Wayne woman waiting for transplant

A fundraiser this evening (Thursday) will benefit a local woman told by her doctors that she needs a new heart.

Landmark Church, 1106 W. Grant St., will raise money for MaKenzie McSwain of Wayne.

Cost of the meal is \$10 per person and carryout meals will also be available.

McSwain, 24, was born with multiple congenital heart defects and has undergone several heart surgeries.

Doctors gave her an internal pacemaker when she was 19. In October, they told her she would need a heart transplant in 3 to

5 years.

Since then her health has declined and the reality of a transplant came sooner than she or her family anticipated.

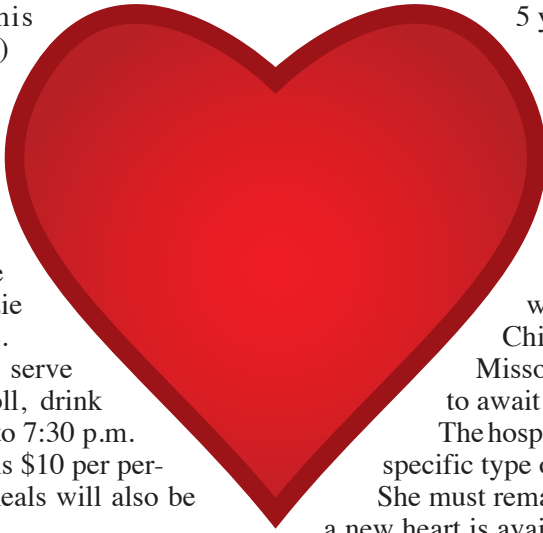
This month she will travel to St. Louis Children’s Hospital in Missouri for testing and to await a new heart.

The hospital specializes in her specific type of heart disease.

She must remain in Missouri until a new heart is available. In addition to relocating, she will be unable to work while she waits for a new heart.

Astronaut Leland Melvin to help honor students, educators at Academic Awards Banquet

Five outstanding Oklahoma educators will be honored along with 100 of the state's top public high school seniors when the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence hosts its 33rd Academic Awards Banquet May 18 in Tulsa.

"Shoot for the Stars" is the theme for this year's banquet, which will feature a keynote address by former NASA astronaut Leland Melvin, who served on the Space Shuttle Atlantis and helped construct the International Space Station.

Tulsa television news anchor Scott Thompson, an Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence trustee, will serve as the emcee for the statewide banquet honoring "the best of the best" in Oklahoma's public schools.

David L. Boren, founder and chairman of the foundation, will deliver closing remarks. The gala event, which is attended by nearly 1,000 people, will also feature musical entertainment by the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute Orchestra. Reservations can be made online by May 6 at

Ken Busby, a Tulsa trustee of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence and executive director and CEO of the Route 66 Alliance, serves as banquet chair.

Caitlin Mantooth of Wayne is one of the honorees.

A class valedictorian, Mantooth is yearbook editor and chapter president of Future Farmers of America, through which she received the FFA Star Chapter Farmer Award in 2017. She is recipient of the Oklahoma Writing Project's Janis Cramer Personal Narrative Award in recognition of a personal essay she wrote about the joy of tutoring students in math. She also crochets Kaps for Kids to donate to children's hospitals and homeless shelters.

A student at Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics Regional Center, Mantooth plans to study architectural engineering at Oklahoma State University.

"The Academic Awards Banquet is such an inspiring, entertaining, and important event for public education in Oklahoma," Ken Busby, a OFE trustee, said. "Some have described it as the 'Academy Awards' of public education

Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of one and one-half (1-½) cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch, or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

(Prior Code 1991, §8-115) State Law Reference: Similar provisions, 21 O.S. §120S.

Socialism is un-American

America is a nation set apart because of the precious freedoms that exist here. Our distinct existence was settled because of patriots who first dreamed of liberty and fought hard to secure it for future generations.

Time to get ready for storm season

At the basic level, insurance is about managing your risks and getting ready for the unexpected. That's why, as Oklahoma insurance commissioner, I'm kicking off a new column called Get Ready.

There are so many things in life to prepare for – from tornadoes to retirement – and insurance plays a vital role in all of those events.

Because it's springtime, we'll first focus on storm season, and what we can all do to get ready for tornadoes and severe weather. Unpredictable weather in Oklahoma is our way of life, but we don't have to be a victim to severe storms.

