In-person absentee voting will be offered at the McClain and Cleveland County election boards from 8 a.m. to

Funding plan

Council OKs resolution on hospital

In a brief meeting March 20, Purcell's city council and public works authority moved the new hospital project ahead a few more steps.

The council approved a resolution to refinance the city's sole debt – a 2011 capital improvements note that is guaranteed by a 2009 penny sales tax – at an interest rate not to exceed 3 percent.

Michael Oglesby with Municipal Financial Services told the council that the note financed by J.P. Morgan cannot be paid off early.

That tax won't expire until Sept. 30 2040.

A separate penny sales tax earmarked solely for Purcell Municipal Hospital will expire Dec. 31, 2039.

Revenue from that tax, Oglesby explained, needs to be pledged to the bond that

will pay for the new hospital's construction.

In preliminary consultation with J.P. Morgan, Oglesby said the company quoted an indicative interest rate of 2.75 percent.

Any rate below 3 percent made him "very happy," the financial consultant added.

The refinanced note would be for 12 years and would immediately give the city access to \$5 million in new money to be spent on capital improvements. It could also be used to pay for the land on which to build a new hospital.

"It is pretty cut and dried to me," said mayor Ted Cox. "It's just a 12-year note and a 20-year sales tax. We haven't tied the hands of the council that will be here in 2030."

Cox went on to explain the bond from 2011 is now secured by utility revenue instead of the sales tax.

"You are nowhere near your debt capacity," Oglesby assured the

"Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."

Taking to heart the scripture above from the Book of Matthew, 20 parishioners from Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church spent spring break on a mission trip to Puerto Rico.

In Yabucoa, the little chapel of Santa Rosa de Lima was hard hit on Sept. 20, 2017, when Hurricane Maria made landfall on the island.

With sustained winds of 155 mph, Maria was the strongest hurricane to hit Puerto Rico in 85 years.

It was, in a word, devastating.

Not all of the damage the Purcell missionaries found came from Maria, however.

Previous hurricanes had torn at the structure, as well. In four days, willing

Purcell Elementary pre-k and kindergarten pre-enrollment

Students planning to attend pre-k or kindergarten in the Purcell School District this fall should plan to pre-enroll April 11.

Enrollment will be held in the parent resource room at Purcell Elementary April 11 from 8-6:30 p.m.

Children who will be four years old prior to Sept. 1, 2019 are eligible for enrollment in the pre-k program.

Students who will be five before Sept. 1, 2019 are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten.

Parents will need to provide a birth certificate and a current immunization record to complete the pre-enrollment process.

Residence in the district will be verified at the enrollment confirmation in August.

Verification will require proof of residence in the Purcell School District.

Enrollment in pre-k is limited and will be filled on a first come, first served basis. Packets will be available for pick up in the elementary school office

on April 8.

Please feel free to pick up your packet early in order to complete it before the day of enrollment.

Pursuant to state statute students must have current and up to date immunization records upon enrollment in school.

Parents may contact the McClain County Health department to complete immunizations.

Explanation of use tax:

(This is in addition to the sales tax reported monthly.) Every state with a sales tax has a companion tax for outside the state. In Oklahoma, that tax is called "use tax."

Those having purchased items for use in Oklahoma from retailers who do not collect Oklahoma sales tax, the buyer owes the state use tax on those items.

The use tax in the state was first enacted in 1937.

ODOC escapee convicted here

A Fort Supply man serving time on a 2018 conviction in McClain County escaped Oklahoma Department of Corrections custody earlier this month.

Rodney J. Ryans, 56, pleaded guilty April 5, 2018, in McClain County District Court to charges of possession of a controlled dangerous substance (methamphetamine) and obstructing an officer.

Ryans left the Carver Transitional Center in Oklahoma City for an approved work site itinerary on March 11, but never returned.

He was also serving sentences out of Logan and Oklahoma counties for forgery, carrying

weapons and possession of stolen property.

He is described as white with gray hair and blue eyes. He is 5-foot-11 and weighs about 180 pounds.

He has numerous aliases, including Mark Morgan, Rodney Morgan, Larry Ryans, Mark Kirkland and Leroy Ryans Jr.

Clearly, the answer is vegetables. And a sprinkling of fruits.

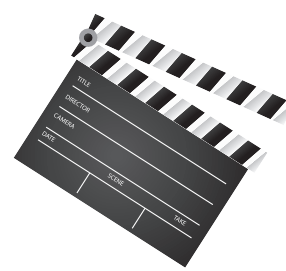

MOVIES WITH DAVE

It's been a bit of a busy week for me. Though I'll be back home by the time this column publishes, as of my writing of it I'm currently in the entertainment capital of the world, Los Angeles, Calif.

I gotta say, it's been a wonderful experience all around. I had the chance to hangout with some wonderful people, new faces and old.

