

Voter registration deadline approaching

EMS bond issue vote is April 3

March 9 is the last day to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the April 3 special bond election for McClain/Grady County Emergency Medical Services.

The election will decide the fate of a \$900,000 bond issue to build a new EMS facility in Newcastle.

Voting will be in the Dibble, Blanchard and Newcastle school districts.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the requirements for registering are that the individual is a U.S. citizen, Oklahoma resident and at least 18 years

Those who have never been registered to vote, who aren't currently registered in their county of residence or who need to change their registration information may apply.

They need to fill out and mail an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight March 9.

Applications postmarked after that deadline will still be accepted and processed, but won't be approved until after the April 3 election.

The county election board responds in writing to every person who submits an application, Haley said.

The response is either a voter identification card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place or a letter explaining why the application wasn't approved.

Anyone who has submitted a voter registration application and who hasn't received a response within 30 days should contact the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Application forms are available at the county election board, as well as most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries in the county, Haley said.

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

Busy politicians

Dana Murphy didn't just tell chamber members what time it was last Friday, she told them how to build the watch.



Lankford patiently answered questions ranging anywhere from DACA to gun control.

One issue that really rubs the Senator with the deepest voice in Washington D.C. the wrong way is the process of nomination approval for government positions.

Lankford said there are 1,100 openings in the government that are open and need to be



You can add another 150 iudicial openings.

"We need to fix the process," Lankford said. "There have always been ways the minority party can slow down the process.

"But now the process is locking up," he said. "It'll take 11 years for all of President Trumps' nominees to be approved."

Lankford said the allotment time for the nomination process should be altered.

"We need to resolve it the old fashioned way and have a vote (instead of continually debating)," he said.

With respect to gun control the Senator said improve background checks and make sure data about mental issues gets out to those who need to know.

"Right now HIPAA is hindering some of that," he said.

If a person wants to sell a firearm to his neighbor it is up to the seller to know if the buyer should legally have a gun.

"We should be able to pick

up the phone and find out if this person or that person can have a weapon," Lankford said.

"We don't need to know the reason why they can't have a weapon, just that they can't or can," he said.

Another needed improvement is making sure data such as the domestic violence issue by shooter Devin Patrick Kelley, when he was serving in the Air Force, is shared.

Kelley was prohibited by law from purchasing or possessing firearms and ammunition after a conviction in a court-martial while in the Air Force.

The Air Force failed to record the conviction with the FBI.

Kelley killed 26 people at the First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs, Texas and injured 20 more.

Lankford also pointed out the fact that the national office of FBI was notified about Florida shooter Nikolas Cruz but they never passed the information along to the Florida FBI office.

"I visited with our FBI office mation error to occur here," the Senator said.

SB 1169 would require insurance companies that issue compulsory liability insurance to notify electronically the Department of Public Safety of anyone who fails to make payment on a liability insurance policy that results in a cancellation of the policy. The bill outlines the timeline in which notification will be sent and DPS may issue a citation for failure to have insurance.

SB 1444 broadens the authority of certain long-term care administrators by clarifying that nothing will prohibit such administrators from being a duly licensed administrator of an assisted living facility within a 15 mile radius of the long-term facility.

SB 1329 modifies and expands the scope of the Radiologist Assistant and Radiologic Technologist Licensure Act.

Changing parties?

Deadline to switch is March 31

Oklahomans who want to change their party affiliation beforethe primary or runoff primary elections later this year must do so no later than March 31.

Karen Haley, McClain County Election Board secretary, said changes of political affiliation are prohibited by law between April 1 and August 31 in evennumbered years.

Recognized political parties in Oklahoma in 2018 are Democratic, Republican and Libertarian.

Applications post-marked by March 31 will be processed in time for the June 26 primary election. Changes made in-person at the County Election Board must be submitted by March 30.

If two or more candidates from the same party file for one office, the party nominee is selected at either the primary or runoff primary election.

Only voters registered in a political party can vote to select that party's nominees unless the party gives Independent voters permission to vote in its primaries and runoff primaries in 2018 and 2019.

All registered voters, regardless of political affiliation, can vote for any candidate at the November general election and for state or local questions at any election.

Applications to register to vote or to change political affiliation are available at the McClain County Election Board office, 121 N 2nd Ave., as well as post offices, public libraries, state offices providing public assistance and at most political party and candidate campaign offices.

National Look at Equine Health

It is March 1, and horsemen have already been to some shows and races, and are planning on which shows or races to fill their calendars for the year. Its also vaccinations and equine health in order to protect their animals and to being able to cross state lines by having their health papers ready.

Following are two articles about equine health that every horseman, whether on the show

The first is an article by Dr, Tom adequate colostrum. Lenz from the AQHA Journal reprinted here with permission. The other is from the American Horse Council. Many of you have seen these articles in the horse publications that you get, lems, such as pneumonia. but many more of you have not seen them.

National Animal Health Monitoring System Report Dr. Tom Lenz

The Department of Agriculture has released initial results from it's third study of the United States Equine industry, the National Animal Health Monitoring System Report.

The current results allow horse, donkey and mule owners, as well as veterinarians to compare the health and management of their animals with national and regional results.

The study in 28 states included horse operations with five or more animals. Results showed that 70.7 percent of operations used a veterinarian as their primary information source on horse health – a higher percent than previous studies. In the past, farriers, feed stores or magazines were listed as primary sources of horse medical care information.

