
Mandy Davis, chief executive officer at the chamber, said the city is waiving its garage sale permit fee for the annual event.

## Rollover wreck Two passengers critically hurt


A rollover wreck Friday afternoon on Interstate 35 critically injured two Noble children and also sent a third youngster to the hospital.

A water line cut that spilled 650,000 gallons of Purcell's water in 2016 could end up costing a Lexington company and its owner more than \$10,380.

The Purcell Public Works Authority filed suit in McClain County District Court on April 20 against Gregory K. Snow, Sun Dog Trails, Snow Land Holdings LLC, Native Sand LLC and five John Does.

Snow is the registered agent for the three companies, according to the lawsuit.

For the past 17 years, the United States has been engaged in several military conflicts, primarily, but not exclusively, in the Middle East. Most recently, the United States worked in concert with British and French military forces, allies and NATO, to strike targets in Syria.

## **Your Views** Up to the task

Oklahoman Jim Bridenstine was sworn in Monday as the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's 13th administrator.

Although his nomination and subsequent Senate confirmation were contentious, it's time to congratulate the former congressman from Oklahoma's 1st District and see what he can do.

Unlike his predecessors, Bridenstine was confirmed April 19 by the narrowest possible margin, 50-49, and that only after Arizona Republican Jeff Flake switched his vote to affirmative and Illinois Democrat Tammy Duckworth – who felt strongly enough that she wheeled her 10-day-old baby onto the Senate floor – put in a last-minute opposition vote.

Many who opposed Bridenstine's appointment argued that the NASA administrator should be a space professional rather than a politician. His predecessor, Charles Bolden, was a space shuttle pilot with four flights covering more than 28 days in space to his credit and a U.S. Marine Corps major general. Bolden's predecessor, Michael Griffin, holds seven academic degrees, including a BA in physics, an engineering MS in aerospace science, and a Ph.D. in aerospace engineering. He worked in NASA's Applied Physics Lab and the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization, and was the associate administrator for exploration. Dan Goldin spent 25 years in the space industry before he was appointed to head NASA in 1992. Sean O'Keefe, who ran NASA from 2001-2004, was not a space professional when he was appointed. He had been comptroller of the Department of Defense, secretary of the Navy, and, for the first year of George W. Bush's presidency, deputy director, Office of Management and Budget. His reputation rested on fiscal responsibility and a knack for reducing costs. Although his NASA tenure was troubled – the space shuttle Columbia accident and ensuing investigation were on his watch - his competency in the lead role was never questioned. Bridenstine takes the helm with degrees from Rice and Cornell, a nine-year active-duty run as a Navy fighter pilot, five as a reserve and three with the Air National Guard. He also has six years of experience on Capitol Hill. That makes him at least as well qualified as O'Keefe and likely better able to navigate the politics of space exploration. Bridenstine is now a space professional with a huge project looming in the manned Orion spacecraft set to launch atop a new class of rocket in just three to five years. There's no evidence to suggest he isn't up to the task.



## USDA adjusts disaster assistance to help Oklahoma producers

assistance programs, LFP provides compensation to eligible livestock producers who have suffered grazing losses because of drought or fire.

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) also moved the 2019 final planting date to October 15 for Oklahoma producers, which was formerly October 1 or October 10, depending on the county in Oklahoma. Bill Northey, USDA's Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation, made the announcement from Leedey, Okla., where he met with producers impacted by natural disasters.

"Prolonged severe drought and wildfires have impacted the availability of adequate forage and water sources for livestock and, in some cases, impacted 2018 cropping decisions for many ranchers and farmers," Northey said. "USDA offers several disaster programs intended to provide relief to producers affected by severe weather conditions, and we want to make it easy for producers to use these tools to

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

There was no parade, no carnival and if there were gunfights, the bullets were real and the participants weren't play acting.

In short, there's little resemblance between the '89-er of 1889 and the '89-er Day participant of 2018.

According to the Oklahoma Historical Society, the largest

Chickasaw Nation.

April 22, 1889, was a Monday, the day after Easter.

It was a bright and clear day and some 50,000 people surrounded the Unassigned Lands, waiting for the noon signal.

Seventy-six of that number waited on horseback at Ingram Crossing near Wayne. The only woman in the group was 24-year-old Emma Claunch, a school teacher at Wayne.

The crossing was known to be narrow and deep. Years later, she recalled the day's events in a Hugo newspaper article.

"Some of the horses went out

anyway and I didn't hurry, for I knew I couldn't crowd my horse in water."

The South Canadian River safely crossed, Emma raced her horse four miles to stake a quarter section east of what is now Lexington.

She ran up her flag on the land, then rested two hours until surveyors from Purcell arrived and platted the homestead.

Early the next morning, Emma returned to her land accompanied by a man with a team. The man plowed a small area, enough to make a showing.

Emma helped to build a oneroom shack to serve as a home.

On April 24, Emma traveled to Guthrie to file on her land. The line of like-minded settlers, all male, stretched more than 300 feet in front of her.

Emma accepted the assistance of a lawyer and paid a \$5 fee and by virtue of her gender

moved to the head of the line. The next day, she returned to her homestead to find it occupied by a squatter.

