This American Heart Month: Pledge to move with heart

Take a stroll down the candy aisle at your local grocery store and you will see shelves chock full of big red hearts filled with chocolates.

It is February, the month of love and Valentine's Day. It also is a time to consider the risks of heart disease as the country observes National Heart Month.

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in the United States and in Oklahoma. Fortunately, there are many things you can do to lower your risk of heart disease, including being more physically active.

This year, the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute is encouraging Americans to move more and adopted the theme Move with Heart. The Move with Heart campaign lines up perfectly with the recent release of the Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans, second edition.

Research shows regular physical activity can lower the risk of heart disease and stroke. When combined with regular physical activity, other healthy lifestyle measures, such as a

healthy diet and not smoking, the impact is even greater.

Regular physical activity can help with weight control and can also help lower the risk of other conditions that can strain the heart, such as high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, and diabetes.

For health benefits, the Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans recommends adults strive for 150 minutes a week of moderate physical activity, 75 minutes a week of vigorous physical activity, or a combination of moderate and vigorous activity.

In addition, it is recommended adults do strength training exercises two or more days a week. Only 23 percent of U.S. adults meet the Physical Activity Guidelines.

In the more recent America's Health Rankings, Oklahoma ranked 47th in the nation with 32 percent of adults reporting no physical activity, other than their regular job, in the past 30 days.

An example of 150 minutes a week of moderate activity would be walking at a brisk pace, for 30 minutes, five days a week.

Moderate physical activity

will get your heart pumping and leave you a little breathless.

You do not have to do all your daily activity at one time. Some people may get overwhelmed at the thought of 150 minutes of exercise, but breaking it down into smaller segments can make it seem less daunting.

Something else to keep in mind is not to let age be a deterrent. It is never too late or too early to improve your heart health. Even small changes make a difference when you Move with Heart.

Try to move a little more each day. You can easily do this by taking the stairs, parking farther away from your office or the grocery store.

Other ways to incorporate more movement are walking, gardening, taking the dog for a walk.

If you work at a desk, simply get up and take a walking break from the screen. All of these active movements count toward your total minutes of exercise.

When starting a new exercise program, don't start with strenuous physical activity. Start slowly and build up to activities that leave you feeling a bit breathless and that gets your heart beating faster.

# Legislation filed creating criminal liability for hiding public funds

Following the discovery of a \$30 million slush fund at the state Department of Health last year, a multi-county grand jury made seven recommendations to prevent future financial deceit by state agencies.

Sen. Paul Scott has authored legislation to implement one of those recommendations by punishing state employees who hide public funds under their control.

Senate Bill 968 would create a criminal liability for any state employee who creates or possesses appropriated public funds which are not reported to the Legislature, or that are not designed for a particular purpose by a federal grant or state statute.

“As the grand jury pointed out, there is currently no criminal liability in Oklahoma

statute for state employees hiding public funds so I felt this legislation was needed,” said Scott, R-Duncan.

“State employees entrusted with their agency’s finances have a moral obligation to Oklahoma taxpayers to maintain up-to-date, honest records. As we saw, hiding funds can be detrimental to the agency’s employees, state services and other agency budgets not to

mention the public’s trust of state government.

“This is an issue that must be addressed quickly to discourage any future hiding of public funds,” he concluded.

Under SB 968, violators would be charged with felony embezzlement and face up to a \$500 fine, up to 20 years in prison and would be disqualified from holding public office.

## AYA app launched

An application which fuses health and history is now available to download on iPhone and Android smartphones.

AYA is an interactive mobile walking app designed to keep users moving while learning about Chickasaw history and culture.

Chickasaw Governor Bill Anoatubby announced the app during his 2018 Chickasaw Nation State of the Nation Address – the same day it launched.

“We are pleased to introduce AYA, a walking app that integrates Chickasaw history, language and culture,” said Governor Anoatubby. “We keep our culture alive through

language, culture and songs as well as through the games we play.”

Much like the games of chunky and stickball, AYA gets participants moving, prompts them to compete, offers a venue to improve and reaches back to traditional Chickasaw lifeways.

The Chickasaw word “AYA” means “to go” or “to journey.” Using step-tracking technology, the app rewards users as they move throughout their day.

The app tells a historical story, through walking part-

## Senator Scott files bus safety legislation

In an effort to decrease the number of injuries and accidents caused by people passing stopped school buses, Sen. Paul Scott has authored Senate Bill 947.

The bill will increase the penalty for overtaking a stopped school bus from \$100 to \$500.

“This is a serious issue. Many kids ride the school bus each day and it’s our job to make sure they get to school and back home safely,” said Scott, R-Duncan.

“Some may think this fine is excessive but if you ask the parents of those who have


been killed or injured in recent years by impatient drivers who couldn’t wait a couple of minutes to get on down the road, it’s a small price.

I’m also sure the drivers who are now behind bars for murder would pay any amount to take back their one moment of impatience that ended an innocent child’s life,” Scott concluded.

SB 947 was a request from a constituent who is a school bus driver.

The bill is strongly supported by Alex Superintendent Jason

## NEWS from the City of Purcell

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited. No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

When I was a girl, Dad would sometimes with affection and other times in sheer exasperation call me John Stink.

Not to denote poor hygiene habits. But because of a behavior I developed early on - "rescuing" stray animals and wanting to keep every one that crossed my path.

I was known to lay claim to pretty much any animal I could get my hands on or coax into following me.

Arriving at home, events followed a set pattern.

"Mom, look what followed me home. It doesn't belong to anyone. It really needs a home. Can I feed it? Can I keep it? Can I, Mom?"

It wasn't Mom's first rodeo, but she did try to break the news gently that what I wanted wasn't going to happen that day.

Still, I never stopped trying and on rare occasions I was allowed to keep an animal "until you find who it belongs to."