And not only that, but had the opportunity to see tons of sites, including the Hollywood Walk of Fame with the TCL Chinese Theatre, Beverly Hills and its multi-million dollar houses, coastal views along the beaches of Santa Monica and Malibu, plus my personal favorites, studio tours at both Universal and Warner Bros., the latter of which I highly recommend if you enjoy seeing behind the scenes of movies and television.

But even though I've kept pretty busy seeing the sites of southern California, thankfully I still had the chance to watch the big new release of this past weekend. And luckily enough for me, it's from one of my favorite up-and-coming filmmakers, Jordan Peele.

So without any further ado, let's get to that review.

The first and only film this week is "Us."



Haunted by an unexplainable and unresolved trauma from her past and compounded by a string of eerie coincidences, Adelaide Wilson (Lupita Nyong'o)

feels her paranoia elevate to high-alert as she grows increasingly certain that something bad is going to befall her family (Winston Duke, Shahadi Wright Joseph, and Evan Alex).

After spending a tense beach day with their friends, Adelaide and her family return to their vacation home. When darkness falls, the Wilsons discover the silhouette of four figures holding hands as they stand in the driveway, pitting the entire family against a terrifying and uncanny opponent: doppelgängers of themselves.

It's been pretty incredible watching Jordan Peele's career as an entertainer skyrocket over the past few years.

To go all the way from performing in sketch comedy on network and cable television, to writing, producing, and directing "Get Out," one of the highest acclaimed horror films of all time.

For Peele I'm sure it's been quite the wild ride. Fortunately for movie lovers everywhere, it seems Peele's career as a distinguished filmmaker has only just begun.

And based on this latest movie of his, I can't wait to see every single wonderful piece of entertainment Jordan Peele has in store for us.

"Us" is a masterpiece in suspense cinema.

I haven't watched a horror movie this unsettling, this thought provoking, since last year's "Hereditary."

The night after watching "Us" I couldn't sleep because I was too busy trying to piece everything together.

There's so many little, seemingly inconsequential details in the film that end up paying off by the end in a huge way.

Even days later the movie still has me going back and thinking on the whole experience. If that isn't the mark of a good film, I don't know what is.

But what makes Peele's brand of horror special is the whole film isn't just scares and excessive gore, though this movie does have its fair share of both to be sure.

No, what really makes this horror movie stand out from the crowd is the comedy.

Much like Peele's last film, "Get Out," this movie has a ton of really funny moments. Moments that were expertly woven in between scenes of pure unsettling terror.

I swear while watching the movie, one second my eyes were wide with shock, and the next I was cracking up laughing.

This kind of high quality storytelling is not only a huge testament to Peele's talent as a filmmaker, but also to the talent of everyone in front of the camera as well.

The performances here are all top notch.

The entire Wilson family is incredibly likable and down-to-earth, but no one person in the entire film stood out more than Lupita Nyong'o as Adelaide.

There was just so much emotion in her face. From the terror of a panicked mother, to the haunted inhuman gaze of her doppelgänger. Every scene she was on-screen was incredible.

Heck, her eyes were so expressive they were practically their own characters.

I know it's only March, but after this performance Lupita has to be in the consideration for Best Actress come next year's Academy Awards. She was that good.

I also have to bring up the music. This might just be the best soundtrack I've ever heard in a horror film.

Common brush, weed management mistakes

Rangelands support many species of brush and weeds. The continual increase over years in the number and distribution of brush and weed species is primarily the result of natural succession, suppression of wildfires, and overgrazing by livestock.

Rangeland owners and ranchers need the ability to manage the occurrence of brush and weed species on their property.

To do so effectively, there are numerous decisions and considerations that need to be made, including: selection and timing of treatments; pre and post treatment management; post treatment resource responses; monitoring; maintenance programs; and impacts on other resource uses and real estate value, risks and financial constraints.

Risk is defined as the chance of injury, damage or loss, often expressed as degrees of probability. It is inevitable that mistakes will occur. These mistakes can be very costly and may result in failure in solving real ranch problems.

Mistakes are minimized by thorough evaluation of alternatives and projection of all likely resource responses, using a long-range integrated plan. Will Rogers said "it's not what we don't know that gets us in trouble, it's what we know that ain't so".

Common Mistakes (Myths) in Brush and Weed Management

1. Weed and brush control produces more grass. Weeds and brush compete with more desirable vegetation for soil moisture, nutrients and space. Controlling weeds and/or brush does not guarantee increased production of more desirable plants. There must be at least a remnant seed stock of desirable plants remaining before treatment.

Also, post-treatment management (grazing, maintenance treatments, etc.) must allow beneficial plants to recover and sustain production over time. If the area has had a history of abuse and overgrazing, this seed stock will not be present and less desirable or undesirable plants may flourish following treatment.

2. Weed and brush control increases ranch profit. Weed and brush control treatments are expensive. The costs and benefits of all options must be evaluated before treatments are implemented.