Preparing before the sirens sound is the best way to protect your family and your property. The following tips will help you get ready.

Create a Home Inventory

It may seem hard at first to record information about everything you have in your house, but don't let that stop you. The information in your home inventory can make an insurance claim settlement faster and easier.

There are many ways to create a home inventory from high-tech apps to basic pen-and-paper. You can find a free smartphone app or a printable home inventory list at oid.ok.gov/GetReady to get started. To get started, include as much identifying information – like serial numbers, brand name, model number and purchase date – as possible. You will also want to take photos or video of your items.

Once you've created your inventory, store the information in the cloud. If using a paper record, keep your home inventory in a safe deposit box or another safe place outside your home.

Collect and Review Your Insurance Information

Be sure you have the right homeowners or renters coverage. That means making sure you know what your policy

will and won't cover. A standard homeowners and renters insurance policy doesn't protect your home or belongings from damage associated with floods, earthquakes or sewer and drain backup. If you have questions about your policy or want extra coverage, call your insurance agent.

Also, most wind and hail deductibles are set to a percentage of the dwelling amount. For example, one percent of \$100,000 home is \$1,000, and one percent of a \$200,000 house is \$2,000. Be sure that your home is not over insured, or you could be paying a higher premium. Talk with your agent to get the deductible amount that will work for you.

After you've squared away your coverage, store electronic copies of your insurance policies with your home inventory. Keep paper files in a safe deposit box or another safe location not in your home. Make sure to have a copy of your policy declarations page listing all of your coverages, as well as your insurance cards.

Finally, collect the 24-hour contact information for your insurance company. Make a list that includes your policy numbers, insurance agent's phone numbers, website addresses and mailing addresses.

It is a good idea to store this information – and your home inventory – in a waterproof, fireproof box or safe. If you have a storm shelter or safe room, keep this information in there.

After the Storm

Navigating the insurance process can be challenging, but knowing you are properly prepared will give you the peace of mind to get through Oklahoma's storm season.

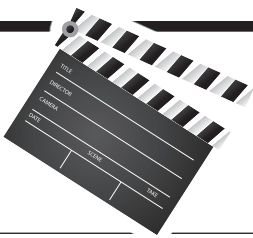

MOVIES with DAVE

It’s not every week we get to witness box office history, yet here we are with “Avengers: Endgame.”

A few weeks ago, most box office analysts were expecting “Endgame” would have a record breaking opening weekend, sure. It was expected to beat “Avengers: Infinity War’s” opening last year of \$257 million domestic and \$640 million worldwide.

The most optimistic of predictors were even hoping “Endgame” could be the first film to open at \$300 million domestic and \$1 billion worldwide, but those were mostly outliers.

Well time certainly makes fools out of us all, because not only did “Endgame” break both those records, but it raised the entire box office bar to the stratosphere.

Everyone who follows movies knew something incredible was happening the second we heard news from China on Wednesday, when the film opened to an amazing \$107.5 million in a single day.

That feeling was confirmed a couple days later when the film opened in the US and Canada to the tune of \$60 million, stealing the record from “Star Wars: The Force Awakens.”

And that was just Thursday evening previews. It only got crazier from there.

By Friday it was up to \$157.5 million. Then on Saturday it added on another \$109 million, and Sunday added another \$90 million.

In the end, not only did it break the optimistic prediction of \$300 million, but it completely blew past it, raking in a whopping \$357 million domestically.

And that was just domestically. This film broke opening weekend records in just about every other country too, includ-



ing China with \$330.5 million by the end of the Sunday, for a total of \$859 million internationally.

Not only did “Endgame” reach the nearly unfathomable goal of grossing over \$1 billion in a single weekend worldwide, it annihilated it to the tune of 1.2 billion.

It’s insane. Before this weekend I knew “Endgame” would do well. At the end of the film’s run I figured it was a solid bet the movie would take the number two spot worldwide from box office champion James Cameron and finally move 1997’s “Titanic” down a peg to number three on the all time box office charts. Now, I just don’t know any-

more.

Passing “Titanic” is basically a given now. Even James Cameron’s “Avatar,” the highest grossing movie of all time at \$2.78 billion, a film who’s box office run seems almost unimaginable to top, doesn’t seem out of the question now for “Endgame.”

If Avengers: Endgame” has proved one thing, it’s that the movie is basically impossible to predict.