That was my obsession which reminded Dad of John Stink, an Osage Indian and familiar

figure around Pawhuska when Dad was growing up there.

He was also something of a hermit, eschewing the house built for him on his allotment land in favor of his campsite near a Catholic school.

He supposedly said the "white man house make me sick" and he didn't let his dogs live in it either.

John Stink favored the company of dogs over people and when he came to town, he was always accompanied by 10 to

12 dogs.

Once during a rabies scare, the police shot and killed two of his favorite dogs. He left town, never returning to Pawhuska after that.

Looking back, my folks never really faulted me for all the strays I brought home. Probably because I got my love of animals from them.

Why, Dad was even known to bring animals home from the job site when he was general manager of a road construction company.

I can never recall a time growing up when we didn't have a dog, cat or sometimes both.

I just took it up a notch.

Current count is three dogs, three cats and two "pasture ornaments."

I gave up riding when an especially hard fall showed me I no longer bounce like I did in my younger years.

Some well-meaning people tell me I need to get rid of my animals. Limit myself to a single dog or cat. I pity them.

## Why does Oklahoma have so many uninsured drivers?

Oklahoma has one of the highest percentages of uninsured drivers in the nation, as nearly 600,000 drivers in the state do not have car insurance.

It's a serious problem that triggered serious action by state lawmakers in 2016. The Legislature approved a program to use mobile and fixed cameras to scan license plates to identify uninsured motorists. Under the program, identified motorists are issued a notice to respond and charged a \$174 fee. The Uninsured Vehicle Enforcement Diversion Program was launched Nov. 1 and has issued notices to 3,360 motorists thus far.

The program, administered by the Oklahoma District Attorneys Council, is the "first of its kind" in the nation, the council said. The program began by placing cameras and scanning equipment in high-traffic areas in Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

As we see it, the state's aggressive efforts to curb the high rate of uninsured drivers in the state is justified. In addition to costing the state nearly \$9 million a year in revenue from tax premiums, uninsured drivers contribute to higher premiums for insured drivers and force law-abiding drivers to foot the bill for costly repairs and exorbitant medical bills.

In 2016, Oklahoma was deemed No. 1 in the nation for having the highest percentage of uninsured drivers as one out of every four motorists in Oklahoma drove without insurance, a statistic that has surely led insurers to raise premiums in the state.

We were curious. How expensive is it to buy car insurance in Oklahoma? According to an October report by Insure.com, the average cost of auto insurance in Oklahoma is \$1,531 a year, 12.6 percent above the national average (\$1,365) and No. 13

on a list of the most expensive states to buy auto insurance. Michigan was No. 1, with an average premium of \$2,239 a year.

Oklahoma has among the highest car insurance rates and highest percentages of uninsured drivers in the nation. The two are indelibly linked. The catalyst for both is the state's low wages. Only 11 states have a lower median household income than Oklahoma (\$48,568), according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Translation: It's more difficult for Oklahomans to pay for auto insurance versus residents in most states.

Denise Johnson, president and CEO of Independent Insurance Agents of Oklahoma, said she and her members believe the new enforcement program will eventually lower the number of uninsured drivers in the state. Right now, though, it's still too early to gauge the program's impact, she said.

Well the Best Picture nominees for the 2019 Oscars have been announced, and boy are they lousy.

But the real life story is so horribly manipulated, so ridiculously distorted, to the point of outright lying to the audience, all in an effort to fit a generic and predictable Hollywood screenplay. And in the end, it doesn't even make for a more compelling story, just one that's bland and a bit more familiar.

The worst part of all is there are plenty of other films much more deserving of Oscar recognition.

One of the most beautiful films of the year, "If Beale Street Could Talk," somehow didn't get nominated. Even after the director's previous film, "Moonlight," won Best Picture in the most embarrassing moment for the Academy in recent memory.

Other films much better than those three nominated include "Eighth Grade," "Sorry To Bother You," "The Wife," "First Man," "Hereditary," "Annihilation," and many, many more.

Heck, if we're nominating superhero movies for Best Picture, why not toss in "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse?" It's leagues better than "Black Panther."

And if we're throwing Oscar nods to big budget action films, might as well add "Mission: Impossible - Fallout." It was probably the best action movie

I don't understand what the Academy is doing. I know the nominations are largely political, but this year's batch of films is particularly odd.

My only hope is one of the more deserving nominees gets the award and we don't see a repeat of The Golden Globes.

Anyway, enough of my ranting. There's still plenty of new movies to talk about.

This week I had the chance to check three films, including an early screening of the second "Lego Movie." So without any more Academy ravings, let's get to the reviews.

First up is "The Lego Movie 2: The Second Part."

Five years after the events of the first film, invaders from outer space have laid waste to the city of Bricksburg, wrecking everything faster than it can be rebuilt. The battle to defeat the invaders and restore harmony to the LEGO universe will take Emmet (Chris Pratt), Lucy (Elizabeth Banks), Batman (Will Arnett) and their friends to faraway, unexplored worlds, testing their courage, creativity and Master Building skills.

I gotta say, I was looking forward to seeing this movie quite a bit.

I loved the first "Lego Movie" released back in 2014. The animation was incredible, the story, while at first glance pretty straightforward, ended up being incredibly subversive and filled to the brim with self-aware humor.

This latest film though? Well I'm not exactly sure what to think.

On the surface it still looks great. It has the same stop-motion animation look, which is stunning despite, or perhaps because the limitation of making nearly everything out of Lego.

But then there's the story, and in my mind it doesn't nearly stack up to the cleverness of the first.

At the end of the original "Lego Movie," it's revealed everything, the characters, the conflicts, the entire plot is actually all events being played out by a boy on his father's massive Lego set.

It's a good twist, one that I definitely didn't see coming.

