City man on lam 3-4 minutes found in mail container

Freedom didn't last even a handful of minutes for an Oklahoma City man here last Friday afternoon.

The jail detainee briefly escaped from the McClain County Jail after pushing down a nurse and escaping out the Sally port.

Sheriff Don Hewett said Austin Haralson, 25, was not free more than three or four minutes after pushing the nurse down who was leaving the jail as the Sally port door opened.

Haralson was in the McClain County Jail on a warrant on a failure to appear on a CDS charge, brought down from Oklahoma City.

"There was a pursuit and he was apprehended hiding in a mail container behind the Purcell Post Office," Hewett said.

"He offered no resistance and was escorted back to the county jail facing additional charges of assault on a police officer and escape from a penal institution," Hewett said.

Assisting in the pursuit was Purcell Police and Oklahoma



Prosecutors charged each man with trafficking in illegal drugs, unlawful possession of a controlled drug with intent

to distribute and possession of a controlled dangerous substance.

Each man is accused of working together and in concert with the other two defendants.

In addition, Barner is charged with possessing a firearm while on probation.

According to an affidavit, a Chickasaw Lighthorse Police officer noticed the three men around a Mercedes in the parking lot of Riverwind Casino on May 25.

When they noticed the officer approaching, all three left the vehicle and began walking toward the casino. They looked back at the officer several times before

That brings the total rainfall


for Purcell to 17.38" for the year compared to 10.83" for Oklahoma City.



No electioneering

Practice violates Oklahoma law

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley today advised voters, candidates, campaign officials and volunteers to be very aware of - and careful not to violate - state election laws in the June 26 primary election for federal, state and county offices.

Haley said that all known election law violations will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities, usually the county sheriff and district attorney.

"Our precinct officials are going to be watching very closely on election day for illegal electioneering by candidates, zealous campaign staff and their volunteers. It's unlawful in McClain County and across the State of Oklahoma to electioneer within 300 feet of a ballot box," she explained.

To electioneer means to work for or against election of a particular candidate, political party or issue.

"This includes the illegal

placement of any campaign signs inside the 300 feet boundary limit away from the ballot box," reminded Haley.

Haley said election law violations sometimes committed accidentally by voters include disclosing how one voted while within the election enclosure or removing a ballot from the polling place.

Other violations by voters include taking a ballot into or out of the polling place or taking intoxicating liquors within a half-mile of a polling place. It is unlawful for any person to disclose how he or she voted to any other person while inside the election enclosure. Haley said it also is against the law for anyone other than voters waiting in line to vote and for precinct or other election officials to be within 50 feet of a ballot box during an election.

National Newspaper Association urges support for the PRINT Act

To save newsprint supplies for community newspapers

Legislation to hit the brakes on damaging trade sanctions against newsprint was introduced this week in the US House of Representatives by a bi-partisan coalition led by Rep. Kristi Noem (R-SD) and Rep. Charlie Crist, (D-FL.) The PRINT Act, HR 6031, would suspend tariffs now being collected on Canadian paper until the Department of Commerce completed a study on the capability of the US newspaper industry to absorb the hits.

NNA President Susan Rowell, publisher of the Lancaster (SC) News, said: "I am delighted to join with others in our coalition to Stop the Tariffs on Printers and Publishers (STOPP) in thanking the sponsors of

this bill. All over the nation, we are hearing from newspaper executives who are experiencing lasting damage to their news-gathering missions. The tariffs have already increased print production prices up to 30 percent this year in many areas, and smaller newspapers are being told they may not be able to purchase paper at all this summer as the market contracts in response to these sanctions. I believe many in Congress see how dire our situation is and they want to help."

The PRINT Act responds to two trade sanctions cases brought at the Department of Commerce and International Trade Commission last year alleging that Canadian newsprint suppliers are dumping paper at low prices into the US and have received unacceptable subsidies from their government. Preliminary action to institute tariffs at the border is common in trade cases. Final determinations are expected in August by the International Trade Commission, following a July 17 hearing, and in September by the Commerce Department. NNA has spoken out vigorously against the sanctions.

When ticks bite

With ticks most active in the summertime, families need to know what to do if someone is bitten by the pest.