Factors to consider include not only the initial cost of treatment, but also the life of the treatment, costs and frequency of maintenance treatments, projected forage response, impacts on other ranch enterprises (wildlife, recreation, etc.) and risk.

3. One treatment will do it! Weed and brush control treatments are not permanent, and in fact, many are very short lived. Most often, in order to

recover the cost of the initial treatment, treatment life must be prolonged through integration of periodic low cost maintenance treatments. This requires the development and use of a comprehensive long-term weed and/or brush management plan.

4. All brush and weeds are bad. Attempts to control undesirable weeds and brush for livestock production can result in significant damage to desirable plants needed by wildlife. Wildlife depend on woody and broadleaf plants for food and cover. The importance of wildlife to the ranch business must be considered before weed or brush management practices are implemented.

Planning should protect key plant species and habitat "honey holes" preferred by important wildlife populations. Learn to identify your desirable plants and their values to livestock and wildlife.

Select the "best" approach to achieve your combination of goals, understanding that it is impossible to maximize production for all enterprises, but it is possible to optimize benefits.

5. A little more will do it! Increasing the amount of herbicide applied beyond recommended rates will not produce more kill. In fact, increased rates may result in rapid defoliation but significantly less root kill, all at a higher cost. Recommended rates have been researched to achieve the best results, at the least cost, while protecting the environment. Read herbicide labels carefully and follow the directions explicitly.

Contact the Extension Office or Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) personnel for specific information on the use of herbicides in your area.

6. My neighbor told me --! There is a multitude of home-cooked weed and brush control treatments passed through the grapevine. Beware! Most are not as effective as those recommendations you will receive from the Extension Service, NRCS or the herbicide label. In fact, some of the recommendations may be dangerous to you, to livestock and wildlife, and to the environment.

In fact, many may be illegal. When a neighbor or salesperson at the local feed store suggests a specific treatment, check the label to make sure it is accurate, safe and legal.

7. That brush is not causing any problems now, so I will wait until it gets big and thick and then I will kill it. It is much easier and less expensive to kill seedling and saplings as compared to mature brush.

Low density, small brush can be treated using individual plant treatment techniques, which usually provide a much higher level of control as compared to broadcast applications. Unfortunately, the cost of using individual plant treatments increases as the number and size of the brush increases. This

is not true of most broadcast treatments.

Thus, the importance of treating brush problems early. It is simply the "common sense" approach to brush control. Deterioration of the desirable vegetation can be prevented if brush is controlled early in its life cycle.

8. We are going to treat this place from fence line to fence line. Many range sites simply do not have the potential to produce results that will justify the expense of a weed or brush control treatment because soils are too shallow or slopes are too steep.

Weed and brush control efforts are best targeted to sites with deep soils that receive runoff from adjacent upland areas. Shallow ridges, slopes and hilltops are usually best left as wildlife habitat or placed at a much lower priority for treatment as compared to more productive areas.

9. After I get that bulldozer or airplane in here, this place will turn into a sea of grass.

Weed and brush manage-

ment is not a miracle cure for rangelands. Not all treatments work the same every time. Most herbicide treatments are characterized by large variation in results governed by climatic and plant characteristics, which are often not very predictable.

Overall management of the rangeland must also improve. The treated area must be given time to establish a desirable vegetation cover before "normal" management and use occurs. Proper livestock stocking rates are critical to both treatment success and longevity.

Desired results will not occur overnight. Desired change on rangelands takes time and depends on long-range planning, careful monitoring and sound management.

10. Herbicides are unhealthy for the environment and humans. Herbicides can affect living organisms directly when exposed to chemicals or indirectly when habitat is altered. Range herbicides are invaluable for control of many

Site Address - Section R319

R319. 1 Address Numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters.

Numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inches (102 mm) high with a minimum stroke width of 1/2 inch (12.7 mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means shall be used to identify the structure.

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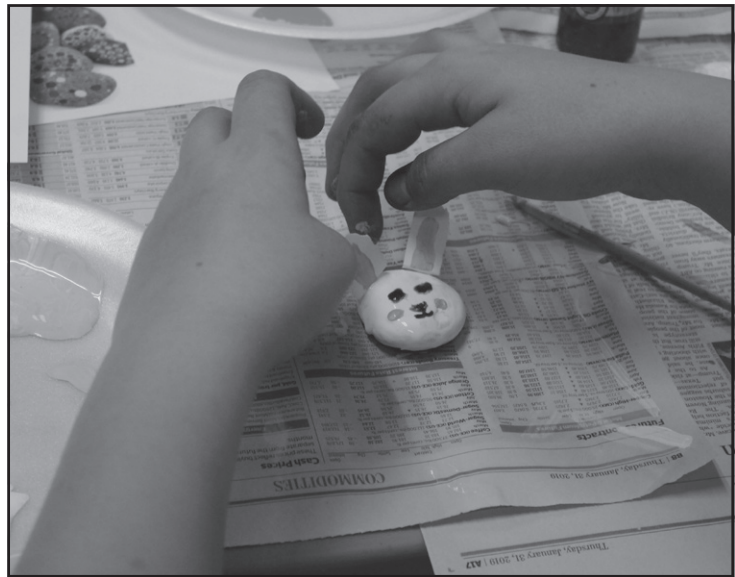

Admission is \$8 for adults with children 12 and under admitted free.