We’ll know more in the coming weeks, but for now I just think it’s pretty cool to be witnessing history.

Anyway, enough about all the millions “Endgame” is making. I guess if you’re reading this column you might be wondering what I thought of the movie itself.

Well it’s the only review I have this week, so I better make it count. Let’s get to it.

The only movie this week is “Avengers: Endgame.”

After the devastating events of “Avengers: Infinity War,” the universe is in ruins. With the help of remaining allies, the Avengers assemble once more in order to take one final stand and restore order to the universe.

22 films over 11 years and here we are.

This really is the end of an era. Every single movie in the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU) has, one way or another, led up to this single three hour film.

This movie not only needed to be the satisfying conclusion to a series filled with dozens of characters and numerous storylines. It also had to be the follow up to one of the most shocking cliffhangers in cinematic history.

It’s all quite the undertaking. And incredibly, the amazing people at Marvel Studios were somehow up to this enormous task.

What Marvel has done with this movie, heck this entire series of films, is beyond extraordinary.

Since I really don’t want to spoil any details for those who weren’t fortunate enough to watch this film opening weekend, the only thing I can really talk about is how this movie

made me feel.

And boy did this film ever make me feel feelings.

It’s hard for me to even look at this movie analytically. To me it was less a motion picture and more of a straight up emotional release.

Feelings I’ve unknowingly pent up over the past 11 years, ever since I watched the first “Iron Man” movie back in 2008, were suddenly released over the span of this exceedingly cathartic three hour film.

From the very beginning this film had me tearing up. Little did I know, that scene was just the kickoff for things to come.

The entire second half of this movie is just one incredible moment after the next.

If you’re a Marvel fan, just about every little hint or tease from past movies finally pays off here. And in the most spectacular ways possible.

Every character has their moment. Everyone in this ridiculously star studded cast has their chance in the spotlight. Especially the ones who felt a little more left to the wayside in the previous film like Captain America (Chris Evans).

There is a lot going on in this movie. Not only with all the numerous characters, but also with the film’s fairly intricate story.

Incredibly though, the filmmakers here were able to craft a narrative that didn’t feel over bloated or confusing, despite the movie’s three hour runtime.

In fact that’s one of the things I loved about this film. It wasn’t just a rush to fight the big bad in the universe. The movie took its time, and really let you breath in the circumstances our heroes find themselves in.

I guess I could see some complain about the slower pacing of the first half of this film, but honestly it didn’t bother me one bit. I was thrilled to see this giant blockbuster action-fest slow down and really show the audience everything at stake.

The film takes complete advantage of its enormous 182 minute runtime, and honestly I wouldn’t have wanted it to be a second shorter.

If it isn’t obvious, I loved this movie. I had an absolute blast watching it from start to finish.

tax increases the government would impose to pay for and implement this government-run, one-size-fits-all system.

Month of May ushers in final weeks of legislative session

The month of May is here. I can’t believe we are three-fourths of the way through my first session. I have learned so much!

Budget negotiations are ongoing and hopefully will be finalized in the next week.

Last week, House members finished hearing Senate bills, and the Senate finished considering House bills. We now move into the fourth-reading and conference committee phase for legislation still active and not yet sent to the governor.

Fourth reading is the hearing of bills amended by the opposite legislative chamber. These bills now move back to their chamber of origin to be considered. If amendments are accepted and the bills pass, they advance to the governor for consideration of being signed into law.

If amendments are rejected, the author of the bill can request a conference committee where committee members from both the House and Senate work on final language. If a majority of these committee members approve the final version of the bill and it passes fourth-reading in both legislative chambers, it moves to the governor.

If a bill fails to gain a majority vote in conference committee, it dies. If bills are not considered at this point, they can be held over until next year – the second session of the 57th Legislature.

The House passed 189 Senate bills and joint resolutions, only failing two of them. The Senate passed 255 House bills. In total, 277 bills have been sent to the governor from the House and Senate so far.

As of Tuesday, the governor signed 110 House bills into law, vetoing two, and 120 Senate bills, vetoing two.

As promised, I have diligently worked on putting kids and families first. I have worked with the Potts Family Foundation to move the conversation of children in trauma forward in House District 20.

The Potts Family Foundation has a powerful video called, The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope. Together we brought this video to two of our school districts in HD20 and are working to bring it to the others for teachers’ professional development in August.