The best defense against ticks is a repellent containing at least 25 percent DEET, but no option is 100 percent effective.

In the event one, or a few, slip past the barrier of protection and attach, proper first aid

involves a pair of tweezers, said Justin Talley, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock entomologist.

"Whenever possible, use tweezers to remove ticks, and especially smaller ticks such as seed ticks or nymphs," Talley said. "If tweezers aren't available, adult ticks can be pulled out by hand slowly and steadily."

To properly remove an attached tick, grasp it with tweezers and pull it out with slow and steady pressure. Do not twist the tweezers or yank the tick out.

Do not put any kind of

substance or liquid such as Vaseline, bleach or alcohol on the tick.

"Putting substances on ticks can cause the tick to salivate more which could potentially increase the risk of the tick transmitting a pathogen," Talley said.

Once removed, seal the tick in a plastic bag, write the date on the bag and save it in the event symptoms develop.

"We recommend keeping the tick for about a month," Talley said. "That way, if you begin developing symptoms, you can tell your doctor you were bitten by this particular tick. That gives the doctor a lot of clues and helps direct the treatment."

Removed ticks also can be washed down the drain or sealed in a plastic bag and put in the garbage.

"It's important to dispose of ticks properly so you're not just throwing them back out on your property. Even if you squeeze some of the blood out, those ticks can survive and lay eggs," Talley said.

There is increased concern around tick-borne illnesses such as ehrlichiosis, tularemia, Bourbon Virus, Heartland Virus and Spotted Fever Group rickettsiosis, which includes Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

Title X Funding Changes Will Protect Our Families

Our Declaration of Independence boldly states that each of us is endowed by our Creator with certain unalienable rights, and first among these is the right to life itself. I have always read that powerful statement to include the right of the unborn to life, and throughout my many years of political service, I have striven to be a champion for unborn children and vulnerable minors.

I have used my platform as the chairman of the Labor, Health, and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee to advance pro-life language in each bill that is brought to the committee for consideration. Each year, the bill I produce continues the Hyde amendment, which prohibits federal funds from being used to perform abortions, and includes other restrictions to ensure that vulnerable children and minors are not inadvertently exploited using federal dollars.

Recently, Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar announced the Trump administration's updated regulations for the Title X Family Planning Program. The last time that major modifications were made to Title X was over 18 years ago during the Clinton administration, and since then, there have been serious concerns that the implementation of Title X has significantly deviated from its original congressional intent.

The proposed regulations strive to ensure that facilities receiving federal Title X funds comply with existing federal statute by requiring a physical and financial separation in facilities that also provide abortions. Not only will this requirement protect federal funds from being misused, but it will prevent abortion from being used as a method of birth control, as the original Title X statute requires. The proposed regulations would also no longer require health

professionals to refer patients to abortion clinics, thus allowing them to practice in accordance with their personal beliefs and values.

Additionally, these new regulations will ensure that language included in the annual appropriations bill I oversee provides protection to victims of child abuse, child molestation, incest, rape, and intimate partner violence which will be meaningfully and vigorously enforced by all Title X grantees.

As a member of Congress who proudly defends the rights of America's unborn children, as well as the rights of vulnerable minors, I am in strong support of proposed regulations to the Title X Family Planning Program. I am confident that these modifications will assist with restoring Title X back to its original purpose. I am proud to support President Trump and Secretary Azar's regulation changes, and I am grateful for their dedication and leadership.

Porch time with my grandparents

When I was a kid, I spent a lot of front porch time with my grandparents.

That was where Grandpa Blansett told me about the time he was driving a team and wagon to Stonewall in the '30s and was nearly run over by Pretty Boy Floyd, speeding away from a bank robbery.

And that's where he told me about Alfalfa Bill Murray calling out the National Guard to stand up to the Texans during the Red River Bridge War.

Grandpa's voice cracked the slightest bit as he told of Alfalfa Bill saying no one would pay a single penny to drive from Oklahoma to Texas as long as he was governor.

Grandma Solomon told me about her dad ordering a new kind of seed to plant for hay in the 1890s and how he plowed a crosshatch pattern of rows for it.