It shifted the narrative from just being a generic battle of good vs. evil to a much smaller and more interesting conflict between a dad who regards his Lego sets as displays not to be disturbed and a son who sees them for the toys of limitless creativity they are.

Well this latest film takes the "real life" twist and runs with it.

All of the subtlety from the previous movie is completely gone. In fact the writers here practically slap you in the face with the real life elements.

The invaders from outer space are from the Syster (sister) System, Emmet has to rescue his friends to prevent arMOMagadden (our mom) which will destroy the world, sending everyone he loves to an eternal purgatory in the bin of storage.

At least the first film had a little nuance to it. This one basically knocks you over the head with the real life "subtext" every other scene.

But even ignoring the obviousness of the actual plot, the overall narrative here just feels a lot less refined than the original movie.

Everything felt like it came out of left field. It's like the writers just threw a bunch of

ideas at a wall and haphazardly stitched them all together.

Luckily, the story does eventually find its footing after the first hour or so. By the end everything becomes a little more focused, and I did wind up liking the overall message.

It's a shame the story leading up to felt like a complete mess though.

But for me, the most disappointing element of this movie had to be the humor.

Where the original often left me laughing until I was sore, I'm pretty sure I could count the number of times I laughed out loud during this film on one hand. I can't quite put my finger on why, but it just wasn't remotely as funny.

Fortunately, one thing that didn't turn out to be a let down though was the music.

Not only do they include a few remixes of the incredibly catchy tune from the first film, "Everything Is Awesome," there's also quite a few new songs. One of which surprisingly rivals the catchiness of "Everything Is Awesome."

So where does that leave this movie?

Well if your kids were fans of the original, I'm sure they'll get a kick out of this one too. There's enough going on to keep children entertained throughout.

I wouldn't say it's bad, nor does it sink to the mediocrity of something like "The Lego Ninjago Movie," but as someone who loved the first "Lego Movie" and absolutely adored "The Lego Batman Movie," this film was definitely a disappointment.

Next is "The Kid Who Would Be King." Alex Eliot (Louis Ashbourne Serkis) believes he's just another nobody, until he stumbles upon the mythical Sword in the Stone, known as Excalibur.

Facing the threat of the wicked enchantress Morgana (Rebecca Ferguson), he must unite his friends and enemies into a band of knights and, together with the legendary wizard Merlin (Angus Imrie and Patrick Stewart), save the world from destruction.

I was not looking forward to this movie based on the previews.

A modern day telling of King Arthur staring middle schoolers? Sounds like something they would have thrown straight to VHS back in the mid 90s.

I'd go as far to say it sounds pretty dang ridiculous, but that doesn't automatically make this a bad film.

In fact the absurdity here is part of the charm. And you won't find a spec of cynicism in this movie, it takes itself 100% seriously.

Honestly, in a way, it's refreshing. Sometimes it's nice to see a kid's movie that isn't constantly trying to subvert common story tropes, I'm looking at you Disney.

Yes, the plot here is exactly what you expect, but it's fairly well paced and engaging for what it is, plus there's just this nice warm sincerity about everything.

The performances are solid, which is no small feat consider the main characters are fairly young.

For that I'll give a lot of credit to the director, Joe Cornish, who was also responsible for another film back in 2011 called "Attack the Block." A movie which was also filled with many

great teenage performances.

Not too surprising, the standout character here ended up being Merlin, but it wasn't only for Sir Patrick Stewart.

Naturally Stewart was first-rate, he's fantastic in pretty much every role he sets his mind to, but it actually ended up being Angus Imrie, who plays a young Merlin, that stole the show here.

The character of Merlin is just so wonderfully ridiculous, and Angus Imrie plays him completely seriously.

It kind of reminded me of The Doctor from the ongoing BBC TV show "Doctor Who." Yes, he seems silly, but there's such a genuine enthusiasm about the way he acts you just want to go along for the ride.

All of that said, I wouldn't go into this movie with the highest of high expectations. The performances are pretty good, but the kids still occasionally fall flat. And the special effects, while serviceable, are more than a little rough around the edges.

But for a modern telling of King Arthur featuring a teenage cast, this movie is about as good as you could hope for.

A quick word of caution to parents though. Morgana's evil minions in the film are pretty dang scary looking.

In fact, I thought one scene near the beginning felt straight out of a horror film. Unless you have a remarkably tough six or seven-year old, I'd definitely consider taking them to see something else.

Last this week is "Serenity." Fishing boat captain Baker Dill (Matthew McConaughey), leads a mostly quiet life, catching fish and leading fishing tours off a tranquil, tropical enclave called Plymouth Island. Suddenly though, his quiet life is shattered when his ex-wife Karen (Anne Hathaway) tracks him down with a desperate plea for help.

She begs Dill to save her from her new, violent and abusive husband Frank (Jason Clarke). Her appearance thrusts Dill back into a life he'd tried to forget, forcing an internal struggle for right and wrong.

You know, I was beginning to think this January wasn't going to be half bad.

Typically, this is the time of the year when big movie studios dump off their garbage. Releasing their worst films on an unsuspecting world, all in a hope to make some kind of profit on projects they know wouldn't be able to compete at a busier time of year.

This January was starting to seem different though.

Sure, there've been a few mediocre films, but nothing too terrible. Even the one horror movie released this month wasn't half bad. I was beginning to think I had lucked out and there wouldn't be any overtly horrible movies this month.

Oh how horribly naive I was.

This film is an exercise in frustration. Let's start with our lead Dill.

I hate Dill. Dill might actually be one of the least likeable main characters ever conceived.

We're introduced to Dill as this man oddly obsessed with catching this one giant tuna fish, to the point where he actually pulls a knife on a paying customer just to have a shot at catching the big one.

And that's just the first scene.