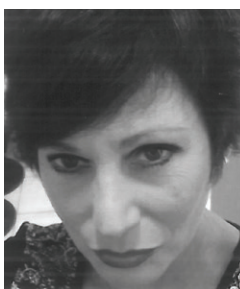

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Opioid victory

Hunter announces Purdue Pharma deal

Attorney General Mike Hunter and Oklahoma State University leaders announced Tuesday an historic settlement with Purdue Pharma that will establish a nearly \$200 million endowment at the OSU's Center for Wellness and Recovery.

The center is the state's most comprehensive treatment and research center for treating pain and addiction.

Hunter said the trial against Johnson & Johnson, Teva and the other defendants named in the state's lawsuit remains on track for May 28.

An initial \$102.5 million will go to the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences Center for Wellness and Recovery.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2020, the entity will receive an annual \$15 million payment over a five year period. During the same five year time frame, it will receive ongoing contributions of addiction treatment medicine, valued at \$20 million.

"The addiction crisis facing our state and nation is a clear and present danger," Attorney General Hunter said. "Last year alone, of the more than 3,000 Oklahomans admitted to the hospital for a non-fatal overdose, 80 percent involved a prescription opioid medication."

Nearly 50 percent of Oklaho-

man deaths from a drug overdose in 2018 were attributed to a pharmaceutical drug.

"Deploying the money from this settlement immediately allows us to decisively treat addiction illness and save lives," Hunter said.

Launched in November 2017, the OSU Center for Wellness and Recovery is dedicated to providing comprehensive care for those suffering from addiction while advancing treatment through education, research and policy.

In 2018, as part of the Center for Wellness and Recovery, OSU launched the Addiction Medicine Clinic, which employs the state's first certified academic addiction physicians.

The clinic offers individualized, evidence-based substance use disorder treatment — including medication-assisted treatment when appropriate — and mental health services to adults.

In addition, \$12.5 million will go towards providing funds to directly abate and address the opioid epidemic's effects in Oklahoma's cities and counties.

Purdue will also make a \$60 million payment to offset all litigation costs up to this point. Purdue will not promote opioids in Oklahoma, including employing or contracting with sales representatives to health care providers in Oklahoma.

Tips to help manage someone else's finances

Managing your finances has been a task you have taken on for all of your adult life. While most people manage their own finances, there may come a time when you find it necessary to manage or help manage the finances of someone else, whether it be a family member or friend.

Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension assistant family resource management specialist, said this situation can arise as a relative or friend ages or if the courts find reason to appoint a financial guardian.

A person legally responsible for another person's money and property is called a fiduciary and the person whose money is being managed is the principal.

"Basically, the fiduciary has four duties, including acting in the principal's best interest, carefully managing the principal's money and property, keeping the principal's money and property separate from the fiduciary and keeping accurate records,"

Clampet said.

"While many people serve as the physical caregiver of the principal with no legal document, a fiduciary must have a legal document called a Financial Power of Attorney. This gives the fiduciary legal right to make financial decisions in the best interest of the principal."

An FPOA is a legal document drawn up by an attorney and must be presented to the bank or other places the principal does business when acting on behalf of the principal. Clampet encourages the fiduciary to safely store the original document, but have several certified copies on hand when business needs to be conducted.

"Something to keep in mind is the principal may continue to manage personal money and property even after an FPOA has been drawn up, as long as he or she is still capable to make decisions," she said.

"However, if the fiduciary is court appointed, the principal may no longer make financial decisions. In addition, the prin-

cipal may at any time cancel the authority of the fiduciary, which would end the fiduciary's responsibility."

It is imperative the fiduciary avoids any conflict of interest. Do not borrow, loan or give money to yourself or others and do not change the principal's plans for how the money will be used after death.

Also, the fiduciary should not pay himself or herself for the time spent conducting business on behalf of the family member or friend, unless it is stated in the FPOA or state law allows.

Make a list of the principal's money, property and debts. Valuables may need to go into a safe deposit box. If needed, change the locks on any property and make sure the property is insured.

"Be sure to pay the principal's bills and taxes on time and cancel any insurance policies that are no longer needed," Clampet said.

"Find out if the principal is eligible for any financial or health care benefits from an employer or the government and help them

apply for those benefits."

Good recordkeeping is a must and keep a detailed list of all monies received or spent on behalf of the principal. Keep receipts and notes, even for small expenses, and a void paying in cash. If a cash payment for something must be made, document the expense.