Grandma and her little brother and sister walked the field, dropping a seed everywhere the rows crossed. It was Johnson grass, she said, which was unknown in the Indian Territory before 1900.

And Grandma Blansett told me about hoop snakes and how you could cure earache by blowing tobacco smoke over a spoonful of milk into the afflicted ear.

As I near the age they were then, I don't recall Grandpa ever talking about going broke as a sharecropper during the Depression, or Grandma about the strains it caused.

None of them talked about the grief of losing Noel Blansett to pneumonia at six years or Cordelia Solomon dying at three months.

They didn't have to - the sadness, the hard times and how they lived through them were woven into their stories, unspoken but as clear as dew on grass.

I enjoyed listening, but didn't realize until later the treasure they had given me.

All of us are products of the past and they helped me understand the events and the times that had shaped their lives, their children's lives and, ultimately, mine.

I grew up understanding how a bank robber and a fiesty, tobacco-chewing governor could be enduring folk heroes to a people scarred by the Dust Bowl and the Depression.

And I grew up understanding that life can be a cruel, heartless teacher but you can always climb above the hard times.

I learned those things on the front porch with my grandparents.

I give thanks that I didn't have a cell phone then, or Facebook or a video game to distract me from what they had to say.

That sentence introduced the Prison Policy Initiative's most recent report, which concluded that Oklahoma incarcerates more of its residents than any other state. It should be noted

I switched things up a bit this week.

Instead of going to the Moore Warren Theatre like I normally do, I decided to head up to Bricktown and pay a visit to the Harkins.

It certainly is a nice theater, even if parking is a bit of a pain during the weekend.

I also had a chance to visit the Cine Capri theater at the Harkins for the first time. I'll tell you what, photos don't do the inside of that auditorium justice.

It's absolutely gorgeous in there, with gold curtains draped along every side of the theater. Plus the Cine Capri also features Dolby Atmos surround sound. Basically meaning the theater not only has speakers on the walls, but on the ceiling as well, giving movies a more three dimensional sound.

I certainly got a taste of that when the Dolby logo appeared on screen right before the film and sounds started bouncing all over the theater. It was a unique experience I had never had until last weekend.

My only regret was the movie I ended up seeing in the Cine Capri was "Ocean's 8," which did absolutely nothing with the amazing speaker setup they have there.

I guess that just means I'll have to go back again and maybe see a more action packed film next time.

Oh well. With that out of the way, here's what I saw this week.

First up is "Hotel Artemis."

Set in a riot-torn, near-future Los Angeles, this film follows The Nurse (Jodie Foster), who runs a secret, members-only emergency room for criminals and her struggles with managing this hotel on a particularly chaotic evening.

Wow. I don't know exactly what I was expecting when I went to see this movie, but it definitely wasn't all that.

The only thing I knew going into this film was the title and that Jeff Goldblum was in it.

Between Goldblum being featured and the film's title having the word "Hotel" in it, I think my mind was expecting something more akin to Wes Anderson's "The Grand Budapest Hotel."

Instead what I got was a futuristic, yet run-down, hotel full of injured criminals.

Honestly, I'm not complaining. The setting and just the entire concept was my favorite part of the movie.

It's like the filmmakers took The Continental from "John Wick," a members-only hotel for hired assassins, and made an entire movie just focusing on that.

And on paper, this film seems to have everything going for it.

It has a great cast with Jodie Foster, Jeff Goldblum, Charlie Day, Zachary Quinto, up-and-comer Sofia Boutella, who's been killing it in movies like "Kingsman," "Star Trek: Beyond," "Atomic Blonde," and also Dave Bautista, who will forever hold a soft spot in my heart for his role as Drax from "Guardians of the Galaxy."

All are good actors and all give solid performances here.

But the problem with this movie isn't the acting. It's the story.

There is a lot going on here. It's to the point of being convoluted.

There's just too many characters floating around, too many pointless sad backstories, and too many narrative threads that go absolutely nowhere.

This story really could have used an editor willing to take a hatchet to this script.

So much screen time is wasted on characters that add nothing to the main story.

The movie begins with Sterling K. Brown and Brian Tyree Henry's characters, but their roles probably could have been cut entirely without losing much of anything.