Later on he follows up this wonderful introduction by telling his fishing partner he's bad luck for catching fish. His reasoning? Because the poor guy's wife died.

That's right, our main character uses the death of his coworker's wife as an excuse to no longer work with him. Not only that, but he tells the guy straight to his face.

Are we actually supposed to sympathize with this wretched contemptible excuse for a human being? I understand creating characters who are a bit rough around the edges, but this man is just awful.

Yet somehow, despite being complete jerk to everyone around him, the entire population of this small island looks out for Dill, keeping up with every little worthless detail in his life.

Beyond Dill, the other characters in the film barely amount to anything more than a footnote.

Dill's ex-wife might possibly have the worst taste in men imaginable. Somehow she found someone even more detestable to marry than her first husband. That's quite a feat considering how vile Dill is.

Instead of being a poor jerk who treats everyone around him poorly like Dill, Frank is a rich jerk who treats everyone around him poorly and also beats his wife.

That's our hero. A man only slightly better than someone who abuses his spouse.

Unfortunately, the characters are only a small piece of what makes this film such an unpleasant experience.

The directing is awful and the cinematography is somehow worse. I couldn't believe how horrible some scenes were shot. To me, it spoke to a director overestimating their own skill. It looked like nothing but pretentious nonsense.

But not even that is even the worst part of movie though. No, the most appalling aspect of this wretched garbage fire of a film is easily the story.

The plot here has a twist ending that rivals and perhaps surpasses the stupidity of even the worst M. Night Shyamalan film.

I mean it. I saw the twist coming, but I thought there was no way the film would actually go there.



# Election rules and reminders

Following tips will simplify voting experience

Voters will go to the polls February 12 for the board of education primary election, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said today.

Haley offered the following information and tips for voters:

- Early voting will be available at the County Election Board office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., February 7 and 8. On election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Lines are possible at peak voting times. Wait times will likely be shortest at mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Anyone in line to vote at 7 p.m. will be allowed to cast a ballot.

- Anyone who needs to look up their polling place, verify their registration information or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: [www.elections.ok.gov](http://www.elections.ok.gov). Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

- Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the County Election Board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot. There are three ways for voters

to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state or tribal government; show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the County Election Board; or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. (If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.)

- Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may be assisted by a person the voter chooses.

In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes.

Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-tactile interface (ATI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or

at their assigned polling place on election day.

- Voters who have moved since the last election, but who have not transferred their voter registration to their new address, may do so on Election Day by going to vote at the polling place where their registration has been in the past. While voting, they may fill out a form instructing the County Election Board to transfer their registration to the new address before the next election.

- Those who become physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. February 5 still can request an emergency absentee ballot. Those who might qualify for an emergency absentee ballot should contact the County Election Board office at 405-527-3121 as soon as possible for more information.

- Any violation of election law will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities.

Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. It is also unlawful to remove a ballot from the polling location, possess intoxicating liquors within half a mile of a polling place or to disclose how you voted while within the election enclosure.

## Planning now can ease financial strain of 2019 holiday season

If the financial reality of overspending during the 2018 Christmas holiday season is making your 2019 budget feel as tight as your pants after a big meal, now is a great time to establish this year's holiday budget and start setting aside money to help ease the financial crunch at the end of this year.

Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension family resource management assistant specialist, said planning and saving now can make the next holiday season less financially stressful.

"When we put off buying gifts, planning special meals, making favorite candies or even sending out Christmas cards, it's easy to overspend," Clampet said.

"Waiting until the last minute and being rushed can lead to more expensive impulse purchases that you may not have made if you had a plan in place. The holidays can be stressful even with great planning, but putting off things off until the last minute and spending more than you can afford just adds to the stress."

One easy way to set your budget for the next holiday is to add up what you spent for Christmas last year. Be sure

to include gifts, food, holiday parties, special clothing, baking supplies and even stamps if you are inclined to send cards. Were there people you wanted to purchase gifts for but either did not have time or funds? Include that amount on your expense list.

Once it has been established what you spent in each of these categories, add them up. When you have your total, cushion it by about 25 percent. Say your total is \$1,000. Adding 25 percent brings it to \$1,250.

Now, divide by 12 and that will give you the amount you need to set aside each month to cover your expenses next December.

In this case, set aside about \$105 each month so you can pay cash for everything next season.

"If you realize this amount isn't doable and will break your monthly budget, step back and look at your list again," she said. "Think of ways to reduce spending. Perhaps restructure your gift giving by drawing names or buying only for the children in the family. Instead of hosting the entire meal, ask family members to bring a covered dish."

Also, keep in mind any upcoming expenses that currently are not in your budget. Will you have children going to college?

Is a new or used car in your plan this year?

Consider all expenses that you are not paying at this time but will be later in the year. These costs may lead to further cutting your holiday budget.

"Keep in mind time and money both are at a premium during the holidays," Clampet said. "Getting your plan in place now will help ensure an enjoyable holiday next time around."

# Mail-in ballots

## Apply now for February 12 primary

A little more than a week remains for registered voters in McClain County to apply for absentee ballots for the February 12 school board primary election, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said.

Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the county election board no later than 5 p.m. February 6 to be processed in time for the election.

Absentee voters may apply in person at the county election board office or may send their applications by mail, fax, or e-mail. An online version of the form may be filled out and submitted electronically <http://www.elections.ok.gov>.

Any registered voter eligible to vote in the election may vote by absentee ballot without stating a reason, Haley said.

However absentee voters can activate certain special conditions in these circumstances:

Registered voters who are physically incapacitated, who care for physically incapacitated

persons who cannot be left unattended or who are confined to nursing homes may apply for absentee ballots only by mail, fax, e-mail, online or via an agent who is at least 16 years of age and who is not employed by or related within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity to any person whose name appears on the ballot.