Through House Bill 1905, higher education will provide the study of childhood trauma for teacher candidates. This study will prepare classroom teachers to help identify children who may be experiencing trauma at home and allow teachers to help these students be more successful in the classroom.

Bill will allow pharmacies to extend life-saving prescriptions on emergency basis

Gov. Kevin Stitt has given his approval to legislation ensuring citizens can get emergency refills on life-saving prescriptions.

Sen. Carri Hicks, D-Oklahoma City, is the principal author of Senate Bill 1019. The House principal author is Rep. T.J. Marti, R-Broken Arrow.

Hicks said the legislation sets out the guidelines for pharmacists to prescribe emergency refills of specific kinds of medication if the patient’s doctor cannot be reached after a prescription has expired.

“There are certain chronic medical conditions that can quickly become extremely dangerous without prescription medication. As the mother of a child with Type 1 Diabetes,

it’s something I understand all too well,” Hicks said.

“Ensuring emergency access to a drug like insulin can save lives,” she concluded.

Hicks said beyond helping people with diabetes, the measure would also allow emergency refills for medications for other chronic health conditions including seizures, asthma and heart conditions.

The bill does not apply to narcotics.

Under SB 1019, a pharmacist could dispense an emergency supply of the prescription under specific circumstances.

The pharmacy must have a record of the prescription for the drug prescribed in the name of the patient requesting it.

If the prescription doesn’t

provide for a refill or it has expired and the pharmacist is unable to obtain authorization for a refill.

The pharmacist determines the drug is essential to sustain the life of the patient or necessary for the continued therapy for a chronic condition.

“I commend Senator Hicks for her work on and passion for SB 1019,” Marti said. “From a pharmacist standpoint, this legislation is long overdue. SB 1019 will save lives in Oklahoma, and that alone makes the hard work involved in passing this great legislation worth it.”

The new law will take effect Nov. 1, 2019.

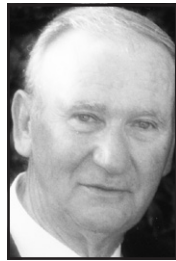

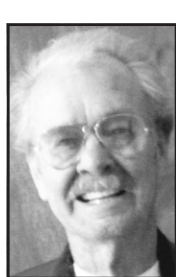

Governor signs school inhaler legislation

Legislation was signed into law April 23 to allow school districts to stock inhalers for health emergencies.

Sen. Kay Floyd, D-Oklahoma City, authored Senate Bill

381 at the request of constituents who lost a family member to a severe asthma attack at school.

"Many people don't realize they have asthma, and for

others it can be so minor they don't have problems. Brendon McLarty was diagnosed with asthma at a young age but it never caused him problems until the last day of his sopho-

more year when the 16-year-old suffered a fatal attack of sudden severe asthma," Floyd said.

Bill:

“By allowing school districts to provide inhalers on site, hopefully tragedies like Brendon’s death won’t happen. Just like having Epipens on site, schools will be prepared for those kids who forget their inhalers or don’t know they have asthma. I appreciate everyone’s support of this life-saving legislation,” she concluded. SB 381 allows a licensed physician to write a prescription for inhalers to the school district in the name of the school district and allows the district to maintain two inhalers within a secure location in the building. It also requires school boards that allow districts to stock inhaled asthma medication to amend their policies relating to self-administration of such inhaled asthma medication. The amended policies require the district to:

- inform parents or student guardians in writing that a school nurse or trained school employee may administer the inhaler to a student who is experiencing respiratory distress.
- designate the employee responsible for obtaining the inhalers and spacers or holding chambers at each school site.
- notify the parent or guardian of a student after administration of an inhaler.

Many states already allow school districts to stock inhalers. Rep. Mickey Dollens is the principal House author of the bill, which was requested

Music:

isn’t it’s typical. A news release describes him as “an incredibly straight-forward, charismatic, ambitious young man who greets everyone with a smile and a humorously firm handshake.” As central as music is to his life, Akin also races half-scale dragsters, restores classic cars and helps out on the family’s horse farm. He’s proficient on guitar, violin, clarinet, keyboard and four of the nine varieties of saxophone and “can make sounds on everything else,” he told a reporter back in 2016. It is on the bassoon that he has shined the brightest. It was over Christmas break in 2013 that then-Washington band director Christopher Hall sent the bassoon home with Akin, promising the teen a steak dinner if he could play it by the time classes resumed in January. Not only did he play it, 2-1/2 years later he was performing at Carnegie Hall with the Honors Junior Orchestra. For years his mentor on the bassoon has been Professor Rod Ackmann at the University of Oklahoma. Ackmann is also principal

bassoonist with the Oklahoma City Philharmonic. Like his mentor, Akin too is a principal bassoonist – with the Oklahoma Youth Orchestra, OkMEA All-State Orchestra and University of Oklahoma Symphony Band. Proposed fix to state liquor laws tackles virtual monopoly