I love Day, but his character adds nothing beyond some bickering with Boutella and Sterling K. Brown.

And speaking of Boutella, as much as I enjoy her work in action movies, her role ends up robbing a potentially huge moment for Foster's character.

If this film had just focused on Foster, Bautista, and Goldblum, and had spent more time refining their story, I think there really could have been something special here.

As it is, this movie is just a narrative mess.

Is it terrible? No, I wouldn't go quite that far.

Bautista and Boutella are a lot of fun here, both in and out of fight scenes, and Foster was perfect for this role.

Sadly though, I can't help but feel this movie could have been so much better.

"Hotel Artemis" is rated R.



Next is "Ocean's 8."

Upon her release from prison, Debbie Ocean (Sandra Bullock), the sister of legendary conman Danny Ocean, puts together a team of crooks to pull off the heist of the century.

Their goal? New York City's annual Met Gala and a necklace worth in excess of 150 million dollars.

Here we go. Yet another Hollywood reboot of a beloved film.

And following in the footsteps of 2016's "Ghostbuster" remake, this movie also does the gender bend and stars an array of well known, talented actresses.

I know the long standing trend of taking well loved classics and remaking them for modern audiences doesn't sit well with a lot of people.

I too have seen my fair share of terrible rehashes that end up being nothing but soulless cash grabs.

But honestly, to me, this doesn't feel like one of them. Or at least not any more so than the other Ocean's films.

2001's "Ocean's Eleven" was itself a reboot of a 1960's movie starring the Rat Pack, so the film featuring George Clooney and Brad Pitt is hardly sacred.

Plus the 2001 film already had two sequels before this new one was released.

One that was a fun continuation of the series with "Ocean's Thirteen," and one that was a self-indulgent, convoluted mess with "Ocean's Twelve." Again, not sacred.

Frankly to me, the Ocean's movies seem born to be remade. These films are less about the story and more about putting a group of well known actors in the same room together and seeing their interactions.

Why wouldn't you remake that concept every so often with current movie stars? Or in this case, a talented all-female cast? It seems like a no-brainer to me.

And for the most part, this reboot/sequel ended up being pretty fun.

Sandra Bullock makes for a great member of the Ocean family. Just like her brother Danny, conning is about as natural as breathing is to her.

Plus her and Cate Blanchett work quite well off of each other, much like George Cloo-

ney and Brad Pitt did in the 2001 film.

But the highlight of the movie, the most entertaining person in this film by far, was Anne Hathaway.

She was an absolute joy to watch here. She had so much fun with this role as a stuck-up, self centered diva.

I loved every precious second Hathaway was on the screen. My only complaint is that she wasn't in the film more.

She's hamming it up, going all out, and I loved every moment.

Rihanna, Awkwafina, Sarah Paulson, and Mindy Kaling are fine as well, though they're not really given a ton of screentime to show off their characters.

2001's "Ocean's Eleven" had the same issue too though. There's only so much movie and not enough time to delve into each character.

Plus you don't want to bog down your film with mopey backstories for your entire cast. Otherwise you end up like the last film I saw, "Hotel Artemis."

I think the only actress I wasn't impressed with was Helena Bonham Carter. It felt like she wasn't all quite there and just was phoning it in. Maybe it had to do with the character she was trying to portray, an aloof fashion designer, but it just didn't work for me.

Beyond the characters, this is your typical Ocean's heist movie. The best part is seeing the master plan unfold. It has your expected twists and cons within cons that you've come to expect from the series.

It's hardly revolutionary and the movie does have its dull points, but I think there's plenty here for fans of the series to enjoy.

Quality wise I'd rank it about the same as "Ocean's Thirteen." It doesn't reinvent the wheel, but it's still an entertaining ride.

Plus it's much, much better than the jumbled mess that is "Ocean's Twelve."

Perfectly fine for a casual afternoon at the theater or a weekend rental when it comes to video.

"Ocean's 8" is rated PG-13.



Last this week is "Hereditary."

When the grandmother of the Graham family dies, her daughter (Toni Collette) and the rest of her family are forced to deal with her passing.