Military personnel, residents of McClain County living overseas, and the spouses and dependents of each group may apply only by mail, fax or e-mail. ### Captain Eads

Becky saw a tall, balding man walking toward them. He wore a full beard but no mustache. “Well, hello,” he said. “It’s Miss Ascot, isn’t it?”

“How kind of you to remember me.”

“I recall that you asked a great number of excellent questions when you toured the caisson sometime back. I’m gratified that you show such interest in my little project.”

“It’s the most exciting thing in years. This is Becky. She’s recently arrived and would like to learn more about the bridge — and if I may be so bold, the man behind it. Becky, may I present James Buchanan Eads.”

“Pleased to meet you,” Becky said, remembering to curtsy. “Are you really a captain?”

He gave a pleased chuckle. “An honorary title only, but one I’m quite proud of,” he replied. “Because of my salvage work in the Mississippi, I became most familiar with the currents and treacherous conditions. There is not a stretch of more than fifty miles where I have not walked on the bottom. I was able to advise other ships of dangers, and they awarded me the title of ‘Captain.’ I also had my own little fleet of recovery ships, so the description was not entirely frivolous.”

“Laura told me about your diving bells. Do you still do salvage work?”

“Good heavens, no! I did much of my own work underwater in the early days because of the danger involved, and my health suffered as a result. I gave that up twenty years ago and contented myself with helping others safely navigate the river. Then came the great Civil War. You’re probably too young to remember much of that.”

Becky nodded. “Yes, that was a little before my time.”

“I was a Union man, and a friend of mine introduced me to leaders in Washington as a consultant. As a result, the government commissioned me to build ironclad warships for river defense. I delivered seven ships within five months; the first United States ironclads to enter combat. We built thirty vessels over the course of the war.”

“Pardon me, Sir, but what exactly is an ironclad?”

“It’s a ship like any other, but fitted with steel plates on all sides to protect it from cannon and gunfire. We slope,



or angle, the plates to strengthen them and prevent a direct impact. Cannonballs striking the ship then generally glance off the plates without doing heavy damage. Since the ship is clad round about with iron, the nickname ‘ironclad’ became the popular term.”

“Did your ships help out a lot during the war?”

Captain Eads smiled. “The river ironclads gave the Union superiority along the interior waterways. We were able to support the ground troops by bombarding the Confederate defenses while their cannon balls merely bounced off our steel plating. By controlling the Mississippi, the Union was able to essentially cut the Confederacy in half. Generals Grant and Sherman agreed that the vessels were vital to our early victory in the West.”

and, finally, a smoothie bar before time and the town's changing needs left it vacant.

But where others saw a building in decline, the Rev. Charles Barton, pastor of the nearby Grace Chapel, saw a means to an end.

Today it houses The Corner, a Christian youth center sponsored by Grace Chapel.

The chapel acquired the shell of a building nearly 20 months ago and the congregation set about transforming it into Barton's vision of a safe place for teens to gather for food, games and fellowship.

"We bought it in June 2017 and started the remodeling process as we could pay for it," Barton said.

Barton first got the idea of a youth center at a pastors' conference.

Lou Dunn, a church member, has taken over The Center's operation.

It is open on Wednesday and Saturday nights for youth age 12-18 years.

On Wednesdays, the doors open at 6:30 p.m. for dinner and there's a worship service at 7 p.m.

Saturday hours are 6 to 9 p.m. On Wednesdays, Dunn and church volunteers try to feed the youth a full dinner.

The menu is simple, tasty and filling – sloppy joes, walking tacos, chicken alfredo, macaroni and cheese are a few favorites.

Hunger, Barton noted, is a fact for many of the young people.

Some kids just want lettuce, no dressing, just plain lettuce.

With local food pantries, Barton said there's no reason

for anyone to go hungry.

Still, it happens.

"The kids can't cook and the parents don't," he said.

The neighborhood near the property is a place where many families come and go and where too many youth are left to fend for themselves.

Food, games and "plenty of love" is what The Corner offers. There is no charge or requirement that youth live in Lexington. In fact, some teens come across the river from Purcell.

The goal, said Dunn, is also to teach the teens about Jesus.

"It's a safe place, a Christian environment, where teens can come and intermingle," Dunn said. "We don't put up with cussing or drugs. When they walk in the door, they know they have to be respectful."

Dunn greets the youth with hugs and assigns simple chores.

Some parents come and check out The Corner.

That's fine with Dunn.

"I want them to know this is a safe place for kids."

A Lexington police officer comes on Saturday nights to hang out with the youth.

Dunn said the youth don't have to attend Grace Chapel – or any church for that matter.

Grace Chapel is a small church – the congregation numbers about 40.

"Our vision is a place where we can minister to youth and try to make a difference, to be a blessing to the kids," Barton said.

One recent Saturday, the turnout was 22 – a pretty good crowd, Dunn said.

In addition to snacks, the teens have a choice of activities. There's karaoke, air hockey, foosball, pool and ping pong.

Barton's wife, Jo, said the church hopes to add a horseshoe

pit and volleyball court by next summer.

Mrs. Barton said there has been positive response from Lexington schools.

Perhaps because the Bartons treat all the teens "like they are our kids."

"It's just planting that little seed," she explained.

The Bartons' daughter and son-in-law, Dana and Derek Ferguson, previously ran the church's youth program. The couple are still actively involved.

Derek Ferguson installed the sound system at The Center.

More improvements are planned as the funds become available.

Barton wants to add central heat and air to the building and has plans to build a brick fire pit and barbeque on an adjacent patio.

"We treat this as our mission field," he said. "It is truly an outreach."

The Corner began when Barton pondered what would happen if he and the church could make a difference in one kid's life.

"Now we've made a difference in probably a dozen kids' lives," he said. "That's not much to the world, but it's a world of difference to them."

at the meeting's low turnout.