If the principal is still managing his or her own expenses, but you do have the FPOA in place, keep an eye out for signs of financial exploitation or abuse.

Those signs can include missing money; sudden changes in the principal's spending or savings; making new or unusual gifts to family members or others; changing a will or beneficiaries of a life insurance policy; or even acting fearful of a relative, caregiver or friend.

"If you suspect exploitation, contact adult protective services or an attorney," she said. "Acting as a fiduciary takes careful observation, organization and awareness of resources, but it's something that's beneficial for the person in need of assistance."

"It still needed the roof replaced. We couldn't get that done in the four days we were there," said Chelle McCaskill.

The trip was a first for the Purcell church – at least in the 44 years McCaskill has been a member.

She said interest in a mission trip began about two years ago when OLV pastor, the Rev. Jim Chamberlin, brought up a possible water project on the island.

Though that project never materialized, interest in a mission trip continued to grow.

Searching for a likely project, the church reached out to organizations in Puerto Rico and their offer to help was taken up by Carritas, a charity not unlike Catholic Charities here.

Yabucoa is on the south side of the island, about five miles inland.

The area is about 90 percent Catholic and includes 26 separate parishes.

St. Rosa de Lima was one of the last to receive any help in recovering from the storm.

The area has a very high poverty level and the people lacked the resources to repair and rebuild.

It is also an area overlooked by FEMA after the storm.

Many residents "didn't even have roofs on their homes," McCaskill said.

After Maria, the people endured three months without electricity and some homes still lack running water.

McCaskill said most of the impoverished residents don't have transportation to get to and from a job.

"The damage was so tremendous, it was hard to catch up," McCaskill said.

Residents showed them the areas where Maria spent her wrath.

Some areas were buried under up to six feet of sand lifted straight from the seabed and carried inland.

Coming from Oklahoma, the team is familiar with storm damage wreaked by tornadoes.

Hurricanes cause destruction on a much larger scale.

The Purcell group – 14 youth and six adults – spent half a day visiting with the sick, as well as members of the community who were home bound.

They delivered food and had fellowship and prayers with the people.

The group included students Liz Caralampio, Sandra Del Toro, Carime Espinoza, Jesus Espinoza, Jack Forster, Sydnee Fox, Aileen Gaytan, Payton Glasgow, Trevor Nimmo, Erica Montelongo, Angela Resendiz, Paulina Resendiz, Estefania Ruiz and Isela Ruiz.

The six adults were Patty Alamos, Daniel Chavez, Edgar Del Toro, Kevin Konrade,

Chamberlin and McCaskill. They also found time before returning home to play tourists in Old San Juan.

"It was such a wonderful experience," McCaskill said. "I believe our kids were so moved and touched by that."

A series of fund-raisers at the church raised between \$14,000 and \$15,000 for the trip and supplies. Catholic Charities in Oklahoma City provided a scholarship to offset some of the travel expenses, which averaged about \$1,000 per person, McCaskill said.

The parish honored the Purcell team with a celebratory Thanksgiving Mass.

Language differences didn't pose a problem as several members of the group are bilingual. However, McCaskill said, the Spanish spoken in Puerto Rico isn't the same as the Spanish spoken here.

Vote:

polling place, verify their registration information, or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: www.elections.ok.gov. Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the county election board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot. There are three ways for voters to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state, or tribal government; or show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the county election board or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. (If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.)

Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may be assisted by a person the voter chooses. In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes. Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-tactile interface (ATI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or at their assigned polling place on election day.

Those who became physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. Tuesday March 26 still can request an emergency absentee ballot. Those who might qualify for an emergency absentee ballot should contact the county election board office at 405-527-3121 as soon as possible for more information.

Any violation of election law will be reported to the proper law enforcement authorities. Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. "We played a good, solid game and we swung the bats