But things begin to unravel as cryptic and increasingly terrifying secrets about their ancestry are revealed.

I need to be completely upfront about this movie. This is definitely not a film for everyone.

I'd especially caution fans of typical, modern horror movies.

If you expect your scary movies to have tons of loud noises with jumpscare out the wazoo, this is not, I repeat, not the film for you.

"Hereditary" is not that kind of horror movie.

It's much more subdued than that. Much more disturbing than that.

This film is a slow burn, but I hardly found it boring despite its over two hour runtime.

There are so many little subtle character moments and hints about things to come throughout the film for those willing to give the movie their full attention.

I love how this film was shot and I especially like the way it transitions from scene to scene. Really adds to the unsettling feeling of the entire movie.

reached a record high in May – meaning Americans feel good about the state of current economic conditions. High consumer confidence leads to more spending and propels economic growth.

Higher confidence in businesses as well allows for increased investments and jobs creation.

that the Prison Policy Initiative advocates for reduced incarceration, but that's not a factor in this number. From most to least, all states are ranked, and the organization has no motive to pick on Oklahoma by skewing the data.

What is noteworthy is some context and the lack of progress Oklahoma has made. At a rate of 1,079 per 100,000 residents, Oklahoma incarcerates residents at a rate greater than 154 percent of the national average, which is 698 per 100,000. The context is even more alarming when Oklahoma is compared to other countries. In nations Americans might consider ominously filled with terrifying prisons there are a lot fewer inmates. Everyone old enough to have seen Midnight Express fears Turkish prisons, yet the incarceration rate there is only 27 percent of Oklahoma's at 287 per 100,000. Mexican jails are viewed as great deterrents to drug-toting tourists, but that country incarcerates only 165 per 100,000, just 15 percent of Oklahoma's rate.

Consider countries most like the United States and the gap is broader still: England is at 141 per 100,000; Canada is at 114; Germany is at 78.

There are only a few possible explanations. One is that Oklahomans are inherently bad people, the scofflaws of the Southwest who just do more wrong – a lot more wrong – than any other people on Earth. A second possibility

is that Oklahoma employs the world's finest crimebusters, that law enforcement personnel here are substantially better at catching bad guys than the police officers, detectives, constables, sheriffs, marshals and agents anywhere else.

It's preposterous to think that either of those explanations is true, which leaves only one possibility: Oklahoma's criminal law system has run off the rails. Criminal justice reform has been at the top of the political platform for the business community for several years as represented

by the chamber of commerce. Voters expressed their desire for reform by passing ballot measures to reduce sentences for drug offenses. Only legislators and a few district attorneys seem to think Oklahoma's present strategy is a good one.

Oklahoma should be first in innovation, education, and prosperity. But leading the pack in incarceration rate is an indication of a deeply troubled state.

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

State has funding: House Majority Floor Leader says

It was incorrectly reported in **The Purcell Register** that State Rep. Bobby Cleveland did not support the teacher pay raise. Cleveland did, in fact, vote in favor of HB1023XX. And now there's even better news for educators. Even if the Veto Referendum

succeeds, the state has enough excess tax dollars to fully pay the full raises that we're promised, according to House Majority Floor Leader Jon Echols. The Tax bill is unneeded and would go to next year's 'pet projects', not education. Oil industry leader Mike

Cantrell had lunch with Echols, earlier this week. Echols was willing to tell the public the same thing he told Cantrell about the funding. So Cantrell pulled out his phone and began a live video broadcast wherein Echols explained several factors and emphasized that the

money for teacher pay raises is not completely dependent upon the massive tax package which leadership pushed through the house on a two hour notice last March. Since then, the state treasurer's office has been reporting record-breaking tax receipts to

the state. Cash is flowing in at an even greater surplus than the massive tax increases would match when the taxes go into effect in July. The net result is that the state had the projected surplus to pay the teachers without imposing a tax increase at all.

Congratulations to Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week Lenard Abrahams from Clinton. He served in the United States Army during the Korean War.

For those of you who have not visited us, this is an open invitation to do so. We are a 501(c)(3) and never charge for our services. As a non-profit, any donations made to our organization are tax deductible. Without the financial help of the men and women we serve we would not be able to fulfill our mission to help all the veterans and surviving spouses who visit us each week.