But he understands, too, the city's baby steps approach to a new hospital.

That there's nothing that can happen until land is acquired.

And that will depend on whether the land acquisition and the future hospital will belong to the city or the developer.

For the next 60 days or so, Shirley and the board's calendar will consist of bi-weekly ad hoc type meetings.

"We want it (hospital) convenient for all people," he said. "And cost is always a factor."

If there is one single thing adding a sense of urgency it is that fact.

"The longer we wait, the cost factor always goes up," he said. "I was told we (hospital board) were there to make a recommendation. From our point, we did everything we could do. This was the first step, as the mayor said."

"The sooner this gets started, the better it will serve the community," he added.

Shirley is hopeful that in 60 days, the city will have settled on a site.

In the meantime, one major decision looming is whether it will be best for the city to own the hospital or enter a long-term lease with the developer.

One consideration in that decision is what will a new hospital be worth in 20 years.

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## Mark Gale starts 30th year at Marshall University

1977 Purcell graduate has made a career in West Virginia

This week, Marshall University Associate Athletic Director of Football Operations Mark Gale sat in his Shewey Building office answering phone calls from NFL scouts while also meeting with players who filed into his office returning from semester break.

On the wall of Gale's office there are pictures of his family, pictures of memorable Marshall football moments and photos of players who made the ascent to professional football. There is also a three-frame collage with photographs of 23 rings he has collected during his coaching and administrative career. The collage soon will be filled out with a 24th ring

change, Gale has been the constant within the walls of Marshall's football offices and has been a fixture in the success of the program.

During his 29 years, Marshall's football program has a 251-127 overall record and eight championships - five Mid-American Conference championships (1997-2000, 2002), two NCAA Division I-AA national championships (1992, 1996) and one Conference USA championship (2014).

While the championships were all special, Gale said it's the people, not the success, that made his near-three decades in Huntington memorable.

"I've been here under four head coaches," he said. "I've worked with 66 assistant football coaches, 36 graduate assistants, nine head strength coaches, 10 assistant strength coaches,

With just seconds remaining in the tight contest Gavin Nation drove in for a layup to give the Dragons the lead 53-52.


Vanoss flew down the court but missed a shot at the end and the Dragons came out with the one point victory.



## Gale:

had two daughters, Caitlin and Chelsea, who were both young at the time of his transition into administration. The move allowed him to be active within Marshall's football program while also helping him see both daughters grow up in sports and activities, which is a sacrifice coaches often make in-season and on the road with recruiting.

Family - both his immediate family and Marshall football family - never became more important for Gale than in 2015 when a health scare threatened not only his career but his life.

After tests revealed abnormalities on his pancreas, Gale had his entire pancreas, one-third of his stomach and one-third of his small intestine removed in an operation that left him hospitalized for 15 days and on a feeding tube for nearly a month.

Carol and his daughters never left his side. Once out of the hospital and back to better health, he went to watch a Marshall practice. The entire team stopped drills to greet him with an ovation that still sticks with him.

The events reinforced Gale's love for family and Marshall, and it's something he keeps with him daily to guide the rest of his life.

"My surgeon told me, 'When your feet hit the floor, thank the good Lord every morning,' and I do," Gale said. "We all think we're invincible and I found out that I wasn't. The welcome that I received was overwhelming. Someone took a picture and shared it with my wife and she got it matted and framed. It's hanging at the house."

### Humble beginnings

Gale met his wife in Huntington after a journey from Oklahoma that is also incredible, when put in perspective by Gale.

When University of Oklahoma offensive coordinator Jim Donnan interviewed for the Marshall head coaching job Gale and other assistants had no clue about Huntington or the Thundering Herd, really.

"You've got to remember - and I can't help but chuckle - we

knew he was interviewing at Marshall, but there was no getting on a computer and Googling to find out about Marshall," Gale said. "There wasn't a cellphone to pick up and say, 'I'm going to see what this is all about.'

"He came back from his interview and was explaining things to us. I remember being in my office on Jan. 18, and he said, 'I just got the call. They offered the job. You wanna go?' This is about 2:30 or 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and I said, 'OK.' He said, 'They are sending the plane for us at 10:30. You get one suitcase, one box and a briefcase.'"

For the Purcell, Oklahoma, native, Huntington was a far cry from OU, where the program had every amenity known in the football world and his mother was 20 minutes away.

Marshall offered humble beginnings, starting with Gale's first season, which happened to be Marshall's last year at Fairfield Stadium.

The football offices in Gullickson Hall had duct tape to keep the carpet down so coaches wouldn't trip, and film study involved finding an empty classroom and wheeling a TV and VCR on a cart for the guys to watch. If there was no classroom available, they went into a corner of Gullickson Gym, where they tried to focus while intramural sports were taking place on adjacent courts.

Gale said the football program's weight room was less than 2,000 square feet and a shared facility with the entire university. He said the assistant coaches bought fertilizer and aerated and watered a plot of grass that was used for track, so the team could practice on a natural surface when playing opponents on the road who had a grass field.

### Everything is different now

Today, the Thundering Herd has Joan C. Edwards Stadium and the Chris Cline Indoor Athletic Complex plus its own state-of-the-art locker room, weight room and academic facilities.

"Our players are appreciative," Gale said. "When they walk into the locker room, no matter what door they enter from, they see the 'Vinny Curry Locker Room' (sign) and they know there have been others before them. They see the jerseys up and down the hallway. I took it upon myself a few years ago to do that because it doesn't matter who you are or where you are from, we are providing the stage and opportunity for you. Carpe diem, baby. Go seize the day."

Gale has memories of the first I-AA championship and the first Mid-American Conference championship in the snow in 1997 and the 1999 Motor City Bowl when Marshall capped an undefeated season.