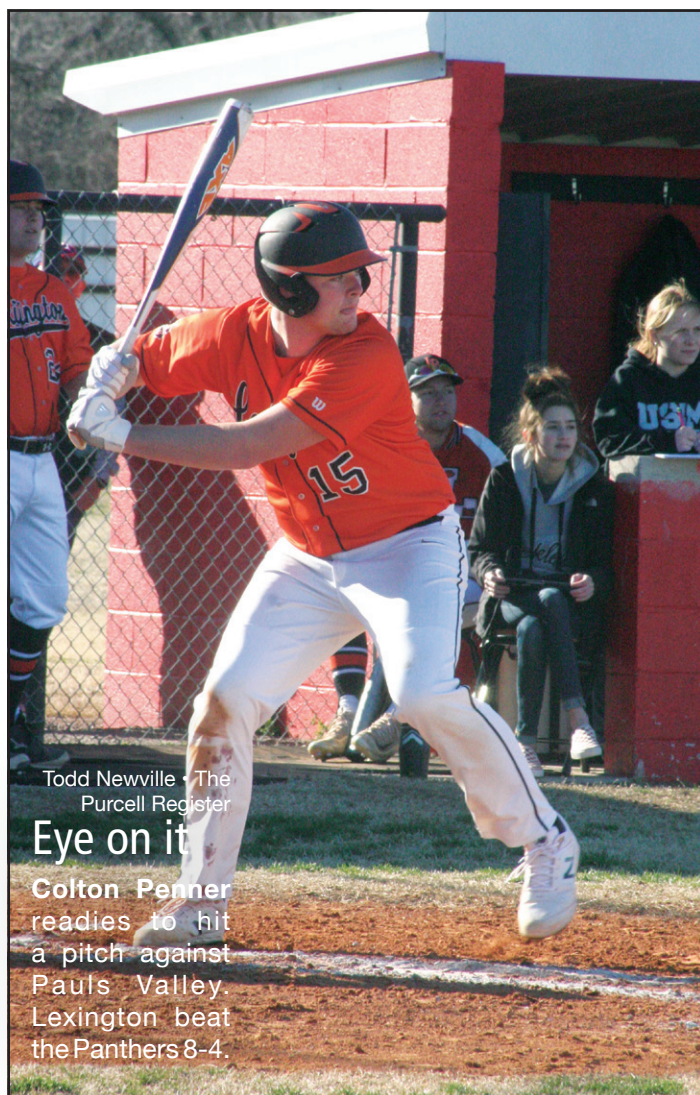
really well, too. When you put those things together, good things will happen for you. They swung the bats well and they were aggressive at the plate."

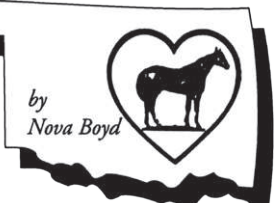

Our study this week is on the Apostle Saint Jude, who was born in Galilee around the same time as Jesus. There are a few different ideas about who he was. The New Testament mentions Jude or Judas six times,

in four places. He could be: 1) Jude of James, one of the 12 apostles; 2) "Judas (not Judas Iscariot)," another apostle; 3) the writer of the Epistle of Jude who identifies himself as the son or brother of James (the Less); and 4) Jesus' brother Judas. The main idea is: he is not Judas Iscariot. According to Wikipedia, the first two are thought to be the same person (1&2), as are the last two (3&4). According to Catholic tradition, all four are assumed to be the same Jude, while Protestants sometimes believe (1&2) is one person, but not the same person as (3&4). There is also some difference of opinion as to whether Jude the apostle is the brother of Jesus,

as the traditional writer of the Epistle of Jude. In general, Catholics believe they are the same person, while Protestants do not. Much of what we can find out about Jude is through tradition, since we don't know much factual information. He probably spoke both Greek and Aramaic and is said to have been vegetarian. There's some thought he may have been a farmer. Tradition holds that he preached the Gospel in Judea, Samaria, Syria, Mesopotamia, Libya, which includes the areas of Iran and Iraq. He is

Front-Porch Gospel Brother Joe traveled crooked roads, but he preached a straight gospel

Growing up, I don't know how many times we would ride through narrow, winding roads up to Napoleon, Ala., or to Temple, Ga., for a gospel meeting. Usually some of my siblings or cousins would pile in the car with my auburn-headed Uncle Alton, Uncle Angus Shelnett, or Preacher Miller and head to hear as good of preaching as the South has ever heard. Those were the days I came into contact with Jimmy Smith, Wayne Fussell, Carl Johnson, Jerry Dickinson, Bill Roden, Edwin Morris, Wayne McKamie, Ronny Wade, Joe Hisle and a host of other great gospel preachers.

Most of those men are still driving those back roads to preach an old-timey gospel today, while a few of them have preached their last sermon and have stepped down from that honorable pulpit for good. The preaching seemed different back then than much of what I hear today. Those old-timey gospel preachers didn't preach anything fancy. It was just a simple, straight gospel. They quoted enough scripture to convert an infidel if they could; then they'd finish strong by reminding every listener - saint and sinner alike - that they needed to heed the gospel call and come in faith and repentance to be baptized for the remission of sins. There wasn't anything fancy about that. It wasn't a hard message to understand, even though it may have been a hard one to live.