Legislation introduced, backed by a coalition of Oklahoma businesses, proposes to fix an under-publicized problem with the state’s popular new liquor laws that created a virtual monopoly in the distribution of wine and spirits.

Boardwalk Distribution of Tulsa, joined by retail interests including restaurants and bars from across the state, is supporting Senate Bill 608, which will amend language that effectively created a virtual monopoly in the wholesale distribution of wine and spirits after implementation of the new law October 1.

The bill is co-authored by Sen. Kim David, the majority floor leader and Rep. Chris Kannady, chair of the House Judiciary Committee.

“State Question 792 was sold to voters as a modernization of Oklahoma’s liquor laws, with the enticement of the sale of wine and strong beer in grocery stores,” said Bryan Hendershot, owner of Tulsa-based Boardwalk Distribution. “But there was nothing put in front of voters that talked about changing the distribution model, which had worked well since 1959.”

The long-standing distribution model was changed from a four-tier to a three-tier system. That, coupled with the change of two simple words, opened the door for out of state interests to dominate the Oklahoma market.

Where previously the law said that manufacturers SHALL sell to all interested wholesalers in the state, it now says manufacturers MAY sell to all

wholesalers. With this change manufacturers gained the ability to “designate” an exclusive distributor for their products.

“Oklahomans who voted for modernization of our liquor laws did not vote on a change in the distribution model that would stifle our local economies, especially retailers in rural areas. That is not what State Question 792 was supposed to be about,” said Kannady.

“The change in the law has created a virtual monopoly in the distribution of alcohol in Oklahoma and it’s putting the squeeze on retailers and product availability. This legislation will fix the problem without changing the spirit or intention of SQ 792,” he said.

The effect of designation has been devastating to Boardwalk and other state-based distributors. Hendershot estimates that Boardwalk will lose \$100 million in sales in the first year since the October 1 implementation of the new law.

In addition, the company was forced to lay off 30 employees. Two other distributors have gone out of business. Retail stores have suffered as well.

Robert Jernigan of Bacchus Wine & Spirits in Oklahoma City says his store has had to deal with “outages” of popular products.

“Before, I could order Jack Daniels daily from five different distributors if I needed to,” said Jernigan. “But now, what really grinds my gears is that I’m forced to do business with the company with the worst customer service in the state.”

“Senate Bill 608 offers a

simple fix to the state’s liquor laws, which will have the effect of protecting Oklahoma businesses who are being harmed by the new, monopolistic distribution system,” said Sen. Kim David, the majority floor leader. “This bill protects consumers as well as Oklahoma businesses.”

The bill proposes to exempt the Top 25 wine and spirit brands from designation, which will restore competition to wholesale distribution and provide relief to businesses like Boardwalk.

The list of brands would be derived from sales reporting by wholesalers to the Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement Commission (ABLE) and set annually.

Jernigan supports SB 608, because he believes it will return competition. He believes voters would not have supported SQ 792 had they known about all the hidden changes to distribution.

“The people of Oklahoma didn’t know this was going to happen; they wouldn’t have voted to approve a monopoly,” Hendershot said.

“Monopolies are bad for consumers, and we’re already seeing that in many parts of the state. Empty shelves, higher prices.