One of the ways we raise funds is through our vehicle donor program. Many of the people we have helped receive VA benefits end up purchasing that new car or truck they have always wanted and could never afford. Some of them will donate their old one to us instead of giving it to the dealer. We then provide that vehicle for a veteran or spouse in need or sell it to raise funds to support our veterans' programs.

Each month we spend on average more than \$30,000 in direct support to veterans and their families. Expenses include paying for medical testing, rent, food items, transportation and utility

payments along with a host of other unforeseen expenses.

As we continue to grow, there is a need to start assisting veterans in other states and different locations in our state using our organization as a model for other locations. There are veterans and surviving spouses who have made the trip to see us from 45 states.

One of the questions I have repeatedly asked over the years is why some of the other folks who are supposed to be helping veterans are not changing with the times and utilizing the Department of Veterans Affairs own Disability Benefits Questionnaires (DBQ) when helping a veteran file for benefits. There is one of these DBQ forms for most every disability the VA will grant a service-connection.

Many veterans will visit us after they have been denied for a disability because they did not send in a medical diagnosis with their application for VA benefits. All I know is that most of the people we assist in filing for VA benefits will be approved. I know that for a fact as I receive all of the VA rating decisions on the over 19,000 we currently represent.

Several years ago, I was approved as a VA Claims Accredited Claims Agent by

the Department of Veterans Affairs in Washington DC. I also have access to the VABS system on all veterans and surviving spouses who we represent. This gives us the ability to be more proactive in all decisions the VA makes on claims because we can review the evidence and evaluations made by others such as QTC, LHI, and the OKC VA hospital. This ability has given us a step up on what most veterans service officers can do for the men and women they help.

We want to make sure you know we have others onsite helping us help our veterans and their families. Legal Aid received a grant to provide free legal services. They are onsite twice each month. Their next visit will be June 21. They usually begin around 9 a.m. Representatives from the Social Security Administration also come to our Foundation to assist veterans and their families. Their next visit will be June 19 and they usually arrive by 7 a.m.

At some point, we are going to either look for a larger facility or start opening more than two days per week. Until we can train more volunteers and maybe hire a person to be there five days a week, we will continue to turn veterans and spouses away when we reach the maximum in the building per the fire codes. Last week we had reached our limit by 6:30 a.m. I have started arriving by 4:30 a.m. and I'm certainly not the first person there.

Twenty-six veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,014,758 per year. Sixty-five veterans received ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group of men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$854,815 per year. Three surviving spouses were awarded DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their spouses' military service. The combined annual benefit for

this group is \$46,192 per year.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food sacks available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact 405-550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food sack.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday morning at the 1268 North Interstate Drive Norman, OK 73072. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. 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

They are "your first call on your worst day," said the Rev. Sam Tucker, a former military

chaplain newly appointed to Wickline United Methodist Church in Del City.

In addition, the conference included celebration of the near-completion of "Let's Finish This," a United Methodist initiative to complete needed repairs for Oklahoma homeowners whose residences were damaged by floods in 2015.

Right after the flooding, 756 Oklahoma homes were identified by government officials as needing repairs.

"Let's Finish This" launched last fall as Bishop Nunn called for teams and individuals to volunteer for the mission of helping neighbors still suffering in damaged homes.

In January 2018, 120 homes remained on the list, an indicator of the campaign's progress.

At May's Oklahoma Annual Conference, Bishop Nunn announced that volunteer teams have been assigned to repair the final 20 homes, with completion expected by the end of July.

United Methodist disaster response ministry, which leads the "Let's Finish This" campaign, is committed to serving until all those impacted in such crises are made whole again.

Jesus carried the scars of humanity after his resurrection. The scars of Jesus reveal the price paid that we might be blessed with abundant and eternal life. Someone said, "The more scars we have in this life, the more stars we have in heaven."