Then, there are off-field memories, like a saved phone call he has from the late Phil Ratliff, a former Marshall player and assistant coach with the Herd and Charlotte 49ers, who called to check on Gale during his health battle in 2015. Ratliff passed away at the age of 44 just a few weeks after leaving that message following a coronary episode on a coaches' retreat in Charlotte.

"He left me a message, checking on me to make sure I was all right and telling me that he loved me," Gale said. "He was at Charlotte at the time, and that's something that I hope technology allows me to be able to keep that."

As Gale looks back on his time in Huntington, everything is different from the beginning of his time with the Herd.

Technology is advanced, the recruiting game has changed exponentially and the sport of football has changed in style.

But there is one glaring difference that sticks out the most for Gale as he enjoys life with Carol, Caitlin, Chelsea and Marshall's football program.

"When I got here I was living in Huntington, but Oklahoma was home," he said. "Now, I'm from Oklahoma, but Huntington is home."

itself for several years by improving the forms veterans use to file claims for benefits and encouraging veterans to use the Disability Benefits Questionnaires as evidence. Many of the veterans who visit us for the first time tell me when they filed a claim elsewhere the person helping them just listed disabilities and sent the claim in with no evidence. Most filed in this manner get denied. This causes many veterans to give up and go home telling their friends and family that they applied for VA benefits but were denied.

I have met many veterans who were 20 to 90 years old who had received a denial because no evidence was enclosed with their claim for VA benefits. Some of them were denied many years ago and suffered severe financial hardship as they have aged.

Another thing I have found out over the years is VA does not have enough staff to review the complete medical records of every veteran who files a claim for benefits. It's up to the veteran along with his representative to provide evidence to support the application for service-connection of a disability. One of the most important benefits I have as a VA Accredited Claims Agent is my ability to review the service medical records on file in the VA computer system. Many times, there will be records showing an injury in the military that had previously been denied by VA because the veteran did not submit those records and the VA did not find them.

We are going to update our building in the next few weeks to make your visit even better. We are adding two more televisions to make it easier for our guests to keep updated with VA benefit information.

I would like to find two men or women who would like to join our driving team as alternates or full-time. Currently, our drivers are averaging transporting veterans 1,500 each week. We would like to reduce their workload if possible. Several times recently we have had a request from wheelchair bound veterans for rides to the OKC VA hospital we were unable to meet because of driver shortages.

As a 501(c)(3) your donations help us pay for such things as doctor appointments, food, rent and utility payments. Each month we are spending an average of \$25,000 to support the veterans and surviving spouses who visit us who are in need. Many of the men and women who have served in the military are having a tough time staying warm and having enough to eat. Our drivers are transporting some of them from the Phoenix House and other locations each day we are open. We will continue to do what we can for everyone who passes through our doors. 

claims and questions. As usual, they were from every corner of our state long with six other states represented. One of the reasons we see so many is our partnership with our states VET Centers. They have counselors at our location to meet with veterans and their families each day that we are open. I have watched the interaction that they have with some of them who have never talked to a mental health specialist. I appreciate them for providing this service to our veterans and their families.

Last week I received the following VA rating decisions on the men and women who represented. Twelve veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities that occurred or were aggravated by the military. These veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$499,609 per year. Twenty veterans received a disability rating from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$257,753 per year. We had two surviving spouses who were approved for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance. They will receive a combined annual payment of \$35,657.

For those of you who would like to support our Veterans Foundation, we are a 501(c)(3) Non-Profit so your donations should be tax deductible. Since all of us are volunteers most of the money we receive goes for support of veterans and their families. We also accept the donation of cars, trucks, motorcycles, tractors, wheelchairs and other types of handicapped equipment that can be given to veterans, and their families or sold to raise operational funds.

Front-Porch Gospel: It all started 89 years ago Good day! I want to share a special front-porch visit today. Welcome to all.

It is Jan. 25, 2019, as I write. My father, C.T. Bowen was born on this day, 1930. He only lived 37 years, leaving us as a young man on Dec. 12, 1967. There was much good in those 37 years, and there was difficulty and tragedy, too.

As I've grown older, I realize that he gave me more than I could have understood as a young boy. When he left in 1967, I was 11; so, I did not really understand much of anything, except that life sure can hurt. I never thought life was unfair, just that you have to do the best you can with what you have, and press on.

Due to my father's difficulties, he unwittingly taught me to be somewhat of an optimist. Sometimes you have to see the hard side of life before you can smile and appreciate all the blessings that come along every day. Burying your dad at 11 teaches you that happiness largely is the absence of tragedy.

This one thing is different than I would have thought: I miss Daddy more now than I did in 1967. I am far more thankful for him now, too. Part of that comes from being a father myself and knowing the impact a father has, no matter what.

But I want you to know that in 1948 C.T. Bowen married one of the best and loveliest Southern women ever to make a home in LaGrange, Ga.! Almost any LaGrangian will tell you that Louise Bowen fit that description to a tee. And, together, she and the man they called Dut left four children, all of whom spread a good spirit wherever they go - well, I can speak for the three older ones: Jean, Tim, and Wayne.

I will have to defer to others regarding the baby of the bunch, except some do say he inherited a generous portion of that Bowen humor that is well known. My sister Jean doesn't always appreciate that humor, though, especially when I write sometimes and say that I have two of the best brothers around, and I also have a sister.

Daddy is the one who shared that Bowen blood and a little

bit of that rare humor that was also indigenous to his LaGrange brothers, especially Jim, Bobby and Bud. They all mastered the art of playful aggravation and dry-panned insult. That was their unique way of saying "Boy, I think you're okay."

So, I am thankful to my dad for sharing a bit of that attribute, along with many others. He was a good man, and I sure wish he could have lived more of these 89 years than he did.