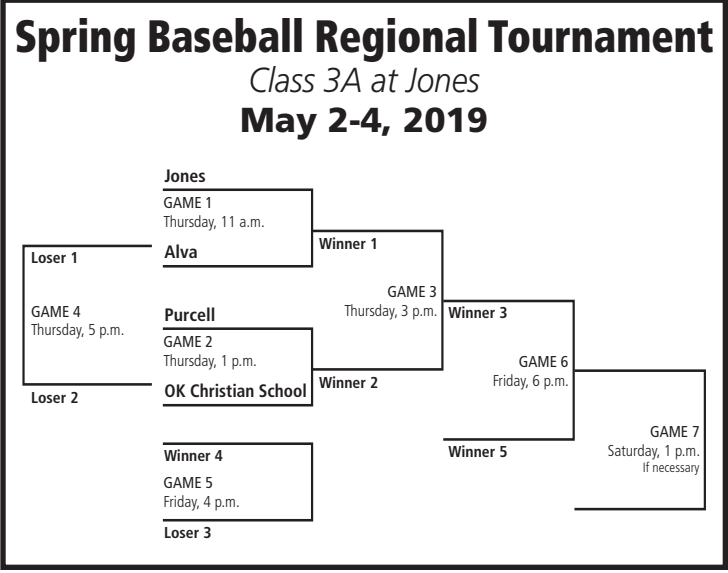
“That’s not what people voted for. They didn’t vote to allow out-of-state, national companies to control the Oklahoma market for the first time. In the end, this is about competition and fairness. The good news is, we can fix it,” Hendershot concluded.

“Blessed are those who have not seen, yet still believe.” (John 20: 29) The Gospel story about the unbelieving Thomas immediately follows a similar story about St. Mary Magdalene. Mary had been outside the empty tomb, weeping for the loss of Jesus who was not there. She turned around and saw Jesus, whom she first thought was the gardener. When she realized it was Jesus, she reached out to hold him. Jesus said to her “Stop holding on to me, Mary. It is time to let go of the earthly Jesus and to embrace the risen Christ.”

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus was sometimes frustrated/ disappointed with people because they were always looking for signs, for miracles, for visible proof of God's power. But with St. Paul we pray “We walk by faith and not by sight.” (2 Cor. 5:7) We walk according to what is unseen, not by what is seen. We walk with the risen Christ, not with the earthly Jesus.

We walk by trust and not by proof.

It is easy to believe in God when there are miracles happening all around you. But that is not faith. That is not trust. It is much more blessed to believe when we are in the darkness than when we are in the light. That is the kind of faith that the Risen Christ is calling us to.

Trust is a virtue, a habit. Like all virtues, it must be practiced over a lifetime. We become trustworthy when we always tell the truth. We become trustworthy when we are careful to not make promises that we cannot keep.

What does it mean to trust another person? People are always going to disappoint us. They are fallible. They make mistakes. They are forgetful, and sometimes inconsiderate of my feelings. But what if my mother makes a mistake, or is in a bad mood. Even then I trust that she loves me, yes?

But God does not disappoint us. God is always trustworthy.

The Eucharist is a visible sign of the invisible love that God has for us. If God can choose to be present in a special way in the Bread of Life, then God can be present in any other place as well. He can be present in our pain, in our sorrow, in our anxiety, and in our joy. The Eucharist is a sign that we place our trust in God, in the risen Christ.

Welcome, friends, to the “front porch.”

I want to tell you today what I believe to be as real and solid as anything in this world: I believe with all my being that God created this old world and everything that is in it.

The reason we believe that God created the world is simple: We believe it because God's Word declares it. As soon as the Holy Spirit opens the curtain of inspiration, He says, “In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth” (Genesis 1:1).

The Lord never goes about “proving” His existence in His powerful Word. He declares it profoundly and emphatically. Should a man choose to question the great truth, the Spirit offers the ultimate rebuttal, saying, “The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God” (Psalm 14:1).

A couple of years ago, a news show reminded me how the world tends to question God's grand declaration of Genesis 1:1. I happened upon a panel discussion on one of the national news stations where the host asked several guests to share a great scene in history they would go back and

witness if possible.

One by one the panelists recounted some great American moments they would re-visit, such as Kennedy's “Ask not what your country can do for you...” speech, or to Martin Luther King's speech at the great Lincoln Memorial.

But one panelist surprised the entire group when his turn came to speak. He said, “I think I'd go back to the resurrection.” The panel laughed loudly, thinking, I'm sure, “What a strange request! How could you go back to a scene that never really happened?,” even though we know the resurrection is the greatest event in the history of the world.

I could not help but think at that moment: What a sad thing for a man or woman to live such a faithless life! The host of the show – obviously in reaction to the previous gentlemen – said, “Well, I think I'd go back to the big bang.” The group was more than pleased with that countermove and chattered on a good while about that worldly response.

When the chatter died down, the first gentleman – unwilling to concede to faithless notions – said boldly, “Well, I subscribe to a different belief.”