I loved those days, and I miss them, because we're seeing a bit of a change. Maybe many of today's preachers have gotten too much formal education, something few of the old-timers were privileged enough to receive. Or perhaps it is just the era we live in. Men today are tiring a little of old-fashioned preaching. People don't like having to hear a hard message; so, some say, change the message to one they will like more. I was thinking of Ada's tall Joe Hisle who has been preaching a solid gospel all over the country now for half of a century. Perhaps the big preacher preaches a little too hard nowadays. Maybe it's time to slow down, speak softer,

I only access it when I need it. The modern "creed" for this religion might go something like this. God created the world, yes. And God wants me to be good, yes. But I only call upon God when I am in trouble or afraid, when I really need him. I will think about God on Sundays and a few times during the week. But the rest of the time I don't really need God and he doesn't need me (especially during March Madness!).

not the religion of Abraham and Moses and Jesus. This past week I worked in Puerto Rico with 13 teenagers and six adults from Purcell. We went as missionaries, to give witness to Christ through service. We worked with Caritas International to address a few of the needs of people who were still suffering from the hurricane of 2017. We worked very hard for four days to renovate a small chapel, Santa Rosa de Lima. We repaired windows, replaced broken toilets, and completely cleaned and repainted the inside and outside of the chapel. On our last day in Yabucoa, we visited five houses where sick elderly people were living. These were people who were

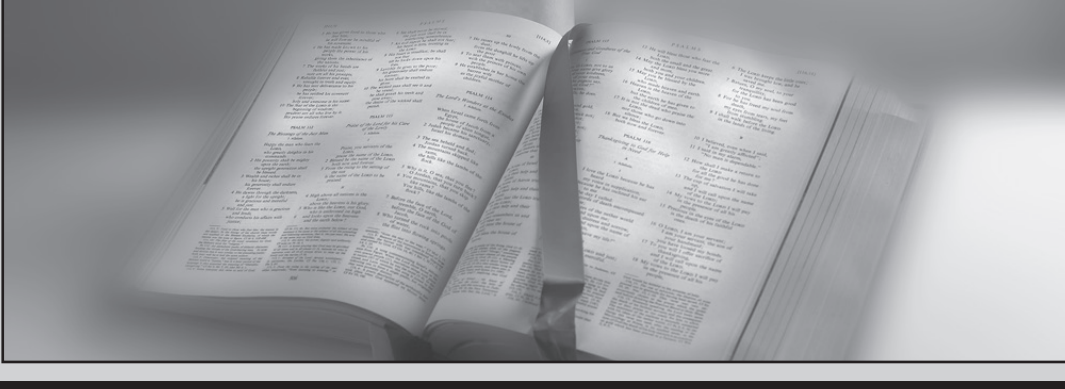
praying for us during the week but could not go out of the house to come to the church. We visited them, brought them a box of food, and prayed with them. At the end of that last day in town, everyone came out for a big Mass of Thanksgiving, complete with much singing and praying and crying. In those four days we experienced a different kind of faith. We experienced the faith of a group of men and women whose lives had been changed by the hurricane. The chapel was for them, the place where God was encountered. It was holy ground. It was their Mount

Horeb, the mountain of God (Exodus 3).

They had been praying for someone to rebuild the place where God lives. They truly believed that we were the answer to their prayers. We could have said that it was just a coincidence. But these ladies would have smiled and replied, "Have another plantain. We know that you are the answer to our prayers."

These Puerto Ricans were people who looked for God all the time, not just on Sundays.

They did the same things that we do - washed clothes, cooked meals, raised their children. But they were always on the lookout for a burning bush - the presence of God - in the everyday answers to prayers.

But to us it was a big surprise. Each morning our teenagers

would show up for work, with their energy, and their laughter, and their music. And when they visited the houses, the elderly cried tears of thanksgiving. Ground turkey recall could

affect what's stored in your freezer

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service recently announced a recall of more than 78,000 pounds of Butterball ground turkey that may be contaminated with Salmonella Schwarzengrund. The prepackaged raw meat was produced July 7, 2018.

Barbara Brown, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension food specialist, said even though the meat was produced eight months ago, consumers can still be at risk.

"Many people purchase large quantities of meat to stock their freezers. It's quite likely there are consumers who have this possibly tainted meat in their freezers right now," Brown said.

"All products affected were packaged in 48-ounce or 16-ounce packages and marked with a sell or freeze date of July 26, 2018.

"Consumers who have purchased these products are urged not to consume them. They should be thrown away or returned to the store in which it was purchased," she concluded.

Consumers may see a complete list of package labels at <https://okla.st/2VW5UUa> to help determine if they purchased any of the meat that has been recalled.

The items were shipped to institutional and retail locations nationwide under the brand names Butterball, Kroger and Food Lion.

Consumption of food contaminated with Salmonella

can cause salmonellosis, one of the most common bacterial foodborne illnesses.

The most common symptoms of salmonellosis are diarrhea, abdominal cramps and fever within 12 to 72 hours after eating the contaminated product. The illness usually lasts four to seven days and most people recover without treatment.

However, the diarrhea may be severe enough the person may need to be hospitalized. Older adults, very young children and those with weakened immune systems are more likely to develop a severe illness.

said to have visited Beirut and Turkey. Jude and the apostle Bartholomew are both credited with bringing Christianity to Armenia and are honored as the patron saints of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

St. Jude is said to have been martyred in Beirut in 65 AD, together with the apostle Simon the Zealot. He is sometimes pictured holding an axe, which may symbolize how he and Simon were killed. In contrast, the Orthodox Christian faith puts his death later (in 80 AD), near Mt. Ararat in Turkey (Armenia), and by crucifixion then being pierced by arrows.