Whether we are able to do this passage justice or not remains to be seen. My guess is we could never come close to doing that. However, despite falling short, our hope is that it



No. 550-June 14-1 Time ORDINANCE NO. 18-04 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PURCELL, OKLAHOMA (THE "CITY"), RELATING TO THE AMENDMENT OF ORDINANCE NO. 16-03 OF THE CITY, BY EXTENDING THE EXPIRATION DATE; MODIFYING THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH SALES TAX PROCEEDS CAN BE USED; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND TERMINATION DATE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 16-03 of the City of Purcell, Oklahoma (the "City") levies an excise tax of one percent (1%) (in addition to any and all other excise taxes now in force) to be levied upon the gross proceeds or gross receipts derived from all sales taxable under the Oklahoma Sales Tax Code for the purpose of providing revenues to be used to fund the operation, maintenance, construction, remodeling, and equipping of the Purcell Municipal Hospital in the City of Purcell, Oklahoma (the "Purcell Municipal Hospital Project"), and/or for the payment of debt service, if necessary, in connection with obligations that may be issued to finance or refinance said Purcell Municipal Hospital Project and related costs; and

WHEREAS, by the terms of Ordinance 16-03, the one percent (1%) excise tax so levied shall expire on December 31, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City desires to extend the term of the one percent (1%) excise tax for an additional approximately twenty (20) years and modify the purpose for which the tax revenues may be expended, subject to the approval by a majority of the qualified electors of the City voting on the same in the manner prescribed by law.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PURCELL, OKLAHOMA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Citations and Codification. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the City of Purcell Hospital Sales Tax Ordinance of 2018, which is similar to the existing temporary tax known as City of Purcell Sales Tax Ordinance of 2016, and the same shall be codified and incorporated into the Code of Ordinances of the City.

Section 2. Modification of Stated Termination Date and Purpose of Existing Tax. Ordinance No. 16-03 of the City currently provides for the levy and collection of a one percent (1%) excise tax (sales tax) which currently has a termination date of December 31, 2019, after which said excise tax shall no longer be collected. Ordinance No. 16-03 is hereby amended by providing that the collection of the excise tax referenced herein shall terminate and said excise tax shall not be collected after December 31, 2039.

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

Election rules and reminders

Following tips will simplify voting experience

Voters will go to the polls June 26 for federal, state and county primary elections, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said today.

Haley offered the following information and tips for those voting:

- Early voting will be available at the County Election Board office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. June 21 and 22 and from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. June 23. On election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Lines are possible at peak voting times. Wait times will likely be shortest at mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Anyone in line to vote at 7 p.m. will be allowed to cast a ballot.

- Anyone who needs to look up their polling place, verify their registration information or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: www.elections.ok.gov. Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot

using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

- Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the County Election Board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot. There are three ways for voters to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state or tribal government; show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the County Election Board; or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. (If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.)

- Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may

be assisted by a person the voter chooses.

In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes.

Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-tactile interface (ATI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or at their assigned polling place on election day.

- Voters who have moved since the last election, but who have not transferred their voter registration to their new address, may do so on Election Day by going to vote at the polling place where their registration has been in the past.

While voting, they may fill out a form instructing the County Election Board to transfer their registration to the new address before the next election.

- Those who become physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. August 16 still can request an emergency absentee ballot. Those who might qualify for an emergency absentee ballot should contact the County Election Board office at 405-527-3121 as soon as possible for more information.

- Any violation of election law will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities.

Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. It is also unlawful to remove a ballot from the polling location, possess intoxicating liquors within half a mile of a polling place or to disclose how you voted while within the election enclosure.



ID required

Voters must show ID proof at polls

Voters are reminded they must show proof of identity to cast votes in the June 26 primary election.

“Any item used for proof of identity for voting must have been issued by the federal government, the State of Oklahoma, or by a federally recognized tribal government,” said McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley.

In addition, the proof of identity must show the name and a photograph of the person and must include an expiration date that is after the election date.

Some documents that may be presented for voting include an Oklahoma driver license, a state identification card, a passport, or a military identification.

The law also states that the person’s name on a document used for proof of identity for voting must “substantially conform” to the person’s name in the precinct registry.

“Voters also may use the voter identification card they received by mail when they registered to vote,” Haley said.

These cards are allowed even though they do not include a photograph or an expiration date.

By law, state identification cards issued to individuals age 65 and older do not have expiration dates, but are valid proof of identity for voting.