It was refreshing to see a man – there on national television – subscribe to what the world sees as an old, archaic, out-of-date belief: “In the beginning God created ...”

It may be out of date to the world, but it is not out of date to us! And it was not out of date to those writers whose pen the Holy Spirit guided long ago.

Nehemiah, one of the last writers of the Old Testament – writing around 400 B.C. – says, “Thou, even thou, art Lord alone; thou hast made heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host, the earth, and all things that are therein, and thou preservest them all: and the host of heaven worshippeth thee” (9:6).

David nor Nehemiah witnessed the creation, nor does

Through designated phases of support, residents work through the challenges in their lives, deal with root-issues and journey forward with new found hope.

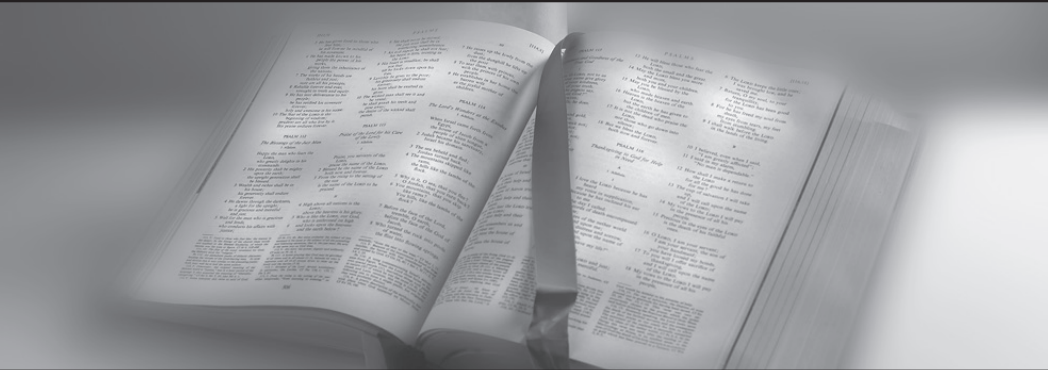

Using Surfactants to Increase Pesticide Efficacy

Adjuvants (surfactants, stickers, spreaders, drift control) are materials that are added to your sprayer tank to increase the effectiveness of the pesticide you are using. They are especially critical during the use of herbicides on tough perennial or brush species that contain various defense mechanisms on their outer leaf surfaces.

If you've ever noticed the waxy covering (cuticle) of an oak or greenbriar leaf or the hairy leaf of common mullein or woolly croton it becomes clear why actually getting the chemical into the plant is the first hurdle in efficient weed control.

How many times have you heard someone say "soap works just as well"? True, it might help on weaker weed species, but most don't compare to the advantage offered from a true commercial surfactant.

Although household soaps are essentially 10-20 percent surfactants, they are not as concentrated as true 50-90 percent Ag surfactants manufactured for use with agricultural pesticides. This can make a big difference when it comes to enhancing the effectiveness of pesticide activity.

Household soaps can also create problems with excessive foaming in the tank and some of these soaps will react with hard water to produce scum and precipitants that can affect pesticide performance. Most Ag surfactants were developed for compatibility with hard or soft water and will not foam excessively in normal sprayer tank conditions.

Surfactants (short for surface acting agents) are most often used with herbicides to help the chemical spread out and penetrate the waxy cuticle of the leaf or to penetrate through the small hairs present on the leaf surface.

Since water has a high surface tension it tends to maintain its round, droplet shape when sit-

ting on the surface of the leaf. The surfactant acts to break down this surface tension of the droplet allowing the liquid to spread over the leaf surface. This results in more of the pesticide coming into contact with the leaf and as a result, more of the pesticide gets into the plant.

Many surfactants now on the market also contain an acidifying agent. This acidic additive reduces the pH of tank water prior to application.

Why is this important? Many of our current herbicides are formulated as weak acids and therefore are most stable in a neutral or slightly acid tank environment.

What you may not realize is that most treated (chlorinated) rural water sources have pH values between 7.8-8.5 from the tap.

This alkaline environment begins to break down the acidic herbicide, eventually rendering it ineffective. Some pesticides can actually be fully inactive in as little as an hour! This is why acidifiers may be a smart addition to your pesticide tool box when using tap water.

When you are considering using a surfactant, always consult the label as to when its addition to the pesticide will help in enhancing the control of the pesticide.