Of those operations using a veterinarian:

* 46 percent did so for diagnosis, treatment or surgery of individual animals

*45 percent did so for vaccination advice

*46.5 percent used a veterinarian to administer vaccines

* 41 percent bought drugs or vaccines from their veterinarian but administered them them-

*47 percent used a veterinarian for dentistry (40 percent of owners did not provide dental care for

their animals) The survey showed that only 66.7 percent of horse operations routinely vaccinate their horse, which was surprising given the often-fatal tetanus, West Nile virus and eastern and western encephalitis that are present the environment or spread by mosquitoes.



That tax is scheduled to end in 2025.

The department is to come back to the council with a laundry list of budget items, including the cost of adding another splash pad and constructing outdoor basketball courts, as well as aesthetics for any proposed public pool.

"My perception is we need a place for youngsters to take swimming lessons," Jacobs

He suggested one possible solution centered on a partnership with Purcell Public Schools.

That plan would utilize school buses in the summer to transport children and parents to area pools for swimming lessons. The transport could be to Pauls Valley, Norman or Lindsay.

Jacobs said the city could provide or pay for bus drivers, as well as the fuel for the trips.

"It's something to do until we can build a pool," he said.

Another option for water recreation would be to create a swimming beach at Purcell Lake across from the Multi-Purpose Center.

One member of the audience suggested building a second playground near the proposed beach to further enhance recreational opportunities at the lake.

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



A true faith will always be fanned by a powerful flame within. And the soul-saving message he carries with him deserves to be shouted from the housetops and mountaintops, is worthy to be carried across many oceans, and must be planted powerfully, organically in our hearts.

Abrahamis called our "father for, the conviction of things not seen." (Heb 11:1). In other words, faith is trust in that which is not seen, but has been promised. It is trust in that which has not been touched or tasted, but has been promised.

Faith is certainty, even when we feel uncertain. Faith is trust in that which is good, even when things seem to be going bad. Faith gives order and meaning to our lives. Without faith, our lives fall into disorder and chaos.

God said to Abraham: "I will bless you. And I will make of you a great nation." But it seems as if God didn't do this. He certainly did not do this in Abraham's lifetime. But Abraham still had faith. He still had faith that God would act according to his promises.

What happened to Abraham? In response to God's call, Abraham left his country and went to the land of Canaan. Abraham left his county of Haran – a place where he was happy and comfortable - and he set his dwelling in the land of

Canaan. On his journey, he had experiences of God in prayer. Each time he had an experience of God he would build a little shrine, an altar, a remembrance of a special moment.

In the land of Canaan, Abraham was a stranger. He was a foreigner, an immigrant. He had to learn how to live among strange people. In all these things, Abraham had faith. He trusted in God and that God would bless him.

But God had to give to Abraham one big test. He tested Abraham to see if Abraham could give up the one thing he loved the most – his only son. Abraham is our "father in faith" because he had come to know that all that we have is a gift from God, including that which we love the most.

Trust in God includes trust in God's will, even if his will is something unpleasant in our lives. Like Abraham, our faith only begins when we experi-

Agriculture Literacy

In the first article in the series of Agriculture Literacy, I highlighted that agriculture is the base for all societies. Today's farmer has the advantage of technology, pesticides, and marketing over his or her previous generations.

As in other industries, Agriculture Production has had many changes and improvements in technology. One of the greatest improvements is the use of Global Positioning Systems (GPS).

On our farm, we use GPS in our tractors, sprayers and harvesters. Farmers, like many business owners, want to save

By using a GPS in equipment, they apply fertilizer or pesticide precisely in areas of need, by following the in cab monitor of the field.

The GPS helps them keep lined up in each field and not over spray or over apply chemicals. This helps them save money by using and applying only what is needed.

Today's farm equipment is also more technologically advanced. Cabs of tractors, combines, sprayers and all other agriculture production equipment have operating technology.

In cab monitors indicate many factors that affect the farmer's productivity such as have monitoring how much seed is being planted from each Literacy Committee.

planter row, or if the planter is not planting.

In a sprayer, the monitor tells the farmer the rate of application or how much chemical is being put on the field. Combine cab monitors indicate the speed of the machine, if the header is working properly, and when the hopper is about full of grain.

In addition to the in cab monitors, today's farm equipment is much larger and more powerful. More powerful tractors, those with greater horsepower, allow a farmer to cover more ground than before.

As I mentioned in the first article, today's farmer feeds almost 135 more people than earlier generation farmers. Bigger tractors, with more horsepower, can pull bigger plows, planters or drills for more production.

that I was not alone and that the military, income, as well we all had the same PTSD symptoms. I believe that all of the men and women who have served in our military should be required to go through both physical and mental health screenings before being discharged. This could help veterans receive VA benefits for those conditions that occurred while in the military.

I have been receiving many questions from veterans about what VA benefits might be available to those who are nearing the age when it becomes clear they need assistance from others. There are several benefits available to a veteran rated at 70 percent or higher for their serviceconnected disabilities. If a veteran has that rating, they can reside in one of our Oklahoma State Veterans Centers at no cost.

Aid and Attendance is another benefit that may be available to veterans or their spouses who need the help of others during their daily living. There are also pension benefits to which a veteran or surviving spouses may be eligible. These benefits are based

other veterans, I found out on when the veteran served in from a VA Medical Appointas their assets not counting their home or automobile. There may be some nursing homes in the Oklahoma City area that are approved by VA where a veteran who is service connected at 70 percent or higher can stay at no cost.

> As the Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the award letters for the folks we help. Last week we received notification that 13 veterans received a rating of 100 percent. These folks, both men, and women will receive \$512,532 on an annualized basis. We also received notice of 22 veterans who received a rating of 10-90 percent. These folks will receive \$312,670 on an annual basis. Three surviving spouses were notified they will receive VA benefits.