It took four years and every cent she could raise to fight his claim to her land. The case went all the way to the Supreme Court where Emma finally prevailed.

Surely Elimelech makes a poor decision in leaving God's country and returning to Moab. Elimelech does not have to travel far from his home in Bethlehem until he comes to the Dead Sea. Appropriately, he crosses that ominous water, goes on to Moab, and dies. He does not survive long in that far country, and his wonderful wife and two sons have to bury him in a foreign land (Ruth 1:3).

Naomi and her two sons stay in Moab, and the two boys marry Moabite daughters, two girls named Orpah and Ruth. But tragedy strikes again, and the two boys die and are buried right alongside their father.

Left with nothing except two grieving daughters-in-law, the heartbroken Naomi decides to go home. The inspired writer says that, "Then she arose with her daughters in law that she might return from the country of Moab" (Ruth 1:6).

Naomi decides to go home! Few stories are greater than homecoming stories. The Lord

Naomi heads back home, and, amazingly, she is not alone. Her two daughters-in-law go back with her. Her influence has been so great they wanted to be with her. Orpah goes partway, but when she counts the cost she decides to go back to her people. She kisses her wonderful mother-in-law, and heads back to Moab. As she walks away, Naomi – no doubt with tear-filled eyes - turns to Ruth and says, "My sweet daughter, you go on home, too."

Ruth stands up tall, looks in Naomi's teary eyes, then delivers one of the greatest speeches recorded in holy scripture:

"Intreat me not to leave you," she says resolutely, "or to return from following after thee: for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge: thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God" (Ruth 1:16).

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week is Korean War Veteran, Don G. Musgrove of Harrah. We appreciate Mr. Musgrove for his service to our country.

By using the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire (DBQ) filled out by the veteran's medical care provider, most veterans claims will be approved the first time submitted. My philosophy has always been for the veteran to have a medical diagnosis, buddy statements, or other evidence before filing the VA form 21-526EZ application for benefits. We do file the Intent to file for benefits (VA form 21-0966) on the veterans first visit. This gives them a start date for benefits and allows one year to submit the 21-526EZ with their DBQ or other evidence in support of their claim for benefits.

Our volunteers who assist surviving spouses of veterans continue to change the lives of many who are approved for the dollars each month. The DIC benefit is based on the veteran dying from a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to their military service. Some information that could be of help to the surviving spouses of veterans is if a service-connected disability or one that is presumptive to their military service is listed on their death certificate.

Last week eight veterans received a VA disability rating of 100 percent and will receive ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected conditions. This group of veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$198,796 per year. When a veteran is awarded compensation benefits that amount is tax-free. Also, a surviving spouse in receipt of DIC does not pay tax on that income. There are other benefits veterans or surviving spouses may be eligible to receive. For those of you who receive either of those stop by for a quick check to see what you may qualify for our state or the VA. Legal Aid is on-site twice each month and will be here again on May 3. If you need their services, please stop by. A representative from Social Security is also available, as well as someone who can help with your questions about Veterans Educational benefits. For those veterans who have never filed for VA benefits or were turned down when they applied, please consider visiting with us. We start assisting veterans each Tuesday and Thursday morning at least by 5:30 a.m., we usually reach the maximum number we can help by 8 a.m. Our services are free, and we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit where your donations are tax deductible. Our operational expenses are approximately \$30,000 each month. One of the biggest expenses we have is the cost for a DBQ to be filled out by the veteran's medical provider. Since many of the men and women we help are homeless or on a fixed income, we help those who could not otherwise afford to pay for the

evidence needed to support their claim for VA benefits. Another significant expense is the rent we pay for our facility along with the utilities.

Our van drivers are logging over 1,000 miles each week transporting veterans to their VA medical appointments. We have been looking for a sponsor to help us pay the operating expenses for our veterans' transportation services. It seems as we are getting older, many of us have to ask someone to take us where we need to go.

Recently, we received the donation of a 10-passenger handicapped accessible bus to be used to transport our veterans confined to a wheelchair. The decals with our logo will be applied next week, and it will be ready for use. For those who need handicapped accessible transportation, please call Lora at (405) 550-8806 Extension 101 to schedule a ride. Currently, we only have one driver who is certified to operate this truck.

The number of veterans and surviving spouses who visit us Tuesday and Thursday morning is averaging 275 each week. We have veterans coming from all 77 counties in Oklahoma. Most of the men and women we help are from our state. It looks like the state of Texas ranks number 1 with more veterans coming to see us from there than any other state. Over the years many veterans have asked why there is not a place like ours in their state. My answer is always the same—it's up to them to start making a difference in the lives of the men and women who have served in the military of this United States.

We have veterans in North Dakota who have been to our place for training and are now sending their claims to us to be reviewed before submitting to VA.

For those of you who are interested in helping your friends and neighbors, stop by for a visit to see how we operate our Foundation. Some of us in our organization are working 50-80 hours each week to be ready and able to help veterans and surviving spouses.

As many of you know the preparation that goes into our operation before and after each operate like we do. Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. ADD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. 