Dale K. Graham Veterans's Foundation

The Masonic Charity Foundation of Oklahoma gifted Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation with a \$25,000 donation last week. John Logan of the Masonic Charity Foundation and his Masonic brethren presented the check at Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation in Norman. Lora Malone, Executive Director for Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation, said, "It is a complete honor to accept this gift from the Masonic Charity Foundation of Oklahoma due to the fact that our missions are parallel in the goal of giving back to America's Heroes. This gift will provide so many with the opportunity to heal and be appreciated."

As the weather continues to improve the number of veterans who are making the trip to our Foundation increases. One of them had been planning a journey from the high country of Colorado for several months while he waited for the snow to melt off and his road to clear. He made it in last Tuesday morning arriving at our location at 3 a.m. ready to start his claim for VA benefits.

After reviewing his Medical records and his VA claims folder, we decided to send him to a medical professional for an evaluation of his service-connected disabilities using a VA Disabilities Benefits Questionnaire. We also asked for an evaluation of secondary conditions to some of his other disabilities that are already service-connected.

As many of the veterans we see are already receiving benefits for injuries that occurred in the military, many of them may also be suffering from depression that is secondary to those disabilities. An example would be if a veteran received an injury to their knees during their service, and now they are unable to enjoy the outdoors with grandchildren or other friends and family members.

For those of you who were not aware of our onsite mental health counselors from the Vet-Centers, please consider stopping to visit with them about any mental health issues you feel were caused or aggravated by your military service. They can provide onsite services or at any of the Vet Centers located in Lawton, Tulsa or Oklahoma City.

Over 20 years ago I was part of a program that was called A Walk through Vietnam established to help veterans deal with PTSD and other issues that were caused by that war. I can honestly say that the services they provided to us not only changed my life but the lives of countless other veterans who were suffering from PTSD and other Depression-like symptoms. What many of us learned during that program was that we were not alone and there were thousands of veterans from all wars who suffered from disabilities that were caused by traumatic events that occurred. After we finished that program several of us began to encourage other veterans who we knew to visit a Vet Center near where they lived.

I know that some of our readers have heard my request for more volunteers many times; we believe there will always be a need to help veterans and their families. Last week I was talking to some veterans in the Enid area who wanted to know if we ever sent volunteers to their town. The answer is not yet, but we are looking at ways to provide services in that area.

One way might be to have volunteers who live there to fill out the VA Form 21-22A and the 1-0966 to be sent to our location to be reviewed. This would then give the veteran or surviving spouse one year to obtain the evidence needed to support their application for VA benefits. They would need to make one or two trips to our location to visit our health care professionals or one of their choices before filing a Fully Developed Claim.

I continue to receive questions about Blue Water Navy people, the personnel who served aboard Navy Ships supporting those who served in Vietnam. Some of you have heard that VA is going to start granting benefits to those who may have been exposed to

Agent Orange and now have some of the presumptive disabilities associated with that chemical.

My advice to anyone who is part of the Blue Water Navy is to file a claim for service-connection of any disease that was presumptive to exposure to that chemical. That goes for the surviving spouses of Blue Water sailors and airmen. Some of the conditions that are presumptive to exposure to Agent Orange include Hairy Cell and other B-cell Leukemia's, Parkinson's disease, Ischemic Heart Disease, AL Amyloidosis, Chloracne, Diabetes Type 2, Hodgkin's Disease, Multiple Myeloma and Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma.

I receive all the rating decisions and other correspondence for the men and women we represent. This enables us to be more proactive in the claims process for everyone who we are the POA for their VA claims. Last week 31 veterans received ratings of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. Their combined annual dollar amount is \$1,261,484 per year.

Those men and women will be eligible for the Oklahoma state tax benefits including property tax exemption on their primary residence, Sales Tax Exemption of purchases up to \$25,000 per year, and there are several other state benefits that available to them such as reduced auto tags for two vehicles

Forty-three veterans were awarded disability ratings from 10-90 percent. Those men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$721,327.

Three surviving spouses of veterans were awarded DEIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their spouse's military service and will receive a combined annual amount of \$54,768.

Our organization is a 501(C)(3) non-profit that relies on donations to be able to provide services to the thousands of

veterans and their families who need assistance. We accept the donations of cars, trucks, motorcycles or other types of items that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide for veteran's needs. Please remember that your donations should be tax deductible on your income taxes.