A voter who does not have proof of identity that meets the requirements of the law still may vote by provisional ballot. A provisional ballot is sealed inside an envelope instead of being inserted into the voting device. Information provided by the voter on an affidavit is investigated by election officials in the days following the election, and the ballot is either approved for counting or is rejected based on the outcome of that investigation.

Voters can avoid proof of identity problems by ensuring now that the name on their voter registration matches the name on their driver license or other proof of identity document or by always using the voter identification card issued by the County Election Board.

Absentee ballot request deadline June 22

McClain County voters who want absentee ballots for the June 28 primary election mailed to them should apply now, county election board secretary Karen Haley said.

Although the county election board can accept applications for absentee ballots until 5 p.m. June 22, Haley urged voters who want to vote by absentee ballot to apply early.

Absentee ballot application forms are available at the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Forms may also be downloaded and printed from www.elections.ok.gov.

“At least two mail transactions must be made,” Haley said. “The county election board must mail

the ballots to the voter and the voter must return the voted ballots by mail.”

Those ballots must be in the hands of the election board by 7 p.m. on election day in order to be counted.

Any registered voter may vote by absentee ballot in any election in which the individual is eligible to vote.

However, a voter must be registered and reside at an address within the geographical boundaries of a school district or municipality to vote in those elections.

“While anyone can vote absentee without giving a reason, the law still provides several excuses and it is to the advantage of some voters to use them,” Haley said.

By stating one of the following reasons on their applications, voters can activate some special conditions that make it easier for them to use absentee ballots:

- Voters who are physically handicapped or care for physically handicapped persons who cannot be left unattended. These individuals may apply only by mail, fax or email.

- Voters who are confined to nursing homes within the county. An absentee voting board goes to nursing homes a few days before the election and sets up a small polling place for those voters. They may

Oklahoma voters to decide on medical marijuana

State Question 788, the Medical Marijuana Legalization Initiative, is set for a vote on the June 26 State Primary ballot. The issue was put on the June 26 ballot after supporters gathered the required number of signatures. The question is reprinted below as it will appear on the ballot followed by a brief summary.

STATE QUESTION NO. 788

This measure amends the Oklahoma State Statutes. A yes vote legalizes the licensed use, sale, and growth of marijuana in Oklahoma for medicinal purposes. A license is required for use and possession of marijuana for medicinal purposes and must be approved by an Oklahoma Board Certified Physician. The State Department of Health will issue medical marijuana licenses if the applicant is eighteen years or older and an Oklahoma resident. A special exception will be granted to an applicant under the age of eighteen, however these applications must be signed by two physicians and a parent or legal guardian. The Department will also issue seller, grower, packaging, transportation, research and caregiver licenses. Individual and retail businesses must meet minimal requirements to be licensed to sell marijuana to licensees. The punishment for unlicensed possession of permitted amounts of marijuana for individuals who can state a medical condition is a fine not exceeding four hundred dollars. Fees and zoning restrictions are established. A seven percent state tax is imposed on medical marijuana sales.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?
FOR THE PROPOSAL - YES

A “YES” vote is a vote in favor of this measure.
A “NO” vote is a vote against this measure.

SUMMARY: If approved, Oklahoma would become one of 30 states that allow, tax and regulate some form of marijuana use. SQ 788 does not decriminalize recreational marijuana use as some states have done. It tasks the State Health Department with overseeing patients, production and retail sales of medical marijuana to treat medical ailments. To be eligible for a license, an Oklahoma board-certified physician would have to prescribe the treatment.

There are no specific qualifying conditions to receive medical marijuana. Licensed users can possess up to three ounces of marijuana on their person and eight ounces in their home.

Supporters say denying science-based marijuana therapy options is cruel and forces Oklahomans to seek legal treatment in other states or to illegally treat themselves here. Supporters also claim state and local economies would be improved with the addition of growers, packagers and retail stores which would collect a 7 percent sales tax.

Opponents of the legislation say SQ 788 would be a gateway to recreational marijuana use. Some business organizations have argued it will impose an unreasonable burden on employers trying to accommodate workers who are licensed to use marijuana.
