of a step stool.

> The Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance program has been proven to reduce the risk of falls. Throughout Oklahoma. many individuals have been trained as Tai Chi instructors and teach Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance classes to older adults.

This exercise program focuses on improving functional abilities, such as balance and physical function, to reduce fall-related risks and frequency of falls.

Oklahoma seniors are invited to join one of the more than 90 open Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance classes across the state.





Last week, 24 veterans were rated at 100 percent and will receive a combined total of \$939,595 annually. Veterans awarded 100 percent will receive our Oklahoma State Tax benefits, including no property tax on their primary residence and sales tax exemption on purchases at local stores. Fiftytwo veterans were approved for ratings 10-90 percent and will receive a combined annual \$922,473. One surviving spouse was approved for benefits totaling \$15,829 annually, and one was approved for Aid & Attendance and will receive \$32,016.

Our services are free to everyone who visits us for assistance with their VA Claims and questions. We have four transportation vans we use to transport veterans to their VA appointments. Our pantry also has food sacks big enough to feed a family for a week at a time. These are available to those in our community who are doing without. We want to