But he lived long enough to give me and the others what he could. He did the best he could with the opportunities that he had, and that is all you can ask. After all, he did marry a sweet 16-year-old girl named Fanny Louise Miller, and he helped send four children out into the world with a good spirit and a smile, and we haven't even mentioned that the highlight of his life was his decision to obey the gospel of Jesus Christ, being baptized as a young man by Preacher Miller himself, his daddy-in-law.

I would say, all together, that makes for a pretty good life.

### Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Every organization has a mission statement. This is a brief sentence or two describing the organization and what it plans to do. This past Sunday Jesus gave us his mission statement (Luke 4:14-21). He is about 30 years old and has been probably working as a carpenter. He has been praying and now has a close intimacy with God through his prayer. Now he is ready to begin his work.

And the words of Isaiah describe his mission very well: "I am here to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to the captives, to give sight to the blind, and to let the oppressed go free." This is his mission. But more importantly, if we are followers of Jesus, then it is our mission too.

The world is a very different place today than in the time of Jesus. There are many more people and more institutions, like governments and schools and businesses and churches. And so the mission of Jesus today includes the transformation of institutions, of unjust structures and practices, many things which are not easily visible.

Let's look at a few examples and discover what happens when the mission of Jesus is fulfilled.

First, we have to be aware of the injustice that is present in the world. We have to look into the eyes of the ones who are poor, who are blind, or who are oppressed. When I worked at a Catholic college in Mobile, Ala., our students participated in a homeless count. We were

given a map with some spots where it was suspected that people lived and slept, without a shelter, without a home.

So we visited these places at night - in the woods behind a grocery store, in vacant lots near a junkyard, underneath bridges. My students spoke to each of these homeless persons and took notes. They and I were surprised to see how many people lived with nothing more than a sleeping bag and a plastic tarp.

They would get food out of the dumpster behind a restaurant - at night so that people would not see them. And so we first have to see the poor and the ones without a voice.

Second, we have to understand that each part of this mission is a way to bring people back into community. When someone is sick, they are separated from their loved ones. When someone is in prison, they are separated from their families and friends. When someone is malnourished, they cannot contribute to the common good of society.

Our bishops have written about the "option for the poor", a commitment to the poor and disadvantaged. The reason for this commitment to the poor is "to enable them to become active participants in the life of society. It is to enable all persons to share in and contribute to the common good. When the poor are powerless, then the whole community suffers."

If you travel to any developing country, you are likely to see long lines of women who collect water each day at a shared well. These women and young girls are hindered in their ability to get an education or to support themselves with a small business because of the need for fetching water. When clean water is more available and accessible, then poor women can do other things to develop their own lives.

There are so many ways in which we participate in the mission of Jesus. We call these the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. To do these works, we only need to look into the eyes of the poor one, the one who feels unheard or alone or abandoned. And then we welcome them back into a place where they can become more human, more happy, and more of a dignified child of God. That is the work of Jesus. That is our work as well.

Our Knights of Columbus held their "Beast Feast" fund raiser this past Saturday. Many people were present to enjoy some wild game delicacies, along with many delicious desserts provided by our youth group.

Pastor David continued his sermon series on the apostles. Last week we started with Simon Peter, who was originally a fisherman from the village of Bethsaida in Galilee. This week we discuss his brother Andrew, who has been traditionally known as "the first called apostle."

Andrew's name is not Hebrew, as might have been expected, but Greek, meaning "manly" or "brave." No Hebrew or Aramaic name is recorded for him. This demonstrates a somewhat unexpected openness in his family since they lived in Galilee, where the Greek language and culture were present.

# Lex UMC:

There is some indication that Andrew and Peter may have spoken Greek and possibly even translated for Jesus. Andrew was older than Peter, having been born around a year even before Jesus. He was unmarried and lived with Peter and his wife. Andrew and Peter both acted as a bridge between the Jews and the Gentiles of the region.

Andrew and Peter both were fishermen and were in partnership with James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who also became apostles. He was the oldest of the apostles and had been a disciple of John the Baptist before he met Jesus.

But when John the Baptist identified Jesus as “the Lamb of God” Andrew decided to follow Jesus. He then went to Peter and told him that he had found the Messiah. He remained a fisherman until Jesus called him, along with Peter, James and John, one day when they were busy fishing, asking them to become “fishers of men.”

At the “feeding of the 5,000,” Andrew was the apostle who brought Jesus’ attention to the small boy who had the loaves and fishes. He was present at a number of the miracles that Jesus performed as well as being a witness to the Resurrection. Although the New Testament tells us no more about him after the Ascension, he is said to have performed a number of miracles and healings of his own according to the Acts of Andrew, one of the books of the Apocrypha.

It is said that he traveled as far as the Ukraine sharing the Gospel, preaching in Scythia as well as along the Black Sea and the Dnieper river as far as Kiev. From there he traveled to Novgorod. Hence, he became

a patron saint of Ukraine, Romania and Russia. Imagine Andrew’s excitement at telling about what Jesus had done, even in the areas where the message may have upset the status quo and brought on persecution of Jesus’ followers.

According to tradition, Andrew died a martyr’s death between 60-70 AD by being crucified in Achaia in southern Greece on an X-shaped cross, thereafter known as a saltire or a St. Andrew’s Cross. Early texts, such as the Apocrypha’s Acts of Andrew, describe Andrew as bound, not nailed, to this X-shaped cross at his own request. He deemed himself unworthy to be crucified on the same type of cross as Jesus had been, much like his brother Peter, who had requested to be crucified upside down.

Andrew was not afraid to ask questions. He was a realist as well as a man of faith and hope. One of his messages that apply to us even today is to be constantly on our guard. Christ expects us to walk our walk and talk our talk to those who can be brought to Him. These are good lessons for all of us.

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