Jude's body was brought from the Middle East many years after his death (mid-15th century?) and placed in a crypt in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

Symbols or attributes representing St. Jude are an axe, a club, a boat, an oar or a medalion. He is the patron saint of desperate situations and lost causes. The late entertainer Danny Thomas chose to name the medical facility that he founded (St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital) after this saint, based on Danny's dream that "no child should die in the dawn of life."

Saint Jude's feast day is

observed on October 28 in the Roman Catholic, the Anglican Communion, and the Lutheran church and on June 19 in the Eastern Orthodox church.

Last Tuesday morning we had over 160 who had signed in before 6 a.m. Thursday morning 145 were there by that same time.

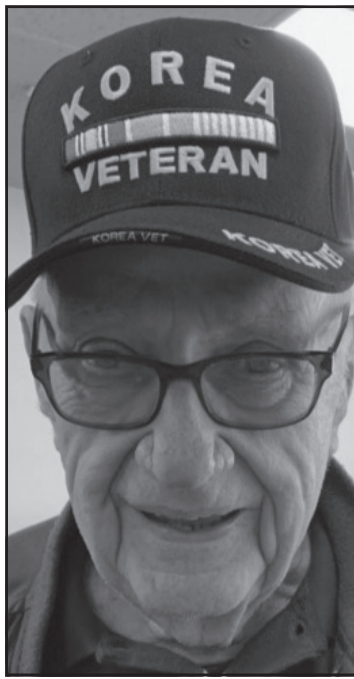

Last week, 20 veterans received approval for a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Those 20 veterans will receive a combined total of \$793,419 annually. Thirty-nine veterans were approved for benefits at the 10-90 percent rating and will receive a combined \$560,270 yearly. One surviving spouse was approved for benefits and will receive \$15,829 annually.

We encourage all veterans and surviving spouses of veterans to visit us to see what VA benefits they may be eligible to receive. Most who visit us for the first time are not aware of what may be available to them based on the veteran's military service. There are many diseases presumptive to veterans who served in Vietnam, the Gulf War and at Camp Lejeune. Veterans who served in parts of Thailand and Korea may have also been exposed to Agent Orange.

The years for presumptive exposure to chemicals in the water at Camp Lejeune are from 1953-1987. There is also a list of presumptive conditions from the Gulf War and possible exposure to burn pits. The bottom line for all veterans is that the VA is not going to knock on your door to tell you about benefits you may be eligible for. We encourage all veterans and their families to be proactive when it comes to their VA claims and possible exposures.

Some veterans were exposed to radiation and may have been a part of the atomic testing, clean up and received exposure that way or from other sources. For those veterans who received a certificate from the testing of an atomic device, if the veteran died from certain types of

cancers, the Justice Department has a \$75,000 payout for his or her family. For questions about radiation exposure, please contact Shirley at 405-361-9322.

We are fortunate to have several partners in our efforts to get veterans and their families what they need. One of our partners is the Vet Center, which has locations in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, and Lawton. They provide counselors on site each day we are open. They also allow us to use their space when we have a hearing before a Judge with the Board of Veterans Appeals.

They are planning a celebration of the National Vietnam War Veteran's Day from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. on Friday, March 29, at their Oklahoma City office at 6804 North Robinson Avenue. They are hosting a Vietnam Veterans Commemoration Ceremony. Vietnam Era Veterans and family members are invited. They ask you to call and let them know you are coming so they can have enough food available. Their telephone number is 405-456-5184.

Several of our volunteers plan to be on hand and look forward to joining in honoring you. Our transportation service for veterans to our location and to VA appointments is a popular program. Currently, we have three drivers and could use another volunteer to drive one of our vans to provide that service.

We are available every Tuesday and Thursday mornings at the 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. We open the doors by 5:30 a.m. and we begin working as soon as volunteers have their computers ready. We stop taking clients at 8 a.m. and urge you to arrive as early as possible.

Counselors from the Vet Centers are here each session and a Legal Aid representative is here on Thursdays. We have food baskets available for those who qualify. We look forward to your visit and thank you for trusting us to help you with your VA matters.

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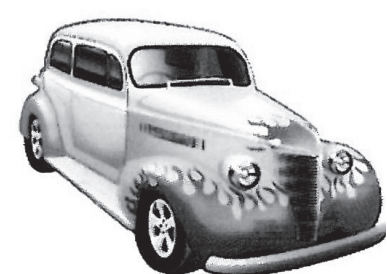

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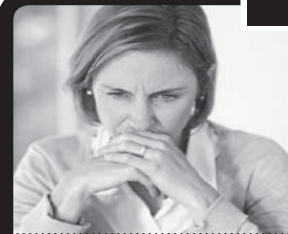
